

Green light for Fleurieu speed limit change...

After years of advocating, the Clayton Bay community is now applauding a move to reduce a stretch of local road from 80km/h to 50km/h.

The State Government recently approved Alexandrina Council's proposal to extend the 50km/h speed limit for about 900m, past homes on Alexandrina Drive along the western side of Clayton Bay.

The 50km/h extension starts along Finniss-Clayton Road, about 100m west, past the Clayton Street and Pearce Road intersection, to the existing 50km/h zone near Island View Drive.

During public consultation, more than 90 per cent of responding residents strongly supported the change, and council formally applied for approval to the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) late last year.

Brian O'Flaherty lives along that strip and was pleased with the move, after being forced to regularly pull rubbish bins to the other side of the 80km/h road over the years, which he deemed "ridiculous" and "dangerous" with the nearby blind corner.

He also reverses his car from a steep driveway onto that road.

"We've had neighbours here over the years who have avoided impact with cars... cars will come flying around that corner doing 80 km/h plus," Mr O'Flaherty said.

A local teenager is hoping to prevent other families going through the same bowel cancer experience by shaving his head for a worthy cause later this year.

Bowel cancer claims the lives of 103 Australians every week or 5350 people a year, but it's one of the most treatable types of cancer when detected early.

Goolwa resident Christopher Watson is currently raising awareness about the inconspicuous disease along with muchneeded funds to help Bowel Cancer Australia with prevention, early diagnosis, research, quality treatment and care.

He will be doing this by shaving his head at the South Lakes Golf Club during Bowel Cancer Awareness Month on June 13.

"Mum has had (it) and I don't want other at the golf club in June. families to go through what we had to go through," Chris said.

Chris has already raised more than \$1000 towards the cause, but hopes many more

His mum Sally emphasised the importance of raising awareness, but also of people taking the bowel cancer screening test.

"When you get your kit, do the test because I had zero symptoms whatsoever and if I hadn't done the kit, I wouldn't have known it was there," she said. "The government sends out all these

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AFL comes to the Adelaide Hills

Adelaide Hills' communities are gearing up for an influx of visitors during the two local matches of the AFL Gather Round this weekend.

Two sold-out back-to-back AFL matches will kick off in Mount Barker on Saturday with West Coast Eagles v Sydney Swans then Gold Coast Suns v GWS Giants on Sunday.

Running alongside the games is a free two-day community event, Gather in the Hills – Hahndorf Footy Festival, which will be held in the main street of Hahndorf, and a new AFL Family Zone at the grounds at Mount Barker

The precinct – The Terrace – will return to Mount Barker's Summit Sport & Recreation Park to showcase Adelaide Hills' food, wines and spirits.

The weekend program of community arts, live music, free family activities, and player appearances will be held at Hahndorf Academy lawns.

Some of the game's littlest fans will enjoy a brand-new AFL Family Zone activation at Mount Barker which includes a mini football oval to play NAB AFL Auskick, footy skills games, mascot meet-and-greets and a dedicated chill zone for when the kids need to take a break.

Adelaide Oval is bringing some big music acts, including indie-rock band The Jungle Giants and electronic music duo The Presets.

Last year's inaugural Gather Round had 268,000 fans attend across all nine sold-out matches, more than 40,000 interstate visitors and more than 80,000 fans attend the Footy Festival at Elder Park.

The 2023 event contributed \$83 million to the state, and generated more than 25,000 visitor nights outside of Adelaide.

The Mount Barker match helped inject \$2 million into the Adelaide Hills' economy.

Grandstands at Mount Barker will be steeper than last year to fit more people, increasing capacity from about 7500 to 10,000.

Treasurer Stephen Mullighan told *The Argus* that one of the reasons he wanted to host the Gather Round was to showcase the state to the rest of the nation.

"When you come to Hahndorf or you go to Mount Barker oval and see what can be

achieved – putting on a game when more than 10,000 people will come – it's one of the best demonstrations of what South Australia has to offer," he said.

"It's really lovely to see it back in Mount Barker, and see the festivities in Hahndorf and the surrounding regions."

Mayor David Leach said this is a "great

partnership" between the State Government, AFL, Mount Barker District Council, and the community.

"We have over 500 volunteers who are going to be working on that weekend to make sure this all goes well," he said.

"The council has staff members... who are intrinsic in making sure that this works.

"We've got a really good team of people on council – we also have a really good community.

"We are honoured that we've been trusted with two games, especially after last year's success.

"We are absolutely stoked to have two matches instead of one – it's beyond my dreams."

Uber weighs in on rideshare restrictions

Uber has weighed in on the debate around expanding rideshare services into the regions, calling for a number of restrictions to be eased.

Infrastructure and Transport Minister Tom Koutsantonis said the government was currently undertaking a review of all point-to-point transport services in South Australia, and all implications and potential impacts on existing taxi operations were being examined as part of the process.

He said at the moment Uber only has to seek an exemption to operate outside the metropolitan boundary, but that no application has been made yet.

However, Member for Hammond Adrian Pederick said that, as it stands, separate accreditation is required for drivers in metropolitan and regional areas and drivers are not permitted to hold both accreditations simultaneously.

He said this limits drivers from

operating across both boundaries and that no such restrictions exist anywhere else in the country.

An Uber spokesperson said there were several ways to ease the restrictions as part of the review into the Passenger Transport Act.

"They include expanding the restricted area, allowing drivers to hold licences for both metropolitan and regional areas or removing the boundary altogether," the spokesperson said.

"Requiring drivers to undertake the cost and burden of two accreditation processes within the one state is also not a feasible, long-term solution that would see the convenience, safety and reliability of rideshare made available for more South Australians.

"We would be delighted to see the expansion of the metropolitan point-to-point transport border to include other areas in South Australia, allowing locals in the regional areas to have the same opportunities to choose rideshare as

people in Adelaide.

"We know access to transport is an important factor in social mobility and ridesharing can go a long way to solving many issues for regional cities."

Mr Pederick said that after meeting with Uber, he was keen for change.

"I'm keen to see these regulations amended to enable expansion of rideshare to regional areas, including Murray Bridge and Strathalbyn in my electorate of Hammond," he said.

"The ball is now firmly in Tom Koutsantonis' court to work through these issues and the minister must solve this situation now because regional people deserve better access to these services."

He said Uber had suggested three options to remedy the situation:

- Remove the boundary distinction between metropolitan and regional.
- Expand the metro boundary further to include some regional areas.
- Allow drivers to hold both accreditations simultaneously and operate in both areas.

"I've seen kids riding their bikes along the road and trucks coming at 80 km/h.

"This has taken so long in bureaucratic red tape, but we're happy they have finally decided to do it and we can't wait until that speed limit is dropped.

"Even in terms of noise pollution too, we won't have roaring trucks driving past at a high speed"

Clayton Bay Community Association's former President, Leonie Henderson, was in the position when the group advocated for the change in 2016.

"At that stage, there were houses being built along Alexandrina Drive so people were concerned," she said.

"It does mean it is a fairly long stretch that is 50km/h, (but) I think it's good news

and the majority of people are going to be happy about it."

The association's current Secretary, Peter Lomman, was also pleased the ongoing safety calls from the community were answered.

"Council has been very supportive of it... it has taken some time for (DIT) to finally realise that there's enough demand from the local community to have it adjusted, which is terrific now," he said.

He described the stretch of road as a "speed area" coming into town, with some drivers entering town at 80km/h or more, so the change is safer for residents.

"This is about improving the amenity for the Clayton Bay residents and the local fauna," Mr Lomman said.

"That road borders a wetland and we've got nesting and roosting birds that are living

in the reeds, so slowing the traffic down means they're not going to be as disrupted by the traffic.

"Some of these things are just small steps towards a broader community that's really caring of its environment."

After hearing multiple concerns raised, Mayor Keith Parkes was excited when the approval recently came through.

"This is a great outcome for Clayton Bay, making this lakeside town safer for everyone and demonstrating that when communities work with council, we can advocate for positive change," he said.

He encouraged all residents and visitors to be mindful of the new speed limit when signs are installed in the coming weeks.

Regional helipads to be upgraded in the Fleurieu

Murray Bridge and Victor Harbor's helipads are among those that will be upgraded thanks to a \$23.4 million investment over two years to allow South Australians needing urgent medical treatment to continue to be airlifted safely from key regional hospitals.

The new helipads will allow South Australian public hospitals to better comply with the new Civil Aviation Safety Regulations while improving the safety of operations – pivotal to the transport and care of regional South Australians.

Most helipads will be widened to have larger landing areas, allowing the new statewide rescue helicopter service fleet to be able to use them safely during the day and night when they hit the skies later this year.

Pathways from helipads to hospitals will be improved, as will lighting, beacons and navigation equipment, and in some areas, safety zones will also be widened to better protect patients and staff when the helipads are in use.

"Our rescue helicopters are essential so everyone has access to the best quality health services, no matter where you live," Health Minister, Chris Picton, said.

"Rescue helicopters and MedSTAR are especially important for serious emergencies such as serious car accidents.

"Upgrading these 13 helipads that service regional South Australian hospitals will ensure critically ill and injured patients can

be transported safely and quickly to a major trauma hospital for treatment.

"These helipad upgrades build upon our other big investments in upgrading country hospitals across the state."

The first round of helipad upgrades will start later this year, with completion of all 13 sites expected in 2025.

The project at Murray Bridge will be ready to tender by the end of March, while Victor Harbor will be tendered and delivered through aligning these works with other SA Health capital works under way at the location.

Designated alternative landing sites are being arranged at local airfields and community sports ovals, allowing services to continue while works are carried out.

Langhorne Creek speed change welcomed by locals

The creek is hopefully 'no longer in crisis' now that the state department has lowered the speed limit signage entering into the Langhorne Creek township.

into the Langhorne Creek township.
As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Langhorne Creek locals raised concerns about Bridge Road – the major thoroughfare linking the town with Strathalbyn to the west and Wellington in the east – which had become notorious for speeding.

Since publication in October last year, the Department for Infrastructure has undertaken a review of the road and found it is used by a significant number of heavy vehicles, prompting them to lower the speed limit for safety reasons.

"For the safety of school students and all road users, the speed limit on Langhorne Creek Road within the township was lowered from 60km/h to 50km/h on March 1, 2024," a department spokesperson told *The Argus*.

"It also found a bend in the road near the school crossing creates line of sight challenges for drivers approaching the crossing

"The same review found that all other existing speed limits within Langhorne Creek township and on the approaches to Langhorne Creek are appropriate for existing conditions, meaning no other speed limit changes are planned."

The change was welcomed by local resident David Freestone, who led the charge on a petition to reduce the speed limit coming into town from 80km/h to 70km/h and through the town from 60km/h to 50km/h, after witnessing vehicles driving at excessive speeds.

"We're grateful to all the people that signed the petition," Mr Freestone said.

"That was delivered to Adrian Pederick and his submissions to the Minister for Infrastructure (Tom Koutsantonis) were successful, and with the help of *The Southern Argus...* common sense prevailed.

"Even though it's freight route.... it's still a village of people and there's still a primary school with students that all deserve care and looking after, and there's also quite a few retired senior people that need to be cared for.

"It should be a win-win all around."
Mr Freestone also wanted a Township
Entry Treatment (TET) implemented,
but due to state regulations stating
red paint is only allowed on the road
for buses, this is currently impossible
without politicians making a change.





Woman arrested for taking drugs into prison

A Huntfield Heights woman was arrested last Sunday for taking illicit drugs into a Murray Bridge prison.

At about 10am on March 24, Mobilong Prison Corrections Officers advised police a woman was suspected to be in possession of illicit drugs.

Following an investigation, the woman was found to be in possession of capsules and pills which police allege are illicit drugs.

A 29-year-old Huntfield Heights woman was arrested and charged with introducing a prohibited item into a correctional facility and driving while

She was granted police bail to attend Murray Bridge Magistrates Court at a later date.

On the same day, at about 1.45pm, police responded to the Mobilong Prison after a report from Corrections Officers that substances believed to be illicit drugs and a glass pipe had been located in a vehicle.

Police attended and seized the items from inside the car, and the occupants of the vehicle, a 30-year-old Flagstaff Hill woman and a 47-year-old Aldinga Beach woman, were both reported for possession of the items.

They will be summonsed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court at a later date.

Man arrested for supermarket theft

A Murray Bridge man was arrested and charged last Wednesday with four counts of theft from a local supermarket.

On March 20, police attended a Murray Bridge address and arrested a 41-year-old man following an investigation into recent shop thefts.

It is alleged that over a week-long period the man attended a Murray Bridge supermarket four times and stole hundreds of dollars' worth of items.

He was charged with four counts of theft and unlawful possession, and bailed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on May 27.

Speeding fines skyrocket

More than a million speeding fines worth more than \$400 million have been issued to motorists on South Australian roads in the past five years, according to figures obtained

Latest SA Police figures revealed 202,358 speeding fines were issued last year - 3548 more than the preceding year and the highest number since 2020 - meaning police have issued 1,008,709 speeding fines worth around \$417 million since 2019.

The huge number of fines has prompted RAA to remind drivers that speeding is one of the 'Fatal Five' causes of road trauma.

"Inappropriate speed continues to be a major contributing factor to serious and fatal crashes," RAA Senior Traffic Engineer, Matt Vertudaches, said.

"Even small increases in speed mean you will travel a longer distance before you can react and bring your vehicle to a stop if something unexpected occurs on the road."

The number of speeding offences picked up by roadside police officers in 2023 was the highest since 2013, with 46,307 offences

By comparison, 96,438 fines were detected by

mobile cameras, and 59,613 by fixed cameras.

In the past four years, from 2020-2023, a 26 per cent increase has occurred in the number of motorists caught by mobile cameras compared to the previous four years, from 2016-2019, and a 36 per cent reduction in the number of fines generated by fixed cameras.

Mr Vertudaches said this may be partly due to COVID's impact on traffic levels.

"While traffic levels are back to normal now, until recently, there has generally been less traffic at peak times and locations, which may be why less drivers were detected by fixed cameras at busy spots," he said.

"But alarmingly, 14,624 drivers were detected speeding at least 20km/hr over the limit last year, showing many drivers are still willing to risk a serious fine and put others in danger by exceeding the speed limit.

"Drivers should also remember that, unless otherwise signposted, the default speed limit on South Australian roads is 50km/hr in built-up areas and 100km/h in regional areas.

"Remember, these are the maximum and the safe speed may actually be lower, depending upon traffic, prevailing weather conditions and the type of vehicle that you're driving."

Repeat child sex offenders warned

Repeat serious child sex offenders would be jailed indefinitely under laws recently introduced to State Parliament.

If passed, the new laws would apply to offenders who have been imprisoned for a second time for a serious child sex offence, and would give South Australia the toughest laws in the country when dealing with repeat serious offenders.

Offenders jailed for a second serious child sex offence will be jailed indefinitely and will only be eligible for release if they can satisfy the court that they are willing and able to control their sexual instincts.

Even if they are released, they will face electronic monitoring.

"We will do everything within our power to protect the community from vile child sex offenders," Attorney-General, Kyam Maher, said.

"These laws send a very strong message to those who have been locked up once for a serious child sex offence - offend again and face detention for life.

"It's the protection all South Australian families deserve from these abhorrent criminals."

These proposed laws build on a number of other tough new changes to child sex offender laws, including:

- Increasing penalties for a range of child sex abuse offences such as increasing the maximum penalty for gross indecency with or in the presence of a child from five to 15 years.
- Introducing legislation to ban child $sex\ of fenders\ from\ working\ in\ places\ that$ also hire underage employees such as hospitality or retail.
- Strengthening Carly's Law, so tough penalties apply to offenders who communicate online with police officers posing as fictitious children.

Be autumn-prepared this season

As the number of calls for help to the South Australian State Emergency Service (SES) continues to trend upwards during autumn months, residents are being encouraged to take a proactive approach to minimise potential damage to their homes and properties.

In 2023, the SES recorded its secondhighest number of requests for assistance on record for autumn, following year-onyear increases of 925 in 2021, 1587 in 2022 and 1719 last year.

SES Chief Officer Chris Beattie said many people were often caught unaware in autumn due to the expectation of milder weather.

"The prior six months of summer and spring is when we all see a surge in the growth of trees and plants around the home," he said.

"This growth spurt can result in people being unaware of some changes that have occurred around their property such as tree branches now reaching over the roof of their home.

"We have all been enjoying the summer holidays, so there will be more children's play

equipment such as swings or trampolines, as well as outdoor furniture in our yards.

"With just a little preventative action, people can minimise potential impacts in and around their homes."

With trees due to start shedding their leaves it is important to regularly check and clear gutters, downpipes and drains to avoid internal or localised flooding around the home.

For autumn preparedness the SES also advises the following:

- Secure loose items in the yard.
- Trim trees and branches that could fall on the home or property.
- Check the insurance policy is adequate and covers for storm damage.
- Fix any damage to the roof.
- Clear gutters, downpipes and drains to prevent blockages.
- Be prepared for power outages.

For emergency storm assistance, people should contact 132 500, and for life threatening emergencies, Triple Zero (000).

Strathalbyn-based actor Jessica Corrie will make a return to the stage this month, after being cast in the ensemble for the Adelaide production of *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night Time*.

The production has been adapted by Simon Stephens from Mark Haddon's best-selling book, presented by The Flying Elephant Company and Limelight Theatrics, directed by Nick Fagan and will run from today until April 13 at the Goodwood Theatre.

At the heart of the story is 15-year-old Christopher, who stands beside Mrs Shear's dead dog Wellington.

Wellington has been speared with a garden fork.

It is seven minutes after midnight, and Christopher is under suspicion.

He records each fact in the book he is writing to solve the murder mystery.

Christopher is exceptional at maths, but he is ill-equipped to interpret everyday life. His detective work, forbidden by his father, takes him on a frightening journey that turns his world upside down.

The SA season is the vision of Benji Riggs, from The Flying Elephant Company, and Michelle Nightingale from Limelight Theatrics.

Corrie said the production includes six actors in the ensemble, and four lead characters.

"I play about five different characters though the show, as in the ensemble, we all play multiple roles, from people answering doors, to a punk girl, to announcing advertisements in a train station," she said.

"I think our version is going to explore the depth of the relationships, while having a lot of funny moments in it.

"It has been great to work with a very talented bunch of actors, and everyone has been so friendly and welcoming.

"Nearly all of the actors stay on stage for almost the entire show, so we also have to learn the run of the show, which is another challenge on top of learning our lines.

"And the scenes change quite quickly, so we have to be a bit creative with how we depict these abstract moments."

Corrie has spent the majority of her life in Strathalbyn, completing an honours degree in acting at Flinders University after being inspired by her drama teachers at Cornerstone College in Mount Barker.

Her acting journey has seen her teach

at the Hills Youth Theatre in Stirling, and perform in productions such as *The Suicide* and *Home, I'm Darling*.

"(Rehearsals) have been going really well.
"We moved into the theatre on Saturday, and we are just doing some lights and painting boxes because we have a very minimal set.

"Then we have our first full day of bump in (on Monday)."

Mark Haddon's novel has amassed more than 17 literacy awards, while Simon Stephens' adaptation has been awarded seven Oliver Awards and five Tony Awards.

Conflict of interest

Dear Editor, I write to provide clarity on conflict of interests that have been discussed in the community.

It has been asserted that councillors Scott and Miller had a material conflict of interest with respect to their participation in the discussion and debate regarding a motion regarding a proposed rates review process.

By way of background, at the council meeting of Monday, December 18, 2023, Cr Coomans proposed a review of the council's rating system, prior to the formation of the council's draft 2024/25 Annual Business Plan and Budget.

During the discussion and debate on that motion, by way of a formal motion moved by councillor Scott and seconded by councillor Miller, carried by majority decision of the chamber, council determined to adjourn its consideration of such a review.

That is, it was a decision of the council, as a governing body, to adjourn its consideration of this item to a later time.

There was, and is, no conflict of interest under the act for the named councillors, nor for any councillor, with respect to the council's consideration of the item and any assertion to the contrary, including any suggestion that any councillor acted inappropriately, is unfair and unwarranted.

Further, to clear up any misunderstanding when it comes to any alleged conflict of interest for a member with respect to rating matters, I confirm as follows:

- Under the Local Government Act 1999 (the Act) a member of a council has a material conflict of interest in a matter to be discussed at a meeting of the council, if any of the persons identified in section 75 of the Act, including the member, would gain a benefit or suffer a loss, depending on the outcome of the consideration of the matter at the meeting.
- Of course, when it comes to the declaration of rates, each and every member of the council would gain a benefit or suffer a loss as the case may be with respect to this decision.
- However, and for that reason, section 75A of the Act provides for certain exemptions, including those set out under regulation 8AAA of the Local Government (General) Regulations 2013 (the Regulations).
- Regulation 8AAA(1)(e), (f) and (g) together provide that the adoption or revision of an annual business plan; the adoption or revision of a budget and the declaration of rates (other than a separate rate) are such exemptions.
- In addition, section 75A(1)(a) also provides that a member will not be taken to have a conflict of interest in matters that are held in common with a substantial proportion of the ratepayers, electors or residents of the council area, the declaration of rates being one such matter that has traditionally been considered under such an exemption.
 - However, noting the specific exemption

for members that is now set out under the regulations, there is no need to rely on this 'substantial proportion' exemption any longer for such matters.

• It is also to be recalled that the decision of the council at its meeting of Monday, December 18, 2023 was simply to adjourn its consideration of such a review. In which case, there is no 'outcome' caught by the conflict of interest obligations in any event.

Lastly, it is not for me, as CEO, nor the Mayor or any other member to raise with a member their conflict of interest obligations.

It is for each member to consider and determine – the same for each item of business at a council meeting.

We trust the above serves to clarify any confusion or concern on these issues.

Disturbance of natural algae-rhythm

The current blue-green algal bloom in Lake Alexandrina shows we must urgently reduce the amount of nitrogen and phosphorus entering the lake.

The nutrients carried down in the recent floods has combined with agricultural run-off, nutrients from our septic systems, and higher summer temperatures to cause an algal bloom.

Blue-green algae – actually a cyanobacteria – is more than an annoyance – some contain dangerous poisons which are released when the algae dies.

It is possible that the neuro-toxins in some blue green algae may be a cause of motor neurone disease.

These toxins in the short-term can also be deadly for humans, pets, native animals and livestock.

Construction of sewage systems and water treatment plants in our towns would go some way to restoring the health of the lake.

Primary producer rates response

In her defence of Alexandrina Council's rates discount for primary producers in last Week's *Argus*, councillor Sue Miller – herself a primary producer – uses council's rating policy justification for that 17 per cent discount ending with the words "...while at the same time, not enjoying the same level of access to council-provided services and quality of infrastructure those in townships do".

But these are the words council now edits out of their budget documents, no doubt because they directly contradict the reasons given at last year's pre-budget 'roadshows' for our high rates, viz the cost of maintaining our 770 kilometres of unsealed roads.

But of course, these are the very roads that provide access to primary producers.

Similarly, when she tells us the Local Government Act explicitly exempts her from having a conflict of interest when dealing with the primary producer rates discount because she is part of the significant proportion of ratepayers involved – ie. primary producers, she is referring to Section 75A (1) (a) of the Act itself – which if quoted in full actually goes on to say that "this exemption does not apply where the interest of the group materially exceeds the interests of the other ratepayers".

Now I reckon that any reasonable person would agree the \$400-plus average reduction in rates enjoyed by Alexandrina's primary producers is a material benefit that far exceeds the average \$74 cost general ratepayers have to pay to cover that shortfall.

But although the original intent of Section 75A is clear when considered in full, it seems there is now a regulation under the act that allows councillors exemptions from material conflicts of interest on all matters relating to budgets, business plans and rates.

In my view that is outrageous, fails to protect us in the way that Section 75A was originally intended, and not only fails the pub test, but fails it badly.



"This means my amount of money raised from generous sponsors can fund 426 peer support sessions, 255 employment support sessions or 22 psychology sessions to support the mental health of our brave

veterans and their families," he said.

"Young serving men are twice as likely to take their own life post service.

"On a personal level, I've made new friends while fundraising within the veteran community and I'll continue to walk as it's rekindled my drive for fitness."

Mr Hopgood joined a total of 6884 participants in the fundraiser who raised more than \$1,600,000.

Smokers urged to 'Quit your way'

South Australian smokers are once again planning to put away their cigarettes for the fourth annual 'Quit your way in May' campaign.

The month-long campaign emphasises the importance of smokers quitting their own way, and provides platforms for participants to quit alongside other community members by establishing a May 1 quit date.

Last year's campaign achieved 550 registrations and more than 9000 visits to the Quit your way in May website, and of participants surveyed one month after, 69 per cent had remained smoke-free.

This year, Quit your way in May's advertisement with animated buddies will be back, demonstrating different distraction techniques.

A variety of resources are provided to registrants, including evidence-based quitting strategies, tools such as the My QuitBuddy app, and distraction techniques to assist quitters to combat their cravings and withdrawal symptoms, as well as vaping cessation resources.

Registrants can sign up for regular emails of support from 'Quit your way in May' that offer advice on quitting smoking, distraction techniques and words of encouragement to set participants up for ultimate success, or participate in the 'Quit your way' Facebook support group.

Participants are encouraged to visit their doctor for support to quit smoking.







Thousands flock to Rotary Easter markets

The Rotary markets at Goolwa and Port Elliot over the Easter long weekend were the busiest of the year.

"It's a demonstration of our commitment to the local communities and we're very grateful for the support of both the stallholders and the patrons who visit."

Celebrations as China lifts wine tariffs

South Australians are celebrating the return of free trade between China and Australia after the former country decided to lift all import duties on Australian bottled wine.

In October 2020, prior to tariffs, China was South Australia's largest wine export market, with exports valued at \$946.5 million, accounting for 47.2 per cent of SA's wine exports globally.

A month later, China made interim determinations of anti-dumping and countervailing duties against Australia, with import duties of up to 218 per cent confirmed in March 2021, which plummeted the amount of Australian wine exported to China as a result.

China's announcement to remove all trade barriers on Australian wine follows concerted efforts by both State and Federal Governments to stabilise the trading relationship between the two nations.

"This is exciting for South Australia and in particular, the communities in our worldfamous wine producing regions," SA Premier, Peter Malinauskas, said.

"The decision of the Chinese Government to lift tariffs is a significant one for thousands of South Australians whose lives and livelihoods have been significantly hurt in recent years.

"At both a state and federal level, the government has been passionately advocating

for the removal of trade barriers on Australian wine and speaking directly with key decision-makers in China.

"This is a decision which has the potential to deliver benefits for people of both nations.

"It's with great excitement the tariffs have now been dropped and our local wine industry can explore opportunities to restore export relationships to our largest trading partner."

The announcement was particularly welcomed by the South Australian Wine Industry Association (SAWIA), which said wine businesses can now consider reentering the market.

"This decision is important and highlights the ongoing strengthening of Australia's trading relationship with China, for the mutual benefit of both countries," SAWIA President, Kirsty Balnaves, said.

"Significant trade exists between China and Australia, and the removal of import duties on wine will result in South Australian wine businesses re-considering the China wine market and allocating wine to the market.

"This will be based on several important factors, principally, a market risk assessment, acknowledging the importance of market diversification."

Other important considerations for South Australian wine businesses considering re-entering the China market include: • The relationship between the wine business and their buyer/distributor.

• The terms and conditions of sale, including price, payment, orders, and shipping.

- Consumer demand.
- Market entry requirements.
- IP and brand protection.

SAWIA is hopeful the lifting of tariffs will also pave the way for trade to resume for other Australian agricultural sectors.

"South Australian wine businesses understand the China wine market has changed since the import duties were imposed," Ms Balnaves said.

"In-market competition for wine is now much stronger than before, meaning there are increased choices for consumers at various price points.

"In addition, alcohol consumption has declined and opportunities for consumption such as events have reduced.

"South Australian wine exporters will need to visit the market to assess the market opportunity, create awareness, provide education, and re-introduce their wines to consumers – this will take time.

"However, Chinese consumers remain familiar with South Australian wine... this positive sentiment stems from the premium quality of South Australian wine, our commitment to sustainable production, and connection with our South Australian wine story."

To help with market re-introduction, the State Government will provide a \$1.85 million China re-engagement support package for SA wine exporters and grape growers.

The support package – which will be rolled out over the next two years to June 2026 – will provide SA's wine sector with in-market insights and capability building to effectively re-engage with the China market in a risk-managed manner, and comprise of five key components: two-way market activation and immersion, promotional marketing and communication campaigns, wine export advisor, technical co-operation, and export capability building.

"South Australians are rightly proud of our world-class wineries and grape producers," Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, Clare Scriven, said.

"This additional support package to industry will importantly assist our growers as they navigate a strategic re-entry into the China market.



The girls academy will be run by Megan Sherry in April, and a lot of clubs are now organising female-only Auskick programs.

Bevan said local footy fans can expect a "good, strong competition" this season, and urged people to get more involved.

"Although the numbers aren't as strong as they were last year, the competition has gotten better," he said.

"Over the years, because the girls are starting at a younger age, their skill level has gotten a lot better.





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Cross and Bazza take the points at Strath trial

Local sheepdog trialler Stefan Cross has continued his good form with dogs Echo Park Bazza and Echo Park Lady by taking out a local sheepdog trial at Finniss over the Easter weekend.

The Strathalbyn and District Working Sheepdog Society staged the event at the Finniss Oval, which was a chance for dogs and handlers across the state to have a go at a Trans-Tasman Trial-type competition.

Fresh from success at the Champion of Champions event at the National trials, Cross finished first with Bazza in the Open, and Lady second.

Club spokesperson Simone Cross said despite the warm weather on Saturday and Sunday, the event was a "very successful two days".

"I think there was about 15 handlers, and we had 42 dogs in total," Mrs Cross said.

"They all basically had the one run, and then depending on the status of the dog – as some were a lot younger than others – we had a final for each class, so a Novice final, an Improvers final and an Open final."

Ben Simmonds, from Williamstown, won the novice section with his young dog Dizzy, while local Malcolm Sorrell came second, and fellow local Anne Doecke finished third in the class.

"They were the more inexperienced dogs, but they certainly held their own in amongst the more experienced dogs, and did a great job," Mrs Cross said.

"The Improver section was won by Anthony Ireland with his dog Clementsville Maggie from a farm near Crystal Brook, and Ben (Simmonds) backed up from winning the novice and came second in the section with the same dog."

Stefan Cross's dogs Bazza and Lady are brother and sister, with both competing in the Open class.

"Stefan had a great trial and I guess it just (showed) the really good run he is currently having with his dogs," Mrs Cross said.

"But you know, in his acceptance

speech he reiterated the importance of running this particular course, because it is the course that we use when we go and compete in New Zealand, which Stefan has done more than anyone in SA.

"But as he said, 'we don't run them to win them, we run them so that people get more experience working this course'."

Mrs Cross said the more the course is run, the more it will become second nature for everyone.

"You could actually see the handlers that had worked this course a lot," she said

"Stefan obviously has a lot of experience on it, Anthony Ireland, he has represented our state a lot of times, and Australia as well... Milton Cross the same, and Tom Joyce, who represented with Stefan last year in NZ, he was at the trial as well.

"The art of being able to calmly work without upsetting the sheep, it holds the event in really good stead, and others learn from seeing those particular guys working it so well."

Mrs Cross said the Open competition was "tight".

"Bazza beat Lady by one and a half points, so it was really close," she said.

"Anthony came third with his experienced dog, eight points behind Bazza.

"Going into the final there was a 10-point gap between the first handler and the sixth handler, as we take the top six for the final.

"Tom Joyce went into the final on top on 89, and the bottom score was 79, so it was fairly close, and the competition was close in the final as well, which is really nice to see."

Mrs Cross said the sheep used handled beautifully, allowing most competitors to complete the course.

"We got the sheep from David Flovd of

"We got the sheep from David Floyd of Brookleigh Park, which is near Finniss," Mrs Cross said.

"Brookleigh have only recently shorn the sheep... Malcolm Sorrell actually works at Brookleigh Park, and he does an amazing job with their sheep handling, and he uses his dogs. "One of the biggest obstacles that you face when you are running trials is getting sheep from farms where they still use working dogs, because if they are not worked with working dogs they tend to be more flighty than those that are used to dogs.

"Because they have just come through the shearing shed, they have been brought in and out of the paddocks, put into the shed, and moved around the yards in the shed and out of the shed, so they were educated to dogs, which was really pleasing."

Mrs Cross said organisers were thankful for the help from the Finniss Hall committee, who catered for the trial and for the many spectators that came out on Saturday and Sunday to watch the dogs and handlers in action.

"The committee did the catering as a way to raise funds for the upkeep of the hall down there are Finniss, because obviously all these little towns that we have got in our area, they all need to have repair work done and general upkeep, so they were kind enough to do the catering, and that took the pressure off us," Mrs Cross said.

"We had a lot of spectators, particularly on the Saturday, as I think people these days are looking to go somewhere (on weekends)

"It was free, the Finniss Cricket Oval is beautiful, it is a lovely shady spot, and you can sit there under the trees and watch."

The club is now preparing for another trial in a couple of weeks.

"We are having a field trial, so a different course again, and that one is being run in one of our paddocks on Nine Mile Road, between Strath and Milang," Mrs Cross said.

"We have used that paddock before, and it, once again, gives the handlers and dogs a chance to work on a different course.

"It is a field trail, so they use five sheep instead of three, and work the sheep through a different series of obstacle.

'It is just something different for the handlers, the dogs and the people who watch."
