Long-awaited plans for Strathalbyn's vacant Kalimna Hostel - which closed in 2017 - can now be exclusively revealed by The Southern Argus.

million upgrade into a health care hub, as the State Government announced funding to expand local health services that are expected to be no cost to patients.

The space will include outpatient and clinic rooms, health education places, staff offices and amenities.

Upgrades will enable Barossa Hills The High Street site will undergo a \$3 Fleurieu Local Health Network (BHFLHN) coming months and are due to be completed

to expand its allied health, community health, nursing, medical, aboriginal health and mental health services.

Further works will involve off-street car parking for staff and public use, along with gardens designed to complement the building and surrounds.

Works are expected to commence in

by the end of 2026, delivered by South Australian construction company Mykra.

BHFLHN Chief Executive Officer Bronwyn Masters looked forward to the transformation of the building into a healthcare hub that the community could "continue to be proud of".

Local volunteer calls time on his service

Almost a lifetime in the emergency services officially came to end for local councillor and community member Michael Scott last week when he retired from the state's ambulance service as one of its longest serving volunteers.

The Middleton resident started his journey with the ambulance service more than 50 years ago in February 1968 at the Victor Harbor station.

He was spurred by his passion for the emergency services.

"Ever since I was a child, I was very interested in ambulance work," Mr Scott said.

"Then an old fellow who lived in Victor Harbor suggested I should join.

"I gave it considerable thought then I joined. "I remember the first night I went, I went 'yep, this is what I really like' and my enthusiasm has not waned in that time.

"Every time I would come in here for a shift, I would walk through the door and I would be as enthusiastic about the shift as I was on the first day."

Mr Scott worked at least one 12-hour shift a week, going up to four when needed, and frequently did nights.

It was a demanding job at times, but he said. one Mr Scott enjoyed for its challenges and opportunities.

Some of these included being the Superintendent of the Goolwa and Victor Harbor Divisions, the Chairman of the Regional South Australia Ambulance Board, the representative of the Hills, Fleurieu and Kangaroo Island zone on the state committee, and a member of the ambulance board.

It's this work that earned him the Ambulance Service Medal in 2007 and an Order of Australia Medal in 2018, among other honours.

 $Mr\,Scott\,said\,advocating\,for\,the\,members$ was "quite a challenge", but it was all in the service of patient care, which was always his number one priority.

"We were there for our patients – that was central to our being," he said.

"I might have been advocating for our members, but that was to put them in a better position to do a better job for our patients.

'We were trying to achieve progress for our people and we didn't ever achieve quite as much as we had hoped to achieve."

Mr Scott was most proud of being able to help others during his career.

There's a great deal of satisfaction in getting a person out of a very serious situation and getting them to hospital without them deteriorating any further,"

"Saving life is incredibly important." After five decades in the service, Mr Scott has officially ended his membership.

He said it will "take some getting used to", but it was a privilege to have served.

"I was operational for over 53 (years) then I stepped back from being operational and kept my membership going, hoping I would perhaps do something in a non-operational sense, but the opportunities for that are not a lot," Mr Scott explained.

"Particularly in the area of training, it takes a lot of preparation work and I don't have the time to do it, so I thought it's time I left altogether.

"The other thing is it marks the end of my involvement in the emergency services full stop because I spent about 15 years in rescue and 42 years in Country Fire Service (CFS), then the 53 operationally in ambulance, so it's been a lifetime involvement in emergency services at various levels.

"I got out of CFS soon after I got into council and I left rescue a long time ago, but your mindset is still locked into that emergency response framework and I'm still very interested in it.

"Everything comes to an end some time and you have to recognise that and be grateful for the opportunities."

Scarecrows bring smiles

Making scarecrows became an outlet for a Prospect Hill woman during one of the darkest points of her life.

Vanessa Builder was battling with depression after her husband Jason was tragically killed in a car crash.

With the recommendation from her life coach Celeste Miller, Mrs Builder channelled her energy towards what she loved - her unique hobby of making scarecrows.

And since then, she has spread that joy to others by making 500 scarecrows over 14 years, "adopting" them out to households across the district, and giving herself a creative outlet.

"I'm really passionate of all the goodness they can bring - whether you're depressed, grieving, been bullied at school and need some support, or have special needs," she said.

'It's a scarecrow, but the intention behind them is to bring kindness and joy - that's what they did for me.

"They become part of your family and

they just light up your day. When you're watering your garden, there's someone watching over you.'

Her creations have been shared with locals at the Meadows Fair, a Macclesfield Open Garden, through gifts to family and friends and word-of-mouth.

The one-of-a-kind characters truly do

become another member of the family, and are often purchased in pairs so they have a friend.

Many customers send Mrs Builder updates, such as photos in their new homes and names they've been given.

The biodegradable scarecrows last about four years before many customers return for more.

Scarecrows have historic traditions across the world and have been used for more than 3000 years.

The first recorded scarecrows were used by farmers in Ancient Egypt to protect their crops from flocks of quail.

Mrs Builder wants to take their use even further, by exploring "healer-crows", such as ones that have wings as angels.

The craft is now being passed down generations, as her daughter Violet, husband Steve and mum Glenda all come together to help build the creations.

The scarecrow production slowed down, but Mrs Builder has just relaunched the business Tinjella Rise Scarecrow Factory with new enthusiasm and energy, including using a new space at home to build the fun characters.

"Last time I did it for me - this time I'm doing it for everybody," she said.

"The reason I make them is because of what they do.

"It's not about scaring crows – it's about how they make people feel, like if people are sad or lonely."

Foam and discoloured water was reported at Alexandrina beaches since last weekend.

Local fishers are conducting extra tests following reports of discoloured water in the Fleuireu Peninsula, including recently along the Alexandrina coast with dead pipis washing up on Goolwa Beach.

Foam and discoloured water were reported at Goolwa Beach, Chiton Rocks and Port Elliot with reports of people suffering allergic-type responses.

When speaking to *The Argus* earlier this week, fisher Darren Hoad said it seemed to be confined to that region, up to the Goolwa Beach carpark area.

"There is certainly something there that has wiped out a massive population of pipis on Goolwa Beach, specifically west of where you drive out onto the track," he said.

His team harvests commercial pipis on the south-eastern side of the Murray Mouth which was unaffected by the issue.

His biggest hope was that if it did move east, it will break up easier as it enters the wide, open sea.

"(We're) nervous... we're basically in the lap of the gods now," Mr Hoad said.

The reason why was still unconfirmed at time of publication, but reports are similar to others relating to recent microalgal blooms.

Ever since those reports, Hoad Fisheries has been proactive in conducting extra water and meat tests to ensure their pipis remain safe and high-quality.

like this" locally during his career, he found some were washed-up surf clams without pipis in them, which is typical this time of year.

"After you have a bit of calm spell with not much swell and calm seas, (hard shells) start to roll in," he said.

'They do get tangled up in seaweed and roll in and pile up on the beach."

After seeking advice from relevant State Government agencies, Alexandrina $Council\ is sued\ a\ warning\ to\ beach-goers\ to$ avoid discoloured water and eating dead marine life.

Anyone who does enter the water is encouraged to take steps to wash in clean water afterwards.

SA Health also advised that fish caught live were safe to eat.


At this stage, the Department for Environment and Water and the EPA have not advised the closure of Goolwa Beach or any other beach in the district.



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Future of Kalimna site revealed

"The Kalimna site has been a valuable asset to the Strathalbyn community for several decades and we are pleased its purpose of serving the public remains," she said.

"The extra health services will also enable people to access the care they require in familiar surrounds."

Minister for Health and Wellbeing, Chris Picton, believed the expanded health services will give the community access to vital health care".

He said "every effort" had been made to ensure the site is reinstated into a "welldesigned and well-equipped facility" to meet the town's current and future healthcare needs.

This announcement is separate to the proposed Strathalbyn Medical Hub - which still awaits building consent, as recently reported in The Argus - for the nearby 54 and 56 High Street and 49 Murray Street.

This proposal is for a multi-tenanted

facility which will include radiology, physiotherapy, dental, and allied health services, alongside an already leased GP clinic and pathology clinic.

'We look forward to the proposed Strathalbyn Medical Hub and the accessible services it will provide to Strathalbyn and surrounding communities," BHFLHN Director of Corporate Services, Daniel Panic, said.

"The BHFLHN prioritises working relationships and partnerships with public and private health services within and across Strathalbyn."

As part of the new plans, BHFLHN will update land titles and connecting services, ensuring Kalimna and neighbouring facilities operate independently.

The Kalimna name will be retained to honour its community significance.

Built in the early 1970s and operating as a 24-bed residential aged care facility, Kalimna Hostel was closed in February 2017 after it was no longer compliant with required standards, leaving residents to relocate.

Since then, ideas have been floated for the site, including unsuccessful attempts to attract commercial proponents to the site.

Alexandrina Council also considered using it as temporary accommodation during the housing crisis.

In 2022, a \$16 million modern and well equipped 36-room residential aged care facility expansion was completed in two stages for the Strathalbyn and District Health Service.

The first stage involved a 12-residential aged care room expansion to the memory support unit.

In the second stage of the expansion, a new wing comprising of 24-residential aged care rooms was established, as well as a new state-of-the-art kitchen and laundry facility to service the whole site.

Jet-skiers tackle the Murray River

Jet skiers will set off on an epic ride along the entire Murray River from today, April 10, to fundraise for a good cause, before celebrating the finish at a community event at Goolwa.

The Big Ride 25 is a 10-day feat from Albury to Goolwa that aims to raise funds and awareness for people living with Motor Neurone Disease (MND).

The inaugural event finishes at Goolwa Aquatic Club on Easter Saturday, April 19, with a family-friendly day with a barbecue, jet ski display, kid's activities, a DJ and dancefloor from noon till 5pm.

Complementing The Big Freeze – being soaked in icy water to fundraise for a cure – The Big Ride focuses on those living with the disease.

The jet skiers will cruise on 70km/h during the 10-day journey and people are welcome to join

The ride will also be logged in the Inland Rivers National Marathon Register, an initiative by the Goolwa National Trust Branch.

The founder is Brendon Henman – who owns a house at Goolwa – and whose family was impacted by MND.

Mr Henman recently lost his mother-inlaw Sue to the disease, which put strain on

his family due to the lack of accessible care and knowledge.

The family had two years from diagnosis until her passing.

"I really love my mother-in-law – she was a wonderful human being," Mr Henman said.

"Nanna looked after my kids when they were young, so it was bloody hard on them to watch someone go from able-bodied playing netball and within two years, a vegetative state.

"Caring for someone with MND is very difficult because there is no positive, unlifting hope

"You're having a conversation with someone who can't talk, who is in a vegetative state, who can't communicate with you."

MND is a group of degenerative neurological diseases which affect the ability to move, eat, speak, swallow and breathe.

One in 300 Australians risk developing the disease during their lifetime.

With no effective treatment or cure, the average life expectancy is only 27 months from diagnosis.

However, specialist care to manage symptoms, and assistance with support, allied health, communication and equipment can help prolong independence.

Mr Henman also saw a need for more resources, such as an accessible vehicle, with Sue being house-bound for the last 12 months of her life.

Anxiety can surround accessible taxis, Mr Henman explained, such as being stranded somewhere due to limited availability.

That is why The Big Ride 25 also aims to fundraise for an \$80,000 support vehicle for MND SA which could allow people living with the disease to get out to places like the park or beach.

As well as fundraising for MND SA, the ride will also fundraise for charities in the other states it passes through, which support people and their families living with the disease.

"All we can do is make their life better... that's what we're really aiming to achieve," Mr Henman said.

"The message we want to put out there is to live every day and enjoy every moment.

"If you've got a friend or family member who has been diagnosed with MMD, spend the valuable time that they have left with them and do the things they want to do."

Community welcome to Dark Sky presentation

Clayton Bay will soon host a Dark Skies information presentation, as the community actively seeks international accreditation.

Dark Sky International aims to preserve and protect the night time environment through environmentally responsible outdoor lighting.

Home to many stargazers and environmentalists, many in the Clayton Bay community have long advocated for the protection of dark skies

This follows the town's new smart streetlights set on seasonal settings, a resolution by Alexandrina Council and SA Power Networks to balance its need for "streetlighting standards" with the community's efforts to protect its "unique dark skies legacy".

Now, the community can learn more about light pollution, its effect on the natural world, and what can be done to preserve the night sky in the upcoming presentation at Clayton Bay Community Hall on April 26 at 11am.

It will be led by Clayton Bay Dark Skies Action Group members Eric Dickinson and Brian O'Flaherty, and guest speaker Dr. Sheryn Pitman, who was instrumental in Carrickalinga achieving Internatioanl Dark Sky accreditation.

The aim of the presentation is to educate and gain community support, which is necessary for Dark Sky accreditation.

Meadows CFS welcome new truck

Meadows Country Fire Service (CFS) members have welcomed a new high-tech 24P rescue truck – one of 10 to be delivered across the state.

The new truck is equipped with modern safety systems such as air bags, radiant heat shields, cabin deluge systems, in-cab pump controls and in-cab breathing.

The 24P is a dual-cab 4WD tanker truck that can carry up to 2000 litres of water, has a pump capability of 2000 litres per minute, and carries specialist resources – in this case it is road crash rescue equipment.

Meadows CFS Captain Steve Allen said the brigade learned about the good news about three months ago, and had been eagerly awaiting its arrival ever since.

"It came on Sunday, March 30, and it has already had two incidents," he said.

"We have had some training on it, and it pretty much went out on its first day.

"We used gear that we didn't have before, including the stokes litter and spinal board.

"We don't generally carry them on the truck – we would have to put them on when we needed them – but this time we were able to go to the call and we had all the equipment on board to respond to it.

"Our old truck was over 20 years old, so the improved safety features and the stowage and extra equipment it has... basically gives us new techniques on how we can respond and also be more effective."

The 10 new trucks delivered across the state have a collective value of \$5.2 million.

"Our brigade responds to all types of emergencies, 24 hours a day, including trees down on roads, motor vehicle accidents, and both rural and urban fires," Mr Allen said.

"We had suspected our truck was at the age of needing replacement, as it was getting to that 20-year mark, but we just didn't know what we would get.

"Our assumption originally was we would just get a modified version of the existing trucks, but to have a purpose-built rescue truck... the other brigades would be very jealous.

"We are really excited to be able to use it and improve our training processes as well.

"The tactics we use are based on the equipment that we have got, so if we have access to better equipment and new equipment, there will be other ways we can do things to get a quicker outcome."

Crews worked around the clock over several hours to turn over and wet down rows.

To minimise crew fatigue, extensive use was made of heavy machinery and ground monitors, and to protect them, BA gear was used to prevent anyone from breathing in anything unpleasant.

Rotary comes to the rescue as thief targets charity store

A Goolwa charity group that provides food hampers and cut-price items for those struggling was recently targeted by a thief.

Between 4.30pm on Monday, March 24, and 8.30am on Tuesday, March 25, suspects broke into Whalers Emporium on Goulburn Street by smashing a window.

Whalers lost about \$2000 in the robbery, with the thief also damaging furniture during the incident.

"(The person) broke in through the side window, and they were aiming for cash and they took it," Manager, Mary McInnes, said.

"In the meantime, they broke some furniture and things like that.

"It was a bit of a shock.

"We won't get any of that back, but (Alexandrina) Council have a grant going for \$1000 and we are thinking of getting an awning on that side that we can close at night because there is a bit of a dark spot there."

Following the incident, the Goolwa Rotary Club stepped in to supply the charity group with a safe, 'restoring volunteers' faith in people'.

"Rotary went out and bought a safe for us that we can put any valuables or money in – we didn't even have the float there for the next day," Ms McInnes said.

"Rotary is definitely the backbone of the organisation as far as things like that go, helping out with things like a clothesline for our garden when we put the shower out there, so people could put their towels there.

"Regularly we get drop-offs of food for our food parcels (from them).

"We only have to mention that we are running low, and next minute, Rotary are here with several boxes of food.

"As soon as they heard (about the theft), it was 24 hours later they came up with the safe."

Rotary also provided \$500 worth of nonperishable food items to help families in need in the community.

Meanwhile, Rotary International is staging a large golf tournament this week at South Lakes Golf Club, with proceeds going to Whalers.

Across the 25 years that Whalers has been in existence, Ms McInnes said this was the first time money had been stolen or items broken.

Though, it's not the first time the shop has been targeted by thieves.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, vandals allegedly stole vital security cameras and lights.

"It is quite annoying, but unfortunately that is what happens," Ms McInnes said.

Others that use the service are allegedly confident they know the culprit of the latest incident.

"It could have been worse," she said.

"We had done the banking on a Friday, so there was not a lot of money here, but there were Friday, Saturday and Monday's takings, and then the float.

"We thought 'how do we pull some money together for a float on the Tuesday?', but luckily people were good that came in – they either used Eftpos or had the correct money."

SA Police has been notified and is investigating the incident.

Schools in Brief

Eastern Fleurieu R-12 School

During Eastern Fleurieu Strathalbyn R-6's english writing lessons this term, students in room 2 have been developing entertaining ways to introduce their stories.

Their picture prompt from *Once Upon a Picture* offers a perfect opportunity to begin a narrative using words other than 'Once upon a time...' or 'One day...' as their beginning sentence.

This first paragraph is where students set the scene, and show the reader where the action is happening and the time in history in ways that entice the reader to continue to read and find out what happens next.

Goolwa Primary School

Goolwa Primary School's elected SRC representatives and student leaders had the recent opportunity to visit Alexandrina Council for a behind-the-scenes look at the work that keeps the community running smoothly.

Students also had the chance to see where council meets and makes important decisions.

Tyndale Christian School

Tyndale Christian School Strathalbyn recently welcomed four beautiful hens – Nugget, Peanut, Dixie and Olive – to the year 9 agriculture innovation and systems class.

Students will learn how to care for chickens as well as bigger concepts of farming, egg and meat production, sustainability and biodiversity.

Meadows Primary School

Meadows Primary School's reception/year 1 class recently enjoyed a special visit to the Kindy to share their learning about living things.

The students presented the books they had created about butterflies, showcasing the journey from egg to caterpillar, chrysalis, and butterfly, which they had been learning about in STEM.

The visit was a fantastic way for the class to practice their presentation skills while connecting with the younger students.

New drought package announced

The State Government has announced a further \$55 million assistance package to support drought affected farmers and communities across South Australia.

The package builds upon the \$18 million in initial assistance announced by the State Government in November 2024, taking the total drought assistance available to \$73 million.

The package has been designed in direct consultation with primary producers, including a roundtable with farmers and key industry bodies hosted by SA Premier Peter Malinauskas last week.

New assistance measures in the package include:

- A further \$13 million for On-Farm Drought Infrastructure Grants for rebates that assist with projects to manage drought conditions and strengthen drought preparedness.
- An additional \$4 million to assist charities with freight costs to transport donated fodder to assist farmers with feeding livestock.
- Immediate financial relief by providing rebates for Emergency Services Levy and commercial vehicle registration fees for primary producers receiving the Commonwealth's Farm Household Allowance.
- \$2.5 million for an immediate and comprehensive strategy to boost mental health and resilience in drought affected areas.
- \$1 million for Rural Financial Counselling Support.
- \$3.5 million in additional supports for rural small businesses.
- \$3.1 million to assist with culling pests and manage kangaroo populations.
- \$4.5 million to support producers with the implementation of electronic identification (eID) for sheep and farmed goats.
- \$1.4 million to co-invest with councils in the upgrade of regional standpipes.
- \$1.1 million to support the provision of standpipes for critical water needs in the Adelaide Hills and Fleurieu.
- \$500,000 to make bulk water available from Bundaleer and/or Beetaloo Reservoirs.
- \$2 million to assist sport and recreation clubs in drought affected areas through the

Active Club Program.

- \$400,000 to develop and encourage new regional events in drought affected areas through the Regional Event Fund.
- \$250,000 to provide financial support for country students affected by drought to attend camps and excursions.
- A further \$250,000 for grants of up to \$5000 for the 'Connecting Communities Events Program', for groups to host events that foster social connections and provide support.
- \$17.4 million for Future Drought Fund Preparedness and Resilience programs.

The package has been carefully designed to complement existing Commonwealth assistance, which includes the Farm Household Allowance, concessional loans, resilience planning, the Farm Management Deposit Scheme and taxation measures.

The additional assistance has been welcomed by industry groups, including Livestock SA.

Livestock SA Chair Gillian Fennell said the support package is a significant step in helping producers manage the pressures of ongoing dry conditions.

"This round of drought funding acknowledges the stresses that many families and farm businesses are facing, and will help them to navigate through this challenging time," she said.

"We are also very pleased to see investment in measures that will increase the sustainability and resilience of our producers, such as kangaroo management, on-farm infrastructure and livestock traceability and management.

"The resilience of our communities is remarkable, and with the right support, they'll get through this and rebuild stronger."

While the new funding provides muchneeded relief, Livestock SA says the recovery process will be long-term.

"Even if the drought breaks tomorrow, recovery will take years," Ms Fennell said.

"This package sets the groundwork, but further investment will be essential to ensure long-term recovery and resilience for South Australia's livestock producers."

Future at Kalimna

With the Federal Election fast approaching on May 3, and health well and truly in the spotlight for both major parties, in Strathalbyn the focus is on some good news for those wanting local health services.

Long-awaited plans for the town's vacant Kalimna Hostel are now revealed, with the High Street site to undergo a \$3 million upgrade into a health care hub.

The space will include outpatient and clinic rooms, health education places, staff offices and amenities.

It will enable Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network (BHFLHN) to expand its allied health, community health, nursing, medical, aboriginal health and mental health services.

Works are expected to commence in coming months and are due to be completed by the end of 2026.

Strathalbyn's expanding population has heard more announcements in the health sector in recent months, including the nearby separate Strathalbyn Medical Hub – still awaiting building consent – which is proposed to be a multi-tenanted facility that includes radiology, physiotherapy, dental, and allied health services, alongside an already leased GP clinic and pathology clinic.

It is all good news, as was the other recent news that the Strathalbyn nurse-led clinic would become an ongoing service.

Kalimna has a long story with Strathalbyn.

It was built in the early 1970s, operating as a 24-bed residential aged care facility.

It was closed in February 2017 after being deemed no longer compliant with required standards.

Since then, ideas have been floated for the site.

Providing health services in expanding communities, particularly those growing rapidly like Strathalbyn, is a key requisite to keep up with demand.

What would be nice now is for a site that would provide 24-hour emergency care.



Drought plan for the region launched

This includes Regional Development Australia Adelaide Hills, Fleurieu and Kangaroo Island (RDA AHFKI), Landscape SA Adelaide Hills & Fleurieu, Landscape SA Kangaroo Island, Southern & Hills LGA, and SA Drought Hub, with support from the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund and the Government of South Australia.

The Adelaide Hills, Fleurieu and Kangaroo Island Regional Development Australia (AHFKI RDA) held the launch event for the Regional Drought Resilience Plan at MacLoran Farm Hindmarsh Valley.

"Local Food on Country was all about valuing country, first and foremost, connecting with local producers, connecting with First Nations and how we can all work together to support a thriving local food community," Food Embassy spokesperson Liz Sanders said.

Sunday's schedule included a Welcome to Country, music by Katie Aspel, and presentations that covered Kaurna stories, mental health, Community Supported Agriculture, baking with local flour, Ngarrindjeri craft making, and a Peramangk meditation.

Ms Sanders said the day finished with some perfectly timed rain.

"Seeing the connections people made with First Nations custodians was a highlight, seeing the connections between the producers was also a highlight, and then people supporting local producers," Ms Sanders said.

We had about eight local producers there, and they all did really well for the day, not only financially but also from a connection perspective – they felt more supported, more valued, and one said they felt really seen and really understood about what they were trying to do.

"We received great feedback, big congratulations, and (it was) lovely to meet producers I didn't know about."

Ms Sanders gave a huge thanks to Peninsula Providore.

"They are in the middle of the olive harvest so it was a big thing for them to stop production to do it," she said.







Hunt club kicks off 2025 season with training ride

The Strathalbyn Hunt Club's 2025 season will begin in earnest the weekend after Easter, but a training ride and prelim ride has already been staged.

Secretary Vivien Fuller said numbers should be good this year, with about 20 for the Strathalbyn club, about the same with the Fleurieu club, and between 10 and 20 for other clubs across the state.

"The major event for the year is normally the combined hunt run, which is run this year by the Fleurieu Hunt Club and will be held at a run down here (at) Hope Forest." Fuller said.

"All the hunt clubs come together and they have trail rides, and then meals and then a hunt, and then another meal, and things like that – lots of camaraderie."

Fuller said only two hunt clubs in the state still use hounds along with their rides

"We say to people we hunt for a good time and a glass of port," she

"It is totally social, we are reliant on our lovely land owners who allow

us over their land, and allow us to put jumps up on their land.

"Someone said 'so it is a social club on horseback', and I said, 'well, pretty much', but we certainly don't hunt anything, or kill anything, apart from a few hours."

Fuller said riders need a "fairly good" skill level to be able to take part.

"The rides are not like a trail ride where you walk and trot a lot, you actually need to canter, (although) you don't have to jump a lot, but a lot of people like to jump, so you have to be able to control your horse and the horse has to be able to be told to stay back and not pass people in front of it," Fuller said.

"There's a lot of etiquette with hunts, in terms of the Masters are out in front, then the Field Masters, and then you have the field, and we don't want people dashing in front of other people.

"So you have to be aware of where they are, and hold your horse back if there are other people going ahead of you, so a reasonable level of riding skill is necessary."

Pitching the case for a Strathalbyn basketball stadium

Supporters of the Strathalbyn Basketball Association turned out in force on Friday in a show of strength to push home with Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie the urgent need for a basketball stadium in the town.

Hundreds gathered at the proposed site of the Lot 10 development on Langhorne Creek Road to hear Ms Sharkie pledge her support for a stadium of three courts for the basketballers. saying a new facility other than the current single court, was "desperately" needed.

"I think everything I have read is there is a keenness to see if we can get three courts up and running," Sharkie said.

"I will keep working with council, but I am really keen to move heaven and earth to make this happen because it is desperately needed for Strath, it is desperately needed for kids, and really any age that wants to play basketball.

"I think it will be a fantastic resource for not just basketball, but maybe indoor soccer and other things like pickleball or walking footy, but also the potential for the area to hold regional (basketball) competitions.

"I know that (Alexandrina Mayor) Keith Parkes is really keen to work on this too, so my thinking is we try and land some federal money either during the election or after, (secure) that commitment by Local government, and then we push the State Government for some money too.

"We have done it in Mount Barker and we have got upgraded facilities right across the electorate, and it is beyond time for Strath to get this.'

So far Alexandrina Council elected members have passed the following resolution for council to: "subject to securing an appropriate level of external funding, further considers the development of the Strathalbyn Recreation Precinct commencing with Stage 1, which is to include as a minimum a two (2) court indoor facility (designed to be increased to a four (4) court facility), a dog park, playing fields and an RV Park/campground" at a special meeting on

Association spokesperson James Murphy said players and supporters want action now from all tiers of government.

"Three years ago we went to (council) and said 'here's our plan, what do you think?'," he said.



"They liked the idea and then said 'take part a price tag of \$10 million.

"We think we have shown good faith in taking part in that process and making sure it is a community centre, which we always wanted (too), but now we are at the point where we have played our part and the council continued, while supportive, (to have) all sorts of delays in trying to bring everyone along at exactly the same pace.

"We felt that the time for talk is really over and action is needed, and that is why we have stepped up our advocacy.

"We think that the original budget that the council came up with is astronomical, so that is why we have looked at how can we break it down and make it digestible for government and we think that phase one is a reasonable start, and everything can flow from there.'

The basketball association's phase one plans are for the stadium, changerooms, and other indoor spaces such as cafes, but it comes with

Murphy reiterated the reasons why a threecourt stadium was needed.

"We have got 20 Under 10s that couldn't play this season because there wasn't room," he said.

"We have an additional 20 people outside of that that couldn't play.

"We have got no over 35s competition and we have no mixed competition.. "We have kids training outside and there is no

training for most junior teams because we can't fit them in, and we are finishing at 9pm."

Murphy said the economic case for a stadium in Strathalbyn was also sound.

"If you talk about economic development for the town, most associations run their own regional carnivals and that is their main money spinner for the year because they get nomination fees from other than their members and people who come in and that then fills the hotels, the cafes, and everything else," he said.

"We obviously can't do that with one court (which), in addition, is non-compliant.

"We spend \$10,000 a year on maintenance and that is money down the drain.'

While the amount needed was a large funding commitment, Sharkie said Strathalbyn deserved it just as much as elsewhere in Australia.

"We have money for basketball that happens in Mount Barker and we are slowly being able to upgrade pretty much every footy club and other sporting codes," she said.

"I do think, as much as everyone loves footy... basketball and soccer are those clubs that always seem to be at the back of the queue, and I don't think that is fair.

"I have said to council this is my major priority for your council area."

Murphy and Sharkie both said the potential for a new stadium to also be a community centre for other groups who need a large space for functions was also inherent.
