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Trees donated to Macclesfield RSL gardens

Six trees removed to make way for the new Mount Barker Hospital have been donated to the Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch.

As part of a partnership between the Department of Health and Wellbeing, Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network (BHFLHN), Mount Barker District Council and the local RSL, BHFLHN has donated six trees, which were removed from footpaths on Wellington Road near Mount Barker District Soldiers Memorial Hospital, to the Macclesfield RSL.

On hearing about their future, the RSL Sub-Branch contacted both BHFLHN and council, where an agreement was reached to provide them with the mulch and any leftover wood.

Sections of the trees were mulched and have been used in the RSL's Anzac Gardens, while the remaining wood was chopped up by the Macclesfield Football Club, with some sold to raise funds for the RSL and other pieces to be donated to local residents.

"Once we heard these trees needed to be removed, our members believed we could be part of the solution for the remains," Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch President, Dennis Oldenhove, said.

"This donation will benefit us and the community in a number of ways, and I thank both BHFLHN and council for helping us turn our idea into reality.

"Our garden volunteers are thrilled with the donation and they can't wait to use the mulch.

"We're also looking forward to helping locals keep warm during the winter months.

"We hope to give the community solace that the trees are back on consecrated land and helping us honour those who served our country."

Work will soon begin on another round of tree removal as part of the redevelopment.

Nine trees will be removed from an area next to the Summit Medical Centre, finishing today, with another nine to be taken down after the Easter break.

Traffic restrictions will be in place on Wellington Road around the hospital during these works, with the majority of the disruption scheduled for between 10am and 2pm.

These trees will also be mulched for use in the community, with BHFLHN to donate a portion of the latest round of mulch to the Macclesfield RSL and Duck Flat Community Garden.

Mental health centre opens

Locals over the age of 16 can now access free, walk-in mental health services after the recent opening of a Mount Barker centre.

The Mount Barker Medicare Mental Health Centre offers confidential support and information with no waiting lists or referrals.

The local facility is among more than 60 expected to be opened across the country by mid-2026, including five in South Australia.

Mount Barker's is jointly funded by Federal and State Governments through Country SA Primary Health Network and is operated by Summit Health.

The team includes qualified mental health clinicians, peer workers with lived experience, specialist alcohol and drug workers, and nursing staff.

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton officially opened the centre last week, believing it is "going to save lives", while Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie congratulated everyone involved, wishing the service will stay for "many decades to come".

Rotary delivers hay to struggling farmers

The Strathalbyn Rotary Club has stepped in to fund a truckload of 32 bales of hay for struggling farmers in the state's Mid-North.

The local club was keen to help when the Rotary Club of Adelaide set up a district-wide appeal and the Department of Primary Industries committed to pay for the transport.

The \$3500 grant will see 32 bales, at a cost of \$110 each, delivered.

"There are farmers over in Gippsland who were prepared to provide the hay at a reasonable price," Rotary Club of Strathalbyn President, John Agnew, said.

"So, the District put out an appeal to clubs to say, we have the need, we have got the transport and we have the hay available, we just need some finances to buy the hay, and that is where our club was able to step in and say 'yep, we can do that'.

"We took it to our board and they thought it was a good idea, and then the club unanimously supported the idea and we were able to move that one forward very quickly."

The ongoing dry conditions has meant

many farmers are now struggling to find quality feed.

"Also, once we do get rain, it takes a while for that feed to get established, and certainly the other thing that would be starting to happen through much of that area at the moment, getting into May, will probably be a lot of lambs starting to hit the ground," Mr Agnew said.

"So, this program was really about enabling people to keep their breeding animals and sort of have a livelihood a little bit further down the track.

"I have contacts up at Quorn, and certainly in terms of that area, the need is tremendous.

"I taught in Burra for quite some time and that Clare area... it is far worse than I had ever seen it in the 10 years I spent up there"

Mr Agnew said the Gippsland farmers were happy to help.

"One of their motivating factors, in terms of these farmers from Gippsland providing the hay, is that, in times past, when they were doing it tough a couple of years ago, a lot of SA farmers donated and hay was sent that way," he said.

"It is a lovely thing... when hay goes back and forwards.

"There is that reciprocity (of help)."



Local council staff receive National Emergency Medals for recovery efforts

Past and present Alexandrina and Mount Barker District Council members who played a crucial role in responding to the devastating Cudlee Creek, Duck Ponds and Kangaroo Island bushfires have been rewarded for their efforts with prestigious National Emergency Medals.

The three fires collectively burned nearly 235,000 hectares of land, destroyed more than 140 homes and hundreds more buildings, and tragically claimed three lives, along with devastating local wildlife populations.

Local Government played a key role in supporting emergency response efforts during these crises, with more than 220 council employees from across 39 councils contributing nearly 6400 staff hours.

The medals were awarded by the Governor-General at a special presentation held at LGA's Local Government House in Adelaide on Friday, April 4, which was also attended by Local Government Minister Joe Szakacs.

Among the recipients were former Alexandrina Council staff members Bradley Powell, Colin Moffatt and Colin Mudge.

Alexandrina Council's Senior Procurement Officer Nicholla Putland, who was working with the Kangaroo Island Council at the time, was also awarded.

Alexandrina Council Chief Executive Officer Andrew MacDonald was proud to have one current and three former employees receive prestigious National Emergency Medals.

"It was before my time at Alexandrina, but I am advised that council provided a grader, a loader and a utility for the clean-up and recovery phase," he said.

"Our employees worked closely with the CFS and spent five days on the Island,

cleaning up roadways, removing fallen trees and other debris, and assessing the condition of burnt and still smouldering vegetation.

"It was pleasing for me to reflect on the Local Government employees who did receive National Emergency Medals.

"This type of council collaboration and support is a wonderful example of how the Local Government sector works together to support our communities."

Bill Shearer, Brett Watson, Damien Richardson, Daniel Newson, Darren Flaherty, Jason Hesse, Jason Simounds, Karl Manarangi, Kym Heinrich, Morris Chambers, Scott Thompson and Shaun Atkins from Mount Barker District Council also received medals.

Council contributed plant, equipment, materials, and staff time to assist in controlling the devastating fires, and additional resources were deployed following the fires to help restore essential services such as roads to a safe and functional standard.

Mount Barker District Council Mayor David Leach was "extremely grateful" to these staff members' commitment to the safety and recovery of others.

"Staff represented the Mount Barker District Council and provided vital support to the CFS – the lead agency in responding to and recovering from the Cudlee Creek fire," he said.

"Working in co-ordination with the Local Government Functional Support Group (LGFSG), they demonstrated exceptional dedication and an unwavering commitment to placing the needs of the community first throughout the emergency.

"The National Emergency Medal is a prestigious award for civilians and Emergency Service Organisation personnel and reflects the dedication of the recipients.

"Council and the entire Mount Barker community are immensely proud of these people within our staff and we extend our deepest thanks to each one of them.

"The work they undertook was dangerous, demanding, and carried out under extreme conditions."

SA Country Fire Service Chief Officer Brett Loughlin also praised councils' efforts.

"What I take most pride in is for everything we lost, we saved far more – we saved more lives than were lost, we prevented more injuries than occurred, and we saved more homes than were destroyed," he said.

"When the focus shifted in the immediate aftermath from response to recovery, Local Government was there playing an amazing role in restoring normality and getting people back to living their lives.

"Everyone receiving a National Emergency Medal should wear them with honour, because they have earnt them – their contributions made a difference at a time when most people could only watch in horror as these events unfolded."

New drought grants for farmers and businesses

Grants of up to \$1500 are now available to drought affected farming families and rural small business owners through the State Government's Rural Support Grant.

Delivered through Rural Business Support (RBS) from the Drought Support Package, this assistance offers relief to help cover essentials such as council rate, power bills, vehicle repairs and school costs.

The \$55 million Drought Support Package, which is in addition to the \$18 million in initial assistance announced in November 2024, brings State Government's total drought relief investment to \$73 million.

The grant is delivered via the RBS Relief Fund, the charity arm of RBS, and is designed to help families who are working with the Rural Financial Counselling Service, which helps to meet people where they are, providing practical relief so they can focus on finding a way forward.

The \$1500 grants will assist to help cover essential costs such as council rates, utility bills, medical appointments and prescriptions and vehicle repairs.

The Talking Point

Cruel is the Light **RATING**



If I'm a sucker for anything, it's a good enemies-to-lovers plot.

While Cruel is the Light is more falling for someone who SHOULD be my enemy rather than being considered the enemy from the outright, it's the next best thing.

And combined with fantasy worldbuilding? This book had me hook, line and sinker.

Written by Sophie Clark, Cruel is the Light is set during a brutal war between demons and humanity which has raged across Europe, specifically Rome or 'The Vatican' to narrow it down, for more than a century.

At its centre are two elite soldiers powerful exorcist trained and graduated at the top of her class at the prestigious Vatican Academy Selene Alleva, who is haunted by a dark past, and foot soldier Jules Lacroix, who is an orphan trying to figure out who he is and where he comes from.

When the pair cross paths, despite the trust and unwelcome attraction, they must join forces to get to the bottom of a series of strange demon attacks.

It leads them to a terrible secret at the heart of the holy Vatican City they both must unravel and another that forces Selene to make the impossible choice between love and duty.

The first hundred pages of the book are a hard sell.

It's hard to wrap your head around the hierarchy of exorcists and demons, and how the former's magic works in the beginning, and the little inserts of Italian and French throughout the book, despite some translation, can withdraw the reader slightly out of the world in order to understand exactly what it is they are reading.

This was the reason I had to deduct one star from the rating, but once you get over that hurdle, the book lived up to all my romantasy (romance x fantasy) needs:

Does it involve some kind of fantasy element? Check.

Do the characters have insane chemistry? Check.

Is the banter between said characters off the charts? Check, check and check.

For those dipping their toes into the genre, Cruel is the Light is a good place to start and definitely one of the few you can read around your religious family.

A \$20,000 bequest has enabled professional cleaners to clear out 14 bags of rubbish from the St Andrew's Church's tower, ticking off the latest bit of progress in the fight to restore the building.

As previously reported in The Southern Argus, the Uniting Church congregation has been working to restore the town's beloved church.

Most recently, bird waste and other debris was removed from the tower, and the bell underwent a clean.

"SA Window Cleaning have been here to do preventative maintenance in the top three levels of the tower, from the roof hatch down to the clock level," St Andrew's Restoration Committee spokesperson, Peter Roberts, said.

"There are 14 bags of residual bird waste and other debris that has accumulated because of the prolonged access by numerous bird life over recent years, coming in through the louvre vents on the top of the tower, and... they cleaned the guttering around the roof hatch because it was blocked solid

'They have absolutely spotlessly cleaned the top three levels and cleaned the timber work that the bell is supported from.

"They have (also) absolutely cleaned the bell to new condition, where the inscription can be read cleanly, from 1867.

"This is preventative maintenance until such time as we can complete the full restoration of the tower, inside and out."

The church's bell weighs a ton in imperial measurements and was cast in Sheffield in England before being shipped out to Australia.

Mr Roberts said "a lot of effort and ingenuity" would have gone into installing it in the tower.

He added the supporting wood was in "pristine" condition and the bell's U-bolts also in a good state.

'We had a local bequest for the work to be done on the tower, and that is how we were able to do this at this time," Mr Roberts said.

"It is up to us as the current custodians of the building to honour the settlers' initiative and determination to build this building, which was only described (recently) by one of the school teachers as the 'Strathalbyn cathedral."

What part of the multi-million-dollar project to be done next was under debate.

"It is based entirely on the extent of funding that we can marshal together," Mr

"We hope we can do some major work on the roof and gutters of the church, but again it is preventative maintenance to rectify this present condition before it gets any worse.

"After this drought weather we have

had, cracks are opening up, and of course once they open they don't close, and when it does turn wet again, we don't want any moisture getting into those cracks and causing internal damage.

'The first immediate turn is to redo the vestry, with cracking there, and replace

"That hopefully will be done within the next six months, subject to workers being available, and we have set an amount aside for that."

Birds such as pigeons and little corellas continued to be a constant source of exasperation for the project.

'We have a regular cleaner that comes every two to three months to clean the gutters and down pipes, and check any cracked roof tiles," Mr Roberts said.

"That is costing us a minimum of \$1000 a year to keep on top of the continuing deterioration caused by bird damage.


"That is incessant and if you magnify that across the whole town, with all the buildings that are affected... it is a monumental cost to the community."

Donations towards the restoration can be made at any time.

"We are very fortunate as a rural community in a regional area to have a building of this magnitude," Mr Roberts said.

"It deserves the repair and respect as any other property in the state."



see and do," she said.


"It's always quite upbeat... it's school holidays, so we get lots of families and people out enjoying what we hope will be delightful weather.

Blaze erupts at Meadows crash repairers

A structure fire that erupted in the early hours of last Thursday morning has caused in excess of half a million dollars in damage to a Meadows business.

Shortly after 1.20am on April 10, approximately 40 Country Fire Service (CFS) firefighters with 10 trucks, worked alongside the Metropolitan Fire Service, with support from SA Ambulance Service, in a co-ordinated effort to extinguish a fire at Meadows Panelworx Crash Repairs on Mawson Road.

Volunteer firefighters wearing breathing apparatus prevented the fire from spreading, which could have caused much greater damage to the business and neighbouring properties.

The estimated damage is likely in

excess of \$500,000.

Fire investigators attended the site. Meadows Panelworx Crash Repairs' Rick Kirton thanked the community for its condolences, and offers of help and support.

"We have felt the full weight of a small community's kindness and willingness to get in and help, and have so much love and gratitude for you all," he wrote in a Facebook post.

"We will be back better than ever.

"We apologise for any inconvenience and are more than happy to assist in helping find the right team to get you back on the road while we are out of action."

Multiple Country Fire Service (CFS) crews and aircraft prevented a grass fire from threatening residences near Strathalbyn last Thursday.

At about 11.50am on April 10, Strathalbyn, Meadows and Macclesfield CFS crews responded to a fire that broke out at a Hillview Road property.

Five trucks with 25 firefighters, supported by FFUs and seven aerial drops by five aircraft, managed to control the incident by 2.30pm.

No impact occurred to the community or residence.

Blaze breaks out at Bull Creek

A vehicle fire quickly escalataed when it spread into nearby scrub and grass at Bull Creek, south of Meadows, on Sunday.

At around 10.45am, Strathalbyn, Ashbourne, Meadows, Macclesfield, Blackfellows, Echunga and Kangarilla Country Fire Service (CFS) crews responded to reports of a car on fire on Bull Creek Road, which quickly spread into dry vegetation on the roadside.

Prevailing winds and the terrain pushed the fire in a south-easterly direction towards houses, but thankfully 42 air drops were able to halt the forward rate of spread.

By about 6pm the fire was controlled, with a few hotspots still active in the middle of the burnt area.

The caravan was saved but the car was written off.

A couple of appliances remained on scene overnight to prevent flare-ups.

One of the impacted residents Meegan McCulloch thanked the CFS, other first responders, neighbours and friends who helped control the blaze.

"(We are) thankful we did not lose our house or our animals," she said.

The incident caused the local residents to lose some fencing and feed for livestock.

Anyone who is able to provide hay is asked to donate.

Suspicious fire at Mt Barker school

Police are investigating a suspicious fire that erupted at a Mount Barker school in the early hours of Tuesday morning.

Just after 4am, 30 firefighters from four Metropolitan Fire Service and three Country Fire Service appliances, and police were called to Mount Barker Waldorf School on Sims Road following reports a building was on fire.

On arrival, firies found a 10m x 20m building well-involved and producing thick smoke.

Firefighters in breathing apparatus used multiple hose lines to externally attack the blaze, which was made more difficult due to structural collapse.

The fire was contained in approximately 60 minutes and fully extinguished in a further hour.

Fire technicians attended the scene later that morning to determine the cause.

A stronger police presence can be eggspected out on the roads and on the water this long weekend to make sure motorists are 'keeping it sweet' during their travels over Easter.

In 2024, three lives were lost and 18 serious injuries incurred during the Easter long weekend on South Australian roads.

Operation Safe Holidays will be deployed state-wide from today to Monday, with a focus on the 'Fatal Five' factors that lead to road trauma, to ensure road users are 'keeping it sweet' on the roads by not taking risks.

Hills Fleurieu Local Service Area Superintendent Joanne Howard said people using local roads can expect a police presence ensuring safety in the region.

"This weekend, police will be targeting the 'Fatal Five' offences, with a focus on speeding and dangerous road use, including motorbikes hooning through the Hills," Superintendent Howard said.

"If you're travelling with family or friends this Easter, consider the distance you need to travel by planning your rest stops and drive to the conditions.

"Stick to the speed limits and remember on country roads the speed limit is 100km/h unless signed."

Meanwhile, out on the water, police and marine safety officers will be ramping up patrols across inland and coastal locations over the back-to-back long weekends.

"We encourage the public to make the most of the warm weather and enjoy our waterways, but they must do so safely," Senior Sergeant Darian Leske, from SAPOL's Water Operations Unit, said.

"Police will be working with our partner agencies to ensure everyone is acting responsibly while on the water by detecting breaches of the Harbours and Navigation Act.

"We will be conducting safety equipment checks, and random alcohol and drug testing

of boat operators, observers and skiers because, as on land, a blood alcohol limit of 0.05 applies."

Failing to carry appropriate safety equipment, misuse of or not carrying lifejackets, outdated flares, unregistered vessels, and exceeding speed limits were the top five non-compliance issues among water users last Easter period.

Since January 1 this year, older standard lifejackets have no longer been acceptable to use and jackets must now meet the AS 4758 standard.

"It only takes a moment to put a lifejacket on, but not wearing one on the water when trouble strikes can cost your life in an instant," Manager Marine Safety and Compliance at the Department for Infrastructure and Transport, Gordon Panton, said.

"More than one third of the vessels we checked last Easter on coastal waters and at boat ramps were non-compliant, with misuse of or not carrying lifejackets among the most common issues.

"Boaties and holidaymakers are reminded to check their lifejackets are to standard,

fit well, and are in good working condition, that they are operating safely and keeping to speed limits around other water users, and they have the right safety equipment on board."

Fisheries will also have an on-water and on-land presence across the state over the Easter and Anzac Day long weekends, and officers will be especially checking compliance with the no-take zones for snapper over the period.

"To combat the spread of the Abalone virus AVG, decontamination protocols apply to fishing devices and boats, especially those operating from the Murray Mouth to the Victorian Border," PIRSA's Acting General Manager Operations Support, Gary Darter, said.

"We ask that fishers adhere to size and bag limits and fishing gear regulations, and are encouraged to access the Rec Fishing App or the PIRSA website for further information."

People are also reminded to:

- Let someone know where you're going and when you'll be back.
- Slow your vessel to four knots when near other boats, ramps, jetties, swimmers, surfaces and the shore.
- Keep keys in a safe location. Do not hide them in your car, caravan or boat.
- Remove fishing rods, tackle boxes and eskies from boats and trailers when not in use.
- Securely attach trailers and boats to a vehicle or a solid fixture when not in use.
- Be aware of water safety issues at the beach or at the river, including rips and currents, maritime safety, and the dangers of marine life.
- Never leave valuable items unattended or under a beach towel. Use a watertight container or leave items secured in your holiday home.

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


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
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Schools in Brief

Fires and medals

With the fire season set to continue and fires still keeping our local Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers busy, the chance of an out-of-control fire that threatens homes, properties, bushland, animals and people remains.

So far this fire season, the region has been spared the heartache of loss of life due to the diligence and hard work of our emergency services personnel and others.

Recently, past and present Alexandrina and Mount Barker District Council staff members who played a crucial role in responding to the devastating Cudlee Creek, Duck Ponds, and Kangaroo Island bushfires were recognised with National Emergency Medals.

The three fires collectively burned nearly 235,000 hectares of land, destroyed more than 140 homes and hundreds more buildings, and tragically claimed three lives, along with devastating local wildlife populations.

Local Government played a key role in supporting the emergency response efforts across all three fires, with more than 220 council employees from across 39 councils contributing nearly 6400 staff hours.

Former Alexandrina Council staff members Bradley Powell, Colin Moffatt and Colin Mudge received a medal, while the council's Senior Procurement Officer Nicholla Putland, who was working with the Kangaroo Island Council at the time was also awarded.

At Mount Barker District Council, medals went to Bill Shearer, Brett Watson, Damien Richardson, Daniel Newson, Darren Flaherty, Jason Hess, Jason Simounds, Karl Manarangi, Kym Heinrich, Morris Chambers, Scott Thompson and Shaun Atkins.

In South Australia, CFS Chief Executive Officer Brett Loughlin's words were for everything that was lost, far more was saved.

National Emergency Medals are awarded to people who rendered sustained or significant service during nationallysignificant emergencies in Australia.

For our awardees, you should be proud, you have served us well.

Nuclear support melting down

RE-Alliance has been working with rural and regional communities navigating energy projects for more than a decade.

We recently released polling across several proposed nuclear communities, which found support for nuclear reactors in those communities was very low.

The polling of 1250 regional residents was conducted by respected research firm 89 Degrees East, which is a member of the Research Society of Australia.

The data revealed only 22 per cent of people in Central West NSW support nuclear, 24 per cent in Central Queensland, 32 per cent in Hunter, 24 per cent in south west WA and just 31 per cent in Gippsland.

Interestingly, regional communities also don't believe that nuclear power is capable of bringing down their energy bills anytime soon, while 72 per cent said renewables would bring bills down faster.

Further, a report released by former Land and Water Australia CEO Professor Andrew Campbell has found an extra 200 gigalitres of annual water allocation would need to be acquired from farmers and other water customers to cool the proposed nuclear reactors.

The report also found half the reactors couldn't be built because there isn't enough water to cool them, and another 40 per cent would have to be turned off regularly due to lack of water.

RE-Alliance will continue to push that all energy projects being proposed in regional and rural Australia contribute to the strength and resilience of our regions, and that clear information is readily accessible.

Goolwa College seeks to partner with businesses

A local high school is seeking to partner with community businesses on work experience opportunities for its students.

Goolwa Secondary College's work experience program offers students in years 10 and 11 the opportunity to get hands-on experience in the workforce and gain the skills needed to become employable.

The program has seen great success with securing work experience for the students, but the school would like to expand the types of opportunities available by partnering with local businesses and employers on the following:

- School-based apprenticeships/ traineeships: allows students from years 10 to 12 to earn a wage, gain a nationally recognised qualification, and work towards their SACE at the same time.
- Student mentorship initiative: provide guidance and practical experience to help students overcome challenges and succeed while also developing essential employability skills.
- Job trials: offer short-term opportunities for students to showcase their skills and learn about workplace expectations.
- Industry immersion opportunities: host a small group of students for one to two days to immerse them in that industry and workplace culture.
- Mock interviews: conduct simulated interviews to help students build confidence, improve their interview skills, and gain constructive feedback.

The main aim for Co-ordinator of Culture, Community and Pathways Sean Beath, who is leading the call, is to show students the job opportunities out there for them and make them feel confident enough to strive for them.

"My passion for the place is to give the students the feeling like there are jobs out there for them in the local community because I think a lot of them are a bit fearful that there's not those opportunities and they don't necessarily feel like they know how to seek (them)," he said.

"I want them to leave school feeling like 'I either know what I want to study one day and potentially come back here and work' or 'there's these job opportunities here and I know how to get those jobs or put myself in the best position to get those jobs'.

"I also want them all leaving here being employable.

"I would love for them to have those employability skills where our local community are like 'those kids from Goolwa have got the skills we need and want'.

"I think the teachers here do a really good job of explaining what employability skills are and trying to teach it as well, but then getting out in the workforce and getting exposure is probably the best thing for it."

The work experience program will take place on week nine of term two, from June 23 to 27.

Australian Lions Hearing Dogs has provided hearing assistance dogs for more than 40 years, but is now branching out to other support areas such as the Diabetic Alert Dog program and Psychiatric Assistant



Dog program.

At the moment the organisation has 20 dogs in training across all three programs, with about 150 active assistant dogs across

"We rely pretty much on the generosity of the Australian public to get our dogs out completely free of charge," Miss Hattam said.

"If people head to the website, they can donate, become a monthly sponsor, sponsor a dog or help raise one of our assistant dog puppies.

"If they are local to Verdun, (where the organisation is based), they can get involved

with our Bed and Breakfast program (and) have a lovely assist dog in their house for a couple of months, and drop it off every day for school.

"Our lovely puppy team will guide you through the process, give you everything you need, including food, all vet bills covered, and grooming, and we will do fortnightly visits with you just to ensure the dog is being well-socialised and its training is coming along nicely."

Miss Hattam thanked Mount Barker Pet Care Centre for sponsoring the event and Mount Barker District Council for its support.

An innovative robotics milking farm formed by two families was officially opened at Mount Compass last Wednesday, showcasing the benefits of the new technology for local farmers.

The Whispering Pines dairy farm is a partnership between the Hicks and Jacobs families who came together to create an innovative dairy farming system using the latest robot milking technology from agricultural robotics manufacturers Lely.

The families installed eight of Lely's Astronaut A5 Milking Robots at the Mount Compass-based farm, which has allowed

them to expand their herd to 500 cows, while also improving milk quality and reducing labour demands.

Whispering Pines Dairy co-partner Warren Jacobs was excited about the integration of robotic technology on his farm.

"At each stage of the process of moving to this new technology, I could see the benefits," he said.

"It's exciting technology, with many positive advantages for the farmer which flow onto the entire dairy industry in terms of efficiency and information.

"The life of a dairy farmer can be allconsuming with early starts and late finishes, making it difficult to juggle family commitments and holidays.

"The introduction of robotic technology has allowed dairy farmers to expand their

herds and build their business, while giving them more flexibility for family and worklife balance."

The open day gave curious dairy farmers an opportunity to see cows being milked autonomously and to see a robotic dairy in action up-close.

Member for Finniss and former dairy farmer David Basham was on hand to cut the ribbon.

"It's a real privilege," he said.

"My family history in dairy was quite extensive until, after 182 years of dairy farming here in South Australia, we sold the farm about three years ago.

"I think the future of dairy farming is very much in the robotics and the advantages of it are enormous through labor changes as well as milk quality."

Goolwa set for boatloads of fun

The South Australian Wooden Boat Festival (SAWBF) is just around the corner, and has a huge line-up of events and attractions planned for boaties, families and lovers of heritage, tradition and maritime.

Supported by the South Australian Tourism Commission, this biennial event on the weekend of April 26 and 27 will feature more than 100 wooden boats – new and vintage, under sail, steam, motor and paddle.

The 2025 SAWBF, which is also the 19th festival, will be officially opened by Her Excellency Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia.

Thousands of festival goers are expected to enjoy sailing races, paddle steamer cruises, steam train trips, maritime exhibits at the wharf and the Armfield Slip, the Rough 'n' Ready boat building competition, vintage bi-plane aerial displays, live music, performances from the Royal Australian Navy Band, food, markets, and family-friendly entertainment with the Little Pirates Tent, the Little Picassos art exhibition and All A (card) board workshop.

An unmissable highlight of the festival will be a light display over the waters of the Goolwa channel on Saturday night when wooden boats adorned with twinkling fairy lights will line the waterfront at the Goolwa Wharf Precinct.

Then, as night falls, the sky will come alive with a spectacular fireworks display launched from the Hindmarsh Island Bridge.

The festival will also be the backdrop of a celebration on April 26 to officially open the upgrade of the historic Goolwa Wharf Precinct.

Federal and State Governments will join Alexandrina Council in unveiling a plaque recognising the work done on this major project to restore Goolwa Wharf, the Wharf Shed, the Signal Point Experience Centre and the surrounds of the heritage-listed precinct.

This project was led by council and made possible thanks to \$3.75 million in funding from the Federal Government and an additional \$1.25 million from the State Government.

The Federal Government also provided \$980,000 through the Murray-Darling Basin Economic Development Program to create the permanent interactive exhibition 'Yuntulun Ku:liwar', the centrepiece of the upgraded Signal Point Experience Centre within the precipat

"This year's SA Wooden Boat Festival brings together the nostalgia of our rich wooden boat history with a celebration of our major project to preserve and protect our heritage Goolwa Wharf Precinct," Mayor, Keith Parkes, said.

"Goolwa Wharf is a special place, one of only two places in the world where you can step off a steam train and board a paddle steamer.

"The festival opening will recognise this unique feature with the Steam Salute, a moment when the SteamRanger train and the Paddlesteamer *PS Oscar W* exchange whistles.

"I'm a boatie myself so this festival is special to me because it showcases the craftsmanship of traditional boatbuilding and the heritage of Goolwa which is integral to the early history of South Australia and is now a world-class destination with a wonderful mix of tourism and cultural attractions."

Previously sunken

A restored 1937 boat that was once sunken at the bottom of the river will be one of the prideand-joys on display at the upcoming SA Wooden Boat Festival.

Curlew was originally built in Kingston by local fishermen who wanted something different to couta boats that were carvel-built, which is made from planks joined smoothly and not overlapping.

Instead, Jack Lane and Len Goldfinch built theirs using the clinker method, where the external planks overlap and are secured with clinched nails.

It attracted plenty of onlookers at the time, and some criticism for a boat so different from anything in those waters before.

One of the challenges was the keel, which was made with West Australian jarrah.

The wood arrived by sea, but being more than 30ft, it was too big to unload onto the jetty trolley so had to be towed ashore by a dinghy.

Curlew became the first locally built boat, and the only clinker-built fishing boat on those waters, and went on to be used for cray and shark fishing.

When World War II came, shark oil was needed for burns treatment as part of the war effort, so Mr Goldfinch and others caught shark.

Curlew has now had nine owners over its 88 years, and more recently local Brett Hoppen - who owned it for about 20 years – and who brought it back to its former glory after it sunk to the bottom of the river at Mannum about 25 years ago.

The wide, 28-foot boat has now been owned by Hindmarsh Island's Lee Spencer for the past five years.

"It's cool to cruise on – it goes slow," he said.

"It's just a lot of fun."

While the deck is new, much of the boat is still original including the hull.

Mr Spencer believes part of the fun is the ongoing maintenance, after working with boats for about 27 years.

"You're forever doing something to them," he said.

"It keeps you busy."

He is now working to polishing it up to scratch to show visitors of the upcoming SA Wooden Boat Festival, which he expects will be a "good weekend".

"The atmosphere is good – all the putt putts cruising around are good to see," Mr Spencer said.

"It's good to see people are restoring and looking after them - no one is building new (wooden boats) anymore, so you've got to maintain them."

Descendants of Curlew's boat builder had a full circle moment when visiting the previous SA Wooden Boat Festival.

They connected with Mr Spencer, viewed the boat and went for a cruise.

NDIS in action at chicken farm

About four years ago, Heather Pearce bought an 80-acre allotment at Finniss, with no real plans for it except maybe to retire there.

Then the egg shortage hit and an idea was hatched between the OT worker and her farmer brother Alistair – run a chicken farm and employ people under the NDIS scheme.

"Heather had friends who were doing pasture chickens down in the South East, and when we started having egg shortages, it just seemed like a good fit for here," Mr Pearce said.

"Then, through her work with her medical practice, she had seen the NDIS model helping people getting work through it and thought that would be a good fit for here as well."

Currently, Rise and Shine Eggs employs four people with a disability and four support workers who look after about 2400 chickens and the eggs they lay.

"The work is very suitable for people who like repetition and that don't handle new things very well," Mr Pearce said.

"All the people who work here have really positive experiences out of it.

"They check the fence, check the feed and water, then they will collect the eggs, and as they collect them, they grade them into clean and dirty.

"At the moment we deliver to Finniss General Store and Sazon Espresso in Mount Barker, and the rest go to Rohde's and are marketed under their label."

The chickens are left to roam the paddock during the day, making themselves sandbaths to cool off in, and spend the night in caravans before laying their eggs in the morning.

"The caravans are all fully automated," Mr Pearce said.

"The chooks all get in there at night, the doors shut automatically, and there is a nesting box down the middle that means they can't roost when they are laying eggs.

"In the morning they open automatically and pretty much they look after themselves – we just have to fill up the feeders when they get low.

"They do get wormed when they need it through the feed and, as yet, we haven't had any health issues that we have had to medicate for.

"On the whole they are pretty happy being out in the open and running around."

Mr Pearce said being able to employ people under the NDIS scheme and pay them award wages was a win-win situation.

"You don't have to look hard to find some negative stories about NDIS," he said.

"But this is doing what it is meant to – it is giving people a meaningful job.

"We wouldn't be able to get by without them. "They like the work, and we do what we

can to help them.
"It is nice seeing that pride in people, when

"It is nice seeing that pride in people, when they are happy being here."

Worker Stephen Verco, who lives with an intellectual disability, has worked at the farm for about eight months as a process worker.

He says it has changed his life.

"I love it," Mr Verco said.

"I do a few other farm chores around the place, do a bit of whipper-snipping and gardening, make sure the feeders are all full, the water tank has water in it and the dogs get fed, and it gives me a few different jobs that I quite enjoy."

He said finding work when you have a disability is difficult.

"It was really hard to be honest, just through me not being a computer or phone savvy person," Mr Verco said.

"My support workers and carers helped me find this place and I have loved it ever since.
"It has made a heap of a difference.

"I am not as depressed as I was, I get to drive out here from Mount Barker, and I just like being in the open spaces, doing what I do here, so it is really good."

Helping the workers is a team of four Maremma dogs that protect the chickens from foxes and wedgetail eagles.

Mr Pearce hopes to expand the farm in the future and continue to provide more opportunities for disabled workers.

"We can't have more chooks here, so we are looking at either buying another place or we have been talking to a guy in Langhorne Creek (who) is keen to try running some there," he said.

"He will buy the caravan, we will supply the chooks and the feed, we just have to work out the business model that suits everyone."

The Langhorne Creek wine region is finishing up its earliest vintage season in recent memory due to the unseasonably dry conditions.

Langhorne Creek Grape and Wine Incorporated Executive Officer Lian Jaensch expected most local wineries to be finished by the end of this week.

Typically, the busy harvest and fermenting period runs through to the end of April or into May.

"Everyone's really happy with the quality and we're really looking forward to seeing the wines that come out," she said.

"Most people are getting Easter off which is pretty amazing.

"Every winemaker I've spoken to has been really happy with the fruit."

Some wineries finished vintage weeks ago, while others are processing their late varieties of grapes, depending on the winemaker, grape variety, and goals.

One of the wineries finishing up is Kimbolton, with its final variety being the Italian red wine montepulciano. been in the industry for 20 years – hasn't seen a vintage this early in a long time.

Kimbolton's season is running about three to four weeks earlier than last year's schedule.

"I think it will be a really great vintage – what fruit has been picked has been really good quality, it's ripe and well," she said.

"It's been good weather... for a grape grower, dry weather isn't a bad thing – there's less disease and it ripens nicely.

"It's really been an ideal vintage as a grower and the quality is lovely."

Much like other wineries in the region, Kimbolton relied on irrigation more this year due to the dry conditions.

While the region is celebrating a successful season in terms of the high-quality fruit, Ms Jaensch said the industry is still facing a "pretty tough" trading environment.

"It's been a really good vintage as far as fruit quantity and quality, but the sales of fruit are still being impacted heavily by the supply/demand imbalance," she said.

"We've got a lot of cabernet and shiraz in this region, and there will be a lot of fruit that isn't sold."

Ms Jaensch credited the challenges to a combination of factors: the disruption from the closure of the Chinese market, a shift in consumer sentiment, changes since COVID, and a worldwide shift in markets.

Australia has an oversupply of red grapes, and the Langhorne Creek region provides much fruit to the national market.

Ms Jaensch stressed the importance of shopping locally especially due to the highstandards of the local region, which will be highlighted in the upcoming Langhorne Creek Wine Show.

Every year, the region's wines are judged according to international standards, with the winners for each category announced on May 9.







ALL EYES ON THE CUP: Hawks and Roosters battle for Anzac Day glory

Eighty-year anniversary of the end of WWII

As the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II approaches in September, The Southern Argus dived into the archives for details on Strathalbyn's Victory in the Pacific (VP) Celebrations, which attracted a crowd of 2000.

The Southern Argus, September 6, 1945

The peace for which we have worked, fought and prayed during almost six long years is here! The victory is ours!

Our loved ones in the forces have reached the end of their long and dangerous road.

Our men, who have suffered so much in our cause, will soon be coming home, including the thousands who have languished in enemy prison camps.

All the morning preparations were proceeding apace.

Buildings were mostly carrying bunting of some kind and in this connection Woolfitt's Bakery displayed some red, white and blue streamers which were used when Ladysmith was relieved during the Boer War in 1900.

The same ribbons saw the light of day at the conclusion of that war.

They were again in use in 1918 at the close of World War I and on Friday they were again used.

The gardens presented a very gay scene, coloured electric light globes being interwoven in the branches of some of the trees.

Dancing on the lawns was indulged in by small groups.

The main attraction for the evening was the fireworks display.

The evening was perfect for rich entertainment, it being absolutely windless

and pitch dark.

Several beautiful rockets were sent high into the air, exploding and disintegrating into different coloured stars as they festooned back towards earth.

Coloured Very Lights were also fired, about half an hour's entertainment being thus provided.

A large bonfire added to the scene and at a late stage in the evening the trailer pump was brought into use under the direction of Capt. Stubberfield.

The volunteer firemen turned on a great show here, at times sending three jets of water into the air where the light from the fire caught it reflecting many colours.

At the start of World War II, she joined the Women's Agricultural Security Production Service (WASPS) – an invaluable team of women from country towns who devoted several days a week from their normal duties to assist on local farms while many men were away on active military service.

Mrs Gamlin enlisted in the Army in 1941 as a Voluntary Aid Detachment (VAD) – later known as the Australian Army Medical Women's Service – and was stationed in New Guinea, 17 miles from Port Moresby on the Lalokai River and two miles south of the Kokoda Track.


It was where she served throughout the war, treating extensive casualties.


On her return, she went on to marry Max Gamlin, live in Sydney, raise five children, and later move to Henley Beach.

Mrs Gamlin was involved in an array of ex-service community activities such as the Women's Auxiliary, Red Cross, RSL, and Legacy.

Later, she moved to McLaren Vale, remaining an avid sports lover and retaining an interest in ex-service organisations and its people.















The day I joined the Goolwa parade

Tommy Atkins, my uncle, died as a POW in Siam in 1945 aged 26. Goolwa was Tommy's home.

A murmur of voices, a chuckle as veterans and family mill and shuffle, sharing subtle rapport with their mates. Most are able, some with canes guiding gait. The order is given to muster, fall in. I join the Goolwa parade, with kith and kin

The parade is called to attention, for all to move in procession. All traffic diverted as needed, a small inconvenience conceded for the vets march down Cadell way. I am nervous joining the parade today

Diggers and ordinary folk in the parade. Some haunted by scenes often replayed, some missing limbs, minds in torment. Their reward, the medals making comment on moments of bravery most care not to share I feel the mateship bond, fused in warfare

Some wear medals over their heart for selfless service that sets them apart. Civvies with medals on the right, for family and friends, a tribute on sight. Some wear medals on both chests. *I am humbled and happy to attest*

The footpaths are lined with faces, from Goolwa and nearby places. They wave and clap the passing parade. Then silence, to reflect on sacrifices made, to honour the Anzacs, we can never repay. I am near out of breath and tears weigh

At the shrine, diggers and civvies stand easy as wreaths are laid for Aussies and Kiwis. Silent, resolute faces, remembering heroes, who kept us safe, free from foreign foes, to live and dream on this Southern Land. I feel Tommy Atkins's spirit join and stand

In sombre voice we recite *The Ode*, to salute the dead, who lie in quiet repose, to salute their sacrifice, as they deserve, to salute the ranks, who continue to serve. Heads bow, as minds are engrossed by the haunting call of the *Last Post*.
