Algae concerns spark a community forum...

Concerns around the microalgae bloom impacting Fleurieu Peninsula's south coast beaches has sparked a forum tonight, April 24, with more than 100 community members expected to attend.

This follows many people avoiding swimming in the discoloured water or walking on beaches if experiencing symptoms over the Easter break after the State Government issued a warning.

Commercial harvesting of pipis closed since last week between the Murray Mouth to 10km south, and ongoing testing in other areas continue.

An ongoing marine heatwave is believed to be the cause behind the algae, with water temperatures 2.5C warmer than usual, as well as relatively calm marine conditions with little wind and small swells.

Locals are waiting on strong westerly winds to stir up and dilute the bloom, which is historically around the end of April.

Estuarine Ecologist Faith Coleman

- who will be one of tonight's speakers

- explained the cause as "more

 explained the cause as "more complicated than just climate change", with a combination of factors such as dredging of natural habitat.

She also added that the season break is unpredictable due to climate change.

"Generally, winds will arrive around Anzac Day, but it hasn't happened for a long time," she said.

"It's getting later and later and more inconsistent each year... the break is less predictable."

Globally, similar outbreaks have generally lasted between a week to two months depending on wind, rain and ocean temperature fluctuations.

The local issue began last month when surfers reported sore eyes, coughing and blurry vision when visiting Waitpinga and Parsons beaches.

Then earlier this month, foam and discoloured water were reported at Goolwa Beach, Chiton Rocks and Port Elliot, as well as dead pipis washed up on shore.

Goolwa surfer Anna Markey has refrained from surfing for the past month.

"It started to affect people who didn't even go into the water," she said.

"As soon as I opened the door to the car at Middleton Point, I started coughing – it was very noticeable.

"We all love this coast along here – it's our home."

Strong winds might have meant stallholders finished up early at Saturday's Milang Easter Fair, but crowd numbers were still reportedly healthy over the weekend.

About 58 stalls were booked in near the town's railway museum and 13 up at the Butter Factory - with a few late withdrawals.

The station's carriage cafeteria sold out of food, while 380 people took the opportunity to go on a free train ride.

Milang heritage protected under code amendment

Milang's heritage buildings are now better protected after the State Government approved Alexandrina Council's Heritage Code Amendment for the former thriving riverport town.

Council initiated the code amendment after comprehensive research revealed many of the residential and civic buildings constructed in Milang between the 1850s and 1900 - when the River Murray was a major trade route remained intact.

Milang has a small number of State Heritage-listed buildings, but no Local Heritage buildings or places have ever been listed.

After going to public consultation last year, the Milang Local Heritage Code Amendment was recently endorsed by the Minister for Planning Nick Champion and is now in place.

Mr Champion said Milang had a rich history and that could still be seen today, with a number of buildings a reminder of the original township.

"Any future development should complement and celebrate these historic areas and buildings," he said.

"This code amendment will ensure Milang's distinctive character can continue to be enjoyed into the future, with the Historic Area Overlay to protect the substantial heritage in the lakeside town."

The code amendment now lists several buildings, places and items, and establishes a Historic Area Overlay over the town.

"Protecting and promoting Alexandrina's history is a priority for our council, and Milang is one of our towns that still retains much of its early architecture, and this heritage contributes invaluably to the character of the town," Alexandrina Mayor, Keith Parkes, said.

"The early character of Milang is evident in its original subdivision pattern and surrounding parklands, and the historic buildings which remain from the 1850s to the early 1900s when Milang was a town for the district and a thriving port for the growing River Murray trade.

"This main period of development in Milang has left a rich legacy of buildings, including prominent public buildings and churches and many private residences of varying degrees of scale and detail, which create the town's heritage character."

"So, to see and smell this sick marine life and then develop coughs from the algae bloom becoming windborne has become very scary for people."

She is one of the organisers behind tonight's community forum at Middleton, which will include guest speakers and a panel, so guests can hear from scientists, First Nations peoples, and surfers, and learn about marine health.

This event is hosted by The Wild South and Rising Tide.

"When people are confused or frightened or don't have information, then it's bad for the community," Ms Markey said.

"We're doing this because we can see the community want to join the dots.

"What we would like people to take away is how important it is to get informed."

The State Government announced that an ongoing microalgae bloom named karenia mikimotoi was affecting beaches on the Fleuireu Peninsula, Yorke Peninsula and Kangaroo Island.

The algae is considered non-toxic, as in, harmful to humans or one that could cause long-term effects, however exposure can cause skin irritation, eye irritation and respiratory symptoms such as coughing and shortness of breath.

These symptoms resolve within several hours after leaving the beach and adjacent area.

Karenia mikimotoi can also cause mass

marine species mortalities at varying concentrations and is known to impact the gills of fish.

The last time a large event of this type of algae was recorded in SA was in 2014 in Coffin Bay.

Waitpinga Beach and Parsons Beach, where significant levels of the bloom were first detected, have now reopened after algae levels reduced.

Kids connect with culture how we pay respect through dancing, song

The Strathalbyn Kindergarten Nga:tji Project is led by Ramindjeri-Ngarrindjeri and Narungga cultural leader and artist Cedric Varcoe in teaching students about culture through artwork, dancing and stories.

Three posts in the playground now have an eye-catching painting representing Strathalbyn and nga:tji, which Mr Varcoe described as a totem, a "guardian angel", and an animal that "we have responsibility to care for, look after, and preserve".

It also is a nod to the animal names given to each kindergarten group.

"As they grow up, they learn that they've got responsibilities for our wildlife – to coexist, preserve and support," Mr Varcoe said.

"They have an opportunity to learn the culture and use language, while on Ngarrindjeri country.

"We're going through the stories, and

how we pay respect through dancing, song and story."

The project began with Mr Varcoe leading students for a walk around the community, taking note of the environment.

"We spoke about 'what do we see on country?' Even though we live in a town, there are still a lot of aspects of culture and history in sight," Mr Varcoe said.

"And they learn more about how it's been utilised for thousands of years."

Students have contributed to the artwork and speak to Mr Varcoe while he paints.

"There are lots of different questions they were asking – (it's good) how curious they are," he said.

"It's really good having them to be able to connect with Ngarrindjeri culture – it's important to keep it alive."

Being an integral part of the community, Mr Varcoe has become passionate about engaging others with the "oldest living culture in the world".

"When I get an opportunity, I paint and create with non-Indigenous community," he said.

"We can respect it and appreciate it by being involved with it.

"I've enjoyed it over the years, I've loved it – it's become my passion."

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
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
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Artists turn out for Macclesfield festival

Macclesfield's Creative Pursuits Art Festival brought artists together for one big weekend recently.

Popular events across the weekend included two sessions of Acapella-style Gospel singing on Saturday with Adelaide choral master Quentin Eyers which attracted about 30 people to both, and a workshop with the Southern Elders Weavers Group, along with a series of workshops such as water colour painting, pen and ink wash, and other forms of art.

While numbers were down on last year – possibly due to both cost-of-living pressures and other big events such as Gather Round also scheduled for the same weekend – Macclesfield Community Art Group Co-ordinator June Conroy said organisers were happy.

"On (the) Sunday, Simone Tippett from Union Street Print came up and she was really popular," she said.

"She did a printing workshop in the morning and in the afternoon, and everybody was very positive about that experience."

More than 30 artists across a range of genres, including watercolour, acrylic, pastels, drawing, 3D sculptures such as ceramics, clay work, Hanji, and visual loops and woodwork, entered the festival's awards.

The Best in Show award was given to Macclesfield artist Lucy Jagt for her piece The Miners, while Strathalbyn artist Kathleen Cain won the People's Choice Award for her work Beach Community.

The children's five to 12 years' award was taken out by Asher Ferriera with a mixed media piece called Thunder, while Bella Vaninetti won the 12 to 18 years category with Cookie.

A total of six honourable mentions were also given.

They included:

- Stan Davis for limestone sculpting.
- Monika Morgenstern a contemporary visual artist.
- \bullet Silvio Apponyi for bronze work sculptures.
- Andy Rasheed for musical instruments.
- Natasha Mallen ceramic artist.
- Kathleen Cain pastel work.

Judges were Director of the Hahndorf Academy Rachel McElwee and Mount Barker District Council Arts Officer Sally Hardy.

A total of 170 people attended the paid workshops over the weekend, with \$4900 worth of artwork sold and \$4200 paid to the workshop artists.

This meant more than \$9000 was returned to artists, along with \$1900 in prize money.

Ms Conroy said the feedback from artists was immensely positive, commenting on how supported they felt to be able to share their work.

A number of artists exhibited for the first time, with newcomer Stan Davis, who has only been sculpting for a couple of years, selling three of his four pieces.

"It was so positive in so many different dimensions, so when you stand back and ask if it was successful, it absolutely was," Ms Conroy said.

"Did we have as many people as we would have liked? No, but there were so many other wonderful things that happened, so while we might not have had the foot traffic through or the people coming to workshops... the people that did come and participate had very positive feedback."

Also on the weekend, the Lions Skin Check van was fully booked.

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Port Elliot businesses destroyed by fire

A commercial premises at Port Elliot was destroyed by a fire that erupted in the early hours of last Thursday morning.

Just after midnight on April 17, seven appliances carrying approximately 35 firefighters responded to a Triple Zero call for a structure fire at a Hill Street

Upon arrival, firefighters found a shed well-involved, and set about containing the fire to the premises involved.

Utilising breathing apparatus, firefighters worked hard to contain the fire and prevent it from spreading into other nearby businesses.

However, unfortunately,

firefighters were unable to prevent the building from being destroyed by the fire and damage exceeding \$1 million was caused to the property hire and gym business.

Fire investigators and Victor Harbor CIB attended the scene later that morning.

The cause of the fire is unknown but is being treated as suspicious.

Detectives reviewed nearby CCTV and identified a light coloured vehicle seen near the premises around the time of the incident.

Firearms found at Murray Bridge

A Murray Bridge man faces firearms charges after a backyard fire led to the discovery of insecure firearms at his address earlier this month.

At about 3pm on Tuesday, April 8, police responded to reports of an uncontrolled fire in the rear yard of a Murray Bridge address.

While at the property, officers allegedly discovered an insecure bolt action shotgun.

A further search revealed three gel blasters and another firearm, as well as a large quantity of various ammunition and firearm parts.

Following investigations, a 54-year-old Murray Bridge man was subsequently arrested and charged with multiple firearms offences, including possessing a firearm without a licence, possessing an unregistered firearm, possessing an insecure firearm and possessing ammunition without a licence.

He was bailed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on July 7.

been voted by the community as some of the riskiest in South Australia.

Risky Roads is the biggest state-wide survey aimed at identifying unsafe roads or intersections, with the results used by RAA to advocate for infrastructure improvements.

The latest survey received more than 1800 nominations and included a local road and an intersection in the list of top regional risky roads.

Goolwa Road placed seventh in the top 10 regional roads, while the Paris Creek Road/ Bull Creek Road intersection placed fifth in

RAA Senior Traffic Engineer Matt Vertudaches said the survey highlighted

the pressure on the road network.

"At RAA we want to advocate for safer roads and safer communities, and our Risky Roads survey is a key study that helps us identify areas of concern," he said.

"It's no secret South Australia has a \$2 billion road maintenance backlog, and that came through loud and clear from respondents.

"Sections of Victor Harbor Road, Main North Road and Black Top Road were just a few examples where drivers feel the poor surface is posing a risk to safety.

"We continue to call for more investment to address our road maintenance backlog to improve safety before the problem gets even worse."

Fire ban extended for two weeks for Mt Lofty Ranges

The Mount Lofty Ranges fire ban has been extended by two weeks to May 14 - the first extension for the district in five years.

It comes as the state's aerial firefighting fleet has completed nearly double the number of drops this fire danger season compared to last season, fuelled by ongoing hot and dry conditions across South Australia.

Around 3000 drops by fixed wing and rotary aircraft have been recorded this season compared to nearly 1600 drops in the 2023/24 season, and hours flown are well-up to 1920 hours in contrast to 1399 hours in the previous period.

Aerial resources played a critical role in supporting crews on the ground to suppress fires and help protect communities, with more than 1300 individual aircraft dispatches attending 200-plus incidents this season.

"After the driest summer we've seen in years, conditions remain a concern for frontline personnel, particularly in the Mount Lofty Ranges," Emergency Services Minister, Emily Bourke, said.

"CFS volunteers on the ground have been supported by crews in the sky, with our aerial fleet recording more drops and hours flown than last season."

People are reminded that a gas or electric barbecue is permitted during the fire danger season so long as it's four metres from flammable vegetation, a responsible person is controlling the fire, and an appropriate extinguisher is at hand.

It is also permitted on a total fire ban day providing the cooking appliance is within 15 metres of a domestic or commercial premises, or on a coastal foreshore.

"Fuel loads vary across the Mount Lofty Ranges, with high forest and scrub fuels in parts and somewhat low fuels in others, and the exceptionally dry conditions and lack of forecast rain in the near future poses a risk of fire," CFS Acting Deputy Chief Officer, Brenton Hastie, said.

'Volunteers have worked incredibly hard to keep the South Australian community safe throughout this fire danger season and will continue to respond to incidents across the state, but the community need to be aware that the risk of fire won't abate until there is significant rainfall."

Several districts including the Mid-North, Murraylands, Riverland, Lower South East, Upper South East, Yorke Peninsula, Adelaide Metropolitan and Kangaroo Island will end as scheduled on April 30, with all other districts already out of season.

Despite the season end in sight for most districts, South Australian communities are reminded not to become complacent, as dry conditions and minimal rainfall continues to pose a risk of bushfire in the landscape throughout autumn.

Current weather predictions indicate no meaningful rain for April, May and parts

The original *Storm Boy* will celebrate its milestone 50th anniversary next year, and the beloved boat used in the film will be on display during this weekend's SA Wooden Boat Festival at Goolwa.

The 1976 film won over the hearts of locals as it showcases the beautiful South Australian landscape, particularly the Goolwa and Coorong region.

HideAway – which was owned by Storm Boy's father Hideaway Tom – was found wrecked on the Murray River before being lovingly restored by Armfield Slip volunteers over about four years.

It will join Armfield Slip's fleet of boats, including *Meralte* used in the 2019 *Storm Boy* production, in the festival this weekend.

Armfield Slip offers a social outlet for members while promoting traditional wooden boat-building skills. An announcement will soon be made of the winner of a hand-built boat by Armfield Slip, which is the first prize in the not-for-profit organisation's raffle, its major fundraiser and promoted during the SA Wooden Boat

A team took about 18 months to build the 12-foot Guillemot dinghy, which will be drawn by Mayor Keith Parkes on Monday.

Thousands of people are expected to pour into Goolwa this weekend to view more than 100 wooden boats on display for the biennial event, which will include competitions, displays, live music and a fireworks display on Saturday night.

Goolwa's Armfield Slip shed on Liverpool Road will also be open and volunteers will conduct demonstrations such as steam bending, and cooking a barbecue.

Goolwa was one of Australia's most important river ports from the 1850s to the 1880s and its original wharf was built in 1852.

The SA Wooden Boat Festival will also be the official opening of the upgrade of the historic Goolwa Wharf Precinct.

While many irrigators have been removing patches of wine grapes and converting to other crops, there are still many grape growers feeling the impact of ongoing low prices.

With consumption of commercial wine falling globally and the large volume of wine retained in storage, there is little cause for optimism in the immediate future.

But there may be some assistance via a program between the State and Federal Governments for funding to assist transition from unprofitable crops to better options.

The River Murray Communities Water Transition Program uses Federal Government funding through state agencies who will administer the program.

An agreement between the State and Federal Governments, it aims to recover water to the environment, with incentives for irrigators who can demonstrate efficiency gains from this change.

Improving efficiency is a challenge for South Australian irrigators, who are already the most efficient in the nation.

With the use of water for irrigation effectively capped in 1968, the only way for irrigators in this state to get bigger was to be as efficient as possible.

Unlike upstream irrigators many methods of improving efficiency, such as fully enclosed delivery systems, drip irrigation and soil moisture monitoring is already in common use.

The burden of this previous investment, plus the costs of energy, employment, and compliance, have come when many commodities are receiving historically low returns.

Few irrigators have enough disposable income or borrowing power to fund a transition on their own.

This program has the potential to make a difference on the condition that it is well-managed.

Firstly, the minister should ensure South Australia receives a fair share of federal funding for the water recovered and the efficiencies gained.

Secondly, the government must ensure it fulfills its commitments as soon as possible.

While the Federal Government is currently in caretaker mode, it is imperative the business case is approved, and that whatever the makeup of the incoming Federal Government, our minister hits the ground running to access these funds.

Thirdly, it is important the State Government offers a co-contribution to address any shortfall in achieving the necessary reform.

Leveraging federal funding will allow the required transition to be faster and more effective.

Currently, it appears there is little urgency in the roll-out of this program from the State Government and, in fact, one is hard pressed to find out how it is tracking.

The State Government and the minister must be transparent, prompt and open with communications about the program to enable people to make important decisions as soon as possible.

Town Hall re-opening date pushed back

A "soft opening" is anticipated for the Strathalbyn Town Hall sometime in July.

Works have been ongoing over several months to upgrade the town hall, but the project has experienced many delays.

It was previously anticipated to re-open in May, however, according to a report from Monday night's Alexandrina Council meeting, redevelopment works are yet to be completed, and administration have other compliance and contractual arrangements to finalise prior to the building being ready for public utilisation.

"This is a normal process to undertake

with re-opening a building, as well as noting that council have not directly managed this building for approximately 20 years," the report read.

"Administration is currently focused on preparing the building to open for public use.

"We are planning to have opportunities for the community to come in and view the hall, and these will be communicated through various communications channels and methods once finalised and confirmed."

It is council's aim to have the Strathalbyn Town Band operating from the hall as soon as all compliance and contractual arrangements are in place, and further information on community use/hire of the hall will occur from July.

This means the council meeting planned to be held in May to celebrate and showcase the renovated town hall will have to be pushed back.

If the meeting fails to occur until next financial year an allocation in the 2025/26 budget will need to be made for technology hire.

"The technology that was hired for the May 2024 meeting remains a valid and potentially superior option to the technology on-site given that it was configured specifically for a council meeting," the report read.

"Until administration has finalised all arrangements concerning the operations of the hall, it is not possible to determine at this time when the hall will be ready to host a council meeting."

Renewable energy facility proposed for Meadows site

A proposed renewable energy facility based in Meadows aims to make the local energy system more efficient and resilient by storing excess energy during low demand periods.

A development application was submitted by ACEnergy for a renewable energy facility comprising of a battery energy storage system for the storage of up to five megawatts with an associated carpark, electrical pole to connect the BESS facility to the existing power network, landscaping, fencing, detention basin, infrastructure and above ground 72,000 litre water tank based on 60 Greenhills Road.

Ample informal onsite parking will be made available during construction, and post-construction two onsite vehicle parking spaces will be provided to accommodate maintenance vehicles.

Construction is anticipated to last four weeks, with working hours limited to 7am to 6pm Monday to Friday, and 8am to 1pm on Saturdays.

Currently the private property has a detached dwelling and scattered mature trees on the land, and has been used for low intensity farming, specifically grazing in the past.

The development is anticipated to enhance the reliability and sustainability of the local energy infrastructure, and support the continued farming use of the land rather than fragmenting.

ACEnergy undertook its own community engagement for submitting the application to receive early feedback from locals but received no response.

However, broader residents can have their say through the Plan SA portal before 11.59pm on Thursday, May 8 by visiting (https://plan.sa.gov.au/have_your_say/notified_developments/current_notified_developments/submission?aid=10657).


She says she will strongly represent the people who come to her for help.

Batmobile is in town

Gilbert's Motor Museum has stepped into the realm of television with its latest exhibit - a Batmobile built by Batman car fanatic Jay Munzer.

The car he hand-built is "98 per cent" true to the 1960s television version and will be on display at the museum for six months.

"I especially loved the car, even more so than the show really," Mr Munzer said.

"When I was a kid ,I would be yelling out to mum, 'the Batmobile is on this episode of Batman'.

"I had been thinking ever since my apprenticeship in 1988 as a panel beater, 'if I could build this and build that, why couldn't I build a Batmobile?'.

"And 25 years later I paid my house off and thought, 'well, I am doing it', and so

In the late summer of 1965, an all-new Batman TV series was gearing up, and with Batman a superhero without superpowers, he needed a lot of gadgets to fight crime and a decent car was a must.

Custom car builder George Barris was given three weeks to build the original Batmobile, deciding to use an abandoned Futura concept car as a base.

The final #1 car featured a large array of bat-gadgets.

In addition to an 'atomic turbine engine', it had a nose-mounted chain slicer, lasers, rockets, an on-board telephone, radar, dash monitor, on-board computer and police beacon.

If needed, the #1 Batmobile was capable of a quick 180 'bat-turn' thanks to two rearmounted 10' parachutes, and was also equipped with a smoke emitter and nail spreader to discourage pursuit.

Mr Munzer bought his kit version in 2011 and found he had to rebuild it from

"It took eight years solid and it is still a work in progress," Mr Munzer said.

The car has been a hit wherever Mr Munzer has been able to transport it to, including at the Wayville Showgrounds one year when Hollywood star John Travolta took an interest.

"He asked me how much it cost and I said 'a house' and he laughed, stood up, and shook my hand," Mr Munzer said.

"I have even got Stan Lee, the inventor of Spiderman, to sign it for me.

"There were two movies made with the original Batmobile - one was in 1968 when they stopped making the TV series and 30 years later, they made a Return to the Batcave movie and used the Batmobile in it as well.

"That was the only time Batmobile appeared in a movie."

Mr Munzer believes his Batmobile is the only one in South Australia, while similar ones are owned in WA, Victoria, and possibly one in Queensland.

Gibert's Motor Museum Assistant Manager Grant Chandler said the museum came across the car by chance.

"We only came about it by chance one day when Jay came in to visit the museum as a normal visitor and someone recognised him as the owner of the Batmobile that he had on display at the Strathalbyn Swap Meet about four years ago," Mr Chandler said.

"So, we got chatting, and we just worked out we could bring the car in and put it

"At the end of the day, there is nothing like it in SA, (so) we are hoping people take the opportunity to come down and see it as it is such a rare car that you will probably never get to see again."

The complete television series of Batman will play on a screen alongside the vehicle.

The original #1 car fetched an eye watering US \$4.2 million when sold at auction in January 2013.

A few ways to boost your super before June 30

Concessional contributions (before tax)

These contributions can be made from either your pre-tax salary via a salary-sacrifice arrangement through your employer or using after-tax money and depositing funds directly into your super account.

Apart from increasing your super balance, you may pay less tax (depending on your current marginal rate). ii

Check to see what your current year to date contributions are, so any additional contributions you make don't exceed the concessional (before-tax) contributions cap, which is \$30,000 from July 1, 2024.iii

Non-concessional contributions (after tax)

This type of contribution is also called a personal contribution.

It's important not to exceed the cap on contributions, which is set at \$120,000 from July 1, 2024.iv





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Mount Barker 'still in the game' for Gather Round

Mount Barker District Council has reassured locals it remains "firmly in the ring" to explore how it can feature in future Gather Rounds in South Australia

Now that Lyndoch Oval was ready to host, it is expected that one or more games will be played there over the remaining two years of the State Government's current agreement with the AFL.

But Mount Barker District Council Mayor Leach said discussions were ongoing with the AFL regarding future programming at the Summit Sport and Recreation Park (SSRP).

"While the Barossa has shown its ability to successfully host games this year, Mount Barker will continue to explore how we can feature in future Gather Rounds in South Australia," he said.

"Gather Round brought national attention to Mount Barker and gave our local fans the rare opportunity to experience elite-level AFL in their own backyard.

"Our hat remains firmly in the ring.

"We are always ready to contribute to major events brought into the state by the government.

"It's a great initiative, not just for sport, but for regional economies and the wider South Australian community."

Mayor Leach confirmed council remains open to future Gather Round opportunities and continues to work closely with the AFL.

He was hopeful that Mount Barker's track record of delivering major events will continue to be recognised by both the AFL and the State Government.

"No decision has been made to step away from hosting," Mayor Leach said.

"While the Barossa has now hosted the Gather Round, we continue to advocate for a model that includes two regional venues – Mount Barker and the Barossa.

"We don't see it as a competition between us; we want both regions – both of South Australia's premier wine and food destinations – to share in the success.

"We shouldn't be constrained by logistical

challenges of preparing two regional grounds – the broader benefits to community, tourism, and the economy far outweigh those challenges."

"Whether it's Gather Round, pre-season matches or elite-level training and development, these events have enormous value, not only for community development but also for our region's economy and tourism sector."

In addition he noted council is still working to make the oval a place to host Hills Football League games.
