Memories flow at Schultz family reunion

Four generations of the Schultz family gathered on Sunday at the Belvidere Soldiers Memorial Hall.

The Belvidere location was chosen for its link with early 1900s dances, with Erwin and Mavis Schultz enthusiastic participants.

Erwin and Mavis moved from Murrayville, Victoria, to the Strathalbyn district in 1947, and were active in the community, including with the local tennis club, bowling club, CWA and Floral Art Club.

Fay Williams (nee Schultz) has been an active member of the sporting community of Mount Compass, while Shirley (deceased) contributed to her Langhorne Creek community, and was the backbone of the local naturalist club.

The weekend was a special time for family members to reflect on Shirley's life, as she was taken too young with a terminal illness.

Local group transforming the Island's landscape

Ten thousand more plants will soon grow at Hindmarsh Island thanks to a recent grant to a local conservation group.

Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife granted \$52,000 to Hindmarsh Island Landcare Group, which will go towards 10,000 more plants on Lawari Conservation Park.

The new plants will make up more than a third of the 26,000 species expected to be planted this year on various sites.

"We're really grateful for the funding," Project Manager, Richard Owen, said.

"We wouldn't be able to do this without their funding so we really want to acknowledge them."

A land care group existed since 1989, and since 2001, the group has planted about 700,000 species, and transformed and restored the landscape of Hindmarsh Island.

Hindmarsh Island Landcare Group has a team of about 30 volunteers who raise plants in its nursery, and a planting team of 10 who are currently working solidly till the end of August.

Mr Owen – who was inducted into the SA Environment Hall of Fame in 2018 – lives on a 15-acre property on the Island, which has wetlands, sand dunes and a recorded 110 species.

The former teacher retired early with a passion to focus on restoration efforts, and finds restoring local environment strengthens his ties with where he lives.

Looking around at the landscape, he is proud of the impact the organisation has made.

For example, on one of their sites, they

"There are all these positive things that we do – and to me, it's all about hope.

"It's easy to get depressed about what's happening in the world, but doing these sorts of things, we can start to address them in a whole lot of ways."

The team has also been creating a habitat for a species of butterfly that was almost wiped out, but has now been recorded.

A western beautiful firetail has also been spotted on multiple places on the Island, and had previously never been recorded, while donated rocks have become a habitat for lizards.

"It just blows your mind (the impact we're having)," Mr Owen said.

"Some places you go back to in a year's time, and particularly if you've had good rain, they're almost unrecognisable – they've grown so much."

When deciding what species to grow, the team investigate what has historically worked in the area by firstly looking for remnants.

With an intention of rebuilding what has been cleared, they have also sought Indigenous knowledge.

Some other considerations include how the vegetation connects from one property to the next so that birds can move from one to the other.

"There's been some experimental stuff... we've been surprised with some of the plants, that some have been a disappointment and some have been a fantastic triumph," Mr Owen said.

For example, some native pines that were planted were exposed and partially burnt from the salt air, which likely would have been avoided if surrounded by other vegetation.

"It's starting to do its job itself, so we're coming across things that we've never planted," Mr Owen said.

Separate leases granted for Milang oval groups

After months of controversy, the Milang and District Historical Society (MDHS) will be granted its own lease with Alexandrina Council, separate from the oval committee.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the MDHS requested an independent lease with council for a portion of the oval grounds in July last year in order to secure the museum's long-term security and expansion plans.

The request was moved to community consultation in January this year, where it received 54 submissions between February and March – the majority in opposition of two leases.

Most of the commentary centred on the Old Scout Hall, with respondents saying the building was for the community, not just one group.

Other concerns raised included the division of both services and the community – the latter of which Milang Oval Committee Chairperson Amanda Vivian highlighted in her deputation at last Monday night's council meeting.

"This is not an us versus them decision," she said.

"The reason the oval committee lease should continue is because the whole facility, including buildings, was built by and belongs to the Milang community and should not be given to one group... (and) because of the cost involved in separating the facility and utilities.

"If separate leases are issued what is to stop all the groups seeking their own leases, opening a can of worms and a management nightmare?

"The reason Milang Oval Committee should continue is because all groups signed a lease for 21 years as a way forward.

"It has worked well for the past seven years – why would you send us back to a system which did not work?"

The Milang and District Historical Society also provided a deputation last Monday night, and delivered its own petition, which garnered 309 signatures.

The society also received 14 letters of support from the likes of the Port Milang Historic Railway Museum, Milang Classic Crawler Club, Gilbert's Motor Museum, and the Goolwa and Strathalbyn National Trusts.

MDHS President Allan McInnes was

"overwhelmed" with the support the group has received.

"We have been overwhelmed with support, not just with the number of signatures on the petition, but with letters of support from community groups," he said during the deputation.

"We hope Alexandrina council will grant us our own lease, giving us the security and stability that we need to move forward into the future, to protect our assets – which are considerable compared to many other museums – and to give our volunteers peace of mind, so they can continue looking after Milang's heritage."

It was noted the results of the petition and council's community engagement conflicted with one another, which along with public debate, had some councillors in two minds about which way to vote.

"I hoped the community feedback would help me a little bit more with my decision," North Ward councillor, Sue Miller, said prior to the vote.

"I've spoken to many people about this and had many contact me, and it would be fair to say if I had 10 people contact me and tell me about something, I had 10 different versions of exactly the same thing.

"It's been really interested and informative, and I've learned so much about the Milang community.

"Needless to say, the next decision we make will leave some elated and some disappointed, and it's probably in equal measure."

After much debate, elected members moved to grant consent for Mayor Keith Parkes and Chief Executive Officer Nigel Morris to sign and seal two leases for the Milang Oval Incorporated and Milang and District Historical Society for portions of the oval complex.

The Old Scout Hall will be included in the historical society's lease area.

"It has been a difficult path for us... because I take all the people I have listened to as being honourable, honest and genuine, and I want to do the best for Milang," West Ward councillor, Michael Scott, said.

"I've tried to look at it (as) is it detrimental to the oval committee to have a second lease on that ground? and I can't see anything that is going to spoil or affect.

"I would hope the two new lesees will continue to work together."

Port Elliot Jetty receives funding for much-need structural repairs

Alexandrina Council is among the several that have been offered funding to repair its much-loved infrastructure as part of the South Australia Jetties Renewal Program.

The program is part of a \$20 million investment to improve the condition and sustainability of jetties, re-opening and keeping them open to locals and visitors for years to come.

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport received ten applications for funding, totalling \$40.308 million.

As a result, several projects have been recommended to be rescoped to better

and Transport, Tom Koutsantonis, said. "This commitment by the State Government will help breathe new life into some of our state's most-loved jetties, helping repair and future-proof them for years to come.

"The Jetties Renewal Program ensures councils get the leg-up they need to repair these assets, benefiting thousands of locals and visitors who use them each year.

"Councils have a contractual obligation to return jetties under their care to the State Government, when the lease expires, in the same condition they received them.

have recorded up to 48 species of birds over three years where previously there were none.

"The impact on wildlife is incredible – they've now got habitat and food," Mr Owen said.

"And we're hoping to do some more research... so we can improve our techniques for planting so we've got food available all year round."

While volunteers benefit socially, Mr Owen boasts of the difference they make to the local environment.

"We're trying to combat climate change – it's all about putting back habitat, so we're stopping extinction," he said. One of his favourites plants is the grass tree xanthorrhoeas, and other wildlife around the Island include kangaroos, swap and water rats, a couple of resident egret birds and blue wrens.

Hindmarsh Island Landcare Group is always looking for more volunteers to raise plants in the nursery, which go on to be planted, sold to the public or for other projects.

For example, volunteers are currently undertaking a "huge effort" of raising 30,000 plants for the new Hindmarsh Valley National Park.

align with the program's objectives, resulting in some funding offers to councils being changed to focus on critical repairs only, maximising the number of jetties which can be funded through the program.

Amongst councils to be awarded funding was Alexandrina Council, which was awarded \$174,000 to re-open the Port Elliot Jetty, which closed to the public in February 2023 due to significant structural and safety issues.

"Jetties are critical pieces of infrastructure in our coastal communities, not only for local residents but also for the thousands of tourists who visit them every year," Minister for Infrastructure

"Sadly, some jetties across the state have had to be closed in recent times due to their poor and unsafe condition, with some councils unable or unwilling to spend the funds required to meet their maintenance obligations under their long-term lease arrangements.

"I am hopeful that through this program we can help Local Government to address those issues and get these jetties back open for the benefit of their communities."

Councils to receive funding were asked to contribute financially to their project on a 50/50 split and accepted an extension to the lease arrangements for a minimum of 15 years once their project is completed.

Sod turned at new Mt Barker Ambulance Station site

A 'ground-breaking' milestone marked the beginning of construction on the new fit-forpurpose ambulance station at Mount Barker for the rapidly expanding Hills population.

Health Minister Chris Picton joined Member for Kavel Dan Cregan, Mount Barker District Council Mayor David Leach, SA Ambulance Service (SAAS) Executive Direction of **Operations Country Robert Tolson and others** in turning the sod at the south-eastern corner of Bald Hills and Springs Roads last Thursday morning which has been set aside for a "bigger and better" ambulance station to replace the current small and outdated facility.

"It is really exciting to now officially have turned the sod of the new Mount Barker Ambulance Station," Minister Picton said.

"This is a region that is growing dramatically as everybody knows, and we need to make sure that critical services keep pace with that growth.

"The current site for SA Ambulance Service is small, old and cramped, with no opportunity for us to be able to expand that site, so we've had to build a brand-new site on a brand-new location.

"This is going to be an ambulance station that not only delivers for the expansion of the capacity we are currently putting in place, but also for future generations."

Being built by Hindmarsh Construction with a \$9.1 million budget, the station will be able to accommodate six ambulances - triple the capacity of the existing Mann Street station and two light fleet, plus a carport for further fleet, 31 parking spaces for staff and a large training room with capacity for 40 people.

The new station will house the existing Mount Barker crew – which includes 12 paramedics that came online last March - and a new six-person Regional Medical Transfer Service (RMTS) crew that hit the road last month and has already responded to more than 100 calls.

Mr Tolson said Hills paramedics were looking forward to moving into the new station.

"We've been looking for this for a long time as an organisation, but as a paramedic workforce, they've been crying out for better facilities for some time," he said.

"The additional resources have played a critical role in significantly improving ambulance availability in an emergency, which has been further boosted by the recent recruitment of RMTS.

"It is great to see site works moving fast

to build the critical infrastructure that these crews need to support their delivery of high-quality emergency care and clinically focused transport.

"The opportunity to provide modern, contemporary facilities for our staff instead of outdated compromised facilities - which we've made do with and provide a good level of service out of - is long overdue and they're really looking forward to moving in."

The sod turn comes after years of advocation by the Hills community, with support from the local member, Mr Cregan, for an expansion of ambulance services in Mount Barker.

The newly appointed Emergency Services Minister remarked it was his "happiest day in politics" to see the commitment the community battled incredibly hard and long for start to come to life.

"Many thousands of people joined a community campaign to emphasise the importance of this issue," Mr Cregan said.

"It weighed heavily on my mind making the decision to become an Independent, so I could speak out more clearly on this and many other issues, and the outcomes we've been able to achieve as a community... we now have a significant plan for a new hospital for the Hills, which will see beds increasing from about 33 to over 100, but also for the first time in our community, 12 mental health beds and many other additional services.

"It is vital to a growing community and it can't be the case that regional communities have less resources than city communities.

"We will soon be the second largest city outside of Adelaide in our state, and we need to change our thinking inside government around what is required for our community."

The new site will complement existing stations in Strathalbyn, Meadows, Woodside, Stirling and Aldgate, in addition to the \$32.8 million Mount Barker Hospital development, which Mayor Leach was pleased with.

"(The hospital) together with this very large ambulance station comparative to the size of the current population means we're future-proofed as we go from 20,000 to 40,000 people living in this town that is soon going to be a city," he said.

"I have been a consumer of ambulances for the first time in many years, and... the ambulance officers who are here do a magnificent job and if you're going to do your job well, we've got to give you the right resources and working place."

The build is expected to be completed and operational by mid-2025.

More than 15 workers per day will be onsite during construction, with site preparations starting ahead of a concrete pour scheduled for June.

New crews will be based out of the existing Mann Street and Strathalbyn stations while building works are under way.

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

On March 1, 1993, Graham Codd started his first day at the Strathalbyn newsagency.

The job would involve running the newsagency, but also delivering metropolitan and local newspapers such as *The Southern Argus* in the dead of night across Strathalbyn and its surrounds.

Now the 82-year-old has announced his retirement, and is looking forward to gardening.

Mr Codd had already lived an interesting life before his move with partner Gail Stanford to Strathalbyn, carving out a notable career in the movie industry.

Not long after he started studying at Woodville High School, he decided school was not for him and he got himself a job with 20th Century Fox.

"I started off as an office boy and from there, I went on to examining all the prints," Mr Codd recalled.

"They would go out to the theatres, and when they came back, I would have to wind through every spool to see if there was no damage done to the print, and if there was, fix it.

"Then I got into the actual exhibition side of it with Greater Union – or Clifford Theatres as it was known in those days – which was the suburban city circuit of Greater Union in South Australia." Mr Codd rose to the level of general manager of Greater Union Theatre Supplies – a job that would see him circumnavigate the world every two years, and earn him respect from the industry as someone who was "very up with it", both with the technology and the exhibition of movies.

"I used to travel to Cologne (in Germany) every two years, and there is a thing called Photokina, which exhibits everything to do with the film industry and photographics," he said.

"So, everything from the box brownie camera to high-definition television was displayed every two years."

Mr Codd would be in Cologne for a week and then travel across the world visiting suppliers in countries such as the UK, Japan, and America.

He would pioneer the design of theatres to make the most of sight and sound.

"I had lots of people from America and England come to see and look at the theatres to see what I had done because things that I did were way out of what was norm in the film industry," Mr Codd said.

Things would change when he finished up in the movie profession, and his immediate thought was to buy a newsagency.

He initially worked around Marden and Payneham, throwing newspapers every morning before buying the Strathalbyn business.

He went on to service outer towns as well such as Langhorne Creek, Milang and Clayton Bay, delivering *The Advertiser*, *The Australian*, the *Sunday Mail*, and the local papers.

"I think I worked out that I usually do about 2220km a week," Mr Codd said.

"My contract says I am responsible for the town of Strathalbyn, and I have a map that shows me the area, but I decided that wasn't far enough.

"I wanted to make money first, but secondly, I wanted to take the business out to the people.

"I get up at 1am... I get a phone call from Encounter Bay to tell me the truck has just left there, so that gives me about an hour to get myself together, get dressed and meet the truck at the shop.

"I want to be here when he arrives because if I don't, he just leaves them on the footpath." He likes to finish his round before the

"The worst road we have is from here to Goolwa because that has the most traffic that

early, so if the papers come late, you are fighting traffic, but if they are on time, you can get it done before it gets too busy," Mr Codd said.

"It has been good fun, and of course... I like teasing people, and sometimes I hide their paper so they have to find it."

Mr Codd has enjoyed the personal nature of doing business in country towns.

"Everyone comes into the shop, and gags on and does all sorts of things," he said.

"(Since announcing my retirement) I

have got quite a few letters... I got another one (recently), saying that they are sad I am leaving, but the service they have been really pleased with.

"And I think they should because I have put a lot of effort into it.

"You have to go out in the wee hours of the morning to do it, but all I hope, at the end of the day, there's a quid in it."

In his time, since 1993, Mr Codd has seen the decline in numbers of newsagencies, thanks to the onslaught of social media, computers and mobile phones.

"The older people have grown up with 'the paper', and the younger people use their phones and don't think they need a paper, and that has put a dent in it," he said.

"The biggest problem you have is you have to watch the costs, and you can't employ too many staff.

"I am training one guy to take over, and that should be any time, and then I will give it away.

"I will go out with him until he is happy that he knows it all, so normally, it will take a week

or two, but if it takes a month, it takes a month." Mr Codd is looking forward to having time to garden and go to the movies.

"Funnily enough, I was given a free double pass by Greater Union for the rest of my life, and I have hardly gone to the pictures," he said.

"There are lots of things that I have to do once I do retire."





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Driver arrested after Hills Fleurieu police pursuit

A man was arrested on Friday for committing several traffic offences in the Hills Fleurieu.

Just after 1.30pm on April 19, police detected a silver Ford Falcon sedan travelling at 116km/h in a 100km/h speed zone on Victor Harbor Road at Mount Jagged.

Police indicated for the driver to pull over, but they refused to stop and continued driving south, where the vehicle was lost sight of soon after and last seen turning onto Yundi Road.

At about 2pm, Hills Fleurieu police spotted the vehicle on McLaren Flat Road heading towards Kangarilla, but it was lost again at Clarendon.

Police found the Ford sedan on Grants Gully Road a few minutes later where it had collided with a guard rail and then two other vehicles.

The driver and passenger tried to run off, but were quickly apprehended.

The driver, a 23-year-old man of no fixed address, was arrested and charged with speeding, dangerous driving to escape police pursuit, and other traffic offences.

He was refused bail and appeared in the Christies Beach Magistrates Court on Monday.

The passenger, a 23-year-old Park Holme woman, was interviewed by police over a number of outstanding fuel drive-off reports, and was charged with failing to truly answer questions as to the identity of a driver.

Anyone who saw the silver Ford sedan driving in the areas listed or has any dashcam footage of the car's manner of driving is asked to contact police.

'Slow down' campaign introduced to parliament

New legislation will require drivers to slow down when they see amber flashing lights on a RAA van stopped at the roadside in a move designed to enhance workers' and stricken motorists' safety.

RAA workers attend more than 950 call-outs a day in South Australia, with an increasing number on high-speed arterial roads where workers – as well as drivers and passengers waiting at the roadside – are particularly vulnerable.

If passed in parliament, the speed limit when passing all breakdown services vehicles and tow trucks flashing amber lights will be reduced to 25km/h in an aim to protect workers on the job and help motorists and their passengers get safely back on the road.

Failure to slow down may result in a fine and demerit points based on the level of speeding. If successfully prosecuted for the offence, a driver faces a maximum court penalty of up to \$2500.

"This is a common-sense measure that protects the people who help us when car troubles strike," Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Tom Koutsantonis, said.

"A vehicle breakdown is not only

inconvenient, it can also create an unsafe situation for the driver and their passengers, as well as the professionals who come to help.

"While roadside workers do what they can to make the breakdown safe site and keep everyone at a safe distance, inattentive driving and going past too fast can have dire consequences for all.

"When you see an RAA patrol van flashing amber lights and traffic cones at the roadside, please slow down and adhere to the reduced speed limit.

"Workers might be out of sight, underneath the vehicle working on a repair or changing a tyre, and there may also be small children nearby waiting with their family to get back on the road."

Between 2019 and 2023, 20 reportable

safety incidents caused by cars driving past breakdowns without due care occurred, according to RAA Road Service data.

This included five incidents where RAA patrols vans were hit by a car or motorcycle, and another five where traffic cones were hit or dragged down the road.

As such, RAA Senior Manager for Safety and Infrastructure Charles Mountain welcomed any measure to keep the vulnerable members and patrols safe at the roadside.

"No one chooses when or where they break down, and we welcome any measure that helps keep our patrols, members and the community safe at the roadside," he said.

"We've seen dozens of near-misses and our patrol vans have been hit five times over the last few years, so it's only a matter of time before someone is seriously injured or killed.

"This is not just about keeping our patrols safe, but also our 820,000 members and the rest of the South Australian community who might need a tow or other assistance.

"When you see the amber flashing lights of a breakdown service vehicle attending to someone's car, please check your surroundings and safely reduce your speed, so we can all get home safely."

Greater voice for victims

Reforms introduced to State Parliament last week will give victims of crime a stronger voice in South Australia's criminal justice system.

The State Government has taken action on issues raised by victims and former Commissioner for Victims' Rights Bronwyn Killmier regarding the experiences of victims during the sentencing process, including some instances where eligible victims were unable to tender a victim impact statement.

Victim impact statements are an invaluable aspect of the criminal justice system that give victims of crime the opportunity to provide the sentencing court with a personal statement about the impact of injury, loss or damage suffered by them as a result of the crime.

Importantly, they may be considered by the court when determining the sentence for an offence, and often have restorative and therapeutic value for victims.

Under the government's proposed reforms the court must, on application by the prosecutor, adjourn sentencing proceedings to allow the victim to prepare their statement where they have not had a reasonable opportunity to provide one or have requested more time, the statements must be received by the courts in the victims' own words, and victims must be given an express right to be informed about their entitlement to provide a statement and how it may be used by the court.

"Victims should have the right to tell courts in their own words exactly how an offender and their criminal actions have affected the victims' lives," Attorney-General, Kyam Maher, said.

"We want to ensure that victims are given every opportunity to participate in the sentencing process and feel their voices are valued.

"After two stages of stakeholder consultation, I am pleased the government is able to introduce this bill that strikes the appropriate balance between the value of victim participation in sentencing and the interests of timely justice."

Drink driver caught at Monarto

A Hartley man lost his licence after allegedly being caught nearly four times over the legal blood alcohol limit at Monarto in the early hours of Tuesday morning.

At 12.40am, police attended Frahns Farm Road following reports a silver Toyota sedan was seen leaving the road, taking out trees and shrub. The driver and sole occupant, a 26-yearold Hartley man, submitted to a breath test and allegedly returned a reading of 0.195.

He was issued an on-the-spot 12-month loss of licence, and reported for driving without due care and drink driving.

The man will be summonsed to attend Murray Bridge Magistrates Court at a later date.



Generations remember who came before for Anzac Day

The Peters are one of the longest running families in Mount Compass, having lived in the town for almost entirely six generations, and three members who served in World War I and II will be remembered by their descendants on Anzac Day.

Archibald James Peters was a Lance Corporal serving in the 10th Infantry Battalion, and was wounded in action in 1918 in France.

His brother Howard Bishop Peters served as a Sergeant in the Australian Imperial Force in the 27th Infantry Battalion and was wounded in action in France in 1917.

Gaps have been found in his service record, as he was believed to also have served in World War II.

Howard's son was Benjamin Richard Peters who served in the Army as a Private, and his posting at discharge was the 27 Battalion.

Their names and photos are displayed on The Wall of Remembrance in the foyer of Mount Compass Memorial Hall, along with 76 others from the Mount Compass and Nangkita districts who served during World War I and II.

The project was pulled together by the local history group and assisted by archivist Steve Kettle whose job was tracing families to find historic photos. "Being a rural area, most of the families could only get one member serving because they had to feed the population... to provide carrots, turnips and swedes," he said.

"There were Italian Prisoners of War (POW) in WWII that worked here on the farms to replace those who went overseas." Keeping their memory alive is appreciated

by descendants Phil, Braedon, and children Jackson and Harvey Peters, who reflect on their family's stories today.

"What Steve is doing is so important," Phil said.

"He's collecting memorabilia... it doesn't matter what it is, he's got it, he's kept it, and he's put it aside.


"It hasn't been gone – it hasn't been lost." Phil remembered Archibald as a "lovely old fella", who was a storyteller and poet, and his brother Howard who was "never the same man again" after returning from war.

During retirement, Howard made a lot of quality furniture out of blackwood, while Benjamin built dairy trusses and yards in the area.

"People have different memories of the war, and a lot of peoples' memories are fun – they travelled, they drank beer, they played up." Phil said.

up," Phil said. "Whereas others... wouldn't mention it. "War impacts lives forever.

"The most important reason to remember it is to bloody well ensure it doesn't happen again, and we're not doing a very good job at that at the moment, are we?"



Design endorsed for Wharf toilets

Alexandrina Council will spend \$350,000 on new heritage-approved toilets to be built at the Goolwa Wharf Precinct, near the pedestrian crossing.

At council's February 2023 meeting, elected members resolved for the external look and feel of the toilets being installed at the wharf as part of the ongoing precinct project to be workshopped with council members and presented to the chamber for endorsement.

The internals were briefly workshopped at the beginning of April, where an initial configuration of one unisex accessibility, two female, one male and another unisex toilet was proposed.

Aside from the independent cubicles, the design has been tailored to complement the heritage colour palette and building style of the precinct.

However, North Ward councillor Christie Thornton was unimpressed.

"I refuse to believe that's the only design the historical people could come up with – a tin shed," she said.

"Surely the old wood of the wharf could have been used as cladding around it instead of that iron?

"There had to have been other designs, and I wish we could have seen them."

At last Monday night's meeting, councillors endorsed the provided toilet block design.

The design has been approved in principle by Heritage South Australia, and has been lodged for development approval to meet the wharf project's larger program requirements.

It will come at a cost of \$350,000, which Chief Executive Officer Nigel Morris explained council "desperately

tried" to get cheaper.

"It's not just the structure you're seeing, it's also the underground works that will be occurring," he said.

"As I've always said, when you're building your own house, you're not expecting 1000 people to walk through it each day.

"It's a commercial property and this is what the cost comes at."

The landscaping around the toilet block will come back to a council workshop.

"I think it's really important, given how much investment we are putting into the Goolwa Wharf Precinct, that we really think about how we can make the structure look less out of place, and not just in the middle of the precinct," South Ward councillor, Milli Livingston, said.

"If we can't make any changes to the structure, it's really important we preserve the character of the precinct."

up to speed with what the Navy is doing. "It is always good to have a uniform presence if it is available."



Starting at 6pm, the service fell from light to darkness, lit by candlelight during 'perfect" weather conditions, and many stayed on for a barbecue dinner at the RSL clubrooms afterwards.

Volunteers in the kitchen served more than 120 meals, and others helped with setting up and packing down the following day.

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Frost's inspiring 500-game milesto

For Langhorne Creek Netball Club's (LCNC) Sophie Frost, netball is an integral part of her life, which is demonstrated through her 500 senior game milestone at today's home game.

The dedicated clubperson started playing netball at about eight-years-old, shortly after her family moved to the region.

With sport being part of 'small, community life' and both her parents participating in football and netball respectively, it was a no-brainer that Frost would play.

"Both my parents were pretty good at sport – mum played in the Great Southern League years before, and dad had played in Great Southern footy as well at SANFL level – so I think sport was just a natural pathway that we went down as kids," Frost explained.

Aside from when she lived in Melbourne for one year, Frost has remained at the Langhorne Creek club, saying she never had the desire to go anywhere else.

"I lived in Melbourne for a year, but all the rest of the time I've lived at Langhorne Creek and just been fulfilled with how I've played here," Frost said.

"Now, I'm probably playing against children of people I played against.

"In Myponga, there used to be – and still is – the Raper family and (I was) playing against Christine in the A Grade, and now her children are coaching their league teams or have been in those positions.

"Even here, last year I played with my eldest daughter Tilly.

"She started playing up a little bit, so... for a mum, it's nice to have that experience, and seeing kids I have coached now having their experiences in league and other pathways has been a fulfilling moment."

During her time at Langhorne Creek, Frost has experienced many successes both on and off the court.

She led the A Grade side to victory in 2009 and contributed to the 2015 Senior 2 premiership, as well as coached the 13 and Under team to a Grand Final win – all fond memories for her.

"The 13s – the one that I coached – I just remember we'd had a really successful season with a talented bunch of girls on the court, as did Strath," Frost recalled.

"We were down in the first quarter quite significantly, and it was a bit of a shell-shock.

"I remember a parent commenting to me... 'you need to make changes and do this' and I said 'nah, you just have to have belief in these kids because they know what their role is', and being calm in that situation, so the kids could see you had the belief in them and just needed a little instruction.

"They turned it around and played these



ripper three quarters and won, and that was something that, for me, was (about) the coaching of those kids and having belief in the team even when they were looking down.

"Our League premiership was really cool because we'd been runners-up previously or always been in the finals, and just to snatch it away from Victor Harbor at the start of their massive run – they'd won a few finals and we'd been up against them a couple of times – and to captain that team was really lovely.

"Then our Senior 2 premiership – that was after I had a couple of kids, so you're sporting days is about your kids not you anymore... I remember we were down by eight or something at three-quarter time and we were playing Myponga at Myponga, (and then) we got our (act) together and just had a really big impact."

In addition to premierships, Frost has won both club and Great Southern Netball Association (GSNA) Best and Fairest on multiple occasions, represented the GSNA as a junior, was part of the Country Championships win in the A Grade, and is a Life Member of both LCNC and GSNA.

However, her proudest achievements are receiving Volunteer of the Year in 2022 and being well-respected across the league. 'She is very calm... sometimes you can see coaches get real riled up in the pivotal moments of a game or when things are close, and I know I'm quite a vocal director on the court and as a sideline person, whereas Kaye she would take her time and be really quiet at the quarter and half-time breaks.

"Linda Follett was another one – she coached us in the Senior 2 Grand Final, but she's also been a great mentor in an administrative type situation because I've held multiple roles in that facet of the club.

"I can remember being a junior and I used to play goals, and one of coaches Dennis (Elliott) said 'you're going to go to goal defence' and I was like 'I don't do that, I'm goalie' because everyone wants to be goalie, and, my mum, we sat down and wrote an apology letter to Dennis and I handdelivered it, and then that's when I entered my senior netball as a defender.

"If I didn't pull my head in and swallow my pride and go 'well actually, you're an adult and you're telling me something I can't see, and you've got experience in that' then I might not have ever had that opportunity."

On top of being an outstanding player, Frost is an exemplary volunteer, having been involved in the committee for several years, both as Secretary and Co-President.

In these roles, she has created and contributed to changes within the club.

"I started as Secretary in the late 90s with Kristy Martin, and we did it together for a while... and before I went (away), we were the first club that wore bodysuits," Frost said.

'We had a uniform change and I remember being involved in that and putting the navy into the club colours because we'd been through so many yellows and browns.

"The time with Linda Follett as President and I was Secretary, I learned a lot then.

"Co-presidency we did it for five years, Sue Hall and myself, and... they were really fulfilling years giving back to the club.

'We did the court resurfacing, took out the old pine trees, changed the colour of the courts, and even the internal clubroom changes.

"I was probably 18 (when I started on the committee), and they had an AGM and they didn't have enough people, and because we lived over the road, someone would have just come over home and said 'we need someone to be part of the quorum' and I can remember doing that then staying on the committee for years?

Frost has also coached on and off during her career.

She is currently coaching the Senior 2 team and the 13s at a reps level, and provides assistance where she can to League Coach Liv Gallio.

Though Frost joked "someone has to do

"The 500-game thing, I'm not sure that's going to ever happen again."

It's a milestone Frost 'doesn't give herself enough credit for', but is one she's proud of.

"I often joke around that it's because I haven't had much of a life; I've just stayed in one spot," Frost said.

"It's a lot of netball, and I am proud that it's been a lot of netball at a decent level.

"Most of it would be at a League level, and I made the choice to step down from League when I wanted to - so I was happy that I did that – and I enjoy the Senior 3 level that I play now."

Frost credited her longevity to the relationships she has built at the club and in the league.

She also noted she wouldn't know what to do without netball.

"It is the people, and also, I think being okay at it does help because you can try to achieve as high as you can," Frost explained.

"I'd rather play (netball) than watch it, so I think that's why (I stayed) because it at least fills an hour-and-a-half of my day.

"I still like playing and until I don't like playing, I think I'll play.

"I will choose to step down or one day something will happen to my body and that choice will be made for me."

Even then, Frost has a seat waiting for her on the sidelines.

She looked forward to seeing how the club continues to develop into the future.

"I'll still be here for a long time watching,"

Frost said.

"There are people here that put in and do so much for so many years, and they keep returning, which I love seeing.

"Hopefully, we'll see some more kids come through some good pathways.

"It's nice to see a fresh face and coaching ideas with Liv that's come to the club, and I hope that continues because I think grassroots sport is so important, which really showed for our community in the COVID times - still having that place to come to and be part of, and the socialisation."

Tonkin emphasised Frost means a lot to the club, and hoped the 500-gamer would continue to share her knowledge for years to come.

"I hope she doesn't ever leave the netball club because her netball knowledge and brain are like none other, so I'm hoping that will continue into coaching years, then we get to all benefit from that," she said.

"She's someone people want to go to because she gives great advice.

"She's just a netball fanatic and she doesn't love the recognition, which is the best thing about her.

"She doesn't like the spotlight on her, but it's very well-deserving."



Silver gongs for local Masters pickleballer

Strathalbyn-based Pickleballer Grant Diggins has returned home from the SA Pickleball Masters tournament in Kadina with two silver, and one bronze, medals.

The SA Masters featured mixed doubles, same gender doubles, and two types of singles categories.

Diggins won silver in the 110 plus mixed doubles (ages are added together) and 110 plus men's doubles, and bronze in the 60 plus men's skinny singles.

He now has his eye focused on the National Championships on the Gold Coast in October.

The sport, which is listed as the fastest growing sport in the US, is also gathering pace in Australia, with 8500 registered participants listed as of December last year, while attracting about 300 new members a month.

"It is a mix of tennis, table tennis and badminton, and is pretty much played on a badminton court," Diggins said.

'My wife and I co-ordinate Pickleball at Mount Barker, and now Strath, where it started around March.

"We saw the growth in Mount Barker... we started with 15 to 20 players and now we have got between 30 and 35 every week, with four courts.

Likewise in Strathalbyn the sport has grown from 20 to 25 people to much more as new people try it each week.

"Initially I was a tennis player, I played a lot of tennis, and with tennis you play on a singles court, but in Pickleball you play on the full court, which is a lot of running around, which I love," Diggins said.

"But you can also play, if you don't want to run as much, a game called skinny singles and that is on half a court.

When you start Pickleball you have to self-grade, and there is a list of things that you need to be able to do to get to certain levels.

Once you have taken part in official Pickleball events you are graded according to results. "One of the great things about

Pickleball, is that it can be played by anyone really," Diggins said

You serve underarm, unlike tennis where it sometimes takes people a while to learn how to serve properly, and while it is great for movement and getting your heart racing - particularly if you are playing at high levels - at the social level all you need is a bit of eye hand coordination to be able to get the ball back.

"My wife is not sporty at all, but she likes to have a hit socially, so she is probably an example of someone who hasn't got great eye hand co-ordination, but can still hit the ball back and rally and still enjoy it.'

The Strathalbyn competition is played on the Tyndale Christian School courts on Monday nights from 7pm to 9pm.



BIDDING ANALYSIS East 1NT: Standard 15-18 Opening South 2D: Nuisance overcall West 2H: Natural suit East 3H: Heart support West 4H: Game

This is an exercise in defence and it highlights the need to think ahead and work out how the contract can be defeated. If that won't work, then try to minimise overtricks. North/South have only a brief window of opportunity so they need to have their wits about them.

East/West easily find the contract of 4 Hearts at every table, and in fact every table except one made 11 tricks. At our table, I had managed to slip in a nuisance lead-directing bid of 2 Diamonds. This had the bonus nuisance value of preventing West from using a transfer bid, which led to West being the Declarer.

My partner duly led the + J which I took with the Ace. These thoughts went through my head: (1) The Jack must have been North's best Diamond, I had the Ace, Dummy has the Queen, so Declarer has the King (2) If I have 6 diamonds and Dummy has 2, the likely distribution is 6-3-2-2, so my partner did not have a singleton, (3) Spades in Dummy are solid and (4) the only chance we have is to find North with the Ace of clubs, and to get a club ruff, so I return my singleton 🕭 4, hoping for the best.

This is when north can apply the same sort of reasoning (1) Again, Dummy's spades are solid, (2) nothing to gain by playing a trump, (3) South bid diamonds but didn't lead one back, and therefore, (4) the best chance we have for another trick is if South's & 4 was a singleton. It worked! South ruffed with his one and only trump, and although the contract still made 10 tricks, that gave N/S the top board,

everyone else got 11.


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



