50 YEARS ON

Veterans will be honoured in a Macclesfield service next weekend to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Australia's involvement in the end of the Vietnam War.

Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch will host the service at the Macclesfield ANZAC Memorial

Garden next Saturday and acknowledge the service, and sacrifice of those who served.

Australia was involved in the Vietnam War from 1962 to 1973, and had 60,000 people serve, 523 pay the ultimate sacrifice and about 3,000 wounded.

The conflict was between the communist

government of North Vietnam and its allies in South Vietnam against the South Vietnam Government and its principal ally, the United States, and Australia's support was to help stop the spread of communism in Europe and Asia.

Bleasdale Vineyards named Australia's best

Langhorne Creek's Bleasdale Vineyards has earned Australia's most prestigious title of Halliday Wine Companion's 2024 Winery of the Year, bringing the accolade back into South Australian hands for the first time in three years.

The annual Halliday Wine Companion Awards was founded by James Halliday and eight other judges select the best from the nation's top wines, winemakers, viticulturalists and wineries.

More than 1,200 wineries submitted samples for this year's competition, with winners announced at an awards night at Melbourne's Stokehouse in St Kilda last Wednesday.

Taking out the night's top honour was Bleasdale Vineyards with 2024 Winery of the Year, with the judges calling it a "quality juggernaut" whose bread and butter is special value wines.

"There's an argument to say the Bleasdale winery, both historically and most certainly

at the hand of winemaker Paul Hotker, should be regarded as every Australian wine lover's best friend," the judges wrote.

"It's probably best known as a value producer thanks to the fact - as James Halliday so aptly puts it -there's 'value across the board', but it's become abundantly apparent in recent years that Bleasdale is a whole lot more than that.

'Bleasdale is our Winery of the Year because at our annual (blind) judging, it won two major awards, (and) quite remarkably, has 22 wines ranked at 90 or higher in this guide, including no less than 16 at 95 points or higher.

'(Bleasdale's head winemaker, Paul Hotker) and his team are relentless in their determination to work magic, and we will never tire of celebrating it."

Mr Hotker said the win was a testament to the dedication the team pours into grape growing and wine making each year.

"Winning Winery of the Year feels like

we've made it," he said.

"We make the best wine we can every year by embracing and adapting to each vintage, rather than trying to stick to a rigid style.

"I believe this accolade recognises the consistency of wine quality we've been producing at Bleasdale for a number of years.

"We're already well-known for our great value wines, but this shows we can compete amongst the best of the best.'

In addition to Winery of the Year, Bleasdale Vineyards took out a back-to-back win the first for any winery – in the Cabernet Sauvignon of the Year category with its 2021 The Iron Duke and had another win on the board with its 2021 Wellington Road in Best Shiraz Cabernet Blend of the Year.

For Bleasdale Vineyards Brand Ambassador, Robbie Potts, the wins are particularly significant.

After working at the winery for more than four decades, he thanked the team for their contribution to the awards.

"I've always known the quality of wine coming out of Bleasdale and Langhorne Creek generally is a cut above the rest, but this award makes it official," Mr Potts said.

'We've been working for generations out here to make this wine some of the best in the world, and I can't thank our team enough for elevating us to this point.

"Everyone from Sarah Keough, our viticulturalist through to Paul and Mat our winemakers, and the rest of the team here at Bleasdale who ensure our wine gets into the hands of the right people. They all deserve recognition for this honour - it's been a huge team effort.

"I hope it now paves the way for this region to finally be recognised in the same way the Barossa and McLaren Vale are - as a global leader in wine quality."

Bleasdale Vineyards and its wine will feature in the annual Halliday Wine Companion Guide.

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Macclesfield service to commemorate 50-year anniversary

Macclesfield veteran, Rob McNamara, and Vice-President of the Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch, served in the Army in Vietnam for more than one year – and the tale of how he got there was nothing but chance.

While in the National Service, he was approached by a Corporal with a clipboard.

"He said 'righto, listen in – the following people are to go to Canungra on Monday morning', and once you went to Canungra, it was virtually the first step to Vietnam," Mr McNamara explained.

"He read out the names in alphabetical order."

He will never forget the affect names can have on your life, as the list was read and the final two names began with 'J' and 'K', finishing just short of his name 'M'.

However, those final two had a car accident just before they were scheduled to leave, which meant the next two on the list were chosen to take their spots – which included Mr McNamara.

"That changed my whole life," he said.

"It just goes to show you how little things that you never think about can change your life."

The day after he arrived in Vietnam was his mother's birthday, and months later, he turned 21.

"The whole thing was particularly hard on her for the simple reason that dad was in the Middle East for two-and-a-half years," Mr McNamara said.

"Mum waited for him to come home from there... then he went to New Guinea for 10 months

"I went to Vietnam for 12 months – that was tough on mum because she didn't deserve all that – that's just the way it was."

Letter correspondence was important for overseas veterans, with Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch President, Dennis Oldenhove, describing receiving a letter as an "absolute treat" for veterans and their families.

Mr McNamara would write letters to his wife and mum, and the Postmaster at the time would often contact his mum and alert her to a letter waiting.

"With letter writing, it was a bit of the same old, same old, because you didn't really want to tell them what you were doing," he said.

"You mightn't have been doing anything particularly dangerous, but perhaps they could read into things.

"When you're overseas, you might be in a tight spot, but in two hours it could all

be over, so you've only got to worry about those two hours.

"But the people at home – they worry about you all the time because they don't know whether you're safe or not."

Mr Oldenhove found living through war time as 95 per cent with boredom and five per cent in fear.

"It's so intense for short periods of time that you are fearing for your life... then once that situation is over with, it's relatively mundane," he said.

"But then you never know when that five per cent of crapping your pants is going to come – that's always hanging over your head – but that's the nature of conflict."

The loved ones left behind at home are also acknowledged as those who have served by the Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch.

"The wives, the mothers, the kids, the parents, the daughters, the girlfriends – everybody who is left behind – is serving as well," Mr Oldenhove said.

"They sacrifice and they give up time with their loved ones, and the stressors they go through during someone's military service is significant."

Some people left behind in Australia opposed the Vietnam War and conscriptions, and protests occurred throughout the country.

"(Apart from World War II), it was the first time that some people – through no choice of their own – were made to go to war, whereas every conflict previously had all been volunteers," Mr Oldenhove said.

"We were now compelling young men... if their name was pulled out, they were forced to serve and go to war.

"There was resentment towards that, and

that's particularly from families who had their sons conscripted and were told they were going to a conflict."

Mr Oldenhove said many Australians also disagreed with being involved the war, as previously there was a threat to Australia, whereas Vietnam posed a perceived threat of what could happen.

Further to that, Vietnam was the first televised war.

"A lot of the protest and ill feelings toward the conflict came about because it was presented to people in their lounge rooms, whereas previous conflicts would be censored articles that came in newspapers two to three months after events had already occurred," Mr Oldenhove said.

"There was a lot of different feelings towards the conflict and that was reflective of the times."

However, Mr McNamara found being from a country town of Macclesfield was a different experience to Australian cities.

"We were very well-received by the local community when we came home, but the big cities copped a lot of flak," he said.

"I think the country towns were more tolerant because in small country towns, people actually knew the people who had gone, whereas in the city, you were just another face."

Australian troops returned home 50 years ago in 1973, and the local upcoming service falls the day after the annual Vietnam Veteran's Day, which coincides with the Battle of Long Tan – "one of the costliest battles during that conflict".

As part of the service, a new memorial in the Macclesfield ANZAC Memorial Garden will be

unveiled, dedicated to those who were part of National Service who will be acknowledged.

Australia had two National Service schemes
– during the Vietnam War and during the 1950s
– which is when Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch
Vice-President, Neil Wright served.

"With the establishment of a full-time force following World War II, they needed more troops and it was a way to boost the service scheme then," Mr Oldenhove said.

"Many thousands of Australians enlisted there, and they served in Strathalbyn, Woodside and local areas around here.

"Those who did National Service may or may not have been deployed, but were called upon as part of the conscription system to serve their country.

"We make sure it's a very holistic look at commemoration, we've got to make sure that it all gets looked at."

Mr Wright joined the National Service in the 1950s for four years.


He filled up the Army Reserves during the Korean War, served three months full-time in Woodside, went on to join Strathalbyn Citizen Military Forces (CMF), and attended a fortnightly camp in Port Augusta.

Mr Wright made the rank of Corporal for two-and-a-half years, and his dad was among the founding members of the Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch.

Mr Wright will be among veterans and families acknowledged and reflected upon at next Saturday's service.

All Veterans' groups, RSLs, and community members are invited to the upcoming service and to spend time in the Macclesfield ANZAC Memorial Garden, where catering will be available.

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Deadline dilemma for Murray-Darling **Basin Plan**

A local MP is 'frustrated, but not surprised' by the news the full implementation of the Murray-Darling Basin Plan is now unachievable by its due date.

Advice from the Murray-Darling Basin Authority has revealed the \$13 million plan is estimated to return 750 gigalitres (GL) less than the overall 3,200 water target to the environment by the June 30, 2024 deadline.

Member for Mayo, Rebekha Sharkie raised concerns during Question Time last month about the delivery of water under the plan - which was acknowledged by Federal Water Minister, Tanya Plibersek – given the importance of environmental water return for the Murray Darling system's health, and the threat of El Nino.

She said failure of the plan was less than ideal and should never have been allowed

"This is a setback for South Australia, as the Murray-Darling Basin Plan will not deliver the return of environmental water within the statutory timeframe," Ms Sharkie said.

"With only two per cent of the 450GL delivered by May last year, I recognise the government was starting from a low base and a short timeframe to deliver.

"Our community has every right to feel disappointed that such an important plan to recover water will not be delivered within the Murray-Darling Basin Plan deadlines."

Member for Hammond, Adrian Pederick believed more focus should be put on the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

"The River Murray is the lifeblood of much of my electorate, and the fact that Tanya Plibersek and Susan Close have only now realised the plan will not be delivered shows

how removed they are from the realities of life in the Basin," he said.

'Susan Close needs to work with her federal counterpart on mapping a pathway forward for the Murray-Darling Basin Plan, so Basin communities can get the certainty they deserve."

However, Ms Sharkie noted Ms Plibersek was committed to working with basin ministers to obtain agreement to extend deadlines and deliver the plan in full.

"We cannot be complacent about returning water to the system, so I'm grateful the minister has sought to extend the deadline and not walk away," she added.

"It is incumbent on us to be prepared for the next drought, and this is why it is so important we return water pursuant to the Basin Plan.

"I urge all state ministers to work collaboratively with Minister Plibersek, extend the deadline, and secure the return of water to the river system once and for all."

Community views sought on water policies

Community input is being sought on Hills Fleurieu Landscape Board (HFLB) water polices to set the direction for an amendment process

The Eastern and Western Mount Lofty Ranges Water Allocation Plans (WAPs) have been in place for a decade, and their effectiveness is now being reviewed.

This year, the HFLB will be sharing information about how its water resources are tracking and some of the key challenges ahead, and want to hear the perspective of water users, licence holders, community members, and industry representatives to understand their experiences and views on the current water policies, particularly what has worked well and where future efforts should be focused.

These conversations will set the direction for the amendment process HFLB will start next year.

During the process, new policies will be tested and explored, which local communities and industries will play a key role in.

Anyone interested in being involved in the evaluations this year is encouraged to attend one of the six drop-in sessions the board is holding around the region between August 21 and September 8.

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Better for life

SA road toll exceeds 2022 total

South Australia's road toll has officially surpassed last year's total, prompting renewed pleas from police to take care while driving.

Seventy-four lives have been lost on South Australian roads so far this year – more than the total for 2022 – and 504 serious injuries occurred.

More than half of the deaths this year have been on country roads, with 13 of the fatalities being motorcyclists, five vehicle passengers, 11 pedestrians, and five cyclists.

"Unfortunately, many lives lost and serious injuries on our roads can be avoided," Officer in Charge of the Traffic Services Branch, Superintendent Darren Fielke, said.

"Distraction of drivers has led to 18 lives lost, with 20 as a result of dangerous driving, 23 due to speed, and another 20 where alcohol or drug driving was a factor.

"In some instances, there was more than one contributing factor."

To coincide with safety pleas, Operation Stop Drink/Drug Driving was launched state-wide last Friday, with police undertaking mobile and static driver screening tests.

As of July 31, 2364 drivers have been detected drink driving and 2,753 drug driving this year.

"South Australia Police is committed

to road safety, and conduct a range of operations throughout the year to target behaviour associated with the 'Fatal Five," Superintendent Fielke said.

"In the last five years, drink/drug driving has been a contributing factor in 26 per cent of (fatal) and 20 per cent of serious injury collisions.

"Every driver detected and removed from the road has the potential to save lives."

Two-car collision at Goolwa

Four people, including two young children, were taken to hospital with minor injuries after two cars collided at Goolwa last Friday.

At about 8.40am on August 4 Country Fire Service and State Emergency Service crews, SA Police, and SA Ambulance Service were called to the intersection of Loveday Street and Crocker Street after a Toyota station wagon and Mazda sedan collided.

The Toyota driver was a 42-year-old Hindmarsh woman who had a 10-year-old female passenger, while a 32-year-old Hindmarsh Island woman who had a six-year-old female passenger was behind the wheel of the Mazda.

All four were taken to hospital for treatment of minor injuries.

The Mazda driver was issued an expiation notice for failing to give way.

Both vehicles were extensively damaged and towed from the scene.

Murray Bridge thefts prompt car security reminder

Tragic death sparks tougher road laws

Landmark new road safety laws passed in State Parliament last month are paving the way for tough new penalties to tackle driving behaviour that results in death or serious harm.

The new laws under the Statutes Amendment (Serious Vehicle and Vessel Offences) Act 2023 establish a new midtier indictable offence of causing death or serious harm by careless use of a vehicle or vessel, effectively raising the maximum penalty for such conduct from 12 months imprisonment to five years for a basic

offence and seven for aggravated.

Circumstances of aggravation include driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs, and will require courts to impose a minimum three-year licence disqualification.

The suite of reforms imposed following the tragic death of Sophia Naismith also includes a new licence class for people driving ultra-high-powered vehicles, and a fine of up to \$5,000 for a person who disables automated safety systems in such cars.

Stolen solar lights at Murray Bridge

Police are investigating the recent theft of solar lights from a Murray Bridge nature strip.

Sometime between July 27 and 28, five large council solar lights were removed from their bollards on a garden path on Adelaide Road.

New coercive campaign timed with FIFA Women's World Cup

As the world's best female soccer players take centre stage for the FIFA Women's World Cup, a new communication campaign is educating fans on the insidious ways controlling and abusive behaviour by men can impact women off the field.

The \$200,000 campaign targeting 15-to-24-year-olds features both male and female perspectives on 'red flags' to look for as signs of an abusive relationship, and is complemented

by educational workshops for sports clubs in a bid to raise awareness about coercive control ahead of moves to criminalise the form of abuse in South Australia.

The ads build on the momentum of South Australia's first ever coercive control campaign, which was launched in March this year, urging the community to 'see the signs'.

"It is incredibly exciting to see the best athletes in the world take centre stage, and

showcase their outstanding skills, strength and passion, as Adelaide hosts the FIFA Women's World Cup," Minister for Women, and the Prevention of Domestic and Family Violence, Katrine Hildyard, said.

"This important coercive control campaign will leverage huge public interest and attention on the FIFA Women's World Cup to drive home an important message about how to recognise the signs of coercive

control, and how to take action when you see them.

"In 99 per cent of domestic violence homicides, the relationship that preceded that horrific event featured a coercive control element.

"We are committed to doing all we can to help prevent and eradicate domestic violence, and our work to raise awareness about coercive control is a crucial part of that effort."

After various delays the little town of Finniss is to proceed with the building of a modern Institute Hall. Murray River water worries

We all saw this coming.

Federal Water Minister, Tanya Plibersek finally came clean this week, admitting the Murray-Darling Basin Plan's environmental water recovery deadline of June 30, 2024 is impossible to meet.

That's despite guarantees from Labor they could be trusted with the plan in the lead up to the State and Federal Elections.

The big losers in all of this are our basin communities and our natural environment.

For four years, I was South Australia's Minister for Water, so I know first-hand that delivering the Basin Plan is gruelling work.

The Murray-Darling river system makes its way through Queensland, New South Wales, and Victoria before arriving in South Australia.

It's a difficult journey, with many claims made against its precious water.

Some players follow the rules and some do not.

Managing multi-jurisdictional rivers is

Managing multi-jurisdictional rivers is fraught, especially when you're the only Liberal at the table.

During my time as the state's water minister, I worked with Labor ministers in Queensland and Victoria, Nationals ministers federally and from New South Wales, and a Greens minister from the ACT.

It was a constant battle, but I was able to keep everyone at the table, ensure the plan moved forward, and delivered vital water to South Australia.

I disagreed with Nationals on many occasions because South Australia always came first.

I secured the first water towards the vital 450GL, and I was able to negotiate massive investment in the sustainability of the Coorong.

I even got New South Wales and Victoria to begin planning work around undergrounding their infamous open channels.

Since Labor came to power in South Australia, quickly followed by their federal counterparts, progress with the plan has ground to a halt.

Just before the last state election, Peter Malinauskas vowed to launch action in the High Court "to defend our water rights against the inaction" of the eastern states.

If there's ever a time for action on this crucial issue, it's now, but sadly it appears Labor has sold us down the river.

Government's overdue rethink on vaping

Last month marked a watershed moment for Australia's approach to vaping.

Emails from senior advisors to Federal Health Minister Mark Butler revealed that even his own expert advisory committee knows the proposed vaping crackdown simply won't work.

Currently only 8 per cent of adult vapers have nicotine prescriptions.

As a result, the black market has exploded, selling dodgy, unregulated products freely to adults and children.

Mark Butler's policy will be a slow train wreck for exactly the same reasons as Greg Hunt's failed model, but worse. And disturbingly, experts advising him on these regulations know this too.

But this begs the question. What would be a better policy in its place?

Regulation. Not prohibition. If we created a legal adult consumer market for nicotine vaping products in Australia, that carried substantial penalties for underage sales, the black market would substantially diminish over time, and young people would have dramatically reduced access.

By regulating vape products rather than banning them, consumers would have access to safer products, with fewer harmful chemicals and basic consumer protections.

This would enable more adult smokers to quit and keep nicotine vapes out of the hands of young people.

This model is working well in other western countries such as New Zealand and the United Kingdom.

This model is supported by 73 per cent of Australian adults according to a recent Roy Morgan survey and is a win-win for public health.

Butler's policy simply cannot be allowed to be implemented.

The unregulated market will only grow in power, continuing to sell dodgy, unlabelled and high-nicotine products to adults and children.

Vaping is here to stay whether we like it or not. We must learn how to regulate it sensibly.

As it stands, the only winners from Butler's plan will be tobacco companies and criminal gangs.

The losers will be the Australian people.
The question to our Federal Health
Minister Mark Butler remains: who do
you care about protecting?

While it may seem like everyone is escaping the Australian cold for a European summer, new data has revealed that's not entirely the case.

Yes, overseas travel has increased considerably by about 55 per cent in the past 12 months, according to recent Australian Bureau of Statistics data.

Some of the most popular destinations are Tokyo, Dubai, Auckland, Bali and Nadi, according to Finder.

However, with the rising costs of groceries, bills and fuel, many are being more mindful with their spending.

New NAB data has found while 85 per cent of Australians have holiday plans in the next 12 months, around two in three have either cancelled or postponed their travel recently.

Four in 10 Australians have scaled

Four in 10 Australians have scaled back their plans, with some travelling domestically rather than overseas.

It makes sense – Australian international air fares have blown out by more than 50 per cent compared to before the pandemic, while domestic travel has risen 10 per cent.

Research has found overseas travel was out of reach for more than one in three Australians.

Some reports have blamed customer demand and capacity for driving up prices, while others suggest the rise in fuel and airlines still recovering from the pandemic.

It's a shame in one sense, after being cooped up at home for years during a global pandemic, many yearn for easy escape to other countries.

Travelling abroad offers so much – expanding world views and learning about other cultures, reducing stress, creating memories, and feel revitalised upon your return.

But, in this post-pandemic world, those overseas trips are coming with much greater sacrifice.

On the other hand, we have gotten so good at exploring our backyard during lockdowns.

Luckily, living in the Fleurieu Peninsula and Adelaide Hills means so many beautiful spots are just a short drive away and there are many more within the country.

After all, the New York Times included Kangaroo Island in its annual top 10 places to visit in the world this year.

Another push to enforce lighting fees for Goolwa Oval Recreation Precinct users has flickered out, with Alexandrina councillors preferring to wait for the recently established advisory group to form its own recommendation in time.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, an advisory group was established at Alexandrina Council's June meeting to determine the management and cost recovery models for the precinct after elected members failed to reach a decision.

The precinct is currently being managed by council, with user groups having to book access for seasonal and ad-hoc requirements, and clubs negotiating use of the bar, canteen and shared space among themselves.

One of the major discussion points for the advisory group will be lighting and user group fees.

As part of stage 2 of the precinct project, new electricity meters are set to be installed by September, along with swipe cards for oval light usage, to identify users, so fees can be applied accordingly.

Council is also investigating ways to automatically turn lights off at a certain time.

The advisory group is expected to review lighting invoices and provide a recommendation to council for

consideration on fees to be paid by September, but North Ward councillor Sue Miller believed a decision should be made immediately to encourage responsible usage for every user.

She put forward a motion at last month's meeting to set facility lighting fees at \$19.41 for the main oval and \$5.55 for the new courts from July 1, which may be reviewed upon written request and subsequent resolution of council.

Additionally, the motion opposed council recovering lighting costs attributable up to and including June 30, 2023 to advisory committee members, and asked for future costs to be open to review by council resolution upon written recommendations for alternative methods of calculating and recovering fees.

"Those lights are on and working, and people are using them basically for free," Cr Miller said.

"If someone who isn't part of the group wants to use the oval, what are they paying for lights? Nothing.

"There's no encouragement to be responsible in light usage fees."

However, the motion was lost.

An earlier motion calling for the advisory group to provide its determination to administration on an operating model or fee structure, and cost recovery no later than July 31 for consideration by council no later

than August 17 also failed to gain support.

This was predominantly due to noted issues getting all members together at the same time, which had delayed the advisory group's first meeting.

The Argus understands the group met earlier this week.

"The resolution we made at the last meeting was silent on when we can expect something," Cr Miller said.

"Given the amount of time that has passed and this is continuing... I don't think it's unreasonable to ask for a date we can expect to see something coming from this advisory group.

"They don't seem to have a sense of urgency about resolving this, but we have a broader community interest we have to be mindful of.

"At some point we have to draw a line in the sand and say if you can't come together, we'll make a decision."

Council was aware of the importance of getting the group together and working out the fees, and aimed to come to a resolution as soon as possible.

"It's taken nearly three years so far and we've gotten nowhere," Alexandrina Mayor, Keith Parkes, said.

"I don't anticipate bringing an answer back until the group has had at least two meetings.

"We just need to sort it out."

Meadows road upgrade hits delays

An unexpected discovery has halted construction work on a popular Meadows road.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Nottage Road will be widened to meet the increasing demands placed on it by surrounding residential development.

Other project works to upgrade the road to a modern urban standard include associated kerbing, stormwater drainage to mitigate the occurrence of localised flooding, lighting, a new dedicated footpath connecting residents to the main street, and the connection of Mount Barker District Council's recycled water to the new development east of the road.

Council's contractor moved on site in mid-July to start the upgrades, but following a survey, a number of additional underground Telstra and NBN services have been found along the length of the road, potentially conflicting with the new stormwater main design.

This is now being revisited to prevent existing services from being damaged or compromised during construction, putting a halt on excavations until all underground services can be physically located.

Several construction materials have already been delivered to the site and are being stored along the road verge and behind the Meadows Hotel.

The original site compound location behind Pik A Pie is currently too waterlogged for material storage apart from plants and machinery.

Council has asked people to continue taking care on the roads, and drive to the temporary signed speed limit.

When works resume, operating hours are expected to be between 7am-5pm weekdays and possibly some Saturdays until the anticipated completion date in mid-December, subject to weather conditions.

Cars normally parked on the road between these times will need to be moved elsewhere.

The Mawson/Battunga/Nottage Roads intersection upgrade is excluded from the scope of works, and is currently in the Department for Infrastructure and Transport's hands for planning/design.

Community input sought on Clayton Bay speed limit extension

Safety concerns have prompted Alexandrina Council to seek the community's views on a potential speed limit extension at Clayton Bay.

The community is invited to have their say on a proposal to extend the 50km/h speed limit past homes along the entrance into the western side of Clayton Bay, which, if approved by the State Government, would affect 900 metres in the 80km/h section of Alexandrina Drive from Finniss-Clayton Road, and some 100 metres past the Clayton Street and Pearce Road intersection.

Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes said many residents believed the speed limit should be reduced.

"The community in Clayton Bay has raised multiple concerns about the safety of the 80km/h speed zone that runs through to the western side of Clayton Bay along Alexandrina Road," he said.

"Council cannot change speed limits without approval from the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT), so we are now consulting with the Clayton Bay community to see if they would like us to formally submit an application to the State Government to lower speeds to 50km/h.

"We should note the final decision rests with DIT, and even if there is overwhelming community support for the speed limit reduction, the department may not endorse the request."



"We are always striving to do things better for our clients," she said.



PARKING PEEVES...

Restrictions to impact Goolwa footy finals

By Giorgina McKay

It's going to be first come, first served for local footy fans heading to either of the major Great Southern Football League (GSFL) finals scheduled at Goolwa Oval, with precinct works restricting car parking around the grounds.

The Goolwa/Port Elliot Football Club is set to host the GSFLW Grand Final between Willunga and Yankalilla/ Encounter Bay on Sunday, followed by the GSFL Men's Semi-Finals in September at the Goolwa Oval Recreation Precinct, which is currently preparing for the construction of three new netball and tennis courts under the next stage of Alexandrina Council's master plan.

The highly anticipated finals are expected to draw a big crowd, but due to the works, car parking is significantly restricted on the southern boundary and around the area the new cricket practice nets are being constructed, limiting the number of vehicles that can enter the grounds.

Club President, Lauren Dart said this will have an impact on games.

"It's going to have an impact regardless of what the game is, (as) even on the weekend, we saw people

struggling with car parking," she said. "It depends on the crowd that comes

because it's three games for the girl's Grand Final and four for the (Men's) Semi-Finals, so it's going to be frustrating. (It also) depends on the weather.

"We do have reasonably good facilities in terms of people can walk, sit in the grandstand and still have a good view of the game, and if you support a team, then I don't think you're going to necessarily worry about whether you can sit in your car or not, but maybe some people that were umming and ahhing might.

A temporary overflow carpark north of the oval grounds, like the one used for the 2022 GSFL Men's Grand Final, will be available for patrons wanting to watch Sunday's games in an attempt to ease the impact of the oval parking situation. Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes advised

people to utilise the additional spaces.

"It is exciting the Great Southern Football League Women's Grand Final will be held at the Goolwa Oval Recreation Precinct, which is an opportunity to showcase our new multi-purpose facility, oval lighting, digital scoreboard, and improved playing pitch," he said.
"Council's advice for people attending

the Grand Final would be to park in the overflow carpark, behind the council (office) and library, which is accessed at the corner of Crocker Street and Farquhar Street.

"This carpark has 100 spaces, and is a short stroll past the wetland to the Goolwa Oval via the Goyder Street entry.

"We're focused on ensuring this exciting development contributes positively to the local sporting scene, and have maintained regular construction updates in advance with the user-groups of the Goolwa Oval to minimise the impact during construction.

But while it will give people a place to park, Dart said it will eliminate the 'country footy vibe'

'İt's country footy; people like to park around the outside of the oval, toot their

horns after a goal has been kicked, and especially in winter, sit in their cars and keep warm to watch the game.

"So, while there will absolutely be a car park available, it's possibly not where people want to park.

"Last year, when we had the Men's Grand Final, we had it one way, but we can't do that anymore.

"I don't even know how we're going to turn around because where the turnaround spot is, there's storage containers, so that's something we're going to have to think about.'

In saying that, Dart believed the club

could manage in the conditions.

She was excited to put on a spectacle and showcase women's footy.

"It will be a 'let's see what happens'," Dart said.

"It's just a pity our girls won't be there - that was a bit of an upsetting loss in the first week - but it's pretty exciting to see the Stingrays make it.

"The fact we got a new team in the Grand Final, and it's not just Willunga and McLaren Districts, is really exciting, and probably should bring quite a crowd considering it's essentially three clubs involved in that final.

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Simounds' 13 leads Rooster rampage at Goolwa Oval

Mount Compass had winners in T Vitkunas and Simons





Ongoing issues with Mount Barker's Summit Sport and Recreation Park Oval has raised concerns about its viability.

Issues flagged with Mount Barker Oval

Major concerns with infrastructure, sponsorship retention, and game day experiences has raised questions about Summit Sport and Recreation Park Oval's (SSRP) viability.

In a public statement last month, the Hills Football League (HFL) announced its decision to exclude the SSRP from the list of Grand Final venues, despite its 'outstanding' playing surface and base facilities, due to ongoing difficulties with its use on game days.

The league claimed one of the key reasons for the decision was that 'very little lasting infrastructure' remained due to the bump in/bump out nature of the AFL Gather Round fixture earlier this year, along with the lack of permanent or temporary fencing to completely close the grounds off for an event, and the need to restrict entry to two points maximum, so admission can be controlled for authorised and paid entry.

These conditions are a league requirement for any finals venue to be considered.

Other difficulties with the oval have included the inability to promote sponsors on the oval, impacting the sponsorship revenue and activity the HFL and clubs rely on for continued viability and future success, and alleged lack of financial contribution or relief that has made providing game day experiences like a barbecue, prepared meals, bar facilities, and space for patrons to participate untenable on a permanent basis for the Mount Barker Football Club.

The club has made significant capital contributions towards upgrading the kitchen and interior facilities in order to provide a full game day experience, and has been seeking sustainable ways to utilise the facility.

Without a solution, concerns have been raised about the oval's future viability.

"The league was initially excited to

have this development in the region, however, ongoing usage fees, licence arrangements, facility issues, liquor licensing issues, and the inability to use this facility for premier matches within the season and at finals time has rendered it an unviable venue choice," the HFL statement added.

"It would be a great shame that in one of the fastest growing areas in the state, there was a facility that could not be utilised to its full potential due to an unwillingness to hear the concerns of the Hills Football League and the football community generally.

"As it stands, we cannot foresee any way, without meaningful dialogue and engagement, that Summit Sports Park Oval will be a viable facility for use by any of the clubs in the Hills Football League for the foreseeable future."

Mount Barker Mayor David Leach was disappointed by the statement, and hoped to come to a resolution with the HEI

"The Summit Sport and Recreation Park is a significant community asset designed and built to AFL standards, which council believes continues to be the premier oval for football in regional South Australia," Mayor Leach said.

"Council budgeted \$500,000 in the 2022-23 financial year for infrastructure improvements at the SSRP, which included the new link road, permanent fencing, overflow car parking, interchange shelters, and new AFL standard goal posts.

"We were disappointed to read the media release issued by the Hills Football League, advising their decision to not play finals on the Summit Oval, which only a few months ago was the regional venue for a national AFL match during the Gather Round.

"We are seeking a meeting with the HFL to understand the barriers to utilising the SSRP for finals for this year and future years, and expect that a resolution can be achieved."
