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Fireworks to remain feature of Christmas event

A Strathalbyn business has stepped in to fund this year's fireworks at Christmas Where the Angas Flows.

As previously reported in *The Southern* Argus, the Christmas Where the Angas Flows committee put a call out for locals to step up to ensure the fireworks would continue this year.

Charlie and Sarah Fenton, of Holtan Building and Maintenance, put their hands up to commit to paying for the attraction after seeing the Facebook post from the event's organisers.

"We had discussed doing it last year and then time got away from us, but once we saw this post this year, we thought we probably need to look into it a little bit more," Mrs Fenton said.

Mr Fenton said the decision was an easy one to come to.

"I think as far as the fireworks are concerned, if you lose that, that is a major drawcard being potentially removed from the night, and then that has a knock-on effect to all the businesses, especially those shops that are open on the evening," he said.

"It is a loss of business, that is what it is, so coming from a business point of view, it is crazy to think if you lose that, how much is the knock-on effect?'

The Fentons are regular sponsors of the Strathalbyn Strikers, local basketball and the town's scout group, but this is the couple's first community event sponsorship.

"We have been in Strath for quite some time, so the kids, even when they were two to three, we have gone every year, and stayed for the fireworks," Mrs Fenton said.

"So many people come from out of town for it as well because of that.

"We were quite surprised that a lot of other businesses haven't stepped up... whether people aren't aware that it is needed, I am not sure."

While an exact figure for the fireworks was yet to be decided, Mr Fenton said the pair were committed to the funding.

'(Committee Chairman Graham Jenke) just needed to know that it was going to be taken care of, and I said 'At the end of the day, if we are kept in the loop and we discuss things, then we have no issues whatsoever," he said.

"Whether somebody else wants to



jump on board as well and make it more spectacular... otherwise we are more than happy to basically take care of it as far as that is concerned, and somebody else can take care of another part of the project, as obviously there are many little components that need to be helped out with."

Christmas Where the Angas Flows Committee Chairman Graham Jenke was relieved to have the fireworks funded for 2024.

"We didn't want to go without the fireworks or the children's entertainment, and we were a bit worried we might run short of money, so it is a great help and we really appreciate it," Mr Jenke said.

"It is one of the main big-ticket items for the night.

'We have set a budget for \$25,000 – that is a conservative budget (but) we usually come in around about that – so that is the cost for the whole lot.

"Everything else (we hope) will be funded

by donations, so we want people to continue to donate and not just think that because we have money for the fireworks we have plenty of money.

"There might be some other people say, 'Well if Charlie and Sarah have done that, then I am prepared to put in some money too."

The committee hoped to deliver the event with as many attractions as last year.

"We are always looking for volunteers too, so if there is anybody that has a couple of hours free to spend on that Friday," Mr Jenke said.

"There's marshalling to do for the pageant, as well as packing up stuff.

"We will never say no to anyone who wants to volunteer for half-an-hour or an hour."

Student safety measure prepped for Tyndale

A new koala crossing is scheduled to be installed later this year at East Terrace, near Chapel Street, after a local school advocated for the safety measure with the state transport department.

Koala crossings have white road markings, and red and white posts with two yellow alternating, flashing lights on top that indicate when it is in operation.

One is currently positioned out the front of Eastern Fleurieu School's Strathalbyn R-6 campus, but another will soon be installed outside Tyndale Christian School to help improve safety and access for students and families during peak drop-off and pickup periods.

'We're so pleased that a new koala crossing will be built on East Terrace," Acting Principal, Narelle Kluge, said.

"We've been advocating for it for some time and the council's support has been so helpful.

'We also acknowledge and thank the Department of Infrastructure and Transport for their support.

"It's a busy road during drop off and pick up, so anything that can be done to ensure pedestrian safety is good news."

Site investigations were undertaken from Tuesday to Friday last week in preparation for the major works later this

The project will also include the extension of the existing school zones, which will be continuous from Gollan Avenue to Rowe Street.

Advance notice will be provided before these works commence.

Algae levels lift at Lake Alexandrina


Local residents and tourists have been given the green light to return to Lake Alexandrina four months on from toxic blue green algae levels halting recreational activities.

Swimming, diving and fishing are among the activities safe to recommence at the lake, including at Milang and the Goolwa Channel, following the latest water tests.

Water samples now show blue green algae is no longer present following heavy winter rains, however, routine weekly testing of the lake will continue.

"Recent testing of water quality at Lake Alexandrina has shown there is no longer a presence of a blue green algae bloom," SA Health Principal Water Quality Adviser, Dr David Cunliffe, said.

"This is positive news as the lake is a popular venue for recreational activities and, as temperatures rise as we head toward spring, the number of people using the lake for recreational purposes will increase."



Development planned for former Strathalbyn SES station

The former Strathalbyn State Emergency Service (SES) site could finally see some action under proposed plans to transform the land into use for a shop/bulky goods outlet, service trade premises, consulting rooms and office.

IBS Planning and Projects' Dennis Chung lodged the application for the alterations and additions at the Murray Street site on behalf of landowner and Murray Strath Investment's George Mocatta, who wants to extend and reclad the existing buildings and structures, and provide additional carparking and landscaping to improve the site's overall appearance and make it a viable commercial investment.

The land was previously occupied by the SES as its depot for many years, but since the unit moved into its new station in 2022, the 4186m2 space has been desolate.

Under the plans, the canopy and shed would be turned into the bulky goods outlet/ shop, the existing garage into the service trade premises, the office into the consulting room/office, and the existing toilet block would remain as its current use.

The proposed service trade premises will be occupied by Kokovans, which specialises in retro fitting vintage caravans for residential and commercial use.

A total of 49 carparking spaces are

proposed on site, comprising of 14 existing ones at the front on Murray Street and 35 new ones throughout the site – two of those being disability spots.

A non-illuminated sign panel inscripted with 'Kokovans' on top and 'The Camper Revamper' underneath is planned to be installed at the front of the building.

The proposed operating hours for the shop/bulky goods outlet are Monday to Wednesday, and Fridays from 8am to 5.30pm, Thursdays 8am to 9pm and weekends 8.30am to 5pm, while for the service trade premises it is Monday to Friday 8am to 5.30pm, and Saturdays 8.30am to 12.30pm.

The proposed office/consulting room hours are Monday to Friday 8am to 6pm, and Saturdays 8.30am to 12.30pm.

"The proposed development recognises the need to respond to its built environment and positively contribute to the character of the locality, particularly with regards to the Historic Area Statement," the IBS Planning and Projects' planning report read.

"The proposal and the configuration of the proposed additions, extensions and redevelopment will ensure durability as they are fit-for-purpose, adaptable, and promote long-lasting usage of the built environment on the subject land as envisaged under the desired outcome and performance outcome.

"The overall design of the carparking layout, internal driveways and circulation area will enable heavy vehicles, including the 10.5m rigid vehicle waste truck, to circulate around the site, servicing the tenancies.

"The proposal will support and contribute to the overall desired outcomes of the zone in providing a cohesive, active, accessible and welcoming main street environment for residents and visitors to shop, work, meet and relax, and is therefore worthy of planning consent."

Public consultation on the proposal is now open for residents to have their say.

Goolwa's 'brothers in arms' reflect ahead of Vietnam Veterans' Day

Goolwa's Vietnam veterans have become a tight-knit clan, as they understand the experiences of one another.

"If you're with people who weren't there, they wouldn't understand - they can't comprehend it," Veteran, Steve Uppington, said.

"But when you're together, it helps because it's easy to talk about and (we) support each other a lot."

RSL Goolwa Sub-Branch is welcoming community members to a barbecue this Sunday at 2pm to remember the service of Vietnam veterans.

Vietnam Veterans' Day is annually recognised on August 18 on the anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan in 1966.

Almost 60,000 Australians served during the 10 years of involvement in the Vietnam War.

Many of Goolwa's returned servicemen

were conscripted and, while serving, had a jovial rivalry with the other soldiers.

But as Mr Uppington believed: "at the end of the day, you were beside each other and you were one".

"A lot of the conscripts were resentful because a lot of them were taken out of comfortable jobs and it cost them two years of their life," he said.

Michael Wilkins added that it "messed up a lot of lives", but they "didn't have a choice".

Australian soldiers mainly served in the Phuoc Tuy province and the centre of the taskforce was Nui Dat.

Soldiers helped in different ways such as building roads, bridges and housing and helping out on farms and in schools, teaching and planning with children many of whom were orphaned.

RSL Goolwa Sub-Branch member Barry Jones was caught up in the "horrifying" Battle of Coral-Balmoral, which is recognised as the longest battle.

In 1968, Australian and New Zealand forces established FSB Coral and North Vietnamese troops attacked.

'We were outnumbered to about 100 to one," Mr Jones said.

"We got there in the afternoon and didn't even have time to dig a hole in the ground and they attacked us that night."

After their experiences, Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and other mental health issues impacted some of the men as they transitioned back into Australia. They also wanted to avoid reliving their experiences.

"I got asked questions that I didn't want to answer, so I just closed down," Paul Roberts said.

"I didn't want to talk about it.

"There's the phrase 'brothers in arms' and

that's what we are."

When they do talk about serving, they often focus on the funny parts, such as drunkenly falling into a weapon pit.

While not on operational duty, soldiers were given a couple of beer tokens, but often saved them or swapped with others so they could drink a few.

"But that's how guys got around it – when they got home, they drank a lot, because that solved the problem," Mr Uppington said.

"When I got home, I re-joined my local footy club and I immediately had 30 other guys and that helped me, and looking back now, that was probably was one of the best things I ever did."

The transition was made worse by antiwar protestors who treated the returned servicemen "pretty badly".

Vietnam vets worked behind the scenes to gain recognition and the tides turned after a welcome home parade in 1987.

Proposed measures to combat SA knife crime

Stronger police powers and tighter sale restrictions are among the reform options being considered in a new discussion paper aimed at reducing knife crime in SA.

With recent incidents both interstate and locally highlighting the issue, the State Government is seeking public comment on the potential measures aimed at better protecting the community.

Options to strengthen South Australia's approach to knife crime include:

- Expanding police metal detector search powers on public transport.
- Increasing the age for purchasing knives from 16 to 18 years.
- Requiring safe storage of knives for sale and displaying prohibition notices.
- Expanding the definition of 'school' to include tertiary institutions and preschools.
- Introducing a licensing or registration scheme for certain categories of knife.

Incidents both locally and interstate highlight just why it's so important our knife crime laws are responsible, tough, and able to help authorities keep our community safe," Attorney-General, Kyam

"South Australia has often led the nation with addressing knife crime, including significant criminal offences for carrying knives and measures to keep them out of the hands of children, and now is an opportune time to look at how we can improve on our existing laws.

"This discussion paper canvasses several options to strengthen our laws, including preventative measures such as restricting access to knives and a licence for people wishing to own certain types of knives.

"We are also keen to explore the possibility of whether police powers should be expanded by allowing them to conduct metal detector searches on public transport.

"This government is committed to keeping South Australians safe, and I would urge all interested South Australians to have their say on this important issue."

Traffic drug bust uncovers stolen items

A traffic stop-turned-drug-bust led to police uncovering a large amount of stolen property at a Murray Bridge address last Monday.

As previously reported in *The Southern* Argus, just after 1am on August 5, police stopped a Ford sedan on Bridge Street after checks revealed the driver was unlicenced.

A subsequent search of the vehicle located a traffickable quantity of methamphetamine.

The driver, a 48-year-old Murray Bridge man, was arrested for trafficking a controlled drug, driving while suspended and resisting arrest, and appeared in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court last Monday.

As a result of the arrest, police subsequently searched a Murray Bridge East premises and located a large quantity of stolen property, including several stolen solar batteries, two trailers, firearms and other items.

The 48-year-old man had further charges of theft added, and two other local men aged 35 and 45 were arrested for theft.

They were bailed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on October 21.

A fourth Murray Bridge man, aged 69, was also arrested and charged with theft and firearms offences

He was refused police bail and appeared in court last Wednesday.

Shed fire wrecks havoc at Murray Bridge

Murray Bridge residents received an early wake-up call last Thursday morning when a shed caught alight at a local property.

At about 5.20am on August 8, Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) and Country Fire Service (CFS) crews were called to an Albert Terrace property following reports of a structure fire.

On arrival, 12 MFS firefighters with four appliances and the support of two CFS crews

found a large shed containing old car parts fully involved in fire.

It took firefighters 30 minutes to control and extinguish the fire.

The blaze managed to be contained to the building of origin, and in doing so, crew members were able to protect the surrounding properties.

Fire investigators were on scene to determine the cause and damage.

Man arrested over Murray **Bridge break-ins**

A local man was arrested on Sunday over a string of break-ins at Murray Bridge.

At about 1pm on Saturday, a resident confronted a man in the rear yard of their Burdekin Avenue home, but he left without incident.

At about 9.30pm that same day, an intruder was found in a rear room of a Swanport Road house, and after the victim confronted him, he left, but it was later discovered lanyards and photo ID had been stolen.

At about 8.40pm on Sunday, an unknown man was spotted climbing out of a window of a Galway Avenue home, where several items of clothing and a credit card had been stolen.

Police were called immediately and searched the area, and a short time later, located the suspect walking along Homburg Drive.

The 27-year-old Murray Bridge man was arrested and charged with two counts of aggravated serious criminal trespass, two counts of theft, and unlawfully being on premises.

He was refused police bail and appeared in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on Monday.

Mount Barker man records five times over legal limit

A Mount Barker man returned the highest blood alcohol reading in a major traffic operation aimed to catch motorists driving under the influence.

South Australia Police conducted Operation Stop Drink Drug Drive from Friday, July 16 to Sunday, July 28, using both static and mobile testing across metropolitan and rural roads to apprehend drink and drug drivers.

Of the 78 motorists caught driving under the influence, two from the Hills Fleurieu region returned a positive blood alcohol test, including a 35-year-old Mount Barker man who recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.253 at Nairne - five times over the legal limit and one of the highest readings from the operation.

Two immediate loss of licence notices and one failure to comply was recorded from

Police issued him with a 12-month immediate loss of licence and impounded his vehicle.

The previous Operation Stop Drink Drug Drive took place over the King's Birthday long weekend in June, during which 67 drivers were detected for alcohol or drug related offences.

Officer in Charge of the Traffic Services Branch Superintendent Darren Fielke appealed all motorists to assess their fitness to drive before a police officer does.

"Operation Stop Drink Drug drive is a key road safety operation that focuses operational police resources toward drink and drug driving detections around the state," he said.

"These results show the good news is most people are doing the right thing, but the bad news is 76 drivers made the wrong decision to get behind the wheel while intoxicated.

'If you're driving, you have a responsibility to do so safely and a duty of care for others.

"South Australia Police will continue to target road users who make the wrong choice to keep sending a message that if you're doing the wrong thing, you will be caught."

Stop Drink Drug Drive operations are one phase of 'Operation Safe Roads 2023-2026', with a mission to target 'Fatal Five' offences on South Australian roads.

SAPOL also announced plans on July 22 to expand drug testing capabilities to include cocaine hydrochloride from 2025.

Malt-iple wins for Fleurieu pair at Melbourne Distilled Spirit Awards

Adding to its large shelf of accolades, Goolwa's Fleurieu Distillery has been recognised at the recent Melbourne Royal Australian Distilled Spirit Awards for its array of top-end whisky, earning a Consistency Excellence Award and three gold medals.

Developed in close consultation with industry experts, including Australian Distillers Association Executive Committee members, the awards – which were established in 2015 – are judged by Australia's leading experts in distilled spirits and recognise excellence within the industry.

Held in Melbourne last weekend, the 2024 awards accrued more than 860 entries from 219 exhibitors nation-wide that were judged by a panel led by Shaun Byrne, who said, despite a small decline in entries, many of those who did apply were new ones.

"The last 12 months in the industry have certainly presented many challenges for distilleries – the cost-of-living crisis seemingly leading to consumers trading down or abstaining altogether," Mr Byrne said.

"64 exhibitors out of the 219 were firsttime entrants, which certainly shows a strong uptick of boutique distilleries joining the stalwarts of old.

"I like to think these awards help both old and new distillers stimulate the domestic consumption of locally produced spirits.

"Looking ahead to next year, here's hoping the industry picks up and Australian distillers continue to make delightful drops that are loved the world over."

No stranger to the awards is Fleurieu distillers Angela and Gareth Andrews.

The pair have been successful in previous years and last weekend was no different, earning gold in the Single Malt Whisky Unsmoked category for *Tapestry* and *Never A Dull Moment*, and in Blended Whisky for the *Country to Coast #5* collaboration – the only distillers to receive that medal

in the category.

The Andrews also received silver in Single Malt Whisky Unsmoked for *The Bird* – a collaboration with Bird in Hand winery.

Mr Andrews said it was "fabulous" news for the region, whisky and the industry.

"Tapestry is a good one for us – last year it won gold at the Royal Australian Spirits Awards, Best of Category and gold at Tasting Australia, and helped us get the Best Distiller Trophy at Tasting Australia, so it has been a good run for that particular blend of whisky," he said.

"Never A Dull Moment, once again, back to 2022 won gold and Best of Category at Tasting Australia and also last year won gold at Australian Distillers, so both of those whiskies have won gold at the Australian Distilled Spirit Awards two years in a row now.

"Every distillery has its own flavour profile.

"You might release different casks and styles, but I think our DNA – our coastal climate – just gives us a certain style that's quite smooth and mellow that the judges seem to appreciate."

To top off the awards, the local distillers were also presented with a Consistency Excellence Award for their *Country to Coast* #5 collaboration.

This award goes to products that have received a gold medal for three consecutive

"That's the fifth year in a row we've done a collaboration with Black Gate Distillery in New South Wales, so for five years now we've done this blend with those guys and for the last three years we've put it in for judging," Mr Andrews said.

"It's a peated single malt whisky, so it has that smoky attribute to it and the judges seem to like that as a style."

The recent accolades will join many others the local distillers have earned over the years


Mr Andrews believed the pair's attention to detail and thirst for improvement is what keeps them in high praise with judges

keeps them in high praise with judges.
"You look at what you're doing and you go 'how can you improve on this?"," he said.

"You make a change and record it, and analyse, so it's attention to detail and just a very methodical approach to constant improving.

"It's an attitude that Angela and I have in terms of you brew, mash, distill and every time you do it, you go 'how can we make a change to make it better the next time?"

The Andrews thanked the judges, stewards and event organisers who put in "tremendous" effort to run the awards.

"We had a really terrific and busy weekend." The sentiment was shared by Bremerton Wines which hosted a masterclass on museum wines and the art of winemaking.



Eating changes trialled at EFS Strathalbyn campus

A shake-up of Eastern Fleurieu School's (EFS) Strathalbyn small campus' eating schedule is being trialled from Monday in an attempt to better support students' regulation and decrease yard litter.

The new schedule which is implemented at many schools across Australia will see EFS students have a fruit snack around approximately 10am in class, then head to 'play' while the canteen is closed at 10.40am before returning to class for eating, including lunch orders, supervised by staff from 11.05am and 11.20am.

The canteen will then open from 1pm to 1.30pm.

EFS' Strathalbyn R-6 campus will trial this schedule after careful consideration for five weeks until the end of term and then review with students, staff and families, while the other small campuses are still in discussions about the initiative.

The school believed the adjustment will benefit students' overall learning experience and wellbeing by increasing their eating, while also supporting their regulation and decreased pollution across the grounds.

"At EFS we are always looking for ways to support our students and many schools across the state and Australia have trialled this model successfully," Director of Primary, Jo Garwood, said.

"Eating earlier in the day has been found to support all students with their regulation, and also eating after play reduces food waste and litter out in the yard.

"As students will be eating after play, there will not be the rush to eat and head out.

"Student will be able to have a snack if needed at our second break of the day."

Startling number in period poverty

New research has found that more than 65 per cent of South Australians who menstruate, including 66 cent from Mount Barker and 77 cent from Victor Harbor, have found it difficult to buy period products due to financial stress.

Surveying more than 153,000 people, The Bloody Big Survey – conducted by charity Share The Dignity – is the world's largest survey on experiences, attitudes and insights on menstruation.

Australia-wide, this number sits at 64 per cent of people who menstruate, with South Australia sitting as the sixth worst when compared to the other states and territories.

Nationally this number increased significantly for those who identified as a person with a disability at 78 per cent, Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islanders, 83 per cent, and gender-diverse individuals who menstruate, 83 per cent.

Share the Dignity Founder and Managing Director Rochelle Courtenay had deep concern over the findings.

'It breaks my heart to see such high rates of period poverty continuing here in Australia," she said.

"No one should have to go without these basic essentials, yet this issue is alarmingly prevalent."

The results came as the charity launched its bi-annual drive for period products during August.

For the month, donation boxes are available at participating businesses in the area, including Woolworths Strathalbyn.

The drive is asking for donations of unopened period products and incontinence aids, which will be distributed locally in the communities where they are donated.





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

Country Fire Service passed down through the generations

The Falzon family bring 72 years of combined experience to the Clayton Bay Country Fire Service (CFS) spanning three generations.

Two were recently recognised for their service, with the patriarch Vince Falzon, aged 75, receiving Contribution Award and his 20-year service medal, while his 20-year-old granddaughter Shaneika received the Up-and-Coming Firefighter Award.

Catching up with the family has a whole other take for the group, who share a passion for service and the community and learn from one another at trainings and call-outs.

Michael joined the organisation with his dad Vince and wife Tracy 24 years ago after

being approached by a door knocker.

Michael and Vince joined as firefighters, while Tracy is in the support crew.

Then after his two daughters spent their lives growing up around CFS and the underlining values of service and community, they also joined as soon as they could.

Shaneika started last November, and recently stepped up to the big role of the front passenger seat while conducting calls with Strathalbyn and Adelaide, and taking care of her crew of three.

"I learned how to do everything and I had great people supporting me," she said.

"It's great to have (my family's) knowledge behind me."

Even while the Falzons are on holidays, they are unable to escape fighting fires, including helping Tracy's side of the family in New South Wales in 2019 during Black Summer.

"They lost cows, a woolshed, shearing shed and cars – even the sheep were on fire," Tracy said.

"You couldn't see your hand in front of you it was that smoky.
"We had to get out of there because it was so

"We had to get out of there because it was so big and it had been going for weeks and weeks.

"There was no power or water, they had no resources left and they were asking people to go home."

They returned to South Australia which was also suffering through its worst bushfire in recent memory.

On another holiday, the Falzons ended up in a fire in Canberra.

In an official capacity, the family has joined many strike teams, and one of Michael's most memorable fires was on Kangaroo Island.

The brigade – which has a close alliance

with Milang – opened in 1986 and its Founding Captain was Henry Jones who is tributed with a special locker.

"We're really well-supported by the community," Michael said.

"Businesses in the region always support us with donations for raffles."

Tracy added that community members drop in donations "all the time".

The brigade is looking for new volunteers to support the growing town and as summer approaches.

"It can be a bit intimidating for new people to join, so they can just pop in and say 'hello' and see if they like it or not," Michael said.

"We've got a cool bunch of people – everyone's very laid back."

Tracy also encouraged others to join, saying "it's like a second family", and with a laugh: "well, you'll meet the Falzons."

Safe haven created for farm animals

Freedom Hill Sanctuary will soon welcome pigs William and Elizabeth who were the beloved mascots of the 7th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment.

The pigs are retiring to the Brinkley property and the community are invited to come and meet them during a special event next month to hear their send-off story and how they are settling into their new home.

The first and largest farm sanctuary in South Australia of more than 200 animals grew from small beginnings in 2011 by nurturing just one orphan lamb Lynn.

Kym and Richard Henley run the charity which relocated from the Adelaide Hills after a scare from the 2019 bushfires.

After growing up at Henley Beach, Ms Henley had no experience with farm animals, but was driven to contribute more than her vegan lifestyle.

"Freedom Hill Sanctuary is the leading

sanctuary in South Australia so I'm pretty happy with how we managed save so many lives," she said.

"There are so many animals out there that need specialty care where a lot of places don't offer that.

"I devote my life to the animals and it shows in their living."

The charity houses and nurtures a range of animals, including sheep, cows, donkeys, ex-race horses, and is funded by donations rather than making money off the animals.

Instead, for example, sheep wool is used as compost, and chicken eggs are given back

Animals that come to the sanctuary come from different backgrounds, but are often rescued from abuse or neglect.

Some recent examples include a sheep and twin lambs that were found severely fly-blown, leaving volunteers up until the early hours of the morning clipping the wool to get the maggots out.

A visit from a vet the following day

confirmed they could have died, as they found her udder had an untreated infection so milk was unavailable for her lambs, but since bottle-feeding, the three are now thriving.

A less successful outcome was when they rescued a small lamb that had fallen off the back of a truck who died the following day from internal injuries.

"You're trying your hardest to help them, but sometimes you just can't," Ms Henley said.

"Because there are so many deaths for different reasons, it's a process that's extremely hard emotionally when they don't

"But, the survival rate is so high here that it keeps you going."

Ms Henley is also motivated by the change in the animals' behaviour, finding their nurtured and happy lives means animals act differently to traditional farm animals, such as running to humans for a pat, and sheep that "baa" in response to their names being called.

Community-led biodiversity projects backed by funding

Completion of a restored, connected soil pits and workshops to fill knowledge Conservation Park. purchase of native tubestock, and student monitoring of local ecosystems are among the successful projects to receive funding from the Hills and Fleurieu Landscape Board's 2024 Grassroots Grants round.

The grants are distributed widely across the region to private landholders, community groups, schools, and not-forprofit organisations, with all recipients demonstrating real intent and capability in bringing positive outcomes and resilience to the local environment.

Funding for the grants is made available through the regional landscape levy.

This year, 28 projects shared in \$269,000 worth of grants, including:

 Kanmantoo Callington Landcare Group: complete a restored, connected and protected biodiverse corridor along the Bremer River from the SE freeway to Plantation Rd, Kanmantoo.

• Flaxley Landcare Group: use the plight of the yellow-tailed black cockatoo to mobilise landholders and community

members to undertake nature positive Mount Compass Area School: purchase actions on private land in a highly fragmented agricultural landscape.

• Friends of Nurragi Conservation Reserve: purchase 300 native tube stock plants to revegetate some bare sections of the Nurragi disused train line-turned-

 Yundi Nature Conservancy: increase the speed and scale of implementation, including sharing the cost of aggregated contracting for complex works for public good, nursery planting stock, fencing and restoration of swamp hydrology.

The board looked forward to sharing stores of the people, group and places behind the grants, as the projects come to life throughout the year.

Council transport workshop outlines potential steps forward

Improved regional transport funding and ticket pricing, rideshare extension, ondemand bus services and comprehensive service reviews were heavily discussed and debated at a recent joint public transport workshop between Alexandrina and neighbouring councils.

Alexandrina is seventh in the state for Local Government Association growth at a rate of 11.1 per cent, with that only set to increase according to the State Government, which currently forecasts the council area's population to reach more than 32,500 by 2031.

Factored in with council's unusually high older age demographic - which sits at 33 per cent for people aged 65 years or older as of 2022 - who need travel for predominantly medical reasons, and young people searching for employment and social opportunities, affordable and frequent transport options are imperative.

Following a motion passed in February, Alexandrina Council held a joint workshop with City of Victor Harbor to discuss public transport across the Fleurieu.

"The purpose of the workshop was to provide a comprehensive overview of the current public transport services and funding status in our region, examine the pros and cons of integrating with the metropolitan network, and evaluate the potential for expanding private ride-share operations on the Fleurieu Peninsula," Alexandrina Mayor, Keith Parkes, said.


"The opportunity to participate in the joint workshop on public transport was extended to councillors from the Yankalilla District Council.

"Presentations by subject matter experts covered a range of topics, including current public transport services, the upcoming state-wide transport service review by the South Australian Public Transport Authority (SAPTA), and the potential integration of rideshare and metro ticketing systems.

"The panel explored important issues such as transport funding, advocacy efforts, and future service planning."

Those who presented at the workshop included:

- Current Fleurieu bus services and funding status - Keolis Downer General Manager Brett Andruszkiewicz.
- Outcome of Fleurieu Transport Survey – Regional Development Adelaide Hills, Fleurieu and Kangaroo Island Director Stephen Shotton.
- Funding, contracts and metro ticketing South Australian Public Transport Authority (SAPTA) Regional Bus Services Contract Manager Joanne Antunez.
- Service planning and review SAPTA Services Planner Paul Silvestri.
- Rideshare and Uber boundary Department of Infrastructure and Transport Director of Planning and Technical Services Gemma Kernich.

A question-and-answer forum followed between representators, along with Member for Finniss David Basham and Mitchell Biermann on behalf of Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie.

One of the major outcomes from the workshop is that council will advocate for improved regional transport funding and ticket pricing rather than metro ticketing moving forward.

This aligns with the response it made to the Select Committee of the Legislative Council's Public and Active Transport in South Australia inquiry, where council highlighted the need for public transport to support wine tourism, particularly in Langhorne Creek, and noted the community's interest in 'trips for purpose' - routes to destinations driven by community interest rather than a standard timetable - a connector between Goolwa and Mount Barker, Park 'N' Ride facilities, and integration of metro and country ticketing services or for the metro ticketing boundary to be extended to the region.

Council also put forward its own proposals for an extension of Keoride into the Fleurieu or other 'roaming bus' service, extension of

the Uber boundary, and better information systems to find available transport options to the inquiry.

"Council made a submission to the Select Committee on Public and Active Transport, advocated for the support in the Regional Development Australia (RDA) Transport Survey, requested the State Government extend the Uber rideshare boundary to include the Alexandrina region, and provided valuable input to the Public Bus Review conducted by the Department for Infrastructure and Transport," Mayor Parkes said.

"At the workshop, councillors discussed that advocating for improved regional transport funding and ticket pricing may be more practical than pursuing metro ticketing.

"The Department for Infrastructure and Transport representative noted the metropolitan and regional boundary arrangements are being reviewed as part of the current review of the Passenger Transport Act.

"Currently for rideshare services, there is no restriction on them operating in regional locations, however, the rideshare operators have not applied to operate beyond the metropolitan boundary.'

During discussions, councillors were also presented with 'hypothetical options' on the next steps council could take to improve local transport.

Options consisted of potentially investigating on-demand transport service trials within and to the Fleurieu, implementing tourism packages with public transport services to attractions and special events, and developing an integrated fare policy that considers equity issues between metropolitan Adelaide bus and train services and regional bus services.

For the Adelaide Hills, potential options included the undertaking of a Park 'N' Ride demand study for the Adelaide Hills and Mount Barker corridor, and investigating ondemand transport service trials within and to the Adelaide Hills, including Langhorne Creek and Milang to Strathalbyn.

'The role of local government is to advocate on behalf of the community to the State Government for improvements," Mayor Parkes said.

"Councillors were presented with several hypothetical options for 'next steps' to explore based on the information provided by the experts.

"This included concepts such as the development of a Regional Advocacy Plan, Regional Public Transport Strategy and Regional Integrated Transport Plan to inform advocacy to the State Government.

"Informed and strategic advocacy will be crucial in advancing our transport infrastructure and meeting the needs of our community."

Works progress at Mount Barker's Heysen Boulevard

The long-awaited Heysen Boulevard Level Crossing is expected to open in

In August last year it was announced the Mount Barker District Council and the State Government would jointly fund a \$5 million upgrade to connect the boulevard in Mount Barker.

In an update, the Department for Infrastructure and Transport said over the past few months the work had progressed well and included:

- Detailed road and signalling design.
- Safety assurance activities for the new rail level crossing.

Off-site preparation of signalling

Member for Kavel Dan Cregan welcomed news of the update.

"The level crossing is expected to open in late 2024, weather permitting," he said.

"When open, it will provide a vital East-West connector road servicing the Mount Barker South growth zone.

"Although this is a council road, agreement was reached between the State Government and the Mount Barker District Council to come to a practical resolution

Last August, Mount Barker Mayor David Leach said council was excited to be able to enter the agreement which will see

• Installation of electrical infrastructure. the Minters Field and Bluestone estates connected by the crossing.

"Opening up this critical part of the connector road will further contribute to removing traffic congestion on other roads, connecting people to shopping precincts and other facilities, and creating a safe and enjoyable walking and cycling route," Mr Leach said.

Site works from August to late 2024 will include:

- Finishing the road with asphalting and kerbing.
- Installing new pedestrian pathways on both sides of the Heysen Boulevard.
- Setting up signalling and rail commissioning.
- Landscaping.

Expanding career pathways at Eastern Fleurieu School

Vocational learning and expanded career pathways will be a focus for many educational institutions for the upcoming National Skills Week, including at Eastern Fleurieu School 7-12.

While still in the planning stages, the week could include an industry immersion for the school's site-run automotive program, as well as beginning sign-ups for 2025 Vocational Education and Training (VET) courses offered on and offsite.

Recognising that each student brings unique skills and that different employers have varying requirements, EFS offers a range of pathways for their future careers to support students in VET programs.

The approach also allows students to set goals, gain work experience and ensure subjects are selected based on their interests and pathway destinations.

Some unique subjects offered at EFS include hospitality, automotive, allied health and agriculture.

The school also provides enriching experiences through excursions, such as Outdoor Education and programs such as the Royal Adelaide Show and local conservation projects, which complement skill development.

The school also provides South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) subjects that allow students to explore different journeys toward industry qualifications.

This approach aims to help students set goals, gain work experience, and select subjects aligned with their interests and future career aspirations.

In primary school, EFS focuses on project-

based learning, encouraging students to explore areas of personal interest.

As students advance to their SACE journey, the school offers expanded opportunities through skill training, VET courses, apprenticeships, and traineeships.

Recent curriculum updates include the adaptation of several certificate-level courses into Integrated Learning SACE subjects.

These courses, available in hospitality, automotive, and allied health, enable students to pursue VET studies or other tertiary education options while being assessed against SACE Performance Standards.

Currently, EFS supports 15 school-based apprentices and trainees, 34 students in VET courses, and seven students who travel from other schools to access the Certificate II in Automotive Servicing Technology.

The school has also seen five students complete Certificate III courses this year, with more expected to follow.

By supporting students in their individual journeys, EFS facilitates networking and communication between employers, employees, and supporting bodies, helping students transition successfully into the workforce.

This support fosters a sense of belonging within the education system in the short-term and contributes to a smooth transition to the workforce in the long-term.

Many students have returned to the school to share their success stories, including securing apprenticeships directly through school-based skill training and gaining employment with local businesses.

Poultry breeders flock to Strathalbyn

The Fleurieu Poultry Club's biannual poultry sale saw a "swarm" of people queuing up for the event at the Strathalbyn Polo Grounds on Sunday.

About 300 poultry were on sale at the August event.

"We had a lot of local sellers, but also we have had ones from as far as Naracoorte, Mannum, Murray Bridge, Jervois, Hope Forest, McLaren Vale, so fairly far and wide they came from," Club President, Trudy Hull, said.

"We almost had a Myer Sale influx as soon as we opened the doors at 8am this time."

A wide range of breeds were open for purchase for breeders or people just wanting some for the back yard.

"It was not necessarily about pure breds, although we did have some rare breeds as well as the general Anconas, Wyanadottes and Old English Game, a bit of everything really," Ms Hull said.

"Popular sellers were the good egg layers, the Australorps, the Anconas, and the Japanese Bantams were also a major hit.

Birds sold from \$5 through to \$150 depending on what the sellers valued each one.

For serious breeders such as Ms Hull, a keen eye was cast over those on offer.

"I look for them to be as close to the correct standard," Ms Hull said.



"We have an Australian poultry standard which every breed has to be bred to, so they have to meet as many attributes to that standard to be in the line for the next breeding season the following year.

"I only breed rare breeds to keep them

thriving and keep them going in Australia.

"I don't count them, as it is safer not to know."

Ms Hull finds poultry relaxing, and they take her away from the hustle and bustle of the world.

She recommended them as good pets for children.

"You do have to choose the right breed, as some breeds are a little too flighty, but in general they are really good for kids," she said







McLaren Districts dee-stroys Willunga in Grand Final

McLaren Districts ended Willunga's reign on Sunday, taking down the three-time consecutive champions in the Great Southern Football League Women's Grand Final to become season 2024 premiers.

Held at Yankalilla, the Demons and Sheagles faced off across all three grades, with McLaren having their work cut out for them in the Under 17 Girls and A Grade Women against sides with a three-peat under their belt and a minor premiership.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, McLaren and Willunga came up

against each other twice prior to the qualifier this season – the first in round five which saw McLaren grab a seven-point win on the Demons' home deck, while the second saw Willunga make a comeback with a 22-point victory at the Sheagles' ground.

McLaren Districts Coach Sally Fuller expected a physical game when she talked to *The Argus* prior to the Grand Final, and she was right.

Both teams were highly athletic and strong competitors, taking big marks and hits throughout the game, and putting on a spectacle that demonstrated just how much women's football on the Fleurieu has grown since it began.

Willunga had many opportunities on

goal, but failed to finish the job and get past McLaren's defences, allowing the Sheagles to dominate and take home the win, 46 points to 28.

For Fuller, as a past player and first time coach, Sunday's win was particularly special.

"It feels really good," she said.

"We're so excited and pumped that we could finally get across the line.

"We stuck to our game plan really well and everybody played their part.

"The transition has been hard and I think I've known all along the girls could do it

"It's just then trying to put in practice what I had in my head to see if we could get it to work out on the field, so going from knowing how it feels to then directing it was a big step, and the girls welcomed me with open arms, took on all my ideas and got it done."

Adding to the team's reward for effort, Layla Rogers won the Best on Ground medal.

Others named in McLaren's best players included Caitlin Ross, Lisa Whiteley, Abby Woodward, Taylah Scapens and Sheena Peters, while for Willunga, it was Caitlin Radbone, Cleo Guilfoyle, Jodie Hunt, Courtney Gutschmidt, Ada Anninos, and Jessica Kirk.

"Layla Rogers... she was outstanding to get us firing through the middle,"

Fuller noted. "Lisa Whiteley – she's a former AFLW player that we've luckily got in our ranks – she was outstanding off that halfback line.

"Taylah Scapens was brilliant through that middle, with Abby Woodward kicking all the goals."

McLaren also saw success in the Under 17s, with the girls also taking down the three-time champions in their competition. Meanwhile, Willunga won the inaugural

Under 14 Girls Grand Final.
Fuller will continue to coach next season and hoped to start McLaren's own "little dynasty".

She thanked Willunga for being so dominant the last few years and elevating women's football to the standard that it





Fairweather Cup attracts top tier archers

This year's Fairweather Cup has been taken out by a team made up three of Australia's top archers in Casey Isles, Simon Fairweather and Alec Potts.

In its fourth year, the event staged in Strathalbyn is held in recognition of Great Southern Archers founding members Rob and Helen Fairweather.

The team of What Handicap beat the team Bugger, made up of Nicky Fairweather, Sarah Haywood and Harry Neve – who, with Simon Fairweather, are bound for the World Championships in Canada next month.

The Fairweather Invitational, which preceded the Cup shoot-off, was designed by Jamie McPherson.

"It was to try to foster a team environment, to get people used to

shooting in a team instead of individually, because archery is quite often an individual sport, unless you are in a higher level (where) you will shoot in teams," McPherson said.

"It is also so that people aren't limited to their club – you can be a team from anywhere

"You could have one person from one club and another person from another club and another person from another club.

"Any gender and any age can come together and make a team of three."

Each team has one compound shooter, one Olympic recurve shooter, and one of either a barebow recurve or a longbow.

"Firstly they shoot what is a handicap event, which is 24 targets around the field, in the beautiful scrub land out here, with targets at various distances and various sized target faces," McPherson said.
"Distances can range from 5m.

"Distances can range from 5m to 60m, and so they all shoot together in a handicap event and we call that the Fairweather Invitational – with Gold, Silver and Bronze medals awarded.

"Then we have the second event, which is the Fairweather Cup, and with that we take the top seven teams with the off-the-bow score, not their handicap, plus a wildcard, and they compete in shoot offs.

"It is eight teams shooting in groups of two teams, with four targets, one arrow per team member per target, then they will go down to a four team shoot off, and then two lots of two team shoot offs, for Gold, Silver and Bronze."

What Handicap and Bugger went into the competition as the ones to watch out for, and failed to disappoint.


Peter's off-rifle score of 103.03 was enough for him to finish second in



BIDDING ANALYSIS

East 1H: Only 10 HCP, but only 6 Losers

South X: For Take Out, 22 HCP! West Pass: 3 HCP and flat. North 2C: Forced to bid with 4 HCP. East 2S: Second suit, but is that wise? It is a Reverse.

South 3C: Shows Club support.

Don't you hate it when you are dealt a lovely 22 HCP hand, and the opponents open the bidding, this time with an 11 pointer with 6 Losers on the Losing Trick count. All you can reasonably do is Double for Take Out and then bid your own suit, but even that depends on what partner does. You can't expect much if your RHO has an opening bid (not a Weak Two) and you have 22 HCP, that seems to account for 34 out of 40 points in the pack. No wonder West passed and North made a minimum response, so it looked like 3 Clubs was all you could hope for.

Even these part-scores contracts can have their interesting moments, and this one illustrated how important it is to remain calm and play the cards smoothly. West's opening lead was the ♥3.

South wins the Heart lead and cashes the two top trumps and leaves the last trump, (♣Q) alone. Next comes a re-think of how to get 9 tricks. There are 6 tricks in South's hand, plus the ♦Q in Dummy, plus the likelihood is that there will be at least one more trump (if the trumps break 3-2), but there the sealed road ends and the dirt tacks begin.

What happened at my table was that Declarer cashed two top Diamonds and then led the ♦5 towards the ♦Q 10, and West fidgeted: the body language from that little piece of indecision gave away the location of the .l and the ♦9. It also implied that East would be void, and if East did not trump, the West also had the ♣Q. All that information came from fidgeting. When West played the ♦7, it was a simple matter of winning with \$10 and taking out ♦J with the ♦Q. The ♣Q was always going to make a trick, so no loss there. 9 tricks are in the bag, a 10th is possible.

My point here is to anticipate what Declarer is going to do, and decide very quickly what you can do about it and act smoothly, hoping that Declarer will put up the ♦Q to be sure of making the
