Homelessness advocates call for funding to address crisis...

A group of homelessness advocates – including some based in Goolwa – are calling for funding from all levels of government to address the crisis in the Fleurieu Peninsula, with a particular focus for social housing.

The calls came during a community forum last week, held as part of Homelessness Week 2025, which brought together service providers, council representatives

and community members to discuss local challenges and possible solutions.

One of the guest speakers was Goolwa's Whalers Manager Mary McInnes who believed that government is unaware of the growing need in the region.

"At the meeting it was loud and clear: we need to lobby government and need to change their thinking of down here," Ms McInnes told *The Southern Argus*.

"They want to build those 2500 houses (at Goolwa North) – why don't you build 500 for social housing?"

"There are still a lot of people that are afraid of witchcraft and believe it is demonic, which it is totally not," Ms Roberts said.

"A lot of women come to the craft because of the self-healing aspect, they look for spiritual growth, the self-healing, the enlightenment and the journey that that brings.

"And some people like the Pagan goddess side, and they like the ritualistic side of it.

"It is really about understanding that we are part of something that is much bigger than we are, working with the different energies of nature and the universe, and working on yourself to heal yourself, so that you can attract the positive things into your

To Ms Roberts witchcraft is all about energy, including plant energy, and the energy of jewellery.

"I personally work with plant spirits, so I believe that plants have their own spirit and they communicate with us," she said.

"Energy exists in everything, and energy is a form of consciousness, and when we do things like psychometry where you pick up information from someone's jewellery, the energy, even though it is different to our energy, it holds memories and feelings and emotions, and that is what we are tapping into when we read someone's jewellery."

Ms Roberts said she uses her skills to cast good spells.

"Spell work is recognising that different crystals and different herbs all have different energies, and using those energies to work with your energy and what you want to create in the world," Ms Roberts said.

"Don't forget, you attract what you put out, so if you put negative vibes and horrible things out, you are going to attract that back to you."

And has for Harry Potter?

"I love Harry Potter, it is awesome, and I wish I had gone to Hogwarts," Ms Roberts

"Obviously it is a very fantasised version of what happens, but the attracting things into your life - some of life is very magical, and you need to be in that world, and in that realm, and believe for it to happen."

Rhonda Roberts has always known she is a witch.

Ms Roberts' family's links with witchcraft go back generations to her great-great-grand mother who was a folk healer, herbalist and a white witch on the Isle of Man, an island steeped in folklore and superstition.

Ms Roberts spoke to *The Southern Argus* wanting to dispel some of myths around witches, including those that go back to the times when they were burnt at the stake.

"Magic was believed to be an evil thing, so if you were found to be performing any magic that would be enough to get you burnt at the stake, along with the worship of other gods – as in Christianity they say that you can only worship one god," Ms Roberts said.

"A lot of witches and pagans are Celtic, and they all had their own gods that were around a long time before Christianity came in, so worshipping other gods was another thing that could get you burnt at the stake.

"It was anything to do with witchcraft, or if they thought that you knew things that you couldn't possibly know, so if you were very intuitive, you would be accused of being

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Illegal dumping warning

Alexandrina Council has issued a reminder about the effects of illegal dumping around Strathalbyn.

A spokesperson said while the number of reports of illegal dumping has remained stable, the cost of the clean up is still a concern to council.

"Dumping rubbish can have a severe impact on native plants," the spokesperson said.

"It can physically smother vegetation by blocking sunlight, air and water from reaching the soil, which prevents germination and growth.

"Soil contamination from dumped materials can also harm or kill native

"In addition, the illegal dumping of garden waste along roadsides can lead to new weed infestations.

"(That) garden waste can often spread weed seeds in the surrounding area, as well as have an adverse effect on the immediate location it is dumped.

"Garden plants may escape into nearby roadsides or bushland, where they outcompete native species and disrupt natural ecosystems."

Fees and charges at the Fleurieu Regional Waste Authority depot in Strathalbyn are set by the authority and supported by its member councils, including Alexandrina Council.

Domestic fees at the site include \$19 for a car boot with general waste, or \$10 for green waste.

Other fees include, for a ute/trailer up to and including 6 x 4 (water level) \$50 for general waste or \$35 for green waste - right up to that for a caged trailer greater than 8 x 5 which is \$266 for general waste, and \$145 for green waste.

Meanwhile disposal fees for mattresses

Meanwhile disposal fees for mattresses and other furniture includes:

- Mattress or ensemble base/single \$26
- Mattress or ensemble base/double/ queen/king - \$39
- Lounge chairs/single \$19
- Lounge chairs and sofas/two or three seaters \$26.

However Items that can be recycled for free include:

- Scrap metal
- Batteries
- Empty gas bottles 9kg and under
- Cardboard
- Fluoro tubes and globes
- Mobile phones
- X-ray films (removed from envelopes)
 F-waste unbroken TVs, computer
- E-waste unbroken TVs, computer monitors/printers.

The council spokesperson said a

number of things are factored in with setting prices.

"Processing waste material involves several steps, such as sorting, contamination removal and transport," the spokesperson said.

"Garden organic waste requires additional processing, including shredding, mulching, composting, and quality control.

"These activities require labour, machinery, fuel and ongoing facility maintenance, each contributing to the overall cost of processing waste.

"To help cover these operational costs, disposal fees are set accordingly.

"The Fleurieu Regional Waste Authority Board reviews these fees and charges each year, aiming to ensure they remain fair and reasonable while still covering the actual costs of providing the service."

The spokesperson said the local fees were generally comparable to other jurisdictions for domestic and small load waste.

"Commercial and green waste disposal costs are slightly higher than those of other operators," she said.

"However, as a regional provider our operational costs are influenced by the need to transport waste offsite and the requirements to pay the non-metropolitan waste levy, which contributes to the difference in pricing."

The council also commented on illegal firewood collection.

"Illegal firewood is often collected from roadsides, in which significant public safety concerns may arise with persons on the roadside for a length of time without appropriate signage or safety measures in place, putting themselves and other road users at risk," the spokesperson said.

"Dead timber, both standing and fallen, provides cover and foraging places for native fauna and provides protection for young seedlings and small plants adapted to the sheltered conditions provided by fallen timber.

"Retention of dead timber (and fallen leaves, bark and twigs) is also encouraged so that soil disturbance and the creation of open areas suitable for weed invasion is minimised.

"Therefore this material should not be collected for firewood."

Firewood should be sourced from reputable businesses who source firewood sustainably.

Community grants up for grabs

Community groups and organisations are being encouraged to apply for small grants through the Rotary Club of Strathalbyn.

The Rotary club is seeking interest from those requiring funding of up to \$1000, such as for computers or record-keeping.

Applications will be assessed on merit, but generally applicants need to have connections within their community and might not have fundraising revenue.

Community groups must be located within the Strathalbyn and districts region, which is the old council district of Milang, Ashbourne, Clayton Bay and Woodchester.

One community organisation that has already benefited from the funding is Gilbert's Motor Museum, which allowed their volunteers to undergo first aid training.

Another was the Strathalbyn Cemetery which installed signage on significant people. "It's mainly for not-for-profits or smaller

groups that are struggling with their administration costs," Rotarian, Craig Maidment, said.

"It gets harder and harder to raise money in the current climate and this is just a boost to help particularly small groups."

The call out for grant applications comes as the local Rotary group prepares for the upcoming Rotary Treasure Market, as part of the Strathalbyn Antiques and Vintage Fair on August 16 and 17.

President John Agnew said the Rotary Treasure Market helps fundraise for these community initiatives.

"Some of the money from that could easily end up in this bucket which gets dished out to community groups," he said.

"You never know where (a grant) will be a major benefit for a range of people."

"So many bands over the last weekend and this week have said 'we will be back next year'.


"The musical director for Burnside Youth said he first came here in 2004 and he thinks they have been here every year since.


"They really just enjoy the opportunity to play and hear other bands play."

Adelaide Hills farmer Darren Koopman came away with the top-selling ram from Lucernbrae's sale last week, describing his newest addition as a "good all-rounder".

Mr Koopman is his family's sixth generation of farmers, managing the mixedfarm merino sheep, cross-bred sheep and murray grey cattle at Bottlesford at Tungkillo, and is a regular customer of the annual Callington sale.

"We normally buy our merino rams from here – we've found over the years that they've performed really, really well for us," he said.

"They're a really nice wool on them and good-framed sheep.

'(This ram) is a good all-rounder – the wool quality is good but there's also plenty of body about him as well."

At the Callington sale, 26 of the 43 rams were sold, with an average micron of 18.7 and body weight of 92kg.

"It was a good, positive vibe with the crowd and we appreciate the people who have come and bought something, Lucernbrae farmer, Judy Paech, said.

'We're happy that some have gone out to homes and if anyone needs a ram down the track, we'd love to sell you one.

"We do have a lot of regular customers and we thank them sincerely for their support because we know that they're doing it as tough as everyone else."

The sale takes about 12 months of preparation, including collecting the rams' body and fleece weight and collating data to be measured against the Australian Sheep Breeding Values.

As well as thanking everyone for their attendance and support, including Nutrien Ag Solutions, Keith Paech thanked his wife, Judy.

"The most important person to thank is Judy – the CEO of this outfit," he said.

"She's done a wonderful job in collecting all the data and so forth, and I thank her very much."

Held during Homelessness Week, the night which was organised by Country Life Compassion saw keen quizzers from 15 tables test their memories with the aim to be crowned quiz masters.

About \$2800 was raised which will assist the organisation to deliver food and assistance to a growing cohort of locals.

Spokesperson Paquita Wise said while homelessness appears to be more

of an issue down at Goolwa and Victor Harbor, the Strathalbyn-based service was also seeing more people coming in for assistance.

"We are still seeing people coming in and needing help, and while it is not necessarily homelessness it is for more support because of the cost of groceries, petrol and just basic living costs," Ms Wise

"Some people are fortunate to have their own home, but the rates have just come in, and (even myself) I have noticed my rates are up a bit.

"We are not seeing a huge amount of influx, but there is an increase for those wanting help."

Country Life Compasion helps with cut-price food through its Pantry Club scheme, while also giving out emergency relief hampers, and every now and then is able to help with utility bills, medical appointment costs, and petrol.

"It is more the needs, not the wants that we will help with," Ms Wise said.

"We have some very good generous people in the community and different groups such as the Lions and others that support us.

"The quiz night is part of our fundraising, it all helps, (including the night's) silent auction, and games."



Local children were rejoicing last week when the Strathalbyn Kindergym reopened its doors to families after a brief closure.

The Kindergym – which has been running for 41 years – announced its closure last term affecting a large number of families, before a group of parents quickly decided to bring their children's favourite play space back.

This included local mum-of-two Bec Brittain who is now the Facilitator – and who has fond memories of attending Strathalbyn Kindergym as a child – alongside a newly-formed committee of parents.

"We thought: 'we've got to do something here, what else are these children going to do?'," Ms Brittain said.

"We had to get it up and running as fast as possible... it's so important for the children. Strath is only getting bigger."

After just a four-week hiatus – two over holidays and two during the term – the Kindergym held its grand reopening, with 68 children attending across four sessions over two days.

"There were lots of happy, little faces," Ms Brittain said.

"(The feedback was) 'this was fantastic' and 'thank you so much for keeping this open."

Kindergym was founded in South Australia in 1980, and is the largest early childhood movement program in the country, and is second in popularity to swimming.

For ages five years and younger, the program allows children to learn new skills, develop fundamental movement and take risks in a safe and fun environment.

Held at the Strathalbyn Show Hall, children are introduced to songs and dancing and develop their confidence, social skills and motor skills through playing on a range of equipment, while parents find a community of social connections.

"We've made close friends from Kindergym – our children are similar ages – and now we can catch up outside," Ms Brittain said.

"There are a wide variety of things for children to do – developmentally, socially and physically – the opportunities Kindergym provides are outstanding and the activities are difficult to find.

"Kindergym is the perfect place for young children to develop gross motor skills, co-ordination and confidence all through play.

"It's a whole-child approach – a positive impact on their development, whole life, and whole being."

The sessions run Tuesday and Wednesday from 9.30am to 10.30am, then 10.30am to 11.30am, with families able to arrive without a booking. New equipment has also been added to the space and membership includes a child's Kindergym t-shirt.

Call for caution

RAA is reminding road users and public transport patrons to be vigilant around railways and level crossings this National Rail Safety Week which is being held this week.

Between 2019 and 2023 there were 60 casualty crashes at road level crossings that resulted in an injury or fatality in South Australia with road users urged to be extra careful when approaching rail lines whether they're driving, riding or walking.

Of these, rear end collisions were the most common cause of casualty crashes at rail crossings with 26 incidents recorded.

All four fatal collisions recorded in the past five years were between a railway vehicle and another vehicle, such as a car, motorcycle or bicycle.

RAA Senior Manager Road Safety Charles Mountain said National Rail Safety Week was a timely reminder to be patient when trains and trams are passing through level crossings – whether in the city or in the country.

"Even a collision with a low-speed train or tram can result in serious injury or death, so it's crucial for all road users to remain attentive around railways," Mr Mountain said.

"Pedestrians are reminded to look up from their phone and be aware of their surroundings, remembering to stand behind the line at platforms and crossings when trains and trams are passing.

'Remember to cross only when the lights stop flashing, and never attempt to race across the tracks when a train or tram is approaching.

"Motorists must also stop when the lights start flashing and can only move off when the barriers are fully raised and the lights have stopped flashing."

Mr Mountain said to remain behind the stop line and not queue across the tracks while waiting in traffic and never drive under closing boom gates or around them.

"Ensure that your vehicle including anything that you're towing - is clear of and doesn't queue over yellow hatched areas near level crossings," he said.

"Regional rail lines have fewer trains than metropolitan areas – but it is imperative not to be complacent around regional level crossings and to do what the signs say, even if you cross regularly.

Spike in crashes prompts warning

Serious motorbike crashes have increased by 58 per cent in recent years in the state, despite a drop in the number of motorbike licence holders in South

Fatal and serious motorbike crashes have increased by the alarming 58 per cent in the past five years (2019-2023) compared with the five years prior - according to SA crash data analysed by RAA.

There have been 966 serious crashes involving motorcycles in the past five years (2019-2023) compared to 611 across the previous five years.

This is despite the number of full motorbike (R) licence holders declining by 3 per cent compared to 10 years ago while full drivers (C) licences have increased by 15.7 per cent over the same time.

Crash data also shows an alarming one in 10 motorcyclists involved in fatal crashes did not hold a valid motorcycle licence.

An overwhelming majority of motorcyclist casualty crashes involved male riders (93 per cent) with male motorcyclists aged 16-28 the most at risk accounting for 34 per cent of casualty crashes involving motorcyclists.

Of all age groups and genders – 20-yearold males were found to be involved in the most motorcycle crashes on SA roads.

RAA Senior Manager Road Safety Charles Mountain urged riders to take extra care on our roads especially this time of year, as the hours of daylight are less over the winter months and the roads are frequently wet and slippery.

"So far this year five motorcyclists have lost their lives and 104 have sustained serious injuries on SA roads which has a devastating impact on road safety outcomes and the community," Mr Mountain said.

'46 per cent of motorcyclist casualty crashes involved a run-off-road crash most commonly rolling over or hitting a fixed object.

Be seen and prioritise your visibility especially during those dark winter mornings and nights - and keep your headlights on at all times.

"Also be aware of drivers' blind spots and make sure you're actively positioning yourself where others can see you on the road – and make sure you're maintaining a safe following distance especially in adverse weather conditions."

The RAA is reminding riders to ride to the conditions, at the appropriate speed and ensure they're wearing the appropriate safety wear to best prevent injury – including a helmet, jacket, pants, gloves and boots.

Commitment to Strathalbyn

Message to all members of the Strathalbyn Community: the Alexandrina Residents and Ratepayers Action Group (ARRAG) is not against the Strathalbyn Recreation Precinct (Lot 10) development.

We are very concerned about, and against it becoming a black hole into which ratepayers will be required to pour money, just like other recent Council projects such as the Goolwa Wharf project, the Goolwa Oval project and the Strathalbyn Town Hall project etc.

Pothole problems

Poor condition of roads in South Australia is contributing to rising cost of living pressures for South Australian residents.

There are numerous potholes on the roads which are causing safety driving issues on our roads, and unnecessary damage to cars and tyres.

Residents are having to drive like dodgem cars to try to avoid pot holes.

Just recently, Sunday, July 27, at approx. 11:30am we were driving along Wellington Road, Mount Barker, heading towards Wistow, just after the roundabout, which has had road upgrades, but yet the road is in terrible condition and has multiple massive potholes for kilometres towards Wistow.

Our car hit a pothole which was unavoidable as it is a single lane, double line road, and we would have hit oncoming traffic if we were to swerve to avoid it.

This caused a flat tyre and damage to our alloy wheel rim.

Fortunately, a worse accident did

We pulled up at Wistow and called AAMI Roadside Assist, and they sent out a person to assist with changing our tyre to a run flat spare which can only now travel a maximum of 80km per hour.

We had to drive at a slow speed with hazard lights on from Wistow all the way back to Goolwa where we reside.

We have since taken our car and damaged tyre into Tyre Power Victor Harbor on July 28, 2025 where it will take at a minimum 10 days for the alloy rim and tyre to be fixed.

This is all additional unexpected costs to the current rising cost of living pressures, and also a great inconvenience as we only have one car and are driving it around with a temporary run flat tyre that cannot be driven very far.

Whilst taking our car into Victor Harbor, we also noticed numerous large potholes on the Victor Harbor/Goolwa Road .

We have reported our incident to both Mount Barker District Council and the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) to report and ask if we are entitled to compensation for our damaged tyre and alloy wheel.

We have since received a response from Mount Barker District Council that this stretch of road is the responsibility of the DIT and not their responsibility (duck shoving).

We also sent the Premier Peter Malinauskas an email to highlight the poor state of SA roads and his office sent back: "As these matters fall within the portfolio responsibility of the Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis, we have taken the liberty of forwarding your correspondence to the Minister's Office for consideration", and we are awaiting a response if any (not holding our breath!).

With the rising costs of car registration in the state, residents should expect safe roads to drive on – it is not good enough.

If South Australia wants to encourage residents to travel in this state and support tourism something needs to be done about the poor road conditions and the unnecessary damage that it is causing to cars

Wellington Road, Mount Barker, to Wistow has numerous potholes along that stretch of road, and also the Goolwa to Victor Harbor Road.

Imagine tourists driving these roads with caravans and the potential accidents that could occur.

Homelessness on the Fleurieu

I know it might seem like we harp on about the impact cost of living has on the most vulnerable in our community, but if you were one of those members the impact is more than just words.

Last week a group of homelessness advocates met to discuss the very real need for social housing in our region.

New figures show an estimated 150 people are living in their cars in Goolwa and Victor Harbor.

Some of those people living in cars are women who have dogs, and are often rejected for rentals because they have pets.

A pet can be the one thing that gets you through a day.

Another concerning figure provided by Junction was that the number of people they support has grown from 517 people in the 2023-24 year, to 560 people in the 2024-25 year.

Broken down the figures show 396 of those were experiencing homelessness and 164 were seeking domestic violence services.

People are presenting with complex needs, including poor mental health, chronic illness and disability – all compounded by the struggle to find housing.

Advocates believe if government can build 2500 homes at Goolwa North, they should be able to build 500 for social housing.

Mary McInnes, who is the manager of Whalers Emporium which offers help including food, clothing and free laundry and shower facilities, had a couple of ideas for other ways to address the crisis.

One included charging ratepayers a small community levy so local councils could build one social house a per.

She welcomed the easing of restrictions on granny flats, while also believing more one-person units need to be built in the region.

There is no doubt about it these issues won't go away overnight, but can't be ignored.

Many families, couples and visitors have been filling Strath Corner Bakery every Sunday during their Strathalbyn stop on a SteamRanger train service.

The passengers enjoy a special of Devonshire tea with scones and cream when they fill the bakery.

"It's really a tradic chunky and filling."

The bakery – on

Owner Catherine McDonald finds the Highlander train service – which showcases the region from Mount Barker to Strathalbyn and back – valuable for local businesses.

"They're making Strathalbyn a destination — it's potentially bringing in 200 people that we wouldn't ordinarily see," she said.

The bakery now and staff members

"The train exposes our businesses to new clientele and our goal is to always create a repeat customer after giving them a good experience."

Strathalbyn photographer John Evans even captured the joy of their coffee with the train in the background (pictured) and gifted it to the bakery.

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



Advocates call for funding

A group of homelessness advocates including some based in Goolwa - are calling for funding from all levels of government to address the crisis in the Fleurieu Peninsula, with a particular focus for social housing.

The calls came during a community forum last week, held as part of Homelessness Week 2025, which brought together service providers, council representatives and community members to discuss local challenges and possible solutions.

One of the guest speakers Mary McInnes, who is the Manager at Goolwa's Whalers, believed that government services stop "at the bottom of Willunga Hill", as the government is unaware of the growing need in the more southern region.

"At the meeting it was loud and clear: we

need to lobby government and need to change their thinking of down here," Ms McInnes

"They want to build those 2500 houses (at Goolwa North) – why don't you build 500 for social housing?'

An estimated 150 people are living in their cars in Goolwa and Victor Harbor, many of whom are seeking safe places to park overnight, and many who visit Whalers regularly for perishable food items.

Some people living in their cars are women who have dogs and are often rejected for rentals because they have pets.

Whalers is a non-government funded, not-for-profit charity that offers a leg up for $those \ experiencing \ homelessness \ or \ domestic$ violence in a range of ways, such as a free clothes wrack or donated food.

This year, volunteers have given 1071 food parcels to those in need.

Ms McInnes – who has been an involved in social housing for about 30 years – manages community housing in Goolwa North, and also helped with Whalers' recent installation of a free shower and washing machine at their

office and op shop.

Some of her suggestions for addressing the crisis include charging ratepayers a small community levy so council can build one social house per year – an idea she initially proposed in the 1990s.

Another is seeking State Government funding for housing on council-owned land that could be managed by a local group.

While easing restrictions on building granny flats was welcomed by Ms McInnes, she also believes more one-bedroom units should be built in the region to diversify the residential spaces available.

The recent forum came during the recent return of homelessness roundtable, where key players in the space regularly meet to collaborate ideas.

"The homelessness forum is quite good," Ms McInnes said.

"Having these forums, and now that we've got the roundtable back up and running - I think there's going to be some productivity from that along the lines of services."

Another guest speakers at the recent forum was a representative from Junction – which

has a Goolwa-based office that services the Fleurieu and Kangaroo Island - who shared stories of hidden homelessness and financial distress, with a reminder that disadvantage is often invisible in small communities.

This was made up of 396 experiencing homelessness and 164 seeking domestic violence services.

"We are seeing more people with complex needs including those dealing with poor mental health, chronic illness and disability," Junction Regional Manager, Tammy Elvin,

"People whose circumstances and vulnerability is further compounded by the fact they are struggling to find stable

All speakers also highlighted the importance of ongoing community engagement and for locals to consider donating, volunteering and spreading awareness of the issue.

"My husband started coaching the Under 12s when our youngest son Daniel was playing, so 20-odd years ago, and they needed a scorer so I took on that," she said.


"So, I scored for the Under 12s, Under 14s, Under 16s, and then while he was playing Under 16s he started playing for A Grade.
