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# Book Week at the book store

This week's Book Week marks 80 years of the Children's Book Council of Australia, and at Baile Books in Strathalbyn owner Caitlin Fry is reflecting on the importance of books and reading for children.

Ms Fry said booksellers, school librarians, and public libraries all play their part in selecting and recommending books for young readers.

"A CBCA sticker on a book and the Premier's Reading Challenge lists are pretty reliable in finding good stories, but so is chatting to those of us in the know," Ms Fry said.

"Book Week is a reminder there's a lot of great Australian children's stories being published all the time, so while British boarding schools and American summer camps can offer some wonderful settings, our young readers can regularly find familiar settings in stories closer to home.

"Here in SA we also have programs such as Words Grow Minds to help promote literacy in the very young children and the Premier's Reading Challenge.

"It is really important that reading is a family activity – having books around the house, modelling reading and sharing stories with your children is wonderful.

"Reading with your kids isn't just for the little ones either, reading the same books your tweens and teens are into, or getting hold of free audiobooks from the library can make it a lot easier to catch up on some reading – and you would be surprised how much you can read in the car during a week of school runs and ferrying children to sport."

Ms Fry said many people would be surprised that young readers today enjoy reading as much as other generations.

"There are so many more books available for young readers today than there has ever been," she said.

"I sometimes suspect in the past, when students were disengaged from reading, they simply hadn't found the book for them (yet) or the right format.

"Kids today have the benefit of all the amazing new kids' books coming out each year, but also the immense collection of children's books from generations of readers – so the average kid today has the choice of their school library, their parents' childhood books and even their grandparents' old Biggles, Blyton and so much more.

"They are also reading a lot of non-fiction, with some very keen young folk getting stuck into reading about science and history in particular thanks to series like Horrible Histories, which was a series of books before it was the TV show."

Ms Fry and her partner bought Baile Books back in 2008, and becoming a family over the years has changed how they understand younger readers.

"One of the best things about being a mum is being able to share the books I loved as a child with my daughter," she said.

"At the moment the Wings of Fire, Wolf

Girl, the Series of Unfortunate Events and anything by David Walliams are on strong rotation in our house, but with an all-important 11th birthday coming soon, I will start leaving various Tamora Pierce and other series around the house."

Ms Fry still sees people coming into the store to search for classics like Enid Blyton.

"The classic 'Blyton, Biggles and Billabong' stories are still going very strong – they are being reprinted all the time, very much due to demand, so families aren't restricted to valuable limited edition originals, but can easily find the paperback versions with more modern artwork that sit alongside modern stories too," Ms Fry said.

"It's very common to have young readers come and visit me after a school holiday with their grandparents, where they discover classic children's stories and then want to read more of the same author or series."

Like many Ms Fry has memories of Book Week as a child – going as Roald Dahl's Matilda, and pairing up with a friend who went as Miss Trunchbull.


"I want Anh Do to receive some kind of national award for creating characters with very achievable costumes – he even has two separate series where the main character wears a plain green hoodie," she said.

"There's nothing wrong with retrofitting a costume to a book – it's a perfect opportunity to find your next new favourite author."

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# \$7 million secured for Langhorne Creek trail

Langhorne Creek winery owners are raising their glasses in celebration after \$7 million of Federal Government funding was secured for the long-awaited trail linking cellar doors, making the region a "destination" for visitors.

The funding – as part of the Federal Government's \$400 million regional Precincts and Partnerships Program (rPPP) – was the biggest grant Alexandrina Council received, and was thanks to their advocacy alongside Langhorne Creek industry groups.

The grant will fully fund the construction of the 2.8km Langhorne Creek Discovery Trail – expected to be completed by the end of 2027 – which would offer walkers and cyclists an access route through the region.

The council-endorsed concept design for the trail would start from the intersection of Kent Town Road and Langhorne Creek Road near Bremerton Wines, pass through the township including Memorial Park and Frank Potts Reserve, and finish at Bleasdale Winery.

Alexandrina Council will manage the construction, while Langhorne Creek industry groups will focus on tourism marketing and promotion.

The project also includes close work with Ngarrindjeri Aboriginal Corporation to incorporate First Nations stories.

Bremerton Wines' Rebecca Willson believed the trail would make the region a destination

for tourists.

"People will come down because there is a trail and they can enjoy themselves along the way... they can park at one end and navigate through the town," she said.

"It'll be great for the community and for businesses... which will promote and draw people in."

She added that it will offer a safe option for walkers and riders, as well as offering regional and Ngarrindjeri information to visitors.

The funding announcement comes after years of advocacy by the Langhorne Creek community, driven by a partnership including Langhorne Creek Grape and Wine Association, Langhorne Creek Hub, the Ngarrindjeri Aboriginal Corporation, and Alexandrina Council.

Ms Willson described the funding announcement as a "really great reward" for all the work that has gone into the years of planning by the group of bodies.

Similarly, Langhorne Creek Grape and Wine Executive Officer Lian Jaensch also credited the outcome as thanks to having a strong partnership with Alexandrina Council.

Mayor Keith Parkes was pleased council came on board with Langhorne Creek community's ambitions five years ago by helping to advocate and apply for funding.

He described the project as a "beautiful, interesting, safe, and accessible" way for visitors to explore the region.

"It will enhance the visitor experience and encourage tourism in an environmentallysensitive way," Mayor Parkes said.

The region produces up to 45,000 tonnes of grapes each year, but only about 15 per cent of these reach the market with a Langhorne Creek label.

Mayor Parkes said the new attraction will help boost Langhorne Creek's profile, attract new visitors and increase spending.

"In turn, we believe this will have a flow-on effect of creating opportunities for businesses to attract investment, including investment in tourism accommodation," he said.

"Langhorne Creek has so much to offer and this tourism trail will help strengthen the connection between our winemaking community and the traditional Ngarrindjeri nation"

Meanwhile, Ms Jaensch described the funding as a "game changer" for the community, and felt lucky that Langhorne Creek was the recipient.

"With both the wine industry and wider agriculture industry facing economic and climate challenges, this tourism trail will be a massive morale boost for the whole community," she said.

Bleasdale will mark one end of the trail, and the proposal is for 700m of its boundary will be connected to the 2.8km path, which General Manager Leigh Warren described as an "amazing benefit", despite having to sacrifice

some of the roadside vines.

The trail will also offer a safe passage from the Frank Potts camping reserve to the cellar door, with Mr Warren believing a "safe, accessible footpath" along the 80km/h road was "well overdue".

The current proposal also includes construction of a bituminised 2.85km, 1.8m wide shared use pathway, an installation of new bridge culvert, and installation of pedestrian refuges.

It would also include wayfinding signage, landscaping, plantings and irrigation.

Mr Warren was pleased that the Discovery Trail would be an all-inclusive path to cater for people with disabilities.

He congratulated all involved in supporting an increase of visitation to the region – being just an hour's drive from the city – which will shine a light on Australia's "best kept" wine region secret.

"We have seen so much investment going into other wine regions for a long period now and this investment will now enhance the look and feel of our region and provide Langhorne Creek a chance to shine like our premium wines have done so for many decades," Mr Warren said.

Mr Warren also imagines more investment into accommodation options in the region, opening up opportunities for day and weekend trips.

# Construction under way at Goolwa Ambulance Station

Construction is under way on a \$3.5 million upgrade of the Goolwa Ambulance Station

The works will deliver a modern, fitfor-purpose base and bring the town's volunteer crews and career paramedics together under one roof for the first time.

The station's upgrade is expected to be completed by the end of the year, shortly after the scheduled deployment of 12 new career paramedics in November.

The new facility will feature an extended vehicle garage, accommodating up to three ambulances at any time – two more than the existing garage.

Other features include a new carport with charging facilities, brought in to boost the region's delivery of emergency services in busier periods.

Internal works will include an upgraded kitchen, crew room, shower and toilet facilities, as well as dedicated utility areas and new flooring.

Four new personal wellbeing and restorative break rooms will also be established, while other new or upgraded features include a new workstation, study area, locker facilities, and a training room where volunteer ambos can develop their skills.

The new career paramedics are expected to be a welcome boost for the region, following Goolwa's existing volunteer crews responded to 2114 incidents last year.

The upgrade is the ambulance station's most significant upgrade in its 34-year

history, tripling its garage space while adding or expanding a wide range of resources and amenities.

Goolwa's volunteer crews and new career paramedics will be temporarily based at the recently built Victor Harbor Ambulance Station until the new station is finished.

SA Ambulance Service Chief Executive Officer Rob Elliott said the Goolwa volunteers had delivered an outstanding level of care to the Fleurieu and surrounds for decades.

"This investment not only ensures their continued vital role in the community but also provides them with the very best facilities to do their job," Mr Elliott said.

"At the same time, it strengthens our emergency response through the introduction of career paramedics to Goolwa.

"Dual crewing is about building resilience, improving response times, and making sure we are best placed to meet the needs of the community – now and into the future."

A new Emergency Operations Centre – including a new SA Ambulance Service headquarters and new Adelaide station – is on track to commence operations by the end of 2025.

"Summit Aquatic and Leisure was delivered within budget and ahead of schedule - a construction success story," Mr Leach said.

"It is the largest infrastructure project Council has delivered to date, and supports our vision to become the most liveable region in South Australia by 2044."

General Manager Belgravia Leisure (SA/ NT/WA) Catherine Foreman said more than 1250 people had already bought aquatic or

The facility includes a 25m lap pool, warm water therapy pool, leisure and play pools, learn-to-swim area, gym, café, community rooms, and the accessible Changing Places

President of the Mountain Swimming Club Aaron Newman said the facility was a "game changer" for the club.

"Regional short course (25m) competitions have not been run recently in SA due to the lack of suitable facilities," Mr Newman said.

"As the most modern 25m competition capable all-year-round 10 lane pool outside of the Metro area, the Summit Aquatic and Leisure Centre will provide Swimming SA, Mountain Swim Club and other local clubs

with a modern, high quality centre for

Anecdotal comments received on Saturday included a family with a severely disabled son sharing that they had not been able to swim as a family for the past five years, but the Changing Places facility near the warm water therapy pool has now made that possible.

The Summer Aquatic and Leisure was funded through a tri-government partnership including \$15 million from the Federal Government and \$7.3 million from the State



Mount Barker's State Emergency Service (SES) crew recently got quacking when they responded to a call to rescue a duck that had fallen into a chimney.



A report on a potential partial road closure of West Creek Road, Langhorne Creek, will be presented at Alexandrina Council's October meeting.

The potential road closure was suggested by the McAnaney family – owners of the adjacent property – to avoid council spending unnecessary funds on upgrading the road and to avoid the children getting "constantly sprayed" by rocks from passing cars.

In a deputation to council on Monday night, Grant McAnaney said the road saves an insignificant amount of time during the commute to Murray Bridge.

If it were to close, council will consider selling the portion to the family.

If the road remains open, resheeting will need to be considered through a future year's renewal program, with costings to resheet the two different segments exceeding

"If council (keeps) this – you're taking on too much, you're not keeping up with growth conditions, there's too many potholes on too many roads," he said.

"I'd rather see less roads in better condition than a whole heap of roads in poor condition.

"If council's only option is to sell it to us to make some money back from it, I'll have to rip the road up, put crop on it, and try to make some money out of it."

A report and analysis of traffic volumes found both West Creek Road and nearby McAnaney Road traffic volumes were regularly and equally used by the local community.

Recent community consultation found that out of 16 responses, 12 were objecting to the

road closure and sale.

This included a letter of objection by Member for Hammond Adrian Pederick on behalf of numerous residents that raised concerns in his office.

Another deputation was given by Ack Verco, who has been using the road all his life, and found the road the quickest route for ambulance services – like when he needed one – and is commonly used by those travelling to the South East.

He finds alternative roads are dangerous, with kangaroos living in scrub.

Councillor Michael Scott was concerned about the costs of upgrading West Creek Road, believing the road should be closed to save money as it is "almost a duplicate" of a neighbouring road.

He suggested alternative nearby corners could be upgraded to ensure make it easier for trucks to turn.

# Wine, trails and tourism

Last week came the exciting news that Langhorne Creek's long-awaited Discovery Trail has secured Federal Government funds to help make it a reality – just over \$7 million in fact.

The funding came as part of the Federal Government's \$400 million regional Precincts and Partnerships Program (rPPP) and was the largest grant every received by the Alexandrina Council.

The grant will fully fund the construction of the 2.8km trail, and is expected to be completed by the end of 2027 – offering walkers and cyclists extra access routes through the region.

The trail will begin at the intersection of Kent Town Road and Langhorne Creek Road near Bremerton Wines, pass through the township and finish at Bleasdale Winery.

The council will manage the construction while Langhorne Creek industry groups will take care of tourism marketing and promotion, with the project also including close work with Ngarrindjeri Aboriginal Corporation to incorporate First Nations stories.

Locals are delighted by the news, coming after years of advocacy by the Langhorne Creek community.

Mayor Keith Parkes was similarly delighted to be able to announce the news, with the project a five-year one for council, saying it is "beautiful, interesting, safe, and accessible".

Mr Parkes is looking forward to the project's flow-on effects of creating opportunities for businesses to attract investment, including investment in tourism accommodation.

The Langhorne Creek region produces up to 45,000 tonnes of grapes each year, and it is wonderful its spot in the nation's production of them has been recognised with this \$7 million grant

It shows what can be done when community, industry groups, and council work together to push a consistent case for federal funding.

Well done. We will raise a glass for this achievement.

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# A future for olives at Peninsula Providore

Back in 2016 Mel Hollick took a punt to establish an olive oil business in the Fleurieu.

Now, 10 years later, she farms about 10,000 olive trees at Currency Creek and another 7000 at Nangkita.

The family business sees them process all their olives on site and turn them into awardwinning extra virgin olive oil.

The trees are harvested with a shaker, and within 24 hours the olives are cold pressed to make "freshly squeezed olive juice".

To be able to label their produce as extra virgin olive oil it has to meet strict guidelines.

"We send each batch of extra virgin olive oil off to get chemically tested, to check that the peroxide values and the free fatty acids are within parameters that are extra virgin olive oil, and as part of that testing we also have to get them sensorily tested, so tasted to check that there are no faults," Ms Hollick said.

"Then we get issued with a certification that each of those parcels are in fact that oil and then we are able to put a label on our bottles.

"Olives, while they are drought hardy and they will survive without water, they are not very productive without water, so they do need efficient and effective watering.

"But like everything they like balance, so they do not want wet feet.

"There are disease pressures (such as) Anthracnose and cercospera and peacock spot which can make the trees lose their leaves, and so without leaves then photosynthesis doesn't happen and we don't have healthy or productive trees."

The aim of the farm is to grow the product as regeneratively as possible, however they are some way off being able to be spray free.

"With our regenerative pruning program we are actually mulching any of the pruning back into the groves and they we compost our olive mill waste with leaves and hay and then spread that out across the grove as well, to try and improve our soil health as naturally as possible," Ms Hollick said.

Like many Fleurieu farms Peninsula Providore was affected by the dry times across the region.

"We were watering 24/7 and it still wasn't enough water, so the yields were a bit lower than we would have liked," Ms Hollick said.

"And because of that the intensity of the polyphenols was quite high, so probably a little bit more bitter than other years.

"There was a bit of a shortage (across Australia) last year, but we were lucky that one of the groves that we have been looking after I actually manually walked out and watered

it every morning and night, so we actually managed to get production off that for the first time in about eight years.

"We are hoping now, that across the two groves, one has a good year when the other is a bit quieter, and vice versa, so that we have more balanced production moving forward.

"Prices are good at the moment, but they had to get good because up until the last 12 months we were still at 1980s prices, and if you consider the increases in all the inputs like wages, fuel and power it was needed, otherwise the whole industry would have been unsustainable."

Over the years Peninsula Providore has won a swag of awards for its olive oil, but that doesn't mean that the consumer loved the award-winning olive oil over others.

"To win a gold medal everything has to be in balance, but it is quite a different flavour profile to what consumers might be used to in the supermarkets," Ms Hollick said.

"So, I actually made three different styles of extra virgin olive oil, bearing in mind that if you are baking with an olive oil you probably don't necessarily want a really robust oil, you want something milder and probably more fruit driven."

For Ms Hollick this means producing their Nangkita-style to cover that demographic, then Peninsula Providore as the farm's core product, and then the gold winning Reserved Peninsula Providore.

A wine background has helped her when it comes to tasting the difference between the oils she produces.

"You do need to train your palate I guess, and try things often," Ms Hollick said.

"With all that sort of thing, if you are not keeping your palate trained and up to date and regularly testing, it becomes a bit harder to pick out the nuances of different flavours and aromas."

Enduring the drought and being at the mercy of the weather has meant the farm has also expanded into agritourism.

"We open our farm shop one weekend a month, where people can come in and purchase and taste and have regional produce platters," Ms Hollick said.

"We are also partaking in the Fleurieu Food Festival this month, which is an opportunity to showcase food production and food producers and hospitality and tourism venues in the region.

"I think tourism and agritourism and being able to showcase your product is a great opportunity to get more buy in and educate consumers on what actually goes into their food production."

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

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



# **New local Aboriginal engagement model**

Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network [BHFLHN] staff and the community have launched a report that examines a program changing how healthcare is provided to Aboriginal families in the region.

Holding Space for the Modern Matriarchy is an evaluation of the effectiveness of BHFLHN's Keeping Families Healthy Together program.

Launched 15 years ago, the initiative redefined the role the health service plays in child protection by placing Aboriginal leadership at the centre of care by using traditional forms of kinship to strengthen

The report found that since the model was introduced, there has been a transformation in how health services engage with Aboriginal families in the region.

The study also found relationships between healthcare providers and families

have grown and trust has been affirmed, helping not only keep families together, but allowing them to strengthen as a unit.

"Keeping Families Healthy Together has been a game changer for our region, redefining the relationship between health care providers and local Aboriginal families," Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network Aboriginal Health Team Leader Jenaya Schmid said.

"This report shows the value of the change in our approach and the impact on how we provide culturally appropriate care.

"Our team has made a big effort to embrace this model and the report's findings are a testament to their passion and commitment."

The report was developed through the intensive efforts of community researchers who worked with staff and families to collate data and insight.
