Investigations launched into potential Lot 10 sale...

SECOND CHANCE

A major proposal by the Strathalbyn Harness Racing Club (SHRC) is being reconsidered after Alexandrina Council overturned its decision on whether to investigate the potential sale of Lot 10, Langhorne Creek Road.

As previously reported in *The Southern* Argus, the Strathalbyn Harness Racing Club (SHRC) expressed an interest earlier this year in purchasing all or a portion of the Langhorne Creek Road land from council to facilitate the construction of a new harness racing facility, inclusive of other community groups, based on a separately designed concept plan, giving council an end-of-March deadline to make

But consideration of the club's proposal

was rejected by elected members, who instead moved forward with the preparation of a detailed business case for future recreational land uses at Lot 10 and an infrastructure investigation report.

The SHRC was also removed from the Steering Group Committee per its own request.

Since then, council received communication from SHRC representatives Max and Debbie Beasley in August, expressing the group's wish to continue negotiations on the club's proposal, with supporting documents provided from interested parties, including the Strathalbyn Agricultural Society, Volleyball South Australia, and Squash and Racquetball SA.

The club also received support from Regional Development Australia.

He wanted to know how long I thought I would be staying in the flat and the Riverland. "I will be here forever, unless my dream

job comes up," was my answer. Jess and I had moved to the Riverland from the Victorian border community of Murrayville for me to take up a job with The Taylor Group of Newspapers, in particular The Murray Pioneer, and southern Mallee paper The Border Times.

It was a move made with much excitement, my second journalism job after some years spent working in childcare and kindergartens.

Starting as a final year cadet in Renmark, over the next 17 years I was covering everything that working in country journalism allows.

I wrote about CWA news, Lions, Rotary accomplishments, but also murders (the finding of the body of two-year old Khandalyce Pearce in a suitcase near Karoonda) and murderers - like Chopper Read who was in Pinnaroo to talk at a local pub.

There were shows and field days at Pinnaroo and Karoonda, a short-lived but successful Spudfest in Pinnaroo, footy and school reunions, and stand out sports people.

Then there was COVID, when our border community got hammered - jobs under threat, young sports lovers unable to play in finals, people unable to cross the border for fuel, workers only able to drive to work and back without socialising down the main street.

I could go on.

I love everything about country journalism. I love creating a mini book each week, starting from a blank canvas and filling it with stories and photos, facts and figures.

I was pretty happy in my job co-ordinating The Border Times and contributing to The Murray Pioneer, but a niggling wish to try the next step – maybe as an editor of a paper somewhere in size between Border Times and Murray Pioneer – lingered.

Imagine my excitement when I saw The Southern Argus at Strathalbyn was looking for an editor.

It would be a chance to dive in to a thriving rural community, meet new people, make new connections, chase new stories - happy, sad, good and bad.

The lure of being able to work within the community I covered was immense.

A few stealthy trips to Strathalbyn and its beautiful surrounds led to an application.

Long story short... last week I finished with the Taylor Group (tears were shed), and started with the talented and super friendly Argus team.

Even in a week it has been more than I wished for.

I now look forward to creating new stories, filling more newspapers, and getting to know my new community.

Regional newspapers play a vital role in creating a sense of inclusion and pride in communities, and The Argus is a leading light in local journalism.

I am proud to be part of the family.

As for my old landlord John... he popped around again just before I left.

"You got your dream job, didn't you?," he said.

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Bumper weekend for Strathalbyn

Strathalbyn's world-famous Antiques Fair and Treasure Market have again helped swell the town's population, with final numbers almost on a par to last year.

Fair Convenor Linda McLoughlin said the entire town embraced this year's twoday weekend festival, with about 1200 people flocking through the Town Hall and Carruthers Hall over both days.

"It is a whole-of-town event, which means that not only are the halls open to patrons, but we encourage all the shops and traders to do their bit to be a part of the fair, to do something special to promote themselves, and to help make the experience enjoyable for everyone who visits over the weekend," Mrs McLoughlin said.

'(On Saturday) there were over 400 in the Town Hall.

"We didn't have Carruthers Hall's figures (then), but the Motor Museum had a couple of hundred people through as well, so that was very busy.

"It (can also) double or triple the normal weekend income for local business (such as) accommodation, cafes, eateries and speciality shops.

Mrs McLoughlin said the fair, as one of the most loved country fairs in the state, was attracting global visitors.

"People come from all over the place... They are local, they come from all around the state, they come from interstate as well, and we did notice a couple of New Zealand visitors on Saturday too," she said.

"Collectors are passionate, and there is a collector for absolutely everything you can think of.

"They could be after something very specific or they might come with an open mind and just look for something that is going to take their fancy on the day, and decide they have to take it home."

Mrs McLoughlin said feedback from dealers had been positive.

"I have only had a quick conversation with about half of them, but they have all been very pleased – they love the fair, it is set up well and it is a nice intimate fair," she said.

She thanked all who had taken part in the fair, including the dealers, the volunteers helping look after the halls, as well as those running the nearby treasure market.

Meanwhile, the bumper turn out of stallholders at this year's Strathalbyn Treasure Market has organisers buoyed for a return in 2024.

Strathalbyn Rotary's Market Convenor Craig Maidment said the event attracted 66 stall holders, up from 40 last year.

"It has been a massive increase, and of course that brings along more people" Mr Maidment said.

"The gate takings were 30 per cent ahead of last year as well, so we are very happy with the result financially.

"The weather was perfect, and that also makes the day.

"Stallholders have come from as far away as Mildura, Port Pirie, and Auburn in the Clare Valley."

Mr Maidment said feedback from the weekend event had been overwhelmingly

'The stallholders were very happy because of the numbers," he said.

"A lot of people coming back through the gate were saying how much bigger the event

"COVID knocked it around, and it has had to build up from that zero base really.

"I now have 101 people on my database that are stallholders that I can contact for next year.

"I am not going to say that we are going to have 101, but it could well be that we get even more."

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CLC quiz night raises thousands

The return of a popular quiz night brought in more than \$4000 to help a local not-for-profit support people in need and complete renovations on their

About 160 people attended Country Life Compassion's (CLC) quiz night at the Strathalbyn Show Hall on Saturday, July 22, which was run by quiz masters 'Mixed Bag'.

A sausage sizzle and soup was available for patrons to buy, along with 30 silent auction items such as bottles of wine and accommodation in Hahndorf, while music was provided by Kick the Dog band.

It was the first time the quiz night has been held since 2019 when CLC switched to walkathons due to COVID.

Pantry Club Co-ordinator Paquita Wise said the event was a great success.

"Everybody said it was a great night, so we're really pleased," she said.

"I've got a lot of good feedback that it was really well-run.

"This is the first quiz night we've had since 2019 because we swapped to walkathons because of the COVID situation, so it was good to have that back and running... and community coming together and supporting."

About \$4400 was raised from the night to support the charity's work, particularly hampers delivered to Eastern Fleurieu's high school to support struggling families and students.

The funds will also go towards purchasing another fridge and renovating CLC's new Callington Road facility.

"We're about to purchase another

fridge – which we fundraised for last year - we just waited for us to shift," she said.

"We've made do for that time, but then we do have to do some renovations here to fit out the area for Pantry (Club).

"The pantry will become an office, then there's a room at the end we'll fit out for Pantry (Club), which will make it a lot easier, bigger and keep it all together, rather than fridges and freezers in different rooms."

Into the future, CLC will switch biyearly between the quiz night and walkathon.

"(The walkathon) is a really healthy option... and then we're not asking for donations every year from companies and businesses, so that makes it a little bit easier," Ms Wise said.

"At this stage, next year will be walkathon and that can raise just as much money as the quiz night.'

Ms Wise thanked Prue Pethick for her work behind the scenes, CLC Chairperson Brad McMaster, volunteers who helped set up the night, and the Show Hall for providing tables and chairs.

At Monday night's meeting, Deputy Mayor Bill Coomans asked council to rethink its decision, and allow serious discussions to continue with SHRC over the coming months.

"It is understood the SHRC is not sitting on its hands and is exploring a number of other sites in the state - none of which are in Strathalbyn, nor Alexandrina," he said.

'The SHRC proposal would contribute significant finances to the Lot 10 proposal that, following further investigation, may provide the opportunity to establish a presence at Lot 10 earlier, leverage their funding with additional external funding to reduce the costs to council to make the project more achievable, and enhance opportunities for the sporting community and beyond."

North Ward councillor Craig Maidment believed the best way forward was to partner with the Harness Racing Club.

"This site has been vacant for 40 years in council's hands and nothing's happened,"

"If you read the history, this all started with an approach by the Harness Club to purchase some recreation grounds.

There's room for negotiation on where the track goes; it doesn't have to sit in the middle.

"They are up for coming to discussions with council on the location of their facility or the possibility of the parts of the land they can purchase."

After much discussion, elected members voted in favour of investigating the sale or lease of Lot 10, with a further report to be included as part of the existing business case to be created and presented to council inclusive of the following:

•A final concept plan clearly illustrating the area in question for SHRC.

 Confirmation of other stakeholders in SHRC's proposal.

 A valuation of the proposed area to be sold or leased.

• A definition and estimate of the cost of installing certain infrastructure as requested by the SHRC for future community recreation and sporting use.

 Details of the ability to ensure SHRC delivers what's promised (i.e A Memorandum of Understanding).

 Details on the ability to ensure the return of land to council ownership or responsibility under certain circumstances.

 A business case that includes detailing feasibility of the SHRC to deliver and operate their project.

 Details on how the club's concept plan can integrate with the Steering Group's master Committee Master Plan.

 Consideration to establish a joint committee comprised of representatives of SHRC and other precinct users to ensure good management of all facilities.

The additional costs for these investigations are unknown.

The Steering Group will be informed of council's revised decision.


Cr Michael Scott noted the project's structure would be important.

On one hand we've got major development happening around Strathalbyn... and there will be a lot of extra residents that will be looking for recreation facilities," he said.

"It needs to be a combined, wellstructured thing, so we can attract money into it and it's seen as a community thing... and from what I can also make out is if you continue with talking about the (SHRC) only, that divide between the group and (SHRC) will widen."

A separate motion was also proposed by North Ward councillor Sue Miller earlier in the night to write to several organisations, advising them of the status of Lot 10, including that tenders for preparation of a business case for future recreation land use purposes will soon be awarded and an infrastructure report is being prepared, and council's budget allocation for the project.

However, the motion was lost after failing to gain support from councillors Maidment, Coomans, Scott, Margaret Gardner, and Peter Oliver.







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

Preparations for this year's Christmas festivities in Goolwa are already under way, but will be missing a parade of floats.

Goolwa Rotary Club member Jim Davis said the focus this year would be on the Carols on the Green, which will be held on December 17 from 6 to 9pm.

"Previously the Rotary Club has looked after the Carols on the Green and the entertainment at the conclusion of the floats," Mr Davis said.

"Our other service club in town, the Lions Club, looked after organising the floats, the pageant and the parade.

'Unfortunately, (due to) their membership numbers and age of members, they are no longer in a position to be able to do that, and we don't have the membership and the age base to do both."

Mr Davis said the popular carols event attracts between 500 and 1000 people.

Fears for nurse-led clinic

A local politician says he has "grave fears" for the trial nurse-led clinic that is expected to open in Strathalbyn in late September.

The clinic has been proposed as a solution to the town's closed emergency department (ED), but Member for Hammond Adrian Pederick said he was worried the service will be "doomed to fail".

"It is no reflection on the vital health staff at all, but I have grave fears on how the proposed emergency operation will work, mainly because you have to make an appointment to go there, and the limited times it is going to be open," he said.

"Some are saying it is better than nothing, but I am really fearful the service will be doomed to fail because it is a very limited service.

There won't be stitching done by a nurse because they are nurses, not nurse practitioners.

"(It will be for) very minor so-called emergency presentations, which is far less than what you want in a properly functioning emergency department I would think."

As reported in The Southern Argus, the proposed opening hours are expected to be from Monday to Friday from 4pm to 8pm, and 10am to 4pm on the weekend.

The clinic will offer care for those presenting with urgent, non-emergency care needs for patients 10 years and older, with vital virtual medical support available by phone of video link.

A spokesperson from the Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network said the new clinic would be based on a similar model being operated in Gumeracha, with recruitment for nurses, administration and hospitality staff to commence soon.

Mr Pederick said a "huge need" existed for something more aligned to a traditional emergency department.

"It is not only looking after the people of Strathalbyn, but the outlying areas, whether it is Clayton, Milang, Langhorne Creek, and extended areas around the district," he said.

"I know that at the consultative meeting (in June) that was taken at the footy club, the talk was that we are only 20 minutes from Mount Barker.

"But that is not the point... I think it is vital to have the triage closer to home."

Mr Pederick said he was just asking for an equivalent service to what was in place before the town's ED was "temporarily" shut due to COVID, particularly an on-call doctor.

"I am not saying there needs to be a doctor onsite, because most country hospital emergencies work on an on-call doctor," he said.

"I think it is vital because we have a growing community around Strathalbyn, (which is) quite a growth area, including the main town.

"What we are finding is that people are still shocked that you actually need to make an appointment to go.

"It is not an emergency department that you can just turn up at, you actually have to phone ahead.

"It is limited in scope... If you are looking at the operation on a Saturday, if they are closing at 4pm then it won't be there for the last half of the A Grade football, (with) potential injuries coming in."

Despite his fears Mr Pederick said he hopes the opening will be a precursor for something bigger.

"I hope it is the basis for improvement into the future, so it is something that can be started, and can be built on, but I do have a fear it is set up to fail," he said.

"Then potentially we will be told, 'well there weren't many presentations over a 12-month period, so what is the point?'

"So, I have a fear and an aspirational hope I suppose all at once.

"Î ĥope it can be seen that we need a bigger service when people see the presentations that turn up, and see they need more active services, whether it be from a nurse practitioner or more likely a call-in doctor process to treat medical needs."

The Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network spokesperson said the clinic would be evaluated at the six and 12-month mark to ensure it was meeting expectations.



Hit-and-run at Murray Bridge

Police are investigating a serious hit-andrun crash at Murray Bridge on Sunday.

At about 7pm on August 20 police were called to the intersection of Old Princes Highway and Hein Road following reports a silver car collided with a motorbike then fled the scene.

When police arrived, they found the rider, a 45-year-old local man, with serious injuries, which have now been deemed non-life-threatening.

He was taken by SA Ambulance Service to Royal Adelaide Hospital for treatment.

The intersection was closed for several

hours while Major Crash investigators attended to assist local patrols.

The investigation is ongoing.

Strong stance taken against extreme speeders

A powerful message was sent to road users who drive at excessive speeds last week, with the public crushing of a car last Friday that was involved in an incident in January.

A Holden Commodore ute owned by a 20-year-old learner driver convicted of driving at 253kph, driving in a dangerous manner, breaching of learner's permit, driving an unregistered motor vehicle, and drug driving earlier this year was impounded, publicly crushed into scrap and sold, with proceeds forwarded to the Victims of Crime Compensation Fund.

The driver was sentenced to prison for one year, four months and 28 days, where, following his release, he will be disqualified from driving indefinitely.

Officer in Charge of the Traffic Services Branch Superintendent Darren Fielke said this was a warning for all motorists.

"This is what motorists driving at extreme speed on our roads can face – jail, having your vehicle crushed and sold for scrap metal,

and a disqualification from driving," he said.
"The behaviour of every motorist impacts the safety of every other road user.

"Road trauma has catastrophic effects on families and communities, and we cannot tolerate drivers who blatantly disregard that responsibility."

An amendment to 19ADA of the Criminal Law Act in 2021 empowers a magistrate to disqualify or suspend a driver's licence, and sentence a driver to a term of imprisonment between three to five years for basic and aggravated offences.

In addition, Section 20 of the Criminal Law (Clamping, Impounding and Forfeiture of Vehicles) Act 2007 empowers the Police Commissioner with making a decision regarding the method of disposal of vehicles forfeited by the court, including the option to sell or crush.

Minister for Police Joe Szakacs said the new laws have more serious penalties for dangerous drivers.

"These measures are necessary to protect dangerous drivers from other drivers on our roads and from themselves," he said.

"Hooning is not an innocent act.

"A stark reminder of this fact is seen in the state's road toll."

Two drivers reprimanded over traffic offences

Two drivers were caught committing traffic offences by Murray Mallee police last week.

On Sunday, a 66-year-old Beverley man was detected driving at 150km/h in a 100km/h zone on Langhorne Creek Road, Mulgundawa.

He was issued a \$1939 fine and nine demerit points.

The following day, police stopped a 50-year-old Murray Bridge woman driving on Christian Road, where checks later revealed she was disqualified from driving.

She was report for driving while disqualified and will be summonsed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court at a later date.

Murray Bridge teenagers arrested over police pursuit

Two teenagers were arrested after a short pursuit at Murray Bridge in the early hours of last Wednesday morning.

At about 2am on August 16 police patrols attempted to stop a Toyota Kluger being driven on Adelaide Road, but it continued for about 300 metres before coming to a stop and two occupants ran from the vehicle.

Checks revealed the car had been stolen a short time earlier from a Murray Bridge address


Murray Bridge police patrols, with the assistance of Mount Barker, PolAir and Dog Operations, located the suspects at a nearby address where they were swiftly arrested.

A 14-year-old and 17-year-old boy, both

from Murray Bridge, were charged with illegal use and driving offences.

The teenagers were also charged with further offences for outstanding matters, including serious criminal trespass, theft, breach of bail, and driving offences.

Both were refused police bail, and appeared in Adelaide Youth Court the following day.



Time-saving QR code service to aid emergency services

An innovative new medical tool is giving ambos, doctors, and nurses instant access to a patient's detailed health records to help save lives in an emergency.

Australian MedicAlert Foundation (MedicAlert) has collaborated with SA Ambulance Service (SAAS) to launch a new QR Code service worn on medical IDs such as bracelets or necklaces to provide health professionals with instant access to a patient's critical medical information, including age, allergies, medical conditions, special devices, medication, emergency contacts, and specialised care instructions, in an emergency.

Health Minister Chris Picton said this will be a valuable tool to help ambos save more lives.

"Time matters in an emergency," he said.
"The sooner our ambos and clinicians can gain access to vital medical information, the better likely outcome for a patient."

MedicAlert's QR Code service is the only Australian medical ID service that has partnered with an ambulance service to determine not just what information is required in emergency situations, but how it's best relayed to support their critical time-sensitive work.

The QR Code service is currently being rolled out nationally, with a strong initial response from both MedicAlert members and ambos during the pilot phase.

"Many Australians will be familiar with the iconic MedicAlert medical ID bracelet, as MedicAlert become Australia's most trusted provider of emergency medical information for 52 years," MedicAlert Chief Executive Officer, Chris Radbone, said.

"With the evolution of health data and technology, we are now introducing a QR Code service that makes essential health information available instantly from anywhere in the world.

"This major update to our services provides every MedicAlert member with hidden or chronic health conditions with the ultimate protection via our unique QR technology.

"This QR Code service – a digital reimagination of MedicAlert's market leading service – is available to existing and new members at no additional cost outside of a one-dollar-a-week annual service fee."

Safety upgrades planned for Wellington Road

A Highland Valley road is among 17 dangerous crash sites set to undergo fully funded upgrades to boost safety, and reduce serious injury and death across the state.

Under the Black Spot Program, the Federal Government has committed \$5.9 million to introduce safety measures such as traffic signals and roundabouts at locations where a number of serious crashes are known to or are at risk of occurring.

One of these locations is a 3.1-kilometre section of Wellington Road, which received \$781,000 for shoulder sealing, curve widening, audio tactile lane marking, delineation improvements, and installation of guide posts and guard rail.

"We welcome the opportunity to partner with the Australian Government to ensure our road network in South Australia is safer by targeting the worst accident spots one by one," Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Tom Koutsantonis, said.

"We're pleased to be involved in this ongoing program, which will improve safety right at the places where it's needed."

Vietnam veterans honoured at local services

A moment of pause and reflection was observed by Goolwa and Macclesfield communities last week to commemorate the bravery, teamwork and endurance service men and women displayed during the Vietnam War.

Vietnam Veterans Day is observed on August 18 each year, acknowledging the more than 60,000 brave Australians who served in Vietnam.

This year's commemoration services were particularly significant as this year marks the 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War.

The Goolwa RSL Sub-Branch held its own service last Friday at the clubrooms, where President Howden Jennings reflected on the history behind the date.

"The battle of Long Tan was a significant moment in Australia's war in Vietnam," Mr Jennings said.

"On the third anniversary of Long Tan – August 18, 1969 – a cross was raised on the site of the battle by the men of the Sixth Royal Australian Regiment.

"Veterans of the battle gathered at the cross to commemorate the fallen, and the

day was commemorated by them as Long Tan Dav.

"In 1987, Prime Minister Bob Hawke announced that Long Tan Day would be known as Vietnam Veterans Day.

"As the first significant engagement by the first Australian taskforce and the single most costly encounter of the war for Australians, the anniversary of this battle was generally accepted to be an appropriate day of remembrance."

Other battles during the war were also reflected on during the Goolwa service.

Additionally, the negativity and criticism veterans faced upon returning home was highlighted.

"In the early years, Australia's participation in the war was not widely opposed," Mr Jennings said.

"But as the commitment grew, conscripts began to make up a large percentage of those being deployed and killed, and as the public increasingly became to believe the war was being lost, opposition grew until in the early 1970s, more than 2000 people marched in the streets of Australia's major cities in protest.

"Unlike the previous generations of Australian service men and women, those who returned from Vietnam did not find acceptance from the wider community readily forthcoming.

"On Vietnam Veterans Day, we pause and reflect on the bravery, teamwork and endurance that Australians displayed throughout the war, (and) honour all our veterans who lost their lives during battle, returned home wounded, ill or injured, lost their lives in the years since they returned home, and still carry the physical and emotional scars of their service."

Veteran Robert Marshall also shared his reflections on the Vietnam War.

Wreaths were then laid, *The Ode* was

played and a minute's silence observed, before barbecue and bar facilities followed.

On Saturday, Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch also held a service at the Macclesfield Anzac Memorial Gardens.

Between 150 and 200 people turned out for the commemorations, including Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie, Member for Heysen Josh Teague and Mount Barker District Council Mayor David Leach, and veterans from Adelaide through to the South Coast.

Following the service, Ms Sharkie and Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch Vice-President Neil Wright unveiled the new memorial dedicated to people who did national service.

"It was great to give that cohort some longoverdue recognition because people that did national service are often overlooked in commemorations, and particularly, when it comes to memorials," Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch President, Dennis Oldenhove, said.

"It's a bit of an unspoken part of our history and we wanted to change that, so now there's a place in the Adelaide Hills for all national service men, which is great to have."

Numerous people also shared their thoughts and memories, and wreaths were laid by dignitaries and veterans.

Protect our producers

A few weeks ago, the Labor Western Australia Government learned a valuable lesson in trying to push through laws that affect food producers.

The Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act came into effect on July 1, 2023, with very little consultation with those it impacted the most.

The WA Government has since stated it will overturn the Act, hopefully, ending the fiasco.

Agriculture in Australia is currently under siege from new legislation and regulations proposed by State and Federal Governments indifferent or outright hostile to the interests and needs of this vital sector.

This is despite continuous price rises in food, with inflation hurting everyday Australians.

We see it in recent federal changes to immigration schemes in the march towards net zero, with little regard to our primary producers, in the continued erosion of our R&D capacity and in a willingness to burden the sector with additional red tape.

In 2023 primary producers face a range of increased costs from decisions made by government departments within the state and in Canberra.

Recently, the horticultural industry has talked to me about 'accelerated greenwashing' being forced on the producers of our food and fibre, which is causing a lot of concern.

They're advised to eliminate things like industrial wrap used to keep products safely on a pallet, but without a readily available alternative.

They're told to avoid styrofoam crates, but no insulated credible option exists without risking produce damage.

They're encouraged to adopt solar, but as soon as they buy and install solar panels on their packing sheds, the connection and network costs skyrocket up to 30 per cent.

It's not just electricity that is up, agricultural fertilisers, chemical costs, fuel, and labour costs are up.

For industries like fresh produce which generally operate on one to five per cent margins, every cost to our farmers translates to increased costs for the consumer.

Industry is begging for a pause on rapid changes until affordable technology is available, and I think they deserve to be heard.

We can't expect small business packers to buy costly equipment to change their production methods overnight, especially when they know new packaging will result in a huge increase in accelerated spoilage.

Agriculture has long-excelled in adopting technological innovations.

This industry embraces tech and innovation, pioneering waste re-purposing and holistic plant solutions, but what is unhelpful is aggressively mandating change without consultation.

The industry will thrive when they are part of the solution, not viewed by city academics and pen-pushers as the bulk of the problem.

Governments needs to show some respect for our food and fibre producers, and the communities they support.

We need an orderly transition to ensure technology and our producers can keep up and – conversely – prices stay down for consumers.

In the current cost-of-living crisis governments of all levels need to get serious about supporting primary production and other sectors, which are the lifeblood of our community and economy.

To continue pressing ahead with policies which add burden to our primary production sector is inexcusable in the current climate, and reflects a lack of understanding of the key issues facing our famers.

It's time to have a sensible conversation about nuclear energy after hosting a roundtable in London attended by experts from across the UK.

Goolwa Oval Precinct project moves to next stage of works

Construction on the next stage of Goolwa Oval Precinct works is steadily progressing and on track to meet the project's early 2024 completion date, with a new sevencompartment public toilet the latest of the facilities to be completed.

The toilet cubicles opened earlier this month, while work on three additional tennis and netball courts, four cricket practice nets, and storage sheds is ongoing.

Construction will soon start on the redesigned and relocated Goolwa Lions Club's book shed facing Wildman Street, and attention will turn to the landscape provision of shelters, park furniture, a playground, and improved open green space.

Alexandrina Council Chief Executive Officer Nigel Morris said the \$4.5 million stage of the total \$8.2 million project which is 70 per cent grant funded - is on track to deliver a high-quality sporting and recreational facility for the region.

"We started the winter sporting season with the completion of the multi-function scoreboard, the installation of audio-visual equipment in the facility, AFL specification goal posts, and high-standard oval lighting," he said.

"These additions have allowed more groups in our community to use the precinct for multiple sports and community activities.

"The remaining components of stage two are forging ahead, and will be capped off early next year, with the installation of a landscaped boulevard entry statement on Hutchinson Street for pedestrians to promote the precinct as a whole.

"Meanwhile, an advisory group of club representatives and community members, chaired by Mayor (Keith Parkes), are working collaboratively to establish the right management and cost recovery models for all users of this precinct."

Stage one was completed in February 2022, delivering a two-storey, multi-purpose clubroom facility with changerooms, firstaid rooms, umpire spaces, toilets, social spaces, storage, canteen, kitchen, bar, and a spectator viewing area.

Local towns uptaking EVs at rapid pace

Mount Barker and Murray Bridge have been ranked in the top 15 South Australian suburbs and towns for increased uptake in Battery Electric Vehicles (BEVs).

According to new data released by Australian Automobile Association's (AAA), BEVs now account for seven per cent of new car sales in South Australia, with the number of BEVs registered in SA as of January 31 this year increasing by 116 per cent, compared to 12 months prior.

Among the suburbs and towns recording an increase of more than 200 per cent in new BEV sales was Mount Barker in eighth place with a 216 per cent uptake, while Murray Bridge ranked 13th on 200 per cent.

RAA Mobility Technology Specialist, Mark Borlace said growth in EV sales was accelerating and showing no signs of slowing down.

"This data tells us EV sales are now doubling year on year," he said.

"While there's still a relatively small number of BEVs on SA roads, this strong uptake indicates a growing appetite for low emissions vehicles."

The RAA Charge network began rolling out earlier this year, and is on track to be finished next year.





New classrooms arrive at Eastern Fleurieu's Langhorne Creek campus

Moving day finally arrived for Eastern Fleurieu School's Langhorne Creek campus students earlier this month when construction on the long-awaited new classrooms was completed.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the R-6 campus is undergoing a \$3 million overhaul of its ageing infrastructure, including demolition and replacement of existing learning areas with modular buildings, refurbishment of existing accommodation to create a new administration hub, and stormwater and maintenance works.

After lengthy delays put the project on pause last year, the first stage of the project, which included demolition of some buildings and refurbishment of the Junior Primary house, began in May and reached completion earlier this month, allowing students to move into the "more spacious, light and airy" classrooms.

Head of Campus Les Cameron said students and families were enjoying the new facilities.

"Students and the community are just really amazed," she said.

"They've waited a long time, and are really happy with the outcome.

"They're much more spacious, a lot more light and airy, and the whole set up is so much easier – Fleetwood did a great job."

Similarly, Minister for Education Blair Boyer, who visited Eastern Fleurieu's Strathalbyn and Langhorne Creek campuses last Tuesday, August 15, was amazed by the improvements.

"It was great to be invited by (Member for Mayo) Rebekha (Sharkie) to visit the three Eastern Fleurieu campuses and see some of the great new buildings being delivered, but also some of the improvements still



needed to make this unique school as great as it can be," he said.

"The school is well-led by Principal Ian Kent, and the student leaders I met are destined for bright futures.

"As a former student at a regional school in country Victoria, I know how important it is to support regional students to reach their full potential, and I have visited as many of these schools as I can over the past year-and-a-half to ensure their views are heard by decision-makers in Adelaide."

The next stage of works is almost ready to begin, and will see the demolition of additional buildings for further classrooms.

"That can happen when administration moves into the 'house', which at the moment, (is experiencing) a bit of a hold-

up waiting on some finalising of IT services," Ms Cameron said.

Already the new classrooms have made a difference to the school, creating more space for students and a fresh look for the campus.

Ms Cameron hoped to maintain that moving forward.

"Hopefully, we get some more enrolments and students come out, so that's exciting," she said

"The community is really excited and continues to be involved.

"We get a lot of support from our local hub and our CAC family members are doing an amazing job working alongside us to see this progression come to fruition, but also to help us with anything in the future we might need or like for our school."

"The Hangar event was a great way to wrap up the 10 days, and it was a great event attended by all," Ms Pilgrim said.

"We had over 250 people attend, so for a first time event, we're really thrilled with that.

"The Hangar and the lights were definitely stand-outs for us as a region because those two events haven't been done before, and they were really well-received.

"I think they'll only get bigger and better."

On Saturday last a match was fired on the Strathalbyn Rifle Range between the home team and a team from the Langhorne Creek branch. Neither team was very strong but some fine shooting was witnessed. S. Saunders was easily top for the home team with 47 over 400 yards and 44 over 600 yards for 91, with V.Shepherd from Langhorne Creek matching this effort. Langhorne Creek compiled the highest aggregate score to win by 16.

Hills Fleurieu Landscape **Board awards** project grants

Several Adelaide Hills and Fleurieu Peninsula groups have been awarded grants by the Hills and Fleurieu Landscape Board to help improve the local environment.

The grassroots grants totalling \$250,000 will be used for a range of projects targeted at biodiversity, waterways, soil health, climate adaptation, and First Nations' connection to Country.

Board Chair, David Greenhough said the grants help support the outstanding efforts of individuals, volunteers, schools, community organisations, First Nations, and not-for-profit groups.

'So many people in the community are doing great work to improve the environment - often in their own time," he said.

'This year's funding will support many different projects, ranging from protecting pygmy possums and rare birds, helping more farmers adopt regenerative agriculture, and fencing off fragile watercourses and vegetation from stock.

"We hope these grants will encourage and support their fantastic work."

Among the successful recipients is Kanmantoo-Callington Landcare Group for its project, 'Greening the Bremer', where volunteers and landholders continue fencing properties on the Hills Fleurieu side of the Bremer River.

The grant builds on the group's impressive work so far, including fencing substantial sections of both sides of the river, and planting 14 hectares of native plants.

Other local grant recipients include: Mount Compass Area School for its Mount Lofty Ranges Southern Emu-wren Habitat Expansion Project, which looks to increase the area of suitable habitat for the nationally endangered bird.

 Goolwa to Wellington Local Action Planning Association Inc. for its 'Grassroots Groups - Supporting Uptake and Scaling of Regenerative Farming in the Eastern Mt Lofty area' project, which looks to engage two experts to attend farm walks to support specific management issues with the group, and support co-ordination.

• Finnis Catchment Group to protect a section of Finniss River and maintain riparian improvements.

 Macclesfield Bushcare Group to protect and enhance native vegetation and freshwater ecosystems along the Angas River and tributary in two Mount Barker Council reserves – the Lord Robinson/Crystal Lake Park and Night Paddock reserve.

 Yundi Nature Conservancy to engage regenerative agriculture and swamp management networks across the Fleurieu, and publicise the opportunity.

The Hawks' small men, Bates and Dalitz, were amongst the goal scorers in the final quarter.


It wasn't Magpie Coach Slape's day, as he came off the field after a heavy knock near the end of the game. At match end, the Hawks recorded


'This means a lot to me because I would have loved to have had a female coach when I was younger," Jones said.

It was the second qualifying round of the Strathalbyn Golf Club's championship on Saturday, and Adam Furniss came out as the winner of the day.

Next time around on the 16th he went even better, this time just staying out of the water, but with his next shot hooking the ball, so it finished up against the boundary fence.

In trying to get off the fence with his putter. Brian only managed to hit the ball a bit further up for the fence to still be in his way onto 10 for the hole.

Alan Haberfield was looking forward to the day's golf, having won on Wednesday with 33 points in a 12-hole Stableford.

But he was brought back to earth last Saturday with 96 off the stick and getting into trouble on the seventh, with his second shot going into the dam.

Having a drop, Alan gave a repeat performance, going into the dam again, and then with yet another drop, managed to hit the ball out of bounds.
