Local's lasting legacy

Two-and-a-half years ago, Macclesfield resident Kerry Thomas just thought she had a urinary tract infection and was tired, and her antibiotics were failing.

But when she got a scan and received a call the following morning to come back in, she found it was much worse.

"They discovered it was a rare kind of cancer and it had spread everywhere," she said.

"It was a big surprise and took a while to adjust to."

She was diagnosed with terminal, stage 4 endometrial cancer and given weeks to live.

All in a day's work for Rufus

International Dog Day was celebrated on Saturday across the world, and in Strathalbyn Vince Saunders was hoping to use the day to treat his dog Rufus for being such a big part of his life.

Rufus is a German Short-haired Pointer and can be spotted napping in the window of Mr Saunders' hair dressing salon Bonce Hair Boutique, where he is a hit with customers.

Mr Saunders said he knew he would have a German Short-haired Pointer the minute he spotted one while on holiday.

"I was on holiday in Africa, and that was the dog breed they had at the safari that I went to, and I loved her energy," he said.

"I saw the dog and thought 'that is what I am going to get', so as soon as I got back to Australia I started researching the breed.

"I was living in Sydney at the time and due to move down here, so on my trip from Sydney to here I picked him up, and he has been here as long as I have, which is six years."

Rufus's introduction to hair dressing was gradual, but he soon became an integral part of the business.

"What I did at first was bring him in for a couple of days, just to see how he was, and as he got more familiar here, people got used to him," Mr Saunders said.

"If he wasn't here people were like, 'why isn't the dog here', and so I thought, oh right, I will just bring him in every day.

"He is a big hit – he is very popular and the reason that people come in.

"As soon as people who are a bit nervous or feel a bit off, have had a bad day, or mental health problems come in here, you can just see a change in the way that they talk and look at you.

"People who don't find talking to other people very easy, as soon as Rufus is there, they are just completely different, and it is lovely to see."

Rufus' popularity has kept him well-fed, with "lots" of treats every day, from customers who sneak a few in in their pockets, to the stash of biscuits already in the salon.

Rufus has also been known to stand outside the nearby butcher's shop for extra morsels. Being a German Short-haired Pointer

though has meant he has never had to have a hair cut of his own.

"I have never bathed him once," Mr Saunders said.

"He has been in the shower a few times, but that is it.

"You hose him down, and he is good... I didn't want a long-haired (dog) because they get all clogged up."

Last Friday, thinking ahead to International Dog Day, Mr Saunders reflected on the importance Rufus plays in his life.

"He is always there, and there is no-one who loves you more than he does, so for me, it is the companionship," he said.

"He has brought me lots of joy, he gets me out walking every morning, keeps me active ,and holds me accountable."

Father and son team up at SES

Andrew and Heath Colliver are familiar faces at the Strathalbyn SES, with the father and son team enjoying the ability to work together to help the community.

Mr Colliver is part of the leadership team, covering road crashes, downed trees, and storm damage, while Heath calls himself a “normal volunteer”.

They have worked together for a year or two. Andrew began his commitment to the SES almost 10 years ago.

“I sold a farm in the South East, and I was in the middle of a gap year, if you know what I mean,” he said.

“I was living here and thought it would be a good way to meet some more people and fill my time in while I wasn’t working.”

Heath, though, was inspired to join

because of his dad after coming along to training nights.

Having a dad as a work buddy has helped the year 12 student learn the ropes at the SES.

“It is easy to ask questions to Dad,” Heath said.

“It is quite nice, as I always get to go out with dad and he will know who to talk to.”

Andrew said they both value being able to work together in a busy world.

“It is good, because we don’t get a lot of time together, what with working full time, and school, so this brings us together,” he said.

“We have a few mates here now, and every job is different, which keeps it interesting.”

Being a SES member can involve challenging call outs, but the duo believe they are prepared for when that happens.

“We haven’t had the rough job yet together,

as Heath has only just done road crash recently, so he hasn’t been out on the road that much,” Andrew said.

“When we come across it, I think we should be fine because I have done quite a few and my wife is a volunteer with the SA Ambulance Service, so we have always been around that for years.”

Strathalbyn SES has about 30 volunteers on the books, but are always keen for more.

“We are always trying to get people to come to the SES, as the more the merrier and the easier it is on everybody,” Andrew said.

“You are not relying on those few that turn out all the time.”

And their plans for Fathers Day?

“Quite often we will go on a barbecue somewhere, and that will probably be it,” Andrew added.

New agreement struck to deliver full Basin Plan

A new agreement to deliver the Murray-Darling Basin Plan in full, including 450 gigalitres of environmental flows, has been reached between all Basin jurisdictions, except Victoria, and the Commonwealth.

The agreement will allow for voluntary buybacks, which the government said was an essential tool for delivering environmental flows, and a time extension to deliver the plan, recognising the previous 2024 deadline was impossible.

The new deadline for delivery of the 450GL is December 31, 2027.

“We are pleased to see strong and decisive action from Federal Water Minister Tanya Plibersek to deliver (the plan) in full,” SA Minister for Water, Susan Close, said.

“The 450GL is the bare minimum we need to ensure the river’s ecology can withstand the next dry spell.

“I welcome the stronger safeguards and legislative changes required to allow for voluntary buy backs the Commonwealth have pledged to pursue.

“The State Government will continue to defend the environment and ecological systems through legal action if this final agreement is not delivered in good faith.”

However, others felt less favourably about the agreement.

“Sadly, the announcement is little more than an agreement to kick the can down the road yet again,” Greens Party spokesperson for Environment, Senator Sarah Hanson-Young, said.

“After a decade of broken promises, there is still nothing to guarantee the delivery of 450 gigalitres of water promised to South Australia and the environment.

“Lifting a cap on buybacks is welcome in theory, but it means little unless water is actually bought and delivered on time.

“The river dies from the mouth up, and that’s why it’s crucial the Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth are healthy for the entire river system.”

Similarly, the state’s Opposition was concerned about Victoria being missing from the agreement.

Next step for Mt Barker hospital and ambulance station

Development of the \$320.8 million Mount Barker Hospital, and rebuild of the Mount Barker Ambulance Station have taken further steps forward, with key updates announced.

Community consultation on the design of the hospital will begin with the inaugural meeting of the Consumer and Community Reference Group scheduled in coming weeks, following more than 50 community members joining the body.

The new hospital will have 102 beds – up from the existing hospital’s 34 – to help cater for the expected population boom in the area.

It is expected to be complete by the end of 2027.

“While our teams there are doing a great job with the increased resources we have given them, they have well and truly outgrown the small landlocked station,” Minister for Health and Wellbeing, Chris Picton, said.

“The new hospital will help expand health services for the community, while the rebuilt ambulance station and additional paramedics ensures residents have access to emergency treatment quickly when they need it.

“We’re listening to the needs of the community, which is why consultation and

finding out what services they feel are crucial to them is so vital.”

Meanwhile, the first concept images of the to-be-rebuilt Mount Barker Ambulance Station have been released.

The rebuild, which is due to be completed by mid-2025, is being done to provide improved

paramedic services and ensure people are seen sooner when they need an ambulance.

Situated on the corner of Bald Hills and Springs Road, the site offers better access to the freeway and major roads than the ageing Mann Street station.

The station will be home to the 24/7 emergency ambulance crews that have

responded to more than 1100 incidents since March, following the addition of 12 paramedics.

The six-person Regional Medical Transfer Service, which comes online early next year, will also be based at the rebuilt station.

Local leaves lasting legacy

Two-and-a-half years ago, Macclesfield resident Kerry Thomas just thought she had a urinary tract infection and was tired, and her antibiotics were failing.

But when she got a scan and received a call the following morning to come back in, she found it was much worse.

“They discovered it was a rare kind of cancer and it had spread everywhere,” she said.

“It was a big surprise and took a while to adjust to.”

She was diagnosed with terminal, stage 4 endometrial cancer and given weeks to live.

Since then, Ms Thomas has gone through treatment, including a 20-week run of chemotherapy, which she had a five per cent chance of surviving, immunotherapy and respite, and her daily chemotherapy pills or “cocktails”.

“This chemo cocktail is about the 15th or 16th variety – we’re getting towards the end of the cocktails now – it is what it is,” she said.

With the cancer in her lungs, Ms Thomas is really tired, has a cough, and is appreciating every moment.

“I’ve had an extra two-and-a-half years of pretty reasonable quality of life that I wouldn’t have had before – I’m really grateful for that,” she said.

“When you’ve got this terminal diagnosis, and you go through all that mental stuff with your partner, friends and family, and then you bounce back, it’s a bit of a rollercoaster ride.

“I’ve always tried to live life with a positive attitude and whatever challenges come.

“I allow myself to be upset and cheesed off... I say ‘Come on, you’ve been through lots of different things, this is just another one.

“Don’t try to pre-empt too much, just take it step-by-step.”

As her journey has progressed, the experience has allowed Ms Thomas to prioritise what is important in her life and how she spends her time, and decreasing energy, which she finds as an “incredible gift”.

“I know a lot of this sounds like what everyone thinks when you get a terminal illness and you say ‘just live in the moment’, but actually, there’s a real element of truth in that,” she said.

“I think about what’s meaningful in life and the lives of those (I) care about.

“What can I do to tell them and let them know how much and why I love them, how important they’ve been in my life, and how they’ve changed me.

“Relationships with people and sharing special moments – that is, in the end, what counts, and being able to give back to the various communities I’m involved with.”

Ms Thomas and her partner Barry have lived remarkable lives, giving to those in need, spending much of their careers in international development and disaster work largely in Africa and Asia.

Over the past 30 years, Ms Thomas has

grown close to some communities, particularly Ethiopia, through famine and war.

“They mean a lot to me because they’ve changed me... they have saved my life literally during war time – I’ll never forget that,” she said.

“They put themselves ahead of me, because we were there helping them.

“They would protect me from MiGs coming over dropping bombs.

“We all lived together and we didn’t have a lot of food... so when food was short, they would make sure I got an extra portion.

“When you share those kinds of experiences, it changes you.”

Ms Thomas appreciates being cognisant of the world.

“This tiny little planet we live on, there are a lot of people doing it tough in a lot of different ways, and it’s relative,” she said.

“That’s been part of the process over my career – coming to terms with the fact that you’re coming out of a warzone where people are starving and in 24 hours, you’re on a flight and back in Australia and... it takes a while to readjust back here.”

Ms Thomas also set up a not-for-profit company during her career that was doing a lot of contract consultancy work internationally and in Australia, largely with Indigenous communities and natural resource management.

The couple will leave a legacy after setting up a trust fund for some of their financial

assets to support innovative programs with African communities they have worked with for decades, and some Australian initiatives.

“It’s one way we can continue to provide financial resources to people who we’re very close to who are in incredibly dire straights much more than we are here, and they don’t have access to medical support services that we have,” she said.

Looking out rather than dwelling on the situation is helping Ms Thomas, and she is excited about leaving a meaningful legacy that reflects their values.

“Money has not been a major priority for us, it’s always been about leading more meaningful lives and trying to help make the world a bit better in some ways, from a humanitarian... and an environmental point of view,” she said.

Nowadays, she enjoys being involved with dog agility, and is a Macclesfield Young at Heart Club member, which has raised more than \$200,000 for Cancer Council since 2008.

Ms Thomas recently joined other local residents in a cheeky “nudie” photoshoot to make a fundraiser calendar for Cancer Council, taking inspiration from the 2003 film Calendar Girls.

“The Young at Heart Club really is an incredible group of people, mostly women but some blokes, in promoting health and wellbeing and connection,” she said.

“It (focuses on) physical, mental,

and social health and mobility, which is absolutely essential as people get older.

“A lot of people, as you get older, can get socially isolated and lonely, but this group is just fantastic for the camaraderie and support.”

Today, August 31, marks Daffodil Day – a fundraising initiative by the Cancer Council which Ms Thomas is an advocate of, particularly because of the support and resources offered, which she has found “really useful”.

Bright, yellow daffodils are used to signify hope and resilience in the face of cancer, and Ms Thomas offered solace to others impacted by the disease, stating “the journey is different for everyone”.

“These days, pretty much everyone has been touched by cancer somewhere along the line – family or friends,” she said.

“Connect with friends and give them the opportunity to give some special support and be as positive as you possibly can in tackling the challenges.

“It’s there anyway – you can make it grim or you can embrace it and look for what gifts there could be in the challenge... and that brings a team around you.

“It turns it into something that is a special experience and not just a miserable one.

“Appreciate, be grateful for all the little things that bring joy and happiness.

“I’m not always successful, but that’s the way I try to live my life.”

Su-paw-star pair to represent SA at sheepdog championship

He started participating in sheepdog competitions almost three decades ago after buying his first pup from someone who suggested he take it trialling, and now breeds and trains them.

“A lot of my training is done with my farm work, then I do a little more of the specialised stuff before the competitions,” Mr Cross said.

“They’ve got to have a fair bit bred into them, but you still have to have the ability to train them to get the best out of them.”

“I think one thing that helps is my father had sheep and dogs on the farm.”

This year’s challenge will mark the 13th time Mr Cross has represented South Australia.

The challenge sees the best two dogs from each state compete, with the aggregate of each state’s scores to determine the winner of the Ted Gaby shield.

Mr Cross was not overconfident, but noted his dog *Echo Park Lady*, who won South Australian Working Sheepdog Association’s Dog of the Year in 2022, was pretty reliable.

“I’m sort of not overconfident because anything can go wrong when you’re dealing with sheep,” he said.

“You can have the best dog in the world, but every so often you’ll get one bad sheep and that will cause the problem.”

“And when you get down to that top 12 anything can happen; anyone can pop up.”

“Because Australia’s so big, we see who wins in Queensland for instance, but we don’t know whether that dog is better than our dog or worse.”

In addition to the shield, the competition’s top four dogs and their

handlers will go to New Zealand to represent Australia for the Wayleggo Cup later this year.

Mr Cross, who has also represented Australia six times, is hoping to be one of them.

“It would mean a great deal because I think it’s been nearly 10 years since I represented Australia,” he said.

“I slackened off a bit when my kids were (young), as I was busy taking them to sport and all that, so I didn’t push and train as hard as I had done.”

“*Lady* is seven-years-old, so it takes a fair few years to train them up to that level.”

“So, it would mean a fair bit, especially with having (the challenge) here in our hometown.”

At the end of the day, Mr Cross keeps coming back to competitions not just for the wins, but the travel, the people he meets, and the thrill of seeing the dogs work.

“The Supreme, which is one of the main events, is held in a different state every year, so that’s sort of like our annual holiday,” he said.

“The people I’ve met over the years have been one of the reasons, but the other one that really gets you going is... sometimes you just sit back and you’re in awe of the dog’s ability.”

“You’re out there and working your dog, but sometimes you stop and go ‘Wow, that was awesome. How good is this dog?’, and I think that’s what keeps you going and keeps you trying to breed the same or better dogs all the time.”

He encouraged everyone to come along to the event.

Ashbourne CFS welcomed the community into its station on Sunday, in a bid to increase its profile in the region.

The brigade's training officer Ben Van Iersel, who co-ordinated the day, said the event was both a publicity and recruitment drive to boost member numbers above its current 11.

"It was basically to get the community together, to show the community what we have and what we do," he said.

Learner drivers urged to make most of winter road conditions

Learner drivers are being urged to make the most of the remaining wet and wintry conditions to get more practice driving in all types of weather.

The call comes on the back of data showing 42 provisional licence drivers have been seriously injured – compared with 44 for all of 2022 – and 11 lives lost.

P1 car drivers have been involved in more than six times the number of crashes than learner drivers, based on State Government data analysed by RAA over the 2018-2022 period.

They also represent a higher involvement in collisions with other vehicles and fixed objects at roundabouts.

RAA Senior Manager of Safety and Infrastructure Charles Mountain was alarmed by the number of P1 crashes this year.

He said teaching learner drivers in all conditions could help save lives on roads.

"Especially during winter, motorists have different challenges each day,

including fog, dull lighting conditions and heavy rain," Mr Mountain said.

"It can be overwhelming responding to these conditions if young drivers have not had previous exposure.

"It's extremely beneficial for learners to experience difficult situations with a supervised driver to provide tips and importantly, discuss with the learner driver any concerns about the best way to negotiate some traffic conditions.

"Throughout the state, there are some challenging winding country roads with limited overtaking opportunities, in addition to unsealed roads, making driving more difficult.

"It's important to get comfortable merging onto expressways, reading the traffic and signs, and knowing when to come off the exits.

"Comfortable learner drivers can gain exposure on the Southern Expressway and South-Eastern Freeway, which is important to experience before driving unsupervised."

Arrest made over alleged hit-and-run

A local woman was arrested last Tuesday in relation to a hit-and-run crash at Murray Bridge.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, at about 7pm on Sunday, August 20, police were called to the intersection of Old Princes Highway and Hein Road following reports a silver car collided with a motorbike before fleeing the scene.

When police arrived, they found the rider, a 45-year-old local man, with serious but non-life-threatening injuries.

The man was taken by SA Ambulance Service to Royal Adelaide Hospital for treatment.

Following an investigation, Major Crash officers arrested and charged a 44-year-old Murray Bridge woman on August 22 with causing injury by dangerous driving, and leaving the scene of an accident.

She was bailed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on October 4.

The investigation is ongoing.

A Lot of problems

My heart breaks for Strath families. As *The Southern Argus*’ article of August 24 says the debacle of Lot 10 and the Harness Racing Club has been on the agenda for decades. I wish to address the two separate motions dealing with Lot 10 this month. The first was Cr Miller reasonably asking the council to communicate with the groups that are desperate for facilities and make up the Lot 10 Advisory Committee. The motion’s intent was quickly railroaded to be a discussion for the inclusion of Strathalbyn Harness Racing Club (SHRC), who once again, have changed their mind about inclusion. Let’s be very clear, council voted to not include SHRC just a few months ago, which means more time and money wasted. I felt sorry for Cr Miller as she expressed her frustration, as her courtesy motion was derailed. As for the second motion to bring back the SHRC into the Lot 10 development... yes, the SHRC is cashed up now – they’ve just sold valuable land – but what is their long-term viability? The parent body of Harness Racing in SA went into receivership in 2020. Likewise, Harness Racing Victoria are now rolling out massive redundancies. It is a dying sport. The ludicrous statement that the cricket team could practice in the ‘stables’ shows little understanding of either sport. Horse faeces and children sharing sporting facilities – really? Let’s be very clear, Regional Development Australia do not give out money, they help find it and will help any development in the area, so this is no coup. Here’s a solution – sell off the portion of Lot 10 to SHRC for \$2 million – approximately a quarter of SHRC funds – and invest that

into the abundance of land for sale in the Strathalbyn township, where children can walk or ride their bikes to sports facilities. The hundreds of thousands of dollars needed for council infrastructure will be significantly reduced by a central location. All along, the distance to Lot 10 has been an added expense. The sports facilities need to be closer to schools and the centre of town – ask any parent.

Vaping misconception

Vaping at Australian schools is increasing, and is understandably creating great concern for teachers and parents, however, the widespread punitive and coercive strategies such as suspensions, vape detectors, locking toilet doors and toilet raids are not working. Clearly, we need a fresh, evidence-based approach. Vaping is not risk-free, but has only a small fraction of the risk of smoking – estimated to be around five per cent of the risk or less by the UK Royal College of Physicians and the UK Government. The panic about youth vaping has grown out of proportion to the harm it causes. Other risky teenage behaviours such as smoking, binge drinking, illicit drug use and drink driving are of much greater concern. Further, most vaping by young people who have never smoked is short-term and experimental, and the risk of harm is particularly low with this pattern of vaping. Harms from long-term vaping may emerge over time, but are highly likely to be far less than from smoking. In this light, schools should educate students and staff about vaping with honest, evidence-based information. Children must also understand that vaping is not completely harmless; there are small potential risks, particularly nicotine dependence. Explain to kids that black-market vaping products are manufactured without the same oversight and standards as legitimate products and are more risky. However, even the best education programs have limited success in changing youth behaviour. Quitting vaping is generally much easier than quitting smoking, as vaping is less addictive, however, some students may need advice and support to quit. Some schools may wish to consider allowing vaping breaks for addicted students, and even have designated vaping areas for those who need them with parental permission. Restrictions are needed, but a pragmatic, supportive and compassionate approach is most likely to be effective and acceptable.

Country Cabinet
success

Last week’s Country Cabinet in Mount Barker revealed a slather of issues and projects locals would like addressed by the State Government. Issues included the Amy Gillett bikeway, planning for future basketball facilities for the Eastern Mavericks, barriers to recycled water use, planning laws around second dwellings on small acreages, and a lack of mental health services in the Hills. The cabinet enabled community members to ask questions directly to Premier Peter Malinauskas, his cabinet, and chief executives in an unmoderated forum. More than 600 people took the opportunity to take part, filling the Mount Barker High School’s gymnasium. Mr Malinauskas said the discussions were “what good democracy should look like”. With a number of big infrastructure announcements made over the past week, including the multi-million dollar contribution to the Heysen Boulevard connection, and updates on Mount Barker’s \$320.8m hospital, and ambulance station, Mount Barker has been well and truly in the news. One of the side events of the Country Cabinet visit was the Youth Cabinet staged at Mount Barker High School last Wednesday morning, where a number of local schools were represented. Like their elders that evening, the students relished being able to talk about issues relevant to them, including the mobile phone ban in schools, public transport, vaping and dumped cars. Many learned for the first time about the role of parliament and the work politicians do in their local communities. The coming weeks will reveal to us all how many issues the government has taken on board and whether any solutions will be forthcoming. But there is no doubt though that having a Country Cabinet visit was a plus for the region, highlighting to the visitors that issues and concerns do not stop at the boundary of Adelaide.

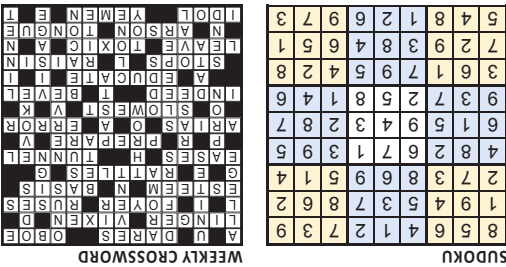

\$5m upgrade to connect Heysen Boulevard

Mount Barker District Council and the State Government will jointly fund a \$5 million upgrade to connect Heysen Boulevard in Mount Barker.

The long-awaited announcement was made last Wednesday while Premier Peter Malinauskas was in the town for Country Cabinet.

Both parties will kick in \$2.5 million each to see a much-needed rail level crossing constructed, and enable the connection of the broader thoroughfare.

Mount Barker Mayor David Leach said council was excited to be able to enter the agreement, which will see the Minters Field and Bluestone estates connected by the crossing.

"Since 2018, council has been advocating to successive State Governments that the railway corridor section is of utmost importance among the remaining segments of the connector road that have yet to be built," Mayor Leach said.

"The need to complete this section of road has advanced beyond the stage of debate and negotiation.

"Council views this investment as crucial from a community social and safety perspective.

"Opening up this critical part of the connector road will further contribute to removing traffic congestion on other roads, connecting people to shopping precincts and other facilities, and creating a safe and enjoyable walking and cycling route."

Mayor Leach said council's funding for the project would come from reprioritising the \$47 million growth and safety-related transport projects listed in council's adopted Long-Term Financial Plan 2023/33.

Speaking last Wednesday, Mr Malinauskas claimed a lack of planning policy thoughtfulness had seen some "catastrophic failures".

"This level crossing, that hasn't been built for goodness how long, is probably one of the worst examples of it," he said.

"Heysen Boulevard is a key connector route in and around the growing Mount Barker community, but at various points along this road, it just hasn't been completed.

"Currently Heysen Boulevard's development is a function private development needs, but when those occur in a patchwork quilt basis without much co-ordination, we see gaps in the system, and a gap in a road can render it completely

useless to the community that relies on the infrastructure.

"These days have got to come to an end here in Mount Barker, and also as a lesson to the future for other developments around the state."

Mr Malinauskas said the problem would now be resolved.

"We are confident that by fixing this level crossing, it will unlock the other developments along Heysen Boulevard, and as a State Government, we are conducting a review about how we can accelerate the completion of the road more broadly," he said.

"Only a few months ago the State Government established our infrastructure planning unit, within the Department of Planning, to make sure that where we have growing communities in new suburbs in particular that we put in the infrastructure first."

Member for Kavel Dan Cregan said the broken boulevard had been a frustration for the local community for many years.

"It is a reasonably modest amount of money, but it means a lot to our community," he said.

"Some people say this is kind of the Berlin Wall of Mount Barker east and west, and it is now going to be joined.

"It needs to be addressed and it will be, and we are very appreciative of that."

Heysen Boulevard is expected to eventually run through the entire 1300 hectares of the growth area in Mount Barker.

The State Government said completion of the rail crossing and construction of the road across the SteamRanger Heritage railway line would provide a kickstart for further development.

Minister for Transport and Infrastructure Tom Koutsantonis said it was no secret former governments, both Labor and Liberal, had made mistakes with the expansion of Mount Barker.

"This city will, before too long, become South Australia's second-biggest behind Adelaide, and we need to be prepared to step in when infrastructure challenges loom too large for local government to deal with alone," he said.

Mayor Leach said council looks forward to future collaboration with State and Federal Governments to invest in infrastructure, and build a special place and community that is a vital part of the state's future prosperity.

Historic turn-out for Adelaide Hills Country Cabinet

Hundreds gathered at Mount Barker High School last Wednesday night for the largest attended Country Cabinet community forum.

Country Cabinet provides an opportunity for communities to voice any concerns or challenges, and ask questions directly to Premier Peter Malinauskas, his cabinet and chief executives in an unmoderated forum.

The cabinet has previously visited Kangaroo Island, Port Pirie, Port Augusta, Yorke Peninsula and the South East with much success.

About 600 people, including local council members and politicians, packed into the school's gymnasium on August 23 to hear from the Premier and ministers.

"(Country Cabinet) is an important opportunity for our community to engage directly with State Government," Member for Kavel, Dan Cregan, said.

"This Country Cabinet format is particularly valuable when used well, and our community, being as engaged in politics as it is, (came) out in full force.

"We had 600 – perhaps even more – people with us, which I understand (is) the largest gathering in Country Cabinet so far in the schedule."

Among the topics and queries raised by the community on the night were:

- The Amy Gillett bikeway
- Barriers to recycled water use



- A rail system in Mount Barker and securing funding for it at a Commonwealth level
- Child protection
- Planning for future basketball facilities for the Eastern Mavericks
- Protection of waterways and environment, particularly Mount Barker creek management
- A potential ban on gas connections to new homes, with Mount Barker used as a pilot project
- Planning laws around second dwellings on small acreages
- Bushfire action
- Lack of mental health services in the

Adelaide Hills

- Heavy vehicles on Hahndorf roads
- Creation of a youth hub or dedicated safe space for young people in the Hills
- Potential for SA to become a heart-safe state, following Kangaroo Island's model
- Vaccination mandates for SA Health staff
- Local energy generation and nuclear power consideration
- Home grounds for Mount Barker District Athletics Club

Mr Malinauskas said the information provided on the night would be useful for the government in the future.

"(Country Cabinet) is a forum we have

reintroduced as a government and has been really useful (for) the communities we can have a positive impact on by not just having the whole of the cabinet here, but the senior executive leadership team of the entirety of the State Government," he said.

"These forums are authentic, unscripted and not choreographed... and we invite people to ask any questions they may have, even if that means for some uncomfortable incidences for politicians.

"But that is what good democracy should look like – political leaders enjoying the opportunity to be engaged with local communities in a really authentic, unchoreographed environment to make sure we are actually addressing the issue that people have.

"I thoroughly enjoy these forums, as it provides an unfiltered opportunity for members of the community to be able to engage with the state's leadership, and it can be really useful from our perspective."

He was grateful to all that attended.

"The key for us in this country and our state is we don't let apathy prevail – that we have engaged communities who don't just care about their own life, they care about a sense of purpose for others," Mr Malinauskas said.

"I think that's alive and well in Mount Barker.

"The fact that 600-odd people showed up despite the fact it's cold fills me with real confidence that it's going to be alright.

"People still do care about their community and their democracy to the extent (they were) here listening to us, and that for us is worth its weight in gold."

"I learnt that there is a whole range of issues that affect all different parts of the Hills differently, and how some of the issues we interconnect with as a bigger group, and how some of the issues were different for smaller groups."

Aimee, who hopes to study nursing, appreciated the opportunity to talk to Mr

Malinauskas afterwards.

"I personally talked to the Premier about transport to university," Aimee said.

"As a year 12 student I have to pretty much rule Flinders University out."

"I don't want to drive every day, but to get transport it would mean I would

have to go from Strathalbyn to Mount Barker, Mount Barker to Adelaide, and then Adelaide to Flinders, which ends up being a two-hour trip.

"I spoke to the Premier and said, 'Is there something we can do?' because it has ruled a university with such amazing courses

(out), purely because of how difficult it is to get to."

Holly also raised the issue of transport locally.

"I just talked about the lack of transport, especially to rural areas, such as (for) myself because we live outside of Mount Barker a bit, but still buses can't get there," she said.

"Then I just talked about the issue of addiction in school, such as vaping, and my opinions on that."

The two students said the Youth Cabinet had opened their eyes about politics, with Aimee now saying she "wouldn't rule out" pursuing politics as an interest.

"I would say I have definitely had my heart set on being a nurse since I was in year 6 at school, and it hasn't changed since then," she said.

"But I have definitely had my opinions and views on politics opened after hearing about what the Premier, Dan Cregan and Rebekha Sharkie do because they talked a bit about themselves and their jobs."

"It was definitely a bit of an eye-opener because it is not what I thought... I definitely learned a lot from hearing them talking about their everyday jobs and what they do to help in our area, so I wouldn't rule it out, but I have got my heart set on nursing at the moment."

Bathroom and washing facilities open for vulnerable locals at Mt Barker

New bathroom and laundry facilities for people experiencing homelessness are now open at Mount Barker.

Located at the Mount Barker Uniting Church, the \$40,000 new shower, accessible toilet and laundry facilities for vulnerable or disadvantaged people in the Adelaide Hills were opened by Minister for Human Services Nat Cook last Wednesday.

The cost is partly funded by a \$14,000 Department of Human Services grant, and

fundraising by Hills organisations and service clubs.

"I'm delighted to open these new shower and laundry facilities, which will play an important role in assisting people who are sleeping rough in the Adelaide Hills," Ms Cook said.

"Access to safe and clean bathroom and laundry facilities is something most people take for granted, but feeling clean and fresh is connected to dignity and self-worth."

"I congratulate the Mount Barker Uniting Church and the local community on their fantastic fundraising effort – it's a great example of a community coming together to help others in need."

Mount Barker Uniting Church Reverend Haydn Lush believed the facilities would make people feel more accepted, confident and supported within the community.

"By continuing to build networks with the local community and health providers,

we will be able to continue to refer people to other appropriate services for ongoing assistance," he said.

"Our aim is to improve community participation, wellbeing, and quality of life for people living and working in our community."

"On behalf of people who are finding life challenging, we are most thankful to the generosity of people in our community for making this possible."

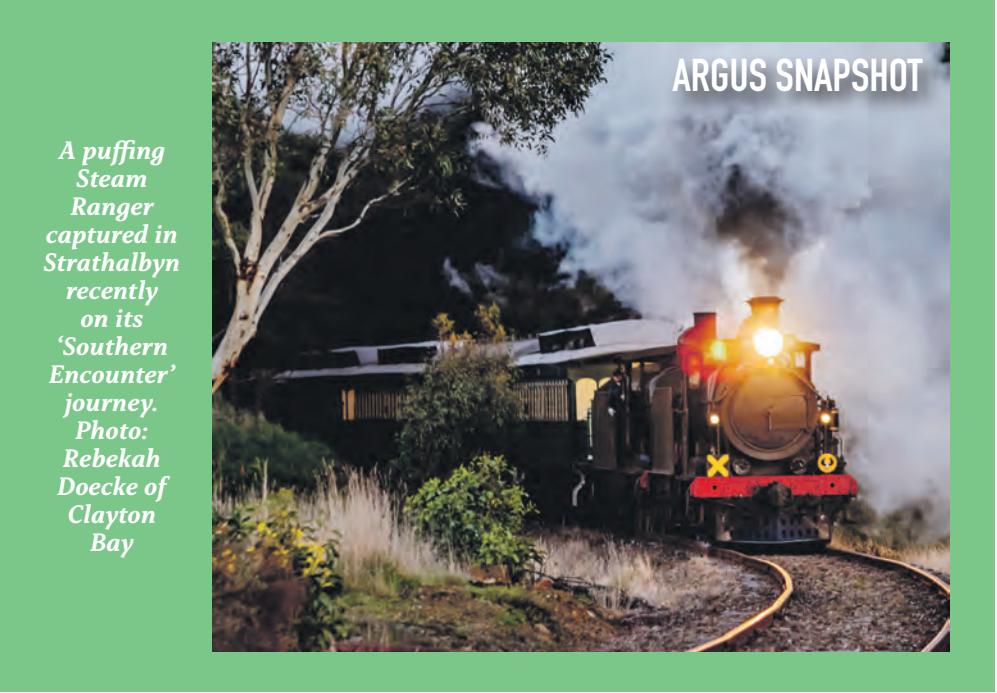

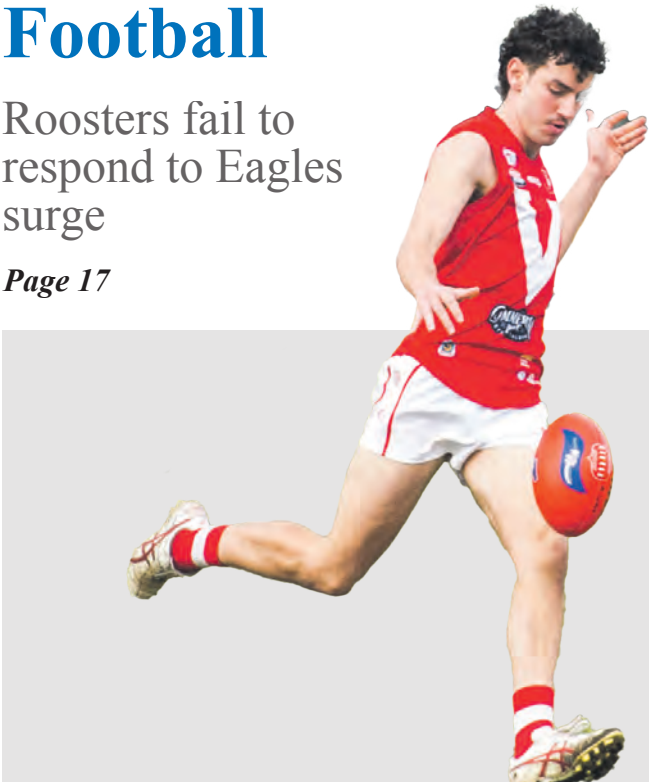

Reynolds debuts with week-apart wins

It has been an overwhelming month for apprentice jockey Chelsea Reynolds who won her first race upon debut in late July, followed by a major cup win less than a week later.

Horses have always been a part of the Currency Creek resident’s life, starting from her first pony at eight-years-old to working at the Victor Harbor horse tram to riding The Great Baby, who helped secure her first race win.

“I kind of always had horses,” Reynolds said.

“I got my first pony at eight – which I still have now – so he lives at the farm retired.

“Outside of work, I had my own horses and was riding them, then I worked at the Victor Harbor horse tram for nine years, so it was always horses.”

Although people used to frequently ask Reynolds if she was a jockey, trying her hand at racing had never crossed her mind until she went to Wayne Francis and Glen Kent’s Finnis Lodge Thoroughbreds.

It was there after Kent saw a video of Reynolds riding that the opportunity to race arose and she slowly began working her way towards a career in the industry.

“When I started at Glen’s I wasn’t even planning to ride,” Reynolds said.

“But then I was just watching everyone else, and I was like ‘I think I

want to give it a go’.

“I started riding the young ones, then slowly worked my way up.

“It’s been really good though; just step by step.”

Reynolds underwent the Racing SA Trackwork Riding Skills Course and was inducted into the Racing SA Apprentice Academy in December last year, which she has thoroughly enjoyed.

When she received the call seven months later that she had been approved to ride, it came as quite a shock, but not nearly as much as when she was informed not long after that she would be making her racing debut at Balaklava on July 30.

“It was just all of sudden,” Reynolds said.

“I left apprentice school (on the Tuesday) and I was five minutes down the road, and (someone) rang me and... was like ‘You’ve been approved’.

“When I got hold of Glen and told him, I was thinking (I would be racing) the next week, then (he) was like ‘What about this Sunday?’ and I was like ‘Oh okay, it’s happening’.”

In the lead up to the big day, Reynolds felt both nervous and excited.

But once she was on Great Baby, those feelings disappeared, and were later replaced by euphoria at having won her first race.

“It would go in waves, so one minute I would be really nervous, then I’d be excited, but just before the race I was

definitely nervous, especially waiting in the jockey room,” Reynolds said.

“That’s when it all started and I was like ‘What am I doing? Can I do this?’











“Once I was on Great Baby, it went away, then going across the (finish) line, I was like ‘No way that just happened’.

“But (Great Baby) was really good; he really looked after me out there.”

The win was also particularly significant for Reynolds, not only because it was her first, but because she’s been by Great Baby’s side since he was broken in.

“I’ve been with him for a long time and we haven’t always had an easy road,” she said.

Reynolds debuts with week-apart race wins

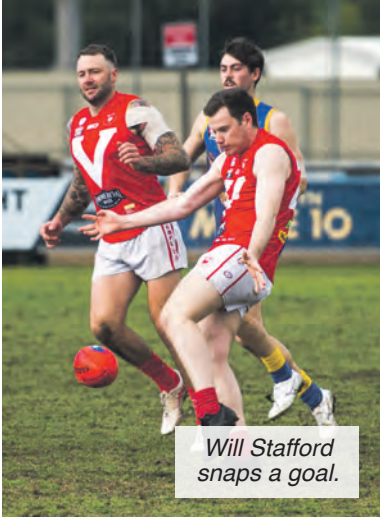

The Magpies suffered an early blow when a brave Brett Heintze had to leave the ground, and the Demons pounced.

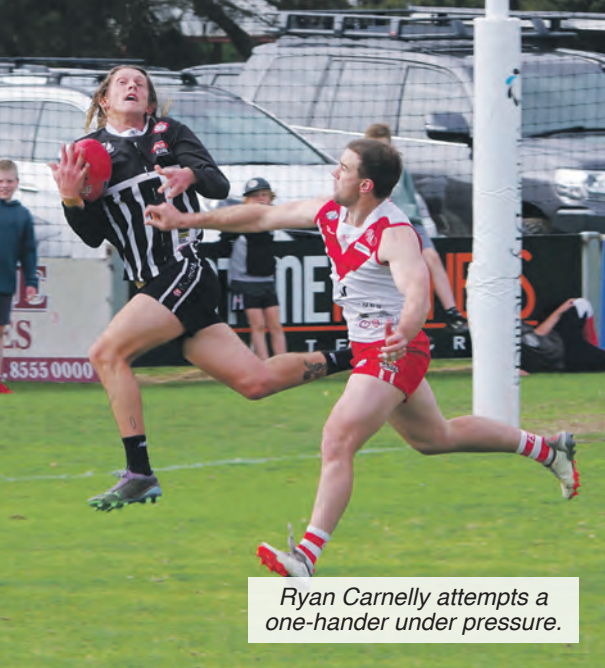
Danny Juckers led the way with 11 goals, as the Demons put in a solid and consistent effort to kick a massive 36-21, and run out winners by 197 points.

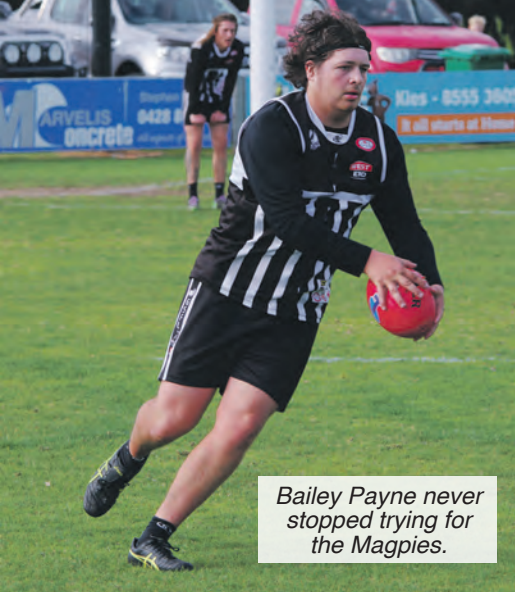

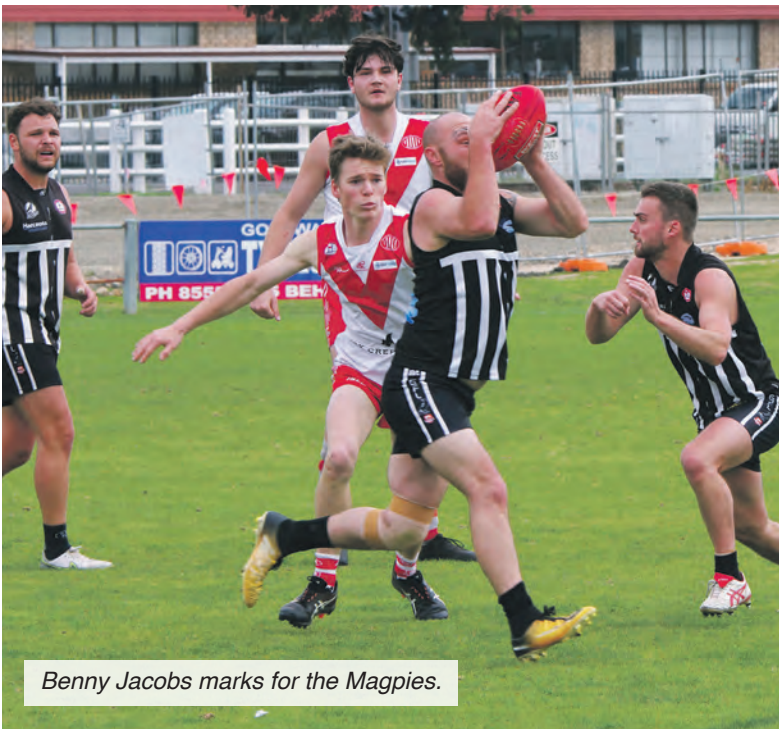

To me, this hand is both QI (Quite Interesting) and a DB (Dog's Breakfast), there are bits and pieces all over the place. Let's have a look and see in anything can be learned from it.

North deals and passes, wondering about the possibilities of the long Clubs. East is now in a good position to enter the fray with a Weak Two in Hearts. Some might argue that with 7 HCP, a pass is wiser, but that's for beginners or those without a partnership understanding about Weak Two's showing length, not strength.

After the Weak Two in Hearts, South can be a nuisance by bidding 3 Hearts, a Michaels Cue Bid showing 5-5 in the higher ranking of the un-bid suits and 6-11 HCP.

All that West can do is Double to show an interest in Hearts and hope that his Diamonds will have some defensive value.

All of a sudden, North's Hearts don't look too good, so North feels obliged to take another look at the Clubs, and pulls a desperate 3NT out of the hat and lives to regret it.

Having opened with a Weak Two, East should not bid again, so the plaster is set.

What North/South have between them is a dog's breakfast, very limited ways of crossing between the two hands and East/West laughing all the way to the score board.

On the night this was played, three pairs played in 3NT by North making 4,6 and 7 tricks, two pairs played in Diamonds by South for 7 or 8 tricks, and one pair played 3H by East making 8 tricks, the best score for N /S.

The bidding gets interesting if East opens a Multi-2 Diamonds. That means that South can no longer use a Michaels Cue Bid, so can only overcall in Spades.

West can safely bid 3H even holding just the AQ of Hearts, since clearly East has 6 Hearts or a strong No Trump, it won't matter which.

On any lead but ♠K overtaken by the ♠Ace, 3 Hearts by West should make.

What can N/S learn from this dog's breakfast? Don't think that if one partner has Spades and Diamonds, and the other has Clubs and Hearts, the 3NT is a good contract to play in!
