Wild weather wipes out **Adelaide Hills farms...** PIT-IFUL

Residents are being reminded to support local farmers after the recent wild storms that lashed South Australia left some farmers devastated by the

Many fruit producers in the Adelaide Hills lost at least 50 per cent of their fruit, while others lost entire crops, and the total damage bill could be potentially more than \$15 million.

Paris Creek Cherries lost about 70 per cent of its fruit from its 4.5-acre orchard equivalent to about \$70,000 worth.

Before the deluge of rain, which reportedly recorded about 100ml in the town within days, farmer Steve Gibbons was expecting an "absolute bumper crop".

Around May-June during pollination and the trees flowering, it was "perfect" weather conditions, and more recently,

the trees were loaded with cherries.

"We took off a tonne of cherries off one little block - one variety - and that was just one pick," Mr Gibbons said.

"I was very optimistic for a great

However, the few days of recent downpour broke the skins of many of the nearly-ripe cherries and split them open.

"I was expecting to produce five to six tonnes this year, and we're going to struggle to produce two - we may or may not cover the cost of growing them," Mr Gibbons said.


'(The rain just prior) wasn't too bad that swelled the cherries quite nicely.

"We had very minor damage from that, but this rain and humidity just destroyed everything.

"It's the life of a farmer, (wanting to) control the weather.

"It happens – all your best laid plans, you think you're going to have a great season, and suddenly it's all taken away."

Eastern Fleurieu's outstanding community service recognised

A locally-made calendar that captures the history of art and the campaign against domestic violence was recently recognised with an award.

The Premier's Community Service Harry Tillyer School Award and its \$1000 prize recognised the Expect Respect Calendar - an annual project running for about 12 years.

The calendar is produced by Eastern Fleurieu School year 6 students with support from Art Co-ordinator Paul Steele, Wellbeing Leader Heidi Yard, School Support Officer Maddie Garwood and the Zonta Club of Mount Barker.

Ms Yard's students learned about relationships and respect through workshops.

"What they learn about relationships at this age is the basis for healthy relationships as they grow older," Ms Yard explained.

"It's about the concept of expecting respect yourself and putting boundaries in place.

As well as learning about and encapsulating domestic violence campaigns, Mr Steele said the project was a good opportunity for students to learn about art history and techniques.

"The great thing about the calendar is it's a great incentive for the children to do their artwork," he said.

The Zonta Club of Mount Barker President Robyn Page was pleased to support the program, and is passionate about teaching children respect when they are young.

As announced last week, a Royal Commission will be held in South Australia to reduce and prevent domestic, family and sexual violence following five South Australian women recently dying allegedly by men known to them.

The Zonta Club of Mount Barker - which aims to empower women through service and advocacy - will make a submission calling for education around domestic violence in primary schools.

Meanwhile, student Archie McKay was one of the recipients of the Zonta Club of Mount Barker Resilience Award and a gift voucher, recognising his resilience and determination in his schoolwork.

"His teacher put him forward for his dedication to work and school life," Ms Yard explained.

"It's for someone who keeps showing up and doing their best."

A chapter came to close at the Strathalbyn Racing Club last Wednesday when Chief Executive Officer Kristy Martin officially stepped down from her role.

The prominent racing industry figure will be "taking a spell" after seven years at the helm of the club as the "time is right".

Coming into the CEO role, Ms Martin had zero racing industry experience, but learned quickly with support.

"It presented a huge challenge and many thought I was insane for taking the role on," she said.

"I envisioned potential, a committee wanting change, and an instant lack of community engagement.

"The first 12 months were enormous, but so rewarding.

"The initial focus was business improvement, however, I was very fortunate to be embraced at the time by industry professionals who were giving of their time.

"Local trainers in particular – once respect was established – shared their knowledge and wisdom with me, differing training methods, and horse welfare."

Since then, Ms Martin has spent almost a decade dedicated to improving the club facilities and generating more participation in race days.

Among her proudest achievements are winning Club of the Year, creating business relationships that are now friendships, and the removal of all metal railing on the track.

Another is securing the funding for the club wash bays, which have dramatically enhanced its operations and user safety.

"Obviously, we received a grant from Racing SA to improve the wash bays, so I spent weeks down there observing in the mornings, trying to find a better system for what they needed down there," Ms Martin said.

"What we've ended up with is four wash

bays, a sand roll, and we slipped some toilets in as well.

"It's just upgraded that area operationally and efficiently, and more so safety-wise.

"The horses don't slip, (which is) such an improvement."

She also played a pivotal role in the upgrading of the club's members area between seasons.

"We've literally between seasons have totally upgraded our members area with a nice new bar and totally opened the room up, so we're ready for larger functions," Ms Martin said.

"We would be able to hold conferences in there now.

"It's a whole new and well-needed look up there – it's amazing."

Ms Martin has also enjoyed getting to know the horses and their owners behind the scenes.

In particular, she had a fondness for David Jolly's Behemoth.

"Behemoth created a huge thrill," Ms Martin said.

"It was just so exciting at the time to have a horse of that calibre at our track, so any opportunity for media, we were in it.

"But then, in the quiet times, he was a difficult horse, so I got to know his mannerisms.

"It was a privilege."

The last race of the club's Christmas Twilight Races last Wednesday was named in Ms Martin's honour.

She thanked the community for its support over the last seven years.

"It's been an absolute privilege, and a chapter of my life I hold very dear," Ms Martin said.

"Thank you firstly to my small team, who do become a work family.

"I'll miss the interaction with trainers and jockeys, and those around the mounting yard."

Clayton Bay light trial postponed

Clayton Bay's smart lighting trial has been delayed until Wednesday due to recent storms.

The trial will commence in the Alexandrina Estate area of Pearce Road, Oakley Ave, Gilbert Street, which will have the following modified light settings and timings:

• Alexandrina Drive between Pearce Road and Gilbert Street – Main Road: On at dusk at 100 per cent power until 9.30pm before dropping down to 70 per cent at 1am then 50 per cent until off at dawn.

● Pearce Road, Oakley Ave and Gilbert Street – side streets: On at dusk at 100 per cent power until 9.30pm before dropping down to 50 per cent until 11pm then 30 per cent until off at dawn.

Throughout January 2024 residents are encouraged to provide feedback on the timings and any issues with lights not performing correctly by visiting (https://mysay.alexandrina.sa.gov.au/clayton-bay-dark-skies), so council can review and, if possible, amend settings and timings from the initial design.



Strathalbyn reserve saved by local community's voice

Overwhelming community opposition to a controversial proposal has saved a local reserve that is home to Australian wildlife, and frequented by daily walkers and horse riders from having its community land classification and being sold to a prospective buyer.

At its September meeting, Alexandrina Council invited community feedback on a proposal to revoke the community land classification of 1 (Lot 87) Stirling Court at Strathalbyn to enable its sale on the open market for rural living purposes.

But as previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Stirling Court residents gathered at the local reserve in early November to voice anger over the proposal, citing the land is frequently used for daily recreational activities, including walking and horse riding, serves as an easy access point in the event of a fire, and is a habitat for local wildlife such as kangaroos, koalas, and birds.

During the public consultation period, held between October 12 and November 3, council received 10 written submissions and 303 MySay contributions, with 92 per cent of respondents voicing opposition to the revocation and sale of the land.

Additionally, a deputation and petition were delivered to council in November further amplifying the community's backlash of the proposal.

This included a second deputation presented by local resident Tony Hixson at council's meeting on Monday night.

"I would like to thank council administration for the thorough investigation and gathering of community responses, and all those that responded with letters, emails and petitions to make their wishes known," he said.

"303 response shows the level of interest by the community, with 92 per cent objecting to the proposal.

"In summary, we simply ask councillors to listen to the wishes of the community."

However, West Ward councillor Lou Nicholson questioned when council would be able to dispose of land.

She believed elected members needed to begin making hard decisions for the benefit of the wider community.

"With the greatest respect to the residents who use this land and everybody who contributed to the public consultation, I am wondering when I read this report when we might be able to dispose of land?" Cr Nicholson said.

"I think we're always going to have opposition, and I respect it and absolutely will accept the vote, but this chamber has resolved to seek opportunities for land disposal to support the priorities and objectives of our wider community.

"We have just purchased strategic land in Strathalbyn, and I do believe that land disposal is an important part of sustainability for this council

"We know nearly every bit of land will have some opposition, and we must heavily assess the level of use and possible alternatives for uses against the broader opportunities for Alexandrina ratepayers."

Having considered the strong opposition, elected members voted against revoking the community land classification of the Strathalbyn reserve.

"When this came up, particularly not those in that ward or Strathalbyn residents were unaware of the use of the ground, and it appeared on surface it could be a saleable block," West Ward councillor, Michael Scott, said.

"I've had some very constructive communication with those that know more about it than I do, and I'm very happy to second this and that we not proceed with selling it.

"It's obviously used and appreciated, and it belongs to the community and therefore, the community can retain it as far as I'm concerned."

Council was united, however, in revoking the community land classification for a different Strathalbyn land parcel – Lot 9 Rankine Street.

At council's October meeting, public consultation was launched on a proposal to revoke the community land classification at a small portion of the reserve on the site that's physically separated from the remainder of the park by a steep embankment during which council received 10 MySay contributions – 60 per cent in support of the proposal.

As such the proposal was supported by councillors and it was determined to apply for a community land revocation, so it could be sold to the adjacent land owner for amalgamation into their existing certificate of titles.

"Absolutely we should sell this parcel of land," North Ward councillor, Craig Maidment, said.

"Its land-locked in any case, it's on a downward slope to the river, and people were saying they would need access from the park up through Rankine Street – well you would have to traverse private property to do that and pass through this particular parcel of land.

"This particular title has no relevance today and it would be better utilised in the hands... of the person (who) will incorporate that into the major title.

"Good luck to him if he wants to develop that site for another purpose because it lends itself to great retail space in the centre of town".

Minister for Planning Nick Champion will review council's process and assess the merits of the proposal for his approval.

A final report will be brought back to council to endorse the revocation or otherwise.

Protect Goolwa's dunes this Christmas

A local security company is reminding beach-goers that driving on the Goolwa Beach dunes is prohibited after a "horrendous" Christmas season last year.

On behalf of SA Water, Great Southern Security is contracted to ensure drivers stay off the dunes, which has fragile ecosystems, can erode, and has cultural significance for Indigenous peoples.

"This time last year and New Year's Eve was just horrendous," Great Southern Security owner, Ian Haylock, said.

"They would come down here (in) groups of four-wheel drives, camp, and there was one-and-a-half trailer loads of litter left behind.

"(During) holidays, people... want to get their four-wheel drives into the dunes and they destroy all this vegetation.

"We all care about the dunes and the survival of the vegetation, and not seeing the beach damaged, so that it's here for many generations to enjoy."

As well as being a home to a number of rare and endangered bird and plant species, the dunes are also a burial ground for Indigenous peoples.

Senior security officer Roger Richards, who is an Elder from the Ngarrindjeri/Ramindjeri and Adnyamathanha or Flinders Ranges peoples, educates the public about the dunes' history.

Shell middens can be found on the dunes, which are a collection of shellfish that have been burned over thousands of years, and Mr Richards said where middens are found, there has been burials.

"That's one thing a lot of people don't understand about Goolwa Beach – the main area is an Aboriginal burial ground traditionally, and there's a history of 25 to 30,000 years," Mr Richards said.

"We've carbon-dated the middens back particularly during busy days.

to as far as nine to 14,000 years – it goes way, way, way back... it's pretty hard to fathom that amount of time.

"My family has been buried up there, and it means a lot to me personally.

"If you're going to walk around, just be mindful of where you tread."

As well as being harmful to the area, driving on the dunes can be unsafe for vehicles, as they erode from wind and water over time.

"You could drop off the dune and roll or be driving along and the whole thing would collapse on you," Mr Richards said.

"It's wild country and we want to help (people) be safe – that's one of our core objectives."

As well as taking caution around the dunes, the officers advise to pick up rubbish, swim between Goolwa Surf Life Saving Club's flags during patrolled hours, and drive to the newly-changed speed limits.

From the start of this month, the speed limit on South Australian beaches was reduced from 100km/h to 40 km/h and 25km/h within 50 metres of a pedestrian unless otherwise signposted, following a review earlier this year.

The change in law was welcomed by Mr Haylock, who previously was concerned particularly during busy days.

Obstetric service closure reduced

The suspension of obstetric services at Victor Harbor's South Coast District Hospital over the Christmas and New Year period has been reduced after local anaesthetists were sourced to cover shifts.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, concerns were raised after it was revealed the service at the local hospital, which is frequented by Goolwa expectant mums, would be suspended from December 11 to 18 as well as December 25 to January 3 after experiencing a short-term unexpected gap in the roster of an anaesthetist.

However, the closure period has since been reduced to four days from December 24 to 27 after shifts were covered by local anaesthetists.

"All expectant mothers are advised to present to Mount Barker District Solders' Memorial Hospital during this time in case further anaesthetic care is needed," Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network Interim CEO, Bronwyn Masters, said.

"All expectant mothers have been contacted about this change."



Donations flood in for Goolwa business' 'pay it forward' scheme

Locals have gathered together to take the pressure off people doing it tough this festive season by donating in droves to a Goolwa business' new 'pay it forward' scheme.

Heritage Pies and Pastries recently started the initiative, which is centred around giving back to those in need by paying for a bakery item, whether it be a coffee or chocolate donut, and leaving a voucher on the pin-up board indoors for them to redeem.

The idea came from local Alexandra Goudge who had seen the scheme being used in Melbourne, and believed it would have the same success in a small town like Goolwa.

"I remember seeing it in a small shop in Melbourne near the railway station, and I thought 'that's an absolutely brilliant idea," she said

"The motivation (was) laying in bed at night thinking what can we do on a macro scale – you can't do anything – so maybe there's something you can do on a micro scale.

"I think I was walking towards Jack's (Place Café) and I thought 'that's silly because (Heritage Pies and Pastries) is the hub really, so I came and saw Josh and suggested the idea and (he) said 'yes, 100 per cent', and there we were."

For owner Josh Jones, it was a no-brainer. He believed the 'pay it forward' scheme was a great way to give back to the community, and particularly those residents that support the business.

"We are so community-minded me and Kym, and that stems from the previous owners," Mr Jones said.

"We're the village bakers, so if you look at it as a village, the bakers provide food for the village and that's us.

"You walk in and people in the morning are not only coming here and having their



morning coffee, they're having their morning coffee with us.

"We're just one big family, and me and Kym just love giving back.

"Without everybody that walks through this door, we don't have a shop."

This isn't the first time the bakery has given back to the community.

The business previously had a 'pay it forward jar' where the tips people would donate to the staff would be used for anyone who may be short-changed.

The team also does 'Workplace Wednesday' where they donate lunch to a business located between Goolwa to Victor Harbor at random each Wednesday.

But since the new pay it forward scheme's implementation almost a fortnight ago, it has "gone bananas".

Hundreds have paid it forward to the point the vouchers have had to be gifted to notfor-profits and other businesses who help the community such as Junction and the Op Shop in order to get them all distributed. "There's been that much of a response, we've had to run the vouchers out because they're sitting up there and nobody is taking them," Mr Jones said.

"This is all about giving back to people, especially at this time of the year.

"Everybody has had those tough moments in their life, where you just go 'if only somebody was kind enough to help out'... but I think this is the real hard time of the year.

"I've done it tough over Christmases and to just have people that want to actually do this, is amazing."

One person even recently donated \$250 towards the scheme.

Mr Jones was brought to tears by people's generosity.

"We had a bloke come in... (who) runs his own business and he said I want to donate \$250," he said.

"He said I don't care what you put it in, but I want to donate \$250 and I'm going, 'are you sure you want to donate that much? Honestly you don't have to'.

"He goes 'look, my business has had a really good year and somebody out there is doing worse than me; I want to give back to them."

"I had goosebumps.

"That a small town would just get on something like this and want to help people I think is really special and makes Goolwa (what it is)."

The problem for the business now is getting people to accept the vouchers.

"I don't know quite how we can convince some people it's okay to come through a door and walk up to a board, and take it," Mrs Goudge said.

"The idea of having that was they don't have to articulate anything, all they have to do is take the voucher, go to the counter, then they can walk out again."

Mr Jones encouraged people to take the pressure off themselves and grab one of the vouchers.

He emphasised no questions are asked, nor judgement given.

"We're a family and we have lots of conversations with our regular customers, so we know who's struggling at times and we can say 'look man, don't pay for your coffee today, go get one off the board," Mr Jones said.

"There's a lot of the older community that come in (who are) on a pension and gone through most of their super by now, and we can tell when they're struggling and just coming in for a treat, so I've said to the staff these are the guys you want to look out for.

"We just want to promote that it's okay to take something – don't feel like you can't... and when you can, just pay it back when you feel like it.

"Hopefully more people start to come around to the idea, but I just think it's because it's that time of the year, everybody is like 'let's give' which is fantastic, but at the same time, we also want (the vouchers) to be used."

The scheme will now be a permanent fixture of the business.



Top honour for Tyndale student

"It's an awesome result, and it's very well-deserved for her," he said.

"As a school, we've got better at working out what a kid's definition of success is, and we've got the expertise to be able to get them (there)," Mr Taylor said.

Give a gift and arrive alive this festive season

Give the best gift this festive season and arrive at your destination safely is the message first responders are delivering ahead of the Christmas and New Year period.

The Hills Fleurieu region recorded from January 1 to December 18 this year 14 fatalities, primarily due to dangerous driving followed by speeding, 110 serious injuries, and more than 1000 crashes, mainly rear-enders followed by leaving the road out of control.

Ahead of the holiday period, South Australia Police will be targeting the 'Fatal Five' factors - drink and drug driving, distraction, speeding and failing to wearing a seatbelt – that contribute to road trauma not only in the region, but across the state, with Operation Safe Holidays.

Hills Fleurieu Operations Manager Inspector Michael Sampson said SAPOL members will be working day and night during the festive season keeping the roads safe.

"109 people have lost their lives this year and 809 people have had their lives changed by serious injuries from a crash on the road this year," he said.

"The holiday season creates an increase in risk of road trauma as people engage in festivities involving alcohol and travel long distances on holidays.

"This season I urge all road users to drive carefully, and ensure you make it to your destination safely.

"Drive with care for yourself and others, follow the road rules, observe the speed limit wherever you drive, take breaks from driving on long distance travel, and remember that drink and drug driving is not just selfish, it's illegal and you have other options."

RAA Senior Manager Safety and Infrastructure Charles Mountain had the same message.

He urged drivers to be vigilant, and leave extra time for their journeys during the

"While school and work begins to wind down for thousands of South Aussies over the Christmas/New Year period, we can't take a holiday from driving safely and looking after one another on our roads," Mr Mountain said.

"No one ever wants to lose a loved one, and especially not over the Christmas break, which should be a happy time of celebrating

with friends and family."

"Single vehicle run-off-road crashes occurring in regional areas may be due to drivers travelling on unfamiliar roads, and potentially at excessive speeds or under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

"The leading 'Fatal Five' causes of road trauma are distraction, speeding, driving under the influence, not wearing a seatbelt and dangerous driving – all things some of us may be tempted to do during the festive season.

"Taking simple steps like leaving a few

minutes earlier, having a passenger navigate and control the music for you, or organising a taxi or uber ahead of time can reduce this temptation and your risk of being involved

Mr Mountain also encouraged parents to have a conversation about road safety with their children before heading away, especially if there were young drivers in their family.

"Crash data shows P1 drivers are involved in six times the number of crashes compared with supervised learner drivers, so it's vital to do more than the bare minimum required before you get your provisional licence," he said.

"We recommend talking to your friends and family about the responsibility that comes with being behind the wheel and sharing the road with others.

"When you're driving, always drive to the conditions and be extra careful to look out for vulnerable road users such as pedestrians and cyclists, as there will be more of them on our roads during the school holidays and in the warmer weather.

"We're pleading with drivers to slow down and potentially save a life this summer."

Plans revealed for Angas Mill

A dynamic shop, cafe, gallery, community and event space and upper terrace has been proposed for the Strathalbyn's historic Old Angas Flour Mill.

The recently revealed plans aim to breathe new life into the building in the heart of the town centre by honouring and preserving its history, while improving the accessibility and user services.

If approved by the Fleurieu Regional Assessment Panel, the gallery space would be "ever-changing", while a digital art presentation would be projected on the external wall, and various activities planned throughout the week.

The redeveloped garden that leads down towards the creek is set back from the street and forms a public forecourt, and is envisioned to mirror and extend Soldiers Memorial Gardens.

Visitors would be able to learn and engage with historical stories and artefacts from the Mill as original machinery is used in interpretative displays.

New owners Jessica and Ray Groot hope local residents will want to use and engage with the space regularly, while out-of-towners will find it a destination to travel to.

Being from rural towns themselves, the pair are passionate about the difference a landmark building in the centre of town can make to a community, and the potential to get involved in public events.

"I think there's something really powerful in making sure old buildings tell their stories again," Ms Groot said.

"They can't if they're falling apart, buildings need to be lived in... people will

be using it and I think that's really important. "You want to be able to see and experience

the things that are in history books."
Since the plans became public, Ms Groot has found "really supportive" feedback.

"Everyone has sent us super lovely messages, and that's really nice to know they're engaged and looking forward," she said.

As part of the plans, partial demolition, conservation work and refurbishment of the existing building is required with some of the materials of the building reused and repurposed.

So far, urgent conservation work has been completed by Stone Ideas and Christian

Frenzel as the Master Mason.

Two types of stones have been sourced for the building – a bluestone sourced from the Adelaide Hills that is used as infill on walls, and a pink-veined sandstone which matches the original colour.

The project has engaged Melbourne-based architect Topology Studio, however, it is being led by two South Australian locals.

During conservation works, a list of inscribed names was discovered on a wall, which were marked before they were deployed in World War II.

With help from an RSL, the individual people and their stories are being researched.

"Now we're in the process of capturing some of their war stories that could be presented as another element of history, as well as what happened to them when they got home and where they ended up in the community and in the region," Ms Groot said.

"Some were tricky to find, some were on service records from other towns such as Milang and further afield, (but) we'll track them and bring their stories home.

"That's important to us because Ray and I are both military veterans, so it's a real connection for us to be able to retell those stories."

With next year's budget already in the making, something must be done to ease the rates pressure on Alexandrina residents – council must rein in its spending.

It also requires those services be resourced and expanded to deal with an influx of people.

Something as simple as getting the waste management systems right is vital.

In a beautiful seaside regional community like Goolwa, poor planning will lead to pollution and environmental degradation, further diminishing the overall well-being of the community.

Country South Australia is a wonderful place to live and is fast becoming popular.

Our regional communities want to grow, but they want to grow sustainably with adequately resourced infrastructure, and they want to have a say in long term solutions.

The State Government must ensure they are listening to regional South Australia.

After all, how can the community trust this change if they have been excluded and silenced in their hometown?

Rental relief

Rotary Club of Goolwa President Jan Lawrence received "really good" feedback.


"People enjoyed it," she said. "We had fabulous weather - we couldn't

Students donate to local pantry

After collecting donations for weeks, Macclesfield Primary School students recently delivered bags of food to the town's community pantry along with baked morning tea for its volunteers.

The donation comes after the students were visited by Macclesfield Community Pantry co-ordinator Hannah Jewell who explained about the non-profit organisation that currently supports about 30 households.

The weekly pantry opened

earlier this year at the Macclesfield Institute on Monday mornings to offer food aid, social connection and support services to the community.

'We explained why we do it, what volunteering is about, and why we started the pantry, which is because we saw a need in the community to support those who needed a helping hand," Ms Jewell said.

Mt Barker Master Plan revised for centre project

Revised master plan designs for the first stage of Mount Barker's City Centre Project will incorporate community feedback such as less parking and more open space.

The project, which will transform the long-time vacant site bounded by Hutchinson Street, Morphett Street, Stephen Street and Druids Avenue, aims to provide a catalytic impact on the local economy and fulfil the need for a central community gathering space in town.

The first stage will deliver a town square, council and Community Living Australia offices and a retail section, with two levels of substantial parking to service the site incorporating entry from Hutchinson and Stephen Streets.

Based on the latest community feedback and detailed feasibility studies, Mount Barker District Council and Burke Urban Investments (BUI) have revised the master plan, with adjustments eliminating an initial proposal for underground and multilevel parking and reduced building heights.

Council's civic building will

also be council-owned rather than leased from BUI.

BUI Director Kym Burke said the plan's natural evolution was influenced by community feedback and sitespecific challenges.

"We've responded to the community's voice on several fronts, including reducing building heights, consolidating parking within the site, committing to the preservation of Druids Avenue's trees, and scrapping the planned multi-deck carpark," he said.

To support the project's progression, council has updated its engagement plan and anticipates engaging with residents next year on the community facilities and final design of the town square.

A community reference group for the project is also expected to be established.

Mount Barker Mayor David Leach expressed confidence in the ongoing community engagement and interim introduction of a temporary 'pop-up park' as a foundational step towards the project's completion.



A Strathalbyn car dealer has a goal of filling a unique Mini trailer with donations to support people experiencing food insecurity for Christmas.

"Everyone talks about the cost of living and we know the pressures, so this is our small contribution to giving back to South Australians," Collectable Classic Cars Managing Director, Ben Finnis, said.

"With Foodbank, last year they obviously needed help, but this year, with the cost of living, they have so many people who they

would not normally see.

"I think Foodbank is an amazing charity." Australia is in the midst of a food security crisis, according to a Foodbank report, which found 3.7 million Australian households, or 36 per cent, have experienced moderate-tosevere food insecurity in the last 12 months.

Many are experiencing food insecurity for the first time, with a three per cent increase to 2022 or 383,000 homes.

Further to that, 48 per cent of the general population now feels anxious or struggles to consistently access adequate food.

This is the second year Mr Finnis has organised the drive of a range of items such as non-perishable food and washing products.

Mr Finnis has found the community to give generously.

"Strathalbyn people are fantastic – they're really beautiful people," he said.

"I have some amazing clients... the local businesses and local people have been fantastic.

"South Australians in general – when there are floods, bushfires or something happens -South Australians are an amazing bunch of people who get behind stuff and support it."

Collectable Classic Cars is also donating \$50 for every car sold during December to Foodbank.

Donations can be dropped off to Collectable Classic Cars on Rankine Street, and will be towed to Foodbank tomorrow, December 22, however, another donation will be made in the new year.

How to take care of waste over Christmas

To help households, businesses and visitors during the summer peak and holiday season, the Fleurieu Regional Waste Authority (FRWA) and councils provide weekly collections of yellow recycling and green FOGO bins between Monday, December 18 and Friday, January 26.

Extra paid collections are available through FRWA or exceptional circumstances (EC) bins are available for eligible households (e.g. medical waste, families with children in nappies etc.) by applying through council.

Due to Christmas Day, all collections between December 26 to 30 December will be one day later:

- •Monday collection: Tuesday, December 26. Tuesday collection: Wednesday,
- December 27. Wednesday collection: Thursday, December 28.
- ●Thursday collection: Friday, December 29. •Friday collection: Saturday, December 30. Waste collections occur on public holidays,

except Christmas Day.

Waste and Recycling Depots are closed on public holidays and will close early on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve (9am to 1pm)

Langhorne Creek rural (not town), Ashbourne, Woodchester, Paris Creek and surrounds

During the weeks all three bins will be collected, plus Christmas week - recycling only, collections will occur on Saturdays -December 23, December 30 (recycling only), January 6 and January 20.


This collection run includes Salem, Hartley, Mount Observation, Woodlands, Gemmells, Highland Valley, Red Creek and Bletchley.

Two bin recycling weeks (yellow/green) will occur on the usual Friday – January 12 and January 26.

YouTube pair tackle momentous bike ride for mental health

Three "normal, everyday" men will battle both body and mind in one of their biggest challenges yet when they cycle from Goolwa to Mount Gambier, starting next Thursday, to raise money for mental health, while also showcasing the state's backyard.

Youtube channel Bunyip Adventures' Jason Moore and Jamie Ramzan along with Mr Moore's brother-in-law Aaron will be taking part in a fourday, 500km journey from one part of the state to the other to not only raise awareness about mental health and the support that needs to go with it, but money for the organisation Talk Out Loud.

Talk Out Loud was founded by Mary Galouzis in 2016, who after experiencing the suicide of her teenage brother, vowed to create spaces for young people to safe, connected, find their voice and share their story.

The not-for-profit has provided much-need support for young people at risk with services that fill the gap between initial diagnosis and what can sometimes be a long and anxious wait for treatment through the mental healthcare system.

Mr Moore already had connections with the organisation's founder through being a mental health counsellor and his past life as magician, and knew Talk Out Loud would be the perfect charity to support.

"Jamie and I do a YouTube channel where we do challenges, and it's about pushing yourself out your comfort zone," he said.

"There was another creator (who) cycled around Japan raising money for a different charity, and I was like... 'What if we did a cycle for mental health?', then we can showcase some of beautiful SA as well.

"That's when we went, 'we need two good locations to ride from A to B'.

"We don't really want to start from my place then ride down to a random location, so we came up with the locations of Goolwa and Mount



Gambier because they're two iconic and really beautiful places here in SA.

"When we were looking for a charity to support, we definitely wanted to support local and went over (to Talk Out Loud), had a chat to them, asked if they would be okay with us representing them, and going out and hopefully make a bit of money for them, and they were over the moon to have us support them."

The team has been preparing for the monumental trek since late last year.

"I know how to ride a bike, but there's a big difference between knowing how to ride a bike and cycling 500km in summer, so I have been doing a fair bit of training," Mr Moore said.

"It's still definitely going to be a challenge because I'm still not a pro, but that's the whole point – this is about your everyday person seeing what they can do, seeing some beautiful locations along the way, and seeing If you can maintain that mindset to enjoy the locations while you're suffering through some very hot weather, sore legs and stiff joints.

"Myself, there's always that doubt in the back of your mind, is my body and mind going to be able to put up with this doing over 100kms each day in summer? You've kind of just got to tell that to shut up and push on through, and keeping one pedal at a time."

Due to medical reasons, Mr Ramzan will be participating in the cycle in a reduced capacity, riding on an e-bike at points and interviewing the locals along the way, which will be featured in a four-part mini-series on the pair's YouTube channel as well as a five-part documentary about tourism in South Australia and raising mental health awareness.

The Youtube series will be released around February and March, while the documentary will come in late 2024.

"Originally, I was going to be riding with Jason and Aaron, his brother-in-law who's a semi-pro cyclist, and up until the last minute, I went to the doctor and (he) went 'no' when I told him what I was doing," Mr Ramzan said.

"He said 'you're going to have to rethink your role in that', which actually worked out better.

"Jason and Aaron have been clocking up a lot of kms on the bikes to physically and mentally get prepped for this, so I hadn't done as much prep myself, which was also kind of the way we wanted to attack this

"I've had a lot of family members suffer with mental health illnesses, and I myself have gone through PTSD, anxiety and depression, and it was about building resilience and pushing ourselves through things you really don't want to be doing or getting out of your comfort zone.

"This is as a whole has been one way preparation for us to go out and do something out of our comfort zone, but also to illustrate to others the importance of pushing through and making sure you're still achieving goals even though you've got something in the background that's got reins on you and is trying to tie you down."

The journey will kickstart with a send-off by Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes at Goolwa's Richard Ballard Park from 8.15am on December 28, and end in time for the start of Mount Gambier's New Year's Eve celebrations on the morning of December 31.

The pair thanked everyone who has either directly donated to the cause, or assisted in the journey in any way.

They invited people to come say hello along the journey or simply share the message.

"The amount of people that have come and put forward to this has been absolutely unbelievable," Mr Ramzan said.

"I think this is has been a great example to illustrate what living with a mental illness is like not only for the person, but the people that have to play a support role, and how important it is to have support around you when you're suffering.

"I know from my own personal problems I had, having an amazing support network around me really helped me push through the hardest times.

"In this instance, Jason and Aaron pushing through some super hard weather – because we know what Australian summers are like – and for us to play a support role as a group of people is super important to let everyone see that.

"Mental health is no joke, and we've been very fortunate it has become a more talked about thing since I was a kid back in the '80s when it was kind of 'bare it and grin it', and that didn't do anyone any good.

"Fortunately, now it's such a spoken about thing, there are support services, and people are a lot more understanding of it."

Council review to investigate potential speed reductions

A speed limit review is planned for Strathalbyn over the coming months to determine the merits of lowering speed limits and signage to 40km/h at town entry points after a local councillor expressed fears over pedestrian safety.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, North Ward councillor Craig Maidment revealed plans to seek Alexandrina Council endorsement to restrict town speed limits to 40km with new developments and increasing truck numbers posing a heightened risk to pedestrians.

In his motion delivered at Monday night's council meeting, he emphasised the danger around school zones.

"Strathalbyn has an increasing population, an increasing number of people with mobility scooters, and an ever-increasing number of heavy vehicles passing through town and the shopping precinct," Cr Maidment said.

"Strathalbyn is on the B-Double route and trucks traverse South Terrace continuously throughout the day, (which) have no ability to stop suddenly if a pedestrian or disabled person on a gopher was crossing the road.

"South Terrace and East Terrace are both DIT Roads and home to three schools with a student population of over 1500 students.

"School drop-off and pick-up are particularly busy times on these roads and, with the addition of school buses at those times, traffic is very congested.

"Additionally, several new subdivisions under construction will direct traffic from those areas along South Terrace, compounding traffic issues."

Other areas of concern highlighted at the meeting were East Terrace, West Terrace and North Parade.

It was decided a speed limit review would be conducted and a traffic statement carried out with the view of lowering the traffic speed from 50km/h to 40km/h.





Local fishers are reaping the benefits of pipis high spawning rate over the past few years.

Fisher Darren Hoad has found it "unbelievable" how local pipis have spawned "non-stop" for the past three years.

"Now they've grown to pretty good-sized pipis and we're reaping that reward now," he said.

He credits this to recent floods and fishing quotas, but over his 45 years in the field, has found their population sizes cyclical.

Mr Hoad remembers finding none on the beach during a drought, but then a few years later, they were "as thick as anything".

He joins the family business Hoad Fisheries with his brother and two nephews, typically working out of the Mundoo Channel.

Being uniquely positioned at the Murray Mouth, Mr Hoad believes the local area is the best spot in Australia to fish for pipis.

His family business is a shareholder and one of the harvest crews for Goolwa Pipi Co.

Hand harvesting allows the fishers to feel connected to the pipis, be mindful of their sustainable impact, and honour long-held local traditions.

In Ngarrindjeri, pipis are called kuti and have been harvested from the Coorong for

"There's no real secret to it - just feel around in the sand," Mr Hoad advised recreational fishers.

"The best way to find them, if you don't know what you're looking for, is feel with your feet and you'll feel them just under the sand."

The family behind Hoad Fisheries have had a strong few years of pipi harvesting. INSET: Hoad Fisheries follows hand harvesting techniques to catch pipis.

The legal length for pipis is 3.5cm, which is typically when they are 13-months-old and sexually mature, and they can grow to 5cm, with the biggest Mr Hoad has ever seen at 7cm.

Typically, their lifespan is quoted at five years, however, after spending years on the beach and seeing them grow over time, Mr Hoad believes it's closer to seven or eight years.



Residents are being reminded to support local farmers after the recent wild storms that lashed South Australia left some farmers devastated by the impact.

Many fruit producers in the Adelaide Hills lost at least 50 per cent of their fruit, while others lost entire crops, and the total damage bill could be potentially more than \$15 million.

Paris Creek Cherries lost about 70 per cent of its fruit from its 4.5-acre orchard – equivalent to about \$70,000 worth.

Before the deluge of rain, which reportedly recorded about 100ml in the town within days, farmer Steve Gibbons was expecting an "absolute bumper crop".

Around May-June during pollination and the trees flowering, it was "perfect" weather conditions, and more recently, the trees were loaded with cherries.

"We took off a tonne of cherries off one little block – one variety – and that was just one pick," Mr Gibbons said.

"I was very optimistic for a great season." However, the few days of recent downpour broke the skins of many of the nearly-ripe cherries and split them open.

"I was expecting to produce five to six tonnes this year, and we're going to struggle to produce two – we may or may not cover the cost of growing them," Mr Gibbons said.

"(The rain just prior) wasn't too bad – that swelled the cherries quite nicely.

"We had very minor damage from that, but this rain and humidity just destroyed everything.

"It's the life of a farmer, (wanting to) control the weather.

"It happens – all your best laid plans, you think you're going to have a great season, and suddenly it's all taken away."

State Opposition Leader David Speirs is calling on the State Government to provide financial assistance to fruit producers after the storms or to fund a marketing campaign to encourage South Australians to buy imperfect fruit.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven believes that while severe weather reduced harvest of local cherries, a "sufficient supply" will still be available for Christmas.

"We're encouraging all South Australians to show our primary producers and farmers across the state we're supporting them and their families by buying local produce this Christmas season," she said.

Harvest was about 10 days earlier than last year, and with typical conditions, Mr Gibbons expects to sell cherries from the middle of December through to a week into the new year.

Mr Gibbons moved to the Paris Creek farm two years ago from Tasmania with his wife, and grows three varieties of cherries and runs a small flock of sheep.

The team sort and pack cherries at their Bull Creek Road shopfront where cherries

are sold to the public.

Work is needed on the orchard on and off for most of the year, including pruning, spraying trees and monitoring pests such as cherry slugs.

Meanwhile, other farmers in the region may have been impacted by the rain, something wheat farmer Brett Phillips will discover during harvest.

Before the bad weather, he harvested some cereals, but still has about 250 hectares left to work on.

"The days after (storms), the humidity and the drizzly conditions probably cause the most problems," he said.

"(The rain can) make it grow in the head or try to shoot and it loses quality that way, because if you want milling wheat, you can't have it sprouted – it's got to be dry, sound grain."

So, if wheat is damaged, it may be

downgraded to possibly feed grain.

Local grape growers generally faired okay through the storms, as they are often prepared for rain.

Langhorne Creek Grape and Wine Inc Executive Officer Lian Jaensch believes the main impact could be heightened disease pressure, but most growers should be okay as they have spray programs in place.

"Powdery mildew can be an issue... you can get leaf damage, but only if it's really severe and that can affect things down the track, so fingers crossed we're okay," she said.

"People in the industry are pretty wellversed on spray programs to manage (powdery mildew) if it looks like it'll be a wetter year.

"Our berries are quite small, green and hard, so the rain hasn't impacted (splitting skin)."

Dean and Jane Hourigan moved to Strathalbyn 31 years ago to raise their

These days, the children have all grown up and the couple have turned their attention to breeding Clydesdale and Clydesdalecross horses.

"I have always wanted a horse and wanted

"I don't ride anymore now, but it was always a childhood dream to have a horse, and now I have 33.

"Dean and I have both had a love for Clydesdales, and as we have got more into we would like to continue with.

"We just love their personality – they are very trainable, and they really are just big gentle giants."

While Clydesdales have different blood lines, the Hourigans are pursuing the Scottish one.

"First of all, they are big, as a general rule," Mrs Hourigan said.

"The traditional Clydesdale tends to have a bay coat, and they usually have a beautiful personality, and you can train them for riding, eventing (if crossed), and of course, your carriage and harness, which is what a lot of people like to do with them.

"As I said, we don't ride anymore now, but there are a couple that I might earmark later on to do some long reining, and possibly a carriage that I don't have at the moment, but I would be keen to have a think about.

"But at this stage, we just really do the breeding, and each year our breeding seems to be improving with colour, eye colour, and personality standards."

Clydesdales can grow to 17 hands high, which is about 1.75m, but despite their size, the Hourigans feel completely safe in their

company. "The foals will come up to you, even at a couple of days old," Mr Hourigan said.

"They will come up and let you have a pat, and lift their feet.

Mrs Hourigan agreed.

"My grand-daughter Ava is six, and I would take her out there and I would feel completely safe that she could wander around with them," she said.

"I have a two-and-a-half year-old grand daughter who loves to pat them.

"They (both) have got favourite horses and they touch them, and interact with them.

"If I had a hint of fear, I would not allow that, but because they are so gentle with them, why not?"

Raising a Clydesdale or a Clydesdalecross, however, is not an easy task.

"Feeding is the big thing, and certainly training them," Mrs Hourigan said.

"I am very pedantic about training my foals... we imprint when they are delivered, so we have a foal guard on which is connected to an alarm system in the house.

"That way when we think the mares are getting close we bring them down to the house, put our foal guard on and be there at the delivery.

getting close we bring them down to the house, put our foal guard on, and be there at the delivery.

"It is important, we believe, that the foals are touched and hear our voices, and we interact with them."

The close bond continues until they are sold or a decision has been made to keep them.

"(Even) as time progresses, if I call out into the paddock, their ears go up, and it is like they have remembered that voice right from an early age," Mrs Hourigan said.

"They imprint with their parents and stuff, so I think it is very important to do that."

Along with getting the feeding right for the horses to maintain their weight, comes care for the Clydesdale's "feathered" hooves.

"Because they have got very hairy feet, in the winter we tend to coat them with a bit of pig oil, just to stop them from getting any mites or anything," Mrs Hourigan said.

"We don't really like using chemicals, but if we have to make sure their feathers are not invaded with insects and stuff, that is what we do."

Meanwhile, in summer those with white faces will have a fly mask put on.

The Hourigans' have sold their horses, both

pure bred and crosses, throughout Australia.

"We have sold to WA and to the NT, Victoria and Queensland, and they have done exceptionally well," Mrs Hourigan said.

"We usually wean them at about sixmonths-old, and sometimes if they are going to be on a long trip, we will keep them a bit longer and feed them up with a lot of protein so that they put on muscle, so that for their trip, they are in good condition."

While Clydesdales might be large, they can still be ridden, especially if they are crossed with a sport horse.

"The Clydie-cross, as they call them, is very sought after nowadays for eventing because they have the Clydesdale bone structure and the endurance, but they might have the swiftness of the other breed that you put over them like a quarter horse," Mrs Hourigan said.

"We do have crosses, and yes, they are very fast, and that is really what the crosses are sort after for - for eventing, hunting and dressage."

Woolren Clydesdale and Drum Horse Stud is situated just out of Strathalbyn on Callington Road, and the Hourigans are proud of their family business.

"Jane and I run it, obviously, but the kids



are always available if we need a helping hand," Mr Hourigan said.

"We are backed up by a master farrier – a

very good vet - and if we need transport, we have a local transport company that will take our horses around Australia for us."


















Eastern Falcons Cricket Club - Round 10



The club also acknowledged the recent passing of avid racing supporter and horse owner Stephen Vaninetti aka





A Bid Outside The System By John Elliott

I was sitting North and was not sure what to do when East opened 1C and my partner overcalled 1 Spade. West could have bid 1NT but chose to pass. We were Vulnerable and although I had only7 High Card Points, I thought we might get some value out of my 7-card Diamond suit, but my partner only over-called, which normally shows a single suited hand with 10 - 17 HCP. Responding to an overcall with a change of suit is a strong and forcing bid, which I did not qualify for, so I passed.

The next thing that happened was that East bid 1NT, which should have promised 12-14 HCP, so that was probably where East wanted to be in the first place, but lacked the HCP for an opening 1NT. My partner passed, which is correct for an overcall, no re-bid is promised. West also passed,

My partner also passed, as did West, so I now had another look at my 7-card Diamond suit. I was in the Balancing Position, if I passed, the auction was all over, so I now put in a bid of 2D, hoping that my partner would not bid again. The problem was, that this bid of mine was not defined in our system, and my partner did not realise what I was trying to say. The fact that I had previously passed and made a bid from the balancing position did not register. Back came a bid of 2H, which was passed out. 7 tricks, one down for a score of 100 to the opposition.

The hand record sheet showed that 2 Diamonds was a viable bid for 8 tricks and 2H was only destined to make 7, as did we. E/W can make 8 tricks in 1NT for a score of 120.

What can we take away from this story? There are two things I can think of, one is that you should always stick to your system, and the second is that no system covers every single situation and sometimes you improvise in order to play good Bridge. On this, we had to agree to disagree

Save our ED



A petition to re-activate the Strathalbyn Hospital Emergency Department (ED) has been launched by a local MP on the third-year anniversary of its 'temporary closure'.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the local ED was 'temporarily closed' in 2020 in response to the COVID pandemic, and has since been unable to re-open due to alleged 'workforce challenges'.

A working group comprised of local clinicians, SA Ambulance Service, and members of the Strathalbyn community and nearby regions was tasked with re-opening the facility in October 2022, but five months on, the ED's doors remain shut.

Sudden closure

Blindsided parents, staff and community members came together on Sunday afternoon to deliberate Strathalbyn Children's Centre's sudden closure.

The local childcare centre ceased trading from 6pm on Friday due to alleged financial reasons, giving staff and parents "no warning".

The not-for-profit incorporated association is located on Burkett Dr, Strathalbyn, and cared for an estimated 65 children.

Pecked apart



A YEAR IN REVIEW DECEMBER

Strathalbyn courts re-open



A whole-of-community effort to revive a deteriorating town asset came to fruition last Thursday when the newly upgraded Strathalbyn tennis and netball courts were officially opened in front of local club members and guests.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the Strathalbyn Oval Controlling Committee (SOCC) Incorporated was granted \$293,000 through the 2022- 23 Community Recreation and Sport Facilities Program – which was matched by the SOCC and local sporting clubs – to resurface the multi-use courts and upgrade court lighting, as well as install new post sleeves and strengthened and replacement fencing at the complex.

More delays for abattoir

Unexpected material and contractor delays have extended the Strathalbyn abattoir's restoration timeline, pushing its reopening date back to late in the new year.

The abattoir closed in December 2020 when former operators Strath Pastoral ceased trading, but it has since been reinvigorated by the Fleurieu Community Co-operative, which is currently undertaking a \$3.5 million restoration of the site – \$1.5 million of which is provided by the State Government.

Blood appeal

More Strathalbyn donors are needed to give the gift of life this Christmas by rolling up their sleeves when the mobile blood donation centre rolls into town next week.

Australian Red Cross Lifeblood has put the call out for an additional 88 donors to urgently book a visit with the mobile centre – which will be down at the Strathalbyn Library from December 18 to 21 – to boost supplies this festive season.

Weather wipes farms

Residents are being reminded to support local farmers after the recent wild storms that lashed South Australia left some local farmers devastated by the impact.

Paris Creek Cherries lost about 70 per cent of its fruit from its 4.5-acre orchard, equivalent to about \$70,000 worth. Before the deluge of rain, which reportedly recorded about 100ml in the town within days, farmer Steve Gibbons was expected an "absolute bumper crop".


