# New Goolwa mural takes centre stage

Hours of hard work have come to fruition in the form of a new mural painted across one of Goolwa Secondary College's (GSC) sheds, depicting facets of the school's agricultural program.

Completed in December, the mural was a six-month process designed by students and the school's leadership team with input from a local indigenous school representative, and painted by Adelaide artist Chad Spencer over a week.

The mural serves as the final project in the launch of the agricultural program at the school, and a place to share with the community.

"As an educator with an arts background, I wanted to incorporate (the mural) within the school's agriculture program," GSC teacher, Kasey Wendelborn, said.

"It was important to create a space that was beautiful and something we could share with our community.

"We also looked at the future of agriculture here at Goolwa Secondary College and we knew that what we would be offering now and, in the future, needed to be catered for."

Each component in the mural represents an aspect of the agricultural program.

The native flowers, created in the second semester of 2023 by year 9 students, complement the proteas, leucadendrons and leucospermums already planted on the grounds.

The isa brown hen represents the chicken coop infrastructure which will be built in



February, as well as the important role poultry will play in the program, while the blue-banded bee represents the school's bee keeping program.

"Students are very excited to be able to start learning about and working with chickens this semester," Ms Wendelborn said.

"We also wanted to explore edible plants that students may not realise can be eaten.

"The paddock to plate concept is incorporated into our program with cross-curricular opportunities to deepen learning.

"We have six hives ready to go – four of which our students designed and painted themselves.

"Our region is bustling with birdlife and the blue wren was a way of incorporating this into the design."

Rounding off the mural, the colour scheme represents the sunrises the community experiences in Goolwa, and in the top left-hand corner will sit the school's agriculture logo, which was designed in a competition with last

year's year 9 cohort and won by Eve Polnear.

Ms Wendelborn hoped students, staff, and the wider Goolwa community will enjoy the mural for many years to come.

"This is a space where students and staff can go to relax, potter and forage, and of course, engage in new learning experiences," she said.

"This space will also be used for classroom learning, journaling, and practical experiences.

"Next to the shed/mural, we have created an organic vegetable garden (that) is a beautiful space abundant in organic fruit, vegetables and herbs.

"We worked alongside botanical artist Hope Deane-Lovelock to design and create a space from recycled materials, and there is a botanical installation and structures in place that over time will be covered in edible produce.

"To walk through this space is a therapeutic experience."

## Local projects funded through Anzac round

Mount Compass' War Memorial Community Centre Inc. will benefit from two new flagpoles purchased using funds received under the latest Anzac Day Commemoration Fund round.

Ten recipients will receive vital government funding for projects that deliver initiatives that help the veteran community, support commemorative services, and foster public understanding of the Anzac spirit under the 2023-24 round.

The Mount Compass War Memorial Community Centre Inc. is among the latest recipients, receiving \$3216 to purchase two flagpoles for the Mount Compass Memorial to replace the temporary ones.

ANZAC/Remembrance Days Projects Organising Committee Chair and member of the community centre sub-committee Bill Coomans was grateful for the funding.

"There's a lot more work we'd like to do around the memorial, but one of those projects was to have the temporary flagpoles replaced with permanent ones," he said.

"We normally have the students from the school and a CFS volunteer at each flagpole, and they're going to find it so much easier and it's going to look better.

"I've also applied to the local member's office for a state flag and aboriginal flag, so we can fly whatever flag is appropriate for whatever occasion."

The six-metre aluminium poles have already been installed.

The Port Elliot RSL Sub-Branch also received \$695 to purchase a marquee to support the annual dawn service at the memorial on Hindmarsh Island, while the Murray Bridge RSL Sub-Branch and Bowling Club received \$9000 to purchase of PA system to support Anzac Day and other commemorative services.

## Bus services expanded in Adelaide Hills

More frequent, comfortable and convenient bus services are on the way for Adelaide Hills residents, with a \$19 million commitment set to deliver 15 brand-new buses and 590 more services each week.

From Monday, January 29, the first phase of service improvements will add an extra 36 bus services during the weekday interpeak between Mount Barker and the city, seeing a 15-minute frequency via route T840 services between 9am and 3pm.

An additional 26 services on Sundays will also start from February 4 to provide the same frequency as Saturdays, delivering a 30-minute frequency between approximately 7am and 6pm via route 864F, while 15 new hybrid-diesel buses are expected to join the fleet.

The delivery of these new buses will support the introduction of a new weekday Go Zone from mid-2024, with buses running via the South Eastern Freeway every six minutes in peak periods and at least every 15 minutes from 7am to 7pm.

“Adelaide Hills commuters have been calling for better, more frequent services, and we’re delivering on our commitment to ensure public transport is a great option to get people where they need to go,” SA Premier, Peter Malinauskas, said.

“By boosting bus services, we are not just improving mobility, we are enhancing the quality of life and connection for residents of these growing communities.

“I’m confident these significant changes can create better opportunities, reduce traffic congestion, and support a more sustainable transport future for the Adelaide Hills.”

Once fully implemented, Hills commuters will benefit from an additional 104 services each weekday, 22 on Saturdays and 48 on Sundays, representing an increase of 590 trips each week or 42 per cent more services.

Feedback gathered during the Mount Barker and Adelaide Hills Transport Study has helped to inform these service changes, with the State Government also committing \$6 million towards the upgrade and delivery of additional parking at the Crafrers Park ‘n’ Ride facility.

Member for Kavel Dan Cregan was pleased to see the commitment being fulfilled.

# Plea to drivers to take caution

After two local railway accidents within less than a week, a SteamRanger representative has revealed the impact on its volunteers while pleading with drivers to take caution around rail crossings.

The first accident was sadly a fatality when an 87-year-old pedestrian was struck by the Cockle Train at McCracken on January 4.

“They hit (him), they heard it, they looked at each other and said ‘who’s going to go (check)?’” Customer Service Manager, Steve Richardson, said.

“They can’t leave the steam loco on its own... so the fireman had to walk back and find the poor gentleman.

“It was pretty confronting.”

The second accident came all too soon, as the Cockle Train collided with a car at Skewes Road, Goolwa, less than a week after when 130 people were on board.

No injuries were reported and the car was written off.

A young volunteer was on the side of impact and witnessed the collision.

“The whole thing happened in front of him – he only just qualified as a fireman,” Mr Richardson said.

“He was very badly shaken up, and we make sure they have the proper checks to make sure they’re okay.”

Mr Richardson wants to protect volunteers who dedicate their time for the joy of promoting the region.

“One thing that’s disappointing is

volunteers come to their role and they’re saying ‘what’s going to happen today?’, not a fear, but concern,” he said.

“That shouldn’t happen at a volunteer organisation – they should be enjoying what they’re doing.”

In response to the recent incidents, SA Police (SAPOL) has been focusing on pedestrian and vehicle movement at significant level crossings, and recently 20 expiation notices in the Victor Harbor, Port Elliot, Middleton and Goolwa areas.

“Crossing train or tram tracks against warning signals or in a dangerous manner only puts you and others at significant risk of serious injury or worse,” Superintendent Amit Sareen, Officer in Charge of Hills Fleurieu Local Service Area, said.

SAPOL will continue to monitor around rail crossings while educating the public about safe behaviours, however, will issue expiations if required.

Four level crossing collisions have occurred in the last two years, and Mr Richardson finds most collisions are with local drivers.

Road signs between Goolwa to Middleton were upgraded last year from giveaway to stop signs, and Mr Richardson believes further safety measures such as boom gates will fail to make a difference to the “small minority” of drivers of concern.

Even two days after the first accident made headlines, concerning behaviour was repeated, when the same train was confronted with people still walking their dogs along the same railway.

“The only way to prevent such tragedies is that drivers take caution and obey the

signs,” Mr Richardson said.

“Don’t trespass on the railway – the rail line is for trains only, and level crossings – trains can’t swerve.

“All the driver can do is put the brakes on – he can’t swerve and he can’t do anything, and the worst thing is when you go back to find out what the problem was.”

Goolwa Country Fire Service (CFS) issued a similar warning to drivers while stating that the recent accident was “completely avoidable.”

“Our town has at least eight crossings – Foster Place, Oliver Street, Liverpool Road, Gardiner Street and Skewes Road, just to name a few, are all danger spots (for) people ignoring the stop signs and not looking for trains,” Goolwa CFS posted on social media.

“It only takes seconds out of the day to stop and check for a train.

“With the holiday season all go, please don’t let us meet like this – stay safe.”

Flowers delivered to the Victor Harbor station were among the condolences received by SteamRanger members, which Mr Richardson finds “touching.”

“Members of the public have been very kind... we’ve had a lot of people say ‘we support you,’” he said.

“Most people will support the SteamRanger, and support the volunteers.

“We’re a tourist operation, and we try to look after people and promote this region.”

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# Mission complete for mental health cyclists

A mental and physical battle from start to finish, three amateur cyclists walked away from their journey from Goolwa to Mt Gambier not only with thousands of dollars raised for mental health awareness, but several life lessons and locations to visit on their bucket list.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Youtube channel Bunyip Adventures' Jason Moore and Jamie Ramzan, along with Mr Moore's brother-in-law Aaron Skirrey, set off on a 500km journey on December 28 from one part of the state to the other, to raise awareness about mental health and the support that needs to go with it, in addition to money for not-for-profit Talk Out Loud.

The trek from the Fleurieu to the Limestone Coast over four days had its fair share of challenges, including broken phones, cramping, strong headwinds and mental exhaustion, but it was all worth it for the trio to see the community coming together to support a worthy cause.

"We'd be lying if we said it wasn't a challenge... but reaching that finish line and being able to do that for such a worthy cause was fantastic," Mr Moore said.

"The mental and physical strength we had to go through to complete the challenge was not something you could have scripted or planned at all.

"There were so many different metaphors for adversity and overcoming hurdles that we came up with along the way by doing this bike ride that you couldn't make that stuff up unless you went through it yourself.

"There were a lot of things (where) you had to really overcome that mental barrier and push forward, and that's where working together as a team helped us get through.

"(It was) definitely a really amazing experience, and I couldn't think of a better way to start off the year."

For Mr Moore, the ride personally tested his mental strength and capability.

In one moment, in the last legs of the ride on the first day, he suffered a minor setback that challenged his perceptions of himself and future involvement in the ride, but managed to overcome it with support from the crew.

"For myself, (who is) not a pro-cyclist by any means, pushing myself to cycle the 500kms over the four days, I knew it would be a physical challenge, but I honesty wasn't expecting it to be as much of a mental challenge as it was," Mr Moore said.

"What it taught me is the difference between when to push yourself and keep going, and when to put your hand up and go 'I need some support right now, I don't think I can go much further up'.

"Unfortunately, on the first day my legs cramped up completely within 15kms of the finish line, so I had done about 120kms and that last stretch we had headwind of about 25-30kms, the temperature dropped, and we were on a main highway with trucks passing us at 110 miles an hour.

"I kept pushing on as hard as I could, but eventually, my legs would literally not go any further and... my initial response was 'I'm a failure, this is terrible'.

"I had to get in the support vehicle and the other two riders continued, and I felt bad, but then (the crew) had a bit of a chat and we were like 'no, that's not what it's about'.

"It's about demonstrating pushing yourself out of your comfort zone and being open with reaching out if you need support."

The personal challenges end up outweighing the end result, with the group managing to raise more than \$3300 for Talk Out Loud so far.

The ride also showcased many parts of

the state's backyard and fostered community spirit in even the most unexpected places.

"From the tourism side, as somebody whose only really been down (Mt Gambier) way when I was a young kid, being able to go back there as an adult and cycle and take the time to do that journey and take more of the scenic route, there were some spots along that route we took that were so stunning that I would have never imagined," Mr Moore said.

"There were some stunning spots along the Coorong that just looked like tropical beaches and oasis, there was some beautiful little towns we came to along the way, and then obviously, when you get close to Mt Gambier (it's) such a jewel in its own right and has so many beautiful treasures to offer too.

"The highlight for me, Jamie, Aaron, and all that were involved overall was seeing that

sense of community and support for such a worthy cause such as mental health.

"Almost every single town, everywhere we stopped, whether it was just for a lunch break or it was the end of that day's leg, there were people waiting and coming up to us on the streets giving us money to put towards the charity, telling us their own mental health experiences, and saying how much it means to them to have people out there raising awareness of this.

"Seeing that sense of support and community is what we really wanted to showcase along the way because that's how we get through mental health struggles and overcome adversity – whether it's a bike ride or mental health struggle you're going through in your personal life, we get through that by supporting one another."

The fundraiser will remain open until January 26, and the boys hope to be able to reach the \$5000 mark and have the first episode of the YouTube series released by then.

They also intend on raising money for other worthy causes, and bringing the cycle for mental health back in future years.

"We had people going 'you need to do this as a regular thing', so I can definitely say yes, we have a lot of plans for both doing new adventures and challenges, but also doing the cycle for mental health trek," Mr Moore said.

"So, maybe doing it as a yearly cycle for mental health for maybe 20 cyclists and raising money for mental health charities.

"We'd probably look at starting that up again next year, but this year, we do have a few other adventures planned and some of them will be related to raising money for other charities because it's been really good to see that sense of support and also showcasing beautiful locations along the way.

"We want to continue that mission and promote the beautiful state we're in, but also promote the beautiful communities we have out there."

The canoe tree at Currency Creek on the Strathalbyn to Goolwa Road was brutally vandalised on the night of Saturday 26th/Sunday 27th December. Alexandrina Council Parks and Gardens superintendent Kallan Dennis received a report from SteamRanger personnel headed for their Goolwa Depot. The River Red Gum, Eucalyptus thought to be around 300-years-old was completely ring-barked with a circle of bark cut out and the damage removing most of the softwood well into the heart wood. It was first thought that a graft would be highly unlikely to take but botanist Dean Nicolle said it was worth a try.

In the early 1880s when the line to Victor Harbor was converted to steam, the alterations were made to the stables.

"It gets the community together and particularly when families are struggling," Ms McRobbie said.

"To have a bit of Christmas magic in the town and for the kids, in particular, is really important."

The first meeting for Goolwa Community Incorporated Group is expected to be held in late January.

## Goolwa Aquatic Building leased to water research centre

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Goolwa Aquatic Building's top storey has finally been leased to Goyder Institute to use as an office and engagement space for its recently established Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth (CLLMM) Research Centre.

The Goyder Institute for Water Research will receive \$8 million from the Federal Government over four years from 2022-26 to work with communities to investigate the impacts of climate change on the Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth region.

The CLLMM Research Centre will occupy the site for the duration of the funding.

"We are delighted to be working with Alexandrina Council for our new location to support our critical research into the needs of the CLLMM region," Goyder Institute Director, Dr Alec Rolston, said.

"Our aim is to provide an evidence base for future management decisions in the region and the broader Murray-Darling Basin.

"While our four locally-based staff members will be based at the Research Centre in Goolwa, our work will include reaching out to communities throughout the wider region.

"The space will be utilised as a hot-desking space for visiting researchers, but also home to an augmented reality experience, which will showcase the values of the region in a new and exciting way, as well as providing community space for engagement activities.

"We are very much looking forward to working with communities to inform management decision-making in the region."

The CLLMM Research Centre will be hosting a public launch in early February.

Alexandrina Council Chief Executive Officer Nigel Morris looked forward to partnering with the centre as it works to develop relationships with First Nations, communities and industries to harness ideas to improve management of this ecologically important area.

"Alexandrina Council is delighted to be involved in this research program, which seeks to develop critical knowledge to support the health of the nationally and internationally significant Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth region," he said.

"Business Alexandrina has already been supporting this key initiative through our Business Hub in Goolwa, providing a co-working space as a launch pad for the centre and its four-year program.

"A special event 'Creating Shared Knowledge - Where Our Waters and Our People Meet' invited local businesses to deepen connections and set the foundation for the CLLMM Research Centre's work.

"Our community is keenly interested in seeing the upper storey space in the Goolwa Aquatic Building occupied with a suitable tenant.

"We believe having a research centre focused on the future health of the Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth and strategically located here in Goolwa along the majestic River Murray is a game-changer for our region."

# Mural unveiled at police station

A recently unveiled Indigenous artwork at Murray Bridge, inspired by the river, will soon be replicated across Murray Mallee and Riverland police stations.

Drawing inspiration from the river and the pathways it represents, Ngarrindjeri artist Nellie Rankine – who has been an artist for almost 40 years – created the artwork derived from a Dreamtime story on creation.

‘Ngurunderi dreaming’ creation of the river illustrates the tale of Ngurunderi, a Dreamtime hero of the Ngarrindjeri people and Ponde, a giant cod, widening the Murray River with his powerful tail.

In Dreamtime, Ngurunderi first came across Ponde while traveling downstream in his bark canoe, searching for his two wives.

He came across Ponde swimming in front of him, and took chase, trying to spear him from his canoe.

As Ponde attempted to escape, his great tail created the sweeps and loops of the Murray River that we now know and enjoy.

The almost 12-month project was to make First Nations peoples more comfortable when attending a police station, and to reflect on the cultural and spiritual significance of the First Nations peoples of the area, with commissioning an artwork suggested by Senior Community Constable Greg Smith.

“Nellie is a great painter and I’m really proud of what (she did) here today,” he said.

“It makes me proud that a simple idea turned into something that we’re now proud to display.”

Murray Bridge Mayor Wayne Thorley was

pleased the artwork will help the community feel proud of where they live.

“The thing that I’ve learned since becoming Mayor is pride is an important thing in your community – if you don’t feel proud of where you live then you don’t respect it,” he said.

“You should be proud of your culture and we’re working together to create a more vibrant, exciting and interesting community.

“I think this... is positive for the future, going forward, where we look at how we can work together to make our community feel safer and more enthusiastic

about living here.”

About 40 people attended the mural’s unveiling at the Murray Bridge Police Station last Friday, January 12, which included a Welcome to Country by Ngarrindjeri Elder Pauline Walker and a morning tea.

## Milang man crashes van into Nairne home

The driver, a 27-year-old Milang man, sustained minor injuries and was taken to Mount Barker Hospital for treatment and to have a blood sample taken.

State Emergency Service members propped up the front wall for safety, and the van was towed from the scene.

Investigations into the crash are continuing.

## Alleged drink driver caught

A local man has lost his licence after being caught driving while under the influence at Murray Bridge earlier this month.

On Saturday, January 6, Murray Bridge police stopped and breath tested a man driving on Homburg Drive, who allegedly returned a positive roadside reading.

The man allegedly refused to comply with a further breath test analysis, and a check on his licence revealed he held a learner's permit.

The 25-year-old Murray Bridge man was reported for failing to comply with a breath analysis test, and lost his licence on the spot for 12 months.

He will be summonsed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court at a later date.

## Truck loses control at Murray Bridge

Police are investigating a truck roll-over at Murray Bridge South earlier this month.

At about 11.30pm on Friday, January 5, emergency services were called to the intersection of Flagstaff Road and Jervois Road after a refrigerator truck lost control and rolled off the road.

The driver, a 24-year-old Para Hills man, was uninjured and managed to self-extract from the cabin, while his passenger, a 30-year-old Parafield Gardens man, was taken to Murray Bridge Hospital for treatment of minor injuries.

A tow truck attended to remove the truck.

The driver, a 16-year-old local girl, was breath tested and allegedly returning a positive reading of 0.123.

She was arrested and charged with drink driving, failing to stop, breach of learner's conditions, and having unrestrained passengers after a 16-year-old boy was located hiding in the boot.

The teenager lost her licence on the spot for six months and was bailed to appear at Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on February 6.

## High-range drink driver detected at Mt Jagged

A Toorak Gardens man was caught with an extremely high blood alcohol reading at Mount Jagged on Sunday.

At about 3.30pm, an off-duty police officer allegedly saw a black BMW driving erratically on Victor Harbor Road, and patrols called into the area stopped the car soon after.

A 27-year-old woman was charged with arson and was refused police bail.

She appeared Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on Monday.

## Drink driver caught three times over the limit at Mount Barker

A local man lost his licence after being caught drink driving at Mount Barker earlier this month.

Just after midnight on Saturday, January 6, police stopped a Toyota Hilux on Hutchinson Street to conduct a mobile screening test.

The driver, a 26-year-old Mount Barker

The man will appear in court at a later date.

I recently emailed Alexandrina Council regarding the filthy, stained condition of the grey and off-white unsealed footpath pavers in Strathalbyn, particularly on Dawson Street and Albyn Terrace.

I asked if council had any intention of removing the increasing build-up of staining and filth from the footpaths.

Council replied that the footpaths were inspected and “whilst there is some minor evidence of spilt drinks in some areas, it is not a real issue”.

The filth and staining is not minor.

Councils also said “discolouration of the new pavers is to be expected given the lighter colouration of the pavers and being in high-use public areas”.

Council said it will continue to monitor the areas, and intervene if and when required, but at this time no further action will be taken.

The footpath pavers selected by council are unfit for purpose due to material, finish and colour.

Unfortunately, they are here to stay.

The least council can do is acknowledge filthy, stained footpaths are a real issue and ensure they are kept clean.

Rivers remain protected

The Angas and Finnis rivers’ stream environments have been found to remain relatively consistent year-on-year after data was collected across both catchments in November.

For the eighth year of Angas Finnis Bioblitz, 30 volunteers helped collect data to help gain a better picture of water quantity and quality.

The team collected 18 water bug samples from 13 long-term monitoring sites with assistance of scientists and ecologists to verify the results.

The data was used to monitor the long-term trends and condition of local waterways to monitor the effects of riparian revegetation projects and other local land management activities.

The data was also uploaded to the national database BioCollect.

The results found similar kinds of invertebrates are collected from year-to-year.

Bioblitz data demonstrated that sensitive remnant sections of the upper catchments of Angas and Finnis remain protected.

Waterbug Bioblitz is a community-

driven project making waves in creek line conservation.

This initiative aims to record as many species as possible within a designated location and timeframe, focusing on the invaluable role of macroinvertebrates, which is water bugs, as indicators of water health.

Bioblitz has expanded to include eight locations across South Australia, and aims to empower communities to take an active role in scientific research and nurture a sense of ownership over local freshwater ecosystems.

Volunteers range from the Finnis Catchment group, The Angas River Catchment group, farmers, school-aged children, and individuals who care about the environment and want to learn more.

Some students enjoy exploring the structure and behaviours of water bugs through viewing the screen of a small digital microscope.

Prior knowledge is unrequired for joining, with staff and scientists providing on-site training and guidance to ensure the accuracy and consistency of the collected data.

When a major environmental change occurs, such as with the high rainfall of 2022, species that are less-commonly detected were present.

Taking care for our volunteers

Volunteers across all types of organisations are often called on to help deal with many types of traumatic incidents – be they, for example, ambulance volunteers, CFS volunteers or football trainers.

The volunteers with SteamRanger are also on this list, and recently have had to deal with two confronting accidents this year.

The first was a fatality on January 4 when an 87-year-old pedestrian was struck by the Cockle Train at McCracken.

Less than a week after, a car collided with the train at Skewes Road at Goolwa.

Fortunately, no injuries were recorded this time.

SteamRanger’s Customer Service Manager Steve Richardson rightly wants to protect his organisation’s volunteers from any further trauma.

They are there because they love trains, and love promoting the region to its visitors.

Road signs between Goolwa and Middleton were upgraded last year from giveway to stop signs, but Mr Richardson remains concerned about the “small minority” of drivers to which these safety measures appear to have no impact.

He has put out a plea for all people to take caution and obey the signs.

After all, train drivers are unable to swerve; all they can do is apply the brakes.

Goolwa CFS also joined the call on social media for people to take more care, saying it only takes seconds to stop and check for a train.

As we gear up for Australia Day, a time to celebrate the contribution volunteers make to our communities, take time to consider the support you can give all of them, no matter their role.

Rail crossings are in place right across the state.

Some have giveway signs, some have stop signs, some have flashing lights, and some have boom gates.

Making a decision to ‘sneak through’ without checking for an approaching train or because the boom gates aren’t all the way down could be the worst decision of your life.

# Local artwork gifted to winner

A sculpture by Port Elliot-based artist Stephen Harrison will be presented as a gift to the winner of the Hahn Men's Stage 4 of the Santos Tour Down Under at the first finish held in Port Elliot in the 25-year history of the international cycling event.

The wooden sculpture *In the Balance* portrays a sailing ship battling stormy seas and draws inspiration from local maritime history.

The sculpture will be gifted by Alexandrina Council to the winner as a memento of the region.

Harrison said it was a compliment to have his work chosen as a gift for the stage winner.

"To represent Port Elliot and to have something locally-made presented to the winner of the stage which is travelling right past the gallery, is a lovely compliment," Harrison said.

"My wooden sculpture portrays a sailing ship entangled in the tumultuous embrace of stormy seas.

"Crafted intricately, it pays homage to the vibrant maritime legacy along the South Australian coastline.

"Through its dynamic stance and the small beachcombed ceramic piece, it invites contemplation of the relationship between human ambition and the unpredictable forces of the sea, capturing the essence of daring voyages, cargoes and shipwrecks that have woven the rich history of South Australia's seafaring past."

Horseshoe Bay in Port Elliot is a popular tourist destination, but in the late 1800s it was a notorious "ship trap" and the site of the demise of seven vessels between 1853 and 1864, including four ships in the fateful year of 1856.

Notably, the bay's shipwrecks include the *Flying Fish*, commemorated in the name of the local cafe and the signage at the Port Elliot Surf Life Saving Club.

In 1864, the brigantine *Athol* was wrecked and crockery from that vessel washed ashore north of Horseshoe Bay, giving rise to the haunting name Crockery Bay.

As the Tour Down Under concludes in Port Elliot, the sculpture serves as a poignant reminder of the town's maritime legacy, connecting the present triumphs of the race with the enduring echoes of a bygone era.

Harrison, known locally as 'Rocky', lives in Port Elliot and his sculpture gift was recently on display at The Strand Gallery.

The sculpture was also featured in the 2023 Wooden Boat Festival Art Trail exhibition *Alice and The Lotus*.

The exhibition featured paintings, drawings and sculptures by award-winning artists responding to the theme of river and boats.

Harrison calls himself a simple surfer, but his Port Elliot studio contains a collection of many years of art projects experimenting with different materials.

His new work consists of wooden vessels where form and balance are integrated with the use of natural materials.

The Santos Tour Down Under Hahn Men's Stage 4 races through the Alexandrina Council district is on Friday, January 19.

# Police preach safety ahead of Tour Down Under

A series of routine operations will be conducted by South Australia Police during the Santos Tour Down Under (TDU) 2024 with a focus on safe cycling and public safety.

The TDU will attract more cyclists across the city, Adelaide Hills and other South Australian regions, making it timely now more than ever to be mindful of sharing the road.

Police Commander Chief Superintendent John De Candia warned all road users to be vigilant for cyclists.

"Drivers are used to looking for other larger vehicles like cars and trucks, but cyclists are smaller, quick and can be more difficult to see," he said.

"Be extra vigilant, especially around intersections and when executing right-hand turns.

"Motorists must also maintain a safe passing distance of at least one metre when the speed limit is 60km/h or under, and at least 1.5m when the speed limit is over 60km/h.

"Cyclists also have an important role in maintaining their safety by ensuring they are wearing appropriate protective equipment and high-visibility apparel.

"Cyclists must also keep to riding no more than two abreast on public roads to keep motor traffic flow open and maintain a safe distance from motor vehicles."

Police will have a highly visible presence to ensure a safe event for all.

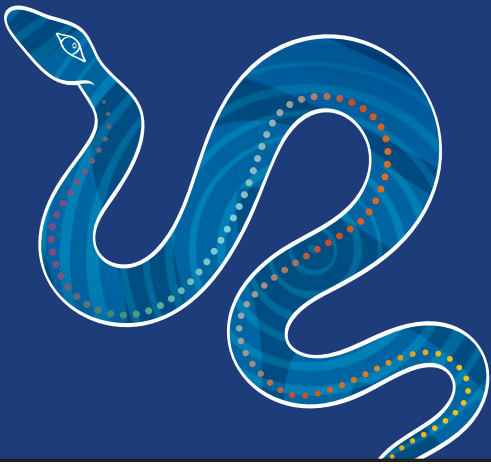

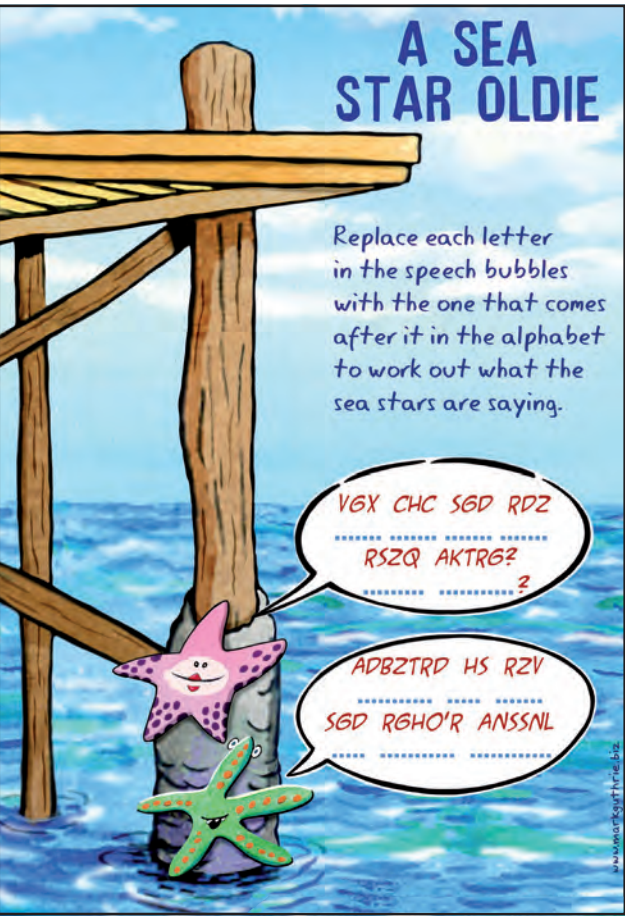

# A healthy distance advised for livestock welfare

Hazards for livestock and the best methods to protect their health were the subject matters of a recent Milang Agricultural Bureau meeting.

Many of the actions undertaken by governments in the early days of COVID parallel methods used by livestock farmers to protect animal health.

Sheep lice – *Bovicola ovis* – is a pale-yellow insect that is 1.5 to two millimetres-long with brown stripes and a broad, red-brown head that feeds on dead skin and secretions, and has a life cycle of 35 days.

Infestation causes discolouration and reduction in fleece weight and skin irritation can progress to derangement.

Females lay one or two eggs every three days, which hatch after about 10 days and most infestations begin from a few sheep or even a neighbour’s ‘stray’ via direct contact, such as between ewes and lambs, and when sheep drink at troughs, or are yarded or shedded.

Lice can survive up to 10 days in shearers’ moccasins, and traditionally the pests have been controlled by time-consuming immersion dipping or jetting immediately after shearing, using water and poisons.

Hayley Hogg and Kate Eckert from FP-AG Langhorne Creek arranged a presentation at the Bureau’s November meeting of newly released treatment FLEXOLT, which promises to revolutionise lice treatment by removing the dependency on shearing.

MSD Animal Health Victoria veterinarian Rachael Holmes detailed results from 15 Australian field trials used to prove FLEXOLT efficacy, showing 100 per cent effectiveness on short and long wool, off-shears and lambs above six kilograms.

Bureau members agreed it promises to

be a game-changer because of the flexibility it offers.

Treatment can be administered to all sheep on a property at the same time independently of the shearing program to incoming and individual mobs after an infestation.

The key to ongoing protection is strict segregation of ‘clean’ mobs from doubtful.

Under a new national system, sheep and farmed goats born on or after January 1, 2025 will need to be identified with an NLIS-accredited electronic identification tag before leaving their property of birth to provide an effective tracking tool to control

outbreaks of infectious diseases such as Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD).

Members were reminded of the 2001 FMD outbreak in UK, which resulted in the culling of around four million animals, suspension of food exports, and financial losses in the billions.

EID uses a 15-digit number colour-coded by year, which registers as stock pass reader panels in saleyards and abattoirs.

Ms Holmes recommended a ‘Where is Woolly’ video from ([agriculture.gov.au](http://agriculture.gov.au)), which shows how traceability numbers explode without individual traceability.

Lynton Arney has used eID on his family’s

Border Leicester stud and commented the technology can be viewed either as chore or opportunity.

Mr Arney cited one Merino producer who for years had bought ewes from three suppliers, and from eID tracking, discovered the ewes from his most expensive supplier achieved pregnancy rates 15 per cent below the other two.

Ms Holmes also provided an update on campylobacteriosis – an infectious disease of breeding ewes that can cause an ‘abortion storm’ in which perhaps 30 per cent of a flock abort.

Wild animals and birds, especially crows, may pass on the bacteria through droppings and are attracted to handfeeding and watering points.

The disease is most common in high rainfall/high stocking rates operations, with an FP-AG representative reporting a storm event at Parawa where 200 lambs were lost.

Farmers are strongly encouraged to take any lamb fetus to their local PIRSA veterinarian for dissection.

Bureau Secretary Chris Littlejohn reported the ASART group will press for Alexandrina Council to commission a report on the economic impact of family farms on the local economy.

Such a report to Yankalilla Council provided surprising information relevant to the recurring debate about rate differentials.

Bureau President Neil Harvey stressed that all harvesting operations should strictly follow CFS regulations for fire risk, and thanked Ms Holmes for her valuable presentation, FP-AG for support, and Marg and Rodney Landseer for hosting the meeting.

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# Advancing women in agriculture

When Currency Creek farmer Belle Baker was growing up, women weren't always accepted as farmers.

These days Ms Baker, with help from her partner Patrick O'Driscoll, is tailor-making courses to help women on the land fill gaps in their knowledge, including the ground breaking Tractoring for Women program.

"Through our farm contracting business, we came into contact with all sorts of landowners, particularly small acreage lifestyle farmers – people who don't necessarily come from a farming background," she said.

"A lot of those women were telling me, they don't know how to drive a tractor, and that was where the idea came from.

"I also have a girlfriend whose husband is away a fair bit, and she would have to wait for the neighbour to get home to come around to her place to drive the tractor to feed her horses.

"And she went 'I want to be independent, it is a tractor not an airplane'... She put a fair bit of pressure on me."

Ms Baker said the growing number of women in agriculture meant they were increasingly being recognised for their skills and expertise, but there was still some way to go.

"It was 1994 when women were legally recognised as farmers," she said.

"Before that it was only men that were given the title, which is just nuts.

"I turned 50 last year, and in my life-time things have changed significantly.

"At least now it is a conversation that we are all having.

"I think most people would recognise that there is still work to do and change needs to happen."

The couple are passionate about their Tractoring for Women program.

"It is a one-day, hands-on course where we teach the women everything they need to know, and none of the dull, boring stuff," Ms Baker said.

"We do discuss the safety elements because tractors are still the number one cause of deaths on Australian farms.

"Then we identify the major parts of the tractors that we may come into contact with such as cleaning out the air filter.

"We also look at the different brands, and identify where all the parts and major grease points are."

Ms Baker said once women were driving with confidence, the next steps are taken.

"One of the most annoying things that I found, was needing to move the hay bales, but the bucket would be on the tractor," she said.

"I would have to wait for Patrick to come home and help me put the forks on to move hay bales.

"Once we have got these women driving with confidence, we teach them how to take the forks off and put a bucket on, and how to lift and load hay bales into feeders, and also how to move a pile of gravel or dirt.

"We also look at slashers, and how to attach three-point linkage implements,

whether it be a slasher or harrows.

"If there is a fire approaching or you want to look at fire prevention, then having that ability to go and do a fire break is very important.

"If there is a fire approaching, I am out... however, having that knowledge and the confidence that if you had to, you could, it means you will be able to make a better decision in that emergency situation."

Ms Baker said for many women taking part in the Tractoring for Women program, the new skills were liberating.

"They go and look at a tractor and think, 'well, I can drive a car and I can drive a 4WD, but a tractor is next level,'" she said.

"But once you get them in and they are driving, we found that these women were coming back to us saying 'I have done that, what is next?'.

"These women are going, 'Right, I can achieve that, what else is possible?', and that to me is a wonderful outcome that we didn't foresee."

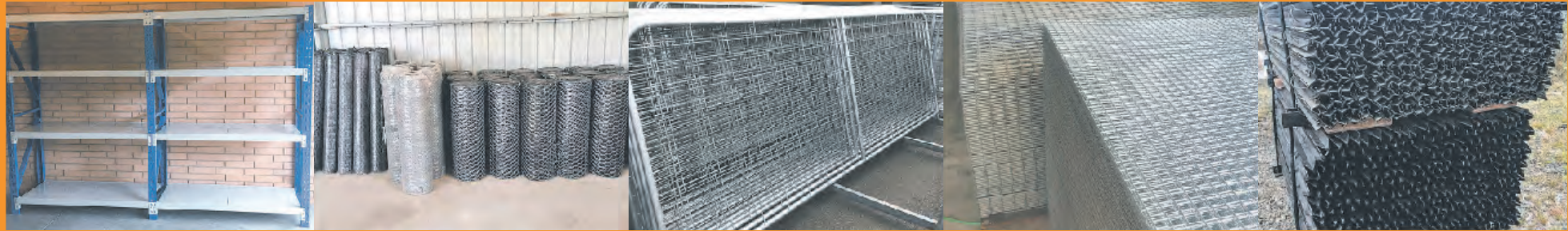

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Milang farmer's hopes rained on due to unseasonably wet weather

A Milang farmer estimates the unseasonably wet summer has caused about 25 per cent of income loss for grain farmers in the region.

His neighbour has recorded 150mm of rain since harvest started since the end of October, and as reported in this week's *Argus*, many local towns recorded their highest December rainfall since 1992.

The heavy rain and humidity over the past few months have resulted in downgraded and lost grain, late harvest and the spread of weeds.

Late harvest is because grain is unable to be delivered to a silo system with more than 13.5 per cent moisture levels.

Even sunny days can still be impacted as any potential dew from the night prior needs time to burn off.

Milang farmer Stefan Cross typically finishes harvest between Christmas and New Year's Eve, but is currently only about halfway done.

"What was happening all of December was most days were cloudy, but on the sunny days, we'd get nearly to the right moisture and then a big cold air mass will come in off the sea and make the moisture go up again," Milang farmer, Stefan Cross, explained.

"The cold air mass coming in off the sea normally comes in cool at 7pm, but it was coming in at 1pm and 2pm.

"All the wheat is now shot and downgraded, and we've lost at least \$50 a tonne, at least, without including the losses in the field where the grain might have dropped on the ground that we can't pick up."

Shot wheat, which becomes stock feed, occurs when the wet conditions resulted in

the grain beginning to grow a root in the head, as well as loss of colour and weight.

Despite the end of season conditions, Mr Cross believes the result is "not a total disaster" as prior to the heavy rain, his crops had decent yield.

"Pretty good yield helps to counteract (bad conditions) as opposed to in a drought when we've got very low yield," he said.

"In a low yielding year, you don't make much money, but at least (this season produced) pretty decent yielding crops."

However, the moist year but dry September impacted farmers differently who operate on slightly different schedules, with some experiencing ripening with moisture in the soil, and others who "suffered".

"In the earlier districts in the state, they ripen earlier so they had a fantastic harvest time because it was dry, dry, dry, but right just as we started, that's when the bad weather came in," Mr Cross gave as an example.

As well as this, the heavy rainfall will mean most farmers will need to begin spraying the influx of weeds as soon as harvest is finished.

"The summer weeds all grow vines and you can't get your seeds through it, so you've got to kill them off and hopefully conserve some of the moisture for next year, but the main thing is you can't sow through it," Mr Cross said.

As a farmer for almost 40 years who operates 1200 hectares including barley, canola and wheat crop, Mr Cross takes the weather in his stride.

"If you've been farming long enough, you realise you don't always get it all," he said.

"I follow a bit of a policy that you've never really got it until it's in the silo or in the bank."

The last dry year was 2018, and since then, Mr Cross has found the seasons "pretty good".

Sowing typically begins just after ANZAC Day when Mr Cross hopes for moist conditions.

Wettest December for more than 30 years

The local area was pelted with record weather last month, with some towns receiving three times their typical amount and the highest rainfall since 1992.

December rainfall recorded by the Bureau of Meteorology:

- Mount Barker had 110mm – its highest rainfall since 1992 when it had 164.8mm. The average is 35.1 mm. Mount Barker also had its coolest mean maximum temperature since 2001 with 23.4C, which is almost 2C cooler than its long-term December average of 25.2C.

- Strathalbyn had 78.8 mm – its highest rainfall since 1992 when it had 171.2mm. The average is 25.7 mm, with data back to 1861.
- Strathalbyn Racecourse had its wettest December on record with 80.8mm, with its previous record of 67.4 mm in 2016, with 27 years of data. The average is 23.6mm.
- Goolwa Barrage had 82.8 mm – its highest rainfall since 1992 when it had 164.2mm. The average is 26.7mm.

Senior climatologist Jonathan Pollock described December as "pretty eventful".

"Maximum temperatures were cooler

than average across a lot of the agricultural areas, but they were warmer than average across the north and north east," he said.

Questions have been raised over the expectations of a hot and dry summer with El Nino, however, Pollock said the forecast was "quite neutral", while above average rainfall was unexpected.


"The long-range forecast that we put out in November for December wasn't really giving us an indication of what was likely to happen, so the chances were close to 50 per cent of above or below median rainfall," Mr Pollock said.

"That's what we'd seen in the past with El Nino, there isn't a clear pattern when we look at these events of below average or above average rainfall in December.

"With a probabilistic forecast, when we give percentages like that, technically they're never really right or wrong.

"It's difficult to verify how well a forecast like that has done."

Looking ahead at the next few months, the forecast is similar, with about 50 per cent chance of above or below average rainfall between Mount Barker to Goolwa, and neutral forecast for temperatures.

# World-first grape sharing ‘Project 5255’ returns to Langhorne Creek

Langhorne Creek’s industry-leading initiative ‘Project 5255’ will return in 2024 following the success of its first two vintages. Shining a spotlight on Langhorne Creek, the project offers three winemakers from other Australian wine regions the chance to discover a new grape-growing region and create a limited edition 100 per cent Langhorne Creek wine under their own label. Two tonnes of premium fruit of their choice are gifted to each winemaker, with mentoring support from seasoned Langhorne Creek grape growers and producers throughout the year from a successful harvest through to bottling. Langhorne Creek Grape & Wine Winemaker Committee Chair Sam Watkins said the project was so successful the first time around that it attracted national attention for the second vintage in 2022. He expects the same to happen for 2024. “We were overwhelmed with the level of interest for the project in its second

year,” he said. “Not only did we receive winemakers applying from across South Australia, but we also received several from interstate. “The calibre of the applicants for each round was outstanding, and the finished wines created a real buzz in the industry. “We were even contacted by an overseas wine region, asking if they could replicate the program.” “Showcasing the terroir of the Creek and its premium fruit was always our number one objective, and we think the project is doing just that, which we’re really proud of.” The first two rounds delivered six outstanding Langhorne Creek wines, each receiving high praise from wine writers around Australia. One of these wines even saw South Australian winemaker Charlotte Hardy of Charlotte Dalton Wines take home the top gong of Young Gun of Wine.

“I found the project to be one of those uplifting things you are lucky enough to do in your career that really changes your thinking and direction,” Ms Hardy said. “I was so thrilled to be selected for the project, but with all the excitement there were also nerves – a new region I knew little about, new people I’d never worked with, and a new (old) history to learn about. “I entered the Langhorne Creek Project 5255 Fiano as one of my two wines for Young Gun of Wine and won it – that seems like a pretty good endorsement. “I could not recommend this project more.” Also part of the inaugural 2020 vintage were Rob Mack of Aphelion Wines and Turon White of Turon Wines, delivering a Malbec and a Grenache, while Greg Clack and Kate Horstmann from XO Wines mixed it up with a Langhorne Creek Prosecco in 2022.

## Discount eID tags now available

As a part of the implementation of a national electronic identification (eID) traceability system for sheep and farmed goats, South Australia’s primary producers can now receive a point of sale eID tag discount. Discounted tags will be available to SA producers following an agreement with the following manufacturers of National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) accredited eID tags – Allflex Australia, Enduro, Leader Products and Shearwell – to provide a \$0.95 discount per tag, with tag arrangements being finalised with Datamars (Zee Tag).

The point-of-sale discount scheme is being funded by the State Government as part of its commitment to supporting producers in the transition to mandatory eID for sheep and farmed goats.

Early adopters of eID will benefit from being able to access discounted tags for breeding stock being kept beyond January 1, 2027 when it will be mandatory for them to be eID tagged before leaving their property of birth.

Sheep and farmed goats born on or after January 1, 2025 will need to be eID tagged before moving off property.

South Australian sheep and goat producers should see this discount passed on to them when purchasing fully accredited NLIS eID tags from rural retailers and from tag manufacturers that supply directly to producers.

As a point-of-sale discount, producers will not be required to complete any application forms, but the discounted tags must be aligned to the NLIS year of birth (black for 2024 and white for 2025) and are only available to producers with an active property identification code (PIC) registered with the Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA).

The eID Device Rebate (2023) remains open to producers for eligible tags purchased between January 1, 2023 – December 31, 2023.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven said having the best possibly traceability system was a key platform in protecting the \$2.96 billion livestock industry.



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# Rebate round opens to primary producers

South Australian primary producers can now access funding to install on-farm water infrastructure after the new round of the on-farm emergency water infrastructure rebate scheme opened.

A further \$8 million co-funded by the Federal and State Government is available through the scheme, with eligible primary producers able to claim up to 25 per cent of the cost of approved critical infrastructure, capped at \$25,000.

Initially launched in 2018 to support drought-affected primary producers, the

scheme has expanded to all council areas across the state, including those impacted by natural disasters that occurred after January 1, 2022, particularly the River Murray floods.

“South Australian primary producers have already seen the benefits of this scheme, and it’s great to see the support now available for primary producers affected by natural disasters,” Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, Clare Scriven, said.

“This round of the scheme will be of

particular assistance to livestock and horticulture producers impacted by the River Murray floods.

“Expansion of the scheme provides support to livestock and horticulture producers in repairing and replacing infrastructure damaged by natural disaster, and continues support to build resilience of primary producers to drought.”

Applications close on April 30, 2024 or when all funds are allocated.

## Young SES volunteer awarded Australia Day honour for dedication to service

A familiar drive is one way Strathalbyn resident Rhys Everett feels connected to the State Emergency Service (SES), for which his time and dedication to over the past two years has earned him Australia Day recognition.

Following in both his friend's and grandfather's footsteps, the young volunteer joined the Strathalbyn service in October 2022.

“A mate of mine was doing it at the time – he's still in it – but he was talking about it at school all the time, and I said ‘do you reckon I could join?’” Rhys said.

“But also, (I have) a lot of family history.

“My grandfather on my mum's side founded the mountain rescue service at Brecon Beacons in Wales, so I feel there's a lot of familiar drive, making me want to do things such as search and rescue and emergency service.”

Being just 17-years-old and in his final year of education, Rhys was limited in his capabilities at the station, but he remained dedicated and helped wherever he could.

The youngster even spent his 18th birthday responding to flood call-outs rather than celebrating with family and friends.

“As an SES volunteer you're not allowed to go on call-outs until you turn 18 and I joined as a 17-year-old, so I started doing some basic courses like first-aid and swift water rescue, and I did lots of publicity stuff like going to pageants and shows,” Rhys said.

“Since turning 18, I've done a lot of call-outs.

“It was difficult, but easy at the same time (to juggle school work) because there were days where if it's a tree down and you get a page, it's not major and I don't need to be pulled out of school for it, but on one occasion there was a dam failure response out on Paris Creek Road and I basically said to my teacher ‘this is a dam failure; I've got to go.’

“So, it all depends on when I was school, the severity of the incident... and what time of day.”

Rhys' commitment to helping the community and his volunteering efforts at the Strathalbyn unit all while completing his year 12 studies has earned him this year's Strathalbyn and Surrounds Young Citizen of the Year Award from Alexandrina Council.

He was shocked when he received the news.

“I'm just your average every day Joe – I didn't expect it,” Rhys said.

“Mum told me and my partner when she got home from work.

“Our first response was ‘are you sure you got the right Rhys?’

“It's pretty good.”

Rhys is currently undertaking a horticulture apprenticeship with an Adelaide Hills business, which means he mainly responds to call-outs that occur in the late afternoon/night or on weekends, but he loves being part of the service in any way he can.

He said it was a great feeling knowing you can help people.

“It's just become a part of my life, and it's easy to balance now because I'm used to it,” Rhys said.

“The group here are all very supporting.

“After a call-out, depending on what it is, I always have a good feeling knowing I've helped someone.

“For example, during the storms the day, we had (a call-out for) ceiling damage, and myself, my friend, and a few others responded to that call-out.

“We cleaned up, helped out, and left knowing we helped someone, and it's always a good feeling.”

Rhys believed more people should volunteer in the community.

“You can't just run a town on paid staff,” he said.

“Lots of people have jobs, but there should always be some aspect of your life that you should try to help others.

“Granted you might do that for work, but volunteering is a good thing to do for your community.”

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# Australia Day honours for long-standing Goolwa ambo officer

Goolwa South Australian Ambulance Service (SAAS) volunteer Chris Osborne has spent 25 years with the organisation, and has now been awarded the Active Citizenship Award for Goolwa and surrounds.

Mr Osborne said news of his award came “out of the blue”.

“It is nice to be recognised for service,” he said.

“I am just an ordinary person doing a job I enjoy, serving the general community here on the Fleurieu Peninsula in their times of need.”

Mr Osborne commits to a minimum of two shifts a week, and behind the scenes, performs other station responsibilities, taking a proactive approach to inventory and other administrative tasks.

He began his involvement with SAAS after his daughter was also interested in joining.

“I wasn’t doing anything in particular at that time,” Mr Osborne said.

“We had moved down here to the Fleurieu and I was retired and I thought ‘why not give it a go’, so I did the year or so training and came out an ambulance officer, and have done it for the past 25 years.

“I get satisfaction from helping people.

“I am normally a fairly calm and orderly person, so when we get into some situations that are quite traumatic sometimes, I can handle those without any problems.”

Mr Osborne was awarded the National Medal in 2012 for his service to both the Country Fire Service and the SAAS, followed by a Commendation for saving a colleague’s life who had a cardiac arrest while on shift in 2014, and then a Premier’s Certificate for recognition of outstanding volunteer service in 2021.

Being presented the Australia Day award was an honour in a different way.

“I think this is more of a, not an SA Ambulance award, but an award from the community here and (Alexandrina) Council, and it feels very gratifying to receive it,” he said.

“I would like to receive it on behalf of all our volunteers because all 40 of us do a really good job here in Goolwa.

“It is quite demanding.

“We do a 10-hour day shift or a 14-hour night shift, so it is not just a Mickey Mouse job, it is full on, full time.

“Sometimes we get five, six or seven jobs.... When I joined in 1999 we did about 1000 jobs

a year, in 2013 it was 1700 jobs, and last year it was 2400.”

Mr Osborne will turn 80 at the end of the year, and is looking towards retirement.

He said volunteering keeps him inspired.

“It is about keeping my old brain ticking over and remembering,” he said.

“There is a lot of misconception about us volunteers – some think we just drive the ambulance, and in fact, we fully crew (it).

“One of us attends and the other drives, and we swap over after each job.

“In Goolwa, we have 40 volunteers at the moment – 25 of them are ambulance officers like me, fully qualified, and we have 15 trainees in different stages of their training.

“We have quite an old community here on the South Coast and we get a lot of medical and sometimes trauma situations, and our training enables us to handle that.”

Mr Osborne encouraged other residents to consider joining the service.

# Young lifesaver’s heroic efforts earns him citizenship award

William Piper-Bamber has amassed an impressive 1500 hours and almost every weekend of patrolling Chiton Rocks – a commitment which saw him receive the honour of Young Citizen of the Year for Goolwa and surrounds.

The 22-year-old joined the Chiton Rocks Surf Lifesaving Club in 2017, and has demonstrated an unwavering commitment to beach safety ever since.

Last season, Mr Piper-Bamber logged 422 patrol hours across multiple clubs and engaged in 11 rescues, including critical out-of-hours efforts, motivated by giving back to the community and “helping the mission to save lives”.

“It’s a really unique place down south, and Chiton Rocks is quite a unique club,” he said.

“We’ve got a lot of challenges on our beach and (I am motivated by) being able to train the next generation to be able to spot dangers and prevent tragedies from happening – to save a life and do it properly.”

Mr Piper-Bamber is currently Chiton Rocks SLSC Club Captain, Chief Training Officer, Club Sports Officer, Gear and Equipment Steward, and an Executive member of the Board of Management.

His extensive training includes certifications in, Assessing, Training and Education, IRB drivers, Bronze Medallion, IRB crew and Advanced Resuscitation. A Chiton Rocks SLSC spokesperson commended Mr Piper-Bamber for his tireless service, leadership, and meticulous attention to detail across

club administration, club patrols, and the mentoring of younger members.

The spokesperson found Mr Piper-Bamber embodied SLSC’s core values and fosters a culture of safety and support.

“I’ve had a lot of mentors at Chiton Rocks over my time and they’ve always taken me under their wing and progressed me to the next level, and I’d like to thank them,” Mr Piper-Bamber said.

“They really pushed me to challenge myself and get better.”

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# Helen’s Active Citizenship surprise

Helen Stacey Bunton says she will use her Strathalbyn and surrounds Active Citizen of the Year award to thank people for their support and also shine a light on community projects she is involved in.

A professional artist of more than 30 years, Ms Bunton has donated paintings to auction as community fundraisers, and is also a driving force behind fundraising and publicity for the restoration of the St Andrews Church, helping a small committee raise more than \$260,000 so far for the project.

She and husband David also began the town’s History with Hilarity tours in four of Strathalbyn’s heritage areas over seven SA History Festivals.

The tours involve enthusiastic participants in period costumes from the Alexandrina Singers, Strathalbyn Players and St Andrews Uniting Church.

A former art teacher, Ms Bunton is also an active member of the Strathalbyn Aboriginal

Action and Reference Group.

“I am very surprised by the award, and see it as a chance to say thank you to people in the community, in particular, the St Andrews Restoration Fund,” she said.

“I am seeing this as an opportunity to lift the profile of that more in the community.

“We are at about \$260,000... (although) the figure we need is probably nearer to \$3 million, (but) because we are not a community-owned enterprise, and because it is a church enterprise it means that we are not eligible for a lot of grants.”

Ms Bunton found inspiration in projects by “seeing possibilities of what can happen”.

“You can’t hold yourself back from not doing anything,” she said.

“There is a need there, and there is an opportunity to work with others and make a difference.

“I think that is the thing that I have appreciated, whether it is a social justice issue that David and I have been involved in in practical ways or in (the case of the church), building community through doing something that is very practical.

“(It is) a heritage church that is the oldest Presbyterian building in SA, and we can’t give up on it.

“It is the centre of the town, it is a focal

point... and it is just wonderful to work with an iconic building like that, that is a spiritual heart for the town, but also a cultural heart as well.”

This year’s History with Hilarity street theatre will be staged on the first two weekends in May during the SA

History Festival.

“So far nearly 1000 people have attended in seven years,” Ms Bunton said.

“We looked at particular locations and then ferreted out the history of that area, and then see how we illustrate this with song and sketches.

“In each location we do it for two years. We have done the first year, so this will be the second year, and the title of it is *What the Barmaid Knew* – there were little places of particular interest to gentlemen in High Street at different times”.

Ms Bunton’s interest in community work came from her father, Colin Stacey, who was a great role model.

“For many years he served on the Strathalbyn District Council and the Strathalbyn Hospital Board, helped establish the St John Ambulance Service, and was a member of Rotary,” she said.

Ms Bunton is now turning her attention to a new project to raise funds for the St Andrews church – A Gifts and Talents fundraiser.

“It is about matching one person’s gifts and skills with another person’s needs,” she said.

“The value of the gift or talented work goes into the Restoration fund.”

## Christmas Where the Angas Flows committee adds to accolades

One of Strathalbyn’s longest-running community events has taken out this year’s Strathalbyn and surrounds Community Event of the Year.

Christmas Where the Angas Flows is a free annual community celebration held on the banks of the town’s Angas River in the Soldier Memorial Gardens, and can trace its beginnings back to 1948.

An organising committee made up of members of the Strathalbyn Inter-Church Council and interested community members organised this year’s festivities, which included free entertainment rides for children, market stalls, a concert program of entertainment, followed by a fireworks display, while the Strathalbyn Tourism Association organised the town’s pageant to coincide with the celebrations, and

Alexandrina Council the road closures.

Christmas Where the Angas Flows committee spokespeople Graham Jenke and Norma Keily said committee members were overwhelmed by the announcement of the award.

“I guess it is recognitions of the work that the committee puts into it,” Mr Jenke said.

“Everybody in the town says ‘it is such a good event, and we really enjoyed it’, so I guess it is verifying what the people in the district think – it is their community event of the year.”

Mrs Keily said the huge turn-out of people at the event meant it was truly a community occasion.

“From my point of view, being a Christian, it is important to have an event at Christmas time that showcases what Christmas is all about, and that is also fun,” she said.

“You have the carols, you’ve got the

Christian input, and you have got the fun activities as well.

“It is hard to gauge the numbers as there is no-one there with a counter, so we just look and think ‘there is more people here than last time’, so it is all good.

“Where would we put more people if it is bigger this year.”

Christmas Where the Angas Flows returned in 2022 after a COVID-enforced break, and organisers had been expecting lower crowd numbers this time around.

Fellow committee member Belinda Croser put the huge turn-out down to a number of factors.

“We had a culmination of things,” she said.

“We picked the great weather... some others had had their’s cancelled, or hadn’t managed to get the fireworks put together.

“I think people are all now descending on those towns that offer a complete package,

with the pageant, entertainment, food stalls, market stalls, and a great music program, so I think it was a combination of everything that worked in our favour.”

Mr Jenke said the volunteers reward was simply seeing people enjoying themselves.

“I guess the thing that makes it possible is the community support we get for funding because we put on free children’s rides, we don’t charge for anything apart from the trade stalls and the food vendors, and we try to have locals for that so they make money,” he said.

“But everything else is all funded by the community, from \$10 to \$1000.”

Mr Jenke is hoping his volunteers will be back on board for 2024.

“I haven’t asked them all yet,” he said.

“Two years ago we had a whole group of new people come on, and they stayed for another year, so I am hoping that they will stay on another year yet.”

# Goolwa's green thumbs awarded

A group of Goolwa gardeners are now reaping what they have sown, after spending eight years transforming a once barren area in the wharf precinct into a beautiful garden, which is now being recognised with an award.

The Little Scotland Gardening Group will be awarded the Mayor's Community Service Award for Goolwa and surrounds at the Alexandrina Australia Day awards ceremony next Friday.

The garden in the historic part of Goolwa,

Little Scotland, was first established by Barbara Staniford as a tribute to her husband's great-great-grandfather, Captain George Johnston.

Captain Johnston played a strong role in establishing the river trade in town, built many cottages in the Little Scotland and was the first person to take a steamer through the Murray Mouth.

Mrs Staniford and her husband remain in his home on Admiral Terrace, the street where the up to 15 volunteers meet monthly, as well as along the connecting Barb's Way path.

"It's been a beautiful community (activity) – people come out, they're stimulated, they love chatting and friendships have been formed," Mrs Staniford said.

"I think (Little Scotland Gardening Group members) are passionate about coming out and helping and getting together as a community – gardening is just a part of it.

"We have nights where we get together once a month for a meal.

"Everyone just embraces each other in this little area – it's easy to do, it's a lovely community."

Over the years, the tended garden has expanded along Admiral Terrace and beyond, down to the SteamRanger Heritage Railway line, whose members they work with to clear green waste near the railway while picking up litter from the rest of the space.

With hardy donated and propagated plants, the space has evolved to now include Indigenous

and native gardens and a vibrant wetland.

"It's a real talking point because there's tourists here all the time – there are people walking up here with their dogs, there are people visiting, and they're asking 'what is this?'" Mrs Staniford said.

"It's always a story (to tell) of what we've done here."

Mrs Staniford described the "great honour" of receiving the award.

"It's lovely to recognise the volunteers and what they've done," she said.

"It's a great honour for the Mayor and council to recognise what we've been doing.

"It's beautifying the wharf precinct, basically, and we just all love coming out to garden."

## Stephen aces Community Service Award

"Each time we had about three

months to do the submission, as it was spaced over a couple of years because we missed the first one."

Mr Blewett said there was a sense of satisfaction that the project turned out well.

"We have played on it, and people are really happy with the courts," he said.

"(While) we finished on budget, which was good, we (also) finished about three weeks early which was even better.

"We tried hard to use as many local contractors as possible as well... some did it without charging anything for it, which was really good from a community point of view, and also good from a budget point of view."

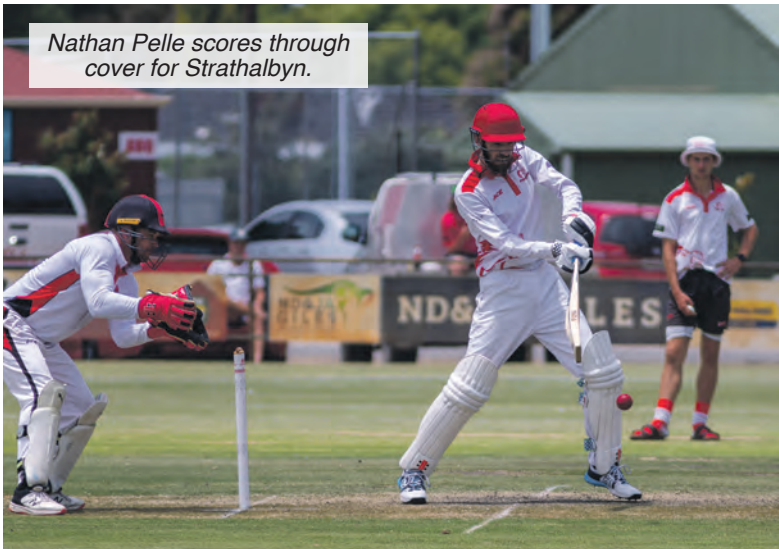

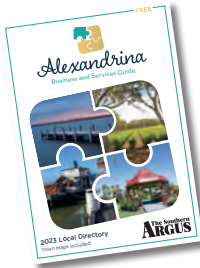

Fellow opener Amy Ratcliffe was bowled by Hull the next over, and once the third wicket was taken, Woodville South struggled to score more runs.

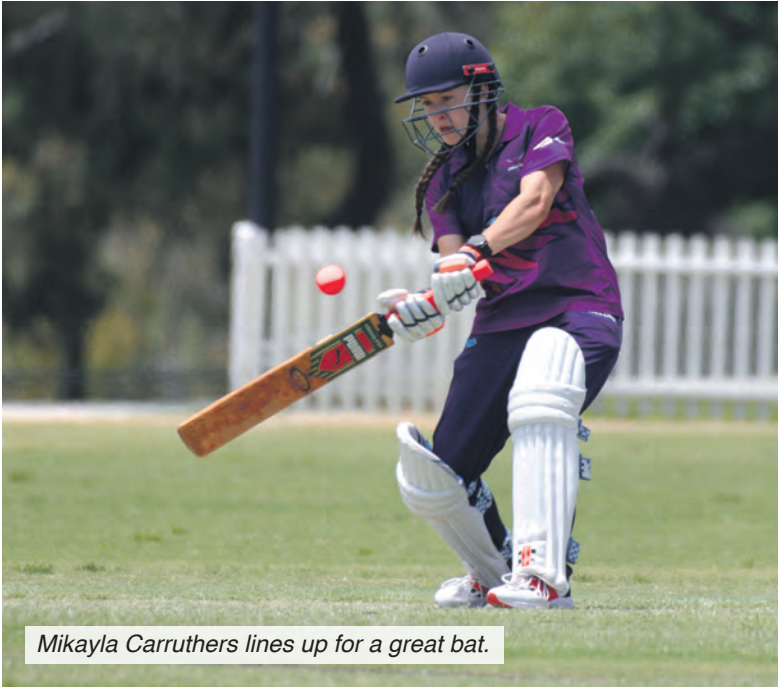
A hotly-contested last few overs saw the game come down to the final ball, where the Falcons fielders did enough to keep the visitors to 91 runs and

Will Davis from Inman Valley

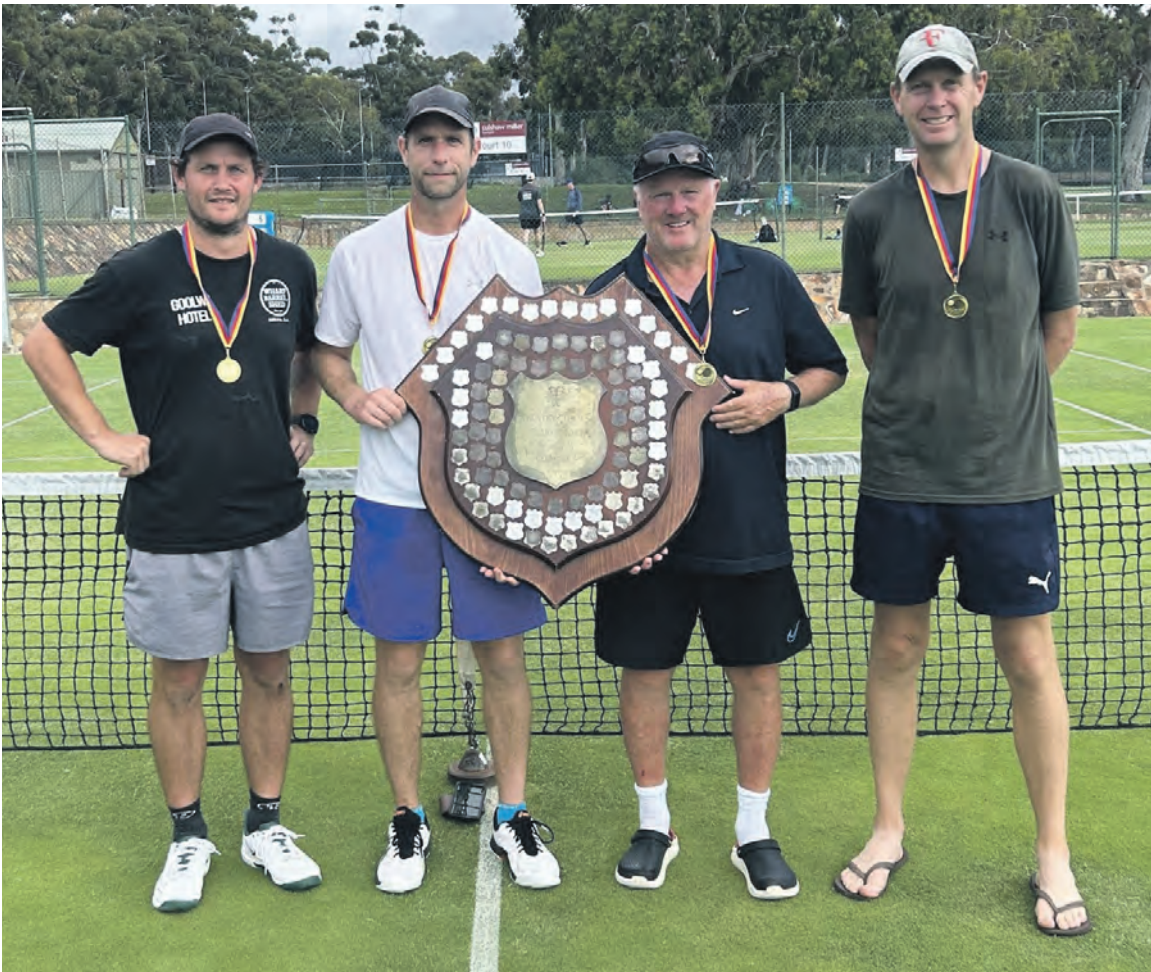
participated in the Under 10s' tournament in a combined team from the Onkaparinga and Riverland associations, against far more experienced grass players.

For those of you who are using Weak Twos to show a 6-card Major with less than opening points, rather than Multi-2 openings, the Precision 2Diamonds has a lot going for it. First of all, it makes use of a bid which is not worth much as a natural opening (because it is a Minor suit) and every single bid from partner in response has a constructive and unique meaning.

All Precision bids other than Weak twos and 1 Club carry a HCP range of 11-15 and I would suggest that if you adopt this bid, you should stick to the same range. Less than 11 you might not consider opening, and above 15 with two 4-card Majors and something in both Minors, you have a well documented set of pathways from an opening 1NT.

There is a down side, when the responder has a very weak hand and less than 10 HCP, because the opening 2 D is artificial and should only be passed when Responder has 6+ Diamonds and no support for either Major.

In brief, any response of 2H or 2S shows up to 10 HCP and 4-card support for the Major called ; if you have 8 trumps, the Law of Total Tricks says you should be able to make 8 tricks. With 11-14 HCP and a 4-card Major, Responder bids 3H/3S, inviting opener to bid 4 with a maximum, pass with a minimum. With 15+ Responder can bid 4H/4S immediately or even ask for Aces if in the Slam range. With 11+ and no support for either Major but stoppers in the Minors, a NT bid is the fix.

In the hand above, the auction is all over in two bids and both partners know exactly what to expect. On the night this hand was played, 4S was the contract at 6 tables, making 7, 8 or 9 tricks, and we were the only pair in 3 Spades (Thanks to the Precision bid) and we made 9 tricks for a score of 140, beaten only by one pair in 3NT, also making 9 tricks on the lead of the ♠7.
