## Employment model expansion hopes to attract more regional doctors...

More doctors are being deployed to regional practices throughout South Australia through the expansion of an employment model which will hopefully attract and retain general practitioners (GPs) in country areas.

Doctors completing their GP training must usually change private employers for each required training placement, which affects their leave entitlements and other conditions, however, the Single Employer Model (SEM) allows them to be employed by SA Health for

up to four years as they finish their rural generalist and general practice training, moving between private and public placements as needed.

After a successful trial in the Riverland, the Federal and State Government are expanding the SEM – which provides certainty around where these doctors work, their income, and employment conditions like work hours, on-call obligations and leave entitlements – with a new four-year trial under way at all regional Local Health Networks (LHN).

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## Innovative lifesavers receive state award

A time saving solution during an emergency designed by Goolwa Surf Life Saving volunteers has earned state-wide recognition.

After years of collaboration with other volunteers and refining, members Matt and Damion Burrage developed a quick-release, tie down mechanism for faster access to rescue boards mounted to the club's vehicles.

The concept was recognised with Innovation of The Year at recent 2025 Awards of Excellence.

"It was a bit of a shock," Matt said.
"It was quite a simple idea and it worked."

The idea was sparked after unnecessary delay and stress during a rescue in 2018 when rescuers dealt with multiple knots.

The brothers – who have been in Surf Life Saving since they were children – researched how other clubs secured their equipment, and found no standard approach.

They found traditional methods not only time-consuming, but also prone to

failure in emergencies and contributed to equipment damage.

Over six patrol seasons, and in collaboration with other members, the Burrages developed a simple, cheap and easy to use solution – a one-handed, quick-release system without the need for knots, worn straps, and metal clips.

The system – referred to as an Olive shockcord clet – is often used in sailing and is adaptable to any vehicle, affordable and strong enough to withstand high speeds and winds.

Now in use on Goolwa's two rescue boards

and spinal board, the system has significantly reduced response times.

"We've been playing with it for a while and we got it to a sweet spot at the moment," Matt said.

"There's been lots of modifications along the way... we've got it to a nice place."

After a double rescue in March this year, members appreciated the efficiency of the new system, which saves seconds during an emergency.

"Seconds do count," Matt said.

"The quicker and easier you can get the board off, the better it'll be for the rescue."

His brother Damion and Club Captain Cassie Wilmot were among five state finalists for Surf Life Saver of the Year.

Meanwhile, the brothers were also among some of the club's most dedicated volunteers last season.


Members who log more than 150 patrol hours in the season 2024/25 were acknowledged.

Across the state, surf lifesavers volunteered more than 90,000 hours, with some donating more than the equivalent of four working weeks to this cause.

Local members who clocked more than 150 hours were Jack Breen, Damion and Matthew, Matthew Ludgate and Cassandra Wilmot.

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# New hospital expected to meet demand

The state's health minister has dismissed budget and capacity concerns for the new Mount Barker Hospital, saying it's on track to meet the demand and needs of the Hills population.

Construction has officially kickstarted on the clinical services building for the new Mount Barker Hospital.

It's one of the first to be started on the multi-million-dollar hospital which has had its budget steadily increase since the announcement of its build.

It was first estimated to cost \$220 million but was pushed out a further \$100 million in the 2023-24 State Budget, and then increased once more in the 2024-25 budget to reach a total of \$365.8 million.

Health Minister Chris Picton claimed increasing building costs was to blame.

"We've increased the budget to make sure we can deliver the best possible outcome, and there's no doubt that construction costs here and around the world have increased substantially since we started this project," he said.

"We're making sure we're not having to make compromises in terms of what the clinical outcome would be of delivering this hospital... therefore we have made sure the budget means we can deliver what is needed for the Hills."

In addition to budget concerns, questions have been raised about whether the hospital will meet the demand of the growing population by the time it's completed.

According to Mount Barker District Council figures, the local population is expected to increase from 33,000 to 55,000 by 2036.

However, Mr Picton was confident all advice pointed to the hospital meeting that demand.

"All our advice is (that) this meets the needs of the Hills and that's why we're not increasing it by a little bit, we're increasing it by a huge amount," he said.

"Obviously, this becomes a hub for the Hills, so we expect there will be people not just from the Mount Barker community, but neighbouring towns around the Adelaide Hills who will come here for their emergency care, surgery, birthing, and mental health care, and that will mean a lot of people in Strath or other communities in the Hills won't have to go to the city.

"Would this have been better if this had been built a few years ago? Of course, but since we're elected, we're dealing with the situation that's confronted us and that's a hospital that was far too small for the population of the area."



## Works kickstarted on first hospital buildings

Construction is now under way on the new Mount Barker Hospital.

Some community services were moved off-site and former buildings demolished to make way for the new build earlier this year, but now construction has officially begun, starting with the clinical services building – the heart of the \$365.8 million new hospital.

It will feature new and expanded health services which will ensure Adelaide Hills residents are able to access care closer to home while at the same time easing pressure on major metropolitan hospitals.

The new building will begin taking shape over the next few months, and Health Minister Chris Picton, who was onsite to see the works firsthand last Thursday, was excited to see it coming together.

"This has been a hospital that has been bursting at the seams for many years, but particularly with the massive population growth in Mount Barker, a new hospital is desperately needed," he said

desperately needed," he said.

"Part of the design of the new clinical building is making sure that we can build as part of it a new mental health ward – this will be the first inpatient mental health facility we have in the Adelaide Hills and is going to mean more people can get that care locally without having to go to the city, and more capacity for what we know is a growing area of health demand.

"I remember standing with Dan (Cregan), who sadly won't be the MP when this is

complete, at the beginning of 2022, announcing our intention to do this project and it was obviously very early stages then... but to now see this come to fruition is a powerful moment for the whole Hills community.

"There's clearly been a lot of concern from the Hills community for many years that the infrastructure hasn't been there to meet the increasing population.

"I think now we can see an absolute demonstration of what investing in that infrastructure looks like and it is actually happening."

The key part of the clinical building design is to ensure capacity for birthing services and care for families afterwards.

For Mount Barker District Soldiers' Memorial Hospital – which is the fourth biggest birthing centre in the state and has seen a record-high of 69 single-term births in the last month – this will be particularly important.

"Midwifery will include a nursery, so we'll be able to increase the capacity that we serve here," Interim Midwifery Unit Manager, Kate Maxwell, said.

"We'll be able to keep the consumers closer to home – those over 34 weeks and with twins – but we'll also be able to increase our birthing services as well as the neo-natal services, so we'll be able to reduce that pressure off tertiary centres."

The new hospital also complements the emerging health precinct at Strathalbyn.

Between the Strathalbyn Aged Care Facility, the after-hours nurse-led clinic, the soon-to-be-transformed Kalimna Hostel, the independent health hub on High Street, and the Mount Barker Hospital, Hills Fleurieu residents will be able to access a variety of

healthcare services.

"We've been doing all our planning work on a sub-regional basis, so we've moved a lot of workforce models instead of being site-specific to be region-specific so we can manage the type of care people need across the region," Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network Chief Executive Officer, Bronwyn Masters, said.

"What we're seeing at Strathalbyn is a large aged care precinct.

"We've got a six-bed geriatric evaluation management unit which is to support older people return to home after being in hospital – that's achieving amazing outcomes for our consumers – then we've got acute beds at Strathalbyn as well.

"The Kalimna Hostel will be used for outpatients, so we'll see a precinct for subacute, less complex patient cohorts, then there's the after-hours nurse-led clinic as well to support lower acuity patients.

"However, if a consumer needs (a) higher (level) of care, they can come to Mount Barker to receive that."

The internal designs for the hospital will be released for consultation for people to provide feedback and input on.

Work is also due to start soon on the hospital's new 654-space multi-deck carpark – up from the former carpark's 431.

The hospital remains on track for completion and opening by the end of 2027.

Once completed, it will triple current inpatient capacity and will be the first newly-built all-electric South Australian public health facility, helping to reduce the state's carbon emissions.

"I think if you go anywhere across regional South Australia, they'll tell you how important is to make sure we have more doctors, and there's been a lot of barriers that have caused issues in terms of how we get doctors in the regions," SA Health Minister, Chris Picton, said.

"Some of those are about the way we employ doctors for their training, so it tends to be that doctors who work in general practice will be effectively self-employed – that means they don't get leave and a regular salary as opposed to staff who work at SA Health who are on a salary employed basis.

"We've been trialling in the Riverland for the past few years what's called the Single Employer Model which is where we can employ doctors to work between primary care and GP practices and in our hospitals in the region, so they can get all of that training working for SA Health, and then we've got a partnership agreement with the GP practices to allow that occur, but also with the Federal Government who would normally block us being able to get the Medicare revenue that patients get through primary care to pay those salaries.

"By working through this, this has been a

successful model in developing that training – it's been really attractive for new doctors to want to be part of that – and we've seen the benefit, hence we're expanding it across the state."

So far, 57 GP practices have been approved to take part in the new SEM trial across the five regional LHNs, with 11 trainee doctors having joined the trial this year and another two due to join by the end of August.

Among the doctors who are already taking part in the model is Rachel Crook who is a GP Registrar in Mount Barker.

As someone who comes from a rural area and is passionate about rural medicine, the SEM allowed Dr Crook to access her training without losing benefits that come from job security, while also providing professional development opportunities.

She added it also helped her give patients more consistent access to primary care.

"I think it's a privilege to live and work in a community where you can look after your community and see them as well," Dr Crook said.

"It's lovely to have that integration across both general practice and the hospital, where you can look after people across both, and really get that continuity of care. "You get that real community feel where they're your neighbours and people around you as well."

It is hoped the expansion to other areas in the state will result in more trainees remaining in regional areas, leading to better medical support for those communities.

"Not having to be based in Adelaide to do all of those steps of your training means it will be easier for us to be able to have doctors complete that training in the regions without basing themselves in the city," Mr Picton said.

"We've now got this first cohort of doctors out on the field and we're hopeful this is going to lead to more practices taking this up and a stronger pipeline of doctors coming into regional South Australia.

"We have for a long time been facing a crisis in terms of regional medical workforce, and of course, no one is saying it's fixed, but we can see this is a real hope on the horizon that is making a difference now.

"The pathway for doctors in terms of training is a long one, but we think this is a really important way of making a difference for those doctors."

Applications are now open for next year's intake of SEM trial participants.

# Mega shake-up of Mt Barker's Wallis Cinema complex

In a massive expansion for Wallis Cinemas, the popular movie-based business plans to transform its current Mount Barker site into a function and entertainment complex complemented by a new four-star, five-storey hotel next door.

The Mount Barker complex on Adelaide Road and Dumas Street currently features seven cinema rooms, but under a new development application it would remove two of these to construct a four-storey addition inclusive of a function venue accommodating 360 seated guests, a balcony and associated kitchen, bar and service facilities, eight lanes of ten-pin bowling, arcade, amusement games and a bar, mini golf, laser tag, food and beverage area and a sensory retreat, and storage areas and stage access on the lower ground level.

Meanwhile, next door a five-storey, four-star hotel featuring 100 units/rooms is proposed to be constructed for tourist accommodation.


The ground level includes a hotel lobby and reception area, services and back-of-house areas, as well as undercroft parking and valet.

The development of the cinema building requires the removal of one regulated tree and one significant, and the demolition of a small portion of the existing carpark, while the hotel will need to remove one regulated tree.

Both developments plan to provide further community and recreation facilities and much-needed accommodation for the town.

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## **Alexandrina Council passes its budget**

Alexandrina Council adopted its budget on Monday night with some significant changes to its forecasted figures and operating initiatives.

The draft 2025/26 Annual Community Plan proposed a 3.05 per cent average rate rise which will remain unchanged, however, the initial 1.8 per cent factored in for rates growth will reduce to 1.4 per cent due to changes to capital values.

This reduction has been offset by a reduction in discretionary rate rebates and additional income in Community Wastewater Management Systems (CWMS) fixed charges.

The average residential property with 10.7 per cent increase in capital value will experience an increase in general rates of \$77 to \$2545, while the average primary production property with a 7.5 per cent increase in capital value is growing by \$54 to \$2812.

Additionally, the operating expenditure for the coming financial year has significantly increased from what was previously stated.

During the consultation period on the budget, council held four budget roadshow sessions which garnered 103 attendees, and received 37 responses from the MySay website and 17 written submissions.

The overriding sentiment from residents was that they appreciated the efforts taken to limit expenditure and put downward pressure on rates, but would like to see ongoing improvements, and have additional projects and initiatives funded.

These changes include a season extension for the Strathalbyn Swimming Pool, grants for the Mount Compass Burgess Oval, Goolwa Netball Club and Langhorne Creek Netball Club, a community survey to understand community satisfaction of existing services, increased funding to the contribution program to support community halls, a community trees give away initiative, and internally co-ordinated community consultation on a progressive tree replacement program, which has resulted in an increase of \$120,000 to the budget.

An additional \$1.02 million has also been added to the capital program for the inclusion of stormwater capital works at Middleton and Albyn Terrace electrical works to install power outlets for Christmas Where the Angas Flows and other events, with an offset of \$50,000 for a reduction in Lot 10 works.

In contrast, council has found information technology savings in software licensing secured with ongoing decreases and in its grant program, and increased its contribution to traffic management costs to reduce the operating expenditure by \$170,000.

Similarly, the adjustments have reduced the operating deficit from the previous \$2.118 to \$2.082 million.

CWMS service charge for the financial year will increase to \$741 for occupied and \$547 for vacant – an increase of \$16 and \$22 respectively from last financial year.

Council borrowings as presented have increased to \$46.027 million.

After months of collaborative workshops between elected members and staff, combined with the work council has done over the past six months to control expenditure, councillors were thrilled to pass the budget.

Particularly West Ward councillor Bill Coomans who has failed to support recent council budgets but was quick to back this one.

"It was argued last year that we didn't (listen) – this year I think we really did listen because those that didn't provide input did have every opportunity to do so," he said.

"The majority of comments showed an appreciation of what we were trying to do, so I think we've taken the community with us in relation to this.

"We found savings which meant most of the suggestions could be accommodated, and also trimmed some of the budget items.

"The last five years I have been here I have not supported one budget because I thought they were all short of the mark.

"I was very happy to move this one because I think this is a bloody good budget."

Council also adopted its Long-Term Financial Plan 2025-35, which outlines how council intends to manage its finances over the next decade to ensure it can stay financially sustainable while delivering services and infrastructure to the community.

In the plan it addresses the Essential Services Commission of South Australia review released in February, and factors in government grants and funding, inflation, service demand and standards, labour demands, and asset management and infrastructure needs.

The plan has been updated since public consultation to include bringing forward \$1 million into 2025/26 and \$1.025 million into 2026/27 for the Middleton stormwater works.

"This is our roadmap," North Ward councillor, Sue Miller, said.

"We can't think year-to-year.

"The Long-Term Financial Plan helps lift our gains and think about what's coming, and it speaks to intergenerational decisions."

## **Mount Barker adopts rate rise**

Mount Barker District Council formally approved a general rate increase of 3.5 per cent as part of its 2025/26 Annual Business Plan, Budget and Rating Policy on Monday night.

This marks the final year of council's three-year plan to smooth out rate increases over time to help reduce the impact of high inflation on household budgets by avoiding sharp rate increases.

The \$203 million budget outlines a comprehensive plan for service delivery and capital works, with continued investment in infrastructure, environmental sustainability and community programs.

Funding will be drawn from \$54.8 million in general rates, \$20.3 million in grants and developer contributions, and \$109.6 million from cash reserves, loans and asset sales.

Mayor David Leach described getting the balance between affordability for residents and the growing need to maintain essential services and infrastructure "one of the biggest challenges" for any council.

"The result is a budget that is both responsive and responsible," he said.

"Council has and will continue to consider the impact of rates on all sections of our community, including residents on fixed incomes and local farmers."

During Monday night's meeting, some councillors such as Cr Samantha Jones supported the rate rise, finding spending has been cut in various areas, and commitment was needed to deliver the three-year rate smoothing strategy.

"No one wants to stand here and say your rates are going up," she said.

"True leadership is not making the popular decisions, not making the easy ones, and not making the ones that will just get us votes, but we need to make the right ones that are going to make us sustainable and keep ensuring that we're on track."

However, Cr Rebecca Hewett opposed a rate increase when some people are living "pay cheque to pay cheque", especially during a cost-of-living crisis, and when some residents were without water during the drought.

"The feedback that I have heard from my community is they want council to cut its own non-essential spending in order to

reduce the burden on ratepayers," she said.
"People in our communities are being stretched to breaking point."

Major projects in the coming financial year include:

- The completion of the Summit Aquatic and Leisure Centre, with stage one opening next month.
- Significant investment in wastewater infrastructure, with more than \$100 million allocated to upgrades of the sewer network and wastewater treatment plant.
- Construction on the town square is expected to begin in early 2026 following the successful securing of \$2 million in State Government funding.

Transport planning and road infrastructure will also be a major focus, with detailed transport modelling determining where upgrades are most needed.

Plans include:

- The Springs Road upgrade between Bald Hills Road and Heysen Boulevard will progress.
- Final designs will be completed for Paech, Sims and Hartmann Roads.

A range of community-focused projects and initiatives are also planned, such as trials of alternative bin collection methods, and new partnerships to improve library services in smaller townships.

A new grant program will be introduced to support upgrades to community-managed facilities, and concept planning will begin for a regional skate park.

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#### Ladies' Probus Club learns bonsai techniques

#### Industries given algal bloom update

The algal bloom continues to impact the state, now spreading to metropolitan waters.

State Government agencies met with commercial fishers, tourism operators and local councils on Friday to provide an update on the current situation with the bloom, ongoing public health information, and the impacts it's having on the marine environment.

The meeting also addressed future research priorities associated with the bloom to better understand how to mitigate future outbreaks.

On top of that, a cross government working group, including SA Health, Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA), Environment Protection Authority (EPA), South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI) and Department of Environment and Water (DEW), has been meeting weekly for the last several months to monitor the bloom and to begin preparations for interventions to assist recovery.

"(This latest) update for commercial fishers, tourism operators and councils ensures those impacted by the bloom have the most up-to-date information available," Minister for Climate, Environment and Water, Susan Close, said.

"The algal bloom is a dynamic situation.
"Its movement depends on weather and water conditions, and therefore, makes the effect on people and wildlife unpredictable.

"Latest observations show increased levels of chlorophyll-a – an indicator of algae concentrations but not necessarily concentrations of harmful algae – between Port Adelaide and Aldinga.

"High levels also have been detected along the eastern and western coastlines of Spencer Gulf, Investigator Strait near North Cape on Kangaroo Island, Troubridge Point on Yorke Peninsula and along the coastline from Victor Harbor to Robe."

The State Government is preparing a recovery plan as the bloom recedes to assist the environment to recover as quickly as possible.

The Federal Government will be kept informed of this plan and its assistance will likely be sought to fund some interventions.

State Cabinet will be briefed about the bloom and the recovery plan next week.

## **Battery storage facility to integrate with Strathalbyn substation**

A proposed facility providing an "essential service" to the community is looking to integrate into an existing electricity substation just outside the Strathalbyn town centre.

Lunio Energy has lodged a development application for the construction of a battery storage facility (BESS) comprising of the placement of six containers containing batteries and a transformer station, along with associated high security fencing and civil works at 2133 Callington Road, which already houses a substation.

The renewable energy facility would be located on the north-eastern portion of the site, adjacent to the existing enclosed substation, well-away from any primary activities.

The proposed transformers and control room have inbuilt temperature and/or fire monitoring sensors that send real-time signals to the control room fire panel, and if an alert condition is detected, emergency

services are automatically alerted.

The batteries are Lithium Iron Phosphate (LFP), and have an automated and inbuilt automatic fire alarm and aerosol fire extinguishing system.

The LFP battery fire alarm system

includes a range of components such as smoke detectors, temperature detectors, an alarm bell, sound and light alarm indicators, deflation indicator lights, an emergency start button, an emergency stop button, among others.

SA Power Networks will need to connect an export generation system to the network which will cost the applicant \$17,710.

Under a proposed flexible demand arrangement with SA Power Networks, the proposed battery system will be subject to limits on the time and/or rate at which it may charge.

## **Encounter Bay driver charged** with multiple traffic offences

Police arrested and charged an Encounter Bay man with multiple traffic offences following investigations into a three-car crash at Middleton last month.

As previously reported in *The Southern* Argus, at 9pm on June 11, a white Holden Commodore sedan was detected travelling at the extreme speed of 146km/h in a 60km/h zone at Port Elliot Road, and then picked up by another patrol in Goolwa as it did a

The patrol activated its lights and sirens, however, the driver refused to pull over.

The pursuit was terminated as the Commodore entered the 100km/h zone on Port Elliot Road, heading back towards Middleton, but a couple of minutes later, police located a three-car crash at the intersection of Port Elliot Road and Boettcher Road, and requested emergency services.

The alleged Commodore driver, a 41-yearold Encounter Bay man, sustained serious injuries in the crash and was taken to hospital.

One of the other drivers, a 65-year-old Goolwa South woman, sustained serious injuries when her Land Rover rolled and was taken to hospital for treatment, while the third driver, a 35-year-old Goolwa North man whose vehicle was clipped was uninjured.

The injured drivers have since been released from hospital.

Last Tuesday, police arrested the Encounter Bay man and charged him with driving while disqualified, extreme speeding, failing to stop for police, dangerous driving to escape police, causing harm by dangerous driving, misuse of a motor vehicle, and drink and drug driving.

He was bailed to appear in Victor Harbor Magistrates Court on September 1.

## **New laws bust** dodgy practices

South Australia now has the toughest penalties in the nation for dodgy car dealers caught winding back odometers and selling cars without a licence.

Consumer and Business Services will be cracking down on those doing the wrong thing, with a campaign launched to ensure sellers understand their obligations and the increased penalties they will be hit with for non-compliance.

From July 1, the maximum penalty for winding back an odometer has increased from \$10,000 to \$150,000 for a first or second offence, and/or up to two years imprisonment for a third or subsequent offence.

The penalty for unlicensed dealing will also rise from \$100,000 to \$150,000 for a first or second offence, and the potential jail time for third or subsequent offences will double from one year to two years in prison, while the fine will increase from \$100,000 to \$250,000 for an individual and \$500,000 for a body corporate.

The tougher penalties have been sparked by an uptick in complaints about unlicensed selling and odometer tampering as cost-of-living pressures and difficulty acquiring new vehicles have seen more people purchasing second-hand.

"For the first time, anyone caught winding back an odometer will face jail time or a fine of up to \$150,000, along with longer sentences and higher fines for unlicensed dealing," Consumer and Business Affairs Minister, Andrea Michaels, said.

"Purchasing a car is a significant investment and we don't want to see people being ripped off or taken advantage of by being sold a lemon."

You must have a licence if you buy, sell or offer for sale four or more vehicles in 12 months.

All licensed dealers have the same legal obligations regardless of whether they are selling vehicles from a car yard or their home.

The government is aware of licensed dealers intentionally selling from home under the guise of being a private seller to attempt to avoid their legal obligations such as providing a statutory warranty or disclosing whether a car was a repairable write-off.

An uptick in complaints have also been received about unlicensed sellers selling from sites such as Facebook Marketplace and engaging in dodgy practices, including winding back the odometer to make it seem like the car has travelled fewer kilometres.

With winter keeping people inside, we don't want to see this danger continue, especially as people depend more on their electricals appliances to keep warm."

Mr Hussey encouraged homeowners to follow a few easy steps to make their homes safer this winter.

"Homeowners can do simple safety checks such as inspecting their heating appliances, keeping them away from flammable materials, and not overloading power outlets," he said.

"These simple precautions can help protect your home, your belongings, and most importantly, your family."

AAMI recommends a range of ways people can protect their home from fires:

- Inspect heating appliances for damaged plugs, frayed cords or signs of overheating. It is recommended to have appliances tested and tagged by a qualified electrician to ensure they are in working order.
- Keep appliances one metre away from anything flammable such as curtains, furniture, bedding or drying laundry.
- Avoid overloading power outlets by only plugging one heat-producing appliance into a single power outlet at a time.
- Test smoke alarms monthly to ensure they are working correctly, have fresh batteries, and are located on every level of your home, including bedrooms and hallways.
- Check electric blankets for scorch marks, frayed cords or damaged elements before use.
- Only use manufacturer or recommended charging cables for all electrical appliances including phones, especially e-scooters and

## Mt Barker teacher fronts court over alleged offences

A Mount Barker teacher accused of alleged child sex offences fronted court for the first time last Thursday.

As previously reported in *The Southern* Argus, Cornerstone College Principal Thomas Brennen recently advised parents that a member of the school's teaching staff had been arrested and charged by police with unlawful sexual intercourse with a person in relation to a historical allegation.

No evidence at this stage suggests any currently enrolled students are involved.

The accused teacher Symon Gogel, aged 49, fronted Mount Barker Magistrates Court last week, where an SA Police prosecutor requested the case be adjourned for 14 weeks in order to

Mr Gogel was initially suspended from his duty pending the outcome of the police investigation and prosecution, and banned from attending the college, however, The Argus understands his employment has since been terminated.

Magistrate Oliver Koehn remanded Mr Gogel on continuing bail to face Adelaide Magistrates Court in October.

## Suspicious fire at Mt Barker school

Hills Fleurieu police are investigating a suspicious fire at Mount Barker school last Tuesday.

Just before 6pm on July 1, police and fire crews were called to the Dumas Street following reports of a fire.

On arrival, they located an in-ground trampoline alight which was quickly extinguished by Metropolitan Fire Service firefighters.

Thankfully no one was injured and the damage was contained to the trampoline.

## Farm firefighting unit program expanded

A State Government program to help landholders purchase essential firefighting equipment has been expanded, with more support available and community water tanks included for the first time to protect lives and property.

The latest round of Farm Firefighting Unit (FFU) grants enables farmers to buy equipment they need to safely respond to fire emergencies and help keep their communities sate.

The program - reinstated under a \$2 million election commitment - has supported more than 650 farmers across the past three rounds, funding around 1300 individual pieces of equipment in dozens of local council areas.

In 2025-26, items for Farm Firefighting Units will receive funding from \$300 to \$5000 a significant increase on previous' rounds cap of \$3000.

Eligible items in this category include FFUs, water pumps for use on vehicle, firstaid kits, UHF radios, fire blankets, heat shields and personal protective equipment.

The fourth round will also allow landholders to purchase community firefighting water tanks for the first time, with grants up to \$10,000 available.

"Expanding this program demonstrates our commitment to farmers and the vital role they play on the fireground to protect their communities," Emergency Services Minister, Emily Bourke, said.

"Farm firefighting units provide a quick response when a blaze breaks out, and equipping landowners to safely respond and co-ordinate with emergency services is crucial.

"New support to secure water tanks and improve access ahead of the bushfire season is an additional measure to help property owners and crews remain safe."

Tanks are required to have a minimum capacity of 22,000L, fire service fittings and other items such as stands and pipe fittings, and be compliant with local council rules.

Successful applicants will have approved items - which must be new and fit-forpurpose - reimbursed in full or a portion of a purchase across both categories.

Once approved, applicants must ensure their FFU is registered with the Country Fire Service (CFS) to receive reimbursement and notify the CFS of the new water tank location.

## **Deadly fungi emerges in the Hills**

Potentially deadly wild mushrooms are starting to pop up in the Adelaide Hills, prompting a warning about the risks of picking and eating unknown fungi.

Poisonous wild mushrooms can usually be found across much of the state from late summer to early winter when the earth is still warm, and particularly after rain.

Despite the low rainfall this year, cooler weather and recent rainfall has triggered the start of the fungi season in parts of the Adelaide Hills, with Death Cap mushrooms, or Amanita phalloides, recently being found at a few locations.

Death Caps can be difficult to distinguish from other wild mushrooms and can resemble

some edible species, so it is important to keep an eye on children and pets when outside.

People can contact the Poisons Information Centre on 13 11 26 for advice or call 000 in an emergency.

Around 46 per cent of the calls made to the Poisons Information Centre last year about mushroom poisoning involved children under the age of five.

Symptoms of mushroom poisoning include severe stomach cramps, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea, which can take several hours to appear.

This can progress to life-threatening liver failure, depending on the species.

## Empower families – protect our children

The horrifying reports of alleged widespread abuse in Australian childcare centres have rightly shocked the nation.

For any parent, the safety and wellbeing of their children is paramount.

When that trust is broken, the consequences are devastating for families, and corrosive to society's confidence in institutions meant to protect and care for the vulnerable.

In the wake of such revelations, it is natural to hear calls for more government action, more regulation, more oversight, and more checks.

But too often, government responses are designed to demonstrate activity rather than to deliver genuine solutions.

When government solves one problem, it too often creates two more.

Proposals such as mandating child welfare officers in every centre or expanding already extensive background checks may sound comforting, but risk creating more bureaucracy and inflating the cost of childcare, placing additional stress on household budgets, without actually making children safer.

It is time to think differently.

It is time to empower families.

We must support Australian parents in making the choices that best suit their families, whether that means staying at home to care for their children or returning to work

A practical reform would be to consider lifting the cap on the Child Care Subsidy (CCS) for in-home care, making it a more viable option for shift workers and families seeking greater flexibility.

More broadly, we should explore income splitting for tax purposes, an approach that would provide families with greater financial freedom and reduce dependence on formal childcare. Australia's income tax system is one of the few in the developed world that taxes individuals in isolation, regardless of

family responsibilities.

It does not recognise or reward unpaid care.

It actively penalises families who make the choice for one parent to stay at home or work part-time.

Why should a household making joint financial decisions be taxed as individuals?

Under a voluntary income-splitting model, families would be taxed based on their combined income, split evenly across adults, with tax brackets applying to the average.

This would ensure families are not punished for how they choose to care for their children.

It would give proper recognition to unpaid care, reduce demand on formal childcare, and ease cost-of-living pressures for all families.

How can we better support informal care arrangements by recognising the vital role of grandparents and extended family members?

We need a system that will support families who choose to rely on trusted relatives – those who already love and know their children – instead of being forced into formal childcare arrangements out of economic necessity.

In many cultures and communities, this is already the norm.

Our tax system should support, not hinder, these family-centred solutions.

If we truly want to keep children safe and support Australian families, we must give them the financial tools, freedom and flexibility to decide what works best for them

It is time for a serious national conversation about how our tax system can better reflect the realities of modern family life and provide the support that strong families and communities need.

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

## The cup that stops the nation tours Strathalbyn

The Melbourne Cup showed it's worth its weight in gold while on a tour around Strathalbyn last Wednesday.

Since 2003, the Lexus Melbourne Cup Tour has clocked more than a million kilometres, visited 680-plus towns, and helped raise vital funds along the way.

Popular winter cuts include legs of lamb, chuck steaks, lamb shanks and slow-cooked roasts such as blades and rolled beef.

The butcher stocks a range of cuts, buying high-quality carcases direct from South Australian farmers with three major suppliers for beef, lamb and pork, as well as two chicken suppliers.

"I love the work for having quality control over what food I put into my body and that I

sell to my community," Melissa said. "I am all about health and wellbeing of animals as well.

"Through my work, I see a lot of love put into our land and animals, and a lot of love that we put into our community through the food that we produce in our shop."

Maidment's Meat Service is located at 15 Dawson Street, Strathalbyn, and is open Tuesday to Friday from 7am to 5.30pm, Saturday 8am to noon, and closed Sunday and Monday.

## Logie nominee flies Goolwa flag

Gold Logie nominee Lisa Millar – who has won over the hearts of TV viewers around Australia – has thrown herself into the "joys" of the Goolwa and Hindmarsh Island communities after becoming somewhat of a local herself.

"I'm basically taking whatever opportunity I can to get to Goolwa," she told The Southern Argus.

"I do love to throw myself into communities – I wanted to feel like I was part of the community even though I'm not there all the time.

"With any small town around Australia, I just like knowing who's making your bread in the morning, or who's serving you your beer at the pub or who's making your meal at Thai Days, where I've eaten many a meal."

Simon's family is well-known in the local sailing community, with him learning to sail in Goolwa as a teenager, and his father Rob previously being Commodore of the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club.

Rob was instrumental in the creation of the marina which is now named in his honour.

The couple are old friends, and now spend time a lot of time travelling, with Simon being an international pilot and Lisa travelling around the country during production.

They try to sync their schedules so their downtime can be spent between Goolwa and Lisa's permanent home in Melbourne.

And Lisa has thrown herself into Goolwa's way of life in every facet possible - swimming, spending time at the beach, bike riding, walks and visiting the recent SA Wooden Boat Festival.

As a "really enthusiastic" Parkrun ambassador, the 5km route in Goolwa on Saturday mornings has won her over on several

and mental health and community-building.

She has also been dragon boat training from Hindmarsh Island and found it "way more intense" than she anticipated.

After acquiring her boat licence at Victor Harbor, the couple now take out the 1960s Caribbean boat that Simon fixed up, which originally belonged to Rob.

One of her favourite spots is Currency

'I just think (Goolwa is) a great little spot and it's really friendly," she said.

"I've really loved exploring the Murray River - our hope is to go further up the Murray and enjoy a bit more.

Goolwa and to see the stars at night... that's the kind of stuff that I love that makes it really special."

Sometimes locals recognise her on the street and ask for selfies, including at Woolworths when Lisa was wearing a Muster

'This woman came up to me and said 'do you love the show as much as I do?" Lisa said.

"I said, 'yes, I narrate it', and she nearly dropped her eggs - that was pretty funny."

She relishes when people approach her

"I know with News Breakfast, you're in peoples' homes at a really intimate time of their day - they look on me as a friend,"

"I am absolutely so comfortable with people wanting to come up and have a yarn with me because I think it's a credit to the programs and a credit to the teams."

Lisa left News Breakfast in August last year, expecting life would slow down and she could spend more time in Goolwa, but between Muster Dogs and Back Roads and the recent Gold Logie nomination, her schedule has gone "crazy".

Muster Dogs is documentary-style reality series that follows working dog trainers from across regional Australia as they raise and train puppies, while Back Roads spotlights regional and remote towns and communities across Australia.

It's something Lisa has particular passionate for after spending the first decade of her life in Kilkivan, Queensland, which had a population of 700 people.

After hearing about her Gold Logie nomination, she is still pinching herself, and received the call while filming with a dozen eight-week-old kelpie puppies in the Victorian town of Kaniva near the border of South Australia.

"It could not be more surreal to think of the most glamourous night for TV in Australia, and here I was being jumped on by these gorgeous little puppies, covered with dirt and everything else," she laughed.

"I'm excited about it - I'm just going to lean in and enjoy every moment of it."

She is the only ABC nominee for the TV Awards Gold Logies, up against A Current Affair host Ally Langdon, comedian Hamish Blake, I'm a Celebrity... Get Me Out of Here! Australia host Julia Morris, Home and Away actor Lynne McGranger, presenter Sonia Kruger, and chef and presenter Poh Ling Yeow.

Votes are now open through the TV Week website and the winner will be announced on August 3, with Lisa describing her contenders as all "terrific".

"I would love to do it for regional Australia," she said.

'When did we have a Gold Logie winner who came from a town of 700 people, (and) who works on programs that are all about the awesome people in regional Australia?

'Wouldn't it be cool if I could do it for them? "That's what drives me at the moment."

## Goolwa Rotary celebrates 40 years of service

The Rotary Club of Goolwa is celebrating four decades of service – which is more than 1600 meetings and countless hours dedicated to local, national and international causes.

Founded in 1985 by the Encounter Bay club, with Charter President being Maurie Perry, the local club has championed Rotary's motto of 'service above self' – making a difference through environmental projects, with youth, disaster relief and community support.

The club has a particular environmental

focus, with volunteers planting more than 5000 trees in conjunction with other organisations since the 1990s, including the long-term project of Rotary Centenary Park.

The park, located off Sweetman Road in Goolwa South, launched in 2021 to commemorate 100 years of Rotary in Australia.

Over the following years, members have worked to revegetate and beautify the space, planting and watering many species, and plan to further fundraise and apply for grants in the future.

The club has also delivered educational campaigns, including a multi-media display aimed at reducing plastic use, highlighting

the impact it has to animals, environment and the ocean, which was presented on various occasions to schools, council, and a Rotary conference.

"We've had a very strong environment focus, and done various environmental projects over the years," Director of Environment, Di Keach, said.

"(And) probably the most outstanding thing that the club has done in its history is the (regular) art exhibition."

Hosted at Signal Point, the regular exhibition had typically 700 to 800 paintings, and was described as a "great success" in terms of fundraising and showcasing artists.


The club plans to revive the exhibition on a smaller scale at a different venue.

Support has been given to local Surf Life Saving SA, donating a boat to the Port Elliot club in the 1990s, and later helping fund a boat, trailer and vehicle for the Goolwa club.

They also supported a \$30,000 fit-out of the new Goolwa Surf Life Saving Club.

Community donations have largely gone towards organisations that help people experiencing homelessness or disadvantaged community members.

The club is also increasingly working with local youth groups, and in the town's primary and high schools, such as with the Rotary

Youth Driver Awareness initiative that is credited to reducing accidents in the region.

The club has also supported farmers, including backing hay runs to Kangaroo Island after bushfires, and to Hawker in the Flinders Ranges for drought relief.

On an international level, the club has supported the emergency disaster relief initiative ShelterBox as well as Wheelchairs for the Asia Pacific.

Looking ahead, members have some noteworthy events on the calendar, such as the inaugural Carpathon, which will be a

Members will also join a walk against domestic violence at Moana Beach in November.

The recent special milestone of the 40th anniversary of the Charter was recently marked during the annual changeover of President and board at the Goolwa Hotel with 140 guests.

Outgoing President Jan Lawrence gave a heartfelt speech reflecting on the club's achievements and the dedication of members, and inducted the new President Debbie Buckingham and board.

Current members include President Debbie Buckingham, Vice President Noeline Biermann, Secretary Tamara McRobbie, Treasurer Lyn Crouch, Community Director Jan Lawrence, Youth Director Shannon Welk, Environment Director Di Keach, Club Service Director Sue Porter and Image and Membership Director Sonia Laucke.

"It's a great organisation – I love it," President, Debbie Buckingham, said.

"I just love getting involved with the people and the community – everything about it is good.

"(Our aim) is to have an inclusive club, that commits to their ideas and projects for

the community, and that we work together as a team."

Ms Keach echoed a similar sentiment, encouraging other community members to join the "family" that is local, national and global.







# Major upgrade for Langhorne Creek sporting complex

#### By Giorgina McKay

Langhorne Creek's sporting complex is about to get a major makeover.

As part of the State Government's \$15 million Thriving Regions Fund, its Enabling Infrastructure Program offers grants from \$50,000 up to \$1 million for infrastructure projects that strengthen and build strong regional communities, can start within six months and be completed within two years of receiving funding.

More than \$3.57 million worth of regional community projects will be brought to life with this year's grants, including Langhorne Creek Memorial Park Committee's complex upgrade.

The committee received a \$400,000 grant, which will pave the way for major upgrades and long-term improvements to the football club.

"We are very pleased to be able to offer funding to nine community projects from across South Australia's regions and see their vision become reality," Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, Clare Scriven, said.

"These projects help support a strong local economy by attracting and retaining people, businesses and service providers in our regions, which helps maintain and grow strong, vibrant regional communities.

"The Enabling Infrastructure Program has been extremely successful in supporting infrastructure projects that improve the quality of life in our regions, and the State Government is pleased to continue to support South Australia's regional communities."

The planned improvements include an upgrade to the 40-year-old clubrooms, new accessible toilets and a dedicated unisex parents room, improved amenities, accessibility improvements, additional undercover area, and an improved bar, storage and refrigeration.

For the committee, which has been trying for several years to obtain funding for the project, the grant represents a "major milestone in the park's history".

More than \$3.57 million worth of regional community projects will be brought to life with this year's grants, including Langhorne Creek Memorial Park Committee's complex upgrade.

The committee received a \$400,000 grant, which will pave the way for major upgrades and long-term improvements to the football club.

"We are very pleased to be able to offer funding to nine community projects from across South Australia's regions and see their vision become reality," Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, Clare Scriven, said.

"These projects help support a strong local economy by attracting and retaining people, businesses and service providers in our regions, which helps maintain and grow strong, vibrant on the oval during the works. regional communities.

"The Enabling Infrastructure Program has been extremely successful in supporting infrastructure projects that improve the quality of life in our regions, and the State Government is pleased to continue to support South Australia's regional communities."

The planned improvements include an upgrade to the 40-year-old clubrooms, new accessible toilets and a dedicated unisex parents room, additional undercover area, and an improved bar, storage and refrigeration.

"The clubrooms at Memorial Park are the lifeblood of this community, and this grant will enable our club to grow and thrive for the foreseeable future, and enable us to focus on supporting families, individuals, and businesses within the district," the club said.

"Not only will this transform our community facilities, it will supercharge our growth, and create an environment worthy of the passion, pride, and potential that defines our club and region.

'We must thank the State Government and PIRSA for their belief in our vision and their continued support of improving regional communities, and a huge thanks must also go to Greg Follett for his enormous dedication in getting this grant application off the ground."

The club already has initial development plans in place with Alexandrina Council and has enlisted the expertise of local architect John Eckert from Jabba Design.

"Maintaining access to the community facilities and minimising disruption has and will be a key consideration throughout the planning and construction phases.


