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
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Goolwa goes nuts for doughnuts

A month ago, Mr Colman put the new wheels to use by joining forces with Heritage Pies and Pastries, which instigated 'Workplace Wednesdays' a year ago.

to be involved with the community, and since news spread about his Herbie, he is often recognised in town and waved at by passers-by.

Mr Colman hopes to use it as a stepping stone to other courier jobs.

"We wanted to help Jack achieve what he wants to with Herbie," Heritage Pies and Pastries owner, Josh Jones, said.

"The whole story of how it all came about and how he got help from the local community was just fantastic - we couldn't help but jump on board too."

Mr Jones has seen Mr Colman grow up, knowing each other for about 14 years through the bakery, so when "the opportunity came up", he "jumped straight on it".

Since buying the bakery a year ago, Mr Jones aims to continue the legacy of the previous owners who gave "so much" to the community.

"For the small price that we pay to give back to a business, it comes back in tenfold, but that's not what we do it for," he said.

"It's to give back to the local businesses and to say thank you for being part of our community.

'We just love being part of Goolwa and part of the Fleurieu - we like to cement ourselves as true locals."

Council meets with committee on Strathalbyn pool extension

The ducks are beginning to be lined in a row for a four-week trial extension of the upcoming Strathalbyn Swimming Pool season, with first discussions taking place between Alexandrina Council and the Swimming Pool Committee last Wednesday.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, councillors approved in May to trial a four-week extension of the 2024-2025 swimming season, as well as develop a plan to market the pool service in the local community and launch a collaborative review to develop a business/master plan to eventually enclose the pool via capital funding grants.

It follows years of community calls for the local pool to be open for public use for an extended period of time.

In the first step to achieving the pool

extension and marketing plans, council representatives met with committee members Lewis McMaster, Cherie-Lee Lindsay, Helen Francis and Garry Tucker at the Strathalbyn Library to discuss swimmers' concerns and suggestions about the pool and its services, potential promotional ideas, and a strategy for a master plan development, among other related topics.

"We're committed to the pool, we're excited it's got a four-week extension, and want to do all we can to see that locked in as a solid thing, but also see the pool expanded, so more of the community are accessing and enjoying the benefits," Mr McMaster said.

The main concerns and suggestions raised included daily maintenance of amenities, coin-operated barbecues, EFTPOS failures, solar heating upgrade, extended opening to 10am, a chairlift for people with disabilities and a day pass for swimmers, while ways to promote the pool's profile included resurrecting the local swimming club, a free open day to start the season, distribution of flyers, and holding a teddy bears picnic.

Mr McMaster appreciated the opportunity to speak with council on these issues.

"We appreciate the opportunity to make the presentation to them, and just express our support and encouragement for them to step it up to see this pool expanded," he said.

"We are a growing community, and the thing that's unique about Strathalbyn within our council district is that we're retaining and growing our young people and families.

"We've had the highway upgraded going through to Strath, so that makes it more attractive to working families – there's quick access to Mount Barker and Adelaide.

"We have no authority to make decisions, but we just want to encourage (council) to realise the potential of this pool for community wellbeing."

Mount Barker adopts rate rise

Mount Barker District Council has adopted its Annual Business Plan, which includes proposed revenue to be raised from general rates of \$43.5 million, which is an increase of 5.3 per cent.

Council is following a "smoothing" approach to general rate setting for three years to minimise increases to inflation.

Last year, the general rate increase was 5.6 per cent, which was 2.3 per cent below the rate of inflation.

The 2024/25 general rate increase is one per cent higher than March's Consumer Price Index (CPI).

The final year means general rates are planned to increase by 1.3 per cent higher than inflation.

The technique was welcomed by Mount Barker and District Residents' Association, however, a representative suggested it be extended to another year to ease financial stress.

Some of the big projects this year include construction of the Laratinga Water Recovery Plant to replace the ageing Springs Road Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Council will be rolling out additional features to its Geographical Information Systems, which offers data visualisation to support informed decisions.

Construction of the Regional Aquatic Leisure Centre commenced earlier this year and is expected to be completed in late 2025.

Revenue from new developments and capital improvements of 3.49 per cent will be used to provide services to new residents and maintain new infrastructure resulting from those new developments.

Council received 26 submissions during the consultation process – significantly less than last year, which had 60.

Submissions were largely around the rate rise during the cost-of-living crisis, infrastructure, and the environment.

Macclesfield Community Association noted "little to no expenditure" planned for its town, and with "increasing frustration" that the plan fails to provide an implementation program for the Macclesfield Township Plan for the coming year.

Community Voice for the Environment members stated they believe that environment and biodiversity was given insufficient weight in planning.

Paths and Trails Mount Barker and Beyond Group called for investment in paths and crossings within the district.

Strathalbyn misses out on major Ag town award

"Congratulations to our Top 10 towns," Acting Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, Andrea Michaels, said. "I wish you all the best in the next round to become our Ag Town of the Year for 2024. The Agricultural Town of the Year Award is an important initiative that shines a light on South Australian towns that are excelling in agricultural practices, strengthening their region and supporting their community. "Now in its sixth year, this award continues to celebrate the hard work, resilience and enduring community spirit that are at the heart of our regional towns."



This year a record 73 towns were nominated and almost 4000 public votes cast for the award that recognises South Australian towns excelling in agricultural practices.

The top ten towns who made it through to the next stage of the competition and a step closer to taking home the coveted award were announced last Wednesday, but Alexandrina sadly failed to make the cut.

The successful towns will be invited to submit written applications that outline how they promote and support agriculture, which are assessed by an independent judging panel, who will then select three

Both buildings are proposed to be demolished to make way for the outlet which cannot be disclosed at this stage and will have dual lane drive-through, with access via South and East Terrace.

The news left Strathalbyn H Hardware's Candeece Falland blindsided.

It is currently still "business as usual" for the team, but now they have been forced to begin actively looking for an appropriate site to move to in case the application is approved.

"Obviously, we have no intention of closing the store," Mrs Falland said.

"We will be actively looking for an appropriate site to move to to continue since, depending on what happens here, we may or may not have a building.

"Where is that at the moment? – I don't know.

"We've only just started that process, and yes it will mean there are going to be some changes that I can't foresee to our business, but I'm going to keep everyone up to date as we find out ourselves."

While the application is still in its early stages, it has already divided the town.

Many on social media believed it was just part of the town's growth and would bring more employment for the region's youth, while others expressed distaste at the possibility of having a 'junk food' outlet in such a popular area.

A fast food restaurant poses no competition for Mrs Falland, but she raised concerns about the impacts it would have on the town's eateries and Strathalbyn's heritage.

"From a business side, it's not going to affect our business," she said.

"Yes, we have to move, but people don't eat paint, so we're not going to compete with a fast food joint.

"What I don't understand is why we would go to all of the effort of beautifying the town and making it a tourist attraction, and claiming we support all these small businesses then move a multinational company into one of the major thoroughfares of the town, and potentially crush a bunch of family-owned businesses in the process.

"I'm not anti-progress at all, but to me that seems counter-intuitive."

Under the Planning and Design Code, no consultation is required for the application.

It has currently been referred to the Commissioner of Highways for response before it reaches the Fleurieu Regional Assessment Panel for decision.

The application will also be referred to the Department of Infrastructure and Transport to review the proposed access locations and impacts on the local road network, and internal council staff will assess CWMS impacts, environmental health, development and traffic engineering, and parks and gardens.

"The property at 37 East Terrace is in the Township Activity Centre Zone, which is an area of Strathalbyn that has been a commercial area for a long time," Chief Executive Officer, Nigel Morris, told *The Southern Argus*.

"The proposal is consistent with the commercial activities permitted in the zone and the outlet will be considered as any other food business.

"The development application will be assessed against the state-wide Planning and Design Code and the requirements of the Planning, Development, and Infrastructure Act 2016.

"I'm advised by council's planning team the planning process will focus on allowed land use, matters such as size and scale, compatibility within the locality, compliance with the code, and the impact on the surrounding built interface.

"As such, there are limitations in this assessment, for example, the process cannot assess public perceptions regarding the type of business it is, whether the community want a fast food outlet, whether fast food is a public health concern generally, and whether this outlet will be in competition to other food businesses in the area."

Road works begin on Strathalbyn Road, delays expected

Road works will be undertaken along a portion of Strathalbyn Road this month. Site investigations, including geotechnical investigation and survey works, began last week and will centre on the road between Mount Barker Road, Aldgate and River Road, Mylor.

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport said the investigations will help

them to understand the current pavement conditions and support the planning of potential upgrades on the road.

The works are part of the Adelaide Hills Productivity and Road Safety Package to upgrade some of the region's key strategic arterial roads.

The \$150m initiative, jointly funded by the Federal and State Governments over five years includes a range of road improvements to support economic growth, improve road safety and increase fire resilience in the Adelaide Hills.

Drivers are warned that for the Strathalbyn Road works, speed and lane restrictions will be in place, with drivers urged to plan trips, be cautious around workers, and follow the speed limits and signage.

Access to businesses and surrounding properties will be maintained throughout the works, with people to be contacted directly if there is a need to temporarily limit access. Minor noise disturbances can be expected. The news follows the completion of the works on Long Valley Road in mid-May this year.

This included the new southbound overtaking lane about 1.5km north of Long Valley Cottage Road to south of Mine Flat Road, remediation of the southbound overtaking lane from the railway line to Gemmell Road, and road resealing between Bunnett and Wellington Roads.

Willyaroo teenager wins national junior roping title

A Willyaroo teenager has cemented his standing as one of South Australia's best headers by taking out the title at the Junior National Finals in Emerald in June.

For Darcy Dall'Aglio, team roping is in his blood, with his family all taking part in the sport which involves a steer and two mounted riders – a header and heeler.

In Darcy's case, he is a header and is in charge of roping the front of the steer before the heeler catches it by the feet.

The aim is to do this in the fastest time.

"If you break the barrier, you get 10 seconds added on your time and if you catch one foot you get five seconds added onto your time, so you don't want to break the barrier or catch a leg, then you can get a clean time - that's what wins you the rodeo," Darcy explained.

"The physical part – your horse does it all. "You don't really think about it too much until you go and rope, otherwise you psych yourself out a little bit."

It's a skill Darcy has perfected during hours of training, starting from a young age.

Having grown up around rodeo competitions is what also makes roping come easy to him.

"At the moment, doing something you love doing, it comes pretty easy for him, so he's not one of those people that emotionally gets worked up before a competition," Darcy's mum, Sandie, said.

"Me, I used to get nervous, but he just knows his job, he does it well, and I've always told him to go and have fun."

While it may come easy, it unfortunately doesn't come cheap.

For someone like Darcy who has competed in several competitions this season alone, from Kapunda to Peterborough through to Echuca, Berwick and Maryborough, the kilometres and costs can rack up.

'We got five rodeos in South Australia, so the rest of the rodeos we have to travel to Victoria, New South Wales, Queensland, and wherever," Sandie said.

'So, for the family – the mums and dads it's an expensive sport, especially with horses, travel and diesel.

"But like I said, it's something we all love doing, so we just do it, and we'll take them anywhere they need to go as long as we can afford it to be the best they can be."

Most recently, Darcy - who is sponsored

by Hide and Horn, and Cavallo Park Equine Education – travelled all the way to Emerald, Queensland, to compete in the Australian Professional Rodeo Association (APRA) Junior National Finals on June 21-22

Not only was he one of just four South Australians who competed, but he won the Australian Junior Team Roping Header title.

"It was amazing," Darcy said. "Winning – that's a good feeling."

Darcy now has his sights set on the open finals.

His family also plan to continue keeping the rodeo culture alive.

"It goes back to traditional days out on stations when you have to fix a calf or cow and you're miles away from the yards, that's how they will do it – grab them and then they can get off and treat it," Sandie said.

"There's sometimes a bit of a bad rap rodeo gets that they think it's cruel to the animals, which it's not at all.

"The whole rodeo scene is like a big family. "The way the kids conduct themselves around these rodeos, they're so mature and grown up, and doing something the big boys do.

"It's not cut throat, they're all supporting each other and loving everything everyone does."

Scouts seek help to 'be prepared' for Jamboree

The Strathalbyn Scouts are reaching out for fundraising ideas as they aim to 'be prepared' for next January's Jamboree.

The Jamboree, which is held every four years, will be staged in Maryborough, Queensland, from January 6 to 15, attracting about 10,000 scouts from across the country, and overseas.

Seven youth and three leaders from the local group are hoping to attend the once in a lifetime experience.

"We need to raise as much as we can," Strathalbyn Group Leader, Prue Turner, said.

"It is \$2999 per youth member to go, and about \$1800 each for the three leaders

"I think we are at about \$6000 at the moment, and we are hoping to get enough to pay for each of the youth members to have about \$1000 to go towards the last two instalment payments.

"We have one due at the end of this month, and one due at the end of September."

So far the local scouts have fundraised through the People's First Community Lottery, where they keep a portion of the ticket sales, Cadbury's chocolates, along with selling carriage rides around Strathalbyn with the help of Carriages of Occasion.

The Strathalbyn Lions have also pitched in with \$2100, and the Rotary Club of Strathalbyn have contributed \$500.

The January Jamboree will be the first for all the Strathalbyn youth attending, and the first as leaders for the three adults.

"It is basically like a giant, very wellplanned out camp, usually attended by about 10,000 youth members and supported by in the vicinity of 3000 to 4000 adults," Miss Turner said.

"They haven't quite finalised what the activities will be or who we will be camped with, (but) there will be water sports and activities, and I think possibly a visit to Australia Zoo."

The 10 locals will combine with other scout groups from across the state to be able to make up a troop of between 30 and 36 scouts, who will camp together for activities and live together for the 10 days.

"We are open for assistance that anyone wants to give," Miss Turner said.

"The \$2100 from the Lions is a massive help, and it is a decent portion for each of the youth members that are going – about \$300 for each.

"We have a raffle which is open until July 25."

"It definitely helps business when you get little awards like this – it is cool."



Teenage model captures global attention



Murray Bridge tops worst regional crash hotspot

Murray Bridge has been named as one of the worst hotspots for fatal and serious crashes behind the city, according to crash data analysed by RAA ahead of school holidays.

Between 2013-2022, 184 people were either seriously injured or lost their lives on roads in the city of Adelaide – the worst suburb for casualty crashes in SA – followed behind by Murray Bridge as the top regionally on 64. In the first half of this year, 77 per cent of lives lost have been in regional areas – up from the 10-year average of 66 per cent.

The data has prompted an RAA road safety warning ahead of the school holidays as South Australian families flock to the state's regions.

"Around two-thirds of all lives lost are

on regional roads each year, so South Australians preparing to head away for the school holidays need to keep safety front of mind," RAA Senior Manager for Safety and Infrastructure, Charles Mountain, said.

"Regional roads are generally high speed, where a small lapse in concentration or moment of distraction can have catastrophic consequences. "If you're heading away, please adhere to the speed limit, take regular rest breaks and share the driving if you have multiple drivers in the vehicle.

"Remember the 'Fatal Five' causes of road trauma – distraction, excessive speed, not wearing a seatbelt, driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol, and dangerous road user behaviours."

New licence class for UHPV drivers

In an Australian-first, all ultra-highpowered vehicles (UHPVs) drivers are now required from December to complete a new training course to obtain a U-class licence

The interactive online course is designed to better educate drivers on the additional risks posed by these vehicles, including understanding features that differ from normal vehicles and the specific laws related to UHPVs.

The course also highlights the danger of risk-taking behaviour in these powerful vehicles and the penalties in place for disabling driver assistance systems, with quizzes designed to reinforce vital road safety messages prior to a final assessment.

The creation of a new U-class licence for UHPVs drivers delivers on a commitment made by the State Government to introduce a suite of reforms in the wake of the tragic death of Sophia Naismith.

"We are proud to introduce these new

requirements, which will better prepare motorists to drive ultra-high-powered vehicles on South Australian roads," Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Tom Koutsantonis, said.

"Through practical modules focusing on vehicle features, safety systems, maintenance, laws and penalties, we're compelling drivers to take responsibility and be aware of the additional risks that come with driving a UHPV.

"Given these risks, it's crucial we can influence driver behaviour, but also ensure our authorities are empowered to prosecute individuals who endanger the lives of others.

"Through the tireless and courageous championing for change of the Naismith family and close consultation across the motoring industry and government, I'm pleased we've been able to deliver Australian-first reforms on both fronts."

The show must go on

Over the years, the annual Strathalbyn Antique Fair has had many incarnations.

In the early days, as the Strathalbyn Collectors, Hobbies and Antique Fair, it filled several halls and involved many of our service clubs, community groups and craftspeople. It has been held at Tyndale School (2016 and 2017).

In 2018, the SLTA ran a stand-alone treasure market at the Strathalbyn Harness Racing Club while a small-scale Town Hall event was staged by an outside promoter.

Conditions within the antiques industry and Strathalbyn itself have changed significantly in recent years, and when the fair was revived by the re-named STA in 2019, its venues were the Town Hall and St. Andrew's Church Hall.

COVID caused the cancellation of the fair in 2020, and in 2021, 2022 and 2023, the venues were the Town Hall and Carruthers Hall.

Last year, the Town Hall renovations were running past schedule and Alexandrina Council generously halted the works and made the hall usable, although it remained an uncomfortable building site with no-go zones and only one functioning toilet.

The Town Hall works are still on-going. Despite a planned finish date of the end of July, we were not prepared to assume the hall would be ready and could not expect council to pause the works again.

The Strathalbyn Bands Festival had the same concerns and will be holding the festival in the Strathalbyn Oval Function Centre on Sundays 4th and 11th of August.

Just as importantly, the internal changes to the Town Hall have rendered it too small to accommodate all of last year's returning dealers.

The organising and running of the fair is a huge job carried out by a limited number of volunteers, and a decision had to be made early in the year to either hold the fair in its entirety at the oval complex or not run it at all.

Once again, a market will be held at Gilbert's Motor Museum on both days.

A shuttle bus will run between the oval and High Street, thus, fair-goers will be able to ride, park and walk or drive from High Street through Dawson Street to the oval and back. Regular fair patrons will be keen to also call into Strath's antiques shops, and they will want to choose somewhere for coffee and lunch.

We are doing our utmost to encourage fair patrons to visit Dawson Street and High Street over the weekend.

We hope that traders (eateries, antique and speciality shops) will use their own social media and other advertising avenues to promote themselves and any specials they might be offering for the weekend.

It has been suggested the fair could be held in 'empty shops' or 'shop frontages and yards' on High Street – this is an unfeasible idea. The fair dealers need to be in large, comfortable, secure venues with their fellow exhibitors, so they are all equally visible and accessible to the public.

We do not know what shops might be empty and cannot ask landlords to hold them empty.

Using shop frontages would impede the business of the shop's tenants and leave the dealers at the mercy of the weather.

It takes most dealers all day on Friday to set up their eclectic stock.

Overnight security is provided in the halls. Trading takes place on Saturday and Sunday.

What protection would their stock have overnight if it were not in a secure hall?

Every additional venue would require insurance, staffing, EFTPOS facilities and a float, security and amenities for the dealers.

The 2024 Strathalbyn Antiques and Vintage Fair will be held in Carruthers Hall and the Strathalbyn Oval Function Centre on the 17th and 18th of August.

We encourage readers to visit the fair and the Rotary Sunday Treasure Market, and to continue to support their local shops, traders and small businesses.

Let's all pull together, embrace what Strathalbyn has to offer, and welcome the visitors that help keep the area buoyant.

Many will tell their friends about our beautiful town and return again to explore it further.

The Strathalbyn Tourism Association does much more than stage the antique fair.

We run Gilbert's Motor Museum, which is self-funded and staffed entirely by volunteers. We produce the Strathalbyn Visitors' Information Guide.

As part of the Strathalbyn 185 programme, we have been working with SteamRanger to showcase and promote the special Highlander train journeys to Strathalbyn.

Along with many smaller projects, we will once again be involved in the staging of Christmas Where the Angas Flows.

After all, it will be Christmas soon enough!

Winter will be behind us and it will be time to join together again in celebration.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Alexandrina Council elected members approved the trial extension in May, as well as to develop a plan to market what the pool can provide the local community and an in depth look at whether to enclose the pool.

Last week the next step was taken, with council representatives and pool committee members meeting to discuss a range of topics to do with the pool.

Main concerns and suggestions raised at last week's meeting included daily maintenance of amenities, coinoperated barbecues, EFTPOS facilities, solar heating upgrades, extending opening to 10am, a chairlift for people with disabilities, and a day pass for swimmers, resurrecting the town's swimming club, staging an open day to attract potential pool users, and holding a teddy bears picnic.

Swimming is a sport of relatively low impact, with a myriad of benefits for a wide range of people.

From gentle floating to trying to out beat records, it is something almost all people can enjoy to some degree.

It keeps your heart rate up, while minimising impact on the body, builds endurance and muscle strength and cardiovascular fitness – it's pretty much an all-over body workout.

For those recovering from injuries, swimming can be a game-changer.

While summer may seem quite some distance away, planning now will make all the difference for a successful expansion of what the Strathalbyn pool offers come opening time in summer.

Creativity on show at EFS market

'Succesful' planting festival at Monarto

Forty-two-thousand tubestocks were planted during last month's Frahns Farm Planting Festival near Monarto.

The 550-hectare property is the major project of Bio R-a charity that reconstructs habitats to support native wildlife, and has hosted annual community planting festivals since 2016. The project aims to provide habitat for declining woodland birds. Across three weekends in June, volunteers were treated to "spectacular weather" as 42,000 tubestock were planted across 23 hectares within the second large kangarooproof enclosure. An additional 1000 seedlings have supplemented the 2023 restoration site, and about 3000 tubestock have been planted into a seed orchard and raised beds to provide seed for future direct seeding. Uncle Moogie's Welcome to Country on the first weekend set the tone of inclusivity, camaraderie and healing. The team were "delighted" to host Chair of the Environment and Communications

Legislation Committee of the Federal Parliament Senator Karen Grogan, who toured the previous years' plantings and helped put tubestock in the ground.

Overall, 175 species of tubestock were planted and about 40 species of plants were direct seeded across the site before planting began.





'Positive feedback' on proposed code amendment The Talking Point



By Giorgina McKay

The community turned out to the Milang Institute last Wednesday to hear Alexandrina Council's plans for a proposed Local Heritage Code Amendment for the town, and to share any concerns and feedback.

Minister for Planning Nick Champion granted approval in March this year for council to initiate a Code Amendment after comprehensive research revealed many of the residential and civic buildings constructed between the 1850s and 1900 – when the River Murray was a major trade route - remain intact in Milang and invaluably contribute to the character of the town.

The proposed Milang Local Heritage Code Amendment seeks to apply a Local Heritage Place Overlay to 25 properties, establish Historic Area Overlay across the area of Milang that exhibits the characteristics of the original survey and subdivision pattern, and apply a Heritage Adjacency overlay to properties adjacent to the approved Local Heritage Places to protect the town's substantial heritage.

Fear grows for popular Strathalbyn Christmas event's fireworks display

Cutting the fireworks or free children's rides are two measures the Christmas Where the Angas Flows committee may have to consider for this year's event, as it embarks on its fundraising goals for 2024.

Committee Chairman Graham Jenke said Christmas Where the Angas Flows typically costs more than \$20,000 to run. We have always had a bit in the kitty each year, but the bit we have left over is getting shorter and shorter, and in actual fact, we probably ran at a slight loss last year," Mr Jenke said. We pay for the hiring of all the sound technology, (although), those people give their labour for nothing. "The fireworks will be \$6000 this year, and we get some rides in for the children and we provide that all free too, so there is a cost in that as well and insurance, and everything else.

or free children's rides were under threat.

"We have talked about the fact that if we had to cut anything, it would be that we wouldn't be able to provide free rides for the children and they would have to pay for it, or the fireworks," he said.

'That is the two that we would have to cut out, and that would possibly be \$10,000 to \$11.000."

The committee will soon be sending out its sponsors forms to those interested in supporting the iconic and popular event. "We have about 250 people on our sponsors list, but not everybody responds to it," Mr Jenke said. "We have different levels, but it would be nice to get a really big major sponsor to put in \$5000 to \$10,000. The levels range from \$100 (bronze), \$200 (silver) or \$500 (gold), and we have a platinum – anyone that wants to put in above that becomes a platinum sponsor." Mr Jenke said the available funds so far this year were below that at the same time in 2023.

"It was a hugely successful event last year with the pageant, street stalls, childrens' entertainment, concert and fireworks.

"None of (it) would be possible without the continued support of the community and many local businesses to cover the costs of staging the event.

"The committee realises cost of living expenses have increased since last year, but we ask for (people's) continued support for this community event for the people of Strathalbyn." The Christmas Where the Angas Flows Committee – which currently numbers seven-- will meet on Wednesday, July 17, at the Catholic Hall in Chapel Street at 7pm. "If any interested people in the community would like to come along and join the committee as we plan for this year's event, we would welcome new faces as some of our current committee members have had to step back due to other commitments," Mr Jenke said. A Quiet Place: Day One

"Sequels are death" was a phrase quoted by *Jaws* star Richard Dreyfuss, and it's one that seems to be shared by many in the industry and lovers of so-called 'A Grade' movies.

It's always a risk when a big production company or writer dares to expand on a universe that rated successfully with audiences, even riskier yet to extend that to a trilogy.

But John Krasinski's A Quiet Place: Day One does one thing that most don't that makes this third instalment a mild success – making the film read as a stand-alone.

Audiences were introduced to the A Quiet Place universe in 2018 with the release of the first film – which at the time seemed like the only one we were going to receive in the now three-part franchise – which starred Krasinski alongside wife Emily Blunt and young stars Millicent Simmonds and Noah Jupe as the Abbott family.

The movie is set a year down the track from the alien invasion that threatened the world into silence and would be considered by most viewers as one of the best thrillers of our generation.

The second film released two years later expands on the Abbott family and gives viewers a greater insight into the aliens that have been tormenting the human race, including our first glimpse at the infamous 'day one', which this latest instalment is centred on.

The third film brings in newcomers to the franchise Stranger Things actor Joseph Quinn and 12 Years A Slave and Us actress Lupita Nyong'o who star as two strangers - Samira and Eric accompanied by furry feline Frodo, who have to join forces to fight their way out of and survive the early stages of this alien invasion.

Directed and co-written by Pig's Michael Sarnoski, the film features some terrifically-timed jump scares and scenes that will leave viewers on the edge of their seats, complemented by moments of earnestness and tenderness between the two protagonists under some harsh circumstances that exemplify what it means to be human.

It's these moments in which we witness the brilliant acting of Quinn and Nyong'o that make up for the 'average' plotline that brings no real 'new' information to lovers of the franchise.

In saying that, it does mean audiences who may not have seen the first two films could easily watch the third and not feel like they've 'missed out' on any critical background information about the premise of this universe Krasinski created or its antagonists.

All in all, it's a film you could comfortably watch in the quiet of your home with family or friends, and walk away having not regretted spent the past hour-and-a-half watching these characters interact in mostly complete silence.





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

According to the Department of Social Services, one woman is killed on average by an intimate partner every seven days, while one in four women have experience emotional abuse by a current or former partner.

Raiise is a respectful club environments education program focused on highlighting the importance of gender equality, challenging stereotypes in sporting environments, and empowering participants to actively support others in promoting respectful behaviour in sporting clubs and their community to meet its overarching goal – the prevention of violence against women.

Trained facilitators come out to clubs at no cost to run an hour-anda-half session that gives participants essential knowledge and practical skills to support a positive and inclusive club environment.

Club Bar Manager Rowena Sheridan first heard of the program through the Office for Women and believed it was a great initiative to share with the club and community.

"The program aims to promote respectful club environments, gender equality, diversity and inclusion, a culture of respect, and to contribute to the prevention of family and domestic violence, which is a very important issue in society at present," she said.

"With the information presented, we are sure all those in attendance will share the information with our wider community. "This is the first year of the program

and the club is excited to be the first in the Great Southern Football League to host the program.'

All senior men and women, U17 Girls and Senior Colts players will be in attendance.

The free session is also open to parents, families and community members aged 15 and over at the Goolwa Oval clubrooms tonight from 7.30pm.

A kayaker finished an incredible 2000km paddle at the Murray Mouth last week, after a 64-day venture to fundraise for mental health services.

"I was able to sit with my thoughts and organise everything in my head."
