Alexandrina ratepayers will see a less than initially projected rate increase to accommodate the cost-of-living crisis.

As previously reported in *The Southern* 


*Argus*, Alexandrina councillors opened the 2023-24 draft Annual Business Plan and Budget inclusive of a general 7.2 per cent rate rise, plus 1.3 per cent from development growth in May to public consultation.

During this period, council received

288 responses – 213 of those from people who attended one of the six budget roadshow meetings – with concerns raised predominantly around roads and footpaths, the environment, rates, fairness of distribution across the district, and

utilisation and/or operating costs associated with services provided at Goolwa Centenary Hall, Goolwa Business Hub, Fleurieu Regional Aquatic Centre, and *PS Oscar W*.

## Meadows gets funky for school fundraiser

Meadows Primary School is hoping to have great sockcess with its latest fundraiser to raise money for the sole purpose of purchasing new play equipment for students and families.

Jolly Soles is a simple, fun and affordable fundraising initiative that helps groups promote their cause by providing funky socks to sell at schools, clubs and workplaces.

The school's parent club knew from other's success using the fundraiser that it was the perfect, most convenient way to raise money to replace the school's outdated play equipment while also providing families with a useful product.

"We've got a few other fundraisers happening this

year, so we wanted something that was less involved and easier that we didn't all need to set up a stall for or (spend) a whole day (doing)," parent club member, Bronny Ryan, explained.

"A friend of mine's kids had done it before for their sporting club and I had bought a couple of socks, so I was rummaging through trying to find the name of (the organisation), then just looked them up online.

"We wanted to choose something fun, and who doesn't need cozy socks in the Hills in winter?"

The fundraiser will run over four weeks, finishing in the first week of the third term.

Once families and community members have scanned the QR code and ordered online, the socks will be delivered to the school for collection in week five.

It's only in the beginning



stages, but students are already getting excited.

"My kids are excited because I've obviously been talking about it, but I did hear a couple of kids who were bringing the flyer home be like 'what socks are you going to get?' which is fun," Mrs Ryan said.

"They do have really cute patterns and designs."

The school hopes to raise at least \$2000 from the fundraiser, and asked families and the wider community to support the cause however they can.

"School fees are quite low they just cover the running costs at the school – so all these types of incentives are what we rely on to be able to do the extra things like play equipment, buying new shelving or subsidising buses for swimming that wouldn't be available without parents paying extra for it," Mrs Ryan added.

"We're all aware some families don't have the money to do extra things, so it's just asking (to support) where you can, but at the same time, we desperately need new play equipment.

"Hopefully, we will have enough to get great play equipment because (the current) one has been there for a very long time... like when parents of the school were here."

## Increasing costs shorten local cafe's opening hours

Strathalbyn's Bean Machine has shortened its opening hours to keep up with rising costs, as the cafe joins other small local businesses in receiving steep bill hikes.

As previously reported by *The Southern Argus*, many local business owners were shocked to discover staggering jumps to their electricity bills at the start of July, with one rising by an eye-watering 60 per cent.

Along with rising bills, supplies, wages and superannuation have risen from July 1.

Bean Machine owner Kathy Ziersch has found increases to "everything across the board", including 35 per cent to electricity, along with food, milk and coffee.

The local cafe is trialling shortened hours over winter, closing an hour earlier from Monday to Thursday, at 4pm.

"We picked the days where it has less impact, but we really have no choice at this

point," Ms Ziersch said.

"It's either that or someone loses their job and I don't want to see that.

"We looked at closing for two days in that week, but then someone loses that job, so we've come to a compromise as a team as I said, 'how about we shorten our days?"

She said the necessary move keeps local employees in jobs, while allowing the cafe to pay for skyrocketing bills.

"We have to put our prices up just to break even and to be able to keep local people in jobs, otherwise what happens?," she wondered.

"They're going to have to go further afield to get jobs, then they can't spend money in the town when there's nothing to spend it on."

Much of Bean Machine's food is made in-house to keep prices competitive for its customers, many who are elderly and facing increased costs of living themselves.

Ms Ziersch even recently got a second job herself, working about 60 hours at the cafe, and a further 10 to 15 in her other job.

The economic climate is a good reminder

on the importance of shopping locally, to keep money in the region, and lift community spirit, with Bean Machine employing 10 local residents and supporting many fundraising initiatives such as sporting clubs, schools and events.

Ms Ziersch is hoping local small businesses survive current hardship, as they attract tourists.

"People come to Strath for (small businesses) – it's like any other village in the Adelaide Hills," she said.

"People come to see something that's quaint, a bit different, and see the heritage."

Introducing more local community events could help inject money into the economy, Ms Ziersch suggested, such as bringing in a folk festival.

"They've got a beautiful park out there and they've got all the facilities out there... that would be excellent," she added.

"Why not bring in more of those events? That would help us out a lot."

## Council welcomes feedback on Milang Master Plan

The community can now have its say on Alexandrina Council's proposed Milang Master Plan.

Public consultation has opened on the draft plan, which was prepared by a multi-disciplinary team of consultants based on a co-designed workshop with the community late last year, MySay feedback, a working group site visit, and internal staff and executive team feedback.

The plan includes clearly defined and prioritised actions to ensure the town's desired future character is achieved, with projects and initiatives proposed comprising of road safety and welcome signage, improved walking trails, vegetation management, a boardwalk, Lake Foreshore walking loops and wayfinding, and a possible alternative skate park location.

In addition, several improvements to Luard Street and Anzac Park are suggested, including placemaking, greening, pedestrian provisions, traffic safety, formalised parking, and repurposing of tennis courts as a skate park and half-court for basketball, with similar suggestions made for Daranda Terrace and Coxe Street.

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
### Road closure to cause delays for Strathalbyn commuters

The intersection of South Terrace and Dawson Street will be partially closed for several weeks for the next stage of Strathalbyn Streetscape works.

As part of the project, a new pedestrian median island will be installed in the centre of South Terrace, which requires the intersection to be reduced to one lane for short periods.

The road will mostly remain open to two-way traffic, but motorists can expect minor delays until Friday, July 21 during closure times.

Minor footpath and service trenching works along Dawson Street are already under way, along with upgrades to the Visitor Information Centre carpark, including asphalting, additional lighting, installation of a stormwater management system, and garden beds.

Four new initiatives have been added to the budget since consultation opened, seeing \$23,200 allocated for Shannons Adelaide Rally's Strathalbyn staging, \$25,000 for Clayton Bay SMART lighting, \$5000 for Community Wastewater Management Scheme (CWMS) Strathalbyn lagoon remediation, and \$70,000 for a Goolwa Township Master Plan.

Council initially anticipated property development growth to be at 1.3 per cent, but based on figures received from the Valuer-General, the previous number has jumped to 1.7 per cent

At Monday night's meeting, the average rate increase was proposed at 6.9 per cent – one per cent under CPI – but was then further reduced to 5.9, bringing slight relief to ratepayers during the country's cost-of-living crisis.

"We're looking at challenging times, and I'm acutely aware of the financial stress that a large percentage of our community are under," Cr Michael Scott said.

"As we speak, we are competing with an enormous increase in power prices, and we are also competing with a rather blunt manner of curving inflation using interest rates, which really targets those people who are already in a vulnerable position.

"We should be really doubling down, cutting some costs – perhaps not providing all the services we've done and not doing the things we were thinking of doing – and responding to where the real need is and that is when they open their council rate envelope, it doesn't help send them to the wall any more than it has to.

"The world will become good in due course, and when (it does), we can view things differently, but right now, we're in very serious times and I would hate to think



the actions of our council have contributed to the unreasonable anxiety of our residents and ratepayers."

The rate reduction, along with other budget movements, has turned the surplus into a deficit of \$271,115.

However, Crs Margaret Gardner and Sue Miller chose not to support the budget.

"From 7.9 – which was March CPI – it was reduced by a great deal by administration to 7.2, then as we have it now, reduced further to 6.9," Cr Gardner said.

"Reducing it to five per cent is all well and good, but if you think about what we did last year with rates – having to put them up so high – we did that because we had to play catch up from the year before when we reduced them severely on the belief people couldn't pay because of COVID.

"I cannot understand a chamber who will reduce the rate to five per cent when it is very clear that if we leave it at 6.9, there is not a huge rate rise and people will manage.

"Why on earth would a large council like Alexandrina decide to reduce their rates when we actually need the income from (them)?"

Cr Miller requested funds allocated for the 2024 Wooden Boat Festival, which is planned in conjunction with the Goolwa Wharf opening in April, be redirected to the Ashbourne Memorial Hall Incorporated's driveway project, scoping for a walkway between Willyaroo and Strathalbyn, Strathalbyn Strikers Soccer Club's portaloo emptying costs, and Strathalbyn and District Basketball Association's floor resurfacing and court cleaning costs.

However, these were rejected, and it was suggested the items be re-tabled at the first quarterly budget review.

Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes preferred a five per cent rate increase, but was happy with the end result.

"Everybody is running at a deficit," he added.

"There are people out there with homes, who are on two good incomes, who are going to get food hand-outs because they can't afford to pay their bills.

"There's a projected deficit, but there are opportunities in the next few months to start cutting that back."

To provide relief against rapid changes or anomalies in valuations, general rates will be capped at 12 per cent, and all other rate categories limited to a maximum increase of 50 per cent upon application.

Council will also consider on application a discretionary rate rebate attributed to anomalies associated with the Valuer-General revaluation initiative.

Ratepayers may object to their property valuation by writing to the State Valuation Office.

## Dam safety a must for Hills and Fleurieu land managers

Recent heavy rainfall has highlighted the importance of land managers regularly monitoring and maintaining their dams, with many threatening to overspill or even collapse during a recent wild weather event.

While the rain is a welcome respite for many watercourses that rely on fresh flows, it has also saturated soils and created significant run-off across the Hills Fleurieu, causing concerns over dam safety.

Hills and Fleurieu Landscape Board General Manager Michael Garrod advised land managers to watch and maintain dam water levels appropriately, and check spillways are functioning correctly.

"It is important to note the majority of dams in the Mount Lofty Ranges were built before there was any regulation either as part of land use planning or water resource management," he said.

"Times have changed, and there's now a detailed permit and application process to go through before building or modifying dams, meaning the capacity, structural integrity, and engineering components of more recently built dams have been somewhat regulated and controlled.

"While all dams need to be carefully inspected and maintained, the older ones in particular can be

concerning when they fill to levels that put extra pressure on dam walls and spillways, potentially causing collapse."

Regular inspection and management also allows minor defects to be identified, which can be repaired cost effectively before major damage occurs, prolonging the dam's life and protecting it against deterioration.

While summer is the best time for preventative maintenance, when water levels are low and land is dry, safety inspections through wetter months is critical.

"Ultimately, land managers are responsible for the safety of their dams, and may be liable in the case of failure," Mr Garrod said.

"As with any emergency situation, prevention is better than cure."

Dam owners and emergency responders can access a quick and simple guideline and rapid risk assessment tool at (www.ses.sa.gov. au/flood/during-a-flood/dams) to determine whether further action is needed when a dam safety incident is suspected.

## Golden milestone for Strathalbyn couple

A chance encounter led two people from different sides of the country into an unusual courtship that's still going strong five decades later.

Strathalbyn residents Joe and Heather Geue met in Mount Gambier one Easter Saturday when Heather, who was living in Melbourne at the time, and Joe, who lived in Strathalbyn, happened to attend the same

"I had just happened to go there for a weekend with two lads I was working on the farm with," Joe said.

"We ended up in Mount Gambier on the Saturday night, went to a dance on Nelson Road, and bumped into this young lady and we talked... if we could hear each other over the loud music and dim lights.

"At the end of the night, I got her phone number, so I followed that up, and the next few weeks I went to visit her in Melbourne and took it from there."

The couple began a long-distance relationship, switching between Heather flying to Adelaide and Joe driving to Melbourne to see each other.

"I was doing interstate transport, so I

was doing three trips a week to Melbourne," Joe said.

"So, that part of the year – the first seven months – I would see her regularly.

"Then when I started shearing, I was committed to local work here, so it was a weekend duck away or she would fly over and we'd go out here, then I'd put her on a plane and go back to work."

It was an expensive arrangement, but one that worked for them.

"We had a long-distance romance, which was very unusual in those days because most people married someone within the district, but he had met me a long way away, and I lived even further away," Heather said.

"When we got engaged, I didn't see him for three months because he was busy shearing over here.

"For its time, it was probably still expensive, and I was flying pretty regularly, which was something else no one else did.

"Our whole courtship was really out-thebox from the 'norm."

About two years later, Joe popped the question while on the couch one night at Heather's parents' place after spending the day at the beach.

The couple married at Malvern Methodist

Church on June 30, 1973.

Their first-born Kirrily then came along, followed by Tait.

The couple celebrated their golden anniversary with their children, and other family members and friends, including their bridal party, at Lutheran Hall on Saturday, July 1.

Both Heather and Joe agreed 50 years had 'flown by'.

"We did look at our wedding album, and we did look very young and we were," Heather said.

"People get married a lot older now, but in those days, you were usually about 19 or 20 when you got married.

"I still think that's very young now, but at the time, we felt we were mature enough.

"I'm very proud of the achievement; it means more to me than birthdays because marriage can be a challenge."

The secret to getting over those challenges for the Geues was having the other person's back, and complementing each other's strengths and weaknesses.

"I think with us, we're a very good team," Heather said.

"When you get married, it's two distinct personalities becoming one body, and that can be a challenge in itself, but it also has huge possibilities.

"For Joe and I, in some ways we had very different strengths and weaknesses, but we complemented each other really well and we still do.

"We have each other's backs all the time, and I think that's a really strong part of our marriage."

Joe added having time and space, but sharing in each other's interests and passions when needed helped the couple reach the monumental milestone.

"I was very fortunate God led me in the right place at the right time," he said.

"These days, as soon as (people) meet someone they shift in together, but we didn't have that choice, which was good for the relationship – we had time to go away and think about it.

"These days, temperaments also seem to get in the way, and they walk away easily and too quickly sometimes – it hasn't been our choice, and we've been persistent with each other.

"We have our own space – we're not tacking each other's boots all time – and I have my commitments and she has hers... so, we've had a two-way street and a wide variety of activities that way."





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

Macclesfield author Liz Harfull has captured true uplifting stories of rural Australian women in her latest book A Farming Life, and the resilience of working through the last few years of droughts, floods, bushfires and a pandemic.

In writing her 10th book, Ms Harfull spent at least a few days on each woman's farm, observing their work and daily lives.

"Part of (the process) is developing a relationship because they have to trust me to tell their stories," she explained.



"I'm asking them a lot, I'm asking them to share their personal lives, that's really part of the process of getting to know them and them getting to know me."

The process resulted in six uplifting stories of hands-on farmers and their resilience in the face of personal loss, illness, fractured relationships, natural disasters and the challenges that come with working in a traditionally male-dominated world.

"(Resilience) is a really important message for our times because we have all been through some really challenging years... and we're not through it yet, now we're facing economic challenges," Ms Harfull said.

"These women have coped with so much in their lives and have come through to the other side really optimistic and still in love with the land and agriculture and seeing a future in it."

Ms Harfull also found a shift in perception around a career in farming, with the next generation ready to join the field.

"They've seen their mothers, grandmothers or aunties as inspiration and they want to follow in their footsteps," she said.

"I found that really exciting because when I worked as a farm journalist, in the 1990s to 2000s, most older farmers... were very pessimistic.

'They really wondered if any of their children who were going off to universities would ever want to come back and be "But, I think that's turning around now."

Ms Harfull believes farming has remained challenging over the generations, however, presents different obstacles.

"Some of these women I talk to, their pioneering ancestors lived in slab huts hundreds of kilometres from the nearest other woman with no home comforts at all, and raising children," she said.

"In that way, their lives were very hard, but now there are all sorts of other challenges to make a good living and to combat the other pressures they're facing."

After growing up on a dairy farm near Mount Gambier, Ms Harfull became passionate about life on the land, and worked as a rural journalist, and then for a PR agency that specialised in agriculture, before becoming an author telling the stories of everyday people, particularly from rural and regional Australia.

Some of her other books include Women of the Land, City Girl, Country Girl, and The Women Who Changed Country Australia.

As many books are about outback Australia, Ms Harfull specialises in the farming she is most familiar with and that she feels is underrepresented – the stories of farmers from closer-settled areas with higher-rainfall.

One of the stories in *A Farming Life* is of Nancy Withers, whose Scottish pioneering ancestors first settled in Strathalbyn.

Her great-great grandmother walked from

the town down the Coorong with her family to take up land near Mount Gambier.

Nancy married into the Withers family of Nalpa Station, and returned to live on the banks of Lake Alexandrina in the 1970s.

The book includes her life on the station, before she and her husband went farming in the South East, where Nancy established a reputation as one of Australia's most highly regarded kelpie breeders and trainers.

In her 70s, she is still breeding and training dogs, now living near Casterton, in western Victoria.

"Even as a journalist, the thing that I wanted to do the most was write in-depth feature stories that worked out why people did what they did," Ms Harfull said.

"To me, a story and history is made all the more powerful because it's about individual people, not statistics or dates or dry facts it's the people that draw you in."

A Farming Life will be launched at Adelaide Showground on July 28, where many of the women in the book will attend.

"I know they'll love meeting each other," Ms Harfull added.

"Even though they've come from very different parts of Australia and different types of farming, I think they'll find a lot in common."

Heavy recent rains have made the construction site of Keith Stephenson Park's new playground waterlogged and unworkable, delaying the opening from the Spring school holidays to November.

Main contractor Adelaide Property & Gardens started a "significant upgrade" to the existing play space in May, which has used renewal funding combined with new capital funding.

The new, all-ages play space includes undergrounding of existing overhead power lines and new switchboards, irrigated garden beds, soft landscaping, a sandpit, fencing and gates, outdoor furniture, water and nature play elements, and lighting.

A Mount Barker District Council spokesperson said Keith Stephenson Park is "extremely popular" and a "highly regarded public destination" in Mount Barker.

"In addition to new and improved play

equipment including nature play elements and water play features, the Keith Stephenson Park play space will include fencing to separate the area from the rest of the park to ensure the safety of children using the equipment," a spokesperson said.

"Shade structures will be installed around the play area to help families beat the heat and be sun-safe."

Rotary recently dismantled the existing playground and sent it to disadvantaged overseas communities to be rebuilt as part of the Rotary Overseas Relocation Playgrounds (RORP) initiative, which a council spokesperson deemed a "great outcome" for all parties concerned.

According to council, "a significant number of responses" and "overwhelming support" was shown for an upgrade to the existing playground, with public consultation done through online surveys and a public display held in 2019.

## Warning against potentially deadly drug

South Australians are being warned about the presence of a potentially deadly synthetic opioid that led to two people being treated at the Royal Adelaide Hospital (RAH) last week.

Toxicology screening detected the presence of Protonitazene, the first time

this drug has been found in South Australia.

The cases suggested this drug may currently be contaminating other non-opioid illicit drugs, such as methamphetamine.

Individuals exposed to Protonitazene are at high risk of opioid poisoning, and the drug can produce life-threatening toxic effects

at low doses, especially if people use drugs while unsupervised or alone.

The danger of taking any type of recreational drug is the unknown of where it came from, what is in it and at what dose, and what affect it will have on the individual who takes it.

Protonitazene has recently been detected in Victoria, Queensland, and Western Australia, and this is the first detection in a clinical environment in South Australia.

Anyone who has taken a recreational drug and has unexpected effects should present to their closest emergency department immediately.

RAH Duty Emergency Physician and Clinical Toxicologist, Associate Professor, Sam Alfred, said these drugs are capable of causing a fatal overdose.

"There is currently a major concern that this drug is mixed with other illicit drugs, such as methamphetamine, and that people may be accidentally exposed to it while seeking an effect from a different drug," he said.

"In this context, overdose is highly likely and death may occur.

"If choosing to use illicit drugs, people should do so in an environment in which an accidental opioid overdose will be seen and noticed by others who can provide assistance."

## Vaping blitz to target illegal sales

An eight-week enforcement blitz targeting the illegal sale of nicotine vapes launched on Monday, coinciding with tough new licence conditions imposed by the State Government in early June.

The stringent new licence conditions make clear selling nicotine e-cigarettes is already illegal and now requires retailers to not only prove vaping products being sold are free from the chemical, but provide information about their suppliers, importers or manufacturers to enable products to be traced.

Licence holders must also arrange laboratory testing if their supplier fails to provide written documentation confirming any vapes are nicotine-free, train staff and provide adequate supervision on the requirements of the Tobacco and E-Cigarette Products Act (TEP), Controlled Substances Act 1984 and other relevant legislation, and display their TEP Act licence in a visible place on the premises.

SA Health compliance officers will begin the first wave of inspections this week, visiting businesses such as convenience stories, service stations, and barber shops to ensure they understand the new conditions and inspect any products already known to contain nicotine.

Follow-up inspections will check businesses have the required evidence to show their products are nicotine-free.

"I am deeply concerned about the alarming rates of young people becoming addicted to vapes," Health Minister, Chris Picton, said.

"Data shows the prevalence of young people using vapes has jumped from one per cent to nearly eight per cent in the past five years – this is why we are taking strong action to try to halt this serious health problem.

"These strict new conditions are designed to keep illegal nicotine vapes out of retail outlets, and out of the hands of South Australians, especially children.

"These changes will help SA Health to regulate nicotine vaping products until the Commonwealth Government's national ban on nicotine vapes comes into effect."

Previous enforcement blitzes over the past year resulted in the seizure of about 15,000 illegal nicotine vapes, 17 fines, and three licences cancelled.

Businesses found in breach of the new licence conditions may be subject to a warning, expiation notices, product seizures, and/or prosecution based on individual circumstances.

"This compliance blitz will target a range of business types, and retailers found to be in breach will face significant penalties," Acting Chief Public Health Officer, Dr Chris Lease, said.

"We gave licence holders a month's notice to familiarise themselves with the changes, so they can comply with them, and we urge them to make sure they are doing the right thing.

"It is important for retailers to know

"It is important for retailers to know it is illegal to sell any nicotine vaping products in South Australia unless you are the holder of a licence under the Controlled Substances Act such as a pharmacy, and the purchaser is in possession of a valid prescription."

## **Record call-outs for Maccy CFS**

A record number of call-outs has kept Macclesfield Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers busy during the 2022-23 financial year.

Over the past 12 months, the brigade responded to 92 call-outs, including 40 fallen trees, 20 road crashes, nine scrub, grass and tree fires, seven rubbish fires, six building fires, two fire alarms, two strike team deployment for storm damage, two

flooding events, one animal rescue, one downed powerline, one air support, and one SA Ambulance assist.

This beats the brigade's previous record of 84 in 2013-14, and has resulted in thousands of volunteer and training hours.

The brigade also welcomed eight new members in the past year, and hoped to see those numbers continue to grow in 2023-24.

"As you can see, fires make up just a small amount of what we do; our volunteers train for and respond to a wide range of emergencies," the brigade wrote on Facebook.

"We are hoping not to see another record year, but that is unfortunately out of our hands.

"Regardless, our volunteers will always give their all to assist those in need."

# Road safety plea amid alarming month-long operation F5 results

South Australia Police has appealed for motorists to take care on the roads after more than 100 offences were reported in the Hills Fleurieu alone during a recent operation.

Operation High Impact F5 ran statewide throughout June, focusing on the 'Fatal Five' factors contributing to road trauma and death – drink and drug driving, speeding, distraction, failing to wear a seatbelt, and dangerous driving.

During the month-long operation, 106 motorists in the Hills Fleurieu were caught displaying these behaviours, including 15 for drink driving and two for drug driving.

Six drivers were caught without a seatbelt, leading to four being fined and two cautioned, while four were detected driving while distracted, resulting in three fines and one caution.

In addition, 28 motorists were caught either driving while disqualified or unlicensed, and another 51 driving unregistered or uninsured.

Officer in Charge of the Traffic Services Branch Superintendent Darren Fielke appealed to all drivers to take care on the roads, and show consideration for one another. "We ask everyone to stick to the speed limit, not drive after drinking or taking drugs, to keep their eyes on the road at all times, ensure everyone in their vehicle is wearing a seatbelt, and to drive with regard for the road rules and other road users," he said.

"Drivers are also urged to drive to the conditions, particularly during this wintery, wet weather.

"Turn on your headlights to see and be seen, especially at dawn and dusk, and slow down and take extra care if roads are slippery or visibility is poor."

### Learner drivers hit the road for more experience

Motorists are being urged to take extra care on the roads during the winter school holidays, as more learner drivers take time to gain experience in challenging conditions.

Driving in winter brings additional challenges, including reduced visibility and slippery roads, which can affect vehicle behaviour and increase stopping distances.

RAA Senior Manager for Safety and Infrastructure Charles Mountain said school holidays were a convenient time for learner drivers to progress their driving skills in these conditions, while completing the minimum 75 hours required.

"Crash data shows P1 drivers are involved in six times the number of crashes compared with supervised learner drivers, so it's vital to do more than the bare minimum required before you get your provisional licence," he said. holidays, we're urging road users to take extra care to ensure we don't add to the

"Feedback we hear from supervising and learner drivers is that many aren't as confident with lane merges and roundabouts, so practice those as well.

"With your supervising driver, start with quieter locations and progress to more challenging ones – experience helps to build both knowledge and confidence.

"Learner drivers planning on driving interstate should check whether any conditions are different in the state you'll be driving in, as some have a lower speed limit applicable to learner drivers."

Mr Mountain reminded all motorists to drive to the conditions, and allow time for vehicles to stop if the road is wet.

"With South Aussies travelling to regional locations during school extra care to ensure we don't add to the number of lives lost on our roads so far this year," he said.

"Before heading off, check all tyres have at least 1.5mm of tread across their full width and wipers are working effectively, and it's a good idea to turn on your headlights when it's raining to ensure other road users can see you.

"Be extra careful to check for pedestrians at crossings and cyclists in bike lanes.

"It's recommended pedestrians use a designated crossing point even if it means walking a few extra steps, and ensure traffic has stopped at a crossing before entering."

In my final edition of *The Southern Argus*, I'd like to emphasise the importance of country newspapers and paying for news.

## Calls for government local news support

Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie recently urged the Government to provide support for media news diversity in regional Australia.

Ms Sharkie has recognised the vitally important role of local newspapers in Mayo's regional communities, including *The Southern Argus*, and Kangaroo Island's

More than 200 regional newspapers closed across Australia during the COVID-19 pandemic's beginning in 2020.

The Country Press Association found the remaining are finding it increasingly difficult to maintain consistent revenue streams, now reliant on digital platforms, cover prices and government support, which has reduced in recent times.

Recommendations have been made to the Federal Government commit more funding to regional media advertising.

Ms Sharkie believes local news publications help hold governments to account and cover stories of local significance which might not otherwise receive national attention.

glue' which helps hold small towns and regions together – championing local victories, and sensitively covering local tragedies," she said.

"And they help preserve the local and regional histories we value so much."

Ms Sharkie finds many these independent, often family-run businesses are feeling "under real threat".

"Country Press Australia members inform me that a comprehensive campaign for advertising in independent regional newspapers has not been included in Government advertising plans for the referendum," she said.

"I am concerned that readers in regional and remote Australia who rely heavily on local news from local journalists would lack critical messaging under a communications strategy which fails to take full advantage of regional media."

The local MP called on the Federal Government to review its communications policy and regional print media funding.

"We need to ensure that regional print media is supported so that regional and remote Australians are connected and engaged, including in the Voice referendum process," Ms Sharkie said.

"We need to help regional media to survive declining economic conditions so that they can continue to provide localised news for regional communities rather than having them rely on solely city-based media."

### Lower beach speed limits preferred

Following Goolwa Beach's speed limit reduction last year, other South Australian beaches may follow suit and also enforce lower speeds to improve safety.

Public consultation earlier this year found a reduction to the default speed limit – which is currently a default speed of 100km/h – received overwhelming support in a yourSAy survey.

Based on thousands of respondents, 80 per cent supported a default speed limit of 40km/h and 25 km/h when passing or within 100 metres of a pedestrian.

Beaches where a recent reduction or a speed limit of 40km/h or less

will remain, regardless of the direction taken, with the recent approval of 40km/h speed limit for Goolwa Beach and a speed limit of 10 km/h for Moana, Aldinga and Sellicks beaches enforced.

From 2017 to 2021, South Australian beaches had 29 reported crashes resulting in the loss of one life, 15 serious injuries and 13 minor injuries.

Speed was reported as a contributing factor to 50 per cent of these crashes.

All the feedback from the engagement process will be considered and a final decision will be made by the end of the year.

## Monarto's new EV charger

Four new electric vehicle charging units at Monarto Safari Park recently came online, allowing drivers to explore the park while using the 7kW charging site.

The new charging site is part of the RAA Charge network which will be completed in 2024, comprising of 140 charging sites across the state.

Since launching the first charging sites in March, the network currently has 25 per cent of the network installed and operational, with slower 7kW sites, and the first 150kW rapid and 200kW ultra-rapid charging sites under construction.

The time duration is dependent on the vehicle, and at Monarto, recharging a battery could take eight hours, but three hours would likely be sufficient to continue a journey.

The network charging sites are planned to be no more than 200km apart so trips can be planned around the state, with 75 per cent of the charging infrastructure in regional areas.

An EV charging site was launched at Strath Motel earlier this year, while Mount Barker and a Goolwa also have planned sites.

RAA's General Manager Community and Corporate Affairs Emily Perry said an important part of rolling out the network, in partnership with the State Government, has been opening up tourist opportunities in South Australia, including the Murraylands, and making "range anxiety" a thing of the past.

While the infrastructure is being developed, Ms Perry is finding many South Australian drivers' feedback falls under two categories:

"We've got traditional drivers who are still in internal combustion engines who are questioning why we are making this significant investment in the network when there are so few cars on the road, through to electric vehicle drivers who are saying the infrastructure can't come fast enough," she said.

"Within the next 12 months, we will have potentially 15,000 to 20,000 (electric) vehicles on the road, so that uptake in demand for this use of infrastructure is huge."

Monarto Safari Park Director Peter Clark said providing a charging option for EV drivers made sense given the importance of the park for tourism.

"As a conservation charity, we're really pleased to be involved in anything that encourages sustainability and especially into the future, and obviously, electric vehicles are a big part of that," he said.

"At the moment, people have to plan their day around the chargers.

"This gives them a bigger range, it gets them to more regions throughout South Australia and I think into the future, there's just going to be more and more demand for it, so the sooner we get the infrastructure in, the sooner you'll see an escalation of electric vehicles on the road.

"It was always going to be difficult to get electric vehicles into circulation because of the infrastructure that's required, so this is a great step.

"We'll be looking to expand on what we've got as demand increases."

## Goolwa and Mount Barker charged and ready to go

RAA Charge network rapid and ultra-rapid charging sites at Goolwa and Mount Barker are set to come online in the coming months.

As part of more than 50 locations set to join the RAA network, Goolwa will have a 150kW rapid charger built at Alexandrina Council's carpark, while Mount Barker will add a 200kW ultra-rapid charger near the Homemaker Centre.

Once completed, the broader network will consist of 140 charging sites, which will help with the predicted increase in electric vehicle (EV) sales in South Australia this year.

"Powered by renewable electricity, our rapid and ultra-rapid chargers are the future of EV charging technology, and will help to make range anxiety a thing of the past for South Australian drivers," RAA Chief Executive Officer, Nick Reade, said.

"These charging sites will help power South Australians through their regional road trips, allowing for only a short stop to plug in and grab a coffee or bite to eat before hitting the road again fully charged. "We are now 25 per cent of the

"We are now 25 per cent of the way through the roll-out of the RAA Charge network, giving more South Australian drivers the confidence to go all-electric.

"In the coming months, another approximately 10 rapid and ultrarapid chargers will come online in regions such as the Fleurieu Peninsula and Adelaide Hills."

More than 75 per cent of the RAA Charge network will be located in regional SA, with 98 per cent of the planned charging sites to be located less than 200kms apart.

It will cost between \$22 and \$26 to charge the average EV at one of the rapid or ultra-rapid sites, compared to the more than \$50 it would cost to fill up the same car with petrol.

Minister for Energy and Mining Tom Koutsantonis said the state-wide network is an important step towards a net-zero future.

"Regional and rural connectivity is a must, not just to make sure people living in the regions aren't locked out of the benefits of owning an electric vehicle, but to incentivise people travelling to and through these areas," he said.

"We look forward to watching the network continue to grow with South Australian motorists' needs."

## Additional funding to revive 'failing' Mount Compass road

Works to extend a deteriorating Mount Compass road's lifespan have been given a much-needed cash boost from Alexandrina Council.

The current bitumen surface on Nangkita Road was installed seven years ago, but has since failed significantly, resulting in large potholes and other hazards for motorists.

Council previously allocated \$300,000 to the Nangkita Road Renewal Program, with \$600,000 contributed from the Federal Government's Special Local Roads

Program, to deliver a cement-treated bitumen solution, however, an alternative foam bitumen stabilisation treatment is expected to give the road a 20-year life expectancy.

This treatment comes at an increase of \$300,000, raising total project costs to \$1.2 million.

At last month's council meeting, elected members agreed to allocate the additional funds to produce long-term council savings and efficiencies, and address a frequently used road that regularly receives feedback about its poor condition.

Council anticipates savings from the broader capital program may accommodate the additional costs.

"It's often criticised as a pothole-laden road, and it's one of the few roads that's actually designated as a B-double heavy transport road," Deputy Mayor, Bill Coomans, said.

"I know a few years ago we did a corner which was close to the shopping precinct, and staff then decided to do it at a 200ml depth – which is the proper way of doing it – and that road has stood up really well.

"Hopefully, the extra funding can be

found within the broad capital program, but it really does need this work done properly.

"Seven years versus 20 years is probably to me a no-brainer, but there is significant money involved with it."

North Ward councillor Craig Maidment agreed it was a "must-do" project.

"As councillor Coomans alerted, this road has failed," he said.



"He was very naughty, and I was still very young and had quite a few falls, but he's a lot better now."

Day was among the creators of Jupiter Creek Pony Club just over six years ago, and is now a committee member

"I try to stay in pony club and show the younger kids that they can get to that level," Day explained.

"If they don't see it, they don't have anything to aspire to," Smith added. Jupiter Creek Pony Club is particularly competitive and focuses on improvement and progression.
