Tour Down Under takes cycling to the Adelaide Hills for another year...

Fleurieu Distillery wins multiple awards in Melbourne

Goolwa distillers Gareth and Angela Andrews have put the Fleurieu on the map once again – this time internationally – by taking out the trophy for Best Blended Malt Whisky and a Royal Consistency of Excellence at the recent Melbourne Royal Australian International Spirits Awards.

Established in 2015, it's the first and largest awards program in Australia, recognising innovation and excellence in distilling, and this year accepted international entries for the first time.

Out of 826 entries, 103 received gold, 372 silver and 281 bronze medals, while 24 received trophies, including the Fleurieu Distillery which took home Best Blended Malt Whisky for *Country to Coast #6* – its sixth collaboration with New South Wales' Black Gate Distillery.

It was also recognised with the Melbourne Royal Consistency of Excellence Award, which is presented to products that have received a gold medal for three consecutive years. "That continuation over the years of constantly winning gold – we're chuffed," Mr Andrews said.

"It's just really good to be appreciated for consistently high-scoring whiskys.

"We do lots of blends with different distilleries but (*Country to Coast*) in particular is a favourite of ours.

"Every year it's slightly different – we try to highlight a different aspect of the whisky.

"Each year they go this is fabulous, so no complaints there."

The pair also took home gold in Australian Single Malt Whisky Unsmoked for *Telemachus*, Australian Single Malt Whisky Smoked for *The Palace of Humbug*, Australian Single Malt Cask Strength Whisky Smoked for *Mary Ann*, and Australian Blended Malt Whisky for *Country to Coast #6*, as well as silver in Australian Single Malt Cask Strength Whisky Unsmoked for *Here Comes The Flood*.

Five of these are brand-new whiskies that will be released for winter, which, in addition to beating out international entries, made the award wins more significant.

"It was lovely to be in an Australian and international awards competition and to

win," Mr Andrews said.

"I think over the years, in the future, we'll see more overseas distilleries get involved."

On top of the Melbourne awards, the pair received an added surprise on their return home, with the announcement they had taken home Champion Whisky – again for *Country to Coast #6* – at the Royal Queensland Distilled Spirits Awards.

They also took home two silvers in the Single Malt category – one for *Telemachus* and the other for *The Palace of Humbug* – gold in Blended for *Country to Coast #6*, and both the gold and silver in Single Cask – first for *Mary Ann* and secondly for *Here Comes The Flood*.


"It's not just good for us, it's good for the whole Wharf Precinct," Mr Andrews said.

"Having different things to see and do really adds to the vibrancy and dynamics of the wharf, so we're chuffed to be able to support all of that.

"And it's good for the whole Fleurieu Peninsula – everyone knows about the food and wine, but having all these awards for spirits just really shows what a fantastic area we live in."

Celebrations for hall opening

Celebrations to herald the re-opening of the Strathalbyn Town Hall will include a walk-through for visitors during the Antiques Fair and a council meeting in the venue.

The long-awaited upgrade of the heritagelisted building has now been completed after many delays, comprising of installation of air conditioning in the main auditorium, reconfiguration of the front foyer and balcony areas, a new audio-visual system and stage lighting, enhancements to meet disability access requirements, refurbishment of existing toilet facilities, roof and floor structure repairs, an extension to the existing stage, and installation of a solar power system.

To celebrate its re-opening, Alexandrina Council plans to make the hall available for people to have an informal walk-through of the facility on the Saturday coinciding with the town's Antiques and Vintage Fair.

Council staff will be on site to welcome visitors, provide information and assist with enquiries.

In addition, the September council meeting will be held in the venue.

Council last held a meeting in Strathalbyn in May last year at the St Andrew's Church Hall to align with History Month and the town's 185-year anniversary celebrations.

The majority of councillors supported holding the meeting in town again to celebrate the completion of the hall renovations.

"I think the renovation is beautiful," North Ward councillor, Sue Miller, said.

"I think the renovation of this historic, significant building will see it immediately activated and I look forward to seeing how the community use it.

"Your support for holding this meeting again, especially in the Town Hall, will acknowledge the geographic and

demographic characteristics of our vast council area and show you care about equity, access and inclusiveness.

"There is growing interest in council business and how decisions are made.

"This is a small but meaningful way to keep that interest growing."

A site inspection has confirmed the venue is suitable to host the meeting, however, even with professional audio/visual support, the acoustics may not be optimal.

The cost associated with holding the meeting in this space is \$3000 in addition to minor staffing costs for the set-up and pack down of the facility.

It is because of this that South Ward councillor Peter Oliver opposed the motion.

"This would be really nice but this is discretionary expenditure," he said.

"I put it to you that this is an opportunity to save \$3000.

"Now \$3000 may not seem a lot but it's more than the rates of one household for an entire year.

"This doesn't stop the party and the celebration from happening, but this is a great opportunity to show our financial restraint."

Moving forward, council will manage the hall through a 'hire only' model for two years, commencing from July, as confidentially voted on in October 2024.

During this next period, administration plans to focus on developing an appropriate long-term operational management model, and address any initial issues that may arise with the facility's re-opening.

After the two-year period a report will be presented to council with recommendations on the hall's future operations model.

Administration is currently actively engaging with potential users and hirers to ascertain initial interest, and short and long-term bookings of the hall ahead of the opening.

As of early September, all bookings will be made via the SpacetoCo online platform.

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Clubs receive drought relief

Dozens of local sport and active recreation clubs impacted by drought have secured vital support under a new grant program helping to ease financial pressures and keep communities active.

The Regional Drought Relief Round - introduced by the State Government enables clubs to access up to \$5000 to continue providing programs and services in regional communities.

"Sporting clubs are at the heart of our regional communities, they bring people together during the tough times and the good," Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, Clare Scriven, said.

"I would encourage all my fellow councillors to keep their noses to the grindstone and continue to keep doing the hard work that we're doing on behalf of our community."

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Paid parking concerns raised for new hospital

Paid parking could potentially be implemented at the new Mt Barker Hospital.

Paid parking is implemented at the state's metropolitan public hospitals, with some exemptions.

Mount Barker Hospital does not charge parking fees, but concerns were raised by local residents and staff recently that it could be implemented at the new multimillion-dollar facility once completed.

Independent Candidate for Kavel Matt Schultz claimed nurses and allied health staff, along with patients, particularly those for regular chemotherapy and dialysis, had approached him about the issue.

He wrote a letter to Health Minister Chris Picton, calling on the State Government to rule out introducing paid parking at the new hospital for fears it could run the risk of "stretching people even further".

"With a new 600-space multi-deck carpark about to enter construction at the hospital site, local staff have been calling on the State Government to rule out paid parking," Mr Schultz said.

"You think about a lot of the people that need to access it – you've got people that are elderly, on pensions, and low-socioeconomic backgrounds - and they're the types of people who will struggle to find that extra money to access what is an essential service.

"We know in the Adelaide metropolitan health sector that paid parking is in place at the public hospitals – both staff and patients - and we just don't think that's the right thing for Mount Barker Hospital, and the reason for that is because Mount Barker Hospital is part of the Regional Health Network, so it is effectively part of Country SA Primary Health Network.

"Mount Barker is still a regional community serving the entire Hills, and staff and patients cannot afford to be propping up the State Budget through paid parking.
"We need the Health Minister to rule out

revenue raising at Mount Barker."

The new multi-deck car park will add 372 car parks on the site in addition to the extra 283 on-grade parks expected by the end of the project.

The operating details are yet to be

"Car parking is currently available for staff and consumers at no cost, with operating details for the new multi-deck car park yet to be determined," Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network Chief Executive Officer, Bronwyn Masters, told The Southern Argus.

"We thank our community, visitors, staff and neighbouring service providers for their patience and understanding.

"We look forward to new and improved car parking capacity in the coming months."

Mr Schultz has launched an online petition to 'stop paid parking' at the hospital which can be signed at (https:// www.change.org/p/stop-paid-parking-atmount-barker-hospital).

In the meantime, the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation SA Branch (NMF SA) is working to support members following the closure of the onsite car parks at the Mount Barker District Soldiers Memorial Hospital while the new multi-deck car park is under construction.

It is not aware of any plans to implement paid parking at the hospital.

"ANMF SA advocates on behalf of members' need to access safe and accessible carparking nearby their place of work," Adj Associate Professor and ANMF (SA Branch) CEO/Secretary, Elizabeth Dabars, said.

"We are working with the Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network (BHFLHN) to ensure there is appropriate parking available for staff members in both the shorter and long-term."

The annual meeting of the Middleton Soldiers Memorial Gardens was held in the Institute Hall when the following were elected; President Mr. D. W. McLeod; Vice-Presidents Messrs. W. R. Lovell, H. S. Cope and E. A. Luxmoore, Treasurer Mr. H. I. Ellis; Auditor Mr. A.S.M.Lovell, Secretary Mr. W. W. Hargreaves. The bank balance showed 52 pounds and tenders called for 70 yards of limestone for improvements to the Soldiers' Gardens.

At the annual meeting of the Strathalbyn Agricultural Society it was reported that the grounds committee had authorised alterations to the cattle and sheep yards, also the erection of 30 new stalls for horses (Mr. John Richardson generously donating 30 posts), and more seating accommodation. Complaints were made as to the damage done by sporting clubs and hire of the grounds and buildings.



Funding for algal bloom at last

The State Government has signed off on a \$28 million harmful algal bloom support package while its Federal counterpart has chipped in \$14 million for the recovery efforts.

The State Government has been actively monitoring and testing waters across the state, and has established an algal bloom taskforce and reference group to help industries and stakeholders respond to and recover from the algal bloom.

In its latest course of action, the State Government requested assistance for the Federal Government on Sunday, which pledged \$14 million towards helping the state deal with the toxic outbreak, though the finer details of what the funding will be used for have yet to be confirmed.

SA Premier Peter Malinauskas also met with scientists and marine biologists on Monday to further examine the harmful algal bloom and advance the State Government's response, and convened an Emergency Management Committee of Cabinet on Tuesday, where a comprehensive package covering industry support, science and research, communications, community support, and clean-up was approved.

Key measures in the next stage of the harmful algal bloom support package include:

- Coastal Monitoring Network: investing in expanded early detection and monitoring of harmful algal bloom species through realtime sensors (buoys), satellite imagery and oceanographic modelling, with rapid detection of harmful algal blooms and early warning systems for industry.
- New national testing laboratory in SA for harmful algal bloom and brevetoxin/ biotoxin testing.
- Rapid assessment of fish stocks and fisheries to quantify impact.
- Citizen Science: rapid meta-analysis of citizen science records and documented ecological impacts to provide a baseline understanding from which to assess recovery.
- Community fund to support activities and small projects in affected communities.
- Beach clean-up funding for Local Government to assist cleaning up dead fish

and marine life.

- \$10,000 Small Business Support Grants for eligible small businesses.
- Financial counselling, mental health support and workforce advice to assist small businesses impacted by the harmful algal

The Harmful Algal Bloom Taskforce will meet every Thursday, with a media conference to follow to keep the public informed on latest developments.

"The State Government has been developing a deliberately calibrated suite of measures for the next stage of our response to this unprecedented harmful algal bloom," Premier Malinauskas said.

"We have been engaging with key stakeholders, industry and communities to ensure our response is targeted to where it is needed most.

"This comprehensive package covers industry support, science and research, communications, community support and

'As a government, this represents the next stage of our response to this developing natural disaster, and we stand ready to deliver additional support if and when it is needed."

Meanwhile, the Southern and Hills Local Government Association Board met last Friday to discuss the issue.

They have written a letter delivered to Federal Minister for Environment Murray Watts while on his visit to South Australia on Monday.

"I fully supported the comments that, if it was Bondi Beach, it would've been a national disaster two months ago," Alexandrina Mayor, Keith Parkes, said at Monday night's council meeting.

"This is a serious situation – it's not going to go away quickly."

The state's Opposition has also criticised the government for failing to declare the bloom as a national disaster.

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Road maintenance on state-managed roads should be core business, yet it's clearly being overlooked. While mostly council roads are in reasonable shape, state roads in our region continue to be neglected, underfunded, and left to deteriorate.

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport cancelled the planned overtaking ane and centre barrier project near Cut Hill



without community consultation or explanation. Land had been purchased, services relocated, and the community was expecting action. We now ask: where has that funding gone?

I've long called for a staged duplication of the Victor Harbor Road from Adelaide to Victor. With traffic volumes ranging from 27,300 (2025) vehicles near McLaren Vale to 8,100 (2023) near Victor, and more growth on the way, this planning must begin



We also need serious attention paid to congestion between Goolwa and Victor Harbor, including a potential bypass behind Middleton and Port Elliot. This isn't just about convenience—it's about futureproofing a growing community and reducing risk.

While Labor spends 93% of road funding in metro Adelaide-mostly on the \$15.4 billion North-South Corridor-regional communities are left behind. Our local roads, like Hindmarsh Tiers Road, Goolwa Road, Alexandrina Road and Inman Valley Road, are cracked, potholed, and dangerous.

The government admits that serious crashes are on the rise, yet we see no evidence of proactive safety investment in our region.

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Scam session to combat community cybercrime

South Australia Police (SAPOL) will host a presentation at the Strathalbyn and Goolwa libraries to highlight the prevalence of cybercrime and upskill the public to look out for common scam 'red flags'.

Prevention measures will also be explained at the August sessions.

"Whilst the majority of reports and financial loss are reported by people over 65, scams happen to everyone," a SAPOL

spokesperson said.
"In the current landscape, younger people are suffering from significant emotional harm due to the types of cybercrime being committed, such as sextortion."

Hundreds of scams are currently out there, and each day a new one may be developed.

"That's why it is important to know the 'red flags' of scams as these rarely change," the spokesperson added.

"Some common scams now are tax phishing scams, where a text is sent to a victim asking them to click on a link to check their tax return.

"Another current scam is an investment scam surrounding crypto currency, with victims looking to make money on ventures that are 'too good to be true."

Those attending the presentation will be shown how to make a secure password and



The thefts allegedly occurred between June 12 and July 6 across numerous stores in the CBD and Adelaide Hills.


The stolen property was valued at more than \$14,000.

Natural burial site locked in for 40 years

For at least the next four decades local residents can be buried 'naturally' at Goolwa.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, The Natural Burial Ground Trust of Australia in partnership with the Nature Foundation enquired with Alexandrina Council in June last year about suitable land within the region that could be established as a restoration natural burial ground.

The Old Goolwa Cemetery at Kessell Road was chosen as the ideal site given it has an existing Bush Forever site and further native vegetation enhancements that would provide significant environmental benefits.

This proposal went to public consultation over the next month, where, after gaining overwhelming support, was endorsed by councillors.

To determine the length of the organisation's tenancy at the site, in May this year, council opened a proposed 42-year ground lease to public consultation, garnering 28 submissions.

Only one objection was returned by a respondent who felt it was a "nonsense idea that will cost ratepayers money with no valuable return", however, most believed it was a greater and greener burial alternative, and would both benefit the environment and complement the existing cemetery.

On this basis, councillors granted The Australian Natural Burial Authority as trustee for The Natural Burial Ground Trust of Australia a 42-year lease for the Old Goolwa Cemetery site.

The overall proposal has no cost implications to council as the site would be fully managed by the Natural Burial Trust of Australia and their collaboration with the Nature Foundation.

One of Strathalbyn's iconic artists has reminisced on his time with the then-Duke of Edinburgh following the launch of the King's new art exhibition.

King Charles III has visited around 100 countries, carrying out diplomatic duties on royal tours, and during that time has invited several artists to join him at his own expense, where he gave them a brief to draw, paint or sculpt whatever inspired them.

More than 70 works from 43 different artists have now been collated into an exhibition at Buckingham Palace's ballroom, handpicked by the King from his own collection, for people to view as part of a visit to the summer opening of the palace.

The launch of the exhibition reminded Strathalbyn artist David Dridan of when the State Government commissioned him to make a painting for the then-Duke of Edinburgh when he opened the Signal Point Visitor Information Centre in 1988 as part an Australian Royal Tour.

"I don't usually watch channel seven but I turned it on... and (the collection of the King's) came up on the news," he said.

"Buckingham Palace owns three of my paintings – one was commissioned by the South Australian Government for when he opened the gallery in Goolwa.

"(Charles III) got through to me to see if I could send him photographs of my work, which I did, and he chose two more for his own room."

This is the first time the artists' works have been brought together.

The initiative reflects King Charles III's "enduring support for the arts".

The King's Tour Artists exhibition runs from July 10 through September 10.

Silent majority support

In Alexandrina Residents & Ratepayers Action Group's (ARRAG) opinion, trust needs to be earned, and in Local Government circles, it takes much longer than six months.

It was only after the appointment of the new CEO that reduced spending and smaller rates increases came to the public notice as an option.

Shortly after the CEO's appointment, ESCOSA found that councillors ignored the public response for them to cut spending and rates increases (refer ESCOSA Report).

This does not build trust.

As we pointed out in a previous letter, the only elected members who voted no for such increases were councillors Bill Coomans and Peter Oliver.

Which leads us to the Lot 10 Recreation Precinct Project in Strathalbyn – a town in council's North Ward.

The business case estimates capital costs

for this project range from \$35 million to \$45 million, with annual operating costs of between \$400,000 and \$500,000.

Council has already spent between \$100,000 and \$150,000 on concepts and a business case which were tabled at the December 16, 2024, council meeting.

In the 25/26 Annual Community Plan, council approved the spending of a further \$200,000 on this project in the current financial year.

We also understand there are further funds allocated to this project in the early years of the Long-Term Financial Plan.

This growth in council spending on a major project has a very familiar pattern to it.

Who can forget the Goolwa Wharf project, Goolwa Oval project, Strathalbyn Town Hall project and Strathalbyn streetscape project?










The state's largest cycling event returns in January where it will travel through Meadows, Strathalbyn and Macclesfield in one of the men's stages, putting an international spotlight on the Hills Fleurieu region once again.

The Santos Tour Down Under will run for 10 days from January 16 to 25, and will see the return of an inner-city prologue, double fireworks up Corkscrew Road, a triple treat on Willunga Hill, and a final day showdown in Stirling to open the men's and women's UCI WorldTour seasons.

"We are delighted to share with everyone the race routes for next year's Santos Tour Down Under, which we know is a catalyst for interstate and overseas cycling fans to plan and book their annual January holidays to South Australia," Minister for Tourism, Zoe Bettison, said.

"Earlier this year we celebrated the event's 25th birthday which saw approximately 807,900 people attending the event, helping generate \$62.5 million for the state's economy.

"Now we want to take that momentum into next year where once again the eyes of the world will be on South Australia for 10 days when we host the biggest bike race in the southern hemisphere.

The new financial year brings a wave of superannuation changes.

Here's what's changing and how to make the most of it.

Twelve per cent SG rate

The Super Guarantee (SG) rate has increased from 11.5 to 12 per cent on ordinary time earnings.

This means more money going into your super account.

Check your first payslips this financial year to ensure the changed rate is applied.

For salary sacrifice arrangements, note the SG calculation applies to your total salary, as if the arrangement was not in place.

Use the MoneySmart calculator to see more than the annual cap. what the changes look like for your super balance.

More for retirement phase

amount of super that can be transferred into the retirement phase - known as the general transfer balance cap (TBC) - has increased from \$1.9 to \$2 million from on whether you're paying from before-

If you exceed the cap, you'll need to transfer the excess back to your accumulation account or withdraw it as

Plus, you may pay tax on the earnings. If you've already started a retirement income stream, you'll have your own individual TBC limit, which may be less than the general TBC.

Your personal cap is based on the general cap at the time you started, and adjusted for how much you've used and any indexation you're entitled to."

For example, if you started a pension with \$2 million on July 1, 2025, you've used your entire cap.

The cap doesn't limit the amount you can hold in super.

If you have more than the cap available, the remainder can be left in your super fund's accumulation account.

You can check your balance cap in ATO online services, where all the debits and credits are recorded.

Special rules apply for defined benefit income streams.

More qualify for after-tax contributions

The change in the general TBC to \$2 million may also allow you to increase nonconcessional (after-tax) contributions can be carried forward to reduce the tax using the bring-forward rule.

While the \$120,000 annual limit on non-concessional contributions hasn't changed, eligibility for using the bringforward rule now applies to those with a total superannuation balance below the general TBC of up to \$2 million.

Awaiting the new \$3 million tax

"It is our busiest time of the year, as lots of people come through in SALA, and it is a great time for us to promote the town," she said.

Artwork on show will include glass, hanji paper art, cold wax and oil, watercolour, acrylic, cyanotype, eco-dye scarves, pottery, silicone work, upcycled work and more.

'Our members are repeat exhibitors and we have had the Artists of Strathalbyn as





Mount Barker artist's 'wobbly' new venture

Mount Barker artist Lloma Mackenzie's latest venture is a children's book - the linotype specialist's first foray into publishing.

One Wobbly Wood Pigeon follows Max, Bella and Violet when they go outside to play and watch the birds, listen to the farmers, smell the flowers, play with toys, walk in the forest, enjoy a picnic with their aunties, eat nuts, dance like ants, and paint some pictures.

It features hand-painted lino prints by

Having been a teacher of young children for many years, including both hearing and hearing impaired (students), I was always interested in children's books," Mackenzie said.

"After retiring from teaching and completing a Fine Arts degree, specialising in print making, I had been thinking of illustrating and writing my own children's book."

For the illustrations, Mackenzie - who spends her time between the Adelaide Hills and France – first drew the designs, transferred these to the lino blocks, and then cut the designs with special tools.

She then printed them in black ink, and when these were dry, she painted them in bright and bold colours.

"For me the illustrations came first," Mackenzie said.

"I had completed some small lino prints of a fox and some tractors, and decided to use these in a simple number book (One

"I wanted to use onomatopoeia in the text, so I researched subjects that appealed to the repetition of certain sounds which linked with the number sounds."

The research and lino blocks were completed in France, where she lived in a farm house with a large garden.

"I was inspired by what was around me," Mackenzie said.

"I had sheep, cattle, grain farms... and tractors, birds, and flowers.

"One day I really did see a wood pigeon land in my large hibiscus bush which was not robust enough for its weight, and it bounced and wobbled around - hence the title of the book."

The writing process was not difficult as the words flowed from the illustrations.

One Wobbly Wood Pigeon has a target audience of children aged three to six years old, along with teachers, parents and grandparents of young children.

It is published by Macclesfield-based publishing house Moonglow Publishing.

Helipad use 'up in the air'

A local politician has raised concerns about the progress of the new helipad at the Murray Bridge Soldiers' Memorial Hospital.

The helipad was one of 13 in regional South Australia to be upgraded as part of a \$23.4 million investment by the State Government.

While the helipad has been finished for weeks, Member for Hammond Adrian Pederick claims it has been unable to be used.

"My understanding is the Murray Bridge helipad is ready to go but there seems to be a dispute somewhere along the line, and (a wait) for the final safety checks and approvals in line with the new Civil Aviation safety regulations, but the government has had plenty of time to get that in place," he said.

"The works have been finished at Murray Bridge for many weeks now, and why isn't it operating? That is the question.

"I can tell you, from talking to some of the local health professionals, it does cause a real problem.

"Instead of using MedSTAR services, which are used continuously normally, it ties up ambulances that have to be sent to Adelaide."

He called on the government to 'get on with the job'.

"It is actually outrageous they are not utilising a helipad that has been finished," Mr Pederick said. "They do vital work these MedSTAR helicopters, and the paramedics and nurses that fly on them – we just need to get them back in the air.

"These helipads have been built to specifications and they need to be utilised for the good of the people of and travelling through regional areas."

Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network Chief Executive Officer Wayne Champion confirmed the works had finished.

However, he said the hospital is waiting for the contracted MedSTAR helicopter operator to sign off on its operations.

"Once operational, the upgraded helipad at Murray Bridge Soldiers' Memorial Hospital will allow patients to access medical care via air transport," he said.

"The upgraded helipad will only open once it is safe to do so."

A spare ambulance fleet has been stationed at Murray Bridge to reduce any impact to local operations, with SAAS MedSTAR responsible for the co-ordination of emergency medical retrievals.

Alternative arrangements are in place during the works, with aeromedical retrievals currently taking place at Pallamana Aerodrome.

In a statement, SA Health said it and the Attorney-General's Department were working with the helicopter operator to ensure appropriate safety of helicopter operations that comply with the regulations.

This must be resolved prior to helicopter operations returning to the upgraded helipad.

"There are obviously other cases where pain is something to live with unfortunately, but it's about finding ways for it to not control you and have control of your own life."

Ms Man plans to increase her hours as her load increases.


