Meadows facility ‘fully charged’ and ready to roll

A local renewable energy facility has been given the green light, despite some opposition.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, a development application was submitted by ACenergy for a renewable energy facility earlier this year comprising of a battery energy storage system for the storage of up to five megawatts with an associated carpark, electrical pole to connect the BESS facility to the existing power network, landscaping, fencing, detention basin, infrastructure and above ground 72,000 litre water tank based at 60 Greenhills Road.

It plans to operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week, in an aim to make the local energy system more efficient and resilient by storing excess energy during low demand periods.

During the public notification period, it only received four responses – all in opposition.

Concerns raised included potential

battery waste contamination, environmental damage, high capital costs, regulatory and market challenges, unsightliness, compliance with electricity laws, and impacts to livestock production.

But despite all feedback being opposed, the Mount Barker District Council assessment panel granted the development planning consent.

“The proposed land use is considered appropriate... due to its proximity to an existing electricity substation,” the panel’s report read.

“The proposal has carefully considered siting, giving regards to topography, stormwater, flooding, bushfire, land stability, interface impacts to adjacent sensitive revivers, scenic quality and amenity all of which have been adequately addressed and supported by corresponding technical reports.

“The scale of the built form of the development is akin to small to medium farm structures and generally considered appropriate given the locality and the siting of the proposal.”

As part of the consent conditions, the following must be met:

- The proponent must provide the total storage capacity of the new stormwater detention basin, the freeboard height, the minor storm outlet diameter, and major storm overflow spillway weir invert level to the Hills and Fleurieu Landscape Board.

- The proponent must demonstrate that all flows captured by the drainage swales and stormwater detention basin are returned to downstream watercourses within three days of flow interception and that the dimensions of the proposed detention basin outlet pipes and orifice plates are capable of returning all intercepted flows within three days.

- The proponent must confirm ongoing maintenance responsibility for the proposed stormwater detention basin, basin outlet pipes and orifice plates, and overflow spillway weir.

- Construction must not be undertaken a minimum of three days before and/or during a high rainfall event (20mm or greater) to reduce the risk of damage to the watercourse

bed and banks.

- A minimum distance of 20 metres must be maintained between a watercourse or well and the fuelling site for machinery used to undertake construction.

- The proposed works must be undertaken in a manner that prevents silt or sediment leaving the site, including, but not limited to, the use of erosion and sediment control measures such as catch/diversion drains, revegetation, hay bale barriers, filter fences, sediment traps and basins.

- The stormwater detention basin must be appropriately re-vegetated using locally indigenous species to minimise future erosion and sedimentation downstream.

Ample informal onsite parking will be made available during construction, and two onsite vehicle parking spaces will be provided post-construction to accommodate maintenance vehicles.

Construction is anticipated to last four weeks, with working hours limited to 7am to 6pm Monday to Friday, and 8am to 1pm on Saturdays.

Artists sought for Town Square project

Mount Barker District Council is seeking expressions of interest from artists to create a public artwork for Mount Barker’s new Town Square.

Up to \$150,000 has been allocated by council to commission a piece of public art marking an exciting step forward in its relationship with the arts.

Applicants will be short-listed, and three artists invited to develop and present their detailed proposal as part of a paid pitch process in recognition of their time and effort.

The chosen artwork will be integrated into the overall plan for the new Town Square which is being partly funded through a \$2 million contribution from the State Government to create a new community space for Mount Barker.

“As the fastest growing region in the

state, this is a remarkable opportunity for an artist to create a significant and meaningful public artwork that expresses Mount Barker’s burgeoning identity,” Council Arts Officer, Sally Hardy, said

“We’re looking for a concept that entwines the past, present and future, and honours what has been and what’s to come for Mount Barker.

“The artwork needs to be bold so it elevates the Town Square as a place of cultural excellence, becomes a source of civic pride, and gives tourists a reason to visit.”

Expressions of interest from artists close on Thursday, July 31.

Weather burst causes localised flooding

High tides and storm surge caused localised flooding in the Murray Estuary settlements last week.

A heavy downpour combined with wild winds early last week caused several coastal properties along with Strathalbyn’s basketball stadium to be inundated with water.

A cold front moved over South Australia, including its coastal waters, from late last Monday night through to early last Wednesday morning, which generated strong to gale-force winds that produced elevated surf and higher-than-normal sea levels.

The high tides and storm surge caused localised flooding in the Murray Estuary settlements.

Several private properties and council assets, including roads, were impacted along Mundoo Channel Drive, Goolwa

Channel Drive and Sugars Avenue.

Council assisted State Emergency Services in response to the localised flooding.

Additionally, council and the Coast Protection Board worked with the community last year to prepare a ‘Community Coastal Flood Emergency Plan for the Goolwa and Mundoo Channel Communities’, which was provided to community members within the Murray Estuary area.

It also impacted Strathalbyn, with the basketball association having to abandon games due to multiple roof leaks, which caused the court to be too wet and unsafe to play on last Tuesday night.

According to SA Police crime statistics, graffiti incidents have risen from 1343 the last rolling year to 1433 this current year. Clean-up works using a combination of pressure washing and repainting have already been completed and carried out by council staff.

"While disappointing, incidents of this nature are not uncommon and are dealt with in line with council's standard procedures," Chief Executive Officer, Andrew MacDonald, said. "Council encourages all residents to report graffiti as soon as possible to assist with timely removal. "Acts of graffiti are illegal, and cause unnecessary damage to both public and private property. "Council urges those responsible or considering such actions to think about the impact this has on the community and the resources required to clean it up." Council is working with relevant authorities in relation to this matter. The cost of graffiti removal is managed within council's existing operational budgets.

Principal recognised with second leadership award

Eastern Fleurieu R-12 School Principal Ian Kent received a second prestigious leadership award nearly a year on from his first in recognition of his dedication to supporting students with complex needs and mentoring emerging leaders. Mr Kent was presented with the Australian Council for Education Leaders (ACEL) SA Educational Leadership Award on June 17 during a ceremony held at the Adelaide Zoo Function Centre. The award recognises outstanding leadership and significant contributions to a school, sector or the broader education system, and Mr Kent was one of four to receive it this year. It comes off the back of the Commonwealth Bank Teaching Award he received last year. "It's really good recognition," Mr Kent said. "Last holidays, I was in my caravan chilling out – (which is when) I usually spend time clearing out my inbox – and I nearly deleted the email from ACEL. "I thought it was probably an invitation to a conference or something. "Luckily, I opened it, and it said, 'Congratulations, you've won a leadership award'" Mr Kent was humbled by the recognition, particularly knowing the calibre of past recipients. "There are some really prestigious educators who've received this award, so I feel a bit humbled to be among them – I don't feel like I should be in that standing," he said. The news arrived just prior to Mr Kent's study tour in Singapore as part of his prize from the Commonwealth Bank Schools Plus Teaching Award. He spent seven "jam-packed" days learning from international education systems and building global connections. "One of the highlights was meeting the Principal of the autism specialist school, where they have 2300 students," Mr Kent said. "What they do is incredible – consistent, predictable routines that benefit not just autistic students, but all students. "There's a lot we could adopt here." With more than seven years leading EFS

and three decades in public education in South Australia, Mr Kent received the award for championing initiatives that address the complex needs of EFS' student population – many of whom face trauma, learning difficulties and socio-economic challenges – as well as for his mentorship of 25 aspiring leaders within the school, and embedding a culture of continuous improvement and shared responsibility. His work has drawn attention beyond Australia and led to 38 senior educators from Jakarta recently visiting the school's Strathalbyn campuses for half a day to observe its approach to deep learning and curriculum delivery. "When visitors come to our school, they witness leaders, teachers, student support officers, and students all speaking the same language," Mr Kent said. "It shows it's not just leadership rhetoric, it's embedded in our practice." A stand-out moment from the visit for Mr Kent was a student-led presentation to the Indonesian delegation, showcasing student agency and data-informed learning strategies. "Our student leaders had surveyed their peers, gathered feedback, and presented it to staff to drive improvements in learning," he said. "I later received an email from one of the visit co-ordinators who said the delegates are still talking about how good the teaching and learning was here, especially the relationship between teachers and students. "That tells me we're doing an excellent job."

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Strathalbyn makes Ag Town of the Year award shortlist

Strathalbyn has been named in the top 10 towns in the running to be crowned South Australian Agricultural Town of the Year.

From 96 nominated towns, 10 South Australian communities that showcase farming innovation, community resilience, sustainability and contributions to both the local and state-wide agricultural sectors have been chosen.

The top 10 towns will provide a written submission to an independent judging panel, which will assess their contribution to agriculture, community strength, and regional leadership.

From this group, three finalists will be selected for town visits before the ultimate winner is crowned later in the year.

The towns are judged on:

- Agricultural innovation: adoption of new technologies, climate-smart farming, and productivity gains.
- Economic impact: strengthening local economies, job creation, and added value industries.
- Community engagement: participation in local ag events, volunteerism, and youth development.
- Sustainability: environmental stewardship, water and land management, and biosecurity initiatives.
- Agricultural education and leadership: school and community education, and leadership programs.

“As the Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, I am privileged to be able to travel across our state to see our regional towns and communities that contribute so much to our state,” Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development, Clare Scriven, said.

“Despite the current drought impacting

many regional towns, it is inspiring to see these communities stepping up and embracing innovation in primary industries, while fostering meaningful connections within their communities.

“This year’s top 10 nominees reflect the breadth of agricultural excellence across South Australia – from pioneering farmers to forward-thinking local councils and agricultural champions.

“This award isn’t just about production, it’s about people.

“We’re celebrating the communities that are truly living the values of partnership, resilience and innovation and showing why South Australia is a global leader in primary industries.”

The Ag Town of the Year prize includes a sign for the town entrance, recognising its achievements, along with a community celebration event, a trophy, and extensive media exposure showcasing the town’s contribution to the state.

Alexandrina Council is calling on riders who use the dirt jumps tracks at Mount Compass and Goolwa to provide their feedback on upcoming maintenance works to the popular recreation facilities.

The maintenance work is scheduled to start in July, with council staff and their contracted trail builder Next Level Mountain Bike holding two drop-in information sessions at the tracks during the school holidays on Monday.

“The dirt jumps tracks at the Goolwa Recreation Park and Mount Compass Recreation Park are extremely popular with our young people, but weather, time and constant use means the time has come for some maintenance and minor revisions to improve the tracks and make them safer,” Alexandrina Mayor, Keith Parkes, said.

“We allocated \$70,000 in our current budget for these works.

“We’ve had a professional trail builder do an assessment and come up with proposals for maintenance.

“The contractor has suggested a range of minor improvements at each site that focus on enhancing the rider experience,

creating a sustainable and maintainable jumps line, reducing rider risk and improving safety.”

Riders are encouraged to attend the information drop-in sessions to view council’s proposed concept designs and make some suggestions.

One session will be held at the Goolwa Recreation Park on Glendale Grove from 10am to 12pm, while the other will be held at the Mount Compass Recreation Park on Ekers Court from 1.30pm to 3.30pm.

Online survey closes at 3pm on July 11. “If you cannot make the sessions, head to our MySay website to see the concept designs and submit suggestions,” Mayor Parkes said.

“Please keep in mind that council must remain in budget, and we need to consider acceptable risk standards, the need to provide an inclusive rider experience and that the track is sustainably constructed.

“Depending on the weather, we expect the works to start in Goolwa during July, which is expected to take around three weeks to complete, and then moving to Mount Compass and taking about seven weeks to complete.”

Hay delivery made to drought-impacted farmers

Tears of relief were shed by farmers when donated hay was delivered to their properties last week after suffering through the worst drought in history.

A crowd cheered on the truck which carted 40 tonnes of hay to four farms at McHarg Creek – near Ashbourne – and one near Mount Barker, while the farmers hugged knowing some hope had been offered and the truck driver honked in excitement.

Farmer Vicki Gatehouse described the initiative – led by Rotary and Farmers Relief Agency and supported by the State Government – as “overwhelming” and felt “very lucky” to be involved in a supportive community.

“It’s a huge, huge difference – mentally, it’s such a relief... this will get us through to spring,” she said.

“The work that must have gone into it to get this to us – it’s just incredible.

“I can’t thank Rotary and everyone who’s involved enough.”

The McHarg Creek farmer has destocked her herd by about half over the drought, but has found some relief that buying water is no longer necessary.

Her neighbour Alison Boyce found this drought to be the toughest in her 30 years on the land, spending up to \$1500 a fortnight on hay, and she has destocked most of their beef cattle.

“We’re just fattening them up and selling them at the moment because we don’t have a choice – it’s costing us so much money,” she said.

“We normally get 40 to 60 rounds (of hay) that we cut off at our place – last year we got nine.

“(This delivery is) going to make a huge difference to us.”

The effort was thanks to 84 Rotary clubs in South Australia which joined forces with Farmers Relief Agency to save livestock during the worst drought the state has seen.

More than \$550,000 has been raised so far from Rotary, community members and businesses to purchase feed from Victoria and Western Australia.

So far, more than 140 farms have received assistance, with more than 500 still asking for help.

Rotary aims to raise a further \$1 million

to stop mass livestock casualties over the next couple of months, particularly across mid-North and Eyre Peninsula regions.

Farmers Relief Agency source the fodder and co-ordinate the complex logistics of delivering to farms from the Eyre Peninsula, to the Mid North, Adelaide Hills, Murray Mallee and down to the South East.

Some of the supporting clubs included Strathalbyn and Mount Barker, with the former contributing funds raised from various events such as The Great Duck Race.

“Things are green down here, but it’s a green drought – there’s still no feed, it’s still a concern,” President, John Agnew, said.

“There are a number of (members who are) farmers or have pretty strong links to the land.

“It’s pretty hard to live in the country and not have a connection to a farmer.”

Meanwhile, the Mount Barker club’s major annual fundraiser is selling doughnuts at the Royal Adelaide Show, which takes a combined 650 volunteer hours.

President Andrew Scott described Rotary’s aim as making a positive impact on the world, both on an international and local level.

“It’s great to be able to contribute to people who really need it,” he said.

“It’s amazing to be here and to see all the support here and the gratitude of the farmers... it’s nice to think that our money is going to something worthwhile.”

Farmers Relief Agency Director Michael O’Keeffe – responsible for hay sourcing and delivery logistics – described the partnership with Rotary as a “breath of fresh air.”

“The tears of joy we witness as a truck pulls through a farming family’s gate is very moving,” he said.

“We literally know we’re not only saving animals’ lives, but the lives of stressed famers as well.”

The State Government’s \$6 million Donated Transport Drought Assistance Scheme – which helps various charities with their transport costs to deliver fodder to farmers – has supported the transport costs of more than 1500 tonnes of livestock feed.

This included about 1350 tonnes of first-grade hay and a further 200 tonnes of nutrient-rich, sheep and lamb pellets.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development Clare Scriven found it “really moving” to see that the collaborative effort offered relief for many farmers.

“This is people coming together – it’s not just the hay,” she said.

“It’s that feeling of being valued and seeing that people actually do care.”

While the region has received heavy rains in recent weeks, Ms Scriven reminded community members that it provided “a bit of hope” but the impact of the drought will likely be felt for 12 months to two years.

There’s something so fascinating about a serial liar and how that plays out in a romantic relationship, like a car crash you can’t look away from.

It also checked off some other boxes: It stars Asher Keddie – Australia’s sweetheart for playing Nina in *Offspring* – tick.

Fake is an Australian story, which is always good viewing to see local culture and society on the big screen, while supporting a homegrown production – tick.

And being based on a real-life story makes it that much more intriguing – tick.

It’s also refreshing to see mature-aged actors navigating the messy world of new love and being represented on TV, with Keddie being 49 years old, and her co-star David Wenham being 58 years old.

At times, it’s difficult viewing and heartbreaking to see Birdie question her gut instincts and her torment at desperately wanting to find love, but knowing something isn’t right.

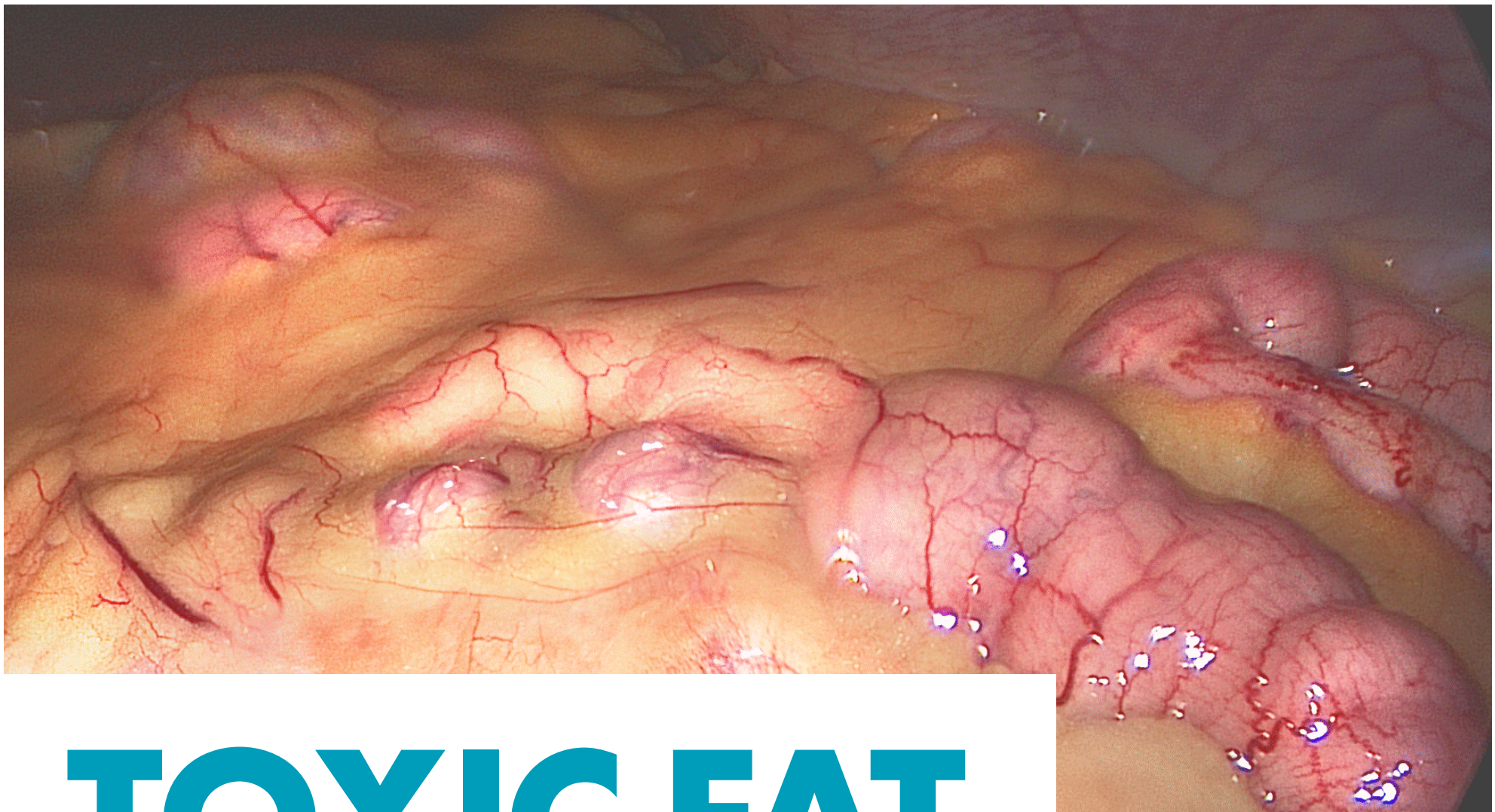
While being based on a true story is more intriguing, it could have been more engaging by dramatising some parts of the narrative.

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Blaze destroys Goolwa shed

A blaze destroyed a shed and its contents at Goolwa on Monday. Just before 11am, 15 Country Fire Service firefighters with three trucks worked alongside the Metropolitan Fire Service, SA Police, SA Ambulance Service, and SA Power Networks in a co-ordinated effort to extinguish a fire in a 12 by 17-metre Dance Street shed. Crews remained on scene for some time as they worked to gain access to the shed. They used thermal imaging cameras to check for hot spots and extinguish any smouldering areas. Unfortunately, the shed was destroyed and the contents, including two cars, a caravan, a boat, and a horse float, were lost. Damage has been estimated at \$800,000, and fire investigators were called to the scene.

Police investigate Tooperang crash

Police are investigating an incident that occurred at Tooperang last Wednesday. Just before 10am on June 26, police responded to reports of a car crash on Deep Creek Road, but were unable to locate the collision. However, the phone of the man involved alerted police he had been in a crash, and when they attended the registered owner's home address, they located a Toyota 4WD with significant accident damage along with its registered owner – a 61-year-old Mosquito Hill man. The owner was conveyed to hospital by SA Ambulance for treatment of non-life-threatening injuries and for a sample of his bloods. Investigations into the collision are ongoing.

Further restrictions imposed on weapons


South Australia has imposed further restrictions on machetes and swords. As of Monday, children under 18 are unable to buy dangerous knives under any circumstances, while machetes and swords are now classified as prohibited weapons. This means it is an offence to manufacture, sell, distribute, supply, or otherwise deal in, or use or have possession of, a machete or sword, carrying a maximum penalty of \$20,000 or two years imprisonment. The reforms are part of phase two of knife crime law reforms, ensuring the state has the toughest knife laws in the country. "We have acted swiftly and decisively in response to incidents interstate to prepare the strongest laws in the country to protect our community from the menace of knife crime," Attorney-General, Kyam Maher, said.

"By reclassifying machetes and swords as prohibited weapons, and preventing minors from buying knives, we are delivering common sense reforms that will better protect the community." The laws also expand existing offences around the possession of knives and offensive weapons at schools and public places to cover more education facilities such as childcare centres, preschools, universities and TAFE SA campuses, and places of worship. People should check whether their possession of swords or machetes will remain lawful and, if not, surrender to a local police station – except for Hindley or Grenfell Street – during the three-month surrender period. Places where police can conduct metal detector searches include public transport

hubs and shopping centre precincts. "We will build on the extra search powers already granted to police and welcome the additional changes, which see swords and machetes prescribed as prohibited weapons," Assistant Commissioner and Operations Support Service, Narelle Kameniar, said. "People in possession of these now prohibited weapons without a legislated exemption should surrender them to their nearest police station. "These changes provide police with extra tools to prevent crime, take weapons off our streets, and to keep the community safe." Fire rips through Monarto home

A blaze destroyed a house at Monarto on Sunday. Shortly after 5pm, 25 Country Fire Service firefighters in six trucks responded to a house fire on Frahns Farm Road alongside Metropolitan Fire Service, SA Police, SA Power Networks, and SA Ambulance Service. Volunteer firefighters wearing breathing apparatus used positive-pressure fans to ventilate the structure, and remained on site for some time to ensure all hot spots were fully extinguished. Thanks to the crews' quick and skilled response, two caravans next to the home were saved from the fire. Fortunately, no one was home at the time, and the occupants' animals are safe. The estimated damage is \$300,000 and the house has been destroyed. Fire investigators were called to the scene. 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E-scooters hit the road

E-scooters and other personal mobility devices will be permitted to drive on public roads and paths in SA from next month. From Sunday, July 13, people aged 16 and older will be permitted to ride devices like e-scooters, e-skateboards and e-solo wheels on public roads, shared paths and footpaths. Anyone riding the devices in public will need to comply with safety regulations, including: ● A speed limit of 25km/h on roads and 10km/h on footpaths. ● Wearing a helmet at all times. ● Flashing lights at night and in low light. ● A minimum age of 16. ● Only e-scooters will be permitted on roads with a speed limit of up to 60km/h, but other devices like e-skateboards will only be permitted on roads with a speed limit of 50km/h or less. RAA believed e-scooters were a great low-emissions first and last-mile solution that can help South Australians complete short trips without the need for a personal car, however, felt the introduction of these devices must be managed carefully. It also believed a strong education campaign was critical to raise awareness of the regulations and prioritise safety. "E-scooters give road users another option to get around and will help to reduce the pressure on our road network," RAA Senior Manager of Road Safety, Charles Mountain, said.

"Recent RAA research suggests around 70 per cent of our members are in favour of these devices being legalised for use on public roads, so we welcome this announcement. "The new safety regulations and their enforcement, in particular speed limits, will be critical to ensure the safety of riders and other road users isn't compromised. "Their introduction also needs to come with a strong education campaign to raise awareness and prioritise safety for all road and footpath users. "As the state's peak motoring body, RAA will closely monitor the introduction of these devices on SA roads, and will continue to engage with the State Government to ensure they are being managed appropriately."

“The Fortuna students are on a similar journey – they are experimenting with new skillsets as they venture into new territory personally and creatively, and they are forming new friendships through the shared experience of collaborating on this

show,” he said.

A group of 19 cast members, from 8 to 18 years old, have been rehearsing twice a week since October for the upcoming season.

While the leads are cast, the junior production is written so all cast members have at least one line to perform.

The show has favourite hits from the original including *I Like to Move It* with backing musical tracks and the performers singing live.

Students will wear animal onesie costumes while props have also been built to set the stage.

Director Thomas James was impressed with the “really good talent” in the performers, seeing a huge improvement from the beginning of rehearsals to now.

“It’s all coming together,” he told *The Southern Argus* last week.

“Because it’s a junior show, it’s really well written that there’s enough parts that everyone has a go.

“It’s an hour of entertainment – an hour of fun, energy and excitement, and there are also some sad moments.”

Fortuna runs classes across Port Elliot, Yankalilla, Mount Compass and Middleton, and ran a successful season of *The SpongeBob Musical* last year.

Mr James admitted to being excited and nervous for the upcoming season, which is the last weekend of school holidays at Goolwa Centenary Hall, which has tiered-seating, on July 17 and 20, 2pm, and July 18 and 19 7pm.

Community initiative turns into small business

The idea for Strathalbyn’s newest business Hills Meals started years ago, when a local cook Nicola Boss philanthropically donated home-cooked meals to vulnerable community members, particularly the elderly or people living alone.

With a career that spans more than 30 years working in commercial kitchens, she was passionate about giving community members access to delicious and high-quality food.

“I loved seeing the joy it brought them and the connections made through the food,” she said.

“As the demand for the meals increased, it became evident that there was a huge gap in the local marketplace for the service.”

However, without grants or funding, and the rising cost of food, she needed a different operational model to meet the demand.

That is where the idea for Hills Meals was born – a business offering popular, inexpensive ready-to-eat meals.

Initially meals were sold online, but popularity grew so significantly over the first year that she opened a shopfront on Dawson Street in May.

“The support for our business from the community has been incredible,” Ms Boss said.

“We’d like to personally thank everyone who has tried our meals or spread a good word – it really means so much to us.”

Weekly delivery is offered through the Strathalbyn and Mount Barker region, thanks to the support from husband and “delivery boy” Andrew, while the rest of her family supports other areas of the business.

Ms Boss has designed a menu of fresh and frozen soups, main meals and desserts, meeting different dietary requirements, with the majority being gluten-free, and other options including plant-based, dairy-free, and low-carb.

Hills Meals offers something for everyone, from small lunch sizes during a work break, larger single meals for those living alone, right through to family-sized meals, that are all affordable and made with quality ingredients.

“We source the majority of our food from our local area and, where possible, from other small businesses so we can support them as well,” Ms Boss said.

“Because a lot of our customers are older or on their own, we created a menu that includes dishes people wouldn’t ordinarily cook just for one.

“So, things like roast dinners, cottage pie or corned beef – that’s one of our best sellers.”

Delivery is offered every Friday to the Mount Barker and Strathalbyn area – with hopes to expand that region in the future – and customers can order in-store, by phone, or through the easy-to-use website.

Hills Meals also works with NDIS and home care package recipients.

AusPost delivery centre posed for Murray Bridge

An Australia Post delivery centre proposed for Murray Bridge will create local employment. Future Urban, on behalf of Emmett Property, recently launched a development application to construct a warehouse with an ancillary processing facility, along with associated car parking, detention basins, fencing, retaining walls, signage and landscaping at 2 Brinkley road, which would house Australia Post. The processing facility would be serviced by up to 10 staff members who arrive by private vehicle and undertake delivery rounds on

bicycles/motorcycles that are stored on site. The proposed development will operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Freight drop-off will occur sometime between midnight and 6am, while delivery van and bikes will leave the site between 7am and 8.30pm, and private waste collection will occur between 9am to 7pm on a Sunday or public holiday and 7am to 7pm on any other day. Family’s fundraising taken up a gear

A Milang family will soon be turning off the ignition after completing their third Shitbox Rally, with an accumulative fundraising total that exceeds \$65,5000 for the Cancer Council.

Vanessa and Wes Oliver and their 23-year-old daughter Madi have been rotating turns in the two-person team of Stickers for the cross-country adventures.

Shitbox Rally is a fundraising event for cancer research where participants drive long distances across Australia in ‘shitbox’ cars worth under \$1500.

This year, the fleet of 230 cars journeyed almost halfway around Australia from Perth to Darwin, with Vanessa and Madi in Stickers, and Wes joining Mount Barker friend Neil Pfeiffer in Be Rude Not To.

The women raised an incredible \$35,000 for Cancer Council and were among the top

10 fundraisers of the event, recognised with a special sticker to honour their efforts, while the men raised \$14,000 and all the teams collectively raised \$2.63 million.

“The rally was amazing – all the pitstops, the catering, all the service we received, it was all really awesome,” Vanessa said.

“We had a ball... We again made more friends that we will stay in contact with.”

The name Stickers is for two reasons – as a nod to Lightning McQueen’s nickname in Cars, and also a friend’s nickname who gave them their first car.

Wes described the red Falcon as “indestructible”, after completing its third rally – raking up about 11,000km from the latest journey and 260,000km in total – with no big issues.

Meanwhile, Be Rude Not To also impressively drove well, which was a donated abandoned car that was resurrected for the trip.

During their adventure, they navigated across two decent water crossings as well as the Pentecost River, which had a nearby crocodile.

When crossing the river, Stickers got caught on a couple of rocks, and someone



got into the water and hooked a strap onto the car to pull it out, where a crocodile was spotted about 700m away earlier that day.

The Gibb Road through Western Australia was “pretty awesome”, driven largely by Madi, with many of those kms completed at night with low visibility, corrugated road and dust everywhere.

Stickers also went airborne over a sandy creek bed and lost a couple of pieces of plastic off the car.

The event was also packed with social activities, dress up days, and new friendships were made.

The Olivers – a family of five, with Madi being the middle child – are hooked on Shitbox Rally and plan to participate again in the future.

With the “massive amount of support” to fundraise \$49,000 across both of their teams, they were incredibly grateful to the generosity of supporting businesses and individuals, crediting it to the kindness of the community.

“We want to thank all of our sponsors and supporters,” Wes said.

“It’s a tough economic climate and people are doing it tough, but they still dig deep to support this cause.”

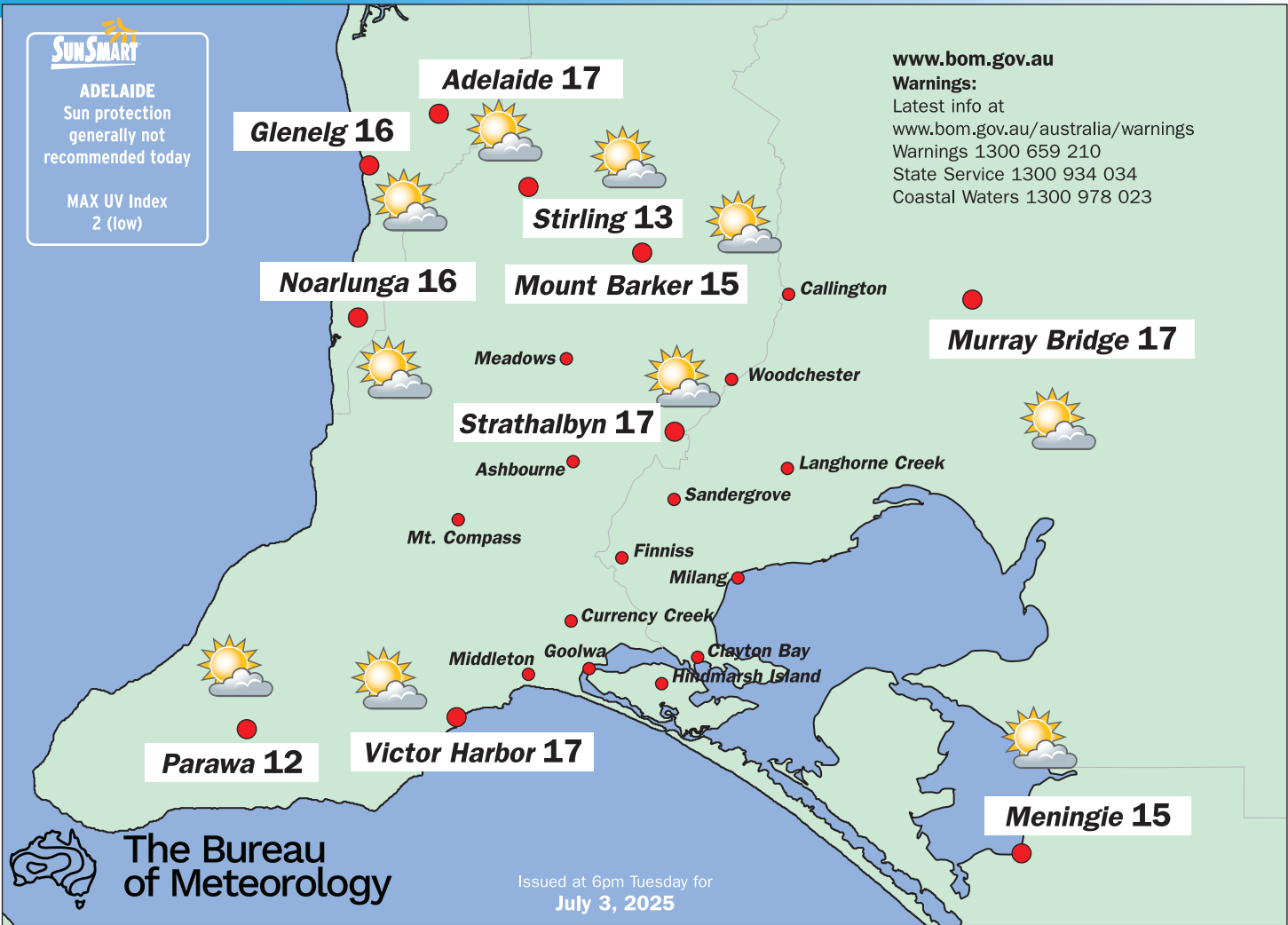
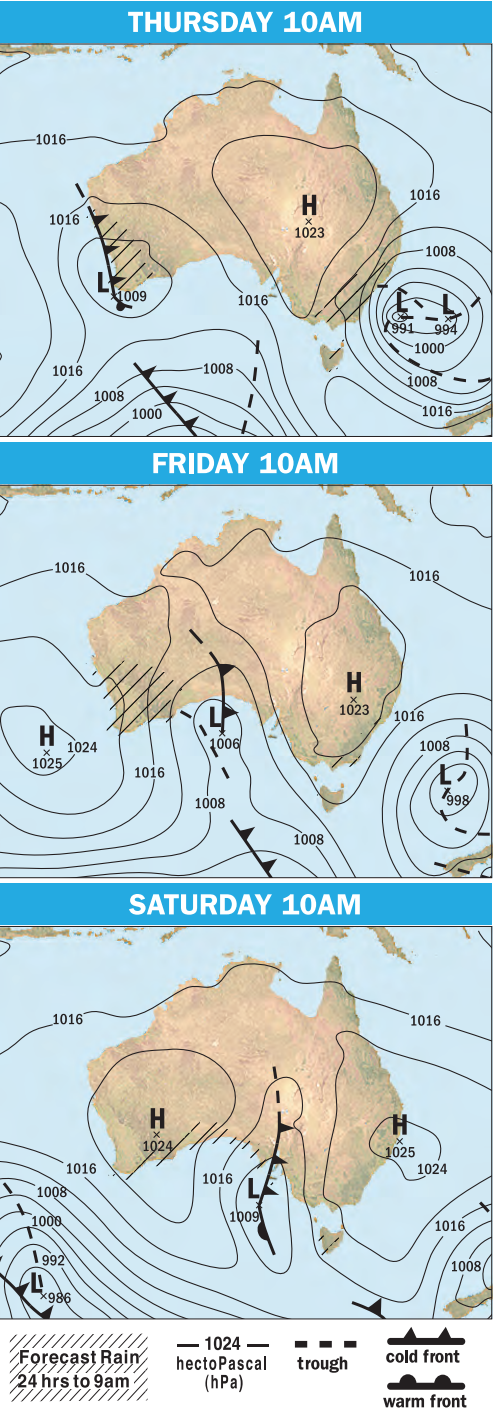

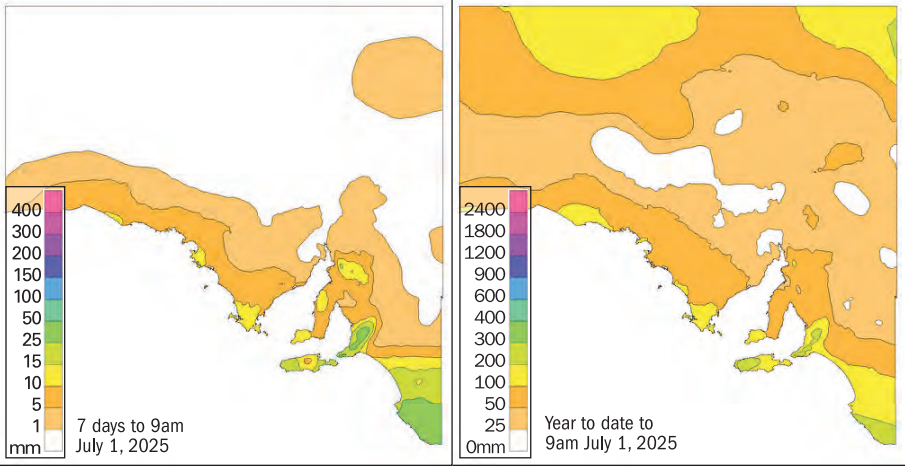
