A billion for regional SA, but local MPs say it's not enough...

A multi-million-dollar law and order package dominates the Labor Government's fourth State Budget, with major funding also allocated to drought-stricken farmers, for regional areas.

The 2025-26 State Budget is forecasted to deliver a \$179 million surplus, which would make it the fourth consecutive one under Labor after it was projected that by the end of the financial year in June, the current budget would record an \$18 million surplus.

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

Nomad Farms in the 'clucking' for award

Finniss enterprise Nomad Farms has been named a national finalist in this year's delicious Harvey Norman Produce Awards for its meat bird enterprise.

The awards are now in their 20th year and have been at the forefront of recognising the unsung heroes behind the nation's top chefs and restauranteurs – Australia's finest fishers, farmers, growers and makers.

This year's awards continue to shine a light on primary producers, and the sustainable and innovative ways they grow, make, harvest and catch the produce they supply to leading chefs and dining establishments.

Producers are nominated by Australia's leading chefs and food industry professionals, and winners will be announced later in the year.

Husband and wife team Tom Bradman and Verity Slee were proud to have made the national list.

"Ours are not your average chicken in the sense of how we produce them," Mr Bradman said.

"I hadn't eaten chicken for quite a long time before I started producing them, and I think there are probably other people like me.

"It was pretty hard to find something that I was happy to eat and support how they were being produced."

The duo produce about 500 meat birds a week, meaning they would have between 4000 and 5000 chickens on the property.

"It is quite small numbers for a meat bird operation, but is probably on the larger side of things for a pasture-raised meat bird operation," Mr Bradman said.

'They live on pasture 24/7 in small, movable shelters and they are moved every day onto a fresh patch of pasture, so we can improve the pasture and the landscape and also keep them healthy without the need of lots of chemicals and medicati)ons.

"It seems to produce a pretty good product." This is not the first time the farm has done

well at the awards.

"We have been lucky enough to win the state award several times, and we won the national award once several years ago for our chicken," Mr Bradman said.

"Basically (the farm's ethos) is to support human, animal and environmental health and regeneration, so everything we do, we try to have a positive impact ecologically, economically, and socially, and that is the underlying regenerative principles that drive our decision-making and operation.

We sell to restaurants, butchers, supermarkets and directly to the public, so all of our stuff is branded with the Nomad Farms brand and sold directly.

"I think the most effective marketing, if you want to call it that, is probably word of mouth.

"That is how we have grown our business really, but something like the delicious award, I am sure it helps."

Nomad Farms also runs a grass-fed beef enterprise, some sheep meat, organic garlic, and wool in the form of botanically dyed yarn.



Jason reaches his Tipping Point

Fans of Channel 9's TV game show *Tipping Point* might notice a local face on an episode on July 16 when Jason Ridge makes an appearance in his sixth foray into television programs.

Mr Ridge, formerly of Strathalbyn and now a Mount Barker resident, has competed in three game shows on Channel 7, one on Channel 10, and now two on Channel 9.

Hosted by Todd Woodbridge, *Tipping Point* sees three contestants answer general knowledge questions to win counters that can be used on a large jackpot machine.

Mr Ridge said it was pure luck that he had even applied.

"Just by chance I was scrolling through rubbish online and an application popped up," he said.

up," he said. "So, I filled that out, pressed send, and then really just forgot about it.

"Then low and behold I got an email through saying I have been shortlisted, with the next process (being) a massive zoom meeting, where you are presented to about 100 people at a time over the course of a week, and then they break you into small groups and you have to tell your story.

"Then you basically get told to wait and see, so it was another process of just sitting there and waiting, but from doing the zoom interview to getting a phone call back from them, it took about three weeks and then they are saying 'when can you come over?"."

In October last year Mr Ridge and a mate flew to Melbourne, all expenses paid, for the recording session.

Mr Ridge was made to feel at ease in the wardrobe and makeup area before walking on stage for question time that Woodbridge also made "very natural".

He is still unsure how he made the cut for the show.

"I had a raft of funny stories about golf and about life," Mr Ridge said.

"It is anything that you could bring up that would be entertaining to the masses, as they have to try and create a buzz that would last for an hour so that you get people sitting at home in their front room basically screaming and cheering for you.

"They want to know what your aspirations are, and if you win the money what do you want to do.

"They found it quite funny that my house is full of females – female dogs, female cat, wife and two daughters – that came up as a bit of a chuckle."

Mr Ridge said the filming of the show – the very end result of which he is unable to reveal – took about 2.5. hours.

"We can keep the last bit a secret, but the first round is three questions each, so a total of nine questions, and it is fastest finger first," he said.

"It is pure luck as, as they say in all of these things, it is very easy if you know the answers.

"Then you are picking one of four columns of where to drop the token, but you just have to hope that it lands properly, pushes enough over, and at the end of each round you are the person with the most money.

"There is a bit of tactics because you can choose for someone else to play or you can take the option to play, and every time I watched the show, if you ever give up your chance to play you generally lose, so there was no way I was going to give up my opportunity."

Things didn't progress well in the beginning. "We got through round one and I was dead last... even though I had answered two questions right when I dropped the tokens, I just didn't get anything to fall over the edge," Mr Ridge said.

Going into the second round he copped a bit of humour, but it was his two female competitors' turn to have a run of bad luck.

"That left me thinking, I have an opportunity here; I only have to get a couple of questions right, knock down three tokens and I am through," Mr Ridge said.

"I had an absolute *Rain Man* moment, where of the 30 seconds, as fast as Todd read them, I got five questions, so I had five tokens to drop, which took me straight to the lead with \$1000 in the bank."

In the next round he again got his questions right, while the other competitor failed a trick question.

"It was 'After Prince William, who is the next successor to the English throne?", he said.

"I couldn't remember his name, but it is Prince William's son, but she jumped in quickly and said 'Prince Harry' and as soon as she said that you can see the smile on my face because I knew she had got it wrong."

Mr Ridge now had about \$1700 in the bank and also a \$3000 lawnmower he had won along the way – already making the trip profitable.

"That saw me go through to the final round and dropping the big gold token, but I guess you will have to wait until July 16 to see what happens then," he said.

As aforementioned, Mr Ridge was no stranger to game shows, having competed on Who Wants to be a Millionaire? with Eddie Maguire, where a late change to a question cost him \$20,000, Deal or No Deal with Andrew O'Keefe, where he won \$40,000 by taking the deal but missing the case with \$200,000 in it, The Price is Right with Larry Emdur, where he won two mobile phones but took home \$1100 worth of gift cards, Holey Moley during COVID, where he got through to the final of his episode, and the Australian version of The One Per Cent Club which didn't go well when he couldn't read the questions because of poor eyesight.

"The only one that I have never got on but applied for is *The Chase*," Mr Ridge said.

"I did *Deal or No Deal* around 2011-2012, so as much as I have been on six shows, it has taken 12 years to do them; it is not as if it has all happened in five minutes."

He remains perplexed by what it is about his personality and life story that the other game show producers find so attractive.

Mr Ridge is keen to keep applying for game shows.

Mount Barker District Councillor Narelle Hardingham is now the second Elected Member to resign from the role during the term, as well as a third who almost followed the same path.

This follows Deputy Mayor Samantha Jones publicly announcing her resignation during last month's meeting before reassessing her options to "minimise the impact to ratepayers".

Sally Harding resigned from the role in the Central Ward late last year and the supplementary election to replace her cost about \$55,000.

Janette Size was elected for the position.

Councillor Hardingham was first elected to represent the North Ward in November 2018.

In November 2022, she was elected as a Councillor in the South Ward.

Mayor David Leach acknowledged the dedication and service of the outgoing Councillor, who served as a member of the Community Grants Assessment Committee, Council representative on the Audit and Risk Committee, a member of the CEO Performance Review Committee, and held the role of Deputy Mayor for one year.

A casual vacancy now exists in the South Ward and a supplementary election is required in accordance with the Local Government Act.

Councillor Narelle Hardingham failed to provide a comment by deadline.

Ms Bellamy admitted that the news was yet to sink in.


"I'm just so grateful and thankful for this honour," she said.

"I feel so proud that the ambulance service recognises little old me, which is lovely.

"It's inspirational for me to keep going with my volunteering and I hope it inspires others as well."

Beginning with SAAS in 2011, Ms Bellamy is now the volunteer team leader for Meadows

Ms Bellamy joined the SAAS Volunteer Health Advisory Committee in 2019 and in 2023, she was appointed as its presiding member.

She also became a member of the local zone ambulance co-ordinating committee in 2021.

The award recognises her being a key contributor to any team, exuding a passion for patient advocacy, and her natural pathway into leadership.

The recognition also acknowledges her significant contribution towards the health and wellbeing of local communities, and through leadership and as a spokesperson, making an impact on the skills, training and confidence required by volunteers.

Ms Bellamy has also improved the flow of communication between volunteers, the SAAS Executive Leadership Team and the State Government.

She has also worked on a volunteer training resource project, to ensure allocated funding resources were directed towards training uptake.

Entrenched in the community, Ms Bellamy has lifted the volunteer profile of the station through her involvement in local events and training alongside other emergency services.

The Mount Barker resident has found the role has connected her to the region.

"It's embedded me more into the community more than I've ever imagined," she said.

"(The rewarding aspect is) helping someone who is in need and knowing that you made a difference... and the gratitude that you see."

Such as a six-year-old boy who she helped transport to Mount Barker Hospital after hitting his head and needing stitches.

Later on when she was in Mount Barker, she turned around to see the same little boy behind her.

"He'd seen me and said to his dad, 'there's the ambulance lady', so he ducked in and said hello," she said.

"He said he didn't cry – he was very brave. "I thought 'wow, this is why I do it."

Now retired and with an empty nest, Ms Bellamy encourages others into the field, especially those during a similar life stage.

"I hope (the award) inspires others to consider volunteering for SA Ambulance if they really want to," she said.

"Especially the mature-aged ones, the ones almost ready to retire and want something challenging to keep themselves in the community."

The Meadows station has about 40 volunteers, who often deal with farming accidents, animal strikes, older people who have fallen, and car accidents which can be "quite significant" with high speeds on country roads.

"You don't know what you're going to get on that day – you might get nothing or you might get busy," she explained.

"You've got to look after each other – this is not an ordinary job.

"This is delivering a service on behalf of the ambulance service.

"You look the same when you walk into someone's door as a paramedic."

Ms Bellamy encourages anyone interested to apply for the rewarding role, with the station typically recruiting once a year.

Lifetime amb

This year Murray Bridge resident David Heard clocked up 80 years of involvement with St John Ambulance, and fittingly has been bestowed a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM).

Mr Heard's involvement has seen him rise from a 12-year-old cadet to being anointed Knight of Grace in 1993, along with being awarded the Order of St John medal in 1958 and 10 bars since.

Along with being an active volunteer (stepping down from active service in 2000) who has trained hundreds of others, he continued with a lengthy association with the St John Ambulance Historical Society, taking on the Treasurer's role in 2005 and keeping it to this day.

Mr Heard was "honoured and surprised" that people thought he was good enough to be nominated for the OAM.

At 92 he has many memories of his volunteering, which began in 1944.

"In those days Boy Scouts was the big thing, (but) a chap by the name of Howard Hollands – who everybody called Dutchie - started up a St John Ambulance cadet division at Colonel Light Gardens," Mr Heard recalled.

My older brother went through the courses and came home with this fabulous cadet uniform - which was a grey flannelette double-breasted shirt with buttons, and black pants with a stripe down the side - and I thought 'that's for me'.

While he was proud of all his achievements, the time he spent training others from multiple brigades over the years stood out.

"When I moved from Adelaide to Murray Bridge in 1954 I was just a basic private in the organisation, and a couple of years afterwards, the Superintendent was down here and we were having an inspection with a district officer from Adelaide and he said 'where is your new divisional officer?", Mr Heard said.

"The Superintendent said 'here he is', so I became the 2IC of the division, and when he retired, I got shoved into the position of Superintendent of the division."

Not long after came a long association with training others.

"Mannum wanted an ambulance so I went across and taught for about 12 to 13 weeks to get them all up with first aid, so they could have a team of people who could run the ambulance 24/7," he said.

"Then people from Karoonda sent down a crew, and I taught them up so they could have an ambulance at Karoonda, and then the same thing happened at Mount Barker.

Experts meet to discuss algal bloom crisis

More than 80 marine and environmental research and monitoring, which will assist incidents again into the future. experts from around Australia came in understanding the broad impacts of the

The Harmful Algal Bloom (HAB) Science Forum, organised by the South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI), brought together leading aquatic scientists from South Australia, national research institutions and universities, government agencies and other community stakeholders at the South Australian Aquatic Sciences Centre. Participants reviewed the latest scientific findings, shared operational insights, identified knowledge gaps, and suggested priority actions for ongoing and future

current HAB, and mitigate and manage future events for the marine ecosystem, coastal industries and public health.

The group also looked at the importance of leveraging existing data systems and research infrastructure to improve early warning and response capabilities.

'This whole-of-sector approach in dealing with the current ongoing bloom ensures South Australia is well-placed to manage the immediate risk and build resilience for the future," SARDI Executive Director, Professor Mike Steer, said.

"Unfortunately, indications are that, while the scale of this current event is unprecedented, the impacts of climate change is such that we can expect such

of all involved from this event, we are shaping a robust and informed response to protect South Australia's unique marine ecosystems and the communities that depend on them."

The bloom is expected to remain present until the state receives regular and strong westerly winds associated with passing winter-time low pressure systems, however, ongoing high-pressure systems affecting southern Australia have delayed these winds.

Outcomes from the meeting will be collated to inform and improve government preparedness to respond to and mitigate future events.

"Then there was a division at Strath, and I helped Tailem Bend set up the Meningie division for the same reason, and down south there was Goolwa, Yankalilla, and even Kangaroo Island."

About the same time Adelaide was seeing groups and divisions combining into a Corp, which Mr Heard thought would be a good thing for regional groups as well.

"I wrote to the Commissioner and said 'what about it?' and we had a meeting with all the Superintendents from around here and they agreed to form a Corp," he said.

"The next thing I know they said 'right, you are the new Corp Superintendent' and I finished up with 19 divisions to look after."

All of this was as a volunteer.

In 1952 the State Government asked St John to take over the running of ambulance services, as while there were several of them already, they all did their own thing, including the civil ambulance run by the police, private ambulances and the SA Ambulance Transport Group that had ambulances at Unley, Hindmarsh and Port Adelaide.

Another highlight of his volunteer work was a training visit at Mount Macedon in the late 1950s.

"They sent me over there for three weeks to do what they call a 'casualty section instructor's course," Mr Heard said.

"That was in the years when atomic fallout was (high in people's minds).

"We went through a lot of stuff about what would happen if there was an atomic explosion in Adelaide or elsewhere, and how we would look after ourselves."

Looking back, Mr Heard said he had a "fantastic career" and just as fantastic was that work with the St John Ambulance Historical Society, where he remains as Treasurer. Mr Heard and his late wife Joy had four children, 16 grandchildren and "23-and-three quarters" great-grandchildren.

Mrs Heard was also involved with St Johns, also being awarded an Order of St John.

"Joy would have been tickled pink (about the OAM)... she would have been over the moon with this one," Mr Heard said.

Other members of the Heard family have also been involved in St John, including Mr Heard's three brothers, his four children, and four of his grandchildren.

"I am quite tickled about what I was able to achieve over the years, but I never made a fuss about it," Mr Heard said.

"It was only my family who knew the hours that I put in with St Johns."

A long-time member and volunteer for the Macclesfield Football Club is continuing to kick goals in a different way, receiving an Order of Australia Medal as part of the King's Birthday Honours for her services to Australian Rules Football.

Meadows resident Joy Edwards didn't come from a 'football family', but she had no choice but to get involved in 1962 after meeting her now-husband Trevor who played for the Macclesfield Football Club.

"My husband was President and we were having a meeting at our house," she explained.

"My background is accounting, so I thought I would give it a go.

"It was a lot simpler then than what it is now.

"A couple of times I had an assistant

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that was being groomed to take my place and by the time they had seen what was involved and the end of the year came (they said) 'no, I'm not interested', so I just kept going."

In addition to Treasurer, Mrs Edwards has also been an Executive Committee Member, Hall of Fame Co-Founder and Committee Member, Club Canteen Co-Manager, Reunion Co-ordinator, Moddies Program Patron, and former Ladies Auxiliary Member.

She was awarded Life Membership with the club and named in its Hall of Fame.

The Meadows resident has loved her time with the club and seeing it grow.

"We moved to Meadows from here and never had any inclination (to change clubs)," Mrs Edwards said.

"I enjoy putting it all together, and working hand in hand with the bar, canteen and fundraising (members)."

Adding to her accolades, Mrs Edwards has been awarded an Order of Australia Medal for her services to Australian Rules Football.

She was "gobsmacked" by the news. "Getting that letter, I was thrilled to bits," Mrs Edwards said.

HAY THERE: Farmers shown 'you're not doing it alone'

Some Fleurieu Peninsula farmers' concerns will ease after the weekend when 200 tonnes of donated hay was delivered by volunteers as part of a powerful community effort, thanks to a Lions club initiative, during one of the worst droughts in memory.

Goolwa and Victor Harbor & Port Elliot Lions clubs fundraised an estimated \$55,000 for Need for Feed, which had nine trucks deliver 200 tonnes of hay to the Fleurieu Peninsula.

The delivery was supported by the State Government's Drought Donated Fodder Transport Assistance Scheme.

The weekend included a sold-out fundraising dinner at Encounter Bay Football Club, where a \$35,4000 cheque to Need for Feed on the night.

This was thanks to the generous support from other Lions clubs, community clubs, businesses and individuals. Another \$5000 was donated by Yankalilla Lions Club. Donations can still be made via Need for Feed website.

The Lions Club of Victor Harbor & Port Elliot also cooked breakfast for the drivers on Monday morning before their deliveries.

"We had a terrific response from the community... (it was) a pretty amazing effort," Goolwa Lions member Andrew Schiller – who is the co-ordinator of the local initiative – said.

"A lot of the community businesses came on board and supported us with donations for raffles, door prizes and the auction.

"Multiple businesses donated about \$4000 worth of goods – it was just a huge response." Special thanks has been given to everyone

who got behind the important cause, including the "incredibly hard" work by Lions members, the Encounter Bay Football Club, the community coming together, local businesses "tremendous" support, and Need for Feed volunteers.



Mr Schiller found that as well as providing critical resources, the initiative also supported the mental health of farmers during the tough time.

"As well as providing hay, (the donation and dinner) provided valuable mental health benefits (for farmers) knowing people do care – you're not doing it alone," he said.

Need for Feed will contact registered farmers on how to collect the hay. More than 100 farmers registered and additional hay runs may be required.

The delivery came during a long weekend of much-needed rain. In the past week, from June 3 to 9, Strathalbyn had recorded 38.8mm, Hindmarsh Island had 26.2mm, while Mount Barker had 61mm.

Mr Schiller – who is also a farmer – referred to the rainfall as an "opening of the season" and explained that several more similar rain events are needed.

"It's still critical at the moment because when it rains, there's a green tinge to the ground, but it doesn't have a lot of nutritional value when it's young," he said.

"It's enough to get good germination and to get things going, but there's no subsoil moisture because it's been dry for so long.

"It'll probably take six to eight weeks for this feed to bulk up in the middle of winter time, it's not going to grow quickly."

Former local officers awarded for service

Two South Australian Police officers who formerly serviced the local service areas have been acknowledged with Australian Police Medals (APM) as part of the King's Birthday honours.

The APM recognises meritorious contributions to an Australian police service.

Superintendent Craig Wall and Assistant Commissioner Ian Parrott were among the three SAPOL officers recognised for their dedication to policing.

Superintendent Craig Wall joined SAPOL in 1986, graduating to patrol duties then transferring to the Operations Response Group.

In 1994, he was promoted to Senior Constable in the Special Tasks and Rescue (STAR) Division, working in a Response Unit engaged in tactical policing and rescue duties.

While at STAR he was promoted to Sergeant and to Senior Sergeant, qualified as a Police Diver, and was a tactical policing first responder at numerous high-risk tasks involving considerable danger.

In April 2008, Superintendent Wall was appointed an Inspector in the Protective Security Service then returned to STAR in 2010 as Operations Inspector, where he became Police Tactical Group Capability Advisor for the ANZCTC and was responsible for facilitating national police tactical training courses, including special weapons, explosives and tactical command.

Between 2015 and 2020 Superintendent Wall led country and metropolitan frontline services as Officer in Charge of the Hills Fleurieu LSA, Eastern Adelaide LSA and later Eastern District.

Since 2020, he has been Officer in Charge of STAR, where he implements a

clear vision for continued development and implementation of specialist policing response capability across South Australia.

Superintendent Wall also holds prominent positions on national committees, councils and working groups and has contributed significantly to national practices that are interoperable and consistent.

Assistant Commissioner Ian Parrott joined SAPOL in 1987, and after serving on patrol and in the Operational Response Group, he was promoted to Senior Constable in the Special Tasks and Rescue (STAR) Division in 1994, working as a firearms specialist in a Response Unit. In 2000, Assistant Commissioner Parrott was promoted to Sergeant and two years later to Senior Sergeant, representing SAPOL in counter-terrorism training and development, enhancing national and local responses.

In 2005, he was appointed an Inspector, initially as Officer in Charge of Combined Operations within STAR Group and later within Human Resources Service.

In 2008, Assistant Commissioner Parrott's leadership of frontline country policing began when he was promoted to Officer in Charge of Riverland Local Service Area (LSA), and then Murray Mallee LSA's Superintendent.

In these postings he was Forward Commander at a major domestic violence murder and siege, resulting in the arrest and imprisonment of a significant violent offender, achieved excellent reductions in crime, and led his people in providing exemplary service to their communities.

He returned to Human Resources (HR) and then led metropolitan and peri-urban operations in South Coast LSA while also being integral to SAPOL's White Ribbon Accreditation.

In 2019, he was promoted to Assistant Commissionerwhere he has driven road safety policing, regional policing, and First Nations policy and practice, including Closing the Gap initiatives.

SA Commissioner of Police Grant Stevens congratulated the three APM recipients on receiving this significant honour.

"These officers exemplify the values of South Australia Police and represent the commitment and professionalism in their work towards ensuring the safety and security of our community," he said.

"Receiving this medal will go down as one of the highlights of their career."

Goolwa Beach man critically injured in crash

A Goolwa Beach man suffered lifethreatening injuries after crashing into a tree at Currency Creek on Monday.

Just after 9pm, police and emergency services were called to Alexandrina Road

following reports a car had crashed into a tree.

The driver, a 20-year-old Goolwa Beach man, suffered life-threatening injuries and was taken to hospital where he remains in a critical condition as of the time of reporting. Alexandrina Road was closed for several hours while Major Crash investigators

examined the scene.

The man's car was towed for examination.



New stalking laws enacted

Laws to strengthen South Australia's response to crimes of stalking and harassment have come into effect as of this week.

The reforms – which passed State Parliament earlier this year – will make it easier for authorities to prosecute crimes involving stalking and harassment, while also better reflecting the serious nature of this type of offending.

These new laws update the list of behaviours which constitute criminal stalking and harassment to better cover digital stalking activities.

Under the previous laws, the offence of stalking required an intent for the conduct to cause serious apprehension or fear, or to cause serious physical or mental harm.



Local driver crashes into cars and wall

A Hindmarsh Island man was issued an expiation notice after crashing into a shopping centre wall at Goolwa on Sunday.

Just before 5pm, police and emergency services were called to Hutchinson Street following reports of a crash, where they found a Toyota sedan had collided with a Suzuki hatch, a Hyundai sedan, and a wall of a shopping centre.

The Toyota driver, a 76-year-old Hindmarsh Island man, received minor injuries and was assessed by SA Ambulance Service.

Fortunately, the Suzuki and Hyundai were unoccupied at the time and minor damage was caused to the building.

The driver was issued an expiation notice for inappropriate speed and inattention/due care.

The Camry was towed from the scene.

Anti-abuse laws introduced to SA Parliament

The State Government has introduced the Ageing and Adult Safeguarding (Review Recommendations) Amendment Bill 2025 to State Parliament, which is designed to enhance protections for adults at risk of abuse and strengthen the safeguarding of their rights.

The bill implements key recommendations from an independent review conducted by the South Australian Law Reform Institute, and includes significant reforms aimed at improving the operation and effectiveness of existing laws.

This legislative response also addresses growing public concern following several high-profile cases of elder abuse in South Australia and across the nation.

Key changes include:

• Strengthening the role of the Office for Ageing Well.

• Expanding the powers of the Adult Safeguarding Unit to respond to serious cases of financial and criminal abuse.

• Providing a broader range of safeguarding actions to protect people at risk.

• Adopting a 'no wrong door' approach to streamline referrals to police and complaint bodies.

• Giving the South Australian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (SACAT) authority to issue orders, replacing the current role of the Magistrate's Court. The bill reflects extensive consultation with people with lived experience, legal experts, service providers, and the wider community. "These amendments are about making sure we're doing everything we can to prevent abuse and uphold the rights of older South Australians who may be vulnerable to abuse," Minister for Human Services and Ageing Well, Nat Cook, said. "This bill says loudly and clearly – we've heard you, and we're not just acting on it, we're enshrining it in legislation. "Every South Australian deserves to be safe and live free from abuse, regardless of their age or ability."

The changes have lowered the threshold to causing harm, not just serious harm, making it easier for authorities to take action against perpetrators.

In addition, authorities will be able to prosecute in cases where the offender didn't intend to cause harm but knew or should have reasonably known their actions would have caused physical or mental harm, or serious apprehension or fear.

"Stalking and harassment is an insidious crime that has very real consequences for its victims," Attorney-General, Kyam Maher, said. "We know stalking overwhelmingly impacts women and these law changes will better protect South Australians, including those who experience situations of family or domestic abuse.

"These reforms update the types of behaviours that can be considered stalking and harassment to ensure new and emerging forms of technology are also covered.

"Nobody deserves to live in fear and these laws will help ensure authorities have the tools they need at their disposal to tackle this menace."

The offence has also been renamed from 'unlawful stalking' to 'stalking and harassment' to enhance community understanding of what is criminalised.

If convicted, offenders will face imprisonment of up to three years for a basic offence or five years for an aggravated offence.

SAARG looks at indigenous history during festival event

The Strathalbyn Aboriginal Action and Reference Group (SAARG) provided an alternative to white history this History Festival at an event in the Strathalbyn Library.

The theme of this year's History Festival was 'decisions' and the aim of the Strathalbyn session was to look at how close some Aboriginal history is, and to see Aboriginal history under our feet and outside the door.

The 15 people who attended spent time outside looking at the cairn across the road from the library, which overlooks where the pioneer cemetery was and curiously where a playground for kids is these days.

They also noted the mill - which in the 1850s was called Colman's Mill – the Store opposite the Mill and the Chapel theatre which, in past times, was the Strathalbyn Methodist Church.

Traditional owner and chair of SAARG Polly Sumner Dodd and other local Aboriginal residents Freda Mills, Graeme and Lorraine McVitty were present and able to contribute to the conversations, with Polly welcoming all to Country.

A picture taken near the Angas looking up at a scarred tree that no longer stands, the old pioneer cemetery site, and with the school in the background was circulated, with the school part of what now makes up the library.

An article by J.W. Elliot in The Southern Argus was also read.

"He described how when the school was being built the men digging the foundations unearthed a number of Aboriginal bones and skulls," SAARG member, Dean Whittaker, said.

"Elliot was the Editor of The Southern Argus over a sustained period and also spent 20 as mayor of the Strathalbyn Corporation (Town Council).

"According to Elliot, we, and Alexandrina Council, are sitting on a significant Aboriginal burial site in that building, yet, unlike the Pioneer Cemetery Cairn or the Soldiers Memorial Gardens, there is no remembering or honouring of that site by us."

The group also spent time listening to the stories around Mr Colman and a young Aboriginal man who he shot.

The SAARG group reflected on the story before looking at a colourised photograph taken behind the store in 1884 of the teams from the first football match between Pt McLeay and Strathalbyn.


The group looked at possible actions that might be possible moving forward and considered dual naming of the Memorial Gardens, South North, East and West Terraces, and High Street and Murray Street.

The group hope to pursue further steps in engaging with history and reconciliation, and appreciate the support of Alexandrina Council, Strathalbyn Library and Second Nature in producing the event.



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

'Underwhelming' budget for Hammond

A local MP has been left underwhelmed by the State Budget, particularly in its spending on regional roads, and its lack of funds to reinstate the Strathalbyn emergency department or deliver basketball facilities for the town.

Member for Hammond Adrian Pederick labelled the budget delivered by the State Labor Government as "very underwhelming", especially for the regions, and full of broken promises in regards to fixing ramping and lowering power prices.

As Shadow Minister for Regional Roads, the \$20 million over two years to deliver additional road safety maintenance works for regional and metropolitan roads, the \$10 million over two years to deliver additional road safety maintenance across regional South Australia, and the \$7.5 million over three years towards regional road safety infrastructure upgrades were welcomed, but he believed this money would barely scratch the surface.

"When you look at this, across the whole state there's \$7.5 million for safety upgrades – that's not much," Mr Pederick said.

"Then a \$10 million increase in regional road maintenance upgrades – that money is welcome, but I think it's \$140 million a year too short of where we need to be.

"I can tell you being the Regional Roads Shadow (Minister) we get multiple calls or emails every week on roads right across the state, and I think the total number

that should be the minimum allocated for regional road funding as far as maintenance is concerned is \$250 million a year."

The current drought has also been a big issue for the local member.

He was pleased to see funding allocated but had some concerns.

"The co-investment, especially with the second round of farming, was at least \$20,000 – well farmers don't have any spare money, they're using it all to keep their stock alive or put their next crops in hoping they'll get a crop this year," Mr Pederick said.

"I firmly believe we really need low or no interest loans for farmers.

"Farmers want a hand up, not a hand out." For Hammond there was little to be excited about in the budget.

Mr Pederick believed the budget particularly lacked in health funding and sporting infrastructure for the electorate, and planning for growth.

"For Strathalbyn I would have liked to have seen an allocation to get a full-blown emergency department up and running again because I never thought what's in place – and no disrespect to the staff at all – is anywhere near what the area deserves," he said.

"In our area we need some master planning around the future needs of Strathalbyn, and whether that needs an expansion of the hospital into the future and the same in Murray Bridge.

"Thankfully for the private sector and education there's new schools coming on (like) there is for the Aurora project in Strathalbyn, but we haven't seen a decent government spend on education in the area at this time and on health, and enough money spent on roads.

"I know both towns – Strathalbyn and Murray Bridge – are crying out for decent basketball facilities and that requires multi millions of dollars, so we havent seen anything like that either.

"I just got to keep the nose to the grindstone and keep pushing the point on the services the area needs."

Cregan pleased with budget

Member for Kavel Dan Cregan has welcomed the measures announced for his electorate in the State Budget.

Some of the major inclusions for the Adelaide Hills include \$45 million over three years to support the delivery of the new Mount Barker Hospital and \$12.5 million over five years to transition the current Mount Barker On-Demand (Keoride) trial service into a permanent Adelaide Metro service, purchase six new EV buses, and undertake associated infrastructure upgrades to the Mount Barker Depot to support electric vehicle charging.

Mr⁻Cregan also welcomed the \$656.3 million from 2025-26 to deliver upgrades between the Swanport Bridge on the Princes Highway and Truro on the Sturt Highway.

"I'm pleased that over half a billion dollars in Commonwealth and state funding has now been committed to the Truro freight bypass to help get trucks off the freeway," he said.

"Securing ongoing funding for the on-demand bus service is also an important win, together with ongoing projects such as a new pre-school and primary school, the duplication of the Adelaide Road Bridge, and the construction of the new Mount Barker and Verdun freeway interchanges."

"Work is also continuing at pace on the new hospital."

BUDGET BOOST: A billion directed for regional SA

A multi-million-dollar law and order package dominates the Labor Government's fourth State Budget, with major funding also allocated to drought-stricken farmers, housing, cost of living, and broader measures for regional areas.

The 2025-26 State Budget is forecasted to deliver a \$179 million surplus, which would make it the third consecutive one under Labor after it was projected that by the end of the financial year in June, the current budget would record an \$18 million surplus.

The government's focus for this budget was to address the immediate economic challenges brought on by the Whyalla steelworks and drought, while also investing in the long-term prosperity of South Australia's economy with some targeted initiatives.

"The purpose of this budget is to try and continue the momentum we've achieved in the last three years, both in terms of the economy and how strongly its performing... and respond to some of the challenges that weren't necessarily apparent to us in South Australia, even in the time of the Mid-Year Budget Review," SA Treasurer, Stephen Mullighan, said during last Thursday's budget lock-up.

"We continue our investments in housing, health and cost of living, and of course, in this budget, particularly in community safety, with a significant law and order package across police, prisons and our criminal justice system.

"Our strong budget position means we can help South Australians now, and deliver important projects for our state's future."

The budget provides \$4.3 billion over the period 2025/26 to 2028/29, in addition to

• \$172 million over six years for additional sworn police officers. An additional 243 sworn police officers are expected by 2028-29 and a further 83 by 2030-31.

• \$31.1 million over four years to undertake additional sustainment works to ensure SAPOL have the facilities and equipment they need.

• \$12 million over three years to continue the accelerated recruitment program by increasing the number of courses delivered

\$1 billion in 2024/25, for new expenditure initiatives and revenue measures that support the government's key priorities.

For regional South Australians, \$1.8 billion has been allocated for new measures, including \$109.7 million over four years to support the River Murray, \$55.4 million over five years to support farmers affected by drought, and several millions towards road safety maintenance and upgrades and to police resourcing.

Under its law and order package, the government is spending \$29.6 million over three years for the expansion of the successful police security officer (PSO) model into regional areas.

However, Mr Mullighan was unable to confirm if any would be deployed to Strathalbyn.

"I can't comment about specific locations because the Police Commissioner determines where police are stationed and where they operate from, but what I can say is a significant proportion of the (new) 326 officers will be deployed to regional areas," he told The Southern Argus.

"I go to every police graduation I can get to and a part of that graduation is not just each successful graduate being given their certificate of graduation, but them nominating where they want to go, and at least half of those graduates are nominating regional locations which I think is really encouraging.

'We've got some vacancies and staff shortages for police in different parts of regional South Australia, so I know the Commissioner is still trying to allocate people to those regional locations, but having this boost in resources, both in sworn police and police security officers, will make sure we can meet those shortages into the future."

For the Adelaide Hills, Mount Barker will continue to see \$45 million over three years to support the delivery of the new hospital, while \$12.5 million would be dedicated over five years to transition the Mount Barker On-Demand (Keoride) trial service into a permanent Adelaide Metro service, purchase six new electric vehicle (EV) buses, and undertake associated infrastructure upgrades to the Mount Barker Depot to support EV charging.

But other than \$80 million over five years for safety improvement works along Main South Road between Myponga and Yankalilla, including new overtaking lanes and road widening, there were no other specific measures for the Fleurieu.

Mr Mullighan understood locals would be frustrated public transport access was still lacking, but hoped the current changes being made would help in the future.

"I think (public transport) remains a pressure in a lot of regional communities across South Australia where we've struggled to make it viable to run a particular bus route in a particular location because of lack in patronage," he told *The Argus*.

"What we're trying to do through this ondemand bus system is introduce a new model of providing public transport services to a discreet area.

"(Mount Barker) is the first place it has really been trialled at this scale, and it gives us the confidence it's something that can be rolled out in the future as a far more costeffective way of providing public transport services, rather than just putting bus stops along a route, running a service and seeing what happens.

'You're right to be frustrated that it's not in your area yet, but hopefully, you can take some comfort that we're changing the way we're providing public transport services so that it's more dynamic, more responsive to the demand, and it's more cost-effective for us to provide, and hopefully, we've got the capacity to roll that out in other places in the future."

Basham 'disappointed' in State Budget

Member for Finniss David Basham is "really disappointed" with the State Budget, saying it offers "very little" for the electorate and fails to address the current drought impacts.

The Shadow Minister for Environment and Water Infrastructure welcomed the \$109.7 million over four years to support the River Murray and the \$1.7 million over three years to deliver a range of onground works to improve wetland habitat across the Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth, but beyond that, felt many measures missed its mark on Finniss.

This included the reduction in the 28day student pass on metroCARDs to \$10 and the \$12.5 million over five years to transition the current Mount Barker On-Demand (Keoride) trial service into a permanent Adelaide Metro service.

"There are things in there like that \$10 for 28 days bus travel that only works if you're in the metropolitan area, so there's nothing in there for families in Finniss," Mr Basham said. Yank... it's only about 4000 people a day that use that road.

"The long-term of the government is to see significant growth, particularly around north Goolwa, and there is nothing being done to invest in infrastructure needed to deliver that."

The former farmer was equally disappointed in the drought relief package. He claimed the measures focused

on future droughts rather than the current one.

"It's very much around drought preparedness and that's fine for the next drought, but we're actually in the middle of the worst one the state has ever experienced," Mr Basham said. "A lot of the money is requiring

^{*}A lot of the money is requiring significant co-investment by the landholder to get access to this funding, and at this point in time they're having to use every cent to stay alive as a business, so have no ability to get prepared for the next one right now.

"It's almost a cruel hoax by offering it up the way it is."

for loans of up to \$10 million.

• \$1.7 billion over five years to address the increasing levels of demand experienced across the public health system and the higher cost of service delivery across local health networks. This funding includes new investment of approximately \$117 million over five years to support mental health services to meet growing demand and costs.

"They've invested into the dial-a-ride buses in Mount Barker, but there's still significant calls for extending the diala-ride from Victor Harbor across into Goolwa, so (there's) no extra investment into delivering Goolwa a dial-a-ride service to get them the ability to travel around Goolwa, and across to Victor and back.

"Then we look at the major road infrastructure – there's over 12,000 cars per day that travel south of Mount Compass (on Victor Harbor Road), whereas part of the road they're investing in on South Road between Myponga and Among Mr Basham's 'wish list' sent to *The Southern Argus* prior to the budget announcement last Thursday was the upgrade of the South Coast District Hospital emergency department and its helipad, upgrade of the Hindmarsh Tiers Road-Victor Harbor Road intersection, flood mitigation for Middleton, and investment in SteamRanger services, among other initiatives.

None of the items have been directly addressed, but most of all, Mr Basham felt that, although the government saw the South Coast as a significant growth area, it had spent "literally not a cent virtually" to deliver that growth and the infrastructure required for it.

Fleurieu artists shine at Stationmaster's Gallery

Barb Groffen, Roe Gartelmann and Lynn Chamberlain were on hand recently for the installation of their pieces at the gallery.

Chamberlain paints with acrylics, oils and pastels, while Gartelmann with most mediums depending on her mood at the time, where she is and what she has with her, and Barb's specialty is ceramics.

"I have lived in Willunga for about 25 years, and I didn't really take up painting until I moved to Willunga seriously, so that was about the time I retired," Chamberlain said.

"Roe was one of my teachers, and I have had lessons from quite a few of the artists in the Fleurieu."

Likewise, Gartelmann is also from Willunga.

"I am actually a trained art teacher, hence, I taught Lynn and various other people around the place," she said.

"I have lived in the Willunga area for 40odd years, and painted, did ceramics, ran workshops and travelled a fair bit, (with) most of my paintings being done on site, not in a studio."

Groffen is based at Aldinga Beach, just around the corner from the beach where she draws her inspiration

All three say their work can take some time, or in the painters' case, sometimes with speed.

"Some paintings just come together really quickly, and others might be more laboured," Chamberlain said.

"When I think about what I have here it is all times."

Gartelmann agreed, adding that with her artwork being done on site while travelling, it meant it was almost started and finished in one go.

But for Groffen the process is longer.

"Ceramics are fairly time consuming,"

she said.

"There are two firings for each piece, and I have done a lot of collecting driftwood to make them a little bit more authentic, and a lot of seaweed floating around.

"You can't just whip one out in a day, as they have to be fired twice – first time to 1000C and the second to anything between 1120 and 1220C."

All three are inspired by the world around them.

"Particularly in the Fleurieu, there are so many gorgeous places, and I think some of them are under threat, so it is really nice to get some painted before you get houses, or vineyards or whatever on them," Chamberlain said.

"Roe and I also paint up in the Flinders and Arkaroola – anywhere that is startling really.

"I remember a time painting with Roe and she said 'don't stop and fuss around trying to find the perfect view, just fix on one and get painting', so that is a good lesson."

All three are hoping to see some 'red dots' on their work, meaning they have been sold.

Dog daycare's major expansion plans


A popular dog daycare in the Adelaide Hills is hoping to expand its operations and provide hydrotherapy services on site.

Jame Farm Days at Kanmantoo has launched a development application seeking a partial change in use to establish a kennelling and canine hydrotherapy facility comprising of two kennel buildings and a hydrotherapy and office building with an associated exercise yard, above ground water tank, vehicle access and parking area. Up to 20 dogs will be accommodated in two separate buildings, each containing 10 individual dog rooms, as well as an indoor play area, and staff and storage facilities. Boarding dogs will continue to primarily arrive to the site via the existing bus service, however, direct drop-off and pick-up will be available between 8am to 6pm Monday to Friday and 9am to 4pm on weekends.

In addition to the dog hydrotherapy as part of the daycare, the facility will be available for private dog hydrotherapy sessions between 8am and 10am, and 4pm and 6pm Monday to Friday, outside the hours of the daycare.

Two dogs will be treated per session – three in the morning and in the afternoon with seven per day on weekends – which runs for 30 minutes with 15-minute gaps in-between. An additional three to four staff will be required to manage the dog boarding and hydrotherapy uses. Cleaning of the pool will occur using natural products and occasional chemicals, which will be stored securely in the designated storage area within the main building. 

Strathalbyn 16-year-old basketballer Alex Blackmore is competing in a global championship in Brazil this week, with the 2025 IWBF (International Wheelchair Basketball Federation) Men's U23 World Championship off to a soaring start yesterday.

He was selected among a mix of international experienced and rising stars for the Spinners squad, which is the national U23 men's team for wheelchair athletes, playing alongside Paralympians Eithen Leard and Jaylen Brown.

Blackmore recently completed a training camp in Melbourne before flying to the South American country with his mum Lauren.

Australia played against Germany yesterday, and will go up against Brazil tomorrow, before Turkiye, Canada, then Israel before the finals.

"I think our odds are pretty good we've got a pretty strong team," he told The Southern Argus before leaving.

"I think it'll be good - it's exciting." As followed in The Southern Argus, Blackmore has been moving from strength-to-strength in his basketball career, ever since making his debut on a national stage at just 12-years-old.

He was also part of the South Australian team that won junior national competition in Brisbane in April, marking the first time the state has ever won in the competition.

When returning from Brazil, he will compete in the 2025 season of the National Wheelchair Basketball League, plaving with Darwin Salties.

His family launched a crowdfunding campaign through the Australian Sports Foundation to help Blackmore achieve his dreams, which includes competing in the Paralympics, and has received generous support from community members and businesses.

"A big thanks to everyone who has donated to Alex's fundraiser so far," his mum, Lauren, said.

"There have been a couple of businesses and individuals that did quite significant donations and we are super appreciative of the support."

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
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
