Drought to continue for weeks, long road to recovery for farmers...

NEVER ENDING

After months of drought conditions, recent rainfall across the region has offered livestock producers a glimpse of hope while still facing a long road to recovery.

FPAG Livestock Manager Michael Quirk – who has worked in the Fleurieu for the past three years following Mount Gambier – believes the heavy rains over the long weekend turned a corner in the industry by easing some concerns from farmers.

But former dairy farmer turned Member for Finnis David Basham is anticipating it could be six weeks before local farmers are able to declare the

current drought – the most severe in recorded history – over.

“To me this is a really hard time for farmers because people in the towns and cities look out and see things starting to go green because it has rained and think ‘well, that’s fixed the problem,’” Mr Basham said.

“But the challenge is that it will be another five to six weeks, if things go well, before farmers will have enough feed on their farms to feed livestock without buying feed in, so it is actually this period that is really tough.

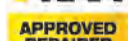

Labor candidate returns to the ballot box

The first five Labor candidates for the State Election in March were announced last week, including the party's choice for the key seat of Heysen.

Intensive care nurse, educator, and City of Onkaparinga councillor Marisa Bell has been selected as the candidate for Heysen.

A proud daughter of Italian migrants who came to South Australia seeking a better life, she shares the values of hard work, strength and resilience that migrants bring to Australia, making her a prime candidate choice for the party.

Multi-million-dollar facility plans to meet tourism demand

A multi-complex comprising of accommodation, a restaurant, and health and wellness facilities at Hindmarsh Valley proposes to meet the emerging demand for new forms of tourism and integrate with primary production on site.

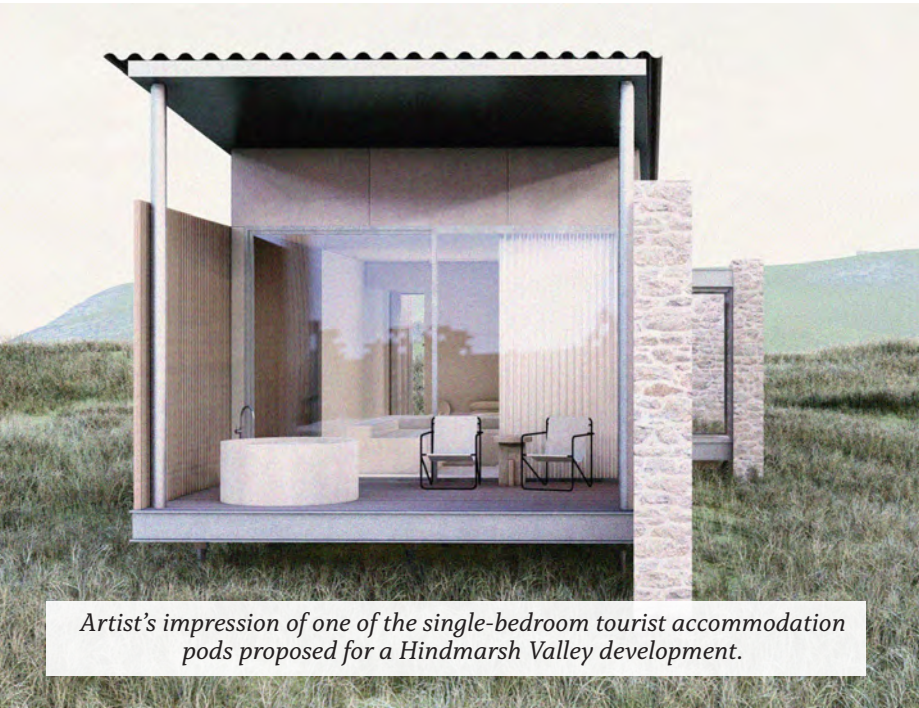
A development application was recently lodged for the construction of tourism accommodation and a restaurant with ancillary health and wellness facilities, swimming pool, and associated car parking and native vegetation removal at Lots 2 and 3 on Nettle Hill Road.

The approximately 19.8 hectares of land is presently used for grazing of livestock and will continue to be used for this purpose in addition to horticulture in the form of orchards, olive grove, fruit, vegetable and herb gardens, as well as the new structures.

The tourist accommodation comprises of 16 pods – 15 one-bedroom and one two-bedroom – with an open plan lounge and deck which can house up to 34 guests in total.

It would be managed by six to eight staff – a general manager, assistant manager, front desk, cleaners, maintenance and gardener – at any one time who would return home after shifts.

The restaurant would support 94 seats

and operate daily from 7am to 11pm for guests, and be publicly accessible three days of the week – Friday to Sunday – by reservation only.

Meanwhile, the health and wellness facilities will offer a variety of services and activities such as spa treatments, stress management, alternative therapies and holistic treatments that will be for guest

use only, along with the pool.

The development accommodates 38 carparks – four less than what is recommended but is still considered appropriate given the restaurant is open just three days a week to the public.

The design of the development has been carefully crafted to ensure no impact on the farming activity of any

adjoining land while also looking at opportunities to retain and enhance current farming activities.

"The proposed development represents a high-quality response to emerging demand for new forms of tourism," a reported by URPS read.

"In addition to meeting demand for new and emerging tourism sub-categories, the proposal would support regional wealth creation and the generation of economic benefit due to the attraction of high value tourists, and a focus on local supply chains.

"The land uses support value-adding to primary production through tourism activities such as beekeeping, vegetable picking, bread baking, gardening, and free-range chicken farming –all of which align with the rural and agricultural character of the zone.

"The introduction of tourist accommodation – which has been carefully designed to coexist with existing agricultural uses – allows both operations to operate harmoniously without disruption.

"This approach not only preserves the rural character of the site, but also enhances its economic sustainability by integrating tourism with primary production."

The development cost is estimated at \$15 million.

It is awaiting consideration by the Fleurieu Regional Assessment Panel.

Council approves housing overlay

A recently adopted code amendment allowing new forms of co-located housing to be established in several council areas has been approved by Alexandrina Council provided its proposed conditions and regulation changes are met.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Minister for Planning Nick Champion adopted the Future Living Code Amendment earlier this year, which will introduce a new form of co-located housing that allows more homes to be built in established suburbs without impacting their existing character, heritage and streetscape.

The new policies allow for existing homes to be retained, altered and extended to create ‘co-located housing’ rather than demolishing a house and subdividing the site to build multiple homes.

Councillors agreed towards the end of last year to support the intent of the code amendment, but until Monday night had yet to make a final decision on whether to apply the new Co-located Housing Overlay to the Established Neighbourhood Zone, which would include pockets throughout Goolwa, Port Elliot and Strathalbyn.

One of the main contention areas for council in the Co-located Housing Overlay was a policy that stated “established dwelling(s) on the site of a co-located housing development are retained to accommodate co-located housing and may include sensitive alterations, additions and/or partial demolition”.

To abate the risk of demolition of valued elements of a local heritage or place within a historic area to make way for a co-located housing development, council recommended in a letter to the Minister for the wording to exclude “and/or partial demolition”.

“As the majority of council’s Established

Neighbourhood Zone is subject to either Local Heritage Place Overlay and Historic Area Overlay, it is important that any demolition, partial or otherwise, should be assessed according to the local heritage place overlay and/or historic area overlay policies,” the approved letter from Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes on behalf of council read.

Council also requested the spatial application of the Co-located Housing Overlay is applied to the Established Neighbourhood Zone at the same time as the deployment of associated amendments to the Planning, Development and Infrastructure Regulations 2017 before it approves the overlay.

At Monday night’s meeting councillors debated whether to endorse applying the overlay providing the proposed condition and regulation changes were adopted, with arguments made over the appropriateness of co-located housing in the zones.

North Ward councillor Craig Maidment was among the two who were verbally opposed.

He raised concerns over the potential impacts on Strathalbyn.

“I’ll give you an example of an Established Neighbourhood Zone in Strathalbyn, particularly the area bound by North Parade, Manse Road and Taylors Lane – it has got a Heritage Overlay on it and some of those houses have been there for a long time,” Cr Maidment said.

“In that particular area we only have one strip of bitumen, there are no footpaths and never likely to be any, there is no street kerbing, and we don’t have room for street trees.

“The infrastructure in that area is at capacity and the ability to have separate CWMS commissions is very problematic in that particular zone.

“There are plenty other Neighbourhood Zones around Strathalbyn it could be applied to but it just seems we’re focusing on Established Neighbourhood Zones with older houses.”

Despite some contention, the motion was passed.

Council fees and charges see an increase for 25/26

User fees for both the Strathalbyn Swimming Pool and Town Hall are among the proposed fees and charges that will increase in the next financial year.

At Monday night’s meeting, Alexandrina councillors adopted the fees and charges for the upcoming financial year, ending June 30, 2026.

In reviewing fees, administration considered the cost of delivery by council and impact of the fee on the community, assumptions in the Long-Term Financial Plan, price comparison of like services, and the Consumer Price Index (CPI).

In addition to its usual charges, council added fees for a new permit to cover community and not-for-profit groups and new membership offerings at the Strathalbyn Pool.

Pool fees have generally increased, with membership for adults rising from \$265 to \$280, concession/children from \$212 to \$224 and family from \$415 to \$440, and costs per visit slightly upping from \$8 to \$8.20 for adults, \$6.40 to \$6.60 for concession/children, and \$25.60 to \$26.30 for families.

The Strathalbyn Town Hall, which recently underwent upgrades, will have a standard hire charge rate of \$110 with a community discounted rate of \$50.

Strathalbyn and Goolwa town bands will pay a \$500 to hire the Town Hall and Centenary Hall respectively instead of the original allocated \$5000.

CWMS service charges are still yet to be determined for occupied, vacant and half occupied homes.

Council will also be transitioning to SpacetoCo – an online bookings and management tool –which will be used for its halls and rooms hire, and comes with its own fees.

At Monday night’s meeting, West Ward councillor Michael Scott called for busking and community room hire fees for community groups to be waived but it failed to gain traction.

However, it was noted discretions can be made by senior staff members to waive such fees.

Projected income from user charges and statutory fees for 2025/26 is anticipated to be approximately \$4.5 million, representing approximately eight per cent of council’s total operating revenue.

SHRC pulls out of Lot 10 precinct plans

The Strathalbyn Harness Racing Club (SHRC) has again withdrawn its expression of interest in purchasing a portion of the emerging recreation precinct in town.

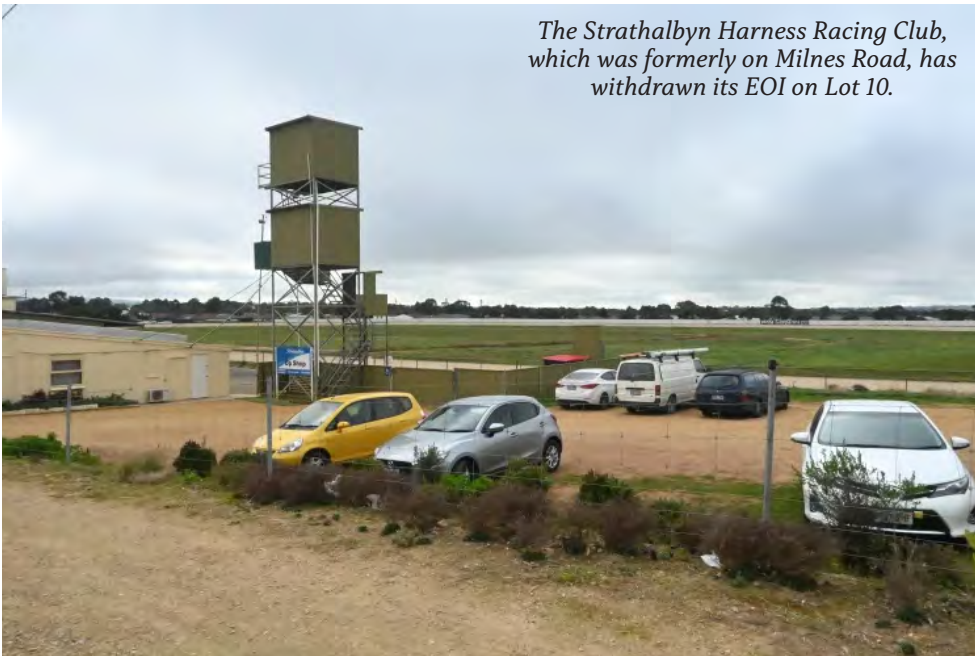
Following the receipt of the highly anticipated business case for the Lot 10 development ordered by Alexandrina Council towards the end of last year, councillors were meant to endorse a preferred master plan for the precinct but the decision was delayed by SHRC indicating its intent to prepare an offer to purchase a portion of the site from council.

This is not the first time the club has proposed to purchase part of the land.

Council held a special meeting in March to discuss the options before them in the Business Case prepared by TSA Riley in November last year and the purchase offer made by SHRC around the same time.

It was also noted at this meeting that council could move forward with a first stage development on the site regardless of the potential inclusion of the harness racing club, which would comprise of a two-court indoor facility that could be designed to increase to four courts, a dog park, playing fields and an RV Park/campground.

Councillors ultimately resolved to further consider stage one subject to securing an appropriate level of external funding, as well as the SHRC proposal subject to the club conducting due diligence to council's satisfaction in regards to construction costs associated with proposed concept designs and providing essential services to the site, and business modelling that demonstrate financial sustainability, including a formal commitment from Harness Racing South Australia in relation to future racing events

at Strathalbyn.

This information has been awaited by council since that time, but it was revealed at Monday night's general meeting the club has since withdrawn its expression of interest.

SHRC President Max Beasley told *The Southern Argus* the decision was based on a lack of confidence in council.

He explained the committee would have liked to have pursued it, but found it unacceptable to have to wait years before you could "turn a piece of dirt over" on the site.

"The reason why we initially sold our complex was I had to sign an official document that we were going to or strongly look to purchase out there, and they wanted to free up the town centre and take all the industrial out there – which is now what's happened –and we moved along on that pretext, then the new lot of councillors come

in and changed the whole structure of the lot," Mr Beasley said.

"This has been going on for that many years now.

"I'm happy to even get a no (from council) but they won't even give me a no, whether it's because we're a racing body I have no idea, but I'm frustrated and I presume the member database is... we haven't moved forward and they can't make a decision on the town."

The club has a project management company currently advising it on alternate plans.

Meanwhile, council administration continues to work through the next steps for the precinct in accordance with the first part of council's March resolution.

It has recommended funding in the draft 2025/26 budget to enable detailed design to be undertaken for the proposed stage one plans.

Church opens doors for mid-week prayer

St Andrew's Uniting Church will open its doors for two hours on Wednesdays to give people the chance for mid-week prayer and meditation.

Church council members have made the decision after having spotted a need because of how busy modern life can be.

"There has been this real call for our mission to be able to open our doors more often," spokesperson, Meredith Green, said.

"It is a case of life is busy and life comes with all sorts of challenges and turmoil, and sometimes it is just nice to find a place just to be.

"The church is a calming place – as soon as you step in the doors there is that feeling of something that is sacred."

The doors will be open on Wednesdays from 12-noon to 2pm, with two members of the congregation to be available to support people with prayer if they would like it.

"It will fit in within a lunch break... if you've had a terrible day or just need a moment's peace," Mrs Green said.

"Prayer is like a love language to God but prayer is also God speaking to us.

"We do not have to have the words, it is more a matter of being in that space and being still, and sometimes there is just that moment that prayer talks to us."

Calls for crisis accommodation at Mount Barker

Support groups that provide help for those experiencing and at risk of homelessness in Mount Barker are calling for a dedicated accommodation facility to be built in the rapidly expanding city.

Shaya Nettle from Towards Home and Minister Haydn Lush from the Mount Barker Uniting Church are seeing increasing numbers of people going through a relationship breakdown, fleeing domestic violence, losing a rental property or struggling with utility bills reach out for help with places to sleep and live.

"We are seeing probably two streams of homelessness increase in Mount Barker – the visible homelessness... as well as at-risk rental properties, and people becoming homeless for the first time either because of relationship breakdown or DV and

increasingly just being unable to continue to afford private rental rates within that community," Ms Nettle said.

"We definitely need short-term emergency accommodation, transitional accommodation, and a range of options for people.

"What we know is that, when people experience homelessness, their life often falls apart, as it would for all of us.

"We move into crisis mode (along with) our ability to make decisions, and it is often very exhausting and it can be fracturing."

Some of the assistance Towards Home provides includes a regular outreach service to Mount Barker for people who may not be connected into mainstream services and those who face additional barriers connecting into mainstream services, along with some support for transitional housing options and those finding it "hard to stay on top of things" with rental properties.

At the Mount Barker Uniting Church people can make use of an emergency shelter room, while others are sleeping on the verandah, in tents around the church or in vehicles in the church's car park.

The church provides a variety of programs to assist people in need, including a community pantry open every second day for which the church works with organisations such as Oz Harvest, Foodbank and Second Bite, and also a free Sunday dinner, where up to 70 people are catered for.

"What we experience is, when we move towards winter, people are looking for shelter," Minister Lush said.

"People who are rough sleepers can sustain themselves reasonably well in summer, but as winter approaches they are looking for more appropriate shelter.

"Some people are local to our Mount Barker area and some are transient, where they are moving from different locations because of circumstances, whether it be escaping domestic violence or there has been a breakdown with their landlord, for example, or are just needing space from the busyness of the city."

Minister Lush said the problem was growing in numbers and complexity.

"It is not just about accommodation, but we recognise that if people don't have accommodation, other issues and challenges become more part of people's lives if they don't have that stability of just basic living accommodation," he said.

"We would love to explore that (dedicated emergency accommodation), even if it is short-term, then we could ascertain what the issues and needs are of individuals and work out how best to support them."

Some time ago, Towards Home put a deputation in to Mount Barker District Council, together with Forage (Built), about

developing a village option for Mount Barker where small portable huts could be built alongside a communal kitchen and spaces.

"That was really well-received, but what we couldn't find was the land to assemble this," Ms Nettle said.

"Ideally, with this village concept we could target older women or younger people.

"What we were hoping to do (with the huts), because they can be assembled quite quickly then packed down and reassembled somewhere else, it could be (built in) a car park or it could be a bundle of land that was in the pipeline for development.

"So, we have put a solution on the table before that the community got behind and was really receptive to, but really we know that land is at a premium.

"In Victoria... they just repurposed an unused car park in a metropolitan area and created a village community of eight portable units with communal kitchen and spaces.

"The solution doesn't have to be this long-term arduous bricks and mortar thing, there are more accessible portable solutions that we could theoretically activate really quickly."

In its 2020 Housing Strategy, due to be updated in the next financial year, Alexandrina Council acknowledged a decline in social housing dwellings across the district, with 24 fewer social housing dwellings across the district than in 1996.

The strategy notes social housing accounts for just 3.6 per cent of the housing stock across the district – approximately half the rate provided across Greater Adelaide and the Rural City of Murray Bridge.

It stated the number of people who are homeless across the district is estimated to be 94 – an increase of 32 per cent since 2014.

A Department for Human Services (DHS) spokesperson says it commissions the Toward Home Alliance (THA), which covers Mount Barker and the Adelaide Hills.

"They provide assertive outreach services to Mount Barker for people at risk or experiencing homelessness," the spokesperson said.

"DHS and THA have met with Mount Barker Council recently to discuss homelessness, and to strengthen the support in this area.

"Emergency Accommodation Program (EAP), including emergency, crisis, temporary and transitional, remains with SA Housing Trust (SAHT) and DHS has no homelessness asset.

"While DHS commissions the specialist homelessness services to provide a specialised service response to homelessness, we do not have authority over any asset and therefore cannot respond to the request for crisis accommodation in Mount Barker."

Wistow's meeting place will celebrate 75-year milestone

For generations, Wistow Community Hall has hosted sentimental celebrations for locals, such as weddings, birthdays and anniversaries, and now, it's the hall's turn to be celebrated as it reaches a remarkable milestone – its 75th anniversary.

Located on Wellington Road, the venue is the only community-owned hall in the Mount Barker Council District, and is run by the Wistow Community Association.

President Ken Hutchinson said the hall was “always a community meeting point” in the area, ever since the 1930s when residents were looking for a public space for gatherings. “They were meeting in peoples’ homes, garages, and shearing sheds,” he said.

“When the guys came back from war, they decided to build something here.”

However, post-war presented a challenge with building materials going to homes, so the project was delayed.

Then, a large tin shed was transported from Strathalbyn to the land donated by the Blight family.

The current brick structure was commissioned around 1950, which marks

the upcoming anniversary.

Today, it is bustling with activity almost every day such as jiu-jitsu, table tennis, line dancing, a church group, children's parties, meet and greet sessions for locals and many meetings.

It's recently undergone many upgrades, including the outside carpark and fencing, improved lighting and kitchen floor, and is maintained thanks to passionate volunteers attending working bees.

Booking officer Barbara Colquhoun described it as a “community asset” for local “cohesion and wellbeing”.

The upcoming celebratory winter solstice dinner on Saturday, June 21, will honour its history and celebrate the milestone anniversary.

Review delivers good news for Basin Plan

A comprehensive assessment of environmental outcomes in South Australia under the Murray Darling Basin Plan shows environmental water is having a positive impact on ecosystems, biodiversity and habitat quality.

Among the findings was that increased freshwater flows through the barrages has increased the resilience of fish species, including black bream, greenback flounder and small-mouthed hardyhead.

Upstream, increasing connectivity of wetlands and floodplains has improved outcomes for native freshwater fish, vegetation and waterbird species.

The report also emphasises the need to recover the 450GL of environmental water as soon as possible, and from the southern Basin, to maximise environmental outcomes across the system, including increasing resilience to climate change.

“This evaluation has reinforced the importance of delivering the Basin Plan in full, including the final 450GL of environmental water and addressing water delivery constraints, to ensure the health of the River Murray and protect our unique ecosystems,” Climate, Environment and Water Minister, Susan Close, said.

“Through this prolonged dry spell, that water has become even more important for the river's ecology to ensure we maintain a healthy aquatic environment, which supports water supply, irrigation, recreation and tourism.

“The State Government will continue to advocate for a healthy river system as we approach a critical time for implementation of the Plan ahead of a review in 2026.”

Despite improvements, challenges remain, particularly in the southern Coorong, and sustained actions, operations and additional investment are required to secure long-term environmental outcomes.

Three-car collision at Middleton

A Goolwa man and woman were involved in a three-way collision at Middleton following a police pursuit last Wednesday.

At 9pm on June 11, a white Holden Commodore sedan was detected travelling at the extreme speed of 146 km/h in a 60 km/h zone at Port Elliot Road.

Another patrol then picked up the vehicle in Goolwa as it did a U-turn and activated its lights and sirens, however, the driver refused to pull over.

The pursuit was terminated as the Commodore entered the 100 km/h zone on the Port Elliot Road, heading back towards Middleton.

A couple of minutes later, police located a three-car crash at the intersection of Port Elliot Road and Boettcher Road, and requested emergency services.

A 41-year-old man, who was the alleged driver of the Commodore, sustained serious injuries and was taken to hospital.

One of the other drivers, a 65-year-old Goolwa South woman, also sustained injuries when her Land Rover rolled and was taken to hospital for treatment.

Fortunately, their injuries are not considered life-threatening.

The third driver, a 35-year-old Goolwa North man, whose vehicle was clipped was uninjured.

All three vehicles were towed from the scene.

Investigations are continuing, with the offending motorist expected to be charged with multiple driving offences.

Urgent heater safety warning for winter

An increase in heater-related fires has sparked a warning from authorities for residents to check their winter appliances and use them safely around the home.

The Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) has attended 11 incidents across the state this year, resulting in around \$1.1 million of damage, compared to eight fires linked to electric or gas heaters, combustion heaters and fireplaces at the same time last year.

In 2024, MFS and Country Fire Service (CFS) crews attended a total 47 related blazes – an increase of more than 50 per cent on the previous year, with 31 incidents recorded.

South Australians are urged to have their combustion heaters, flues and chimneys professionally inspected and cleaned at least once a year – timed for the start of the cold weather – to keep them in good working order and avoid embers sparking a fire.

“We know heaters are one of the most common causes of house fires so preparation around the home is key as temperatures drop,” Emergency Services Minister, Emily Bourke, said.

“A check of winter appliances can help

prevent a blaze that risks the safety of your family, your neighbours and fire crews who respond.

“Correct installation, maintenance and use of equipment, paired with a working smoke alarm, will help save lives and prevent devastating consequences.”

Other heater safety tips include:

- Keeping combustible items like clothes, bedding, furniture and curtains well-clear of heaters – ideally a minimum of two metres.
- If clothes need to be dried inside, using a clothes airer in a room with no heater but a good air flow.
- Ensuring any heating equipment is installed by a qualified tradesperson and regularly maintained.
- Following the manufacturer’s instructions.
- Checking for signs of wear and tear before use and replacing as needed.

Pair arrested over White Hill break-in

A local pair were arrested last Sunday for breaking into a shipping container and shed at White Hill.

At 10.50am on June 8, the home owners discovered a vehicle on their property along with a man and woman who had broken into a shipping container and were attempting to break into a shed.

A generator had been removed along with a box of toys from the container.

The quick-thinking owners blocked the driveway to prevent the suspects from leaving the address and called police.

A 19-year-old Murray Bridge woman and 34-year-old Langhorne Creek man were arrested and have been charged with serious criminal trespass and theft.

They will appear before Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on August 4.

Health care in regional South Australia

The recent coronial findings into the tragic and preventable death of Mrs Kathleen Salter at Clare are deeply distressing and I offer my sincerest sympathies to her family.

Mrs Slater’s passing, after what should have been routine gall bladder surgery, underscores a glaring gap in our regional health system – access to critical diagnostic tools.

Deputy State Coroner Naomi Kereu’s recommendation that CT cholangiograms be made available at all regional hospitals where elective gall bladder surgeries occur is both sensible and urgent.

This is not simply about technology – it is about equity.

People living in regional communities deserve access to the same standard of healthcare as those in metropolitan areas.

Too often regional hospitals operate without the tools that could save lives and prevent avoidable harm.

In 2025, this disparity is unacceptable and the coronial findings are a wake-up call for the State Government.

I urge the Health Minister to act swiftly on the Coroner’s recommendation and equip our regional hospitals with the diagnostic technology they need, starting with CT cholangiograms to ensure that no more families endure such a devastating loss.

Not over yet

Out and about on the weekend at the Finnis sheepdog trials, the talk, other than about the competition, was how welcome the rain has been, but that while our region has fared better than some, the drought is not yet over.

The current drought has been declared the worst in living memory in large swathes of the state, with many farmers going to the brink.

With recent rain, local paddocks are turning the colour of green, but while it looks great to outside eyes, there’s a bit more to it than just having enough grass for the land to look green.

Grain growers and livestock producers will need both more, steady rain and warm conditions for optimal growing conditions.

As FPAG Livestock Manager Michael Quirk says, rain will need to continue beyond winter given the ongoing shortage of hay available in South Australia and Victoria.

Member of Finnis David Basham says the price of hay, for many, is well-above the normal, pre-drought price of \$200 a tonne.

He says it is even more difficult for those farmers who need to access hay that is high in nutrition, including dairy farmers.

Mr Quirk also said prior to the recent rain, the region was in “dire straits”, meaning he worked through the busiest period of his 15-year career for all the wrong reasons, with farmers choosing to totally or partially destock due to the lack of water and feed, and escalating costs.

It is his conservative estimate that between 30 to 40 per cent of stock in the region has been sold off compared to usual.

The next challenge, should conditions improve to a point where the drought has been broken, will be a rebuild, and that too will be costly, with the possibility of higher prices for new stock compared to for what they sold for.

But most of all, we need Mother Nature to play her part.

Continued growth a challenge for regional ED

The Southern Fleurieu Health Service's Emergency Department (ED) upgrade has taken so long it will barely cope with increased growth across the region – even if it opens this year.

That's the prediction by Member for Finnis David Basham who believes the works will take at least until the end of 2025, despite the local health network CEO saying it's on track for an August completion.

"I keep being told it is on schedule, (but) I drive past it on a daily basis and there is still about a third of the roof and significant external walls not there," Mr Basham said.

"To get it to a lock-up stage, and then a fully equipped stage, two months doesn't seem like long enough.

"It is literally two years late, as when it was first announced its completion date was mid-2023.

"It is hugely necessary, but sadly, the growth that is occurring down here – the growth predictions of what were considered for the new ED in the papers – we are going to pass that this year, so we are going to be effectively at full capacity the day it opens."

The upgrades will deliver 12 treatment bays, three emergency short stay unit beds, two emergency resuscitation beds, two consulting rooms, and one low stimulus room.

The project is funded through both state and federal agreements, with a combined total budget of \$16.825 million – a 2023 revised total due to unforeseen budget pressures related to the impacts of COVID and an escalation in construction costs.

Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network (BHFLHN) CEO Bronwyn Masters said a range of key milestones have already been achieved in the new ED, with an existing

building demolished, concrete slabs laid and construction of the steel frame, roofing, internal well framing, façade and external walls completed.

"Upcoming works include glazing, sewer, internal linings, and external works at the entrance," Ms Masters said.

"As with any major refurbishment, especially where demolition of old buildings are required, there have been some minor adjustments which have been managed well by the project team."

Despite his concerns, Mr Basham is looking forward to having a larger ED to service the Fleurieu region.

However, he called for a full assessment into the hospital's ability to cater for the growing regional population.

"It is going to give the people of Goolwa a better, faster service by having a significantly improved ED," Mr Basham said.

"The government has projected significant urban growth at north Goolwa and also new parts of Victor Harbor that are earmarked for growth, so is the hospital going to meet those needs? I highly doubt it.

"It is going to be a challenge to have the increased population come and then manage that without an increase in hospital size."

The ED upgrade has also meant a new helipad at the hospital was unable to be used.

Ms Masters said helicopters are currently unable to access the hospital grounds due to the helipad's proximity to the construction site.

"There is a risk of building materials becoming projectiles if a helicopter was to land while construction is taking place, potentially impacting nearby homes and businesses," she said.

The BHFLHN has access to Victor Harbor Hockey Club grounds on weekdays and at night, and Investigator College during weekend daylight hours for air retrievals, while the upgrade takes place.

Strath icon Snowy turns 90

On June 4, the popular Strathalbynite Kevin Snow – widely known as 'Snowy' – celebrated his 90th birthday.

Snowy was the first of 11 children, and he and four others were given their mother's surname, and were raised as a family together.

More recently, they discovered another six of their siblings had been adopted out.

Kevin's childhood in Adelaide was rather an anxious one.

His mother was a live-in housekeeper for his stepfather and it was always a struggle to make ends meet.

Kevin attended the Prospect Primary School until grade six and in the latter couple of years he would get out of bed at about 4.30am and help the local milkman until about 8am, and then go off to school.

When his stepfather died suddenly in 1948, Kevin, at the age of 13, was now the man of the house.

Although the official school leaving-age was 14, Kevin obtained an exemption and left early to help support the family.

For the next several years, the family lived in a multitude of places, wherever they could find cheap accommodation, including Goolwa, Finnis, Strathalbyn, Sandergrrove, Willyaroo and Langhorne Creek.

Kevin was doing whatever work he could find, including farmwork, milk deliveries, builder's labouring, and at the Strathalbyn chaff mill.

While living at Finnis, he used to ride his bike to Strathalbyn for work every day.

He had a lucky break in 1957 when he got a regular job with the Highways Department at the age of 22.

Kevin's mother died in 1959 at the age of only 47.

Until 1948, Kevin had never had time for sport or the Methodist Church.

Some well-meaning friends persuaded him to have a go.

He joined the church, acquired a racquet, and soon got hooked, playing for the Methodist Club on the courts on Commercial Road.

In 1980 Kevin was appointed a Life Member of the Methodist Tennis Club – possibly the club's first.

He pioneered the junior tennis program back in 1966 and many of those juniors fondly remember him to this day.

In 1985 Kevin's services to tennis were recognized by the Strathalbyn District Council when he was presented with the 1985 Citizen of the Year Award at a special function in the Town Hall, and in 1998 and 1999 he was presented with a 'SA Senior Volunteer of the Year Award' by Australia's former Wimbledon champion Evonne Goolagong-Cawley.

He has been a great asset to the town over many years and still has a minor role with the tennis club.

Cr quits over 'dysfunctional' chamber

A former Mount Barker District Council elected member who recently resigned claimed the chamber had become "increasingly dysfunctional".

Narelle Hardingham formally resigned on June 3, describing it as an incredibly difficult decision made after "careful consideration" for her personal wellbeing and professional integrity.

"I was elected... with a genuine desire to connect the community with council and contribute to thoughtful, community-focused decision-making," she said.

"Over time, however, I found the council chamber had become increasingly dysfunctional.

"The behaviour of some elected members, and what I viewed as a lack of meaningful leadership in addressing that behaviour, created an unhealthy and unproductive environment I no longer could be part of."

Councillor Hardingham was first elected to represent the North Ward in 2018, then elected for the South Ward in 2022.

She is the third outgoing councillor during this term, and her departure will trigger a supplementary election.

The supplementary election to replace Sally Harding cost about \$55,000 – a cost that "weighed heavily" on Ms Hardingham.

"But in the end, I had to prioritise my health, peace of mind, and the ability to continue to work with my community, just from outside the chamber now," she said.

Deputy Mayor Samantha Jones also recently announced her resignation during a council meeting, also citing concerns with behaviour within the chamber, but afterwards decided to stay.

Mayor David Leach said all concerns relating to behaviour and workplace culture are taken seriously, and any matters raised by elected members are addressed through legislated and council-established procedures and policies, and that a decision

to resign is "never made lightly".

"Council meetings involve robust debate, but it must always be underpinned by respectful conduct," he said.

"Supporting the health and wellbeing of elected members is a key priority.

"We remain committed to fostering a respectful and inclusive environment that enables councillors to serve effectively and with confidence.

"As we look ahead, council remains focused on working together to serve our community with integrity, collaboration, and commitment to respectful decision-making."

Council members have access to Council's Employee Assistance Program (EAP) for the length of their term and for up to 12 months after they no longer hold office.

"The nature of public office has changed significantly in recent years," Mayor Leach said.

"While increased transparency through live-streamed meetings and social media has enhanced community engagement, it has brought heightened criticism and pressures that some members of council find challenging."

Mayor Leach thanked all councillors for their contributions.

Ms Hardingham added that her resignation is no reflection on council staff, who she respected for their "professionalism, integrity and commitment to serving the district".

"I've also been genuinely heartened by the many community members and local groups who have reached out thanking me for the work I've done, the issues I've advocated for and the way I've represented their concerns in council," she said.

"That feedback has been incredibly meaningful and has reminded me why I first put my hand up to initially."

She thanked everyone who supported her.

"(Their) trust, encouragement, and honest conversations have meant so much," she said.

"While I'm stepping away from this role, I remain passionate about our district and will continue to contribute in other ways."

Growing a stronger future at Monarto

An annual planting festival in Monarto is growing, with this year’s goal of planting 58,000 seedlings across 29 hectares with the help of 850 volunteers – a 20 per cent increase from last year.

Hosted by Bio R, an ecological restoration charity, the annual festival takes place over weekends in June at Frahns Farm, a crown land site.

It’s part of at least a 100-year, intergenerational project to rebuild the biodiversity of the area and reinstate complex habitats, with this year more than 200 different native species being planted.

The site is in a rain shadow which, while

offering drier planting days for volunteers, can present a challenge for the plants.

To overcome this hurdle, seedlings are planted in a saucerpan shape with a barrier built on the lower side of the slope to capture more rainfall as it rolls down the hill.

The festival aims to halt the decline in woodland bird species, as well as support insects, birds, reptiles and small mammals, with shorter term solutions such as nesting boxes, and longer-term food and habitat.

“(Their loss) has a huge domino effect – not only in that ecosystem but it will affect us at the top of the food chain and our way of life,” Bio R Marketing and Communications, Blair Wickham, said.

Bio R aims to connect with the next generation through school programs, with Mr Wickham quoting David Attenborough: ‘No one will protect what they don’t care about, and no one will care about what they

haven’t experienced’.

The planting strategy is well-researched, including by monitoring local populations and finding new ways to increase the survivability of plants.

For example, a large herbivore enclosure sufficiently and more cost-effectively protects the plants rather than having individual guards.

The Bio R Planting Festival is running for the next two weekends, with 200 helpers last weekend, and more than 300 who are rolling up their sleeves across this Saturday and Sunday.

“It’s very, very inspiring when you get out there and see how enjoyable it is,” Mr Wickham said.

“It feels good giving back, it’s a great day out and a lot of people come back every year and bring their family and friends.”

Opposition calls on investigation into algal bloom

The increasing threat of the ongoing algal bloom crisis along the state’s coastlines has a local MP calling for an independent investigation into the response to occurrence.

Since the harmful algal bloom was first detected in March, it has caused the death of marine life across the state, prompting concerns from both locals and ecologists who fear it may become a yearly occurrence if the cause is not investigated and determined.

Following the latest detection in the Coorong’s north lagoon and Lower Murray River, Shadow Minister for Environment and Member for Finnis David Basham has written to Deputy Premier Susan Close

asking for an investigation that reports and assesses the response to the toxic algal bloom as a “matter of priority” to ensure the government is doing everything it can to prevent more blooms in the future.

“We are calling for an independent review into the response to this disaster so that we determine the exact cause and ensure that we’re doing everything we can to prevent more algal blooms in the years to come,” he said.

“Locals, in both my electorate and beyond, have been incredibly frustrated at the lack of information about the health and environmental impact of the algal bloom.

“If the Environment Minister is

suggesting this won’t be the last time we see an algal bloom like this occur, then we need to do everything we can to learn from this incident and improve the response next time.

“Any review must be independent of government departments to ensure the public get the answers they deserve.”

As part of the investigations, Mr Basham believes the nutritional load the algal bloom is thriving on should be looked at more closely.

“From my discussion with some scientists and people around the place, there is very much a thought that probably the flood that occurred a couple of years ago brought a large nutritional load down

the River Murray and deposited it out on the sea floor, and, as it settled and through the environmental conditions we have had over the last few months, that has lifted that off the sea floor to let the algal bloom blossom,” he told *The Southern Argus*.

“The scientists that I have spoken to said probably the easiest thing to minimise this happening in the future is to manage the nutrition load coming down the River Murray by changing practices up the river to stop nitrogen, phosphorus and other things getting in the water stream, so it doesn’t end up out in the sea or out here in the channel, where we are also seeing a different variety of algal bloom as well at the moment.”

This year's Finnis event was changed to June to avoid clashing with a trial at Birdwood at Easter.

Sixty-six dogs were entered across three divisions – Novice, Improver and Open.

Organiser Simone Cross was "quite overwhelmed" with the entries received.

"We had one guy come from Victoria – Michael Deppler – and then most of the other competitors were from all over South Australia, including Tom Joyce from Mullaquana Station near Whyalla, and a couple of competitors from Cleve," she said.

"Apart from it being cold, I think it actually worked for people because this time of the year you are looking for something to do.

"There were some really good scores... to get into the Open final you needed to have a score of 83 out of 100, so that was amazing.

"The standard was really high across all classes, which was really good."

At the trials participants start with 100

points and then lose them as they go around the course, with the dog steering sheep through obstacles and corridors.

Points can be lost, for example, at any of the four obstacles, going outside designated corridors, leaving sheep too far behind or too far in front, or for not getting on with the job.

Dogs can be disqualified for crossing, or biting or doing something that jeopardises the sheep.

"At the end of the day the aim is to get those sheep into the pen, which is the final obstacle," Mrs Cross said.

"The handlers are very much aware of the condition of their dog, but they also have to

make sure the welfare of the sheep is taken into account and that is part of the judge's role – to make sure the handler is looking after the sheep and also the dog.

"At the end of the day we are borrowing sheep from a local farmer and the last thing we want is for those sheep to be mistreated in any way."

This year's sheep were supplied by Steve Eckert.

Results in the Novice saw Cleve residents Jennifer Horne and dog Frank win, Tom Joyce and Sambo finish second, and Anna Doecke third with dog Jenny.

The Improver was taken out by Tom Joyce with Sambo, Anna Doecke was second with

Jenny, and Mike Deppler third with Punch.

In the Open Anthony Ireland and Banjo won, Stefan Cross and Lady finished second, and Tom Joyce and Callie third.

Winners receive a small cash prize and bags of Hypro Dog Food.

Following the Finnis trial, the South Australian team to compete at the Supreme Australian Working Sheepdog Championships in WA in August was announced – Tom Joyce and Sammy, Anthony Ireland and Byn, and Stefan Cross with Lady.

After months of drought conditions, recent rainfall across the region has offered livestock producers a glimpse of hope while still facing a long road to recovery.

FPAG Livestock Manager Michael Quirk – who has worked in the Fleurieu for the past three years following Mount Gambier – believes the heavy rains over the long weekend turned a corner in the industry by easing some concerns from farmers.

“Two weeks ago, we hadn’t really had a start (to the rain season),” he said.

“Some areas that rely purely on dam water were still in full sell mode, but the rain will give them confidence that they can keep a few more (livestock).

“It changed peoples’ mindsets overnight.”

While the region looks green, Mr Quirk hopes rain continues beyond winter due to

lack of hay available in South Australia and Victoria, and believes farmers will have to wait until September or October for feed.

If zero was a starting point in terms of measuring recovery, Mr Quirk said the region is currently at “minus 50” as “it’s just so dry.”

“There’s not a lot of substance in that green grass for those first period... it’s nearly half water,” he said.

“When it’s not very long – the cattle especially – wait, they chase that bit of green grass and spend so much time looking around looking for the fresh pick, and burn off just as much energy.”

Prior to the recent rain, Mr Quirk was described the local situation as “dire straits”, working through the busiest period in his 15-year career for all the wrong reasons, as many farmers chose to totally or partially destock due to lack of water, feed, and associated costs.

Up until recently, he was getting many calls from farmers who desperately needed hay. Those calls are still coming through, but have eased.

Primary producers to hobby farmers were

“hurting pretty bad”, selling off many animals that would have ordinarily been kept.

His conservative estimate is that 30 to 40 per cent of stock in the region has now been sold off compared to usual.

Older cattle, such as grown cows, steers and heifers, were typically sold and did so for a good price, worth more dollars per kilo than lightweight heifers who also eat less.

However, now cows that would have calved are now out of the system, farmers will need to rebuild over the next 12 months or so – depending on if rain continues through spring – and stock will likely need to be bought back at a higher price.

Mr Quirk explained that the market was delivering high prices for 2021-22, while 2023-24 was “pretty ordinary”, and it has started to lift again. Analysts are predicting prices could return to the peak of 2021-22.

The fluctuations of the livestock market typically aren’t seen by shoppers, with many supermarkets and butchers being forward-sold meat at a certain price.

Six-week window for farmers

It could be six weeks before local farmers are able to declare the current drought – the most severe in recorded history – over.

That's the prognosis from former dairy farmer turned Member for Finnis David Basham.

"To me this is a really hard time for farmers because people in the towns and cities look out and see things starting to go green because it has rained and think 'well, that's fixed the problem,'" Mr Basham said.

"But the challenge is that it will be another five to six weeks, if things go well, before farmers will have enough feed on their farms to feed livestock without buying feed in, so it is actually this period that is really tough.

"We saw last weekend the Need for Feed hay donations delivered (but) it is just a drop in the ocean for what is actually needed, and the sheer challenge of actually sourcing hay has become almost undoable.

"We are seeing road trains coming from Western Australia with hay, but the cost of doing so is so high – we are talking what normally would be delivered on farm for \$200 a tonne being closer to \$1000 a tonne."

Mr Basham said farmers are having to find significant money each week to meet the needs of livestock.

"As a dairy farmer in my previous life, in the Millenium drought we milked about 450 cows and used two-and-a-half semi-loads of hay a week," he said.

"There is no high nutrient hay anywhere to be found locally, and when I say locally, I am saying SA, Victoria and NSW.

"Western Australia and QLD are the only sources, and both are nearly as far away in

transport."

While more rain is needed, so is the need for warmer weather.

"We need some sunny days to help make it grow, so it is a real challenge and is not by any means an instant fix," Mr Basham said.

"The drought support that has been offered by the government, there are some good bits in there, and supporting the fodder to get that into SA that is a great outcome, but the long-term parts of the package, where farmers have to put up their 50 per cent share to get a grant, that is almost worse than having nothing offered.

"You can have it if you can find the money... well, farmers don't have the money at the moment – they can't invest in the next drought and won't be able to for a fair while."

He encouraged all residents who know a farmer to reach out.

A Bureau of Meterology spokesperson said more rain is expected for the region, which aligns with Mr Basham's predictions, but this is yet to be determined.

"The current weekly rainfall forecasts show below-average rainfall is likely for the Fleurieu region during June 21 to 27, and during June 28 to July 4," the spokesperson told *The Southern Argus*.

"There is no strong push towards above or below-average rainfall for the Fleurieu region for July overall.

"This is not a guarantee of near average rainfall for July.

"A range of outcomes from drier than average through to wetter than average are possible.

"Temperatures are likely to be higher than average across the Fleurieu region for the end of June and the month of July."



Dairy farmers have been hit with another blow, with concerns raised over milk prices announced by major processors for the next financial year.

Another blow for dairy farmers

Concerns have been raised over the milk prices announced by major processors for dairy farmers for the upcoming financial year.

While a handful of local processors have maintained healthy pricing, the South Australian Dairyfarmers' Association (SADA) is concerned the very modest increases offered by many major processors will fail to address the significant increases in feed and business costs experienced by all dairy farmers in this time of severe drought.

"Maintaining a fair and sustainable farmgate price is essential to ensure farmers can continue producing high-quality milk without threatening their viability," SADA President and Mount Compass dairy farmer, Robert Brokenshire, said.

"While we recognise that all stages of the supply chain are experiencing

increased cost pressures, we're calling on processors and retailers to reassess their opening prices over the coming weeks.

"Without sustainable farmgate prices, processors risk losing access to local milk supply, and without that, they don't have a business either."

Mr Brokenshire added that this year has already proven to be one of the most challenging years on record for dairy farmers.

"The ongoing effects of inflation, particularly on input prices, have made the business environment more difficult," he said.

"When combined with the driest two years on record in most dairying regions, the situation has become dire for many of our farmers."

SADA urges a more collaborative approach between farmers and processors to address these challenges.

"The town has been amazing.

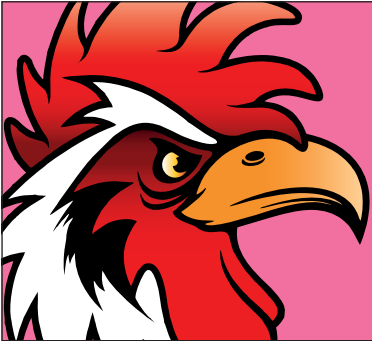
"Before the match a lot of the town donated online,

Magpies no match for the Hawks




It had been four weeks since the Hawks played a home game, and last Saturday they hosted Goolwa Port Elliot in the final round of the first half of the Great Southern Football League season. After a very dry start to the year, local rain gauges have recorded around 70 mm since the last match, much to the delight of farmers. Despite the rain, the oval surface was in excellent condition. The Hawks won the toss and kicked to the southern end with a light breeze at their backs. Rain threatened, but the match began in dry conditions. At the first bounce, the Hawks' Cates took on Goolwa's Bottroff in the ruck. The home side hit the scoreboard first through Howell, who soccered the ball through for a major. Both teams looked rusty early, missing targets with handballs and kicks. H. Bruce added the Hawks' second goal from a tight angle, and the Creek began to dominate play, especially on the eastern wing. Further goals to L. Bates, Kellock and Hall had the Goolwa defence under pressure.

Just before the break, Payne slotted Goolwa's first and only goal of the quarter, although earlier missed opportunities proved costly. The visitors regrouped in the second term and opened with two quick goals - Norman converting a McKinley pass before the latter goaled himself shortly after. However, Kellock responded with two goals in quick succession for the Hawks. Goolwa won more of the clearances early in the quarter, with Norman proving a strong target up forward and lwao displaying his class around the ground. The Hawks' defence, led by Derham and the Bruce brothers, held firm. The quarter became a shootout, with both sides booting five goals, but the Hawks maintained a 21-point buffer at half-time. Light rain fell at the start of the third quarter, resulting in more congested play with frequent stoppages. With visibility deteriorating, the oval lights were switched on. The Hawks adapted better to the slippery


conditions, controlling the quarter but squandering several chances, finishing with 2.5. Goolwa, under increasing pressure, were held scoreless. Frustrations boiled over, and a Hawk player was sent from the field for five minutes. By the final break, the Hawks had extended their lead to 40 points. The final quarter was all Langhorne Creek. Although Goolwa added seven behinds, poor accuracy and a resolute Hawks defence denied them a goal. The Hawks capitalised at the other end, slotting six more majors through Stirling, Howell, H. Bruce, Dalitz and the impressive Kellock - who finished with seven goals in a dominant performance. As the match ended, the rain finally cleared, with Langhorne Creek running out 71-point winners. At the halfway mark of the season, both clubs have struggled to build momentum. The Hawks sit with two wins, just above Goolwa on the ladder, who have managed only one. Both sides will be looking to turn their fortunes around in the second half of the season.

Athlete set for international championship

After a lifetime of dressage competitions, Strathalbyn's Noella Angel has traded horse reins for ice hockey sticks after an accident redirected her sports career, and she is already set for an international championship.

The 32-year-old was selected for Australia's first women's para ice hockey team and is preparing to compete in the upcoming inaugural Women's Para World Championships.

Angel is no stranger to paving new pathways across her life, with a passionate aim of making the road easier for those who follow in her footsteps.

Her life has proved to be one of resilience as she continually makes comebacks after facing hurdles.

She was born with Klippel-Trenaunay Syndrome, which is a rare condition involving malformed veins from her waist to her toes.

The condition also affects her bones, muscles and tendons.

Being so rare, the condition took five years to be diagnosed – including a televised appeal by her family, which connected her to a handful of others across Adelaide.

She then spent more than a decade travelling back and forth from the United States before treatment was available in Australia.

In 2022 at 30-years-old, she made the decision to amputate her right leg.

Horse riding and dressage became one of her biggest passions competing since about 10-years-old and reaching international heights. Her mum Kathy owns The Riding Patch in Strathalbyn.

When she started, she was among just a few para riders in the state, and now the sport has grown to a couple of dozen.

Last year, a friend in the UK offered Angel horses to ride on and she competed overseas.

But, a fall off a horse led to her breaking her right leg – the third in that spot – and made her reassess her future in a sport that had grown to be her identity.

Fixing it again would be uncertain, and she could potentially lose her leg from the hip-joint.

Now, she's using a crutch and undergoing rehabilitation and building up strength.

"I'm meant to be giving up horse riding, but it's been such a thing of my life... how do you give up half of your identity?," she questioned.

"It's a hard one, and it's hard to be around it."

Not long before she had broken it, she had just learned how to walk off her crutches for the

first time in her life.

"It was an amazing feeling... so I don't want to lose that," Angel said.

But, the self-described competitive athlete needed an outlet, and that is how para ice hockey stepped in, being her "saving grace".

After attending a couple of come and try days in Melbourne, Angel joined the Adelaide team after it formed in 2021.

Her horse-riding easily converted to the sport, knowing how to turn and use the whole body, including through balance, core, stability and being ambidextrous.

Para ice hockey offered more physical security, as the sport is played sitting in a sled and her leg is protected by a capsule.

"You set us on the ice and we are the same as everyone else," she said.

"The playing field gets levelled very quickly."

She will soon join the Australian squad in the 2025 Women's World Championships in Slovakia in August, and is crowdfunding for her expenses through the Australian Sports Foundation website.

Angel hopes the championship solidifies women's para hockey on the international stage and carves a pathway for the 2030 Paralympics.

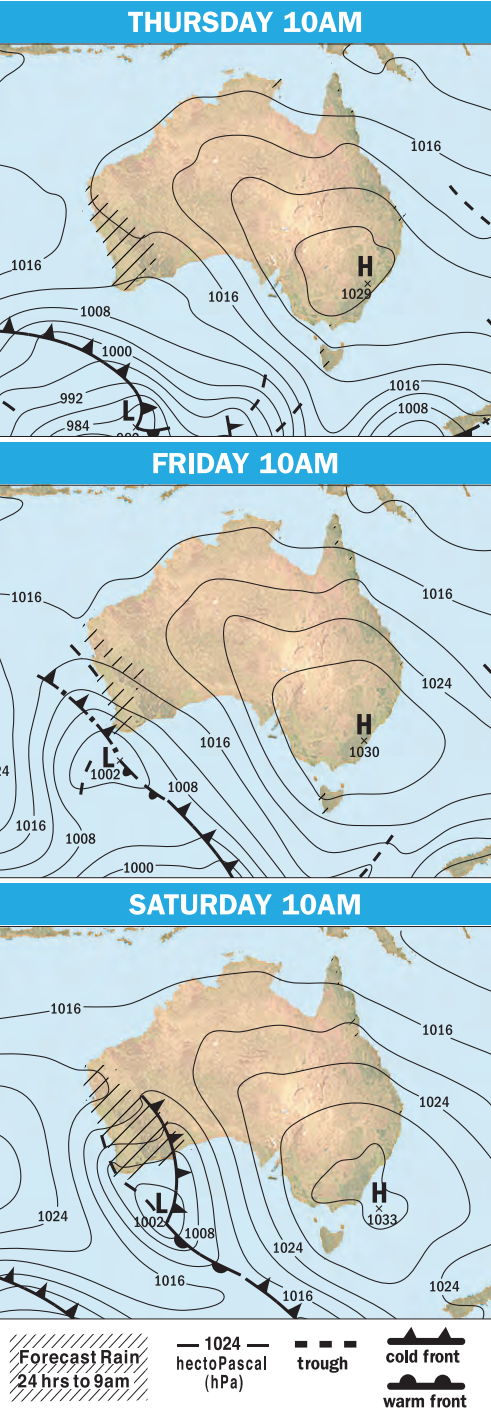
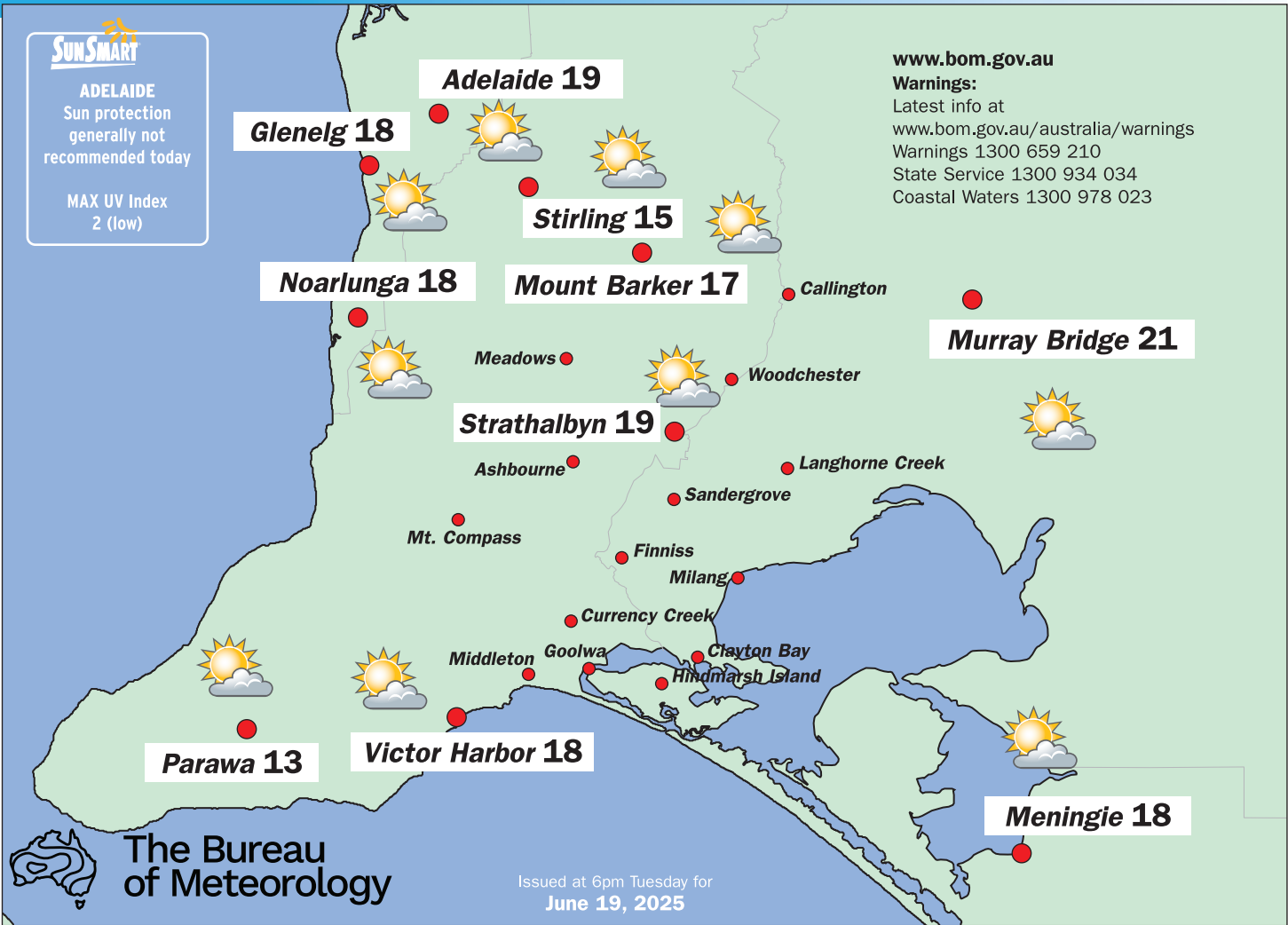

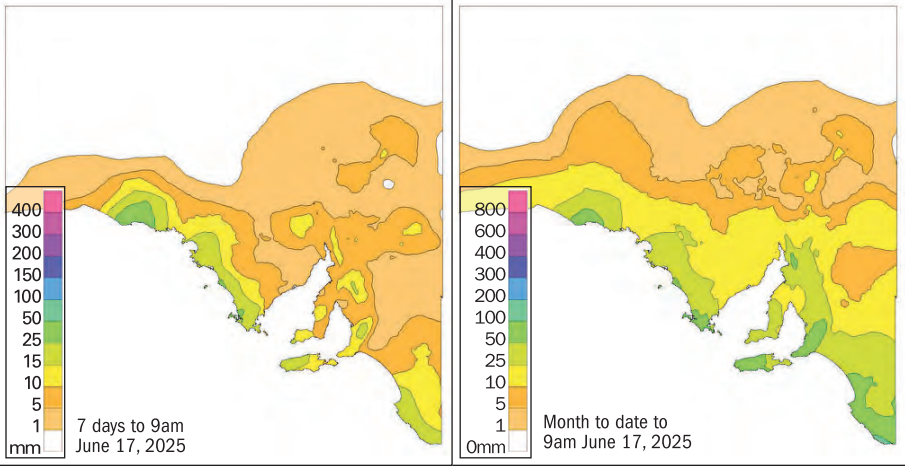
