Mount Compass has been named in the top five locations for kangaroo collisions in SA, sparking safety calls from local advocates.

Car crashes with kangaroos continue to skyrocket in SA, with RAA Insurance and towns are worst for kangaroo crashes, by Goolwa-based not-for-profit Wildlife

receiving more than 2100 claims in the past year - a 44 per cent jump on the same period two years ago - which is likely due to the state's lack of rainfall bringing the marsupials towards the road in search of food.

RAA has also revealed which su

Mount Compass recorded 64 collisions and ranked fourth in the state, with Victor Harbor ranking 10th with 40 accidents.

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

Creative individuals living in the Hills Fleurieu region or interstate are invited to apply for Mount Barker District Council's new artists-in-residence program at the historic Three Brothers Arms Hotel in Macclesfield.

The six-month pilot program 'Make Believe Dream Create' offers artists the opportunity to base themselves in a picturesque, self-contained studio at the oldest pub in the Adelaide Hills while they work on their latest projects.

Council Arts Officer Sally Hardy said the program was a unique opportunity for artists to be inspired by Macclesfield's beauty, history and charm in a dedicated creative space at no cost.

"Being a professional artist is not for the faint-hearted – on one hand, you need the discipline to produce great art on a regular basis and on the other, you're running a business and managing everything that comes with that," she said.

"By offering the studio rent-free, we're removing a layer of financial pressure, and providing artists with their own space where they have the mental and physical room to embark on a new artistic endeavour or the next stage of an existing project."

Make Believe Dream Create is the latest council-led initiative aimed at creating a strong and sustainable arts sector in Mount Barker.

It will run from August 2025 until January 2026, and offer residences of two, four and six weeks to emerging, mid-career and professional artists across Australia working in any art form.

"We're excited to see the calibre of artists who

apply for this rare opportunity, and our goal is to see this pilot program evolve with residencies offered in different townships across our district in coming years," Ms Harding said.

"The importance of creating opportunities for professional artists to practice their art and be visible to the community can't be underestimated.

"It's a vital conduit for connection, shared experience and belonging, and that's what builds a strong community."

Applicants living outside the council area

will need to demonstrate their project has a connection with the Mount Barker district.

Artists are also required to work from the studio at least three days a week and provide local residents with an opportunity to engage with their work once their residency ends.

Applications for the program are simple and close at midnight on Sunday, July 20.

Town Hall sustains water damage

Recent heavy rain caused minor water damage to the Strathalbyn Town Hall.

The issue was caused by gutters overflowing due to a build-up of debris, which blocked the water flow, and has been addressed with minor repairs to the internal painting.

Scaffolding was set up last week to safely clean the gutters, removing any build-up and preventing future damage to the hall.

This is not the first time the hall has experienced issues.

In 2023, works uncovered contaminants of mercury and lead in the roof void, potentially from the storage of old cinema equipment and batteries.

And more recently, in 2024, the builder overseeing the works - Stride Construction - stopped work at the site.

The latest damage won't cause delays to the hall's 'soft opening' in July.

Calls for speed limit review

Calls have been made for a reduced speed limit on a "thoroughfare to the south", sparked by safety concerns from community members.

Wistow Community Association is advocating for a reduced speed limit and installation of a traffic island along Wellington Road, which runs through the town's centre and has heavy traffic of commuters between Strathalbyn to Mount Barker.

The strip between Long Valley Road and Paech Road - that also includes a bus stop and several shops – is currently

'We need to action something fairly quickly - it's a busy road," President, Ken Hutchinson, said.

"It's the thoroughfare to the south, and people from Goolwa, Strath, and Langhorne Creek – it's their thoroughfare to get to the freeway.

A Department for Infrastructure and Transport spokesperson said a recent review found the current speed limit appropriate for the road and traffic conditions.

The review included an analysis of the road development, layout, function, traffic volumes and crash statistics.

"While there are currently no plans to install a pedestrian refuge at this location, we are continually assessing the road network to identify opportunities to improve road safety," the spokesperson said.

"We prioritise improvements on roads with the greatest need, based on a variety of factors including traffic volume, safety, and pavement condition.

"We undertake reviews of speed limits and road conditions as requested from a number of sources including members of the public, local councils, the RAA, SA Police or the heavy vehicle industry."

Hills Interchange upgrade contracts awarded

Contracts have been awarded to deliver \$150 million worth of upgrades to the Mount Barker and Verdun Interchanges, allowing major construction to begin later

South Australian company Bardavcol Pty Ltd has been awarded the contract for the upgrade of the Mount Barker Interchange, while a joint venture between BMD and Leed will undertake the Verdun Interchange upgrade.

The interchange projects aim to improve connectivity to the South Eastern Freeway, and improve the capacity of the interchanges in response to existing and projected growth for Mount Barker and the Adelaide Hills area.

The Mount Barker Interchange will be upgraded to include a new three-lane bridge across the South Eastern Freeway for north-bound traffic, the conversion of the existing bridge to accommodate three lanes of south-bound traffic and a new shared use path, plus improved ramp capacity

and new traffic signals to improve safety.

The project will also include pavement rehabilitation and safety upgrades such as smart lighting, while the existing Verdun Interchange will be upgraded to a full interchange, allowing access to and from

the South Eastern Freeway in both directions to improve connectivity and traffic flow.

It will feature an east-bound entry ramp towards Mount Barker and a new westbound exit ramp, which will cross under the existing west-bound entry ramp and

connect with a new roundabout at Mount Barker Road adjacent to Silver Road.

"These works will provide a muchneeded upgrade to the way Adelaide Hills residents travel," Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Tom Koutsantonis, said.

"We're seeing significant population growth in Mount Barker and surrounding areas, and we need to ensure we have the road infrastructure in place to support this.

"Both of these contractors have a great history delivering significant infrastructure projects in South Australia.

"With these contracts now awarded, we can get on with delivering these projects to make travelling on and off the South Eastern Freeway for locals and tourists much easier and safer."

The project will support approximately 260 full-time equivalent jobs per year during the construction period.

Major construction on the interchanges is expected to begin in late 2025 and be completed by late 2027.





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Mental health support for drought-impacted farmers

A comprehensive \$2.5 million mental health support strategy has been initiated for South Australian communities impacted by the drought.

The Mental Health Support Program forms part of the State Government's \$73 million drought assistance package, which was first announced in November last year and expanded in April.

More than \$1.2 million will be invested in expanding trusted NGO mental health service providers across regional SA, including Centacare (with KWY), Uniting SA, Mind and Skylight, enabling these local services to deliver more support to individuals and groups.

These programs will involve mental health support workers on the ground who will work directly with affected community members.

Referral pathways are also being broadly expanded to ensure these services can be accessed through a range of new and locally established referrers, including Rural Financial Counsellors (via Rural Business Support), Family and Business Support Mentors and local GPs, plus self-referral from July 1.

At least eight men's tables will be formed over the next year – men's mental health, suicide prevention and community-building initiatives that bring together groups of local men so they can build genuine connections over dinner – at a cost of \$200,000, starting with the South East and expanding to at least one in every drought-affected region.

An \$80,000 investment is being made in tools such as ifarmwell – an online

platform developed by farmers for farmers which teaches skills to better cope with stress – while more than \$600,000 is being invested into other wellbeing, resilience and mental health initiatives, including the provision of access to training, support, information and resources for the broader community, as well as Aboriginal and Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) communities.

"Drought doesn't just affect the land, it also affects the health of those living through it," Health Minister, Chris Picton, said.

"This funding will ensure they do not face this burden alone.

"It is so important to meet the communities where they are, putting support directly into these affected regions where it's needed most.

"To anyone who has been affected by these devastating droughts, we see and hear you, and are working to support you."

Targeted support such as counselling and suicide prevention will also be established to help each community's most vulnerable people.

Those needing mental health support or advice can call the Medicare Mental Health Line between 8.30am and 5pm on weekdays at 1800 595 212.

Support is also available 24 hours a day, every day of the year, through Lifeline (131 114) or, for urgent matters, by calling the Emergency Triage Liaison Service on 131 465.

Crown contenders will soon compete for the chance of the title of Strath Rodeo Princess and Strath Junior Cowgirl – the only competition of its kind in South Australia – as a way to encourage women in the sport and be an ambassador for the upcoming local event.

Rodeo Queens are common in the sport's history, acting as an ambassador for the western lifestyle and a role model for younger competitors and spectators.

They present in modest, traditional western outfits, including a cowboy hat, bootcut jeans, long-sleeved, button-down collared shirt, western boots and a sash.

Competitions have dwindled in the sport, with this being the only one available in South Australia.

"I want to bring the opportunity to people locally without having to go for the national title if that's not something they're able or feel like they're ready to do," Host, Belle Styles, said.

Styles, said.
"It's a taster or step in the door for people to give it a go."

Ms Styles is the only South Australian 2025 Australia Rodeo Queen Quest Entrant, leading to her promotion of rodeo and encouragement of others in the sport.

The Monarto rider has been barrel racing on and off for about 10 years, and will compete in the national judging in the Gold Coast in October.

The local competition for Rodeo Princess and Junior Cowgirl will be based on the criteria of interview, sportsmanship, horsemanship and presentation.

Judging will be done by Caitlin Mitchell, who was formerly Miss Rodeo by the Sea, and Olivia Donaldson, who was previously the 2024 Rodeo Queen of Australia Runner-

up, the 2024 Miss Rodeo Horsemanship and the 2024 Australian Rodeo Queen Quest Miss Congeniality, as well as a Strathalbyn Rodeo committee member.

The competition aims to offer an entryway for local riders and to add their participation to their portfolios, with a variety of awards up for grabs.

The winners of the top titles will join Strath Rodeo's grand entry, which is like an opening parade where riders carry flags around a circuit.

They will also need an appropriate horse, capable of carrying the flag and being appropriately calm in the environment.

The upcoming August competition is just prior the local rodeo in November, and will be held in the Strath Rodeo indoor arena.

The competition will also have the Strath Jackpot Barrel Race, which will have divisional winners, ribbons and prize money, which will give competitors more variety on the day.

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Code amendment proposed, leases secured for Wharf Precinct

Community feedback is being sought for a proposed code amendment that aims to better reflect the newly upgraded Goolwa Wharf Precinct's unique character, rich First Nation's heritage, and its important role in the state's riverboat and steam railway history.

Alexandrina Council has proposed an amendment to the State Government's Planning and Design Code to create a 'Goolwa Wharf Subzone' that will foster the community, tourist, cultural and recreational aspirations of the precinct, reinforced by the area's First Nations and historic significance.


This will also enable future alterations – subject to development approval – to enhance current and envisaged land uses and infrastructure.

It comes as council approves the first short-term leases for the precinct.

Council established the Goolwa Wharf Precinct Activation Strategy in July 2023 to create an eclectic, sustainable mixture of tenants.

Stage one of the strategy included a registration of interest from existing tenants, business operators and community groups looking to be part of the precinct after its development, resulting in three tenancies being secured that November, including the Wharf Wine Bar, Cittaslow Goolwa, and Goolwa Visual Arts Group.

Stage two commenced in early 2024 with a focus on attracting new leads and registrations of interest for both the commercial portion of the Wharf Shed and the Customs House site, resulting in a community lease with the Friends of the Oscar W and a commercial one with Imbiss

on the Elbow.

The final elements of the precinct to be resolved include the Old Police Station on Goolwa Terrace, the Old Post Office on Cadell Street and Customs House, which will all rely on a service review following the establishment of a Service Review Framework, as well as three smaller buildings – the Railway Superintendents Cottage, The Chart Room and the Old Morgue – that would benefit from interim activation.

The Railway Superintendents Cottage is already occupied by Alex FM radio station and the Chart Room by Goolwa Visual Arts Group, but the Old Morgue has been vacant due to its lack of basic utilities such as a

toilet, running water, windows, electricity, and no active connections, or public services or utilities.

Administration was approached by Hidden Curiosities during stage two, seeking to activate the Old Morgue as unique pop-up shop with an ever-changing theme, offering quirky, vintage and retro gifts in a setting of "mystery and curiosity".

The business used the space as a weekend pop-up during the recent Wooden Boat Festival and received positive community feedback.

Administration proposed to offer a twoyear lease term for all three businesses for the separate properties, which will provide time for the Service Review Framework to be resolved and the subsequent review to then be taken on Customs House, the Old Police Station and Old Post Office in December .

It will be then implemented across the precinct in 2026/27.

Last Monday night, consent was granted for Chief Executive Officer Andrew MacDonald to negotiate and enter into a lease with Radio Alexandrina Community Broadcasters (Alex FM) for continued occupancy from July 1 to June 30, 2027, at a rent of \$721.68 per annum, with Goolwa Visual Arts Group for continued occupancy from July 1 to June 30, 2027, at a rent of \$500 per annum, and with Hidden Curiosities for a lease from July 1 to June 30, 2027 at a rent of \$1200 per annum.

"I am absolutely delighted that Alex FM have been given a lease longer than one month – they deserve it and I know they'll be really thrilled about it," South Ward councillor, Margaret Gardner, said.

"Also, the Goolwa Visual Arts Group have really enjoyed having the Chart Room.

"They've sold a lot of paintings and photographs, and they too are very happy to have that lease.

"As for Hidden Curiosities, my curiosity has been sparked.

"I am going to have to go find out about this place."

An information drop-in session will be held at Signal Point Experience Centre today for the proposed Goolwa Wharf Code Amendment from 10.30am to 3.30pm.

Strathalbyn couple reminisces on 70 years





"If you hit one, you need to stop and check to see if the kangaroo is okay... and call your wildlife rescue," he said.

"I have seen kangaroos on the side of the road for up to a week, starving, can't move, and digging themselves a hole because they've got broken legs.

"Quite often they need euthanising or need to be checked for a joey because there's quite often one in the pouch at this time of year."

He also encouraged drivers to take extra caution around dawn and dusk, and slow down and drive to conditions, especially around blind corners in rural areas.

Mr Biddle also recommended that drivers brake if they see one and never swerve.

Fleurieu Road Safety Group President Michael Scott found the issue "very serious" and has advocated with Alexandrina Council to erect safety signs in common hotspots.

However, he still find drivers "howling" past.

"They're very hard to see at night – they have wonderful camouflage and absorb our lights very well," Mr Scott said.

"Often one could pass and you could miss that, but there's another one following it that can sometimes cannon into the side of your car.

"And if you add speed, you add another dimension to the whole scenario where your whole car is getting out of control."

Along the stretch of road where he lives, about four dead kangaroos are typically seen on the side of the road, and Mr Scott has counted 45 jumping around in a nearby paddock.

He guessed that a motorbike was recently roaring down the road at more than 160km/h.

RAA Senior Manager of Safety and Infrastructure Charles Mountain also urged drivers to be aware of the heightened risk of kangaroo crashes.

"There is a clear trend that kangaroo collisions are increasing across the state as

more animals come towards busy roads in search of food," he said.

"Kangaroos in particular are unpredictable creatures that can seemingly come out of nowhere and pose a significant safety risk.

"They can also do a lot of damage to your vehicle – from minor damage up to a complete write-off.

"If you're driving in regional areas especially, make sure you're alert to the possibility of animals near the road and drive to the conditions.

"Typically, we see the most crashes occurring in autumn and spring, but with the lack of rainfall in recent months, the numbers for other months have increased as well."

If drivers happen to encounter a kangaroo on the road, brake safely and sound the horn if it's safe to do so, but avoid swerving as that can cause a more serious crash, and put yourself and other road users at even greater risk.

Fatal crash at Meadows

A Mid-North man tragically died after crashing his vehicle into a tree at Meadows in the early hours of Sunday morning.

Sunday morning.
At about 2am, police and emergency services were called to Morris Road following reports a car had collided with a tree.

The Toyota ute driver, a 28-yearold Mid-North man, sustained lifethreatening injuries and was taken to hospital for treatment, but sadly later died.

The driver's death is the 38th life lost on South Australian roads this year.

The passenger, a 47-year-old Meadows man, was seriously injured and remains in hospital.

Morris Road was closed while Major Crash investigators examined the scene.

Young drivers become new face of SAPOL road safety campaign

A new campaign launched on Friday targeting young drivers highlights the life-changing consequences of committing road safety offences.

Last year 81 per cent of drivers who received immediate loss of licence penalties were young drivers aged between 16 and 24 years old.

This new campaign message 'Lost your licence? Sucks to be you' highlights the lifestyle regression young drivers face if they lose their licence.

Becoming a new driver should be a liberating time, but SA Police State Operations Service Assistant Commissioner Ian Parrott says it comes with serious responsibilities.

"If a young driver loses their licence, the excitement of driving themselves to work, sport and social events will go back to relying on parents and public transport again, and that sucks," he said.

"In addition to losing personal freedoms, young drivers should be aware of the risks of causing a loss of life or serious injuries from unsafe driving.

"Sadly, fatal and serious injury crashes resulting from at-fault young drivers is overrepresented in South Australia."

In 2024, young drivers found to be at-fault in crashes caused 11 deaths, making up 12 per cent of all lives lost on the roads, and 100 serious injuries.

Minister for Police Stephen Mullighan said this campaign will send a clear message to young male drivers in particular.

"Young men are overrepresented in serious and fatal crashes which is why this campaign is deliberately targeting that cohort of drivers," he said.

"Getting your driver's licence is an exciting time that gives young people more freedom but it also comes with enormous responsibility.

"Losing a driver's license can have big impacts on a young person's professional and personal life, so I strongly urge drivers to abide by the road rules and take care when driving."

SAPOL to introduce new firearms registry system

A new firearms registry system is expected to enhance efficiency, security and accessibility while also improving the experience for owners, businesses and law enforcement.

South Australia Police (SAPOL) is introducing the South Australia Firearms Register (SAFR).

Its key benefits will include faster processing of digital applications, secure online payments, secure and centralised storage of all digital submissions, enhanced reporting and workload tracking for the firearms branch, and built-in validation.

"SAFR is shaping the future of firearms services in South Australia by delivering a new system," Officer in Charge of the Firearms Branch, Superintendent Lauren Leverington, said.

"Together with our Commonwealth partners, SAPOL aims to elevate safety standards and improve service across the firearms community."

Plans for SAFR include offering 24-hour online access for 15 digitised firearm services for dealers and licence holders, which will expediate application processing and reduce wait times.

Users will also benefit from improved visibility and tracking of their applications. The system anticipated to be operational in mid-2026.

"SAPOL recognises the community's

frustration with the current application processing times," Superintendent Leverington said.

"To address this in the short-term, additional staff have been employed to manage the workload more efficiently."

Licensees who have registered their email address with SAPOL's Firearms Branch will receive an email invitation to complete a survey.

For those who haven't registered, a participation link is available on the SAFR page on SAPOL's website.

"As we develop the new digital system, SAPOL is asking firearm licensees to provide us with feedback on their current user experience," Superintendent Leverington said.

"We encourage all licensees to participate and share their insights to help us improve our services."

Driver caught five times over alcohol limit

An Adelaide driver was caught five times over the legal alcohol limit at Encounter Bay last Tuesday.

At about 7.30pm on June 17, police stopped a vehicle on Mill Road for a mobile driver test, where the driver, a 37-year-old Adelaide man, recorded a blood alcohol reading of 0.252 – more than five times the legal limit.

He was reported for drink driving, issued a 12-month instant loss of licence, and had his vehicle impounded for 28 days.

The man will be summonsed to appear in court at a later date.

Car rolls at Mosquito Hill

Two occupants were in the car, with one woman in her 50s taken to the local hospital with minor injuries.

The road was closed during the incident and reopened about an hour later.

Mount Barker teacher charged with offences

A Cornerstone College Mount Barker teacher has been arrested and charged for alleged child sex offences.

Principal Thomas Brennen wrote to parents last week confirming "with a heavy heart" that a member of the school's teaching staff had been arrested and charged by police with unlawful sexual intercourse with a person in relation to a historical allegation.

No evidence at this stage suggests any currently enrolled students are involved.

"As you know, we take all allegations of this nature extremely seriously," Mr Brennon wrote.

"In accordance with our procedures and duty of care, we reported the matter to the police immediately upon becoming aware of it and are providing them with our full assistance."

The 49-year-old Adelaide Hills man was suspended from his duty pending the outcome of the police investigation and prosecution, and banned from attending the college.

He is expected to face Mount Barker Magistrates Court on July 3.

The school has also launched its own internal investigation, and is offering counselling to students and parents.

"I understand this matter may be unsettling and I want to acknowledge the impact it may have on our community." the letter continued.

"As a Christ-centred community, may we draw upon our faith and unity to navigate this time with compassion, integrity and hope."

Fleurieu Regional Aquatic Centre to be upgraded ahead of birthday

The Fleurieu Regional Aquatic Centre is about to embark on a milestone maintenance project to ensure the long-term future of the popular facility ahead of its eighth anniversary.

After nearly a decade of continuous operation, the pools are due for an important 'health check' and upkeep to optimise operations and ensure the long-term viability

Starting on June 30, Alexandrina Council and the City of Victor Harbor will stagger the closure of the three pools to replace the epoxy coatings and filter media, and inspections and maintenance will be done on the expansion joints.

Both councils and the YMCA are planning to start the maintenance project by closing the hydrotherapy pool, then the children's program pool, and finishing with the 25-metre lap swimming pool.

Work on each pool is expected to take four weeks to complete, barring any unforeseen issues, with the project expected to be completed by October.

Weather, humidity and the ability to dry out the pool areas being worked may affect the timing of works.

YMCA will relocate classes and programs to available pools where possible, ensuring minimal disruption to members and swimming lesson students.

Calls for another season extension

A social success has seen a push for a further extension to the Strathalbyn Pool season.

Ahead of budget deliberations last year, Alexandrina Council heeded local swimmers' calls and agreed to trial a four-week extension to the 2024/25 swimming season to see if the demand was there for additional dates.

The pool season was extended for two weeks in October and in April, garnering more than 800 patrons in that period.

The budget allocated by councillors for the extension was \$30,000, which was allegedly exceeded by approximately \$500.

The Southern Argus understands positive feedback was received from regular morning lap swimmers throughout the extended period

This prompted Lew McMaster, who was among those who originally led the calls for the extension, to request that council grant another extension next season.

"Strathalbyn is a growing, vibrant community with a strong contingent of young families and retired seniors, and the pool benefits both those sectors and inbetween," he said during a deputation at last Monday night's meeting.

"The four-week extension led to a fresh appreciation of the benefits and privilege we have of that pool and the recreation it offers the community.

"We would argue and request council's investment in the pool service to continue because of the social wellbeing benefits it generates and respectfully request council's budget for next financial year be modified to accommodate a further four-week extension to the season to verify results to date."

Mr McMaster, who is a regular lap swimmer himself, claimed the extended season had enabled relationships to be formed between attendees and provided health benefits for some of the town's older residents.

"Medical science experts all concur (pools) have a good benefit, particularly for the senior folk," he said.

"It's a low impact form of exercise that seems to service most of the muscles in the body and the benefits are significant - I've certainly appreciated them.

"One of the outcomes of the four-week extension to season was the emergence of a social critical mass... where you get the right combination of ingredients and you suddenly you get this massive energy release.

"We saw this generate some initiatives I haven't seen before - I've been swimming for 10 years down there - (such as) there was significant upgrade in cohesion and mutual support among the swimmers.

'Some of the positive outcomes (include) caring and nurturing in relationships... that was really comforting, and some folk who are in their senior years often experience loneliness but we're now going out as a group to dinner regularly, supporting one another with birthdays and celebrations, and even the sadder events with bereavement."

Council is expected to deliberate and adopt the 2025/26 Annual Community Plan on July 7.

It is unknown whether a budget for a further extension will be included in it until then.

South Australia leads the way on World Milk Day 1 June 2025

As a proud former dairy farmer and current Member for Finniss, I was honoured to move a motion in the South Australian Parliament last week recognising World Milk Day and celebrating the incredible contribution our dairy industry makes — not just here in the Fleurieu, but right across South Australia and beyond.

Dairy is Australia's third largest rural industry. It produces over 8.3 billion litres of milk each year, contributing around \$6.2 billion to our economy.

There are just under 4,000 dairy farmers across the nation, with more than 31,000 people employed across the sector — from the paddock to the processing plant.

Here in South Australia, we punch well above our weight. Our cows produce more milk per head than any other state — increasing from just under 3,200 litres per cow per year a few decades ago to nearly 7,400 litres annually today. That's a testament to the hard work and innovation of our local farmers and the smart use of technology.

One of the most exciting advances we're seeing is the adoption of robotics in dairy. I recently had the privilege of opening a new robotic dairy in Mount Compass, run by the Jacobs and Hicks families — a fantastic example of how local farms are embracing the future.

Robotic dairies are improving productivity, animal welfare and farmer wellbeing, and they show how our region is leading the nation in innovation.

But dairy is not just about farming it's about health, too. Australians consume an average of 88 litres of milk each year, along with 12.5 kilograms of cheese, 10 kilograms of yoghurt and 3.4 kilograms of butter.

Dairy is a key part of our diet, helping manage osteoporosis and supporting bone health with essential calcium.

Unfortunately, this year's World Milk Day comes at a time of great challenge for our farmers. We're in the grip of a tough drought. I remember well the struggles of the millennium drought — milking 450 cows while feeding entirely with bought-in grain and hav. The situation now is worse. and many are again buying feed just to keep going.

That's why the support of community and organisations like Need for Feed matters so much. I recently joined local farmers at a dinner in Victor Harbor where we acknowledged the delivery of 16 semi-trailer loads of donated hay to the Fleurieu Peninsula. It was a powerful reminder that when times are tough, our communities rally together.

I also want to acknowledge the South Australian Dairvfarmers' Association - a strong voice for our sector over many decades. I pay tribute to past and present leaders including Aub Kretschmer, Alan Manning, Frank Beauchamp, Jeff Wright, John Hunt, and now Robert Brokenshire, as well as long-serving CEOs like David Highed, Adrian Scott, Ken Lyons and Andrew Curtis. Their contribution has helped shape a resilient and futurefocused dairy industry in our state.

Importantly, I thank Adrian Pederick MP for working with me. Together we convinced the Treasurer Stephen Mullighan to respond to the urgent challenges our farmers face, with a \$3 million grant program to support the 42 South Australian dairy farmers affected by the collapse of a major processor. This funding will help them weather the storm and plan for the future.

As we mark World Milk Day, I want to say this: to every dairy farmer, every farm worker, every processor and every person who contributes to this industry — thank you. Your hard work sustains our communities, feeds our families, and underpins our economy.

You make South Australia proud.

Supporting Australia's dairy farmers

I know it's been a difficult period for so many of Australia's proud dairy farmers.

Australia's weather extremes – flooding rain to the north and bone-dry conditions in the south – have made it an incredibly hard time to be on the land.

We've heard from Dairy Australia that almost 44 per cent of Australian dairy farms are currently affected by drought or significantly dry conditions, accounting for just over 44 per cent of Australia's total milk production.

That's why I've made meetings with farmers impacted by these conditions a priority, and why we've prioritised important support for the people Australia relies on.

Most recently, I was in South Australia with the Prime Minister to hear directly from farmers facing drought in that state.

Sadly, we know drought is a case of when, not if, and Australia's changing climate is likely to mean more frequent, longer lasting, and intense droughts in many regions.

Our \$1 billion rural support and drought resilience programs have helped farmers to prepare, adapt and respond to drought and other hardships.

Programs like the Rural Financial Counselling Service and Farm Household Allowance can be the first port of call for dairy farmers who are impacted by drought and flood.

Rural Financial Counsellors live in regional areas, so they know what their clients are dealing with.

I know how important this service is to farmers which is why our government has announced further investments in it, most recently by the Prime Minister in SA.

This financial year, 415 dairy farmers have already been assisted by the Rural Financial Counselling Service across the country.

Farmers can access concessional loans through the Regional Investment Corporation or if relevant their Farm Management Deposits.

It's important we play our part in government to make sure Australia's dairy farmers can get on with the job of farming.

That's why we are undertaking a review of the Dairy Code of Conduct to identify whether updates are needed and ensure the code is operating as intended and remains fit-for-purpose.

We will also keep investing in the future of agriculture and regional communities.

Looking forward, we've committed \$3.5 million to develop a National Food Security Strategy: Feeding Australia.

Our dairy industry will be an important part of the development of this strategy because we know the industry is a key part of Australia's food future.

I know it's been a tough period for so many dairy farmers, but our government will keep backing this proud industry to succeed – now and into the future, in good times and through the challenges.





The club will be starting with its Annual General Meeting (AGM).





Pantry Club able to keep things 'chill' with RAA grassroots grant

A local community pantry has been awarded a grant that has enabled them to purchase their own refrigerator to store perishable items along with essential equipment to reduce volunteers' workload.

Twenty-two local community groups and not-for-profits received grants of up to \$5000 under the latest round of RAA's Grassroots Giving initiative for projects that "make a real difference in South Australia".

Among the recipients is the Macclesfield Community Pantry, which is a weekly food pantry that operates out of the Macclesfield Institute every Monday from 10am to 12-noon.

The group received a \$5000 grant to primarily purchase a refrigerator to keep items picked up on the weekend as fresh as possible before they're handed out on Mondays.

"We applied initially for a significant amount less than the \$5000 because the grants have to be spent on things other than running costs," Macclesfield Community Food Pantry Co-ordinator, Hannah Jewell, explained.

"So, we asked for \$2700 roughly to purchase a commercial refrigerator which would enable us to put the food we collect Saturday and Sunday mornings from Coles Mount Barker via SecondBite into refrigeration prior to Monday's pantry.

"Some things deteriorate a lot more quickly... so, particularly over the last two years when we have been open in summertime, we've been trying to keep food as fresh as possible until Monday either through putting it in a small back fridge we've got in a shed in the rear of the Institute or using the fridge in the main hall

"But the hall gets used by many different user groups, and depending when the hall is hired out or used for the market, we then need to take out all of our refrigerated things from the fridge and freezer to enable them to be used, so it was important to us to have our own space both from the point of view of not disrupting the use of the hall and other areas, reducing the workload on our volunteers if we have to move food, and most importantly, to keep the food as fresh as possible until Monday."

The rest of the money will then be used to purchase a printer and laminator, and for a garden cart to transport goods from the shed to the hall.

"We asked for funding to get a printer

and laminator because we commonly need to print out documents, signs and information for people in terms of other support services, and being able to print with a printer that doesn't belong to a volunteer and using up their own ink etcetera... it would reduce the burden on the volunteers," Ms Jewell said.

'When RAA called us to let us know we had been successful with our grant, they actually said to us 'this is exactly the sort of project or community organisation (they) were trying to support with these sorts of grants' and as such, they were providing us the full \$5000 even if we hadn't asked for it.

'We're investing in some other equipment, for example, a garden cart we can put the boxes of fruit and vegetables into to transport them from the back shed into the hall on a Monday morning.

'We're also getting stationary supplies, document holders, and flyer stands to hold the flyers we have there from the Mount Barker Community Centre as a display of information for people who need support to any number of areas, and also to purchase things like cling wrap, biodegradable bags, paper bags for mushrooms, and all those sorts of consumables we regularly use.

"We also have hand soap and dish washing liquid we've been given by someone in the community which people can fill up (in) their containers, but a lot of people don't remember to bring containers with them, so we're going to purchase some pump packs and squeezy bottles that we can fill to be able to give it away more effectively."

The Rotary Club of Murray Bridge was also one of the successful recipients.

RAA General Manager of Community and Corporate Affairs Emily Perry said the Grassroots Giving program was a key part of RAA's purpose to be better for members and the community.

"These projects support everything from community safety, environmental sustainability, reconciliation activities and more," she said.

"Since launching in 2019, Grassroots Giving has contributed more than \$450,000 in grants to more than 90 organisations doing crucial and impactful work in the community.





The 'perfect storm' during the drought

Rainwater tank suppliers have been experiencing the "perfect storm" during recent times – an "overwhelming" demand during the drought coupled with the regular strong uptake of tanks at the beginning of winter.

The need meant some customers were waiting up to eight weeks for tanks, as manufacturers wait times extended as the drought continued.

"We have had to explain to customers that things are going to take a bit longer this year as our tank partners get back to a normal level of production," Strathalbyn Mitre 10 Managing Director, Brad Fuss, said.

"There was a massive uplift of tank sales in Meadows and other areas where there was no SA Water connection."

During water shortages, some of these customers increased their current supply by buying more tanks and having water shipped to their property.

"There were lots of retrospective increases in wait times because of the overwhelming number of orders that happened in this perfect storm," Mr Fuss said.

Strathalbyn Mitre 10 "champions" rain water harvesting, with Mr Fuss having a particular interest in it for two decades.

The shop offers a large range of rainwater tanks which will ship to most corners of the state and parts of Victoria.

Mr Fuss, who has worked in and owned Mitre 10 stores since 1999 said this summer's drought saw very different consumer sentiment than the millennium drought which happened through most of the 2000s.

"The Desalination Plant which opened in 2013 has really changed how we feel about and use water," Mr Fuss said.

"I remember our customers in the mid-2000s when water restrictions were in place could only water their gardens on certain days of the week, or whether they had an even or odd-numbered letter box.

"We had customers showering with

buckets and then emptying those buckets into the garden.

"At one point we mothballed our garden centre as plant sales completely stopped because you could not establish a garden.

"Fast forward to an era of better water security, gardens have remained in tact but people still want their own storage and to control their own usage."

Demand for water tanks is now returning to business as usual.

"We really appreciated (and respected) our farming and agricultural customers... letting us know that they wouldn't be purchasing for a while until it rained and everyone felt a bit more comfortable about the immediate future," Mr Fuss said.

"We wish all the landholders, farmers, and growers a speedy recovery back to normal. "Let's hope we get a whole more lot of rain."

Meanwhile, gardeners are also customers of water tanks and irrigation systems, with many preferring to use rainwater on their pride-and-joys.

"Inside the town, there are some wonderful gardens – and people are proud of them," Mr Fuss said.

"Gardening is the fun part of our business because everyone can have a crack at it."
