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Alexandrina Council requests review into vaccine implications...

Alexandrina Council has become one of only a few in South Australia who will ask the Federal Government to commission a thorough and independent investigation into all safety aspects in the Pfizer and Moderna COVID vaccines.

The motion brought to Monday night's council meeting was spurred by a deputation provided by Mount Compass local GP Dr Vikki McLaughlin in December last year, explaining the alleged potential health implications in mRNA vaccines.

The pair asked council to follow in other councils' footsteps and move a motion to advocate on behalf of the community and request the Federal Government to conduct an investigation into the heath effects of COVID vaccines.

At Monday night's meeting Mr Rogers again reiterated council's "I do hope the elected members have had time to reflect on the December presentation to do personal further research and consider this issue is indeed something this council can take positive action on," he said during Monday's deputation.

"My wife and I have sons, daughters and grandchildren, and some of us have taken COVID-19 injections."

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One man turning the wheels of change for dementia



A Kangaroo Island man is taking on Australia – and soon Strathalbyn – with his bicycle in a bid to raise money for the fight against the second-leading cause of death in the country.

In 2025, an estimated 433,300 Australians are living with dementia, and without significant intervention, this number is expected to increase to an estimated 812,500 by 2054.

These are statistics Nicholas Tremaine knows well.

His mother was diagnosed with dementia and now lives in full time care, and his uncle is in a similar condition.

It's why he felt it was an important cause to raise awareness and money for, while also honouring his mum's legacy and support for her community.

The way Mr Tremaine is doing this is by attempting to cover 40,000km around Australia in 365 days, with the aim of raising \$1 million for Dementia Australia – the national peak body supporting people living with dementia, and their families and carers. "I thought riding around Australia wasn't tough enough, so I added a couple of kilometres," Mr Tremaine said.

"(Dementia) affects many people, and people probably aren't aware it's the secondleading cause of death of all Australians and it's the leading cause of death of women in Australia, so that's my driving force."

Mr Tremaine started the journey from Bondi Beach on the first of January and headed over to South Australia for the Tour Down Under.

After completing five out of the six stages, he rode through Victoria and Tasmania, and is now back in South Australia, following the country shows that are held in autumn.

He will be attending Mount Barker Show this weekend before making his way to Strathalbyn.

Mr Tremaine says the journey has been "good" so far.

"I'm heavily involved in the organisation of the show on Kangaroo Island, but I'm also on the Executive Body to SA Country Shows," he explained.

"When I started planning the journey to ride around Australia, I wanted to make sure I rode through every town that holds a country show at some point, and try to get to as many of the shows as possible.

"The weather is testing me – there has been a couple of days that have been warm

- but other than that, it's more of a mental game some days than anything else."

Other than breaking a back tyre, the biggest challenge Mr Tremaine has faced was in Tasmania when his GPS took him down an unrideable track.

"The GPS took me up the back of Mount Wellington, down some sort of fire track rather than the road," he said.

"I couldn't ride it with my back so I had to carry the bike up 860 metres of elevation down the other side.

"It took me about six-and-a-half hours to go 55km, and then I still had 120km to do, but I got through it and we kept going."

He has been supported along the way either through people providing words of encouragement, random strangers offering him beds for the night, and donations to his online fundraising page.

Mr Tremaine is expected to finish his journey in Sydney on New Year's Eve after which he hopes to enjoy the fireworks and have a long sleep-in.

Meadows residents show support for important intersection works

Passionate residents gathered at Meadows on the weekend to show support for a campaign being driven by a local MP to demand answers from the government about the proposed and promised intersection works.

Mount Barker District Council has been working with the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) who cares and controls the Mawson and Battunga Roads - on the treatment and design for the Mawson, Battunga and Nottage Roads intersection for years, but DIT has deemed the project "years away" from construction due to costs.

As previously reported in The Southern Argus, Member for Heysen Josh Teague is now calling on the State Government to fulfill the promise it made to the community and bring this much needed infrastructure to fruition.

He has written to Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tom Koutsantonis and launched a petition to support his campaign.

A street corner meeting was also held with local residents on Saturday.

"It was really good to see a really motivated group of local residents coming out on a hot morning at Meadows," Mr Teague said.

'That's off the back of now several impromptu gatherings of locals on each of the days I have been focusing on getting to the doors in Meadows in recent weeks.

"The exercise on Saturday was far from a one-off, but it certainly served to emphasise just how committed to getting this done the whole community is."

Minister Koutsantonis confirmed to *The Argus* earlier this month a funding commitment had been made the project through the Adelaide Hills Productivity and Road Safety Package.

However, Mr Teague is calling for answers on when locals can expect it to eventuate.

"The government in response to the campaign is claiming it is funded and it will be done, so when are we going to see what you say you're going to do?" he said.

"The case has been proved and you've even told us that's the case, and you'll do this work and from an identified fund, so just get on with it."

Mr Teague hopes to raise these questions to the minister in parliament this week.

He will continue to press government for the specifics of when the work will start and finish.

"That's what the Meadows community deserves, nothing less," Mr Teague said.

"And we know it's not only the Meadows residents, but everybody who is coming though Meadows and that part of the Hills that deserves a safe and workable central crossing."

Remember the 90s hit *Sing it Back*? One of the singers Roisin Murphy is now a solo artist with an incredible stage presence that includes multiple costume changes.


Local glider makes top 20 in world champs

Three Southern Soaring League members pitted their skills against the best in the world earlier this month, with one finishing in the top 20.

Model glider pilots Andrew Meyer, Nick Chrabel and Beth Loveday, from the Milang league, ventured to Cordoba in Argentina for the F5J World Championships, with Mr Meyer finishing 18th.

They were competing against 60 competitors from across the globe as individuals and part of the Australian team. "We probably didn't do as well as what we would have liked to, as it was a fairly tight competition," Mr Meyer said.

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"It was the top 14 pilots that got into the fly-off, but there was very little room in those top positions, so there was not a lot of variation in scores there.

"I finished in the top 20, so I was happy with that, (although) as a team, we probably would have liked to have done a bit better. "We had varied conditions, all the way from really dead, still air through to quite windy, so there was a lot of 'carnage' in some rounds, where lots of people ended up landing out or not making the time, so it was definitely a very challenging competition." Pilots are scored for launch height, flight time, and distance from the landing spots. Members of the Australian model glider team: Andrew Meyer, Beth Loveday, Nick Chabrel, Marcus Stent and Hugh Blackburn.

This year's winner was New Zealander

"Joe is really interesting because he is the only person in the world who has won all the world championships now for all the gliding disciplines," Mr Meyer said.

"Joe is 64 and did exceptionally well to win it all."

The next world championships are scheduled in two years time for Muncie, Indiana, with all three keen to try again.

Council requests review into COVID vaccine implications

"My wife and myself consider we are older and have lived much of our lives, but we do live with fears of the unknown consequences of these injections for our families – how can we not?

"Council can and must demonstrate a moral duty of care to this community by taking action. "To turn a blind eye and do nothing is

absolutely not an option." Following December's deputation and correspondence from Port Hedland councillor Camillo Blanco, West Ward councillor Michael Scott brought forward a motion for council to write to Prime Minister Anthony Albanese and Federal Minister for Health and Aged Care Mark Butler urgently requesting a thorough and independent investigation into all safety aspects, including synthetic DNA contamination issues, in the Pfizer and Moderna COVID vaccines administered in Australia, and to communicate these findings transparently.

The letter will also be forwarded to SA Premier Peter Malinauskas, SA Health Minister Chris Picton, Federal Shadow Minister for Health Anne Ruston, SA Opposition Leader Vincent Tarzia and SA Shadow Minister for Health Ashton Hurn.

His aim was to provide answers, certainty and health solutions for the community.

"It is well-remembered and acknowledged that the emergence of COVID-19 in 2020 was a shocking and fearful phenomenon for the majority of the world's population," Cr Scott said.

"It seems likely that most government and health leaders acted in good faith in responding to the events of the time, including our own Federal, State and Local Governments and health officials.

"The ensuing history of the virus and the way in which it was responded to in Australia is well-documented and remembered with the application of several intended control measures, including widespread administration of mRNA vaccines.

"Unfortunately, the subsequent benefits or otherwise of the measures used to combat COVID -19 have been somewhat contentious in Australia and globally.

"The scientific and anecdotal evidence of negative health issues and death correlated to the administration of COVID-19 mRNA vaccines is concerning to many in our community and across Australia, however, without concerted and focused research and investigation into this issue, ill health as well as concerns and fears of community members will remain unresolved."

Where appropriate, council can advocate to represent the interests of, and encourage and develop initiatives for improving the quality of life of, its community.

This was the basis for the argument for those in favour of the motion.

But others, like West Ward councillor Bill Coomans, remained unconvinced.

"I've thought long and hard about this... and to me a lot of this is well-above me," he said.

"But the people I do listen to are people like Professor Nicola Spurrier.

"Some of the stats say both vaccines are about 95 per cent efficient in preventing COVID.

"Moderna seems to have some adverse effects, but they seldom cause any long-term effects.

"I'm not convinced this is the path we should be taking."

However, the motion gained the majority support.

Alexandrina's decision joins similar ones made by District Council of Streaky Bay, District Council of Ceduna and Grant District Council.



Third Mt Barker pub jumps hurdle

A new Mount Barker pub development has been cleared for construction, making it the third for the town.

Work on the Heysen Hotel – which already has planning approval – is set to start from July after it was recently granted a liquor licence and permission to operate 40 gaming machines.

The granting of the gaming licence was originally objected to by former Barker Hotel owners, Fassima Investments, on the basis it would allegedly increase gambling problems, however, this failed to be proven in court.

The Wellington Road facility is expected to open in mid-2027 and will cater for more than 1000 patrons with its bistro, sports bar, gaming lounge, function rooms, large outdoor area, drive-through bottle shop, and undercroft parking.

The poker machines are expected to bring in a \$2.6 million a year in gross gaming venue, while the construction of the hotel itself is expected to create 150 permanent, local jobs once opened.

New plan to target repeat offenders

The State Government is cracking down on repeat young offenders by toughening bail and sentencing laws under a new Young Offender Plan, along with a multi-million-dollar investment in specialised programs to help break the cycle of re-offending.

Over the past financial year, just 20 young people were responsible for roughly 11 per cent of all matters before the Youth Court, with advice from South Australia Police indicating that a small cohort of repeat offenders are responsible for a disproportionate rate of offending.

The government will pursue measures to strengthen bail laws and options to ensure the recidivist young offender scheme is fit-for-purpose in response to serious repeat offending. Other key elements of the plan include strengthening penalties for young offenders with extensive criminal histories, and cracking down on youth street gangs by giving police greater powers similar to what they have for outlaw motor cycle gangs. A \$3 million investment in intervention programs targeting young people in this cohort will also be made to offer a lastresort chance for offenders at risk of entering the adult justice system. The Attorney-General will convene a roundtable with stakeholders to discuss appropriate responses and interventions for serious repeat young offenders who fail to respond to more general interventions and sentencing outcomes.

SAPOL Commissioner Grant Stevens and eSafety Commissioner Julie Inman Grant recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), formalising updated protocols to jointly investigate matters ranging from cyberbullying to image-based abuse, adult cyber abuse and illegal and harmful content.

The MoU will see eSafety share information from investigations into some of the thousands of complaints it receives every month.

"Reports to eSafety of serious cyberbullying, abuse and harmful content continue to grow," Commissioner Inman Grant said.

"For example, we received 2978 cyberbullying complaints in 2024 – a 25

We have a fantastic partnership with South Australia Police, and this MoU will strengthen that by formalising our approach in vital areas of co-operation to improve online safety for South Australians."

South Australia Police Commissioner Grant Stevens echoed this commitment. emphasising the critical role of law enforcement in tackling online threats.

"This MoU will see our continued relationship with eSafety, and ensure all parties work together to make the online environment safe for our community," he said.

"We are committed to using our resources to investigate cybercrime matters whether through fraud, child exploitation or abhorrent violent material."

The MoU covers serious cyberbullying, adult cyber abuse, the sharing of intimate extreme violence or terrorism content.

The strengthened partnership has also been welcomed by South Australian Police Minister Stephen Mullighan, who highlighted the importance of a united front against online crime.

"The State Government welcomes the collaboration between SAPOL and eSafety to help stamp out criminal activity online," he said.

"Crimes including cyberbullying, adult cyber abuse and the distribution of illegal content have no place in South Australia, and this agreement will strengthen the fight against those illegal activities.

"By sharing resources and jointly investigating online offences, SAPOL and eSafety are in a better position to close the net on online criminals."

Young artists emboldened through workshops



Young Adelaide Hills artists will have the opportunity to express themselves and explore their relationship with the land through visual arts and new technologies during a series of six one-of-a-kind workshops, including an on-country experience.

Heart of the Hills is an opportunity for young people in the community aged 12 to 18 to broaden their understanding of both traditional and new visual art techniques, and explore and express their feelings about the environment through the medium of art.

The six workshops will be held at the Hahndorf Academy, The Cedars and at Totness Conservation Park and Womma Murkurta (The Summit) over several weeks in May and June before culminating into a public showcase of work.

Professional artist Laura Wills, who brings a wealth of experience working across different mediums and has a passion for working with young people and environmental themes. will run the workshops, while the on-country experience will be led by First Nations Elders.

This project is about creativity and the environment - thinking about how we can get to the ecology of our environment a bit more and create artworks about it to share with people a little bit more about the place

care for it," Laura explained.

"I grew up in the Hills myself and I would have loved to have participated in something like this.

"Art was always my favourite subject at school, and the youth art workshops I did at that time were down in the city and I got so much out of it, so I'm hoping some of the participants will be able to explore ways of working in the arts that might expand their thinking in ways that might be beyond twodimensional artwork."

Heart of the Hills is generously supported by renowned Strathalbyn artist David Dridan and his family in collaboration with Mount Barker District Council.

Heavy-handed implementation of VMS

I write to express my deep concern regarding the South Australian Government's heavy-handed implementation of Vessel Monitoring Systems (VMS) in the Marine Scale Fishery.

The decision to mandate these systems without proper consultation with fishers is both unfair and alarming.

This move smacks of a "Big Brother is watching you" approach, treating hardworking fishers as if they are untrustworthy or engaging in wrongdoing rather than as legitimate operators in a vital industry supplying South Australians with fresh seafood.

One of the most pressing issues with VMS is the security of the data being collected.

Fishers have spent years, often decades, refining their knowledge of the best fishing spots, and this information is highly sensitive.

Where are the guarantees this information will remain confidential?

What security measures are in place to ensure this data cannot be hacked or misused?

Without strict and independently verified protections, fishers' livelihoods could be at risk, as valuable GPS location data could be accessed and exploited by third parties.

Furthermore, the government justifies the introduction of VMS as a way to improve compliance and enforcement efficiencies.

It is worth noting that, according to the latest compliance report, compliance is about 99 per cent for the marine scale fishery, and if efficiencies are to be gained, why aren't license fees being reduced?

A more streamlined and efficient

compliance process should logically reduce costs, yet fishers are expected to shoulder this new burden without any corresponding relief.

Instead of offering incentives or demonstrating how these efficiencies will benefit industry members, the government has instead imposed additional red tape, costs and regulations without transparency.

Adding insult to injury, the minister has indicated the ongoing maintenance costs of VMS will be a "business cost" for fishers, despite the fact this system is a government mandate.

If the government deems this surveillance necessary, then it should also take full financial responsibility for the implementation and upkeep of the system.

Forcing individual fishers to pay for the maintenance of a system they did not ask for, and which is designed for government oversight rather than business benefit, is fundamentally unfair.

The fishing industry is already facing significant pressures, from environmental challenges to rising operational costs.

^Adding a poorly considered, costly, and intrusive surveillance system without proper safeguards or consultation is a slap in the face to South Australian fishers.

The government must reconsider its approach, ensuring that any new regulations are introduced transparently, with appropriate security measures, and without unjustly burdening the very people who sustain this important industry.

It just takes an early morning drive into Strathalbyn to get an appreciation of just how many Little Corellas have made the town their home.

There are thousands of them flying across the town, looking for almost anything green to shred to pieces – be it trees, lawn or, as we have found out, cricket pitches.

It might seem extreme to some people to be concerned about little birds and the damage they cause, but the numbers and their impact are both monetary, and health and safety.

Take the case of the Strathalbyn Cricket Club whose \$4000 cricket pitch mat can no longer be used by several teams.

Junior players have had to bowl from one end, and senior teams have had to play 'at home' at various venues such as Woodside #2 and Meadows.

With a shortage of ovals across the association, having one out of action is, as Strathalbyn Cricket Club President Michael Cutting says, "not ideal".

Not to mention the possible safety concerns of bowling down a wicket where, depending on what hole you strike, the ball could be dangerously unpredictable.

Perhaps the organisation that knows the financial impact of corellas most and how concerned ratepayers are is Alexandrina Council.

Council has reportedly tried many management strategies, including the use of sound and light devices at dawn and dusk, bird fright products, clap boards, starter pistols, birds of prey, trap and gas culling programs, shootto-scare techniques and lethal shooting.

Currently council is only using scaring techniques to discourage corellas from the most problematic sites, and on Monday night, councillors agreed to the continuation of non-lethal scaring activities and onsite advice to residents.

What will happen if the dry conditions continue?

Can we expect more numbers of Little Corellas in our skies, trees, ovals and parks as outer areas become more parched than before?

Who knows, but it does highlight the need for a community solution to take on a community problem.

Community calls for action after corellas destroy cricket pitches

Strathalbyn's ongoing Little Corella problem has claimed another victim -Eastern Fleurieu's (EFS) oval and cricket mat – which was only recently upgraded.

Abundant bird management is a state-wide issue affecting and impacting primary producers, conservation and land management organisations, State Government, councils and the community.

For Alexandrina, its biggest bird problems are Little Corellas and feral pigeons, which cause nuisance and aesthetic issues, particularly destruction and loss of vegetation, and noise.

This time, the local corellas have damaged the mat at the EFS oval.

The junior grades managed by bowling all overs from one end to avoid the sections worst damaged, but Strathalbyn Cricket Club President Michael Cutting said the damage was so severe the club had to move its senior games to other ovals for the year.

"I think the damage might have gotten worse over the Christmas break when the kids weren't around," he said.

"We ended up playing our first C Grade game back after the Christmas break, but we had to bowl all the overs from one end because there were actually some holes in the wicket, which would have made it dangerous to play at the other end, which wasn't ideal.

'They are not huge holes, but there is enough of them, and they are in a bad area that if the ball hits them, it can misbehave and it just becomes a safety issue.

"For the remaining three home games, we went to Mount Torrens, Woodside #2, and Meadows – our last three home games effectively away - so it was not great to have to play your home games so far from home, but unfortunately, there is quite a shortage of ovals in the association.

"We looked at Finniss but because there has been no cricket (there) for a couple of seasons and things are so dry, it wasn't really an option because it was basically brown down there.

We looked at Milang, but because Langhorne Creek has four senior teams, (it) basically gets used every week." Having Mount Barker teams unable to use the Summit facilities this year was also a problem, as if they were able to play there, it would have freed up another oval in the region. "We are not really sure what the resolution is," Mr Cutting said. "It is not just the pitch, there are holes in the outfield as well. "At the moment the biggest issue (is) it has permanent matting on it. "Ôn a lot of cement pitches, you just roll out the mats each week, but we have always had permanent matting on there, which saves you a job on a Saturday, plus it is a bit safer for the kids during school to have the

carpets on it permanently.

'We are thinking we may have to remove the matting and purchase some roll-out mats that we just roll out each Saturday for the games.

'The disappointing thing is we only replaced that pitch 18 months ago with the matting, so there was not much return on the investment - it cost us \$4000 to do that, and basically it needs to be done again."

The impacts of Little Corellas have been felt by council and its community for more than two decades, particularly during the warmer months, but little has been able to significantly deter the creatures.

Council has tried a vast number of management strategies and options in the past, including the use of sound and light devices at dawn and dusk, bird fright products, clap boards, starter pistols, birds of prey, trap and gas culling programs, shootto-scare techniques and lethal shooting.

Currently, it only employs various scaring techniques to discourage the corellas from problematic sites, and is working with the Local Government Association and other relevant State Government bodies on management strategies.

At Monday night's council meeting, councillors noted current measures being taken to deter corella flocks and the continued liaison between relevant State Government bodies, and agreed to continue to undertake non-lethal scaring activities and onsite advice to residents.

North Ward councillor Sue Miller highlighted the problems faced by the community, including the cricket club, and emphasised the need for solutions.

"When you get to plague proportions, you do have to take intervention measures," she said.

"It's not just a cost to council here, there's a huge cost to the community.

"Whether you like Little Corellas or not, I think we're above that now, and sometimes it looks like it's snowing over the ovals in Strathalbyn, and you clap your hands, and you feel like you're in a Hitchcock movie.

"We've got to keep doing something, doing

Council prepares to respond to ESCOSA financial review

Alexandrina Council will wait for the Audit and Risk Committee to meet and consider the recent Essential Services Commission of South Australia (ESCOSA) report before it delivers its formal response to the review.

As previously reported in The Southern Argus, council's current financial performance was deemed unsustainable, according to a review conducted by ESCOSA, due to the \$7.1 million deficit, and its projected financial performance deemed potentially unsustainable due to historical and forecast high levels of expenditure on new and upgraded assets, and underspending on asset renewal and replacement, creating future liabilities.

At Monday night's council meeting, Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes delivered a verbal statement regarding the report.

He believed it was prudent for the Audit and Risk Committee to consider and respond to the ESCOSA report before council formally addresses it at a general meeting.

The committee is expected to convene a special meeting at the end of March, which Mayor Parkes would like the report for to be presented at council's April meeting.

Council is expected to make its formal response at that time.

"I do not believe any of us are surprised by the report which found that our current financial performance - based on the draft Long-Term Financial Plan that went out for public consultation last year - was unsustainable," Mayor Parkes said on Monday night.

'Our most recent asset revaluation identified a huge increase in the overall value of our assets, resulting in a significant increase in our asset depreciation costs.

'We recognise the need to address the costs associated with servicing the substantial increase in the overall value of our assets, as well as the need to reassess our entire operating budget, and that we need to bring our community along on this journey of financial transformation.

We've been working closely with both our CFO and CEO to develop a new draft Long-Term Financial Plan as part of the draft 2025/26 Annual Business Plan and Budget process.

"I stress that what we are doing is a draft at this stage and council is going to have to exercise financial restraint. which can always be challenging when we have diverse interests across our communities, however, our newly drafted Long-Term Financial Plan sees council returning to surplus within two years and shows a significant reduction in rates over the first four years compared to the LTFP consulted on with our community."

The draft plan also shows a 3.25 per cent above-CPI rate increase over four years compared to 11 per cent in the previous plan.

Council has eight budget workshops planned which are open to the community to observe.

The third workshop is scheduled for Monday, followed by the fourth on Monday, March 31.

Formal community consultation will take place in May when a draft Annual Business Plan and Budget and draft Long Term Financial Plan is ready to be presented.



nothing is not an option."

The cricket club has six months to decide what it will do going forward.

"We are confident one way or the other that we will come up with a solution," Mr Cutting said.










Making avocados grow at Ashbourne



On a farm near Ashbourne Tony Schirripa has watched his passion for avocados turn into a local agricultural success story.

The farm now has two sections - the older one of 30 hectares planted in 2000, and a new section of about 15 hectares that is just starting to bear fruit planted in 2019.

He has found, compared to Queensland, the cooler climate has been beneficial.

"We harvest anywhere from October through to February, but we are finding it is better to take them in November/December and be done by then," Mr Schirripa said.

"Being cold climate, the trees flower around November and then the bees pollinate the trees and they bear fruit.

"If you have still got the crop on the trees, they try to sustain last year's crop and the new one.

"The tree only has so much energy, so if you can get them off before flowering, it is much better for the tree.'

At harvest time Mr Schirripa's extended family pitch in to hand-pick the avocados, while they also have one farm manager who looks after the trees and fruit full-time.

'The new farm has only just started to produce, so there is not much there,"Mr Schirripa said.

"Although, this year is its first adult year and they are fairly well-cropped, so I can't tell you what we are going to get off that yet, but ideally, we would want to get about 15 to 20 tonnes to the hectare.

"If you get more than that, that is great, and if you get less, it is still sustainable, but that is about the benchmark."

Avocados can fetch between \$20 to \$40 a tray, depending on supply and quality.

Mr Schirripa believed his fruit benefits from the cold climate, slow growth, and being longer on the tree.

'The oil content goes up and there is less water content, so the tastier and better they are," he said.

"We go through a wholesale network that puts some into SA, some into Victoria, some into NSW, and even some into QLD, (as) when they don't have them, we do.

"We have also had some export into South-East Asia and we are registered for India now."

Caring for the avocado trees includes plenty of water, along with a fertiliser regime. Mr Schirripa said avocados are one of the

best bits of food that can be eaten.

"You could have eggs any way you want

with avocado and you are not hungry until lunch time, maybe even tea time," he said. 'They fill you up, are high in potassium,

and the omega three fats are great." Mr Schirripa said the family took on

the farm after seeing the potential for Australian produce, while working at city fresh food markets.

"There wasn't enough grown in Australia, and being a wholesaler at the market, we felt the consumers didn't like them coming from New Zealand or wherever else they were bringing them in, so we thought we needed to grow some to build our supply up," he said.

'When we bought the place it had a vineyard on it – we pulled them out and put avocados there, and we did it differently to the old farm.

"We have them under net to protect them more, as the more we can protect them, the more fruit hangs on the tree and they don't get knocked off by the wind.

"I think if I had a vineyard and it wasn't paying, I would be thinking about putting avocados in.

"It is a long wait though – there is a five to seven year wait from planting, so you have to have your wits about you.

"You need some patience and money because you are growing something for five years and getting nothing back."

A total of about 58 ratepayers from across Alexandrina Council area turned out on Friday to lodge a protest about increasing rates and other concerns.



"We want them to look very closely at their level of spending and cut it back to where it is at a sustainable level, and rate rises are much more reasonable and sustainable."

While his group keeps its number private, Mr Nichols claimed it was growing regularly, and building momentum.

Though he believed some members were considering running for council at the next election, he was unable to supply names.



Feral deers growing in peri-urban areas

Land managers across the Adelaide Hills and Fleurieu Peninsula can now register interest in joining a feral deer eradication program after new CCTV footage revealed their increasing presence in peri-urban areas.

Recorded at a private residence in Mount Osmond, the footage shows a feral deer wandering down a suburban driveway.

Feral deer populations have been expanding across South Australia, damaging native vegetation, agriculture, and waterways.

In peri-urban areas, feral deer are more difficult to control and raise additional concerns for residents.

Recent peri-urban feral deer sightings

have been reported in Mount Osmond, Belair, Crafers, Bridgewater, Chandlers Hill and Onkaparinga Hills.

The Greater Adelaide Peri-Urban Feral Deer Eradication Plan, led by Landscapes Hills and Fleurieu and Green Adelaide, aims to reduce feral deer numbers across the region, with a spokesperson highlighting the need for "urgent action".

Feral deer are among the most damaging invasive species in Australia," Landscapes Hills and Fleurieu's Tom Kloeden said.

"They don't just harm the environment

- they trash and destroy habitats.

"They trample delicate bushland, strip vegetation bare, and turn creeks into muddy wastelands."

He added that native animals that depend on these ecosystems are left struggling to survive.

"We've seen the devastation they cause in the eastern states where feral deer populations have spiralled out of control," Mr Kloeden said.

"In the Adelaide Hills and surrounding areas, we have a small window of time to act, and we're calling on the community to help by reporting any sightings of feral deer at (feralscan.org.au)."

Joining the upcoming program is free and will explore control operations to be taken. Registrations of interest can be made via the Landscape Hills and Fleurieu website.

Scott Bormann has spent his life working for the Langhorne Creek family farm 'Bormann Turf', watching it grow from a small acreage at Woodside to now covering 80 football ovals in size with grass.

Mr Bormann was just three years old when his father took a punt on turf, but the business now has markets in Victoria and the ACT.

This includes supply to a lot of the AFL training grounds throughout Victoria, along with the Canberra Stadium, Manuka Oval,



and the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS). "They are some of our biggest clients and

they all take about 60 per cent of our annual production," Mr Bormann said.

"The other 40 per cent is in SA – some commercial clients, and then the bigger garden centres that do the retailing and delivering for us – so we can remain as a wholesale turf producer.

"It is really rewarding – you turn on the TV and you see them, and it makes you want to do your best.

"It is not easy to break into those markets they require a very high standards.

"They have a lot of consultants involved and a lot of them are government projects, so we do have to be really transparent with what we are supplying.

"The quality has to be up there with the best in the world and it is a challenge, but we love challenges and that is why we do what we do."

Mr Bormann also takes pride in knowing he has supplied turf for cricket pitches across the region, along with the Langhorne Creek and Strathalbyn ovals, and Adelaide Oval.

The family business employs eight permanent workers, an additional two or three casuals in the summer months, as well as his wife Ingrid.

Every day is a harvest day.

"It is every day, but it is a seasonable business, so we do have busier times," Mr Bormann said. "Those holiday periods when people have a lot more time to do gardening or when there is a transition in sport – when we go from football to cricket, and cricket back to football, as there is always a transition period where they need to repair ovals."

He said growing turf takes a lot of patience. "It is not a quick cash crop at all, so from the time of actual planting a new field, it can

take 12 to 18 months to mature so that it holds together for harvesting," Mr Bormann said.

"If you start harvesting too prematurely, the sod will break up and it will be poor quality.

"So, it is a patience and also a knowledge game – just to know what to apply and when to apply things.

"Soil quality is a big thing as you need to have very consistent soil quality, and you need to have an even watering system – our farm is all under centre pivot irrigators, (and) it takes all that as well as regular mowing.

"Everything is really regular, so mowing is twice a week, fertilising is every four weeks, and there is lots of regular maintenance that goes into making it look nice all the time."

Mr Bormann said the farm has managed to develop, despite some rather large hurdles.

"Probably back in 2012 when we had the last drought period, that was probably our biggest hurdle so far, with our watering licence being restricted," he said.

"We put in a desalination plant to try and

desalinate the salty water that was coming out of the lake, and it did work, but it was very costly.

"But once we got that up and running, the government helped the CPC put in a new irrigation pipeline from the Murray, so we decommissioned the desal plant and jumped onto that pipeline.

"In essence, the desalination plant was only used for about four months, so we spent \$2 million on trying to clean up our water for four months of use, so we just had to mothball that whole project and it is still

sitting there to this day. "They are kind of the hard times that a lot of people don't see, but you can't sit on your hand and do nothing in those times, you have to be proactive."

He said things are now travelling well. "The quality of the water from the Murray

is really good," Mr Bormann said. 'This year, even though we haven't had rain for a while and it has been a quite hot, dry summer, the soil temperature has risen quite well and all the varieties of turf that we grow are all warm season varieties... so we need high soil temperatures to make the grass active.

"Last year, with the cool summer, we lost about six weeks of peak production just because of the cool soil temperatures.

"This year is actually really good, but we are looking for rain – everyone is desperate for rain."

The farm grows three main warm season varieties – santa ana couch, fine leaf kikuyu and kenda kikuyu – all of which are drought-tolerant.

Quarantine regulations, coupled with other difficulties, mean the business is unable to export overseas.

"Because it is a product that has soil on it,



quarantine is a big issue," Mr Bormann said. "We can't send turf into WA or NT because of quarantine issues, and also there is a time period of life expectancy.

"To send it overseas you also have to refrigerate it, and it also needs to breathe, so it would be more headache than what it is worth."

Anyone looking to buy turf can expect to pay anything from \$10 a square metre to \$20 a square metre at retail outlets.

"Buying it wholesale from the farm, you can obviously buy it a little cheaper, but you do have to pick it up," Mr Bormann said.

"The bulk of ours goes through our agents and retailers, but we do have farm gate pick up as well and that is around \$9.50 a square metre."

New emergency bulk water collection point

A new emergency bulk water collection point has been added at McLaren Vale to further ease pressure on households not connected to mains water in the Fleurieu region.

In addition, four more water carting providers have now registered through SA Health's accreditation process, and more are expected to come online in the coming days and weeks.

These new providers will help to address the bottleneck in carting services for those living off mains water amid record-low rainfall throughout the state.

The new collection point at Field Street behind Coles follows three other sites that were established earlier this month in the Adelaide Hills.

The four sites are open seven days a week from 7am to 7pm.

They are a temporary emergency measure for household domestic purposes only, and are to assist households that are running or have run out of water and are unable to get some delivered by a water carter.

"The new collection point at McLaren Vale will provide relief to households in the region who need extra water while they wait for their water carting delivery," Minister for Climate, Environment and

Water, Susan Close, said.

"This temporary service has been set up in response to the current high demand in the Hills and Fleurieu region.

"The four new companies with a water carting licence will ease pressure on other carters, who continue to go above and beyond to support their customers.

"We will continue to monitor the number of people using the emergency bulk water collection points, and locations and opening hours may change depending on the demand and delivery capacity of water carters."

So far, about 100 people have collected 110,050 litres of water from the emergency bulk water collection sites at Brukunga, Sandergrove and Woodside.





Putting in the hard yards to battle cancer

Tour de Cure's SA Discovery Tour will pass through the region in coming days and Mount Barker's Lelanie van der Merwe is one of 68 riders, 31 support crew, and three staff who have signed up for this year's challenge.

The three-day ride will travel from Tailem Bend to Mannum. to Hahndorf. to the Adelaide Hills and then Adelaide from Saturday, March 29, to Tuesday, April 1, stopping in Callington on March 31, and Strathalbyn on April 1.

The tour supports the Flinders Foundation and other cancer researchers, along with local cancer treatment and support services.

It covers 310km over the three days, challenging riders to complete 3265 metres of elevation.

The goal is to raise \$305,000, with \$168,815 already raised by Sunday afternoon.

The Southern Argus Editor Deirdre Graham sat down with Mrs Van Der Merwe who shared why she was taking part and what it has meant to be able to be involved...

"I have never done anything like this before in my life," Van Der Merwe said.

"I have done a lot of cycling, but never big tours or groups like this one, and I only really got back into cycling last year, so yes, it is quite a new thing.

"A big part for me is my partner was diagnosed with CLL leukaemia a few vears ago.

"He had done the Tour de Cure before and then afterwards found out he had CLL.

"He actually went through experimental treatment through Flinders and finished that last year.

"I am not saying he is cured, but he is in remission which I think is fabulous."

Another big part of Van Der Merwe's decision to take part was the fact her extended family had many members that had lost their battle to cancer, including her brother who passed away nine vears ago.

She said her experience had shown her the power of positive attitude.

"I always say you don't die from cancer, you live with cancer whichever way it is a choice," Van Der Merwe said. "My brother fought it for over 20

years and he was very positive, and I see my mum now as well.

"They always see the glass half full and I think that is what makes a difference because there is always someone worse off than you.

"My brother was in hospital for months at a time, and it got to the stage where he was in isolation for about three months and it turned him into a quadriplegic.

"I can remember the doctor came in one day and said to him 'it is just so bad, I really feel for you', but he said 'No, it is not that bad'.

"(He said) 'there are people out there at this stage with Ebola and dying from that'.. and 'I am not that bad off - I am in a really good hospital, getting really good care'.

"So, I think that is the attitude that you go with."

Since Mrs Van Der Merwe made the decision to take part in the tour, she has benefitted from the cycling family that exists among those taking part.

"We cycle a lot," she said.

"I thought about it the other day, thinking the first time I cycled 100km I was crying next to the road because I thought I could not go on.

"The second time I did 100km I also cried, but at least I did not stop and cry next to the road.

She has found training rides organised by the Tour de Cure have made all the difference.

"I look at the people who have been riding for a very long time and they are so helpful and motivational," Van Der Merwe said.

"I know there are some of the guys who are really strong riders, but they would hang back with me and say 'take it slow, you will get there'
