Goolwa Wharf officially opened at Boat Festival launch...

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

After more than 160 years of being a meeting place and site for special occasions in Callington, St Peter's Lutheran Church will soon hold its final service.

The building has the legacy of being one of the oldest Lutheran churches in Australia to still hold services in its original building.

The church has hosted important milestones for locals over the years, many of whom have had their christenings, weddings and funerals at the space.

The church is now down to about five members and one service per month, and has been hit by the current economic climate.

"We literally can't afford the upkeep, the insurance," Secretary/Treasurer and organist, Judy Paech, said.

"It'll be a sad event but... we can't keep on running at a loss - the worldly expenses have just gotten over the top.

"It's not an easy thing to do – but we've made the decision now."

The church's pews had already been sold off and replaced with chairs.

The church previously hosted the playgroup sessions Mainly Music before it was moved to the local hall during COVID.

Members will now likely attend Salem, Mount Barker, Murray Bridge or Strathalbyn. More than 1200 churches in Australia have

closed since 1991, according to the National Church Life Survey.

A Facebook group is even dedicated to listing churches for sale around the country. Callington Lutheran Church was opened

about 17 years after the town was founded in 1847.

Copper mines attracted families to the

town and they opened their own church in November, 1864.

The building attracted a large attendance over the years and became a sentimental space for many locals.

The "modest" and untraditional building shaped as a Greek cross is pictured in historical photos standing alone surrounded by open land, and today, is surrounded by houses.

For a period of time, it also had a hanging cast-iron chandelier and candles would be lit before the connection of electricity.

From 1960, women were allowed to attend annual meetings.

The future of the building remains uncertain, being an "old building" that 'needs lots of maintenance".

The church is an SA Heritage Place, reflecting its importance to the local area, which means it is protected by law but can be developed or altered under certain circumstances.

Anyone with a connection or interest in the church, such as with photos, family history, previous pastors or members, are encouraged to return for the closing service on May 25 at 9.30am.

After the service, visitors will be welcomed at the town's hall for a lunch and to reminisce while viewing a history display.

Final puzzle piece fitted on Goolwa Wharf project

Marking an end to the embroilment surrounding the Goolwa Wharf redevelopment, additional funds have been added to the Friends of the Oscar W Goolwa Riverport Heritage Centre budget to complete the fitout and the project in general.

As part of Alexandrina Council's wharf redevelopment project, the Friends of the Oscar W were allocated a portion of the wharf shed to transform into its Goolwa Riverport Heritage Centre and a budget of \$183,148.50 in July last year to make this come to life.

Since then, it's been working to achieve the fit-out with the help of designer and project manager DL Anatomy to have a fully operational experience ready for the Wooden Boat Festival, which occurred over the weekend.

However, the fit-out has experienced unforeseen issues during this time, including additional project management costs associated with contractor and financial management, and development application processes for both the fit-out and signage, and rectification of base build issues that needed immediate attention due to security and safety concerns.

To date the group has expended an additional \$33,975 towards these unforeseen matters with a commitment from the Friends of the Oscar W towards that amount of \$11.250

That's why at last Monday night's meeting, a request for a further \$22,725 in the budget, to be reallocated from the remaining Goolwa Wharf Project contingency capital budget, was requested from council.

Among those in support of the request was South Ward councillor Milli Livingston.

"I understand we're needing to be mindful of our budget, but I'm also mindful we need to finish off our projects properly," she said.

'The partnership with the Friends of the Oscar W and council has come a long way in the last couple of years, and I can only applaud the volunteers and administration for this.

"We as a council have a wooden boat strategy and make a commitment to showcase our heritage, and I see this as part of that.

"After going through the additional costs with members of the Friends I can see why the request has been made and how the additional costs are outside their control, and that is why I'm speaking in support of this motion."

North Ward councillor Sue Miller was the only one to vote against the motion after raising concerns about the lack of supporting evidence provided.

"I feel I need to stress that I have never and I am not questioning the dedication, passion or volunteering work the volunteers have done, I am speaking against this because it's not about that," she said.

'You are asking for us to spend public money from borrowings on the basis of a less than one page report with no supporting information.

"(With) the frequency of the meetings that have been occurring, to get asked for \$22,000 and not put at risk completing this in time for the Wooden Boat Festival feels like a gun to our head to say yes to this.

"That's not acceptable to me and I'm voting against it for that reason.

"We are under immense pressure with our borrowings and I think why wouldn't we test and validate being asked for \$22,000 if it was my money, I would be asking for evidence that it's needed."

When completed, the centre will feature a workbench and kitchen in the workshop, interactive steering and digital displays, a Goolwa riverport model and map table, visitor information and ticket sales area, and kids' activity table.

Along with the official opening of the Goolwa Wharf during the Wooden Boat Festival on the weekend, the completion of the Riverport Centre will mark an end to the project.

It's anticipated the remainder of the works will be finished by the June long weekend.

Friends of the Oscar W spokesperson Nigel Robinson said the group was delighted to

bring many years of turmoil to a close. "The Goolwa Riverport Heritage Centre will be a state-of-the-art heritage museum which we believe will attract a whole new group of people to Goolwa to support the tourism to the revitalised wharf," he said.

"It tells the story of the Goolwa riverport which is the first riverport in Australia.

"That's what is unique about the Goolwa – the meeting of the paddlesteamer with the steam train at the wharf - and it's a huge heritage tourism asset.

"An eight to one vote was a huge endorsement for the Friends of the Oscar W. "The support of the Mayor and councillors

has finally closed this long period of turmoil and now we're looking forward to the success of the new Goolwa wharf and working with council to promote the heritage tourism."

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



A-BOAT TIME!

The restoration of a "really important part of South Australia's and Australia's history" was celebrated at the same time as the launch of this year's Wooden Boat Festival on the weekend.

Organised by a group of 'boaties' associated with the Armfield Slipway, the first official South Australian Wooden Boat Festival was held in Goolwa in 1989 and was a simple gathering of wooden boats that had been built or restored locally.

From 1991 it became a biennial festival and steadily grew a reputation as a unique event in Australia that attracts thousands of locals and visitors alike.

Held at the Goolwa Wharf, the two-day festival featured more than 100 wooden boats, a 'rough 'n' ready' boat building competition, grand parade of boats led by festival flagship the PS Oscar W, vintage tigermoth bi-plane aerial display, and fairy light boat exhibition, along with a steam salute, live music by Dane Unwin, The Stormboys and Navy Band, sailing races,

cruises, and trophy presentations. It was officially opened on Saturday by SA Governor Frances Adamson AC, who was pleased to be among the festivities.

"We're so pleased to be part of these vibrant celebrations and to be here on the wharf with so many people enjoying the river and boats - (it) makes it immediately clear this is a memorable event," she said.

"More than just an enjoyable day out, the festival connects us with the region's river and maritime history, as we're reminded that boats have been essential for food gathering, transport and industry since humans first occupied this ancient land.

"It's not at all surprising that these lands and waters have great cultural significance the Ngarrindjeri and Ramindjeri people."

The festival also marked the unveiling of the Goolwa Wharf Precinct Project a multi-million-dollar endeavour by Alexandrina Council, and the Federal and State Governments.

It has had its challenges, but Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes was glad to see the wharf finally restored.

"This investment is made possible by money from the Federal and State Government, and also our local residents and ratepayers," he said.

"This was the largest inland port in Australia, and all of the produce from New South Wales and Victoria came down this river - before there were any locks or barrages - to this port to unload it to put it on to the first railway in Australia and taken to Port Elliot.

"It's now here restored – we're not going to lose it again - so we can look forward now to another 150 years of this beautiful wharf. "It challenged our council, and we completed it and we thank everybody who

has been involved."

Among the other guests at the wharf and boat festival opening were Deputy Premier Susan Close and South Australian Senator Penny Wong, who helped unveil the official plaque.

Ms Wong hoped the project celebrated the rich history from the area for years to come.

"I'm very proud our government has been part of delivering this project for South Australia," she said on Saturday.

'Community infrastructure is essential to building communities – it expands economic opportunities, it encourages new business, and of course, as today, it brings people together. "This area has changed a lot since the wharf

was first built in the 1850s from the river trade

area to the busy tourist destination it is today.

"Let's preserve that history and as part of preserving our history, let us continue sharing the stories of the Ngarrindjeri people.

"My thanks to all who have worked on this major project to renovate, restore and protect the heritage-listed precinct."

More than 18,000 people attended the festival over the two days.

"Everything about the festival was outstanding and I received so many positive comments from people who attended over the Saturday and Sunday," Mayor Parkes said. "The wharf precinct really had this

wonderful festival atmosphere."

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Local artists on display for **History Festival**

This year's SA History Festival will see seven local artists exhibit their work at the Stacey Gallery in Strathalbyn.

The DISCOVER! Old Strathalbyn and region exhibition features the work of Jen McCallum, Tana Lampard, Malcolm Edward-Cole, Helen Stacey, Judith Stephens, Bernie Morrison and Kathleen Cain, with the official opening at the gallery on Harriet Street on May 4 at 2pm.

The exhibition by the artists from Strathalbyn, Goolwa, Milang and Highland Valley will enable locals and visitors to connect to Old Strathalbyn and other lesser known areas of the Alexandrina Council region.

Old Strathalbyn was settled in 1839, the second town surveyed after Adelaide.

Early landowners such as the Rankines and Stirlings built small workers cottages in the network of streets off North Parade.

Visitors to the exhibition will be able to undertake self-guided tours and find out more about the area's history.

Writer and historian David Bunton has produced an Old Strathalbyn walking trail brochure with a map to help people to navigate.

A former brothel and coffin maker's house is among the buildings.

The exhibition will be open on Wednesday to Sunday from 10am to 4pm until May 25 at 17 Harriet Street.

Meanwhile, Ms Stacey's own landscapes from Hartley and Red Creek reflect on the symbolic endurance of ancient trees, with some works framed from aged timbers from an old farm site.

Visitors will also be able to take in the marvel of Ngarrindjeri weaving by the Strathalbyn Aboriginal Action and Reference Group.

On Sunday afternoons from 1pm to 4pm, Bernie Morrison, of Boandik descent, will teach weaving to all.

Alexandrina Council will take its budget consultation on the road again from mid-May. For the past two years, council has held public meetings - five in 2023 and three in 2024 - in various locations across Alexandrina to enable face-to-face community engagement on the upcoming budget for the financial year.

This year four locations are proposed for consultation on council's newly named Draft Annual Community Plan 2025/26 and Draft Long-Term Financial Plan 2025-35.

Venues were selected based on capacity, availability and accessibility, with a focus on achieving a balanced geographic spread



across the region.

At last Monday night's council meeting, elected members locked in the dates and venues:

Residents of the Strathalbyn District will soon see an amazing little car which is noiseless, pollution free and uses no petrol. It is one of five Enfield 8000 two passenger electric cars brought to Australia by Chloride Batteries Australia. The cars are powered by eight Australian made Exide 12 volt light weight batteries linked in parallel to give a 48 volt system. The car cost less than one cent a mile to run having a range fully loaded of 35 miles in stop start urban traffic and a range of up to 55 miles under less arduous operating conditions. with a top speed of 40 mph, and rechargable plugging into a normal 240 volt domestic power supply in eight hours.

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
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

Authorities get tough on drug offenders

A raft of measures aimed at strengthening the power of authorities to stifle the operations of serious drug offenders have commenced after recently passing State Parliament

after recently passing State Parliament. Under the reforms, police and courts will have new powers to:

• Stop prescribed drug offenders from getting rid of their assets before they are confiscated.

• Demand third parties and banks comply with freezing orders on bank accounts and provide information to assist with the confiscation.

• Increase maximum penalties for non-

strengthen the important work authorities do in this area.

"Clarifying the laws around the prosecution of attempted drug offences will also help give the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions greater confidence when taking action against offenders."

Other reforms to the controlled substances laws have also recently passed parliament.

These reforms clarify that the prosecution does not need to establish the accused knew or was reckless with respect to the particular identity or quantity of a controlled substance for drug offences and attempted drug offences. This will ensure those who try and import drugs into SA will face the full force of the law. "Each of the new measures will contribute to the further disruption of serious drug offending and organised crime in South Australia," SAPOL Assistant Commissioner, John Venditto, said. "The amendments will allow police to gather information sooner to enable assets to be locked down faster, and compel offenders to provide accurate information about their assets early in proceedings to prevent later fabrication of third-party claims to try and keep their tainted property. "They also capture prescribed drug offenders who structure their criminal activity to avoid losing their ill-gotten gains and facilitators, such as accountants who assist them, if they are charged with the same offences."

Drivers caught on long weekend

Several people will face court after being caught violating traffic laws over the Anzac Day long weekend.

On Anzac Day, police reported a 48-year-old Murray Bridge man for driving while disqualified as well as his 20-year-old passenger and Murray Bridge woman for being in possession of drug and drug paraphernalia.

Both will be summoned to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court at a later date.

On Saturday, Murray Bridge police reported three drivers during separate drug driving incidents, including a 37-year-old Murray Bridge man and 62-year-old Wellington man.

They were issued a three-month loss of licence and will appear in court at a later date.

That same day, a P-plater was detected riding a motorbike at 150 km/h in a 110 km/h zone on the South Eastern Freeway at Callington.

The 26-year-old Murray Bridge man was reported for excessive speed and breaching the conditions of his provisional licence, and will be summonsed to appear in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court at a later date.

On Sunday, police attempted to stop a man driving on Mulgundawah Road, but he drove away at speed.

A short while later police located the vehicle and man who refused to answer any questions or comply with directions to submit to a drug analysis test.

The 27-year-old Murray Bridge man was charged with driving while disqualified, dangerous driving to avoid pursuit, breaching of bail, failure to answer questions, and failure to comply with drug test.

The vehicle he was driving was impounded, and he was refused police bail.

'Slow down for yellow' laws coming soon

New laws requiring motorists to slow down when passing roadside service and recovery vehicles come into effect this month.

The new laws, which passed State Parliament last year, will expand the existing 25 km/h speed limit for emergency services vehicles to also cover RAA, and other roadside service and recovery vehicles when their amber lights are flashing.

lights are flashing. It follows RAA's 'Slow Down for Yellow Too' campaign, which called for the extension of the laws to protect roadside recovery workers and members of the community at the roadside.

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compliance under the Act to \$100,000.

The reforms will strengthen the laws around the prosecution of drug dealers and the confiscation of the proceeds of their crimes, whether it's money, cars, houses or other assets. Assets of prescribed drug offenders are confiscated by the Crown, with proceeds going to the Justice Rehabilitation Fund, and then used to fund programs and initiatives for rehabilitation and crime prevention.

"These measures are designed to help keep South Australians safe, and ensure that authorities have the tools they need at their disposal to take action against offenders," Attorney-General, Kyam Maher, said.

"The reforms to our criminal asset confiscation laws are an important response to a recent review of the adequacy of these laws, and take a number of steps to Infrastructure Charles Mountain said it was reassuring to see these important changes coming into effect to help keep South Australians safe at the roadside.

"With the new speed limit laws coming into effect from May 19, we're entering a new era of improved safety for roadside workers and the South Australian community they're there to help," he said.

"Our patrols and tow truck drivers are often helping members just metres from fast-moving traffic, and they deserve to carry out that work in a safe environment. "With children or any other person stranded at the roadside, it's not safe for anyone to have cars flying past too fast. "By slowing down for yellow, it will ensure we're all helping to protect the people they are helping."

Volunteer crushes it over 30 years

After about 30 years of volunteering – including more than two decades with Milang Environment Centre – Don Boyce will soon retire.

Milang Environment Centre is run by a group of volunteers who recycle bottles, cans and glassware, as well as green waste to make mulch for community gardens.

The 86-year-old has enjoyed helping fundraise for community initiatives largely raised from the small profit from on-selling cans and bottles, such as to the Red Cross, the Milang Railway Museum, the local school, and museum.

Mr Boyce encourages others to join for the "camaraderie".

"I've met a lot of people through here and many have become good friends," he said.

His cohorts sent him loving well-wishes in the *Milang Community News*, mentioning his behind-the-scenes organisation, his punctuality, and that MEC is a "well-organised, efficient and harmonious operation" thanks to his leadership as Treasurer.

Being involved for most of the organisation's operation, Mr Boyce remembered the early days of the time-consuming task of crushing bottles by foot.

As well as MEC, Mr Boyce also volunteered with Meals on Wheels for more than a decade, delivering hot meals to Clayton Bay, <complex-block>

near Finniss, Belvidere, Langhorne Creek and Milang.

"You had some time to chat to the people," he said.

"It made their day having somebody come, particularly if they were elderly."

As well as this, Mr Boyce plays a strong role in the community, by catching up with older, single local residents for coffee and driving others to medical appointments. He is also part of Alexandrina Singers. His long-running love of Milang dates back to when he was around 10-years-old, when visiting on a camping trip with his parents and three sisters.

They loved the town so much that they built a shack, then a cottage in the town.

Mr Boyce lived in Stirling and worked in the city most of his life – visiting Milang as a holiday – before moving to the town about 30 years ago.

With his partner, he undertook the "labour-

intensive" task of building the local motel.

"That was also very fulfilling, because there were a lot of people (we'd meet) who would come into the town," Mr Boyce said.

With some funds made through the motel, they would donate to community initiatives such as the memorial gardens.

When retired, Mr Boyce plans to spend more time gardening, painting, and connecting with other community members.

Warfare RATING



Being brutally honest, I went to watch this movie purely for its cast and instead walked away with a grim reminder of some of the lesser talked ramifications of war/conflict.

Warfare centres on a platoon of Navy SEALs who embark on a dangerous surveillance mission in insurgent territory in Iraq that goes wrong.

Directed by Ray Mendoza and Alex Garland, it's based on the former's real experiences during the Iraq War, and in particular, the encounter he and his platoon experienced in November 2006 in the wake of the Battle of Ramadi.

To maintain historical accuracy, the film's material is exclusively taken from the testimonies of the platoon members and is described by Mendoza as a 'love letter' to his comrade Elliot Miller, who sustained significant injuries during the encounter that are depicted in the film.

The film starts out seemingly light-hearted but takes a quick trip downhill, and for the remainder of the 95 minutes, it's a visceral experience that plucks audiences out of their seat and into the battlefield.

Of note, the performances by Joseph Quinn, who plays leading petty officer Sam, and Cosmo Jarvis, who plays Elliot, were particularly haunting and stayed with you wellafter you leave the cinema.

Unlike most war films, the material doesn't feel like it glorifies conflict or brushes over its grittier bits, but instead it hones on the graphic nature that inevitably comes along with it and the mental toll it takes on the troops put into these situations.

It's not a movie I would jump to see again for obvious reasons, but cinematically, with its use of sound and visuals, it does what it sets out to do.

Transport facility expected to deliver goods from Monarto

An integrated transport distribution facility at Monarto would redistribute goods from interstate to local delivery routes if given building consent and development approval.

A development application was lodged by Monarto HQ for a transport distribution facility consisting of a storage building, including office spaces, an attached canopy over loading area, and associated earthworks, landscaping and a detention basin at Lot 2 Ferries McDonald Road.

The large warehouse building and associated canopy will be used for the handling and distribution of goods received interstate or Adelaide CBD to the local area by road.

Goods will be received via one B-Double delivery per day, with up to five small rigid vehicles to then redistribute the goods for local delivery.

The proposed facility will have no more than 10 staff onsite at any one time and have 24/7 operational hours.

Car parking for 14 vehicles will be established between the building and Ferries McDonald Road frontage.

Waste will be collected by private contractors, preventing any further demand upon The Rural City of Murray Bridge's waste collection capacity.

Planting will occur adjacent the Ferries McDonald Road frontage and along the northern side boundary, and accommodate a mix of taller trees, shrubs and ground covers to provide an attractive interface to the public realm and enhance the overall amenity of the site.

Being located within a bushfire medium risk overlay, several requirements will need to be met.

These are some of the stories that here in Australia, for the very vast majority of us, we have escaped.

The bloodshed of Ukraine and Gaza, just to name two current conflicts, still feels so far away, brought to life by our television screens, radio bulletins, newspapers, and – these days – social media.

What would you lay down your life for?

In earlier conflicts many of our servicemen and women were but children themselves - of school-age even - and so much younger than myself.

Anzac Day gives all of us an opportunity to reflect on the sacrifice of our servicemen and women - serving in times of war, conflict and peacekeeping to uphold our values of mateship, courage, and selflessness.

It is because of them, not just while serving, but when they arrive home to contribute to civilian life, that we don't have to experience first-hand the atrocities of what occurs in other countries around the world.

As I think of those people who have arrived in Australia from refugee camps across the globe, many having lived years in such challenging conditions unknown to me, I think of their dreams to live in a country that is safe, mostly, from violence, where their children have the opportunity to pursue education, careers, sports, and families of their own.

These are the things we sometimes need reminding of.

I hope you too took the time to reflect on Anzac Day about just how lucky we are indeed to live in Australia.

Shark patrols extended

Aerial shark patrols along South Australia's coastline, including the Fleurieu, will be extended by a month following sustained warmer weather and shark sightings in popular areas.

April has seen a period of unseasonably high temperatures, resulting in increased aquatic activity along populated coastlines and coinciding with shark sightings.

Annual fixed wing shark patrols began in November and were due to run until April 27, at the end of school holidays, but an extension has been made until May 25 to support community safety, subject to further assessment.

Shark surveillance aircraft will continue to monitor beaches on weekends from North Haven to Rapid Bay, and on the south coast of the Fleurieu Peninsula between Waitpinga Beach, east of Victor Harbor, and the Murray Mouth.

The State Government is also providing further support to regional coastal areas through a \$500,000 shark mitigation package, which enables Surf Life Saving SA to work closely with regional communities to develop coastal risk assessments and help them implement measures such as improved beach signage, including shark sighting boards and flags, trauma kits, increased drone usage and education programs for school and community groups.

"Eyes in the sky are one way to protect beach-goers who are making the most of warmer conditions," Emergency Services Minister, Emily Bourke, said.







Anzac honour bestowed on Macclesfield RSL President

One of the community's own has been bestowed one of the highest honours in the country.

"I think like all awards, one person gets the chocolates off of the work of many," he said.

"We have a good committee of people and a lot of volunteers who all come together to promote the RSL, and primarily look after our local veterans and make sure we do what we can for local people.

"It's a good, collective effort."

During his time with the RSL, Mr Oldenhove has ensured the sub-branch makes a considered effort to engage with the community and be an integral part of it, so members can support the various community groups and, in turn, those community groups support the RSL.

He was most proud of helping to connect the various community groups together in a way they find it easy to mutually support each other, and the creation of the Anzac Gardens, which provides a great outlet for the veterans and their families, and has become a very popular community asset.

Upon announcement of Mr Oldenhove's award, the community flooded the RSL Sub-Branch's social media with messages of congratulations and support.

National RSL President Greg Melick also passed on his regards to the award recipients.

"On behalf of the RSL National Board and members of the RSL, I would like to congratulate the four individuals who have been selected for Anzac of the Year Awards," he said.

"They are exemplars of community service and an inspiration to all Australians.

"This year's award recipients exemplify the Spirit of Anzac in the community through their dedication and commitment to the benefit of others."

Walking history in Strathalbyn

This year's SA History Festival will see the return of one of Strathalbyn's most popular history events – a walking history tour around town courtesy of the Alexandrina Singers and Strathalbyn Players.

This is the ninth time the groups have staged the light-hearted event, with this year's tour – On the Beat – to take place in Rankine Street and South Terrace.

For those who are not familiar with the concept, spokesperson Gillian Tucker said it was essentially street theatre.

"It is a combination of narrated stories about aspects of the streets that we walk along, the buildings that were there, and some of the people who lived in the town in the past, with a number of skits and songs along the way," she said.

"This year it is being told from the perspective of a journalist, but also being told from the perspective of the gossip in town and what she knows about the people that might be involved in some of the skits and stories."

Mrs Tucker said there were some unexpected stories discovered.

"It was just interesting to know that a town like Strathalbyn, which to all intents and purposes was a very respectable town, was home to a few larrikins," she said.

This year's walk will start at the Save the Children's Op Shop, continue to the Heritage Centre (once a police station and court), to South Terrace and back to the train station.

Those taking part have been rehearsing

hard and finding fitting costumes.

"We have the skits and the scripts, but we do have a few larrikins that live around the area and who are playing some of the parts, and they tend to mix script and ad lib," Mrs Tucker said.

"We try and learn the songs off by heart because we really want to connect with the audience through song, and the more you connect with the audience, the more likely they are to start to participate."

Mrs Tucker said the performances were a chance for people to get to know more about Strathalbyn and its history, along with more about the groups staging the event.

"It is a really important lens back into what life used to be like, and I think it is important for people to not lose sight of some of the hardships that were here and that the same kind of activities went on, just in a simpler way," she said.

"There were lots of shops and businesses going on that depended on the railway, and that is how you got into town in those days.

"Before that they were actually quite isolated because although we don't think Adelaide is that far away, back then it was and they had to walk or go in horse and cart."

On the Beat will run on May 10, 11, 17, and 18 from 2pm.

Hundreds gave up a moment of their time on Friday to remember the men and women who paid the ultimate sacrifice for freedom during Strathalbyn's Anzac Day dawn service.

Gathering at the town's cenotaph, those in attendance acknowledged all ex-serving and current serving members of the Australian Defence Force, and paid their respects to all men and women who've paid the ultimate sacrifice while serving the country.

In her annual address, Strathalbyn and Districts RSL Sub-Branch President Cate Goodall recounted the history behind the date and its purpose.

"For all the reasons wars are fought, the objective is always freedom – to be who we are and who we want to be, and perhaps the greatest freedom of all, the one of choice – but the price of that freedom comes at a staggering cost and includes the lives of our soldiers.

"As you pass this monument during the year, I hope you will think of all the men and women named here with respect.

"They had families too and many of them remain in Strathalbyn today.

"There are men and women among us who have lost family members not named here, but should be thought of as soldiers who were assigned the job of defending our way of life and the freedom we all enjoy."

The service ended with a minute's silence, and the playing of *The Last Post*, and New Zealand and Australian national anthems.

Regiment receives honour for Somalia service



Milang veteran Greg Hopgood was among the returned soldiers from the 1st Battalion, the Royal Australian Regiment (1RAR) to recently receive an award for their deployment to Somalia 32 years ago.

The Meritorious Unit Citation recognised the solders' professionalism, conduct and sacrifice, from December 1992 to May 1993.

"Soldiers are finally getting recognised for their service," Mr Hopgood said.

"There's now a legacy that it's left behind - (the citation) is forever in the (1RAR)." Soldiers were deployed to help stabilise Somalia which had fallen into a civil war in 1991 They stayed for 17 weeks, succumbed to extreme heat and conditions - no showers, fresh food or barely any rest. They were sent to Baidoa - the 'city of death'- which was "one of the most hostile" areas of operations. 'Obviously there was fear, but we had a job to do," Mr Hopgood said. "There was an element of being scared but adrenalin overrides that fear – it's a survival mechanism. "You'd go out on a patrol and... are so alert, and I wanted to help – I wanted to get the gunmen off the street." 1RAR offered humanitarian aid, escorted people for security, and employed village



The most vulnerable, such as those who passed out or had young children, were given priority by the soldiers. Their determination and compassion

enabled the safe distribution of humanitarian aid and the resumption of law and order.

After returning to Australia, many soldiers retired from the army.

"We were just drained – we'd had enough," Mr Hopgood said.

"The stigma was so bad to have a mental illness, you were regarded as a failed soldier, or a coward."

Mr Hopgood became a strong mental health advocate, and previously shared his own struggles with *The Southern Argus* to help reduce stigma while fundraising for other defence personnel and their families. He is also involved in Vietnam Veterans Federation's Camp Andrew Russell at Alawoona in the Riverland, to be used by veterans and their families to get away and have respite. The recent citation was presented during a parade at Townsville.



elders as police and interpreters.

"These poor buggers had lost all hope, and we gave them a little bit of hope when we were there," Mr Hopgood said.

"They could start selling meat and vegetables in the markets, start walking the streets without getting knifed or shot, women could start walking the streets (with security)." Building "really good rapport" with the locals, the Australian soldiers would hand out milk caramels or water from their ration packs, play games or have slingshot fights. They bought items from the locals and traded with their rations.

While showing strong discipline, the Australians gained respect from locals.

Mr Hopgood felt a strong allegiance to protecting the children, who – despite not speaking English – would affectionately call out "Australia: number one" or "Hoppy" on the streets.

Law and order was kept at water points which could be targeted by "bandits".

Wanting to fill their clay pots, civilians joined a line-up that sometimes stretched to 600m long, 15m wide for 24 hours in 40C heat.

It was the first time Mr Hopgood had seen many of those who he served alongside in 32 years, which he attended with his assistant dog Nas and partner Tash.

They shared war stories and caught up on life since returning to Australia, with many now being fathers and grandfathers.

"I wanted to meet all my mates... it was really, really good," Mr Hopgood said. "To walk the ground that I used to walk as 32 years ago – it's changed so much.

"It was a proud moment for the regiment."





'Very good turn-out' at Goolwa for dawn service

Some laid wreaths at the RSL's monument to stop and honour the sacrifices of Australians and New Zealanders who have served in military.

President Ray Woods was pleased with the turnout including the many who stayed longer for breakfast.

"It's been a good day to remember," he told *The Southern Argus*.

"A lot of medals have been worn... (and) we've been very blessed with the weather."



Headstones unveiled for local personnel

Two local servicemen will be laid to rest with military headstones at Currency Creek Cemetery at an official unveiling ceremony next weekend.

Started in Tasmania in 2011, the Headstone Project is a voluntary project dedicated to locating and ensuring all World locally after the war and were laid to rest at Currency Creek Cemetery.

One of them is Thomas Kiffen Barnes, who was born in Weetulta, near Moonta, on December 21, 1883, as one of seven children and enlisted in the AIF, joining the 51st Batallion, 8th Reinforcements at the age of 32 in August 1916. He arrived in England in February 1917, and after further training, was sent to France in June 1917. Barnes served in both France and Belgium, including at Messines Ridge, Ypres, the Somme and Villes-Brettoneaux, until the end of hostilities in November 1918. He returned to Australia in August 1919 and was discharged in September 1919. During his service he was hospitalised three times for mumps, pyrexia (fever), and in April 1918, for gunshot wounds to his left buttock. After the war, Barnes lived in Paris Creek and then Port Elliot, where he worked as a labourer and became involved

in the Port Elliot Soldiers' Memorial Garden Association.

He died in 1971 and was buried with his wife Muriel Adams in the Currency Creek Cemetery.

Their daughter Jean Barnes coincidentally married Sydney Bowley – to France in June 1916.

Bowley's first major action in France was at Pozieres in the Somme Valley in August 1916, where the Germans overran part of the line and resulted in himself, along with several others, being taken prisoner.

However, after a bloody encounter involving the 14th Battalion, Bowley escaped. Unfortunately, on the following day he suffered a gunshot wound to his right wrist and buttock and was taken to England, where he was hospitalised for treatment. Bowley was invalided back to Australia in July 1917 and discharged as medically unfit in February the following year. After the war, he lived in Goolwa, where he worked as a painter and in 1943 married Jean Barnes who he had a daughter with. Bowley died on May 28, 1959 and was buried in Currency Creek Cemetery. Military headstones will be unveiled for the pair during a ceremony at the cemetery on Saturday, May 10 at 11am.

War I veterans who served overseas have their final resting places suitably marked.

In South Australia, volunteers search for World War I veterans who have died and whose graves are unmarked.

After investigators confirm the gravesite and research the veteran's military history, they seek to locate a living relative or descendant, and then once all enquires are completed and appropriate cemetery authority requirements are met, the gravesite is marked with a prescribed military headstone consisting of a pedestal headstone and plaque that acknowledges the veteran's service to Australia.

Of the most recent to be bestowed this honour are two servicemen who moved

the other veteran being honoured at the ceremony.

Bowley was born in Goolwa on June 15, 1891, as the youngest of eight children, and enlisted in November 1914, joining the 16th Battalion, 2nd Reinforcements.

He left Australia in February 1915 and subsequently arrived at Gallipoli where his battalion was heavily involved in establishing the front line of the Anzac beach head.

While there, Bowley suffered a gunshot wound to his left thigh, and in May 1915, was transferred to hospital in England.

He re-joined his battalion – now the 48th – in Egypt, and after another period of hospitalisation for influenza, proceeded

our society with the traits that we hold dear," he said to the crowd.

'The returning Diggers from each conflict have contributed an enormous amount to our society, with leadership, resourcefulness, determination, and national pride.

"Whether they came home whole or wounded, or broken, their spirit is often an example to us all.

"When they enlisted and put on the uniform for the first time, they wrote a blank cheque to you and the nation, for the price of up to and including their life.

"For this we owe them all a debt of gratitude for what they have done for us."

Mr McNamara thanked the piper and bugler, barbecue volunteers and the Battunga Lions who provided tea and coffee.

a Catafalque, guarded by soldiers," Mr McNamara said.

Hundreds gather to show respect

"This is why we have a Catafalque Party bearing arms around the memorial, respectfully guarding and protecting the fallen.

Wreaths have been used since ancient times to honour the courage and bravery, as well as for mourning.

"If you stay in the barracks, you will be woken each morning by the bugle playing Rouse and sent to sleep at night with The Last Post.

"Here they are reversed deliberately. "*The Last Post* played first signifies that our fallen have now gone to sleep in death and our minute's silence is to let them rest; to not awaken them."

The flag at half-mast signifies grief and loss.

"But when our silence is broken by the Rouse, this expresses the hope we have that death is not the end of the story," Mr McNamara added.

Also during the proceedings Chris Collins read the poem Flanders Field, Steve Boyd recited the Requiescat, and students from Macclesfield Primary School read a poem and wreaths were laid, before the school leaders also read the Veterans Covenant.

While it was natural in ceremonies like last Monday night's to focus on those from the community who paid the ultimate sacrifice, Mr McNamara said it was important to remember those who came home.

'When we characterise ourselves as Australians, we think about the country built by those who came home and infused

Tony Stratton is a self-confessed motorbike lover, but he has one car that has also taken his fancy – a 1973 Ragno –which is Italian for spider.

His Ragno is believed to be the only one of its kind in the world – hand-built by Nick Davies and purchased by Mr Stratton's late brother Ken, before Mr Stratton took ownership of the vehicle after Ken died.

"Nick was an Ansett mechanic and he was friends with the late Garry Cooper, of Elfin Racing," Mr Stratton said.

"Elfin Racing originally started in Mount Barker and that is where it was built, so it has a good history about it and the body shape has a bit of Elfin design in it.

"Nick was in love with Ferraris and Le Manstype vehicles, so that is how it came about. "He basically hand-built the whole car. "It is a one-off vehicle – it is not a kit car – it has its own space frame and a fibreglass body over the top."

Mr Stratton loves his car's shape, how it looks, and how it handles, particularly on corners.

"The power in it is about 120 horsepower," he said.

"It has a four-cylinder Cortina 1600 engine and it weighs 610kg, so its power-to-weight ratio is really light.

"As it sits on the ground low, it tends to suck itself to the ground reasonably well, so cornering is never a problem, and the steering is very direct and easy to drive."

Some of the two-seater's attractions include that Cortina motor with a Volkswagon gear box, making it a mid-engine car.

"The engine has been fully worked, so it is balanced and blueprinted, (with) a threequarter race cam in it," Mr Stratton said. "It has got twin Weber carbs on it, so it

is still carburettor and not fuel injection.

"Unfortunately, when they built it, they

didn't make a very big fuel tank on it - it only has 26 litres, while an average car has about 80."

The Ragno is Mr Stratton's first sports car that he has owned, as he normally prefers motorcycles, including a Ducati ST4 2004 model that he still owns.

He says to build the car these days would cost you about \$250,000.

"It is under historic club registration, so you have to put your log book details in before you go, otherwise you are in trouble," Mr Stratton said.

"When my brother bought it, he bought all the engineering drawings, plans and the body mould, so if something happens to go wrong with it, I can actually repair it. "The car, on the track, will do about

"The car, on the track, will do about 170 to 180kmh, and it is mainly designed for cornering, so it gets around Mallala (racetrack) fairly quickly."

With all of the attractive bits about the car, its sentimental value was also important for Mr Stratton.

"Because it belonged to my brother, it has

sentimental value to it," he said.

- "He passed away about five years ago after a short stint of cancer.
 - "My brother was into racing as well.

"He had another car called a Tiga, which is a British racing car, that raced in Le Mans for a period of time.

"Ken was actually a mechanic for Tiga at Le Mans, even working for the Porsche team when (Australian) Vern Schuppan was driving."

Mr Stratton enjoys showing off his car, being a volunteer at Gilbert's Motor Museum, and a member of the Strathalbyn Auto Collectors Club.

"If it is a sunny day I tend to park it out the front of Gilbert's, which brings out some interest from people," he said.

"My plans are to just show it off, so people can actually see it, instead of it being locked away in the shed all the time.

"At the museum there are quite a few parents and children that come along, and I am quite happy to put the kids in it to have a sit – it's a one-off opportunity."

She had a highly successful and enjoyable regatta, and finished in first position in seven of her eight events.


International rowers experience the Mighty **Murray**
