Tribute for oldest Goolwa RSL member

Goolwa RSL's oldest member, and one of the last local Korean veterans, the late Jack Heller, is being remembered for his warmth and sense of humour.

The 94-year-old was a member for about 15 years, and would attend the RSL most Friday evenings for dinner.

"They loved him at the club," his daughter,

Linda, said. 'You'd walk in and everyone would just

flock to him." His son Tony found everyone would stop

to say "g'day" to his dad. "They had an appreciation for him as a veteran," he said.

"When we were in here for dinner and it was announced that he'd passed away, there was a collective 'oh' from the crowd - that was nice."

Before having his family, Jack served in the Navy from 1952-57, including a year off the Korean coast and a couple of trips to Japan.

He also spent a year around the Pacific, including New Guinea and Manus Island, as part of Australia's patrolling.

Being a shallow water diver meant he was often tasked with sweeping the hull to check for booby traps.

On one occasion, two ships were arranging a transfer when a cable got tangled with a propeller, so, in the middle of winter surrounded by icicles, Jack dressed in a canvas wetsuit and jumped in.

He went on to be married to his now late wife of 62 years, Helen. The pair were "two peas in a pod" and "never went anywhere without the other".

The couple had three children, and the family have a long-line of veterans who served in almost every conflict since World War I, starting with Tony's great-grandfather, grandfather and great-uncle, his dad Jack, himself, and three of his four children, due to an "inherit awareness of service".

As a boilermaker by trade, Jack moved into a senior supervisor role in charge of quality control from a young age.

He worked on a number of large hydro projects, and was qualified in high-pressure fabrication, where his work took him around Australia and sometimes overseas, bringing a sense of adventure to his children.

The couple settled in Goolwa during retirement for about 35 years and were involved in various community groups including RSL, Lions, a community craft group, learning computer, and thai chi.

Jack is widely remembered for having a cheeky grin and dry sense of humour, who loved engaging with others.

"It wouldn't matter how his morning had started – he would switch back on," Tony said.

"He would give (others) cheek and enjoyed poking fun at people.

"One of his favourite moments during any given day was if he could catch someone out." His passing was felt by the community,

with many stories and condolences from others, signifying the impact that he had on people.

Linda believes he will be "hugely missed", while Tony reflected on him as a "gentleman".

"But more than anything else, he was such a good example of how to lead a really good life," he said.

'We couldn't have asked for a better lived example."

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Federal Budget considers costof-living crisis

The Albanese Government's third Federal Budget was handed down on Tuesday night, with a greater focus on the nation's crippling cost-of-living crisis and fighting inflation.

Labor is expecting inflation to reach 3.5 per cent this year and 2.75 per cent in 2025-26, while the budget is predicted to deliver a \$13 billion surplus but tip into larger deficits over the next four years.

Ahead of the budget, one of the top priorities for Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie and Member for Kavel Dan Cregan last week was to see vital Adelaide Hills road infrastructure funding included in the budget.

Hall renovations continue

Local family 'flip'n and dip'n' Strath's former chicken shop

New owners of the former Strathalbyn chicken shop are busy preparing the building for its grand re-opening next week as a takeaway store that caters to all members of the community.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the Strath Chicken Shop was forced to close its doors the day before the Adelaide Cup long weekend last year due to financial stress.

The building has remained unoccupied since then, but will finally have new life breathed into it by a local family who were handed the keys last Wednesday.

It started out as a joke, but the idea to open a takeaway store soon grew legs for new owners, the Graetz family.

"It just started out as a joke when we

were sitting around the table one night, (saying) 'let's open the chicken shop' and it eventuated into 'let's call it Strath Flip'n and Dip'n," Fiona said.

"Oskar had the food truck, so we have done catering before, it's just a matter of now we've got a shop rather than a food truck."

Strath Chick'n Flip'n and Dip'n will have a predominant takeaway menu, including chicken and fresh rolls, and potentially sweets and cakes.

Its opening hours to start with will be 5.30am to 10pm seven days a week to fill a gap for those needing meals in the early hours of the morning and late at night.

"(We'll) open early in the morning for the truckies to go through and get their breakfast, and closing later at nights because when you come up from the city it's like a ghost town – nothing is open past 7.15pm and the pubs stop serving around 8pm,"

"There are some takeaways, but the

location for us is what made us pick this space because it's on the main (street)."

The family has spent about \$70,000 to get the building up and going for its anticipated grand opening next Friday mid-morning.

In the future, the Graetzs plan to put in outdoor seating and hire some local employees, and potentially look at turning the building into a café/restaurant.

For now, they are focused on getting it started in order to give back to the community.

"We will employ some eventually, but to get started, it will be six of us – family and close friends in food – that can help jump it and get it started," Orleans said.

"We want to make sure we know exactly what we're doing first, so when it comes to training them, it's easier.

"(It's about) giving back to the community a bit.

"We're quite immersed in the community, but we just want to get in there a bit more."

- The Institute was newly remodelled from 1939 and was called the Town Hall.

- 1939 centenary celebrations included a grand ball, with proceeds going to Town Hall.
- In 1939 January had two days of terrible bushfires, and it was a huge fight to save Strathalbyn.
- In September 1939 World War II started, and some men enlisted immediately, especially in the Air Force while others were 'called up'.
 In farming families some sons trained for war and others remained to grow food. Women were about to be called to form Women's Land Army, working on the land in industries, and munitions and factories making planes and all sorts of equipment for the war effort.
- The Institute Committee handed the Town Hall deeds and responsibility to the Corporation, and a large porch was built as a memorial.
- The Angas Flour Mill changed hands to the Laucke family.
- Major reconstruction occurred on Commercial Road.
- Mill Bridge was raised and moved.
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ The curved road from Commercial Road to Albyn Terrace was eliminated.
- The Great Depression dominated, with wages cut, wheat and wool prices reduced, and people waiting at end of day to take home bakery goods left unsold.


"It's a day where we stand together as one in saying bullying is not okay, to be kind to one another, and to stand behind Dolly's motto - 'speak even if your voice shakes'.

Push for youth opportunities in Mt Barker

A local MP is calling for the community to have its say on Mount Barker District Council's proposed Child and Youth Action Plan 2024-2028, which will hopefully open more opportunities for young people in

As of 2020, the Mount Barker council region's child and youth population stood at 12,547 - a number projected to grow to 17,415 by 2035.

In recognition of this growth and the evolving needs of this demographic, the four-year action plan outlines key actions and ongoing services council commits to implementing that are aimed at supporting the needs and aspirations of children and young people in the area.

It is the result of extensive consultation, incorporating insights and ideas shared by children, young people, community members, and stakeholders alike.

Some of the plan's actions include the feasibility of a programmed youth space, the establishment of a youth advisory group, appointment of a community development officer for children and youth, township play spaces, promotion of local activities and opportunities, and funding avenues.

Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie recently met with Member for Kavel Dan Cregan and Mount Barker Mayor David Leach to discuss the establishment of a youth hub, which is one of the plan's key priorities.

The wellbeing of young people in Mayo is a priority of mine," Ms Sharkie said.

"I have met with Dan Cregan and Mayor David Leach to discuss my goal of establishing a youth hub in Mount Barker, offering young people a purpose-built space where they feel welcome and safe.

"Public consultation for Mount Barker District Council Child and Youth Action Plan is now open, and I encourage young people and families to put in a submission to ensure they are part of the change we need to see in our community."

A Macclesfield couple are giving back to a worthy cause after going through their own health battles by participating in a fundraising walk in Adelaide on Sunday.

Motor Neurone Disease (MND) is a terminal illness that results in rapidly increasing disability, as messages to the muscles from the brain fail, and the muscles wither and waste while the mind remains active.

Currently, the illness has no effective treatment or cure, and average life expectancy is only 27 months from diagnosis.

The Walk to Defeat MND is a major annual fundraising event that enables MNDSA to provide qualified, experienced and passionate staff to provide care and comfort, and supportive client services, including occupational therapy, augmentative and alternative communication, and assistive equipment to aid independence and the caring role.

Held at Adelaide's Pinky Flat, opposite Adelaide Oval, the 4.5km walk on the banks of the Torrens River attracts hundreds of people, who individually attempt to raise money for the cause through participation.

Macclesfield couple Chris and Lesley Attrill will be among those lacing up their sneakers in support of MND.

The pair heard about the walk through their daughter Stacie who is on the MNDSA board.

"(Stacie) put a Facebook notice up saying MND walk is on May 19," Chris said.

"I didn't know about it, but I knew a little bit about MND from Neale Daniher from Melbourne.

"He used to play for Essendon and I've followed Essendon since I was a boy, so I thought 'why don't we join?' as a family because Stacie, her husband and three grandkids are down in Mitcham, so we'll all get down there at the park, have a good time, and raise a bit of money for the cause."

The couple wanted to give back to a cause after having gone through their own health battles.

Chris is a lung cancer survivor while Lesley is a bowel cancer survivor, and

each hoped to raise as much as they can through the walk to help people in similar situations.

"We do know what it's like to live through a debilitating disease and we've been lucky to come out the other end," Lesley said.

"Some of these people aren't so lucky because the research hasn't gotten to that same stage as cancer and some of the other diseases, so it's an opportunity to help one of those diseases still relatively unknown and give it publicity.


"If you've got a disability, it makes it that much tougher to get out and make your way in the world, and live a so-called normal life, so I think these sorts of causes help people in those predicaments to fulfil what they can with their life.


"So, I think that's always a good side of it – to see the people that have the support not just from their families, but organisations in the state and throughout the country that provide the supports they need in their day-to-day life.

"Hopefully, we come closer to a cure or at least make people more aware of it if nothing else."

Operation Safe Hills concludes

Police are warning motorists that officers will still be out in full force, paying attention to safety on the roads, despite Operation Safe Hills concluding this week.

The annual operation ran from September 2023 to April 2024 with a focus on speeding to try to reduce the impact of road trauma.

Sadly, during the operation, six lives were lost, including one motorcyclist, and 66 serious injuries occurred in crashes in the Hills Fleurieu local service area and its surrounds.

Additional officers and cameras were deployed to monitor roads in the region throughout the operation.

A total of 12,848 speeding offences were detected throughout the operation, and of the 29 motorists who immediately lost their

licence as a result of driving at high speeds, 12 were motorcyclists.

Although the operation has officially concluded, with the fine weather continuing through autumn, Superintendent Darren Fielke warned drivers not to risk their lives or others by engaging in dangerous road user behaviour.

"Police will still continue to pay attention to speeding and other dangerous driving behaviours on Adelaide Hills roads," he said.

"While the weather is still warm and the roads may be dry, it is very easy to come unstuck on these windy roads.

"Treat them with respect and obey the speed limit."

Road safety education programs vital for SA action plan

A new road safety report is highlighting how vital education programs are reaching more young South Australians to help them make safe decisions when on the road.

The first annual report of South Australia's Road Safety Action Plan 2023-2025, released during National Road Safety Week, presents a 12-month snapshot of achievements and progress against the Action Plan's ten priority areas, including schools and local places, regional areas and road user behaviour.

The Action Plan, released in February

2023, identifies measures that will contribute to a target of at least a 50 per cent reduction in lives lost and a 30 per cent reduction in serious injuries on South Australian roads by 2031.

Targeting dangerous behaviour through road safety education is a key focus, with the Department for Infrastructure and Transport's THINK! Road Safety Partnerships Program at the forefront of driving cultural change among young people.

Minister for Emergency Services Dan Cregan said the programs help those starting out behind the wheel make informed decisions.

"Education remains a key pillar – delivering programs that hit home and positively influence driver behaviour for the next generation on our roads," he said.

"We know there's much more to be done, but the first annual report of the Road Safety Action Plan 2023-25 marks an important step for the government to assess progress on its targets and inform future measures to help save lives."

Celebrating 50 years of preserving history

The Strathalbyn Museum celebrated turning 50 last Wednesday, hosting a morning tea for its past and present volunteers, and welcoming the Chief Executive Officer of the National Trust of SA Simon Ambrose.

Mr Ambrose was on hand for the cake cutting alongside current Strathalbyn Museum Chairman Warren Doman.

The history of planning for the museum goes back to 1939 when the then town clerk Harold Stowe started collecting historical items.

Concerned about what would happen to his collection, he called a public meeting and from that, the National Trust of Strathalbyn was formed.

When news the town's police station was going to be moved to Commercial Road, the members lobbied to use it as a museum, and in 1973 they gained approval, with the official opening staged in July 1974.

Mr Doman said since then, more than 100 to 150 volunteers had helped out at the buildings on Rankine Street.

"We have a History Month event this May, which involves being open for Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday afternoons, and on Saturday and Sunday, with a display about our 50 years," he said.

"On Wednesday, we had a morning tea for about 30 past and present volunteers to help celebrate the 50 years, and recognise the volunteers who have made the place what it is today."

Part of last week's celebrations was an exhibition of photographs showing how the museum has progressed.

"Over the past 10 years, there has been some major displays, (for example), there is a room set aside which shows the war room and gives an indication of what Strathalbyn people contributed during World War I and World War II," Mr Doman said.

"We have got an industry display in the stable that shows the different industries over the period of time, right back to the 1850s.

"There are about 12 to 14 different industries and we have an agricultural display that shows how agriculture changed in the Strathalbyn district over that time.


"They went from a quite prosperous start to a period of time when the soil started to deplete, and then after the advent of fertiliser, everything was restored again, and they came into another prosperous time after that."

Among those attending the volunteers' morning tea was Founding Secretary Janet Rankine.

While more than 100 volunteers have helped out at the museum, Mr Doman is always hoping more will assist.

Have your say on engagement charter

Alexandrina residents interested in housing growth in the council region's coastal areas, particularly Goolwa and Hindmarsh Island, are encouraged to share their input on proposed changes to the State Government's Community Engagement Charter.

The charter is a crucial strategic document that aims to provide opportunities for South Australians to influence how people live, work and move in urban and rural areas, and streamline delivering planning rules such as rezoning land by introducing a new engagement process.

One significant change being considered is the possibility of 'streamlined' rezoning processes, which could see rezoning fast-tracked with minimal community engagement, potentially limiting residents' chance to have a say in the matter.

For example, if the Minister for Planning Nick Champion deems prior community engagement sufficient then consultation on proponent-led rezoning proposals of land within a township boundary may be as short as 14 days, with limited opportunities for feedback.

He was ably assisted by club members Pat Simpson giving the lowdown on Hellebores, and Marg Jenkins who knows all about Cyclamens.


The question remains though - is it 'cyc' as in quick or bike?

She went on to work in the Crime Prevention area until her retirement in 1990 - the recipient of several citations and commendations

In retirement, she served three terms (nine years) as a Councillor with Alexandrina Council, and was Deputy Mayor when Kym McHugh was appointed Mayor.





Also, to celebrate the 40th anniversary of the railway between Mount Barker and Strathalbyn, SteamRanger is planning a special event on September 14 and 15.



Bartlett family reunites in Strathalbyn

Descendants of Edward and Susan Bartlett - who immigrated from England to Australia in 1849 and went on to settle locally - gathered in Strathalbyn for a family reunion recently.

About 40 family members enjoyed meeting new faces, and swapping stories and photos, with the aim to leave a record for future generations.

Edward Bartlett and his wife Susan embarked on the 'Harry Lorrequer' with seven of their 12 children on September 21, 1849.

The 12 children were John (1828-1906, who remained in England until 1853), William (1829, who remained in England), Edith (1831-1918), Mary Ann (1833-1911), Edwin (1834), Elizabeth (1836-1866), Susan (1837-1903), Albion Edward (1840-1926), Thomas (1840 - died at birth) and triplets Jane (1844-1846), John (1844-1846) and Thomas Henry (1844-1933)

After a three month journey, the ship docked at Port Adelaide on December 26, 1849, and the immigrants settled in the Macclesfield area.

The family settled on a property owned by Ferdinand Mueller - a well-known botanist known as German Paddock and produced orchard fruit stock.

Edward later built a cottage on the property in 1850, which is now under the care of the National Trust and its current owner.

All the timber appears to have been soaked with coal tar and perhaps arsenic as it is well-preserved and termite free, even after 150 years.

Edward and Susan worked for Von Mueller for many years as farm labourers.


As the family grew up they purchased land in the Bugle Ranges, Doctors Creek, Paris Creek, Macclesfield and Strathalbyn.

Descendants of three of the children that migrated to Australia attended the recent reunion.

Edwin Bartlett married Sarah Hamp in Macclesfield in 1858.

The couple settled in Bugle Ranges until 1871, living at German Paddock before moving to Bungaree and then Watervale.

They had 12 children – William, Henry,



Susan, John, Edwin, Ellen, Sarah, Isaac, four children – Sarah, Edward, and William, the day was planned "very quickly". Arthur, Robert, and Sydney.

Two of Edwin's children married Bartlett cousins in Strathalbyn, and Edwin returned to Strathalbyn when Sarah died.

He passed away in 1921, aged 86.

Albion Bartlett married Margaret Taylor at Meadows in 1871, had four children - Samuel, Albion, Ernest, and Leslie - and settled in Paris Creek.

They worked taking wagons and drays loaded with goods to Adelaide, and to the Bugle Ranges Railway Station when the line was built.

Albion died in 1926 and is buried at Macclesfield.

Thomas Henry Bartlett married twice and

and one child that died at birth – and with his second wife Agnes Patten he had three children - Francis, Stephen and Walter.

Thomas built a limestone and mortar home in Strathalbyn, growing all the food necessary for the family, selling any surplus.

By 1885 he was prosperous enough to own 24 allotments, a total of 61.5 acres in Strathalbyn, and possibly a farm in Macclesfield.

Thomas's first home was built at 4 Anderson Street and has withstood the test of time, having been restored by its present owners.

In later life, he was caretaker of the Soldiers Memorial Gardens in the centre of the town.

Thomas died in 1933 at the age of 88 and is buried in the Strathalbyn cemetery.

Reunion organiser Jeanette Bartlett said

'We did it in the last three months after we finalised one section of one of our families, and we decided everyone was getting older and it was time to get together and meet some new faces and learn a bit more about the family," she said.

'Everyone came with photos and were reminiscing.

"That was the lovely part – that it just brought everyone together and they realised we came from one very big family.

"We had name tags and people had to introduce themselves, asking which part of the family do you come from, and they were all trying to work out if they were second or third cousins.

'That was part of what made it so special – to be able to leave a record for future generations."

Alexandrina scores major grant for Milang heritage preservation

More of Alexandrina's history will be protected and promoted with the help of one of the State Government's Heritage Code Amendment grants, which has been offered to council to predominantly help preserve Milang's substantial heritage.

In recognition of their proactive work, Heritage Code Amendment grants of up to \$75,000 are being offered to eight councils across the state to improve planning rules that strength protections for approximately 93 local heritage places, 458 representative buildings and 15 historic areas.

These councils are the first to act on the State Planning Commission's three-prong approach to boost character and heritage protections, through elevating Character Areas to Historic Areas, and updating Character Area Statements and tougher demolition controls in Character Areas.

"As a government we have a focus to protect local heritage to ensure we retain our state's history for the enjoyment of future generations," Minister for Planning, Nick Champion, said.

"To reward these councils for being proactive in this important space, the South Australian Government is committed to offering funding to help deliver these stronger heritage protections.

"Funding offers have already been made

to five councils, and the remaining three councils will be given this opportunity once the code amendments have been initiated."

Of the fortunate councils is Alexandrina which received funding of up to \$75,000 for works supporting the preparation of Heritage Code Amendments.

Council will work with the Office for Design and Architecture SA on the grant criteria and how it can assist its Code Amendment work.

"Protecting and promoting Alexandrina's unique history is a priority for council, so we welcome this recognition by the Minister for Planning for the important work council is undertaking via Code Amendments," Chief Executive Officer, Nigel Morris, said.


"Next month, we kick off the public consultation stage of our Milang Local Heritage Code Amendment.

"Many of the residential and civic buildings constructed between the 1850s and 1900s remain intact in Milang and contribute to the character of this lakeside town today.

"Whilst Milang has a small number of State Heritage-listed buildings, no Local Heritage buildings or places have ever been listed.

"Our Code Amendment seeks to list several buildings, places and items, and establish an Historic Area Overlay in order to protect the substantial heritage in this special town."

Council is currently working on 16 Code Amendments, with three initiated by council, eight by private landowners, and a further five that affect SA being led by the state.

A scoping study has been initiated by Alexandrina Council to inform a potential Code Amendment that would look to increase more accommodation opportunities for the Langhorne Creek region.

A large portion of the town and its surrounds is affected by flooding on a relatively regular basis, which has restricted any expansion and meant that as the population has increased to support the growing wine industry, the local community has had to seek accommodation in nearby townships rather than in Langhorne Creek.

This has in turn had an impact on services, shops, industry and schools in town

An initial desktop review has found ways the Alexandrina Council Development Plan and current Planning and Design Code could be amended to enable flexibility for housing and accommodation in the Langhorne Creek region while maintain protection for valuable horticultural and primary production land.

It comes off the back of enquiries over several years regarding current zoning restrictions, and how the guidelines could be changed to enable more dwellings and other forms of accommodation around the town.

Given the 'clear messaging' from the community that it supports a proposed review of housing and accommodation policy, council proposed commencing investigations into a potential Code Amendment.

It proposed to do this through the commencement of a scoping study, which was approved by councillors in April, with a further report to be brought back upon its completion to endorse the preparation of a proposal to initiate a Code Amendment.

Council will apply for a Federal Housing Support Program grant for \$50,000 to enable a review of flood mapping, and an accommodation analysis and review for the Langhorne Creek region as part of the scoping study.

"There's no harm at all that can come from this," North Ward councillor, Sue Miller said

"It will be a robust and fair process, and it will allow everyone to participate.

"It's community-led and I love the way it's been presented as how it will be progressed."

If after that, council endorse the preparation of a code amendment, administration will prepare and present a document for consideration and endorsement, which if approved, will be formally lodged with Minister for Planning Nick Champion.

First council-owned intersection traffic lights planned for Mt Barker

Traffic lights are coming to Hartmann, Alexandrina and Bald Hills Roads after Mount Barker District Council made the significant decision at recent meeting in an aim to improve traffic management and safety.

Traffic data collected by council revealed the intersection is currently operating at near-full capacity at peak times, necessitating an upgrade to accommodate present and future traffic volumes effectively.

Three potential solutions were considered, including either a 20-metre diameter dual lane or 12-metre diameter single lane roundabout, before a recommendation was put to council to install traffic lights to ease congestion at the busy junction.

While a 20-meter diameter dual lane roundabout would achieve results similar to traffic lights, it posed significant challenges, including impacts on surrounding native vegetation and the necessity for land acquisition.

Similarly, a 12-meter diameter roundabout was found to be less effective and non-compliant for the B-double truck route along Alexandrina and Bald Hills Road.

"A thorough comparison of the upgrade options for this intersection was made against multiple criteria such as functionality, safety, impact on trees and private properties, and cost," Mount Barker Mayor, David Leach, said.

"A signalised intersection emerged as the best solution, offering a high level of effectiveness whilst having minimal impact on the surrounding native vegetation and not likely requiring any land acquisition."

Monitoring and maintenance of traffic signals will be outsourced to an external party, following the model established for existing school crossings and pedestrian activated signals.

Early cost estimates for the construction of traffic lights range between \$2 and \$4 million, and has been factored into the council's draft Long-Term Financial Plan.

Funding for the project will be sourced from developer contributions to the Transport Infrastructure Separate Rate, with the project proceeding to detailed design in 2024-25 and then construction in subsequent years.

Couple clocks up more than 50 years as volunteers

Milking agricultural industry into the future

Sustainability is a major focus for the dairy industry over the next five years, as outlined in the SA Dairy Industry Action Plan 2024-2029 which was recently launched during an industry event at a Mount Compass dairy farm.

The initiative by South Australian Dairyfarmers' Association (SADA) gives a roadmap for government to invest in policies into the future, and was launched by Premier Peter Malinauskas and Minister Clare Scriven.

The plan took five years of planning and about 15 months to create, including revising the feasibility study twice due to interest rate rises and inflation.

The Dairy Industry Action Plan 2024-2029 builds on the notion that premium will mean more than the quality of the product into the future.

Customers will come to expect that products are not only high in quality, but premium in terms of verifiably sustainable, integral and reputable.

Sustainable practices will take into consideration emissions, biosecurity, animal care and environmental footprint.

In terms of environmental footprint, SADA President Robert Brokenshire – who hosted the event on his Mount Compass farm - stated that the plan avoids "mistakes that have happened" in countries such as New Zealand, Canada, and Ireland, which are now "shrinking their industry" because of "knee jerk reactions" to certain calls.

Rather, he believes the dairy industry has

"led the way" for plans to reduce emissions by 2030, and on track by 2050 to be zero emissions as a dairy industry, and that South Australia "could capitalise" on that global market by exporting more into the future.





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Farming industry keeps improving

While inflation and interest rates hit the industry, Mr Brokenshire was optimistic about the mid and long-term plans for the industry.

At the recent launch, Premier Peter Malinauskas – who admitted he consumes a "truckload" of milk, with his household buying 16-litres of milk at a time – told more than 200 guests that industry numbers have shifted in the past 70 years.

In 1950, there was an estimated 175,000 dairy cows in the state, which yielded a nation-leading 406 million litres of milk every year, which was considered a highly-productive industry.

Fast forward to the beginning of this decade, over 3000 dairy farms have been consolidated to less than 200.

In 2021, stock had reduced by two thirds since 1950 to 67,650 cattle, but despite that, the production per cow had tripled to just under 500 million litres of milk, which he credited to the "ongoing commitment" from producers and processors to "keep growing and improving the industry".

South Australia has the largest production of milk in the country, and part of the plan is to increase production from 500 million litres to 700 million.

"South Australian dairy products are globally recognised and exported around the world, and the plan laid out by industry will aim to build on that reputation and ensure we also (produce) the greenest and more premium products on the market," Mr Malinauskas said.

The average age in the industry is 56 in South Australia, and the successive industry

action plans aim to work with government to address workforce issues.

Member for Mayo Rebekha Sharkie said after the dairy sector had experienced its share of "ups and downs", it was "heartening" to see it in "such a mature phase of development".

"The Australian Government has earmarked \$15 billion in its National Construction Fund," she said.

"The Government must ensure viable industries, such as the food manufacturing sector, be given appropriate access to grow the dairy opportunity, especially given the natural competitive advantages Australia has in the area."

The event was also the opening of the Amdena Dairy's new state-of-the-art rotary milking system, that will boost productivity, improve environmental outcomes, and support the health of their 400 Jersey cows.

The dairy has been operated by the Brokenshire family for more than 40 years, and provides to Fleurieu Milk Company.

On another note, a recent study found that the recommended 3.5 serves of dairy consumption a day reduces risks of hip fractures by 46 per cent, reduction in all fractures by 33 per cent, and a reduction in falls by 11 per cent.

Local farmers dealing with dry spell

Local grain growers are looking to the skies in the hope that the dry start to seeding will be over soon.

Woodchester farmer Neil Harvey typically crops canola, beans, wheat, barley and oats, and would dearly love 20 to 25mm of rain as soon as possible.

"Unfortunately, we had lots of rain during harvest in December and January, and since then the tap has really been turned off," Mr Harvey said.

"As farmers we have tried to conserve as much moisture as we could while summer weed spraying and keeping minimum weeds on the land.

"(However), the last couple of months has been exceptionally dry... we traditionally start seeding just after Anzac Day.

"This time last year we were seeding with no dust – we didn't have any dust from start to finish – (but) this year we have started in dust and we

are still in (it).

"And unfortunately, it looks like (for the) next week to 10 days there won't be too much rain about."

Mr Harvey has begun dry seeding, but the later it rains, the potential for less yield becomes more likely.

"By all means, it is not too late yet," he said.
"Traditionally, the break doesn't come until
the middle of May, so it is just unfortunate that
the forecast (is) a bit further than that, and we
can't see substantial rain in sight at the minute.

"They keep telling us once is starts raining we

are going to have a good Spring, so you have to be an optimist.

"The subsoil moisture we have is down a bit deep, and the stuff we are planting now is still dry seeding, but that subsoil moisture will reward us later on.

"As soon as we get that 15 to 25mm of rain, with the potential of it catching up to each other, then the season really kicks off."

While the start has failed to be ideal, technology and agricultural science means the outcome is better than what it would have been decades ago with the same factors.

"Twenty-five years ago we couldn't do what we are doing now – dry seeding – because the equipment we had back then wouldn't penetrate," Mr Harvey said.

"With technology and better chemicals you can still put the seed in the ground with some confidence as long as the rain comes at the right time.

"We have been blessed the past three years with early starts, but I can remember years ago, when we only started seeding in the first week of June, and that year turned out really well.

"So, it is not abnormal, but at the same time, we like to have an early break to give us our full potential – about 20 to 25mm would be ideal.

"Obviously the night time temperatures have got cooler – it is a lot dewier and there is moisture in the air at night – so we are just looking to the skies to get something at the minute."

Mr Harvey remains hopeful.

"Like the old fellas say, it doesn't grow in the bin, it has to be in the ground to grow," he said.

"These days, once it does rain, if it is in the ground, it will be out of the ground in no time, and you are away."

Milang Agricultural Bureau welcomes new trailer delivery

The Milang Agricultural Bureau received the 'delightful' delivery of a new barbecue trailer at its April meeting, which was held at Strathalbyn's Inverbrackie Border Leicester Stud.

The trailer will be used for meetings and field trips as a centrepiece for postmeeting gatherings where members foster friendships and learn informally from discussing common experiences.

Funding was provided by Community Bank Fleurieu and supported by Rural Bank, and the trailer is a great example of the Community Bank model in action – to share in profit and support local farmers through the Rural Bank Agribusiness specialists who live and work locally, and work with farming customers on financial products to support agricultural enterprises.

At the meeting, Landscapes SA Hills and Fleurieu Sustainable Agriculture Officer John Butler also presented members with an important and challenging topic – what is happening in the carbon space and how it is likely to influence agricultural production.

Members expressed concern that traditional family farms – as represented in the Bureau –may be disadvantaged within decarbonisation strategies negotiated between government and corporate farming interests.

For example, a small grape producer recently completed a government survey

intended to measure carbon emissions.

All fuel-intensive operations – pruning, harvesting, weed control, etcetera – are completed by family members.

By contrast, neighbouring vineyards owned by corporates use contractors to perform equivalent work.

If the relevant survey fails to rigorously track contractors' carbon emissions, the small family operation may be counted as a relatively heavy user of fossil fuels per unit of production.

It is hoped that Australia can devise processes that will accurately trace carbon emissions and protect family farms from any distortions of how they use fuels and fertilisers.

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





What you need to know

On May 6, 2024, major changes to how the Family Law Courts determine parenting matters came into effect.

The primary purpose of the changes are to protect victims of family violence, particularly children.

The impact of the amendments will become clearer as judgements become available which will interpret and apply the changes to real life cases.

The main amendments are:

 There is no longer a presumption of equal shared parental responsibility. The presumption related to the joint making of major long-term decisions, but was commonly misunderstood to create a right to equal time arrangements.

 The Court is no longer required consider ordering significant and substantial time. That provision required the court to consider making an order that the child spend equal time, or substantial and significant time, with each parent, if an order for equal shared parental responsibility was made.

It remains open to the court to consider equal time arrangements, or arrangements that give substantial or significant time with each parent, in accordance with the child's best interests.

In considering a parenting arrangement that is in the best interest of a child, the Court has streamlined its approach to six considerations rather than the previous 13.

(a) what arrangements would promote the safety of the child and each person who has care of the child;

any views expressed by the child; the developmental, psychological, emotional and cultural needs of the child;

the capacity of each person who has or is proposed to have parental responsibility for the child to provide for the child's developmental, psychological, emotional and cultural needs;

(e) the benefit to the child of being able to have a relationship with the child's parents, and other people who are significant to the child, where it is safe to do so; and

anything else that is relevant to the particular circumstances of the child.

• Further provisions have been introduced which apply to indigenous children to support their connections to family and culture;

 There are now "harmful proceedings orders" that consider the impact of court proceedings on a party.

Harm may include psychological harm or oppression, major mental distress, behaviour which causes a detrimental effect on the other party's capacity to care for a child, or financial harm.

• The Independent Children's Lawyer is required to meet with the children whose interests they represent if that child is over the age of five years (with some exceptions);

 Strongly urge anyone who is currently involved in a parenting dispute or considering pursuing an application to the court to obtain legal advice regarding the amendments and the likely impact of them on their particular case.

Langford sets sight on World Uni Games

Mount Compass race walker Nellie Langford has her eyes set on the World University Games after a mid-field result at the World Teams Race Walking Championships last month.

Championships last month.
Langford placed 32 in a field of 50 at the 10km event in Turkey, which she was happy with.

"It was probably about where I expected," she said.

"It wasn't necessarily a really, really big time, or a really terrible time, it was just around what I have been doing all season

"I walked a road PB technically, but I was still like 40 seconds off the time I have done on the track, but technically it was a 10 second PB on the road."

Langford said the she and the two other Australian women's competitors were excited to take part, especially after learning under 20 boy's walker Isaac Beacroft, from NSW, had just won his race

"We have never had a medallist in that race before, and we were so excited to race when we heard over the speakers that Isaac had just won," she said.

"It was such a new experience, and it was so interesting just to be around all these people warming up.

"You are used to seeing SA, or NSW, not Japan and China all around you – seeing the girls up the front that will probably be at the next Olympics, it was pretty cool.

"We were almost crying, it was so exciting to do the race."


Langford said the race was held in near perfect conditions, with a nice wide flat course.

"I have never had a course where all the turns were so nice and wide, so it was a really quick course," Langford said.

"The other two Australian girls were ahead of me, so I was really happy for them, one posted a personal best and

one finished 16th, which is massive.
"Top 20 is always amazing, and the other girl was 22nd, it was so good."

She said she is now inspired to train hard for the next big event – the World University Games early next year.



"It has inspired me to want to get back into it, I didn't want to have a break at all, but I kind of had to.

"Now I am motivated to do all the right things, do more stuff in the gym, and I definitely want to do (the Turkey event) again.

"The World Uni Games... that will be a 20km race, and open age, so it will be quite hard to get into, so I just want to have a long season of consistent training up until then, and probably race my first 20km race late this year."

Langford thanked her coach, doctors, local club, community supporters and her parents for making it possible for her to compete in Turkey.
