

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Proposed Strathalbyn RV park rejected

A recreational vehicle (RV) park at a proposed Strathalbyn site separate from Lot 10 has failed to gain support.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, creating RV parks within Alexandrina has been raised several times over the past two decades but failed to eventuate further than discussions until council directed in March last year for a scoping study report to be conducted on suitable locations for RV parking facilities locally.

The report brought back potential locations, with councillors finding Strathalbyn, adjacent to Parker Avenue, Mount Compass' Sam Court Reserve, and Barrage Road Reserve, adjacent to the PS Federal, to be the most suitable sites.

At the time, North Ward councillor Craig Maidment strongly opposed the proposed site for Strathalbyn due to its proximity to residents.

Feedback from pubic consultation – which was run in November last year – did show some support for the proposal, with 71 per cent of the Strathalbyn residents who responded voicing support the location.

But Cr Maidment remained unconvinced. Aside from the impact on residents, he was concerned that the Campervan and Motorhome Club of Australia (CMCA), which has been part of the redevelopment

plans for council's Lot 10 site for the last few years, had expressed it would remove its interest in setting up a competing RV Park at the incoming Langhorne Creek Road sporting recreation precinct if the proposed plans near Parker Avenue eventuated.

This was one of the main arguments Cr Maidment made against the proposed site on Monday night.

"Long vehicle parking would still be the preferred option for this site for people passing through town to stop and shop," he said.

"Camping in that area for up to 72 hours would impact the amenity of the immediate neighbouring residential properties which have a common boundary.

"There were 16 Strathalbyn residents who responded and 71 per cent or 11 people only were in favour of the Parker Avenue site – not a particularly good result when only 16 people out of a population of around 8000 residents of Strathalbyn and nearby areas (responded).

"So, where does this leave the Campervan and Motorhome Club of Australia at Lot 10? "For nine years they've been asking for

"For nine years they've been asking for an RV park.

"Yes, an RV park in the centre of town would be ideal, but if you look around Australia, there are many RV parks which are two kilometres or even further out of townships."

For these reasons the motion failed to gain support from all councillors.

For the other locations, 100 per cent of respondents to public consultation from Mount Compass supported the proposal for their town, while for Goolwa, 67 per cent of

residents were in support.

But despite the overwhelming support from residents, council had concerns about the location for Goolwa based on the severe impacts it would potentially have on the surrounding wetland environment and its unlikeliness to be approved by the minister.

That's why while councillors agreed to conduct an Expression of Interest process for the development and management of an RV park at Mount Compass, they withdrew the concept of one at Goolwa.

Additionally during Monday night's meeting, council made a move to attract more tourism to Langhorne Creek.

The CMCA has set up an RV Friendly Town initiative aimed at assisting RV travellers as they journey throughout Australia.

Potts Reserve – which currently accommodates RV travellers who use the destination for short-term stays – meets the criteria for the initiative, prompting council to make a move to seek accreditation for Langhorne Creek to become recognised as an RV Friendly Town.

This would allow for Langhorne Creek to be advertised on the CMCA website and other marketing mechanisms, and on township entry signage as having this title, which would increase short-term visitors and subsequently economic benefits, stimulus and visitation for local businesses and wineries.

An application to the CMCA for RV Friendly accreditation will be undertaken in consultation with the Langhorne Creek community.

Feedback sought on roundabout design at Meadows

Meadows residents are being invited to share their experiences of using the Mawson Road, Battunga Road and Nottage Road intersection ahead of scheduled works.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, Mount Barker District Council has been working with the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) – who cares and controls the Mawson and Battunga Roads – on the treatment and design for the intersection for years.

Work had been stalled due to costs, but thanks to the advocacy from Member for Heysen Josh Teague and local residents, the State Government committed funding in March to improve road safety in the Adelaide Hills by upgrading the intersection.

DIT has developed a draft concept design for a roundabout upgrade at the intersection to improve traffic efficiency and make it safer for turning vehicles as well as pedestrians and cyclists and is now seeking input from residents to help inform the final design.

The department would like to understand people's current experiences using the intersection, and how they feel the proposed concept design would address any concerns.

Two drop-in sessions will be at the Meadows Memorial Hall today between 5pm and 7pm, and on Saturday between 12.30pm and 2.30pm for residents to have their say.

Feedback is open on the draft concept until Friday, June 13. The works are expected to begin in

the second half of next year.

Dog charges rise again for pet owners

Alexandrina dog registration and charges will see another minor increase in the upcoming financial year.

Fees have been indexed at CPI, with rounding involved to nearest 50 cents, except for seizure and impounds which have had a greater increase to cover the cost being charged to Alexandrina Council.

Councils are obligated to provide a rebate on registration fees for dogs that are both desexed and microchipped.

Following endorsement from councillors last Monday night, these are the fees for the 2025/26 financial year:

• Standard dog: \$54 (\$1.50 increase)

- Standard dog pension concession: \$28.50 (\$1 increase)
- Non-standard dog: \$105.50 (\$3 increase)
- Non-standard dog pension concession: \$54 (\$1.50 increase)
- Working dog: \$31 (\$1 increase)
- Racing greyhound: \$54 (\$1.50 increase)Standard dog training (level 2):
- \$41.50 (\$1.50 increase)

 Standard dog training (level 2) –
- concession: \$21 (\$1 increase)

 Business registration (price per dog):
- \$115.50 (\$3 increase)

 Assistance dog, assistance dog in training, and puppy registration (under
- six months): no charge

 Late fee: \$22.50 (\$2.50 increase)

 Twelve per cent of total dog registration

The board allocates funds to welfare organisations such as the Animal Welfare League and RSPCA, conducts training for dog management officers, and produces educational materials for councils to share with the community.



Landmark EFPA changes met with backlash

A landmark legislation passed by the State Government last week has now enabled the potential for thousands of new homes to be developed on cropping land in Goolwa, Victor Harbor and Murray Bridge.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the government expressed its intent to introduce a bill to vary the Environment Food Production Areas (EFPA) which would enable it to rezone cropping land for housing development in areas like Goolwa, Murray Bridge and Victor Harbor which the Greater Adelaide Regional Plan (GARP) identified as suitable to accommodate a large proportion of future projected housing needs for the Fleurieu over the next three decades.

These variations have now been approved and are expected to help the state meet current and future housing demand while maintaining the integrity of South Australia's most productive agricultural areas by allowing the potential to accommodate approximately 7000 new dwellings in Victor Harbor and Goolwa, and 10,400 in Murray Bridge.

"This is a massive moment for South Australia's future," Planning Minister, Nick Champion, said.

"We are unlocking the potential for more than 60,000 new homes for South Australians and tackling the housing crisis head-on.


"This reform ensures we will have the land and the infrastructure in place to deliver the homes South Australians will need for generations to come.


"More homes mean more jobs, stronger communities and a more inclusive economy."

But the decision has been met with heavy criticism by the state's Opposition, including Member for Finniss David Basham.

He supported development but told *The* Argus it needed to be "well-planned, able to be serviced, and contribute to the community being a place locals desire to live".

"I have heard from constituents that a satellite town is not in the best interests of the Goolwa community, and many residents are very concerned about the capacity for the Goolwa and Victor Harbor Roads, as





to be removed from EFPA due to existing infrastructure, location and not ideal for farming can still be used for shopping centres, schools, industrial, etcetera under the current overlay, the only thing it can't be used for under EFPA zoning is residential crazy when that is where people want to live.

"The government took umbrance to pockets of environmentally sensitive land, and this is an important consideration that can be understood and managed best locally to enhance a residential area.

"I feel the process has been forced and somewhat rushed mostly independent of the local member or key leaders, (and) I can see little evidence of the integration of the local community feedback provided last year for GARP."

Mr Basham will continue to advocate for sensible development and land use for the community, and welcomed any discussion

from residents that have ideas or concerns. Grain Producers SA (GPSA) was equally

disappointed with the decision. GPSA Chief Executive Officer Brad Perry said grain producers in the affected areas were "devastated" by the decision.

"It's a dark day for the grain industry and agriculture more broadly when some of the state's prime cropping land that was once protected by legislation is rezoned for housing, forever lost to grain production,"

"The very parliament that established the EFPAs has now voted to weaken them, opening prime cropping land – 33 per cent more productive than the state average – for housing development.

"There is still no solution to the conflict that occurs when productive farming

operations are forced to coexist with expanding residential developments and yet, approval for urban sprawl continues.

"These changes through parliament set a worrying precedent for the continued erosion of South Australia's agricultural land."

While Mr Perry supported more housing, he drew the line at sacrificing productive agricultural land to achieve it.

"The cropping land now to be rezoned for housing development in areas like Murray Bridge supports the production of enough grain for 57 million loaves of bread every year – that is not an insignificant contribution," he said.

"The question that must continually be asked is: when will agricultural land be prioritised in strategic planning?

"For too long, governments have viewed farmland as a convenient blank canvas for other uses - be it housing, mining, infrastructure or renewable energy.

"Meanwhile, South Australian grain producers are feeding the world and driving our export economy. Where does that rank in importance?'

Under the new legislation land removed from the EFPA will be subject to a limited land division overlay, preventing unplanned fragmentation and ensuring rezoning occurs in a staged, infrastructureready manner.

Alexandrina Council told The Argus it would need to carefully manage the development of all growth areas to ensure appropriate infrastructure is "delivered in a co-ordinated manner".

"The areas that have been announced by Minister Champion as being 'unlocked' for future housing within the Alexandrina

Council area... were already included and approved by the minister within the recently released Greater Adelaide Regional Plan,"

"The 'unlocking' referred to relates to the legislation change to alter the Environment and Food Production Area Overlay which previously prohibited residential development - to enable the delivery of the GARP.

'Council notes these areas will continue to be subject to a 'Limited Land Division' Overlay, which is intended to prevent premature or fragmented development of these areas.

"The intent of the planning system is to encourage developers to make reasonable financial contributions to infrastructure required to support their development in order to reduce the financial burden on council's ratepayers.'

A government spokesperson previously told *The Argus* the proposed changes will give landowners a choice on whether to continue farming or develop housing.

"All the proposed rules will do is ensure the growth areas over the next 30 years in the GARP align with the EFPA provisions," the spokesperson explained.

"Any future changes still need to follow the existing process, which provides for a five yearly review of the EFPA boundaries by the State Planning Commission, which can be disallowed by either Houses of Parliament.

"Removing the land from the EFPA does not change the current zoning, and all areas identified for growth will need to be structure planned, with infrastructure and servicing costed before the land is rezoned for residential purposes.

"All land identified for future residential and employment growth was tested through an extensive land suitability analysis and multi-criteria assessment which included an assessment against a criterion of productive land and soil suitability.

"The land included as future residential was identified against all the criteria, on balance, as being the most suitable land for future residential development."

In response to community backlash, Minister Champion assured the decision was made after careful analysis and extensive consultation.

"The decision to reconfigure EFPA boundaries was made after careful analysis and extensive consultation to balance the urgent need for new housing, the need to secure housing for future generations, and the protection of South Australia's prime agricultural land," he told The Argus.

"Less than one percent of productive land is affected and strong safeguards are in place to ensure ongoing protection and proper planning measures are made.

"We remain committed to working with local councils and communities to support both housing growth and South Australia's vital agricultural sector."

Algae bloom persists on the Fleurieu

An online meeting hosted by Deputy Premier Susan Close between local MPs and coastal council mayors affected by the ongoing marine microalgae bloom met last Thursday to discuss the latest on the situation.

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Cattle truck rolls at Nangkita Rd

Several cows had to be euthanised after a fully laden cattle truck rolled at Nangkita last Thursday.

Just before 10am on May 15, emergency services were called to Nangkita Road, near Willowburn Drive, following reports a cattle truck had rolled.

Patrols arrived to find the truck down an embankment and in a creek.

The driver, a 29-year-old Craigmore man, was taken to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries and will undergo mandatory blood test.

A heavy vehicle tow truck removed the vehicle while PIRSA personnel assisted with euthanising the animals.

The investigation into the circumstances of the crash is ongoing.



Not out of the woods yet despite fire season end

Authorities are warning against complacency, despite the fire danger season officially ending in all South Australian districts, with dry conditions still posing a fire risk.

The Bureau of Meteorology has recorded the period from October 2024 to April 2025 as one of the hottest and driest on record, with maximum temperatures the highest seen for much of the state and rainfall in the bottom 10 per cent for most districts.

The fire danger season was extended by two weeks in the Mount Lofty Ranges fire ban district to May 14 – the first time since 2019 – due to soil dryness, high forest and scrub fuel loads, and no meaningful rainfall forecasts over the coming months.

With the season now ended, South Australians planning to conduct any burnoffs, especially in proximity to any scrub or timbered vegetation, are urged to maintain safe practices such as preparing a clean field break of at least four metres and ensure a sufficient water supply and a responsible person is on scene.

"Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers have worked incredibly hard through one of South Australia's hottest and driest fire danger seasons, and have ensured the losses and impacts of major fires have been

significantly minimised," CFS Chief Officer, Brett Loughlin, said.

"Every volunteer should be proud of the work they have put in to protect the community.

"As an all-hazard agency, our volunteers will continue to respond to incidents across the state, despite the end of the fire danger season.

"Complacency is a major risk for our agency at this time of year, particularly with dry conditions and minimal rainfall forecast for the near future, so it's imperative the South Australian community are adequately prepared and vigilant should they decide to conduct any burn-offs, especially in proximity to any scrub or timbered vegetation."

Fire prevented at Woolworths

A quick response from local firies prevented a major incident at the Strathalbyn Woolworths last Monday night.

At about 9.30pm on May 19, Strathalbyn and Woodchester Country Fire Service (CFS)

crews were called to Dawson Street following reports that an electrical distribution board was smoking.

Crews in BA gear isolated the power to the impacted distribution board and cooled the area with a CO2 extinguisher.

A thermal imaging camera showed a

temperature of more than 800 degrees celsius at one point.

The Strathalbyn CFS thanked staff members for their help during the incident and were glad to hear the shop was open for business the following morning.

A local woman sustained minor injuries after colliding with a tree at Goolwa last Wednesday.

Just before midday on May 14, emergency services were called to Alexandrina Road following reports a car had collided with a tree.

The driver, a 19-year-old Goolwa woman, was taken to hospital for assessment of minor injuries.

Police investigated the crash and no charges were laid against the driver.

Meadows man injured in three-way crash

A Meadows man sustained non-lifethreatening injuries during a threevehicle collision at Cambrai on Sunday.

At about 1.15pm, police and emergency services were called to Ridley Road following reports of a collision between two cars and a truck.

The truck driver, a 33-year-old Salisbury Plain man, and the driver of a Holden SUV, a 69-year-old Meadows man, were both airlifted to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

Sadly, the driver of a Toyota SUV, a 59-year-old Sedan man, died at the scene.

Major Crash investigators examined the scene and following their investigation, the 33-year-old truck driver was arrested and charged with causing death by dangerous driving and causing harm by dangerous driving.

He was granted bail to appear in Berri Magistrates Court on August 11, and was issued with an immediate loss of licence until further order.

The man's death is the 31st life lost on South Australian roads this year.

Pair arrested over Murray Bridge assault

Two local men were arrested following a serious assault in Murray Bridge earlier this month.

Shortly before midday on Tuesday, May 6, police and emergency services were called to Neumann Avenue in relation to an assault, where, upon arrival, they

located a 34-year-old local man who had an injury to the back of his head.

The man was treated at the scene by paramedics before being taken to hospital. Local forensic officers attended the scene and conducted an examination.

Following an investigation, on Friday, May

9, police arrested an 18-year-old man and a 33-year-old man – both from Murray Bridge.

Both men were charged with assault that causes harm and refused police bail.

They appeared in Murray Bridge Magistrates Court on May 10, where they were remanded in custody.

Strathalbyn's Argus House Shop will change ownership for the first time in 27 years, and the historic building will also expand its offerings.

After opening the shop in 1998, Clara Stockigt is now handing over the reins to Michael and Britt Vaninetti, the owners of Strathalbyn clothing store CICLO.

The historic building on Commercial Road will become a shared space for the two popular local businesses.

"I'm relieved and delighted the business will continue to operate, and will serve all our loyal and long-term customers who love this shop," Ms Stockigt said.

"I feel really lucky that someone as inspired and energetic as Britt has come on board."

Ms Vaninetti is delighted to have the opportunity to operate from a building that has such a wonderful reputation and legacy, and expand on her current trading space.

"It's amazing how many people you speak to... (who say) it's such a beautiful place to come – there's so many gems in Argus House that you just can't find anywhere else," she said.

"I don't think anything like this could be replicated anywhere... it's a really special place."

Argus House is expected to remain business as usual, stocking products from smaller businesses that customers say they don't see elsewhere, including a selection of children's toys, jewellery, clothing and giftware.

Long-time employee of 17 years Pauline

Gibbs will continue in the role, while much-loved Argus the cat will also stay.

Meanwhile, CICLO – the Italian word for 'cycle' – opened in 2024 with a mission to challenge fast fashion by selling quality wardrobe staples and offering a buyback scheme

The owners are active in the community – also running Vanscapes Strathalbyn – and are raising their family in town.

After growing up in Strathalbyn – and Ms Vaninetti's grandparents Jean and Joe also previously owning the former nearby Lee's Electrical – the family have a strong

love for the area.

"To have our own space just around the corner (from Lee's Electrical) is pretty special," Ms Vaninetti said.

"We feel lucky that we've been given the opportunity."

Argus House was built in 1866 and was home to *The Southern Argus* printing press from 1872 until 1948.

The building's inclusion on the National Trust Heritage Register recognises its cultural and historical significance.

Argus House building is being sold to the Versteegh family.

Ms Stockigt decided to sell after being diagnosed with the blood cancer Myeloma in 2002.

The disease accounts for about 15 per cent of blood cancers and about one per cent of all cancers are myeloma.

"While the disease remains incurable, treatments are developing incredibly rapidly and life expectancies are extending," she said.

"I'm now going to be able to focus on staying well and enjoying life."

The change of ownership will happen on May 30 and CICLO's relocation will occur shortly afterwards.

Call for more dams to safeguard against drought

Mr Manuel called for assessments for dams of a four megalitre size on farms of 100 acres to be based on individual properties.

"Normally, I would be running about 120 head at the moment – I am down to 65," he said.

"It is getting to the stage now where, the bit of hay that we have had, because it has been warm, they didn't need the energy as much, but now as it starts to come in cold, they need double the feed.

"It is not good and I think there will be a lot of people that will never recover from this."

With the ongoing challenges of drought, the need for practical, equitable and sustainable water solutions have never been more urgent.

However, the Hills and Fleurieu Landscape Board said it was important to know why the moratorium on new and enlarged dams in the Mount Lofty Ranges currently remains in place.

The moratorium has been in place since 2013 to ensure water continues to flow to where the board says it is needed most – to other farmers, communities, and the environment

Paul Wainwright, from the board, said a motion by Dr Game to ease dam restrictions

was of "serious concern".

"Many catchments in the Mount Lofty Ranges are already overallocated," he said.

"Further dam development would place unsustainable pressure on an already stressed system.

"Additionally, around 30 per cent of water stored in dams is lost to evaporation.

"This isn't about restricting farmers, it's about ensuring long-term water security for all

"The government is actively working with communities to develop a Regional Water Security Strategy and update water allocation plans."

All land managers planning work in a watercourse or on a dam must obtain the appropriate development approval or a Water Affecting Activity (WAA) permit, which are safeguards that ensure any changes to the landscape are managed responsibly and sustainably.

Minister for Environment and Water Susan Close echoed Mr Wainwright's comments, noting the dam moratorium was put in place in 2013 to ensure the sustainable management of the region's water resources.

"Changing this policy setting would do little to assist those farmers who are currently suffering a water shortage," she said.

"Additionally, around 30 per cent of water stored in dams is lost to evaporation.

"More water evaporating from more

dams will further reduce water availability for everyone.

"With climate change resulting in South Australia experiencing hotter drier periods, prudent water management is more important than ever.

"One of the last things we want to do while in drought is to prevent replenishing water sources everyone depends on."

Dr Game disagreed.

She said the reaction to her proposal and the attention her motion had attracted clearly shows that farm dam regulation isn't working in the best interests of farmers and South Australians who want locally grown, fresh food.

"This plague of government overregulation is the problem, and it's driving up the cost of fresh food and increasing our dependence on imported food," Dr Game told *The Argus*.

"Those prohibitive regulations and costs are robbing drought-impacted farmers in *The Southern Argus* readership from building suitable dams that could water livestock and crops.

"I want farmers to be able to modify or create a dam up to five megalitres, with a three-metre dam wall height, without a permit under the Landscape South Australia Act 2019.

"And it's worth noting that under my proposal dams larger than that would still require approval by the local council."

HISTORY MONTH:

During History Month, *The Southern Argus* is publishing a series on Donald Sutherland, a stonemason/builder of early Strathalbyn and districts. The series is researched by Strathalbyn historian Carolyn Tucker with support from Donald's great, great-granddaughter Kaye Sheehan, who shone a spotlight on a man responsible for several of Strathalbyn's earliest stone buildings, but was previously

missing from local history books.

Family visits Strathalbyn

One of the many interesting facets of working in the History Room of the Alexandrina Library, Strathalbyn, is the recurring experience of meeting visitors whose enquiries lead us to learn amazing things; history so significant, yet it has escaped inclusion in our local history books.

It is not by oversight by any one of our esteemed authors of publications.

Simply, that people arrived in Strathalbyn from 1839, toiled for decades, raised families and when the need to seek new opportunities arose, they moved on, often far away and their story went too.

Great, great-granddaughter of Donald and Janet Sutherland, Kaye Sheehan, of near Geelong, visited the History Room of Strathalbyn Library in August 2024 hoping to learn the whereabouts of the property 'Craigdarroch'.

Kaye's great grandfather was the Sutherland's son William.

At this time, they had been recorded in a Property Names Project.

However, nothing was known of Donald's important building work in early Strathalbyn and district from 1840s to the early 1870s, his farming at Lake Plains, nor where his land and 'Craigdarroch' were situated, but Kaye shared her extensive knowledge.

In the course of our research, John McBeath, grandson of Donald and Janet Sutherland revealed further building information in a Letter to the Editor in *The Southern Argus* 1933.

John McBeath was son of Donald McBeath and Harriet (nee Sutherland).

1840s - Building work and a growing family

The first of their 11 children to be born at Strathalbyn was second child, Jessie/Janet

Sutherland 1844, then David c. 1849 and Margaret c. 1850.

During 1848, Donald was "one of the expert masons who built the original St. Andrew's Church", according to John McBeath's letter.

"He built the flour mill for the Colman's, also Gollan's and Bowman's houses and many others," it read.

It may be that Donald Sutherland built the original Gollan's Mill 1847 and worked on the rebuild after the fire, which then became Colman's Mill by 1851.

Donald Gollan was also a stonemason, having built the first stone structure in Strathalbyn with William Rogers.

The building would have created work for many, including the quarrying and carting of stone and felling of timber.

1850s - Buying and leasing, farming, family and building

Donald Stewart Sutherland was born 1854 at 'Craigdarroch' and in that year, Donald Sutherland's Tender was accepted to build the Presbyterian Manse in Love Avenue.

In 1852, he bought Section 2627 Hd. of Kondoparinga of 78 acres with houses, near the township.

He sold it six weeks later to William Rankine. In 1856, he was the owner of property 'Stoney Know' in Hundred of Kondoparinga.

In 1859, eldest daughter Harriett married Donald McBeath at Donald's home, Sandergrove.

In the same year, Donald built the 15-room Belvidere Hotel for Jeff Jeffries.

Discovering an iconic stonemason

Donald's sister Ann came out from Dingwall, Scotland and married Malcolm McCrae, a blacksmith.

In 1855, Donald leased Section 2055 Hundred of Bremer at Lake Plains where in 1856 Daniel Sutherland was born.

The block of approx. 60 acres was situated between Richmore and Chapel roads NS and Windermere Road EW, closer to the Angas River than the Bremer.

Donald tendered for enlarging the St. Andrew's Church. The work went to the lowest Tender, of

Edward (Edmund) Nicholls.

Third son William was born 1857 at Strathalbyn.

C. 1857/58, their fourth daughter Elizabeth was born at Echunga.

While their connection to Echunga is unknown, it was the name to the hotel Donald built after moving to near Cohuna Vic.

The name was changed to The Black Bull Hotel as the name sounded too much like Echuca.

Fourth son Daniel Sutherland and fifth son Simon Sutherland were born c. 1859/1860 at 'Craigdarroch'.

1860s more building and births

Donald was combining building with farming during the 1860s.

He worked on the additions to the St. Andrew's Church which in that decade included the spier, porch and gallery on the eastern end of the building.

He also built the Morning Star Inn at Wistow. Their second daughter Jessie married Edward Yates at Black Bull Inn, Hindley Street 1864. The couple were licensees of the Morning Star Inn for 40 years.

In 1864, sixth son Charles Stewart Sutherland was born at Lake Plains and, in 1865, a fifth daughter Isabella Sutherland was born.

In 1865, Part Section 2603 Hundred of Bremer on the edge of Strathalbyn by the Angas River was sold back to Christina McLean.

On May 12, 1868, Donald purchased Lot 29 Milang West and sold it a month later on June 8.

New tourism cabins planned for Mount Jagged property

Two tourism accommodation cabins are proposed to be built at Mount Jagged to offer visitors "immersive" natural experiences and highlight the Fleurieu region.

In an application lodged with PlanSA by Greg and Vanessa Wiese, the pair propose to build two tourism accommodation cabins, water tanks and an associated vehicle access track on the 192 Mosquito Hill Road property.

The cabins comprise of a bedroom, bathroom and living room/kitchen space.

The property already contains several farm buildings while the remainder consists of fenced grass paddocks used for small-scale beef cattle grazing as a secondary income due to its small size for commercial farming.

The development site has been selected to ensure seclusion and privacy from the existing buildings, and take advantage of the views of the lower lakes and Murray Mouth.

"The proposed tourism accommodation is of small scale, aligned with the primary production use of the land, although at a minor and hobby farming level," Mrotek Town Planning Director, Adam Mrotek, said in a report.

"The accommodation is situated 400 metres away from sensitive receivers and located on flatter terrain at the hilltop, thereby minimising the need for cut and fill, while providing excellent long-distance views of the lower lakes and Murray mouth to enhance the visitor experience.

"The low-level, single-storey building, with a footprint of 50 square metres and finished in a monument colour, will seamlessly blend into the natural landscape.

"The proposed development supports the desired outcomes for the Productive Rural Landscape Zone by offering a diverse range of land uses at an appropriate scale that

leverages the region's tourism and lifestyle opportunities while conserving the natural and rural character of the landscape."

The accommodation will be commercially available for short-term stays throughout the year.

Vehicle access to the cabins will be established through an existing gate on Mosquito Hill Road and a new all-weather compacted access track.

Each cabin includes one adjacent parking space.

As I near the age she was when she died – 59 – I think about all the things cancer made her miss out on – seeing her children get married, seeing her grandchildren grow up, and just navigating life's ups and downs with my dad, the extended family and friends.

The Cancer Council tells us that one in two Australians will be impacted by cancer before the age of 85, and even if you are lucky enough to not be diagnosed with it, it would be almost certain that someone close to you would have been.

On Mother's Day I did my little bit and took part in the Mother's Day Classic walk in Adelaide with a good friend who works in a chemotherapy unit at a local hospital.

For those who do want to help raise funds to fight cancer, there are a multitude of events you can get involved in.

At the moment, in May, Australia's Biggest Morning Tea get-togethers are popping up across the nation.

They raise funds for cancer research, prevention and support services.

Almost anyone can stage them by inviting friends, family and colleagues to share a cuppa and some food.

So far, the Cancer Council has 19,766 of them registered, with \$3,062,564 raised as of May 20.

Locally, the Macclesfield Young at Heart Club has almost raised \$300,000 since they began their iconic Biggest Morning Tea event in 2008.

If my mum had been battling cancer these days, more than 20 years later, her treatment path would have been so much more positive – mainly because of the work of those who raise funds for that treatment, research and support services.

Almost 130 people attended the morning, which included an auction, skits and speeches.

Co-ordinator Cathy Megson-McAllister thanked everyone for their generosity in supporting an important cause.

"From a small community, it's an incredible amount," she said.

"People were so generous with their bids, and everyone is struggling (in the economic climate) – it's just incredible what we can keep doing.

"Thanks to all the members, community and the businesses who donated – it was really, really fantastic with the donations we've received."

Ms Megson-McAllister also thanked the volunteers, many who are personally connected by the disease, with either themselves or family members being diagnosed, or by losing loved ones.

"The volunteers do the most wonderful job – everyone works so hard and not just on the day," she said.

"We're all getting older and it gets a bit harder but we're all so enthused."

An overarching message from the guest

speakers was the importance of getting tested, including by the much-loved Macclesfield wife and mother-of-one Donna Clarke who has breast cancer, and whose family and friends also generously donated towards the fundraising total.

"This year's going to be my last ever morning tea because I've been given weeks to live – it may be shorter than that," she told visitors, bringing many to tears.

"I will not have been lost or passed away, I'm very vocal on there's a circle of life – you're born, you die.

"Everybody talks about coming into the world, but nobody talks about death."

As reported in *The Southern Argus*, she recently had a 'living wake' – the "biggest party of (her) entire life" – to share with her loved ones.

Through her experience, Ms Clarke became a strong advocate for other cancer patients, from advocating for improving treatment pathways, to being a source of positivity during a hard time.

Meanwhile, Mount Barker District Council Mayor David Leach also opened up on his experiences with prostate and the "most aggressive form" of bowel cancer, which left him with multiple organ failure and in an induced coma.

"I've had a pretty rough trot with this disease but there is some good news – this all happened a year ago," he said.

"I've been to see the surgeons and the oncologists and they have both said 'you are cancer free."

The Strath Neighbourhood Centre's mission is to provide connection for residents in the town and surrounding areas, highlighting how important community is in ageing well.

Between 200 and 300 people use the facilities each week for anything from discounted meals to table tennis to gardening to line dancing to craft groups and more.

For older residents, this is an extremely important resource.

Particularly for those at the end of their careers, Centre Manager Mal Sutcliffe said it helps to maintain a social life after retirement.

"First and foremost we are a connection for residents of the town and the district, so we open up the doors for people to just chat and gather, with different activities," he said. "I was reading an article about two weeks ago that (said) once people get to mid-70s onwards, they tend to start losing social contact because it is getting a bit late in the day or they don't want to drive too far, or unfortunately, their friends have passed on, so making new friends or connections is vital.

"If social isolation and loneliness... get hold of a person, then depression and mental unwellness will set in, so maintaining contact is vital, and centres like this, not just us, add to the wellbeing of people."

At the centre, the volunteers are all passionate about their roles, helping with services such as administration, catering, gardening and repairing small items.

This also provides a source of socialisation after retirement.

Telecommunications facility denied

A telecommunications facility proposed to be erected at Clayton Bay to meet growing demand and alleviate service delivery issues experienced within the township has been rejected due to its "unacceptable visual impact".

A development application was lodged in December last year for the construction of a telecommunications facility comprising of a 40-metre monopole, headframe, two equipment cabinets, security fencing and associated infrastructure at 1517 Finniss-Clayton Road, which currently comprises of an existing detached dwelling, various outbuildings and water storage tanks.

It was noted the proposed facility will be sited in a visually sensitive location, being 15 metres from a major thoroughfare and 190 metres from the general entrance to the town, but it was not considered to be a significant nuisance.

It was deemed the most desired location for cellular coverage delivery.

"Whilst preferable to have these types of facilities to be co-located or within close proximity of one-another to reduce visual clutter, the advice received from the telecommunications provider indicates that it is not technically feasible to achieve the relevant service coverage objectives that Telstra requires," a report from the Fleurieu Regional Assessment Panel argued.

"For a telecommunications facility to be feasible for all users, it must have an unobstructed 360-degree distribution of service coverage across land accessible to users.

"Locating this facility on the eastern

side of Clayton Bay would result in a poorer signal to the township, as well as significant lost signal by result of directing signal east over the Goolwa Channel/Lower Murray.

"The provision of sub-optimal service coverage is not considered a feasible solution to service the land or areas consisting of natural water bodies, like the Lower River Murray, where users cannot access this service.

"Therefore, it was determined by the provider that the current proposed location is the most efficient location for ensuring an acceptable 360-degree distribution of services to meet the growing demands of caller infrastructure in Clayton Bay and the wider region."

The proposed development went to public consultation in January and received three representations in support, four in support with concerns, and nine in opposition.

The major concerns raised were the location, the potential devaluation of abutting and nearby properties, excess light and noise pollution, undermining of the dark skies classification, alleged excessive levels of electromagnetic radiation, and impacts on habitat.

The development application was debated at last month's Fleurieu Regional Assessment Panel meeting where, despite agreeing the application was not seriously at variance with the provisions of the Planning and Design Code, it was refused planning consent due to being "incompatible with the orderly and efficient servicing and conversion of the land for future urban growth" and its "unacceptable" visual impact on the township.

It was also noted the Aleppo pines proposed to be used for screen planting was inappropriate as it's a declared weed.

Can I lose my deposit if I can't settle on a property?

Purchasing a property is a significant milestone for many people, and it often involves tight timelines and strict legal requirements.

If settlement does not occur on the specified date, the seller is able to issue a Notice of Default, which will:

- Confirm that you are in breach of contract because you have not settled.
- Set a new deadline for settlement (often referred to as the 'Notice to Complete' period).
- Warn that if settlement does not occur by the new date, the seller can choose to terminate the contract and keep your deposit.

As well as losing your deposit, the seller can also seek interest, legal costs, and damages depending on the terms of the agreement.

Granny flats: tax traps and tips

With the current housing shortage, flat arrangement. building a granny flat or second dwelling in the backyard has become an affordable

In 2023, CoreLogic analysed residential properties in Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane, finding more than 655,000 sites suitable for granny flat construction.i

It's become so popular that there are hosts of businesses providing modular buildings as an alternative to designing and building your own.

Before taking the leap, you must check your state and local government regulations, restrictions and permit costs, as the rules vary considerably.

Tax implications

There are also potential tax consequences, particularly capital gains tax (CGT).

A granny flat may be considered a secondary dwelling on a property.

To be eligible for a CGT exemption, there needs to be a written agreement giving someone the right to occupy a property for life.ii

The agreement can be entered into with any party, including family and friends, and will be exempt from CGT provided the person with the 'granny flat interest' has reached pension age or requires day-to-day assistance because of a disability.

Granny flat or investment property?

There are important differences between a granny flat arrangement and building a secondary dwelling on your property as an investment or renting out a room in your home.

A second home on a property that's used for short or long-term rental purposes is considered a commercial arrangement.

The rent you receive is assessable income, which you pay income tax on at your marginal tax rate.

Like most income-producing activities, you are entitled to claim the normal expense deductions against the rental

Granny flat arrangements, on the other hand, must not be a commercial arrangement.

Capital gains

Capital gain can be an issue needing consideration when setting up a granny flat arrangement.

If you don't follow the rules, you may receive an unexpected tax bill when you eventually sell your home.

Usually, a granny flat arrangement is exempt from CGT provided it is not commercial in nature.

This means if the person living in the granny flat is required to make payments such as rent at market rate, CGT will apply.

However, if the individual only contributes to ongoing household costs such as electricity and water, the ATO is unlikely to consider it a commercial

To qualify for the CGT exemption, the property owner must be an individual.

One or more individuals must have an eligible granny flat interest in the property, and both parties must have entered into a written and binding granny flat arrangement.

The CGT exemption only applies to creating, changing or terminating a granny

rules and may be liable for CGT.

For example, the sale of a property previously used in a now terminated granny flat arrangement is still subject to the normal CGT rules.

Tips for a successful arrangement

To avoid potential problems further down the track, it is essential to get all the parties together to consider possible future scenarios before the written agreement is

The agreement should cover everyone involved in the arrangement, the circumstances in which the agreement can be varied or terminated, and what happens if this situation arises.

It's also sensible to discuss how any problems or financial conflicts will be resolved and to seek professional legal advice before signing.



Although the Strikers rallied and attempted to press for an equaliser, Prince Alfred's strong defensive partnership proved too powerful and the game finished 1-0.


Although yet another defeat for the Strikers, they went away full of spirit after pushing second place

It certainly was a welcome sight to see rain falling on the Strathalbyn golf course last Saturday after a long absence — and equally welcome was the sight of Graeme Noble breaking his winning drought by taking out the day with 39 points.

Graeme teed off with Kingsley Handke, John Owen and Geoff Hall, who was returning to golf after time spent playing tennis and recovering from a recent hip operation.

At the halfway mark, Kingsley and John, despite riding in a cart, decided they had had enough of the wet conditions and pulled up stumps, leaving Graeme and Geoff to continue on their own.

The result saw Noble win the day with 39 points, keeping out of too much trouble after both he and Geoff picked up on the second hole following wayward tee shots -Noble's only scrub for the day.
