# Calling on donations for hampers

 **By Tara Nash**

Local support groups are now collecting donations towards the annual Christmas hamper drive after another year of the rising cost of living and further pressure on households.

The Inter-church Council initiative is run with Country Life Compassion (CLC), Strath Neighbourhood Centre, Milang Old School House Community Centre (MOSHCC), and Vinnies, in collaboration with the local community, schools and with support from Teen Challenge.

The Christmas hampers – which have been running since at least 2011 – are delivered to Strathalbyn and surrounding towns, including Clayton Bay, Finniss, Callington, Milang, Langhorne Creek, and Ashbourne.

Last year, 208 hampers were delivered to 580 residents after their names were put forward by 14 different groups.

"That's the bit that confronts people – that there's almost 600 people in our community who need help," Strathalbyn volunteer, Sally Ness, said.

"I think that's a big number."

Long-life food and money donations are being sought.

Last year, a group of locals got creative and decided to donate to the cause in lieu of Kris Kringle presents.

Recipients can only be nominated by other organisations, and are anonymous

when the hampers are being collated, only indicated by genders, ages, and how many live in the household.

Those who nominate a person are then responsible in delivering in the hamper.

"There's always lots of tears giving out hampers," Country Life Compassion's Paquita Wise said.

"They are so thankful and so blessed by it, and appreciate it."

Volunteer Sue Eckert finds hampers are especially needed as local residents are stretched even further this year due to the rising cost of living.

"Everybody has gotten their power bill – it makes a hole in peoples' pockets that they weren't expecting," she said.

"Let alone that, the food prices have gone up. "A packet of cornflakes that last year cost \$5 is now \$7.50 – that's a huge jump.

"Having everyday food in the cupboard means the money can go a bit further and people can then use their cash to get what they want for Christmas."

Mrs Eckert saw the impact the hampers had on people when talking to a woman who works at a local shop.

"I (didn't) know their family had been given a hamper... I went into the shop and she said to me 'we got one,'" she remembered.

"I didn't know what she was talking about, so she said they had been given a hamper.

"As she's telling me, she's crying.

"She had a couple of teenage kids and we'd given them a gift card, and she said 'my kids were so excited they had some money of their own'"

Mrs Eckert finds the local support groups work "very well together" and is always appreciative of the generous community.

Long-life food and money donations can be made until December 2 to Woolworths Strathalbyn, through local churches, and at the Strathalbyn Churches Bookshop.

Cash Donations can be made to Strathalbyn Churches Bookshop, or at CLC, Strath Neighbourhood Centre or MOSHCC, or local collections can be made by arrangement.

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# Tyndale Captains hoping for exam success

Tyndale Christian School Captains Sean Kelly and Caitlin Baker are wishing for success for their peers over the next two weeks as they embark on their end-of-year exams.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, thousands of SACE students are expected to complete the final step of their secondary studies from Monday just gone.

Year 12 Tyndale student Sean had few nerves about his physics, specialist maths, and math methods exams, while fellow senior Caitlin was less confident about biology.

“Maths I’m not overly confident about, but I think I’ll be able to pass that,” she said.

“Biology is a bit of a mess if I’m being completely honest.

“We haven’t had very much time to revise, so I’m a little bit stressed about that.”

Both captains are heading into the exams with similar preparation methods, which include examining and working on previous years’ exams.

“I’m setting myself a plan to work through a certain number of hours every day for each subject, then as long as I stick to that plan, I’m pretty set,” Sean said.

“Math methods I’m more confident in.

“I did a trial exam for that, so I did better in that one than physics, so I’m definitely more confident in that.”

Sean is yet to decide whether he wants to pursue mechanical engineering or a Bachelor of Teaching, but has applied for both courses at Adelaide University.

Meanwhile, Caitlin is waiting for her results before making a decision about pursuing a scholarship to America or taking a gap year.

Getting a high ATAR was ideal for the pair, but for Sean, it was a ‘personal win’ if he remembered his physics concepts, while Caitlin wanted to ‘nail’ finance.

“I struggled with that throughout the year, which is weird because it’s meant to be the

easiest,” Caitlin said.

“But I find that finance is something I want to keep working on, so when I get into the exam, I can nail it.”

The captains’ parting words of advice for the Class of 2024 was to expose themselves to as many practice tests as possible, so it becomes normality in the exams, and to spread out their workload.

“You’re going to have times when you’re busy and have lots to do, and you’ll have times where you’re not busy and don’t have a lot to do,” Sean said.

“So, my advice would be to spread out how much work you’re doing across those times, and make sure even when you’re not busy, you’re still doing something to make sure you’re progressing, otherwise it can build up.”

Sean and Caitlin wished their peers the best of luck with exams.

“Good on you for sitting the exam,” Caitlin said.

“I think it’s a big thing to walk in there and sit it in general, so well done for just getting there.”

# Heritage grant awarded to St Andrew’s Church restoration project

Restoration works on one of Strathalbyn’s most famous churches have been supported by the awarding of a State Government heritage conservation grant.

The State Government’s Heritage Conservation Grants Program will provide a total of \$2.5 million over 10 grant rounds – double than the previous program – to encourage investment in South Australia’s diverse range of heritage places through financial assistance and advice for private owners undertaking conservation works.

Grants of up to \$5000 are available for simple projects, \$10,000 for complex and \$20,000 for major, with 18 State Heritage-listed properties named in the first round of funding to help conserve significant sites, including Strathalbyn’s St Andrew’s Uniting Church.

The church will receive \$20,000 from the program to repair the roof and gutters on the western end, including the clock tower, vestry and rear of the church.

St. Andrews Uniting Church Treasurer Joyleen Winter said the grant will greatly help that part of the restoration.

“It’s very pleasant,” she said.

“For the roofing, just on the western end, (we’re) replacing flashings, box gutters and broken tiles.

“The masonry has been falling from the clock tower, which has been cracking tiles, so they need to be repaired, then the vestry masonry we’ll clean, (do) repointing, plastering as required, and removing any loose masonry we can see on the clock tower.”

Heritage grants cover up to 50 per cent of the anticipated costs of conservation works, with recipients responsible for matching the

funding dollar-for-dollar, which the church has already done.

Ms Winter emphasised the importance of grants like these that preserve town heritage.

“Let’s face it, the church appears on so many logos of the town,” she said.

“It’s a great venue to be available for holding events, as well as the fact we are a church and we give back to the community.”

Strathalbyn’s Old Angas Mill was also a successful first round grant recipient, receiving funding for the Old Angas Mill East facade.

Deputy Premier Susan Close was proud to

help groups restore and conserve significant pieces of the state’s history.

“State heritage sites help tell the stories from South Australia’s rich history, and it is important we preserve these remarkable buildings, so everyone can enjoy them long into the future,” she said.

“Repairing historic buildings can be costly.

“That is why the State Government is doubling the amount of funding in the Heritage Conservation Grants Program.

“I am committed to partnering with private owners to maintain and celebrate state heritage sites, and I look forward

to seeing the end results of these latest conservation projects.”

“For our little town and the little things we do, I am just blown away by how it has all gone.”

“Apparently the announcer said ‘welcome to the first annual event,’” Ms Angel said.

“It was lovely for him to make that decision, but look, yes, we will be trying.

“We are probably not going to make it bigger, but we are going to make it better.”

Ms Angel said she was rapt with the help from Woodall Rodeo Promotions, and Saturday night’s entertainment from Ash Gale and Motel Music, who were “unbelievable”.

One of the things which will be taken onboard will be to have more food vans.

“We had a heap of volunteer people pull out at the last minute, so we didn’t have staff

to make lines shorter, and we did not have enough food vans,” Ms Angel said.

“At 4pm, I had foodies looking at me going ‘you really think we are going to get smashed?’, and I was like, ‘yes’.

“Then an hour later... it went absolutely ballistic.”

Ms Angel thanked the community for getting behind the event.

"I still want to have (Strathalbyn's) the second supermarket, but, unfortunately, it hasn't panned out like that," he told *The Southern Argus*.

"This year has been a total waste for me because of health issues – not just with me, but with some of my family members.

"I'm recovering in the sense that I'm getting better."

Early next year, Mr Gupta will decide from two options – to finish the building and open the shop or sell the space to a buyer who could run it as a supermarket.

Only minor work and finishing touchings are required for the supermarket, which already has all the electrical, air-conditioning, hydraulics and new concrete floor.

As previously reported in *The Argus*, the IGA was set to open on the corner of Dawson Street and Albyn Terrace in early 2022, but has faced several delays, including tradespeople contracting COVID or being close-contacts, and a cost-blow out when uncovering problems of asbestos and structural issues.

# Life lost in Brinkley workplace incident

Police are preparing a report for the Coroner after a Callington man lost his life in a workplace incident at Brinkley on Friday. At about 7.15am on November 3, emergency services were called to Baker Road business Mulch N More following reports a worker had been critically injured by heavy machinery. The 30-year-old Callington man was rushed to War Memorial Hospital, but sadly died from his injuries.

SafeWork SA and SA Police are investigating the circumstances that led to the man's death. In a public statement on its Facebook page, Mulch N More expressed its sadness and shock over the incident. "This is a very distressing time for everyone involved and as a small, family-run business, we are grieving along with his loved ones," it wrote.

"Out of respect for our valued colleague and friend, we have suspended operations until further notice and ask his family be given privacy. "Counselling will be provided for staff, and we are doing what we can to support his family. "Mulch N More has been operating for five years and we consider every member of our team to be part of our family."

# Robbery at Mount Barker liquor store

A man was arrested at Mount Barker on Friday after holding up a liquor store. At about 9.30am on November 3, SA Police were called to McLaren Street following reports a man had attended a liquor store and threatened staff with a knife before leaving with a bottle of alcohol and a small amount of cash. No one was injured. Mount Barker patrols attended and quickly located the suspect, a 42-year-old man of no fixed place, on nearby Morphett Street, who was placed under arrest. He was charged with aggravated robbery and declined to apply for bail. State Emergency Service and Metropolitan Fire Service crews were called in to assist with a search of the area, and located the knife, stolen cash and alcohol. 
## Two vehicles collide at Flaxley

## Feedback wanted on roundabout upgrade

Local insight is being sought to help inform the planning and design process of a multi-million-dollar Mount Barker roundabout upgrade. As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, the State Government committed \$40 million in its 2023-24 budget to upgrade the roundabout at the intersection of Adelaide Road, Alexandrina Road, Wellington Road, and Flaxley Road to ensure safe and efficient access for all road users and enhance traffic capacity to meet demand. The Department for Infrastructure and Transport is currently seeking local insight to help inform the planning and design process, which in turn, will be used to develop the roundabout design. ## Burn-off flare causes fire at Prospect Hill

A burn-off at Prospect Hill last Monday has served as a timely reminder for residents to make sure any fire is fully extinguished. Just before 3.30pm on October 30, Meadows Country Fire Service (CFS) crews were called to Morris Road after a flare up from a burn-off escaped into surrounding trees. A significant amount of cut wood was present, making it difficult for CFS crews to extinguish. Macclesfield CFS' Bulk Water Carrier was called to assist, with more than 15,000 litres of water used. The fire serves as a timely reminder to anyone conducting or planning to conduct a burn-off to fully extinguish it once it's completed, particularly if strong winds are forecasted in the following days.

## Consultation paper released on work health and safety recommendations

A consultation paper outlining potential reforms to work health and safety laws arising from the recommendations of an independent SafeWork SA review, including new powers to deal with health and safety disputes and right of entry breaches, is open to public comment. The review conducted by former WorkSafe Victoria Executive Director John Merritt and released earlier this year recommended changes to the Work Health and Safety Act 2012, including giving workers and their representatives the ability to pursue civil legal proceedings for breaches of work health and safety duties as an alternative to criminal prosecutions by SafeWork SA. Released by the State Government, the paper includes a potential model to implement this recommendation, as well as stronger powers for businesses to deal with rogue behaviour relating to the misuse of right of entry powers in order to ensure a fair and balanced work health and safety system. Under the paper the following actions are proposed:

- The South Australian Employment Tribunal (SAET) would be given power to deal with disputes about health and safety breaches on top of existing right of entry dispute powers.
- A person could refer a health and

safety dispute to SAET if they reasonably believed a breach of work health and safety laws occurred, resulting in a serious risk to a person's health and safety.

- If the dispute cannot be resolved through alternative dispute resolution processes such as conciliation or mediation, a person can apply for SAET to impose a civil penalty for a breach of work health and safety laws.
- Contraventions would be assessed on the civil standard of the balance of probabilities. The maximum penalty for a contravention would be \$100,000 for a corporation and \$10,000 for an individual.
- Simultaneously, businesses would be given the ability to apply to SAET to impose civil penalties on unions and officials for breaching orders dealing with a right of entry dispute.
- SAET would also be given new powers to take into account whether a union had a significant history of right of entry breaches, making a declaration removing the union's ability to bring civil penalty proceedings, placing the union under closer scrutiny by SafeWork SA, and making it easier to revoke right of entry permits for future breaches.

The consultation paper is available on the SafeWork SA website for public comment until November 10.

## Hillbank man loses licence after traffic stop

A Hillbank man lost his licence after failing to submit to a breath analysis following a Murray Bridge traffic stop last Wednesday. At about 3.35am on November 1, Murray Bridge patrols stopped a Holden Commodore sedan travelling on Mannum Road for a random driver test. The driver, a 30-year-old Hillbank man, returned a positive roadside breath test, and was taken back to Murray Bridge Police Station, where he refused to comply with a further breath analysis. The man was reported for failing to comply with the breath analysis, and received an instant 12-month loss of licence. His vehicle was impounded for 28 days, and he will be summonsed to attend Murray Bridge Magistrates Court at a later date.

## Car crashes into tree at Mosquito Hill

# Lobethal Harmony Club celebrates 145 years

A male choir that draws its members from across the region will turn 145 this month. To celebrate, members will be in full voice at Mount Barker's St Mark's Church on November 12 from 2pm.

Lobethal Harmony Club spokesperson John Wittwer said the group has long had an ethos to perform across the state, and help raise funds for communities they sing for.

"We recently went to Kingston in the South East, raising \$1700 for their chaplaincy and schools," he said.

"We performed with children that were in years 5 and 6, and their local community choir, and we all sang – all 90 voices – *I am Australian*, and that was really magic – quite lovely.

"That has been very much what we like to do – to help the community – and we don't charge as if we are an elitist choir because we are not that, we are sort of like a Men's Shed choir."

The Lobethal Harmony Club was formed in 1878 by a group of young men who met at the Rising Sun Hotel at Lobethal after work and would sing in German.

The November 12 concert will feature some German songs, in keeping with the group's German background.

"It was only in World War I that anyone that spoke German was ostracised, and they had a fairly tough life to live," Mr Wittwer said.

"The Harmony Club got down to just four members, but they kept going and didn't stop.

"We will definitely have reflections back on the past.

"We have a paper and our history book that we have prepared."

Mr Wittwer said the club helps support

men from varying backgrounds and health challenges, including dementia.

"We have a really good music director now, Alex Roose, who sings in the State Opera, and he is excellent for us," he said.

"He has lifted us from just being together to performing something that is quite unique in that we perform songs from Gilbert and Sullivan through to some stories that he has arranged the music for, (including) about all the early convicts.

"We sang at Kadina two months back, and there was a gentleman that I spoke to and I said, 'How did you like the concert?', and he just remarked, 'I have listened to you guys for over five years and that was the best'."

Mr Wittwer said that over the last 12 years, the choir has also supported young singers and musicians with scholarships, including teenager James Skelton who has gone on to perform in London.

The funding for scholarships comes from the Onkaparinga Lions Club, and the Mount Barker Rotary Club, with \$1000 given to the winners, and two prizes of \$250 to the runner-ups.

The November performance will include recent winners, as well as the choir members.

Mr Wittwer said while the group was still called the Lobethal Harmony Club, these days just two members come from Lobethal.

"The rest of us come from Langhorne Creek, Mount Barker, Mount Pleasant, even from Adelaide, so we have a whole range of people that come from all over the state," he said.

"It is still a male voice choir, and we hope to keep it that way.

"We just need to get younger people to join us that enjoy singing."

## Strike closes EFS campuses

A number of Eastern Flinders School campuses will close today in response to strike action by Australian Education Union members.

Public school teachers are striking after rejecting a revised offer from the State Government that included a four per cent pay rise in the first year, followed by three per cent in the second year, and two-point-five per cent in the third.

This has forced EFS' Strathalbyn, Langhorne Creek, and Milang R-6 campuses to close, while the 7-12 campus will be open, but run under a modified education program.

Principal Ian Kent made the announcement late Tuesday afternoon, saying the closures had been approved by the Education Director on the grounds that insufficient staff would be on duty to ensure adequate standards of safety and welfare.

In regards to the 7-12 campus, he said the Education Director had approved the provision of a modified program on the grounds there will be sufficient staff on duty to ensure adequate standards of student safety and welfare can be provided.

Families can send their children to the 7-12 campus as per normal.

Groups of students will be supervised, but regular classes will not take place today, and instead, recommence at all sites on Friday, November 10.

Regional SA left behind by government's Energy Transition Bill

Dear Editor,

As the State Labor Government presses ahead with its Hydrogen and Renewable Energy Bill, you have to ask the question, what does this mean for South Australian landowners and pastoralists?

There has been much commentary from the State Government on the bill being a pathway to enable an efficient and flexible licencing and regulatory framework for hydrogen generation and renewable energy infrastructure in South Australia.

But what the bill fails to do is recognise the right for a pastoral leaseholder to share in the benefits over and above base level

compensation from renewable energy projects on their leasehold.

Furthermore, several clauses of this bill have the risk of significantly compromising pastoral leaseholder and freehold landowner's rights.

Not to mention a complete lack of attention to the significant biosecurity concerns of pastoral leaseholders and freehold landowners.

The bill fails to ensure regional communities will share in the benefits of proposed projects.

That is why we introduced an amendment to the bill that included a clear objective to consult with those communities.

Whilst the amendment was successful, however, the bill still fails to provide an explicit mechanism in which pastoral leaseholders can receive additional remuneration for renewable energy projects going on their lease.

Pastoral leaseholders will only be eligible for compensation for any economic loss, hardship or inconvenience suffered during authorised operations under this bill.

Those additional payments would assist pastoralists in drought proofing their operations.

There are also questions around the special enterprise licence.

This new form of licence will allow a renewable energy proponent to ask the Minister to step in, and unilaterally permit them to undertake work on freehold land, regardless of the wishes of the landowner.

This is a significant erosion of landowner property rights.

The third concern is related to biosecurity.

Currently, the bill is silent on issues of biosecurity when it comes to accessing land.

Those of us in regional communities understand how critically important it is to keep out endemic pests and diseases, many of which have serious economic implications.

There should be a legislated requirement that any proponent when accessing land is required to comply with all relevant biosecurity requirements, including any reasonable requirements of the landowner and/or pastoral lessee.

The State Government has said we should not worry about these matters.

They are asking landowners to trust they will be addressed in subsequent regulations.

However, these concerns are important enough that they should be explicit in legislation.

What is critical for country South Australia is we do not see the burden of the energy transition fall on regional communities without receiving their fair share of the benefits.

It has been the hot topic in downtown Strathalbyn for several years now.

A long-awaited second supermarket in town was being planned.

With the town's and the surrounding area's population set to grow, the team behind the new IGA supermarket believed there was room for a second supermarket in addition to the large Woolworths facility already in place.

The price tag on the renovations for the new supermarket – to be located on the corner of Dawson and Albyn Terrace – was reportedly initially around the \$2 million mark, but more recently flagged at more than \$3.5 million after cost blow-outs.

The building works included demolition, asbestos testing, hydraulics, air conditioning, fire and safety, and supermarket equipment having to be installed.

A new automatic door was planned for the mall entryway, while the Dawson Street windowfront would remain open for public viewing.

Opening dates were flagged most recently for May this year, but for developer Sajal Gupta, obstacle after obstacle presented itself.

Now with 80 per cent of the supermarket about done, Mr Gupta will soon make a decision on whether to finish the building and open the shop or sell the space to a buyer who could also run it as a supermarket.

He says only minor work and finishing touches are required, with the site having all the electrical, air-conditioning, hydraulics and new concrete floor in place.

The project was set to open as early as 2022, but delays such as tradespeople contracting COVID, and the cost blow-out after the discovery of asbestos and structural issues all made a mark.

A new supermarket would bring welcome jobs to Strathalbyn, possibly up to 30, and provide extra competition for Woolworths.

Competition is good for the consumer, and hopefully, the community will know if they have that choice soon.

# Funding shortfall puts Goolwa Christmas Carols at risk

A much-loved, highly anticipated community Christmas event is in jeopardy this December due to financial challenges. Organised by the Rotary Club of Goolwa together with the Goolwa Lions Club, community groups and Christian organisations, the Goolwa Christmas Concert sees families head down to the Goolwa Oval in December for a night of carol singing and other activities. The event has been running for more than 30 years and the next concert is scheduled for December 17, but due to financial challenges, the 'Carols on the Green' could be cancelled.

At last month's Alexandrina Council meeting, the status of the Goolwa Christmas event along with the several other Christmas and New Year's Eve community-run events was noted during debate over reallocation of funding allocated to this year's Goolwa Christmas Pageant after its cancellation.

During discussions, South Ward councillor Margaret Gardner revealed Goolwa Carols organisers were struggling to come up with the funds needed to put on the event.

"The reason for this is, over the last three years, they have not been able to have their art show, which is their major fundraising (event)," she said.

"So, the amount of money they have in their kitty is very little, and they have particular groups they try and help every year."

It is currently estimated to cost \$7500 to run the event, with some financial support provided by council.

However, an approximate \$5000 shortfall still remains.

Musical Director Roxanne Venner said the groups were hoping to source the remaining funds from local businesses and other donations.

"We need \$7500 to run the event and we usually get sponsorship from the local churches, Alexandrina Council and the local businesses," she said.

"Because it's getting close to the event, we have sent an email out to all the local businesses, and then we'll follow that up with a phone call or personal meeting."

The group has until November 15 before it has to cancel the event, and inform the performers and technical crews.

Ms Venner believed the community would be "disappointed" by this outcome.

"It's an event which has been part of the Goolwa community's Christmas calendar for about 30 years now, and local people tell us they still want to have the carols concert," she said.

"They still want this free local event, so I think the community will be very disappointed if we can't continue on with that."

"It's an event that gives local entertainers a chance to show what they can do, and it's also a chance for charities to hold food stalls,

so they can fundraise."

Anyone wishing to donate can send a notice of intent to (goolwacccc@gmail.com).

No additional funding was allocated for the Goolwa Carols at the October council meeting, but it was strongly encouraged for the Rotary Club to submit a grant application for consideration as part of the Community Christmas Event Contributions round.

Meanwhile, due to Christmas Where the Angas Flows being one of the few end-of-year events confirmed for the region, it was decided to reallocate the \$5000 previously dedicated to the Goolwa Christmas Pageant budget to SteamRanger Heritage Railway to provide a train service to the Strathalbyn Christmas Pageant in December.

"This initiative presents a wonderful opportunity to bring our communities and families together to celebrate Christmas," a council report read.

"Families can enjoy a ride on the train to Strathalbyn, experience the pageant, and other festivities, including the fireworks and then return by train to Goolwa."

"It is proposed that adults would pay \$10 and children under 16 can ride free of charge."

"The total cost to council will be dependent

on how many bookings are received and hence, how many carriages will be required, however, it will be between \$3290 and \$4875."

In other good news, a dynamite display is in store for the Goolwa community this New Year's Eve, with the beloved 'Off the Bridge' fireworks event confirmed for another year.

Since 2015, each year on New Year's Eve community members congregate near Hindmarsh Island Bridge, particularly along Goolwa Wharf and surrounding areas, either on the lawn or nearby balconies, or by boat for a good spot to see the fireworks.

It was rumoured event organisers were struggling to put together the event, but Co-ordinator Karen Ross has since confirmed to *The Southern Argus* the highly anticipated display will go ahead.

"We were waiting on insurance, but we have that, so I think it looks 99.9 per cent sure," she said.

"I'm pretty confident it will go ahead."


The event will cost in the vicinity of \$12,000, with money acquired through fundraising from local businesses and community organisations.

Tickets will go on sale soon for complementing events on the night at local vendors such as the Wharf Barrel Shed.

"We invite people to come down to the river with their deck chairs or picnic rugs close to midnight and watch a fabulous display from the bridge," Ms Ross said.

"It's pretty special going up from the bridge because of the height, so people can see it either from Hindmarsh Island or Goolwa side."

About 300 local Scouts and their families stopped to commemorate Remembrance Day at Macclesfield's ANZAC Memorial Garden in a service led by the local Returned Service League (RSL).

On Monday evening, members from Echunga, Strathalbyn, Goolwa, Mount Barker and Prospect Hill branches started a new tradition of joining together for their service to stop and reflect ahead of Remembrance Day this Saturday.

Macclesfield RSL Sub-Branch President Dennis Oldenhove welcomed the children to the garden.

"It's a very special place that has been built by local veterans and local townspeople to... remember and honour the service and sacrifice of the people from our district who have served Australia during times of war," he told the children.

"During our history, over one million Australians have served... in over 40 different

conflicts for Australia, and over 102,000 have unfortunately not come home."

The symbol of Remembrance Day is a bright red poppy flower, which were

symbolically growing in the garden around the service.

Mr Oldenhove explained the symbol started at the end of World War I when the battlefield had been destroyed by artillery fire, bombs and explosives, and very few trees and buildings remained.

"The whole place had turned to mud, and it was a very grey mud," he said.

"So, the troops who were in the trenches didn't see colour for a really long time."

At the end of the war, one of the first flowers that started to appear were Flanders poppies, which grow prolifically in the area.

"It just happens to be bright red, which the soldiers attributed to the colour of the blood spilt in that area, and it was their spirits that were growing up out of the soil that had been so destroyed by the war," he said.

After the service, Mr Oldenhove explained to *The Southern Argus* why he is passionate about educating the younger generation.

"They get it from the horse's mouth and they learn it properly," he said.

"If they're going to learn it, learn it right, so they remember it the right way, so they give it the dignity and the respect it deserves."





## Car lovers called to rally around motor event

Strathalbyn is revving up for a huge day on November 19 when about 300 cars will take to local streets for Shannons Adelaide Rally alongside The Great Duck Race.

The Shannons Adelaide Rally has events across the city, Adelaide Hills and Fleurieu Peninsula, and will be stopping at Strathalbyn for lunch and for viewing from the expected thousands of visitors.

On Sunday, November 19, spectators can view the cars from 10.30am to 3pm, beginning on Albyn Street, with cars stopping in the Soldiers Memorial Gardens before crossing the bridge over the Angas River.

The new 550-metre-long stage will have spectator points from 11.50am.

It starts on Catherine Street, turning onto Donald Street and Rankine Street before Sunter Street, crossing the St. Andrew's Bridge before the stage finish.

Event Director Tim Possingham said the event is a "great collaboration" between Shannons Adelaide Rally and the Rotary Club of Strathalbyn, as well as the SteamRanger's Great Duck Train, with support from Alexandrina Council.

This will create a bigger event.

"It's a great opportunity for people

from the region to come to experience all the things to do with the Duck Race and see and hear (the cars) in action," Mr Possingham said.

"(The stage) weaves around some of the streets.

"It's tight and twisty, and people will get to see the cars driven in a spirited manner.

"They will get to certainly hear those amazing sounds of some of the Lamborghinis and Ferraris."

Running since 1997, the event was formerly Classic Adelaide Rally and has combined with The Great Duck Race over several years in the past.

However, this is the first time "dynamic vehicle activity" will occur in the town.

"The course is very tight and twisty deliberately, so the cars won't get to the high speeds, but they'll certainly be revving and

sliding," Mr Possingham said.

Strathalbyn's automotive tourism is one of the town's drawcards for the Shannons Adelaide Rally, such as Gilbert's Motor Museum, Collectable Classic Cars and the Ken Blake Memorial Statue.


"We are (also) really aware that Strathalbyn is the perfect day-drive destination," Mr Possingham said.

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
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

## Fun community event fits the bill

Local residents are shaking their tail feathers in excitement, as the popular community event The Great Duck Race returns to Strathalbyn after a three-year hiatus.

Thousands of residents will be like a duck to water on November 19, filling Strathalbyn streets for a jam-packed day of fun, with The Great Duck Race, visiting cars in Shannons Adelaide Rally, and the SteamRanger's Strathalbyn Duck Train bringing passengers from Mount Barker.

Presented by the Rotary Club of Strathalbyn, The Great Duck Race is a major fundraiser for the service group, which supports the community and is currently focusing on installing Automated External Defibrillators (AED) in the region.

Entrants can purchase a raffle ticket with a number which matches with one of the 2500 ducks floating down The Angas River in the Soldiers Memorial Gardens.

They will be up for chance to win from the \$2000 prize pool, with \$1000 as the major prize.

The Corporate Duck Race involves local businesses, which are creatively decorating their ducks for a chance to win best dressed.

The day will also include food vans, a market run by the Strathalbyn Country Women's Association, and children's entertainment.

Rotarians Craig Maidment and Norma Keily described the day as "massive".

"It's all happening in Strath... there's something for everyone," Mr Maidment said.

Mrs Keily added the entertainment will continue "from 9am in the morning until you're exhausted in the afternoon", with visitors expected from Mount Barker.

"With Mount Barker being such a bigger population and looking for things to do, I think that's a drawback," she said.

The Great Duck Race is believed to be a world-first of its kind, and a much-loved annual tradition for the town after it began in 1990.

In an effort to fundraise for the club, the then-Director of the Club Service Committee Frank Clennett bought 2000 small yellow ducks, presented the bill at the next Rotary Club meeting, and The Great Duck Race was off and flying.

Over the years, the race has evolved, with many creative ways to persuade the little ducks to race down the river.

In the second year, the ducks took 2.5 hours to make it to the finish line, so damming up the old swimming pool for a month prior proved to do little to increase water flow in the river.

The ducks toppled over the weir and were trapped in a vortex of cascading water where they remained.

The next year, the club used a fire hose mounted in a tinny and powered by a generator – an idea which remarkably failed when the tinny capsized and the generator ended up at the bottom of the Angas River.

Other times, water jets to small boats have encouraged the ducks, while a few sunk along the way.

In 2008, a wind machine was introduced, which sped up the process and made the ducks fly.

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## Lack of knowledge hampers country's recycling attempts

A recent report by Cleanaway found that 89 per cent of people believe recycling is important.

The research also found that 74 per cent of people rate themselves as good or very good recyclers, while nearly everyone participates in some form of sustainable behaviour in their everyday lives.

Despite this positive attitude, other results from the research suggest misconceptions and lack of knowledge around recycling may be compromising Australians' efforts.

Misconceptions were observed at all stages of the recycling process, with 47 per cent of Australians believing soft plastics can go into recycling, while 26 per cent didn't know food containers need to be rinsed before going into recycling.

Another 15 per cent think people can put everything in the recycling bin and it will get sorted out at the recycling facility.

It doesn't help that so many of people are wildly confused about what should be recycled.

Items frequently found in kerbside recycling that should not be there include:

- Plastic bags.
- Broken glassware or mirrors or glass from a photo frame.
- Batteries.
- Clothing and other textiles.
- Food containers with food in them.
- Building materials, like pieces of timber or bricks.
- Paper towels.

No matter how much people like to send

them to a 'good' place, they have to stop clogging the recycling stream with non-recyclable items.

Aspirational recycling can contaminate an entire batch of recyclables, forcing everything to be sent to landfill.

It potentially only takes one non-recyclable item to contaminate an entire load of recyclables.

## Recycling goes from strength-to-strength in Strathalbyn

Increasing interest in recycling is being seen locally at Strathalbyn's Bottle and Can Recycling Depot.

The local business, which has been running for more than 20 years, has, as its primary objective, to take 10 cent bottles and cans, along with non-deposit items such as milk bottles, paper and cardboard, and scrap metal, which they don't pay for, but take in to prevent it going to dumps and landfill.

Owner Todd Schulz expects his business to expand in coming years as Strathalbyn and the district grows.

"When we first started, we were only open two half days and one full day a week, whereas now we are open two full days and two half days," he said.

"South Australia has always been ahead of everyone else.

"The figures have always been that 80 per cent of the bottles and cans come back through the depots.

"That is a pretty high number of stuff that people take back, and quite often, there are people that don't recycle.

"But there is always someone who walks around and picks it off up the ground or it goes to kerbside recycling."

Mr Schulz said while there were some companies that still used products that would not be able to be recycled, the trend was going the other way.

"What we are seeing in the supermarkets now is more and more of the products are coming in a container that can be recycled, whether it is through kerbside or through us, or through another system," he said.

"It is slow unfortunately... but the manufacturers are slowly getting it, and putting stuff into containers that can be actually recycled, rather than just chucked in the bin."

Mr Schulz had some recycling tips for people thinking of bringing items into the depot.

"Keep your cans and plastics separate from your glass because when you bring that in, that speeds up the process at our end," he said.

"If you have, for instance, a bag that

is full of cans, plastics and glass bottles, and we tip it on the bench, we have to fumble through it to sort cans, count plastics.

"Whereas if you have them sorted – cans in one bag, plastics in another, and glass in another – we can bang (it out and) it is all counted."

Having lids off plastic bottles is also a big help, along with pre-sorting deposit and non-deposit items.

"If you are bringing in your old shampoo bottles, old milk bottles and paper and cardboard, don't mix it with your 10-cent stuff," Mr Schulz said.

"That way you are in and out quicker."

Mr Schulz said plastics these days are meant to be turned back into more plastic bottles.

"New plastic bottles are technically supposed to be made out of the old ones – there is meant to be no raw product," he said.

"The aluminium, from where we send it to, that pretty much gets sold to whoever the highest bidder is each month, and it can be made into anything that is aluminium.

"Some months they might be selling it to someone in Australia, and some months they are selling it overseas on the export market because someone is prepared to pay a higher price."

Mr Schulz emphasised the importance of recycling.

"The more of it that people do, the better off we all are," he said.

"Don't just go, 'oh that is a glass jar with sauce still' – use your dirty dishwater and wash it out, and then that glass bottle gets recycled, rather than just being thrown in the rubbish bin and going to landfill.

"Be vigilant with what you do, and try to recycle where you can.

"Nowadays, when you look at your bins at home, generally your rubbish bin is the smallest, so the less you put in it the better it is.

"Use the green waste bins and use the recycling bins to get rid of all the stuff that is recyclable, as the more we recycle, the better off the country is going to be."

Strathalbyn soccer club looks to reform women's team

A local soccer club is hoping to fill the 'missing gap' in its arsenal and reform its women's team next season.

The Strathalbyn Strikers have been without a permanent women's team since 2019 when a player shortage forced the group to disband.

With the opportunity ripe coming off the back of the Matildas' World Cup campaign, the Strikers are hoping to reform the team and are putting out

expressions of interest for female players to join the 2024 winter season.

"We got the team together then we had a few players leave, which then made it unsustainable for the rest of them, which forced the rest of them to leave," Club President, Nick Brook, told *The Southern Argus*.

"It happens with the men as well, but we just haven't had that flow-through of players coming up, whereas now we're starting to get that.

"We've already got between 15 and

25 really keen to play, so we feel it's at the right time now to really push it and get continuity of a team.

"We're very strong advocates of women's sport in general, but more so, it's filling that one gap we've got left – we'd love for it to be filled and permanently."

Female players from 14 years of age onwards are encouraged to join the women's team.

Brook hoped the reformation of the team would provide more opportunities for young girls locally.

"It's just creating the same opportunities for women as what the men have had for 40 years," he said.

"It's keeping things even and being able to have those girls we've worked so hard for over the last 15 years... play for the club instead of having to see them go elsewhere."

The club welcomed both experienced and non-experienced players to 'give it a crack' at its 'come and try' day, which will be held at the Strathalbyn Polo and Recreation Grounds on November 28

from 6.30pm.

Individuals can meet club members, enjoy a barbecue, and learn more about the sport.

"Come out and have a look," Brook said.

"It's a good, fun club, and very family-orientated.

"We're ready to go and welcome (players) with open arms, as opposed to some other clubs."

Veteran Fleurieu cricketers will be testing their skills and catching up with mates within days, as the national championships for various age groups kick off across the country.

SA Veterans Cricket Association President Dixie Daw said the state was sending teams to six different national championships, beginning on Sunday for the Over 60s in Perth, and the Over 40s in Brisbane.

SA teams will be fielded in the Over 40s, Over 50s, Over 55s, Over 60s and Over 70s, with games to also be played in New Zealand.

Among those taking part is Chris McGlinchey, whose home cricket club is Macclesfield.

McGlinchey has also played

veterans cricket in the area for a number of years after being approached at a local game.

He will be playing in the Under 60s division two team in Perth.

"I didn't know too much about veterans cricket, and when I learnt about it, it was the people that are involved (that I liked most)," he said.

"I have probably found there are more pro rata decent guys that play veterans cricket that I have met any other time."

Daw said the national competitions will run into December, with teams to play four matches across five or six days.

"The bigger states – New South Wales, Victoria, and Queensland – tend to be the main competition," he said.

"A couple of years ago, SA won the Over 60s, but since then it

has moved on.

"Our Over 50s last year performed incredibly well – they won both the division one and division two."

The partners of competitors were also made welcome.

"There is always a program for partners, so that those who come along... while they certainly watch some of the cricket, they (also) go to local tourist attractions, wineries and breweries, art galleries, shopping, arts and crafts and things like that," Daw said.

He added it was important for older people to continue to take part in competitive sport.

"The important thing is to be involved, challenge yourself, but have some fun playing the game that we love," Daw said.

"It is about the friendships that we develop.

"I play against Fleurieu, but then in the nationals, I am playing with guys from the Fleurieu who are in my team, so you make friendships there.

"But you also make genuine friends that you look forward to catching up with year after year that you have played against in the national championships from all over the country and New Zealand.

"That is the real delight and is the treasure of playing veterans cricket, – the comradeship that you share with your fellow players."

Daw said the talk among players was not just about cricket.

"We do talk a lot about cricket, but we also talk about anything and everything – our grandkids, families, politics and so on," he said.

"You would never have a game where you don't have a drink with the opposition players after the game."

He did get the ball clear, as his club hit the tree for the ball to fly back over his buggy and just miss Welky standing near it.

Des then got on the green with a chance to pick up a point, but another short putt missed for him to pick his ball up.

With his effort of 25 points, Des waited patiently as others came in to disclose their score to see if he was going to pick up the Naga Award for the first time, and he did, only due to the fact that A Grade player Sean Naylor chipped in for four points on the last hole for a round of 26 points.

The lucky putting competition for \$60 failed to go off, as Red, Berti and Welky all failed the test.

This hand gets off to an easy start, with a natural opening bid from South of 1 Club, which is a Better Minor opening with equal length Minors. Easy enough for South, but a little less easy for North, with 12 HCP and a 5-card Club suit.

I teach that it is OK to support the Clun opening bid, but not until you have at least tested the Majors and No Trumps.

North is not particularly comfortable with his Majors, and NT looks decidedly dodgy, so Club support is a satisfactory response, but not what South would have preferred.

Undaunted, South can see little prospect for Spade support, but tries to test for a No Trump contract with a bid of 2 Diamonds.

North takes another look at his hand and realises what South is trying for, so offers a bid of 2S to show the stopper, but it cannot be a four-card suit, as the 2C first response denied a four-card Major, so the bid is a stopper – a contribution to a possible NT contract.

South can now see a problem in Hearts, and asks if North has anything in Hearts. This is done by bidding the fourth suit – an action we call Fourth Suit Forcing – and it invites partner to bid NT with something that might resemble a stopper or re-bid Clubs without.

North re-bids the Clubs to show no Heart stopper, and South raises to game with his 4-card Club support.

On the night this was played, top score went to the pair who played four spades with a seven-card fit, equal second was 3NT by North, which made nine tricks on the lead of the ♥8, and 5C by South.

Four others made 11 tricks in 3 Clubs, and one hapless North went two down in 3NT on the lead of the ♥Ace, losing five Heart tricks and the ♠Ace.




