

Business group highlights parking options

The Strathalbyn Business Group has launched a campaign to highlight the problem of people parking all day outside businesses in strips such as Dawson Street and High Street.

In a flyer being handed out across the town's shopping areas the group says over the past 12 months it, and Alexandrina Council, have undertaken a survey regarding parking arrangements in Strathalbyn.

It follows concerns raised in last week's Southern Argus which highlighted the issue of all-day parkers, and the impact it was having on local businesses in the town's shopping precinct.

In the flyer the group stated that the survey showed that the problem of staff parking all day outside other businesses was a concern for a number of business owners.

The group hopes the publicity campaign will see staff choose other parking options - several of which are highlighted on a map that is on the back of the flyer.

"We ask our group continually what is your biggest challenge, and we did a written survey early this year to the 70 to 80 (members) in our group, (and) staff parking in customer car parks came up as a really high thing,"

Strathalbyn Business Group member Terry Scolari said.

"It is everywhere, I have had it with previous business groups in different towns, to the stage where (in other areas) they called a meeting to say, 'guys, we have got to stop it'.

"This is just a way of making everyone aware of it, and maybe think about it, and say to their staff 'hey, where are you parking?'.

"It is just around the main precinct here in the CBD and High Street, I think besides that, it is fine.

"If you have got cafes and retail, well if you can't find a spot in front (of premises such as) the (corner) bakery here to get a cup of coffee, you will keep going and go to the next one, so that business has just missed out on someone coming there."

Mr Scolari is hopeful the map on the back of the flyer will help people find alternative

"There are not many business owners that want their staff taking up car parks that might be their customers', I don't know many businesses that would go for that," he said.

"Everybody is just trying to make money, and there are a lot of challenges out there, so if this frees up six or 10 car parks, well that is 10 people that might (be able to) stop and (shop)."

Opening celebrations for the Goolwa Riverport Heritage Centre

A crowd of about 250 were on hand on Monday to mark the official opening of the Goolwa Riverport Heritage Centre.

Among the celebrities to speak at the event were The Friends of the Oscar W President George Kaiser, Alexandrina Council Mayor Keith Parkes, and SA Minister for Climate, Environment and Water and SA Minister for Heritage Lucy Hood.

The Friends of the Oscar W spokesperson Nigel Robinson said the opening had been years in the making.

The centre, funded by the Alexandrina Council and The Friends of the Oscar W, is a state-of-the-art museum.

"It provides a history of the port of Goolwa and celebrates two things that are unique about Goolwa - being declared the first river port on the Murray in 1857, and the first public railway between Goolwa and Port Elliot – the first public railway in Australia and indeed the British Empire," Mr Robinson said.

"We have had so many people involved, and the Ngarrindjeri have been honoured in the first display, and then we go into the European settlement.

"It has a dozen touch screens and large screens showing documentaries about the history of Goolwa, and hands on activities

'(It also includes) a steering simulation, you can turn the beam engine on, you can watch a model railway, you can do quizzes, so there is something for kids of all ages.'

Mr Robinson said Monday's opening marked a new chapter in the partnership between council and the Oscar W group.

'Council approved the history themes in December 2023, and council approved giving The Friends of Oscar W control of the project in July 2024," he said.

"Council released the funding in December 2024, and we have been able to bring the project home in nine months.

"As a result of council giving control to The Friends of Oscar W a dozen local businesses, and more than 24 local trades worked on the project, with 60 per cent of the budget spent on local trades."

Mr Robinson said Minister Hood received huge applause for her speech.

"Her speech highlighted that the Fleurieu Peninsula is unique in the world, because we have the horse drawn tram at

Victor Harbor, and you can then ride the Cockle Train through the historic towns to Goolwa, get off at the historic railway station, walk directly to the wharf and get on a paddle steamer, and we believe that is a unique international heritage attraction," Mr Robinson said.

Among the other invited guests on Monday were Alexandrina Council councillors, senior staff, and visitor services staff; The Friends of the Oscar W committee, captains and crew, volunteers and friends; Wharf Shed Refit Trades and FOW sponsors; and representatives from SteamRanger, National Trust, Goolwa Wharf operators, and community

A steam salute between the PS Oscar and SteamRanger was staged, while Morris dancers and the Ladies of Distinction were also at the wharf.

Mr Robinson gave a particular thank for an "absolute brilliant job".



THURSDAY, OCTOBER 5TH, 2000

"I was honoured to have been asked to open the 130th Strathalbyn Show and have thoroughly enjoyed the day" were the Governor Sir Eric Neal's parting words to show president Mrs Pat McAlinden. In fact it was the show that was honoured by the Governor's decision to fly back from Sydney after attending the closing ceremony at the Olympics the night before. In his speech Sir Eric made mention that the Strathalbyn Show has long been recognised as one of the State's best one day show. He noted the changing nature of both the town and surrounding areas which will help with the future prosperity of our region.

In the early hours of Tuesday morning, the Goolwa CFS crews were called to a fire at the Palmwood Furniture factory in Goolwa's industrial area. It took over an hour and a half to extinguish the blaze which destroyed the company's stock and equipment with a damage bill of close to \$200,000.

50 YEARS AGO

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 9TH, 1975

The Ashbourne Reunion Day for 1975 began with Divine Service in the little church with 200 present for the roll call. Many were descendants of the pioneers, for whom commemorative plaques shine on the church walls. During lunch the years rolled away for young and old alike. Baxter Beviss recalled the time when the huge pine trees which now tower over the building were planted by pupils, Clarise Sissons recalled having to start school at four to keep numbers up. Nell Allingame, Mavis and Ernest Dohnt, Dorris Haines, the Beviss brothers, John Haines and Reg Sissons were all their helping to recall the past. Oldest pupil present was Mrs. Olive Reece (nee Maidment) aged 91, her brother Mr.G C.Maidment 92 unable to attend, sister Mrs Doug Whittam the oldest teacher present.

100 YEARS AGO

from the files of the Southern Argus

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 8TH, 1925

On Saturday 26th September the Southern Motor Cycle Club held a very successful speed trial. the winner of the 15 and 24 miles being Mr. Harold Leslie, second place falling to Mr. A.D. Verrier. In the 40 mile event Mr. n.Studing was successful in landing first place. Mr. Perrey and Mr. G.Hall junior acted as starter and time keeper respectively. On Sunday October 4th the club has a successful social run to Murray Bridge with dinner on the banks of the Murray. In the afternoon members had the opportunity to visit the 'Amscol Works' and the new bridge which is nearing completion.

At the local court Goolwa, Mr. E.H.Dodd was charged by the Pt. Elliot District Council and Goolwa Corporation for damages caused when sailing his boat and making contact with the cable of the punt, which had to be replaced. The court gave a verdict to the plaintiffs for 4 pounds 14 shillings.

Algal Bloom Update





What caused the algal bloom?



Three extraordinary environmental events have led to this algal bloom:

- 1. Floodwaters from the River Murray in 2022–23 brought extra nutrients into the sea.
- 2. A cold-water upwelling in summer 2023–24 lifted more nutrients to the surface.
- 3. A marine heatwave since September 2024 has lifted water about 2.5C warmer than normal.

What to look for?



The algal bloom is made up of microscopic, plant-like organisms that occur naturally in the ocean. In large numbers, they can make the water look foamy or discoloured.

Can I enjoy the beach?



Yes, it's safe to enjoy South Australian beaches.

It's best to stay away from foamy or discoloured water which may cause mild, short-term irritation.

If you experience irritation, rinse in fresh water.

Can I take my pets to the beach?



You and your pets can still enjoy the beach.

For their safety, keep them away from sick or dead fish and other marine animals, and avoid letting them swim in discoloured water or foam.

If your pet does enter foamy or discoloured water, wash them in clean water afterwards.

What seafood can I eat?



All commercially available seafood from South Australian waters is safe to eat.

If you catch fish, crabs, prawns, lobsters, or squid yourself, they are safe to eat if cleaned thoroughly and gutted before cooking.

Do not eat self-collected bivalve molluscs (like oysters, cockles, mussels, pipis, scallops) or abalone, as they have not been tested.

What's the State Government doing?



To support the crisis response, a \$28 million support package has been announced. Funded by the South Australian and Australian governments, it will support affected metropolitan and regional communities, as well as go towards research, clean-up efforts, and industry support.

How does the algal bloom affect fish?



The algal bloom affects fish in two ways. Firstly, the algal cells damage fish gills and prevents proper breathing and secondly, when the algae dies and decomposes, it draws oxygen from its surrounds and suffocates the fish it encounters.

in these pages as I did in photographing it.

"I thank everyone for their time, their fun spirits when getting photographed, and getting behind this vision."

Keen calls for maternity ward upgrade

A local candidate running for the seat of Hammond in next March's state election is calling for an upgrade of the maternity ward at the Murray Bridge Soldiers' Memorial Hospital.

Independent Airlie Keen said an upgrade of the ward was long overdue, with the last lot of upgrades delivered 20 years ago.

"I'm calling for a major upgrade for the maternity ward at the Murray Bridge Hospital so it can cater for the expected population growth and provide mothers and babies with modern facilities and the best care, delivered locally in our community," Ms Keen said.

"We are just one of a number of growing regions in SA (and) investment in our maternity ward won't just happen as we compete with statewide needs."


Ms Keen said many young families were expected to take advantage of affordable housing offerings and proximity to the Murray River with the growth of Murray Bridge.

"Those families need fit-for-purpose facilities in Murray Bridge without needing to travel to Mount Barker or Adelaide," she said.





Citizen Assembly concept raised in council

The idea of Citizen Assemblies was floated in last month's Alexandrina Council meeting as an optional method for community consultation.

In a Citizen Assembly, people are selected by lottery to discuss and make recommendations on specific issues, offering a broad representation of opinions from a wide section of the community.

The motion was raised by Cr Lou Nicholson, as part of a call to also review of the council's Public Community Consultation Policy.

Assemblies could reach a wider demographic than the traditional consultation methods and could be another tool used to help make decisions on complex issues.

Cr Nicholson said the concept could "lift the quality" of their engagement, "counter apathy" among residents and seek understanding of the "lived experience" of the community.

Some councillors expressed uncertainty, raising concerns with extra costs, stepping away from current legislation, or that it could be considered "with care".

The motion was lost, but Cr Nicholson hoped it would be She believed Citizen reconsidered at a later date.





CELEBRATING 175 YEARS OF BLEASDALE





By Tara Nash

Nautical adventurer Frank Potts could never have imagined he was founding a generational legacy when he signed the deed to a 30-acre property in Langhorne Creek in early 1850, after arriving in South Australia in 1836.

Inspired by time spent in the wine regions of Portugal, he recognised the value in Bremer River's natural flooding to help irrigate the vineyards, a unique method now widely used in the region.

The retired British sailor, who was also in the Royal British Navy, proved to be an extraordinary pioneer with many talents, including skills in winemaking, engineering, carpentry and boat building.

Using the timber from the big red gums on the property, he built the region's first winery from the ground up, including the famous red gum lever press.

replacement press was built in the 1890s and still stands.

Over 175 years, six generations of Potts family members have worked within the winery, and together they celebrate this milestone anniversary.

They are proudly one of the longest running family-owned wineries in Australia, the owners of the first winery in the region, and were the pioneering force behind Langhorne Creek's highly regarded reputation.

Damen Michelmore is sixth generation and the cellar door host, growing up surrounded by the story of Bleasdale and the legacy that Frank left.

Over the years, Damen has seen many changes in cellar door, progressing from self-serve tastings on barrels to guided wine flights that showcase the extended range of Bleasdale's award-winning wines.



Bleasdale released the Mainsail Malbec into its portfolio for the first time this year, aligning with the winery's milestone 175th anniversary, showcasing one of the strongest varietals of the region.

The winery - which has some of its eyecatching labels printed by Multi-Colour Corporation (MCC) – also has a soft spot for its signature wine, Malbec, which has been growing since the late 1800s, and produced the region's first Malbec table wine in 1961.

Before that, Malbec was mainly used in

"It is often said that Malbec delivers what all the other wines promise to deliver," marketing manager, Kate Mooney, said.

A range of malbecs are available, with the flagship wine being the Generations Malbec, a dark purple with intense aromas of violets, blackberries, plums and clove spice.

To commemorate the winery's milestone 175th anniversary, Bleasdale has released a limited-edition collection.

Three magnums showcasing the grapes that won them Cabernet Sauvignon of the year in 2024 and a 9-year-old fortified made from their 95-year-old Verdelho vines.

The fortified Verdelho is a nod to one of the first grape varietals to be planted by founder Frank Potts in the 1850s and is well suited to the Langhorne Creek's growing conditions.

Looking outside of this special release, cellar door host Damen Michelmore believes their best-seller is the Mulberry Tree Cabernet Sauvignon, named after an ancient tree growing on the banks of the Bremer River on the edge of one of the main Cabernet Sauvignon estate blocks.

A close second is Bleasdale's Sparkling Shiraz, which is richly flavoured and best served chilled.

Other important varietals are the white grape Verdelho, with the vines dating back to 1930, making them one of the oldest surviving in the world, as well as Cabernet Sauvignon, which continues to be the region's

Mr Michelmore explained the unique feature of Bleasdale's wines is the grapes being picked earlier than most, which allows the fruit to "come to life".

This results in a lower alcohol content, with most being around 13.5 per cent rather than 14 or 14.5, Ms Mooney added, which gives it an "elegant" taste.

"It's a subtle but noticeable difference when you taste it," she said.

This approach has seen Bleasdale receive many awards and accolades, including two of the country's most prestigious: the esteemed title of Halliday Winery of the Year in 2024, as well as Halliday back-to-back Cabernet Sauvignon Varietal Wine of the Year for the 2020 and 2021 The Iron Duke Cabernet Sauvignon, which was also recognised as the best overall wine in Australia.

Another is the Jimmy Watson Memorial Trophy for the 2018 Wild Fig SGM, handed out at the Royal Melbourne Wine Awards for the year's Best Young Red Wine. These awards, and others, continue to recognise the winery's heritage and excellence in creating premium quality wines at accessible prices.

Bleasdale's exciting future ahead

Bleasdale has created a legacy in the industry, as one of the oldest and longest running family-owned wineries in the country, and has an exciting outlook looking ahead

Over the past year, the Bleasdale team have been developing their limestone cellar. Dug out in 1892, the underground cellar

Dug out in 1892, the underground cellar was previously used to store fortifieds.

After standing unused over four decades, work began to bring this rarely seen area back into service.

With the installation of a hand-crafted iron gate by Organic Iron Studio's blacksmith Robbie Alderson, they are one step closer to opening up this historic section of the winery to visitors from around the world.

The gate is part of a broader plan to provide high-end tourism experiences and promote local history, with the next focus being the installation of a lift to improve accessibility in the winery, which marketing manager, Kate Mooney, is looking forward to.

"The lift will open up the opportunity to cater for events, expand our historic tours and get people to see the beauty hiding in these buildings," Ms Mooney said.

Bleasdale's museum – which pays special tribute to heritage and history – is a "workin-progress"

Visitors can experience a taste of winery life in the late 1800s and early 1900s when walking through the site.

Copper stills, hand-made red gum vats and the recently restored excise office are readily available to visit, along with the red gum vat that Frank Pott's sons built.


Adding to an already memorable year, Bleasdale is excited to be part of a recently announced \$7 million trail connecting most

of the region's cellar doors.

Funded by the Federal Government, the 2.8km Langhorne Creek Discovery Trail – expected to be completed by the end of 2027 – will start near Bremerton Wines, pass through the township and past Frank Potts Reserve, before finishing at Bleasdale.

In recent years, the family-owned winery of almost 40 staff members has extended its sponsorships, including to Football SA, Adelaide 36ers, South Australian Cricket Association and the Melbourne Football Club.

Other local partnerships include the Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club, Strathalbyn Racing Club, Murray Bridge Racing Club and Monarto Safari Park's Grapes for Good, which has several wineries donating part proceeds from special labels towards saving some animal species from extinction.

Hundreds try their luck at inaugural Carp-a-thon

The Rotary Club of Goolwa's inaugural Carp-a-thon has exceeded all expectations with hundreds of people lining the banks of Bristow-Smith Reserve on Saturday.

Rotary spokesperson David McDonald said the turn-out was double that expected, with the fisher who caught the most carp landing 68 over the day, well ahead of his opposition.

"Everyone involved in Rotary said it was an outstanding success for our first time," Mr McDonald said.

"We had nearly 200 entries online, and we haven't tallied up the late entries on the day, but we think it is around 300 to 400 (all up), it could even be more.

"We had a couple of, well they may be professional fishers, as they belonged to angling clubs, but a lot of families – mum, dad, and two to three kids – which was what we aimed it at, and it was a real joy to see the kids enjoying themselves."

Mr McDonald said the largest carp caught was 28 inches (71.12 cm), the average number caught about 30, while many of the kids and families caught about 10 to 15 of the fish.

The hundreds of carp caught were put in a hired biobin, and will be turned into fertiliser.

Carp are considered a pest and can pose several issues in river systems, including sucking up mud from the riverbed which stirs up silt and mud, damaging plants and outcompeting native fish.

While not commonly eaten in Australia, the cuisine is enjoyed in other parts of the world such as Europe and some Asian countries.

Mr McDonald said Rotary members were already talking about staging the event again next year.

"I don't think there is much question about that," he said.

"We weren't expecting that number of entries.

"In the last few days the entries really ramped up, and on the morning... I was there at quarter past five setting up and we had about six utes lined up ready to go, waiting for it to open.

"We were just very happy with the way things went, and we will definitely be doing it next year."

Proceeds from the entry fees will be
