Mac the Bernese Mountain dog might be just six months and three weeks old, but he is already taking out ribbons at the Royal Adelaide Show.

In his first Royal Show, Mac made his owner, Strathalbyn's Annette Burge, proud by winning the Best Puppy of Breed (Bernese Mountain Dog) and finishing runner-up for the Best Puppy Dog six months and under 12 months.

It was enough to make Ms Burge shed some happy tears.

"I took care of his litter for quite some time, and I just fell in love with him," she said.

"There was something special about him, and I always wanted a little boy, so he stayed with me.

Then his breeder suggested 'do you want to show him?', and I said 'I had never shown before', but I thought 'well, we would give it a go', and he has done extremely well.



'He was about 13 weeks old when he went to Melbourne with Ros the breeder, and won Best Baby Puppy.

"I thought, 'Oh God, Mac', but we sort of haven't looked back since then."

Mac was presented at the Royal Adelaide Show by handler Darcy Clark, and with no training at all for the event.

"I was just there cheering him on," Ms Burge said.

"At the Royal Adelaide Show, the dogs all sit in their big boxes.

"They are open so the public can walk around and see them, and then, when it is time for their group and age, they go into a massive big ring.

"It is all very well put on.

"The first win I cried – I got real teary – and I gave Darcy a real big hug.

"It was like when your son or daughter does so well at something - it was like, 'That's my boy."

Ms Burge has two other Bernese Mountain dogs, Heidi and Kelly, but Mac is the favourite.

'He will jump on the bed or the couch, and the other two look at me as if to say, 'why is he allowed on the bed or couch, mum?,"

she said.

"But he is the baby boy – he is the last one and he is pretty spoilt.

"He is cheeky, loveable, and also quite sooky, and then he can be quite naughty.

"My yard has quite a few holes in it, which get filled up daily, but he is still a puppy, so I have to remember that."

While Bernese Mountain Dogs are quite large with luxurious coats they are relatively easy to look after.

"People think that they need a lot of exercise, but they don't," Ms Burge said.

"They sort of go for a little bit, and they like to rest.

"Mine just like to stay inside pretty much, and slobber around.

"With grooming, they normally have two malts a year, but mine get brushed quite often.

"He is quite into his food at the moment, which is good, as I do feed them well - they probably get better fed than myself."

Early 2025 finish for Town Hall



Alexandrina Council expects to complete upgrades to the Strathalbyn Town Hall in early 2025.

As previously reported in *The Southern Argus*, work stopped in August after the builder Stride Construction went into voluntary administration, believed to be owing thousands to subcontractors.

Council has been project managing the upgrade of the hall as part of Stage 8 of the Strathalbyn Town Centre Revitalisation Project.

Despite several hurdles council is expecting the project to be finished soon.

"The upgrade is close to completion," Acting Chief Executive Officer, Tash Hunt, said.

"Remaining primary works include the commissioning of the air conditioning, installation of additional stage A/V and lighting, installation of a new building access system and reconfiguration of the front-ofhouse and foyer.

"At this stage, council has not entered into a formal agreement with an alternative lead contractor.

"Council has been in negotiations with potential contractors and anticipates starting work again on the town hall in late 2024.

"The remaining works are expected to

take two or three months to complete and, pending the schedule and availability of any successful contractor, council hopes to complete the upgrade in early 2025."

No outstanding payments stand between the council and the former lead contractor.

Onsite works commenced at the hall in early 2023 in an aim to create a multifunctional facility catering for a diverse range of activities and events to promote social activation and improve benefits to the local and surrounding communities.

It was previously earmarked to open late last year, but then flagged for a soft opening in the second quarter of this year before the August announcement.

Early hold-ups included when workers uncovered mercury and lead in the roof void, possibly from the storage of old cinema equipment and batteries.

"The Strathalbyn Town Hall is an important community asset, and council is working hard to bring the building to modern standards and have it available for community use," Mrs Hunt said.

"Delays throughout the project due to structural issues related to the historic use of the town hall and older building materials, and the recent matter with the major contractor, were unforeseen.

"We appreciate the community wants the town hall to be finished as soon as possible.

"The current situation is complex, and council is working through matters to reach a resolution."

Major safety improvements scheduled for Goolwa Road

A "substandard" arterial road that has been deteriorating over many years will undergo more than just a patchwork job to make it roadworthy for users thanks to a new multi-million-dollar investment from the State Government.

The government has allocated \$10 million over four years to undertake regional road safety treatments on several 'problem' highways and roads, including shoulder sealing, audio tactile line marking, safety barriers, and rural junction activated warning system signage, to reduce the risk of fatal and serious injuries, and increase safety for road users.

The investment forms part of the State Government's \$98 million road safety package – one of three being delivered under a combined \$346.1 million investment in partnership with the Federal Government – and the South Australian Road Safety Action Plan 2024-26.

"This significant investment to upgrade these key regional highways and roads will significantly reduce the likelihood of crashes, improving the overall safety for our regional communities," Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Tom Koutsantonis, said.

"The upgrades will benefit not only locals, but also freight operators and tourists travelling through these regions.

"This program of safety upgrades is further evidence of the State Government's commitment to improving safety on our regional roads."

One of the roads planned for upgrading under the new funding is Goolwa Road, which recorded 11 crashes between Mount Compass and Goolwa from 2019 to 2023.

Safety barriers and audio tactile line marking will be installed along this section of road to prevent further accidents.

The announcement was welcomed by Fleurieu Road Safety Group President Michael Scott, who said the quality of the road surface has been deteriorating for "quite a long time".

"It's sinking in places... and joins in the road are not finished off properly," he said.

"For instance, there's one piece that there's a tree root under the road, and the root is just getting thicker.

"Now it's like going over a speed hump, and it's at 100kms and it's on a bend, so as you go over the bump, the car actually moves. Now it's like going over a speed bump and it's at 100kms an hour and it's on a bend, so as you go over the bump, the car actually moves...

"The old part of that road was sealed many years ago and it was done in two parts – one part was done in my lifetime and the other was done before I was born – and that has just been a source of ongoing maintenance to keep it anywhere near right.

"Things like that aren't being addressed at all."

While the upgrades will make the road surface safer, more work is needed on Goolwa Road.

"The other thing that is needed that we have been campaigning for for ages is a slow vehicle turn-out on Adelaide Hill for north-bound traffic, and ideally there should be one passing lane on that road from the Mount Compass/Victor Road turn-off onto the Goolwa Road," Mr Scott said.

"From there, somewhere, there needs to be at least one passing lane because there are three between Mount Compass and Victor Harbor and none after the turn-off on Goolwa road.

"(Alexandrina Council staff) have raised it before and I'm hoping that because it has been discussed, that it will be well-up the list."

Mr Scott also raised the matter again during Monday night's council meeting.

A review of regional intersections will also be undertaken to consider installation of rural junction active warning systems as part of the latest government investment.

These systems involve installing electronic variable speed limit signs at approaches to intersections, which are radar triggered by the presence of side road traffic, slowing traffic for a short section of road and reducing the likelihood of crashes.

As previously reported in The Southern Argus, Goolwa Tourist Resort launched a proposed Code Amendment to rezone four allotments of land with frontage to Banfield Road from rural living zone to residential park zone to meet growing demand for affordable retirement and lifestyle accommodation for people aged over 50 in Goolwa's North.

During community consultation – which included direct mail to residents, a meeting with the Ramindjeri Heritage Association, and two drop-in information sessions - 397 people made submissions – 334 in support and 59 in opposition.

Lakeside Goolwa Managing Director Andy Ward was happy to see the amendment had garnered overwhelming community support.

"The adjacent land is the natural place for us to expand to," he said during a deputation to council on Monday night.

"The expansion ... creates lots of job opportunities for trades people and other people in the local community.

"The new residents will spend money in the local area, bringing more money to the local businesses, so there's an economic benefit to the community.

"Our residents are active in the local community as well - they volunteer in lots of local things, as well as being big participants in local bowls clubs and golf clubs.

"We'll maintain a similar housing style to the current village so it's a seamless continuation of the village, and we'll have landscape boundaries to preserve the country feel around the local area."

While council missed its opportunity to provide its comments as a stakeholder on the amendment during the consultation period, the Designated Entity agreed to give an extension.

In a letter addressed from Alexandrina Mayor Keith Parkes that councillors agreed to submit to Ekistics, council supported the intent of the Code Amendment.

North Ward councillor Sue Miller was

particularly in support of the additional housing it would provide, not just for older generations, but new ones too.

"I do think we have to note this will free up existing houses for people who want to come down here and live near their families," she said on Monday night.

"We do have a responsibility here to address the shortfall in housing in our area.

"I think it's a great letter for council's submission, and there will be a response I'm sure from the proponent.

"I think this is a really measured and appropriate response."

However, council identified several areas it wanted addressed before a final decision is made.

Council requested a hydraulic report for the future design of the affected area that must demonstrate ultimate hydraulic loads and flow rates generated from the site, with clear staging plans, in addition to further information that addresses the provision of medical facilities and allied health services to support additional growth.

Council also wants the developer to enter an infrastructure agreement for the construction and sealing of both Bricknell Road and Banfield Road due to expected increased traffic volumes, and a shared footpath linkage on Noble Avenue from Bricknell Road to Liverpool Road due to increased pedestrian use as a result of the development.

"Given the location of the affected area, which is predominantly bordered by the rural living zone, it is critical to ensure the interface between a heavily built-up area and a semi-rural setting is sensitively managed," the letter read.

"In addition, access/egress to the affected area should be directed onto Banfield Road, which is a sealed road, as opposed to Fiddock Road, which is unsealed and services rural landholdings.

"To best manage these issues, given the ambiguous nature of the policy contained in the Planning and Design Code, it is requested that a concept plan be incorporated which clearly identifies an interface buffer along the boundaries that abut the rural living zone - the interface buffer should include the 15-metre fire management zone, as well as an additional 10 metres to provide sufficient area for landscaping and tree planting.

"In addition, as the envisaged land use will not warrant a land division application, it is fundamental that an infrastructure agreement be entered into the Code Amendment stage.

"Finally, as the form of development is anticipated for an ageing demographic, it is important that adequate medical and allied services are available."

However, not everyone was happy with council's decision.

The proposed Code Amendment drew opposition in its early stages from some community members who wanted to protect the semi-rural lifestyle and environment of the area, with it being located near an internationally significant Ramsar Wetland, and held concerns about the potential threat to habitat, endangered species and surrounding ecosystems.

It prompted them to even form their own response group in August.

They believed Monday night's decision would destroy the opportunity for people to move to the area and have the space they currently can.

"This is an area that people come to have space – they can't due to Lakeside Goolwa's land banking of the proposed land and other land in the area," local resident, Debbie Turner, said.

'Other such villages are expanding to provide such living opportunities - this area needs to be retained to allow choice to people.

"Is this a development that provides opportunity to everyone that needs housing? No, it is not.

Upon council's submission, the Designated Entity will prepare an engagement report, which, together with any amendment instructions, will be forwarded to Minister for Planning Nick Champion for decision.

Ekistics Senior Associate Catherine Orford said the report will also address some of residents' concerns.

"In terms of negatives we heard during the consultation, there was concern about the density of housing, a general lack of infrastructure in the area, including road and community services, some concern about the impact on the rural character and amenity, potential impact on the natural environment and wetland, potential increase in bushfire risk, and there were some concerns on what the impact would be during the construction period," she said in Monday night's deputation.

"A lot of these matters we addressed within the Code Amendment as part of the investigations.

'Once we've received council's submission, we'll go into more detail about how those particular issues will be addressed, and that will form part of the report back to the minister for his consideration."

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Strathalbyn Caravan Park granted consent to progress its expansion



The first of six cabins could be constructed within the year after Alexandrina Council granted landowner's consent on Monday night for the Strathalbyn Caravan Park to pursue its expansion plans.

As previously reported in *The Southern* Argus, the Strathalbyn Oval Controlling Committee lodged plans to construct six cabins on the western side of the park currently being used for caravan stages, in addition to a new storage shed near the netball courts to replace the ones current used by the local club, to accommodate more visitors. The total development cost is estimated at \$700,000 - itemised as \$675,000 for the caravan and tourism park works and \$25,000 for the store – which will be funded by the committee. The development application went before councillors on Monday night for landowner's consent as council owns the premises, who found no grounds to deny approval.



"It all went very well.


"I'm very pleased with how it's gone."

Busy Spring for SES volunteers

South Australian State Emergency Service (SES) volunteers are gearing up for their busiest season of the year.

While the 1700 SES volunteers respond to thousands of calls for help from the public 24 hours a day, seven days a week, Spring remains their busiest three months of the year.

SASES Chief Officer Chris Beattie explained this was often because Spring was renowned for severe and often unpredictable storms.

"In Spring 2023, the SES responded to around 2000 calls from the public," he said.

"The rapid onset of destructive or damaging winds is often the main reason for damage to property and is responsible for bringing down power lines, causing power disruptions to homes and businesses.

'We also know the dangers of not securing loose items around the home such as trampolines, kids play equipment and outdoor furniture."

But the 1700-strong cohort of SES volunteers, who lead the response to severe storm and flooding impacts, are up to the task.

'When our volunteers aren't responding to calls for help from the public, they maintain a consistent regimen of ongoing training to ensure their skills are maintained and up-to-date with the latest technological improvements," Mr Beattie said.

"Whether it is chain saw operations, vertical or marine rescue techniques, flood response or general rescue, our volunteers are continually training to ensure they are well-prepared.

"The SES will always be on call to support communities in need, however, I encourage people to take proactive action now to prepare their properties for Spring?

The SES advises the following to get ready for Spring:

Clear gutters, downpipes and drains.

Trim trees on the property.

• Securing loose items around the home.

• Check your insurance policy is current and adequate.

• Call 132 500 for emergency assistance in a storm or flood.

Minister for Emergency Services Dan Cregan said South Australians can do their bit to reduce pressure on volunteers.

"Spring is a particularly busy period for crews and we can all play our part to ease emergency services' workload," he said.

"Taking measures around the home or business will help minimise the impact of severe weather on communities across the state.

"Preparing now also means volunteers might have one less callout to respond to and enables them to prioritise resources."

Information and advice on how to prepare for Spring storms including checklists, an emergency contact list, and what to include in an emergency kit can be found at (ses. sa.gov.au).

Kangaroo collision claims at RAA Insurance are so far 32 per cent up from this time three years ago, prompting a warning for people to be on the look out for the animals this Spring.

Worst season for kangaroo collisions

Spring is one of the worst seasons for kangaroo collisions, which have recently jumped due to South Australia's dry winter, prompting a plea from RAA Insurance and Fauna Rescue.

Kangaroo collision claims at RAA Insurance are so far 32 per cent up from this time three years ago.

Further, Fauna Rescue SA attended almost three times as many kangaroo call-outs between April and July this year compared to the same period in 2023 due to the extended dry spell causing animals to come closer to suburbia in search of food.

RAA Insurance data also shows typically 17 per cent more animal collisions occur in Spring and Autumn when compared with the rest of the year.

"Last year, we received more than 2000 insurance claims where a motorist unfortunately hit an animal," RAA Insurance Head of Claims, Jess Lyons, said.

"Depending on the animal and speed involved, the damage to your vehicle could range from a few thousand dollars to the car being a complete write-off.

"As the weather begins to warm up this Spring, we're reminding drivers there is likely to be increased animal activity on our roads, especially in our regions.

"While hitting an animal is a very unnerving experience, we urge drivers to brake safely if they see an animal, but do not swerve, as that could cause a more serious crash

"Sounding a car horn may also divert the animal away from your car."

Around 87 per cent of animals hit in South Australia are kangaroos, while even per cent are dogs or cats, two per cent are emus and another two per cent are wombats.

Consultation opens on self defence legislation

The State Government recently released draft legislation to remove a partial defence of excessive self-defence in murder cases where self-induced intoxication is a factor.

South Australians are being urged to have their say on the proposed law reforms developed in the wake of the tragic killing of Millicent woman Synamin Bell

Ms Bell was killed by her partner after he had consumed hallucinogenic drugs, and was sentenced to 11 years in jail with a nonparole period of eight years and 10 months.

While he had been charged with murder, he ultimately pleaded guilty to a charge of manslaughter.

As a result, the government has prepared reforms to the law that would prevent the partial defence of excessive self-defence from being used in murder cases where the accused was substantially affected by selfinduced intoxication.

"My heart goes out to the family and friends of Synamin Bell who have not only lost a loved one, but are also understandably frustrated by the law that currently allows for a partial defence of excessive self-defence in cases where self-induced intoxication is a factor," Attorney-General, Kyam Maher, said.

'We have been looking at this issue in detail while this matter has progressed through the courts, with a view of ensuring this does not happen again.

"We recognise that change is needed to make sure these laws are in line with community expectations.

"The Government intends to progress this as a matter of priority, and I'd urge anyone with views on the subject to make sure their voices are heard during this consultation."

Consultation on the draft legislation closes on October 7, with South Australians able to comment on the proposed reforms by visiting (www.yoursay.sa.gov.au/excessiveselfdefence).

major issue for drivers, and the organisation would continue to advocate for greater investment in road maintenance funding.

"The condition of some of our roads is concerning, especially in our regional network, and this is reflected in the feedback we're receiving from our members yearround via Report a Road," he said.

'We have a \$2 billion road maintenance backlog in South Australia and the latest Auditor General's report shows this equates to 20 per cent of our 13,000km road network. "That's why we've been calling for \$1

RAA's team of traffic engineers reviews every Report a Road nomination from the community, and regularly investigates sites in detail before recommending treatments or upgrades to road authorities.

In the past two financial years, 64 nominations have been successfully addressed.

"Our Report a Road platform is an important community service that we offer for all South Australians to register any issues with a road, intersection or related infrastructure, and we will follow up with the responsible authority," Mr Vertudaches said. "In the last financial year, we've also seen a jump in nominations for improvements to cycling and walking infrastructure, as more of our members look to use active transport and then notice spots that are unsafe."

Fauna Rescue SA's Sue Gredley urged drivers to familiarise themselves with what to do if they hit an animal while driving. What to do if you hit an animal on

the road: Make sure any vehicle occupants and your car are safe.

 Call emergency services if necessary. If it is safe to do so, check if the animal is still alive. Do not approach a live injured kangaroo – they can cause injury to you. If a joey is present in the pouch or nearby, call Fauna Rescue or another local wildlife rescue group - do not try to remove a joey from the pouch yourself.

Bring back express bus

Dear Editor, I am among many commuters adversely affected by recent Adelaide Metro reforms, as mentioned in last week's *Southern Argus*.

Using the service daily to travel from Mount Barker into the city and return, I'm not alone in being forced to amend my working hours after the removal of the 840X express service.

Last week, Transport Minister Koutsantonis was quoted alleging that the government is providing "more frequent and reliable public transport options" for Adelaide Hills residents.

However, what was once a 30-minute commute (on a good day) via the 840X service has become a 50 plus-minute commute via the T800, not the "few minutes difference" as claimed by Adelaide Metro.

The altered service now stops multiple times between the CBD and the tollgate, and now Crafers.

This has meant the buses intended for Adelaide Hills commuters are now full by the time they reach Pulteney Street for the return journey to Mt Barker.

Despite the increased number of buses, it is now almost impossible to get a ride during peak periods.

When on board commuters are packed in like sardines, with many forced to stand for the long journey up the freeway.

While I am using my personal experience catching the Mt Barker service, talk in the local community has revealed changes to Strathalbyn and Nairne services are also detrimental to users.

Before the reform, the 840X bus was often at capacity.

Now it is the residents who were meant to benefit from the reforms being inconvenienced. Dream solution: the return of the 840X

route with additional buses. Alternative solution: the return of the

previous service as it was.

Compromise: A review of the new route and removal of stops on Glen Osmond Road. I have written to the Minister and local Member Dan Cregan on these concerns, and hope others affected will too.

Principal wins Teaching Award

A local Principal was the only one in South Australia to receive a Commonwealth Bank Teaching Award last week, earning the honour for his exceptional leadership and work to initiate game-changing programs within the school that helped achieve the best-ever year 12 results on record.

This year's award recognised ongoing commitment to equity and inclusion, creating equitable learning opportunities, and ensuring all students, regardless of background or ability, can succeed at school.

After being shortlisted from more than 300 nominees, Eastern Fleurieu R-12 School (EFS) Principal Ian Kent was selected as one of the 22 award winners - 12 Fellowship Awards for Leadership and 10 Early Career Teachers for Excellence – from across Australia to receive the special honour at Parliament House in Canberra last Monday.

It was "overwhelming", but an honour for Mr Kent to be the only Principal in South Australia to receive one of this year's awards.

"It's a national award and I felt humbled by the whole experience," he said.

"I don't like going for these sorts of things, (but Education Director Ann Prime) kept pushing me and my closest colleagues at EFS here kept encouraging me, so I threw something together at the last minute, and thought that would be the end of that.

"I was surprised a few weeks later I got shortlisted, and then had to do an interview online... I thought it wouldn't go any further.

"I was in Yunta in the second week of the school holidays in my caravan visiting some friends on the way back from the Flinders Ranges.... and I got the phone call that I was a winner – and felt completely overwhelmed.

"However, I was very proud because it's a team effort – you can never do anything in a school without a great team of leaders and teachers behind you."

Over the last six years, Mr Kent has introduced initiatives like new pedagogies for deep learning and the Berry Street Education Model, which have enhanced student wellbeing, emotional regulation and competency development.

He started this after recognising in his second year at EFS that the school had many complex students from disadvantaged and/ or traumatic backgrounds, and there needed to be programs to ensure they had a safe and enjoyable learning environment that met all their needs.

"Nothing will ever beat quality teaching and learning," Mr Kent said.

"It's about tailoring the teaching and learning program to meet every kid's needs. "Here, what we've done in a whole range of

different ways with the teaching and learning program is make sure we know what the next step of learning is for each child, and how

we tailor what they need to learn within the curriculum so they can understand it.

"It's embedding the learning so you can problem solve, work through it, and get to a point where you actually understand what you need to do to put the knowledge into practice and how it's useful for life as you go on."

This, along with his efforts to create a whole-school assessment and reporting policy, and introduce targeted literacy and numeracy interventions, have contributed to the best-ever year 12 achievements in the school's history.

"It's years of the good work we've put in right from the start when I started the tenure here," Mr Kent said.

"It shows that after the last four years, the results have steadily grown and improved.

"Post-COVID wasn't good for anybody and I think our wellbeing programs here and the wonderful teaching staff were able to get kids back on track, and that's why the results are there."

Additional reasons why Mr Kent received the award included the promotion of shared and distributed leadership within his school, mentoring 25 aspiring leaders and fostering their development in alignment with AITSL Principal Standards, sharing of knowledge with other schools, and his work with the Governing Council to clarify their role, making changes to governance, financial management and decision making that puts student learning and wellbeing at the centre.

As part of the award, Mr Kent receives \$40,000 - \$15,000 of which goes towards a 12-month professional development program that includes coaching and engagement with leading education experts to help further develop skills, networks and capabilities, and the other \$25,000 to fund a strategic school project.

The project the school will look to fund with the money is a Wellbeing Dog Program, as research shows they can have a positive impact on the engagement, wellbeing, attendance, and confidence on the most vulnerable learners.

Mr. Kent expressed his gratitude to the Commonwealth Bank, Schools Plus, and all the Philanthropists for their support in making this program possible.



A spotlight on the realities of dementia

By Deirdre Graham

Yvonne and David Tonks met on a blind date at 18 during Easter 1970 when a friend's boyfriend borrowed David as a driver for a visit to the South East.

They have now been a couple for 54 years, with two children and two grandchildren.

Mr Tonks was a police officer for more than 30 years before leaving to work in real estate, while Mrs Tonks worked as a telephonist until their daughter Kerry was born.

She then joined Bendigo Bank where she worked from 1984 until she retired in 2018.

Older family members on both sides had symptoms of cognitive decline and some of dementia, but it wasn't until 2003 when the possibility that David had the disease was first aired.

"Our daughter Kerry had been living in England and she came home in 2003, walked in the door, and said 'Hello mum, hello dad, it is really good to see you, what have you done about dad?" Mrs Tonks said.

"I said 'what are you talking about?,' and she said 'mum, dad has either got Parkinsons or dementia, and what have you done about it since I have been gone?'.

"I asked 'what makes you think that?', and she said 'I am just looking at the way he is walking and talking - he is not right."

Kerry marched off to the doctor asking for Mr Tonks to be checked, but the family's concerns were brushed aside until 2010 when a CT scan was ordered, although with no ominous results.

"From then on, there were just little things that happened," Mrs Tonks said.

"I started to compile a little list about things that you notice, and it probably wasn't until 2022 that it got to the point where I felt this is not right, and I had a good old shopping list, so I made a double appointment with David's GP.

We had the appointment for the Tuesday, and on the Saturday beforehand something came on TV and he actually broke down - it was a story about children being maltreated and it really affected him.

"I know that some of his jobs in the police department, there are some (incidents) he still carries today, and I said to him 'why has this affected you so much?' and he said 'Yvonne, I don't know, I know things are not right."

After telling her husband about her worries and revealing the list, he agreed to talk to the doctor, and allow them to talk to Mrs Tonks, thereby giving Mrs Tonks a "Hallelujah moment".

"He is not responding to me, I had to help him into the car, he couldn't lift his feet or swivel in the seat to get in and put his seatbelt on, and he hasn't spoken to me all the way home – he has been like a vegetable."

An ambulance was phoned, but then cancelled when Mr Tonks appeared better and said he had just had a "funny hiccup".

Then the geriatrician rang with the full results of the scans," Mrs Tonks said.

"Kerry, David and I were on the video call and she said to us, 'I am sorry, I am absolutely floored with these results'.

"I have been back to the radiologist and asked them to check their records to make sure I have the right results for the right person', and we said 'why is that?'.

"She said, 'I will be quite frank with you, I have never seen anything like this in my life, and I do not know David how "That made me much better and it made you function like you do… every main part of your brain has severe atrophy, your hippocampus is non-existent, which is the area that forms your memories, and the only way I can describe it is you are running on cognitive reserve'.

well with support from me," she said.

"I virtually dress him each day – he doesn't have the capacity to put his shirts on properly because part of the symptoms include that they lose dexterity."

On bad days Mr Tonks can be apathetic not aware of what is happening around him, unable to follow the stories family members tell him, has trouble putting names to his nieces and nephews when they visit, and has trouble spotting ways he could help with things such as chores around the house.

"I can't get angry about it because I know the brain doesn't have the capacity to think 'perhaps I could get up and do things," Mrs Tonks said.

"Sometimes you think 'Oh, you lazy soand-so, it would be really good for you to offer to do such and such', but I understand now, that he has gotten himself into a system where, (for example), he will get his breakfast, but he will have a method of doing that.

"Once you do (get help), and if I started again at the very beginning, I would be in touch with someone like Dementia Australia to just to find out from them where I start to seek advice.

"I have found going to the carers support group really beneficial, and just by talking to people there, I have learnt a lot of things about better ways of addressing little situations that might crop up.

"It is also mental support as well because you do feel that you are on your own at times because you virtually have someone who is non-verbal at home."

However, Mrs Tonks is preparing for the future.

"In our situation, at this point in time, there are no signs of aggression, and I put David in the mid-range of being affected, so I understand things are going to get worse as time goes on," Mrs Tonks said.

"Talking to others gives you the understanding that other people experience these things, and it is not just you that is



it a whole lot easier because I felt I was going to have quite a challenge from him in doing it," she said.

"We had been together for so long, talking to somebody about what you notice and the change is hard, but David was there and he was very supportive."

In 2022 a brain scan was ordered, with the geriatrician saying 'I hope that the MRI scans don't show what I believe they may show, so we will wait and see'.

Before the results were received, a family friend also expressed his fears after bringing Mr Tonks home from a men's lunch.

"I thought the front door was being bashed down on this particular day," Mrs Tonks said.

"The friend said 'Yvonne, I have got him

"At any point in time that could go, and you will go from being fully functional now to unable to do a thing."

Mrs Tonks said the announcement "really rocked her".

"It felt the same as it did when we, as a family, were told my dad had terminal cancer and he had six months to live - it was the same feeling," she said.

Mrs Tonks has now slipped into the role of her husband's carer.

"At this point in time, while his symptoms have increased, he is still functioning very

'I guess he has become very regimented in doing what he does, and you just have to accept the fact and that it is what it is, and you tailor your life around it."

These days Mrs Tonkin has the support of the Adelaide Hills Dementia Carers Support Group and Dementia Australia, and has also completed courses through the Wicking Dementia Centre.

"My tips for other people who are going on this journey is, if you start to notice changes, no matter how small, just write them down, and see if it is a recurring thing," she said.

"Have the hearing and the eyesight tested to rule out the simple things first, and then if it continues, it is very important to start to seek help and be persistent.

going through it.

Mrs Tonks said men in particular found asking for help difficult.

"One man (in the support group) said he felt that he was being dishonourable to his wife, as they have been together for many years," Mrs Tonks said.

"He felt that he should cope with this thing because it is very hard for a man to talk about it, but he said coming along to the group allowed him to talk about how he really felt, and he picked up some strategies that he could use at home.

"He didn't feel as bad about the fact that he had gone outside the family and asked for extra help, which had helped him mentally, and he was better able to come to grips with what he was dealing with."




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

Mount Barker apiarist protecting local bees

By Deirdre Graham

A local beekeeper is pleading for more understanding of bees, as the weather warms up and the likelihood of swarms becomes more common.

Mount Barker's Nathan Brown became a beekeeper about five years ago, and is passionate about helping what he terms "homeless little people".

He now travels from McLaren Vale to Tailem Bend relocating bees to safer homes.

"With bees they are really amazing, little creatures where they remember a smell and the identities of every single person – what they look like, what they smell like, and how they act," he said.

"Each hive is its own little universe, and one week is a year for them, so their life expectancy is 90 days during any season other than winter where they live for 45 days because they overwork themselves."

Mr Brown warned people not to approach bees in an aggressive manner.

"Usually the peak time is from the end of spring all the way to December," he said.

"If people do see swarms don't stress, don't spray them with a hose, and don't use any bug spray or anything like that.

"They are homeless little people, so literally, with a swarm I can walk up to them without having a suit on, cut them off a branch or take them out of a bird box, or whatever they are trying to make a new home for themselves.

"Basically, I don't need a suit because they have nothing to defend unless you start spraying them with water in which case, they are going to try and defend themselves,

which is normal."

Without bees, Mr Brown said plants would diminish and ecologies would be under threat.

"If you look at all of the flowers and everything else that needs pollination to make seeds, such as your gum trees and roses, cross-pollination is not just about giving a plant a chance to make more flowers, it is a chance for a flower to make more seeds, to regerminate itself and become healthier," he said. "Without the cross-pollination, plants are limited to its single self – it can't crosspollinate with anything else to duplicate itself to make seeds and be healthier.

"Without bees, we are going to lose a lot more plants and then we are not really going to be able to have veggies or (other plants).

"Once we lose all the bees, what are we going to do? – wake up every morning and start with a paint brush to try to crosspollinate everything and try to get it right? "Us humans, we can't tell, unless it is a veggie, what is a female flower and what is a male flower, so we could easily crosspollinate a female flower with a female flower, and a male flower with a male flower, and that will do absolutely nothing."

People wanting to help out bees can plant flowers such as lavenders or almost any vibrant flowers in their gardens.

If they are making a home somewhere that is not practical, call a bee keeper for advice.

"If they rock up on a tree, just leave them, as they are still trying to find a place to move in to," Mr Brown said

"If they do land up on a building, then definitely call us as soon as possible.

"If they have flown into bird boxes, leave them be or give us a call and we can come out and rehome them, and give back the bird box."

Mr Brown said swarms were all about giving old queen bees some rest.

"She can't travel like all the other bees can because she is highly impregnated from whenever, so with a swarm, it is the old queen leaving the hive and the new queen threatening the old queen about being alive," he said.

"The old queen is running around her hive going 'Oh my God, someone wants to hurt me and kill me because she is a new queen and wants to take over the hive – I need workers and I need my family still'.

"So, she gathers as many as she can and she leaves.

"Therefore, they have nothing to protect and all they want to do is, like us humans, find shelter where they can keep warm and safe."

All regular feedlots were present and active, operating on suitable steers and heifers approximately 360kg and more.



Sisters making flowers bloom at Langhorne Creek



Langhorne Creek sisters Kate and Sarah Elliott run a business which is "blooming" – a flower farm on an acre plot of the family vineyard.

While Vineyard Flower Patch is small and relatively young at two-years-old, they manage to grow more then 60 varieties across the year.

It all began with Kate's life-long love of flowers.

"I think it stemmed from Kate growing dahlias in her garden, and then, because they have tubers on the bottom, she pulled them all up," Sarah said.

"She didn't have enough room to plant them all at her house, so there was an empty paddock right here and we said, 'let's just plant a couple of rows out here'.

"Then, when they grew, we were like, 'Oh, they are so pretty, we could probably sell them."

Their first crops were dahlias, sunflowers, zinnias, and some statice.

"We grow a lot," Kate said.

"It is Spring at the moment, so we have ranunculus, stock, poppies, Queen Anne's lace, sweet peas, and straw flowers, and then coming into summer, we will have dahlias, sweet peas, and snap dragons."

Growing flowers can be quite labour intensive. "They are on drippers, so they get watered," Sarah said.

"We use some liquid fertiliser, we put in slow-release fertiliser in the soil, ns compost, and weed."

And you need to know how to maintain them. "Things like cutting them back, and knowing what season they need to be planted in and picked," Kate said.

"Because they are seasonal... you plant them and then they die, then you need to replant them, so it is a continuous cycle of growing from seed, planting them, picking them, and then changing your crop to something else."

For Kate, she loves the whole process.

"Ever since I was little, I have always grown a lot of plants, and always had indoor plants," she said.

"I just love flowers – I have a real passion. "It is not even the picking time really, although that is the end product and the beautiful part, but I love planting them in the ground, seeing them grow, and seeing them change with the different seasons.

"There will be lots of flowers at one stage and hardly any at another, so I just love the excitement that it brings when the flowers are beginning and the buds are starting."



So far there is no machine for cutting flowers, so it is done by hand first thing in the morning when it is nice and cool.

"We have a pair of snips, and you go along and cut them," Sarah said.

"For a big haul to Adelaide, when we take a car load, that probably takes a few hours to cut – about 10 to 12 buckets."

The Elliotts sell their flowers locally at a stall called Googies & Greens, the Langhorne Creek town store and The Potting Shed.

They also sell to florists in Adelaide, Victor Harbor and Goolwa, along with wedding florists who will ask for what they need, and those buying for themselves.

They have a small greenhouse where they grow the seeds they collect, along with purchasing plugs from wholesale places and online that are all planted out.

The business has been doing so well that expansion plans have been discussed.

"I am always wanting to get bigger, but need to discuss that with the family," Kate said. "At the moment we have over an acre and

that is getting pretty big for us to manage. "We both have other jobs that we do as well, so it is not a full-time job for either of us, and we also need to have an area that is rabbit-proof.

"What we have got now has a rabbit-proof fence the whole way around it, so if we did expand, we would have to move to another area on the farm and start again."

All flowers have their fans.

At the moment Sarah loves the ranunculus, while the scent from the stock and the delphiniums make them favourites for Kate. Dahlias remain one of the most popular

for buyers.

"I think it is all about the season," Kate said. "Ranunculus are quite popular at the moment.

"They are so pretty, but they only last for six weeks and then it is time to move on to a different flower, so dahlias and ranunculus – those sorts of seasonal flowers – are always really popular, and no-one gets sick of them as they are only around such a short time."

Kate and Sarah are also passionate about pushing Australian-made produce, encouraging people to buy locally.

"We think it is really important that people buy seasonal flowers and support their local



farmers," Kate said.

"About 50 per cent of flowers are imported to Australia, so to have seasonal flowers is good for the environment, for the local farmer, and Australians.

"They are fresh, they are beautiful, and there is no sprays or chemicals added to them to make them last longer.

"So, it is such an important thing to always think about the flowers you are buying, and think about the fact that seasonal flowers are always going to be a bit more special."

The whole album is an almost noskipper and I have no doubt a shiny gold Grammy is awaiting Carpenter's future.





Cuthbert takes on Magpies job full time

Taking a long-term approach to rebuilding the senior side, Goolwa/Port Elliot Football Club's new A Grade Men Coach Dale Cuthbert is hoping to recruit some more experienced players, continue developing the youth, and celebrate the small wins in order to see some success next season.

Cuthbert is a Life Member of both the club and the Great Southern Football League, and is a long-time player, starting his career in the Mini Colts almost four decades ago.

"I've been playing since I was a kid, so I've probably been at Goolwa playing footy since I was five or six." he said.

footy since I was five or six," he said. "My dad played footy for Goolwa when he was younger as well – he played in three premierships back in the '70s – so I just started playing when I was a kid in the Mini Colts."

Cuthbert comes into the role with some experience under his belt.

He previously coached the club's Senior Colts in 2021, 2022 and 2023, was Assistant Coach for the Under 17s when they won the 2012 premiership, and stepped in this season as Interim Coach for the A Grade Side when they lost their coach after round four.

"It was interesting," Cuthbert explained.

"Obviously, on-field results weren't what we were after, but we were coming from a long way back.

'The way we started the year was pretty poor and it was a pretty tough time after the previous Coach Trevor left after round four – we had just lost to Victor by 300 points, so it was a pretty bleak time for the footy club - but sort of the second half of the year I actually really enjoyed the coaching and just the challenge to it. "We knew it wasn't so much about wins and losses, it was more about improvement and building on some offfield stuff, and we really did (that) and started to reduce those deficits by quite a bit. "I tried to build a bit of camaraderie around the group and use this year as building upon a mini preseason for next year, which was good. It's this experience that encouraged Cuthbert to apply for the full-time position. "I didn't really have that goal to start with, I was just the Interim Coach trying to help out in whatever way I could," he said.

and I had a few chats with some people close to me, (that I) decided it was something I was interested in doing longer term."

While he is yet to know whether he will both play and coach next season, Cuthbert will continue to train, but hoped to recruit over the summer and add some depth to the squad so that his contributions aren't needed on the field.

His plan for the upcoming season is to focus on improvement first and worry about success later.

Cuthbert also wanted to build on the team's fitness during the preseason.

"For me, it's more just focusing on building something – taking a long-term approach and getting some development into our kids, but we also want to add some quality to the squad, so I think if we can add five or six quality players and we can continue to develop the young guys, we can turn it around pretty quick," Cuthbert said.

"That might not mean finals next year – it might mean we finish seventh or eighth.

"Let's not cap where we can go and what we can achieve, and let's just look at getting the process right and improving step-by-step.

"It will be a lot different next year going forward with a full preseason under our belts, so we can actually spend the summer working on some things.

"I think as a group we definitely need to work a bit harder and get fit over the Summer."

Cuthbert will be assisted by 133-game AFL player Barnaby French.

"But it wasn't until probably later in the year where I was really enjoying it and we did start to see some results, Together, Cuthbert is looking forward to making those small wins with the team and working with the players on a oneon-one basis.

"Obviously as a group we want to build something going forward for the future, and start to put in a process to get some sustained success, but a lot of the time you can get some small wins from seeing those individuals improve on things you're working on during the week," he said.

"We're going to look to get some games filmed and watch some video as well, so I think that's a really important step of actually seeing some of the things we're talking about on film – how we're trying to play and move the footy.

"(Then) sitting down with the guys, and going through that and chatting one-onone – that's a good way for the guys to learn as well."

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
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
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
